EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

Legislative Meeting of May 24, 2000

In addition to executive sessions announced at the legislative meeting of April 26, 2000, the Board met in executive session on May 15, and immediately before this legislative meeting to discuss various matters relating to personnel, specifically staffing, including transfers, resignations, ratings, suspensions, terminations, sabbatical leaves, residency waivers, additional work days, summer school assignments, and the Solicitor and outside counsel discussed various matters in litigation.

Finally, at the executive session immediately before this legislative meeting, the Board discussed student discipline cases that involved violations of various portions of the Code of Student Conduct.

The Board does not vote at executive sessions.

COMMITTEE ON STUDENT SERVICES

May 24, 2000

DIRECTORS:

The Committee on Student Services recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

Proposals/Grant Awards

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to submit proposals for grants and accept grant awards in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 5, inclusive.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That upon approval of the grant by the granting agency, the Board authorize the establishment of appropriate accounts and, where necessary to implement the grant, authorize the advancement of funds to operate the program until the grant and fees are received.

- 1. Acceptance of a grant of \$49,500 from Youth Works to support the Health Careers program at Oliver High School. Once students have successfully completed the training in a selected Health Career area, they will be placed on job sites. Dates of operation include July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001.
- 2. Acceptance of a grant of \$5,000 from the Community Revitalization Assistance Program to erect a community memorial at Banksville Elementary School. The memorial will consist of an historic bell donated by the Banksville Civic Association and a planting area.
- 3. Acceptance of a grant of \$90,000 from the PADOE for support of the operation of the Even Start Family Literacy Program, which shall provide summer reading activities to program participants and other community children and families. The increased funding shall 1) better assist in the promotions of the importance of the parent's role in their child's literacy development and 2) stress the significance of

parent-child reading activities. Dates of operation include July 1, 2000 through August 31, 2001.

- 4. Acceptance of a grant of \$250,000 of USDOE funds from the PADOE to support the operation of an Even Start Family Literacy Program, which will provide educational/partnering instruction to children and their parents, utilizing the following program components: Adult education, early childhood education, parenting and parent and child together (PACT) time. Dates of operation include July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001.
- 5. Submission of a proposal to the Danforth Foundation for a grant of \$25,000 to support activities related to the Superintendent-Elect's transition plan, including a Transition Forum Meeting, to be held on June 4-6, 2000. Dates of operation include June 1, 2000 through December 31, 2000.

Consultants/Contracted Services

RESOLVED, That the Board authorize its proper officers to enter into contracts with the following individuals for the services and fees set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 14, inclusive.

- 1. <u>Sarah Decesar</u> To continue the psychological testing (subsequent to the resignation of a former psychologist) of potentially gifted students referred through the Jacob Javits Research Project, Project Enterprise: Pittsburgh. The consultant shall be required to document results and meet with parents and project staff after each evaluation.
- 2. Regina Oliva To provide tutoring to Title 1 students at Minadeo Elementary School. Ms. Oliva will be at Minadeo three hours per day during the school year, and she will provide tutoring to students identified as partially proficient or below. Dates of operation include September 2000 through June 2001. Payment shall be at the rate of \$780 per month, total amount not to exceed \$7,020 from Account # 4155-235-1490-323.
- 3. Western PA Writing Project To provide four Arts Integration workshops for students and parents. The workshops will be conducted in the evening from 6:00 7:30 p.m. Dates of operation include May 29, 2000 through June 9, 2000. Payment shall be at the rate of \$1,000 from account #4155-122-2810-323.
- 4. MAPS Program To provide prevention education in classrooms and groups at Crescent Elementary School. The topics include saying no to alcohol and drugs, anger management, conflict resolution, coping skills and safe/healthy choices. Individual counseling, parent education and staff development will be provided, and crisis intervention will be provided as needed. Dates of operation include April 19, 2000 through June 30, 2000. Payment shall be at the rate of \$31.50 per

hour, total amount not to exceed \$4,032 from an account to be determined. Funds to support this project are from the Safe Schools State Grant,

