What was PERC?

- Pursuing Equitable Restorative Communities
- Grant from Department of Justice through Comprehensive Safe Schools Initiative
 - Awarded October 2014
 - \$3M over 3 years
 - o 22 schools
- Implementation Partner: International Institute for Restorative Practices (IIRP)
- Research Partner: RAND
- Randomized controlled trial two year implementation of SaferSanerSchools Whole School Change model at 22 selected schools

1. Affective Statements	School-wide		
Personal expressions of emotion in response to another person's			
behavior, e.g. "I'm proud of your effort on this assignment"			
2. Restorative Questions	School-wide		
Set 1: What happened? What were you thinking of at the time? What			
have you thought about since? Who has been affected by what you			
have done? In what way have they been affected? What do you			
need to do to make things right?			
Set 2: What did you think when you realized what had happened?			
What impact has this incident had on your and others? What has			
been the hardest thing for you? What do you think needs to happen			
to make things right?

4. Proactive Circles	Broad-based

5. Responsive Circles	Broad-based

6. Restorative Conferences	Targeted

7. Fair Process			
Observing engagement, explanation and expectation clarity in	School-wide		
decision making.			
8. Reintegrative Management of Shame			
Using shame productively to strengthen ties between the offender	School-wide		
and the community, rather than stigmatizing the offender and			
pushing them out of the community.			
9. Restorative Staff Community	School-wide		
Utilizing restorative practices among staff.			
10. Restorative Approach with Families	Broad-based		
Utilizing restorative practices with families.	School-wide		
11. Fundamental Hypothesis Understandings			
"Human beings are happier, more cooperative and productive, and			
more likely to make positive changes in their behavior when those in			
positions of authority do things with them, rather than to them or for			
them." (From IIRP)			

School-wide: all staff who interact with children; **Broad-based:** administrators, teachers, counselors, social workers, etc (all but non-instructional staff); **Targeted:** those who carry out a specific element, e.g. conferencing