- 5. Marcia Freeman To provide support to the Communications Team and Literacy Lead Teachers. She will also visit classrooms for ongoing support in elementary writing using her text, Building a Writing Community. Dates of operation include September 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001. Payment shall be at the rate of \$1,500 per day, total amount not to exceed \$18,000 from account #4600-087-2270-323.
- 6. <u>Carnegie Institute of Pittsburgh</u> To provide summer reading activities as part of an Even Start Family Literacy Program, to program participants and other community children and families. In addition, community library activities shall be provided to the participants of the program. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$70,000, as invoiced, from an account to be established.
- 7. <u>Council of Three Rivers</u> To provide tutorial and instructional support to students at Beltzhoover Elementary School. The tutoring will occur after school for fifteen (15) students in the school's Read to Succeed Program. The Program will operate from May 25, 2000 through June 30, 2000. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$15,000 from account #4107-137-1490-323.
- 8. This item was removed from the agenda.
- Penn State, McKeesport Campus Students To provide Summer Enrichment Program (DARE 2XL) for up to eighty (80) elementary-age students for a threeweek period from July 3, 2000 to July 20, 2000 at Phillip Murray Elementary School. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$19,500 from account #4800-235-1490-323.
- 10. Edge Associates To provide Consultation, Coaching, Training and Technical Assistance to the Federal Programs Coordinator and Head Start Staff. The support will be provided from June 1, 2000 through June 1, 2001. Payment shall be at the rate of \$2,500 to \$3,000 per month, total amount not to exceed \$36,000 from account # 4800-076-1441-330 and an account TBE.
- 11. <u>Sheraden Homework and Computer Center</u> Provision of a two-week computer camp for up to thirty (30) elementary-age students. The program shall be staffed by two (2) certified teachers; transportation shall be provided for participants. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$9,170 from Account #4800-235-1490-323.
- 12. <u>Educational Resources</u> To train and coach Vann Elementary School teachers and educational assistants in the implementation of the Direct Instruction School Reform Model during the period of June 1 through September 30, 2000.

Payment shall be at the rate of \$1,000 per day plus expenses from Account #4183-137-1490-323. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$34,000.

- 13. <u>Educational</u> Resources To train and coach Miller Elementary School teachers and educational assistants in the implementation of the Direct Instruction School Reform Model during the period of June 1 through September 30, 2000. Payment shall be at the rate of \$1,000 per day plus expenses from an account to be established. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$53,000.
- 14. <u>Educational</u> Resources To train and coach McKelvy Elementary School teachers and educational assistants in the implementation of the Direct Instruction School Reform Model during the period of June 1 through September 30, 2000. Payment shall be at the rate of \$1,000 per day plus expenses from an account to be established. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$24,000.

- 1. The ten month Boggs Avenue Head Start staff To work ten days between June 21, 2000 and July 6, 2000 at daily rates between \$90.11 and \$165.10 per day, total amount not to exceed \$15,900 from Fund #076.
- 2. Fifteen (15) South Hills Middle School Teachers and one Aide To provide a safe school summer camp for incoming sixth grade students. The camp will be held on June 26 through 29, 2000. Payment shall be at the prevailing workshop rate of \$19.41 for teachers and \$9.57 for the aide, total amount not to exceed \$5,113 from account # 4020 160 2190 124.
- 3. Robert Christie To provide an exploratory experience for fifteen (15) middle school students at McConnel's Mill. The students shall participate in group activities that focus on cooperative skill building and interpersonal relationships. Payment for this activity shall not exceed \$1,100 from Funds 160 and 602.
- 4. In Connection with Summer Camp Educational Experiences at Carnegie Mellon University, Edinboro University, and McKeever Learning Center for Students in the Westinghouse Science and Math Program, Payment to the Following Employees from Account #4327-081-1490-157:
 - a. Shirley Wheaton To plan and implement the summer experiences. Payment shall be at the rate of \$107.22 per day for fourteen (14) days of on-site supervision at the Summer Science Academies. In addition, Ms.

Wheaten shall be compensated for planning that occurs after normal working hours. The total amount of this action shall not exceed \$4,000.

- b. Calvin Stemley To assist with the Summer Experience and to work various dates during the months of June and July. Payment shall be at the workshop rate of \$19.41 per hour for eight hours per day on June 19 and 20 (prior to the close of the school year). For all dates worked after the close of the school year, payment shall be at the per diem rate of \$356.51. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$4,588.52.
- c. Rhonda Graham -- To assist with the Summer Experience and participate in the McKeever Learning Center camp, which shall operate from July 17, 2000 through July 21, 2000. Payment shall be at the per diem rate of \$171.88, total amount not to exceed \$859.40.
- d. Edward Epstein To assist with the Summer Experience at the Edinboro University camp, which shall operate from June 26, 2000 through June 30, 2000. Payment shall be at the per diem rate of \$184.90, total amount not to exceed \$924.50.
- 5. Nemacolin Woodlands, Fort Pitt Teachers and Paraprofessionals— For a retreat to be held for the staff of Fort Pitt Elementary School. The staff shall participate in staff development activities on literacy and standards-based classrooms. The retreat will be held from June 27, 2000 through June 30, 2000. The cost of transportation, accommodations and meals is approximately \$32,000. The staff shall be paid at the prevailing workshop rates of \$19.41 for teachers and \$9.57 for paraprofessionals, total amount not to exceed \$44,966 from Account #s 4131-122-2810-(582/124/125) and 4131-077-1490-157.
- 6. Up to Four Teachers, One Clerk and Fifteen Parents To participate in the Washington Polytechnic Academy Extended Day Program from September 2000 through June 2001. Payment shall be at the rate of \$19.41 for teachers, \$9.57 for paraprofessionals and \$10 per day for childcare and transportation reimbursement to parents. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$19,750 from Account #s 4290-TBE-1490 (124/157) and 4290-TBE-3300-599.
- 7. Doris Robinson To work eight extra days in the summer, performing clerical responsibilities associated with the testing of special needs students. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$952 from Account #4100-010-2380-153.
- 8. Up to Three Teachers To provide training and professional development for teachers and paraprofessionals in the Early Literacy Extended Year Program. The program shall operate from June 28, 2000 through July 26, 2000. Each teacher shall be paid a stipend of \$3,000, total amount not to exceed \$9,000 from Account #4600-087-2270-124.

- 9. ARAMARK Corporation To provide catered boxed lunches and afternoon snacks during the Summer Institute. Payment will be at the rate of \$6 per lunch and \$3 per snack per day for 220 participants and presenters. The Summer Institute will be held from June 21, 2000 through June 23, 2000. Total amount not to exceed \$5,940 from Account #5500-285-2390-635.
- 10. Up to four persons To serve as facilitators for the Summer Institute. Each person shall be paid for eight days at their per diem rate, total amount not to exceed \$11,200 from Account #s 5141-241-1241 and 5500-285-2390-136.
- 11. Duquesne University To provide parking for two hundred twenty (220) participants and presenters at the Summer Institute. Payment shall be at the rate of \$4 per car per day, total amount not to exceed \$2,640 from Account #5500-285-2390-599.
- 12. One Teacher To work with the Assistant Director of Science. Payment shall be at the workshop rate of \$19.41 per hour for a total of 258 hours, total amount not to exceed \$5,008 from Account #4000-240-2270-124.
- 13. Up to Two Group Supervisors and Two Aides To provide day care services at the Oliver High School Day Care Center for teen parents who must attend summer school at Oliver, total cost not to exceed \$7,000 from an account to be established.
- 14. Various Personnel To participate in the District's Elementary School Extended Year Literacy and Learning Initiative. This initiative will be supported by the Grable and Heinz Supplementary Funds and Title 1, total amount not to exceed \$424,130.11 from accounts to be established.
- 15. Michael S. Markantone Catering To provide catering services for the Head Start Annual Training and Volunteer Recognition Day Program on June 10, 2000 for up to three-hundred (300) participants, including staff, community and parent volunteers and administrators, total amount not to exceed \$6,231 from Account #4800-076-1441-599.
- 16. Up to Four Teachers To implement an After School Tutoring program at Spring Hill Elementary School. Payment shall be at the workshop rate of \$19.41 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$1,700 from Account #4178-235-1490-124.
- 17. Approximately Twelve (12) Social workers and counselors To complete the Pupil Services Curriculum Guide and revise the Pupil Services portion of the District's Safe Schools Plan. The activity is to be completed by July 30, 2000. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$12,495 from Account #4024-125-2190-124.

- 18. Up to Ten Teachers To conduct the Summer Learning Camp at West Liberty classical Academy from July 5, 2000 through August 3, 2000. Payment shall be at the workshop rate of \$19.41 per hour. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$8,800 from Account #4285-235-1490-124.
- 19. Three (3) Teachers, Sherdina Jones, Marianne Muraska and Amy Troyani To work on a pro-rated basis for twelve (12) days between June 22 and July 14. The teachers shall support the curriculum efforts of the Phase III participating teachers; facilitate attendance; support set-up and concluding activities; and collect and disseminate lesson plans and curriculum units developed during the summer session by developing a webpage for the summer session. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$13,000 from Account #4000-212-2270-125.
- 20. In connection with the District's Technology Plan, payment at salary pro-rata for six teachers for ten days between July 3 and July 21, 2000 and the employment of Willie Jenkins, Coordinator of the project, for twenty-five (25) days between June 26 and August 11, for the development of web pages for each of the thirty (30) content-specific software packages piloted by the teachers involved in the work supported by the Buhl Foundation grant. They shall finalize and put online the software evaluation form developed by the teachers and develop a set of guidelines for how to select content-specific software. The total cost of this action is not to exceed \$31,000 from Account #7000-042-2260-122.
- 21. Employment of Six (6) Health Program instructors, Three (3) Vocational Assistants, One (1) ABE/GED coordinator, and three (3) ABE/GED teachers or their substitutes at the Connelley Technical Institute and Adult Education Center for the period between June 12, 2000 and August 22, 2000. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$66,746 from various supplemental funds.
- 22. Camp Deer Creek For an Extended School Year Program at Camp Deer Creek for a student with severe disabilities. Payment shall not exceed \$1,800 from Account #5544-285-2390-330.
- 23. Up to Fifteen (15) High School Teachers And Twenty-Five (25) Middle School Teachers Payment at the workshop rate to score high school and middle school language arts portfolios for one week between July 1 and August 31, 2000. The total cost of this action is not to exceed \$20,000 from Account #4600-163-2270-125.

Amend Contract Number 0B6139 with Professional Services Industries, Inc.: Add \$34,000 to provide additional construction materials testing and inspection for the Westinghouse construction project. The total contract amount is not to exceed \$54,000.00, chargeable to account number 327-9305-327-4500-340.
- 6. Enter into an agreement with Compaq Enterprise Consulting Services to provide ongoing annual hardware and software technical support services for the centralized Compaq SMP servers. The total contract amount is not to exceed \$38,000.00, with annual increases not to exceed 6%, chargeable to account number 001-7000-010-2844-330.
- 7. Enter into an agreement with Compaq Enterprise Consulting Services to provide performance tuning and optimization services, and service cluster implementation services. The total contract amount is not to exceed \$25,000.00, chargeable to account number 001-7000-362-2170-330.
- 8. Enter into an agreement with Klynveld, Peat, Marwick and Goerdeler (KPMG) to conduct an accounts payable audit, including an examination of the District's paid invoices and related documentation in order to identify overpayments to vendors. The

base fee for services is \$2,000, plus out-of-pocket expenses, and a contingency not to exceed 33.33% of overpayments recovered. The total contact amount is not to exceed \$2,000.00, chargeable to account number 001-9000-010-2500-330.

9. Enter in an agreement with James Baumiller to provide on-call payroll administration training and assistance to the Office of Business Affairs/Payroll from May 24, 2000 through June 30, 2001. The total contract amount is not to exceed \$5,000.00, chargeable to account number 001-9103-010-2514-330.

GENERAL AUTHORIZATIONS.

10. WHEREAS, the City and School District of Pittsburgh have individually and jointly developed recreational facilities for the use of city residents and students, and

WHEREAS, the City and School District of Pittsburgh use one another's facilities from time to time for various programs or events, and

WHEREAS, the City and School District of Pittsburgh wish to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of recreational service delivery to our city residents and students,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to enter into a cooperation agreement with the City of Pittsburgh for the shared use of facilities;

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That the cooperation agreement shall specify the rights and responsibilities of each party through addenda,

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That the rights and responsibilities of each party may be added, deleted or amended from time to time with approval from the Secretary or Assistant Secretary to the Board,

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That compensation to the respective parties shall be based upon each entity's recreational usage and fee structure as identified in the addenda with the net balance due from each party payable upon sixty days written notice for reasons including, but not limited to, violations of the agreement,

RESOLVED, FINALLY, That the cooperation agreement be subject to other terms and conditions as are satisfactory to the Solicitor and Executive Director of Business Affairs.

11. WHEREAS, the City of Pittsburgh owns a park adjacent to Banskville School, and

WHEREAS, the City of Pittsburgh has asked the School District to allow water and sewer connections be made to the plumbing system at Banksville School to service the City Park (said connections to be metered so that water/sewer usage can be charged to the City of Pittsburgh),

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board authorize entry into an agreement with the City of Pittsburgh allowing for water and sewer connections to be made at Banksville School for the adjacent City Park.

12. A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING TAX EXEMPTIONS FROM PROPERTY TAX FOR CERTAIN DETERIORATED INDUSTRIAL, COMMERCIAL OR OTHER BUSINESS PROPERTY AND PROVIDING A PROCEDURE FOR SECURING AN EXEMPTION.

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of Pennsylvania passed Act 76 of 1977 (72 P.S. 4722 et seq.) known as the Local Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance Law (LERTA) which authorized local taxing authorities to provide, *inter alia*, for tax exemption for certain deteriorated industrial, commercial and other business property located in deteriorated areas; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of Pittsburgh, in accordance with said act, held a public hearing to determine the boundaries of said deteriorated areas; and

WHEREAS, at said public hearing the Planning Commission of the City of Pittsburgh and other agencies and individuals presented to City Council their recommendations concerning the location of the boundaries of deteriorated areas; and

WHEREAS, the City of Pittsburgh thereafter, by Ordinance, affixed the boundaries of deteriorated areas for purposes of Act 76 of 1977; and

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved By The Board of Public Education.

A. DEFINITIONS.

As used in this Resolution, the following words and phrases shall have the meaning set forth below:

- (1) <u>Board</u>. The Board of Property Assessment, Appeals and Review of Allegheny County or its successor(s), if any, responsible for assessing properties in the City of Pittsburgh.
- (2) Deteriorated Areas. Those locations in the City of Pittsburgh which City Council, after public hearings, has determined to be physically impaired on the basis of one or more standards including, but not limited to, the following:

- (a) The buildings, by reason of age, obsolescence, inadequate or outmoded design or physical deterioration have become economic or social liabilities.
- (b) The buildings are substandard, unsanitary, unhealthy or unsafe.
- (c) The buildings are overcrowded, poorly spaced or so lacking in light, space and air as to be unwholesome.
- (d) The buildings are faultily arranged, cover the land to an excessive extent, show a deleterious use of land, or exhibit any combination of the above which is detrimental to health, safety or welfare.
- (e) A significant percentage of buildings is more than 20 years of age.
- (f) A substantial amount of unimproved, overgrown and unsightly vacant land exists which has remained so for a period of five years or more indicating a growing or total lack of utilization of land for economically desirable purposes.
- (g) A disproportionate number of tax delinquent properties exists.
- (h) The area is impoverished as certified by the Department of Community Affairs and approved by the Governor under the Act of November 29, 1967, P.L. 636, No. 292, as amended, (Neighborhood Assistance Act) or blighted under criteria set forth in the Act of May 24, 1945, P.L. 99] No. 385 (Urban Redevelopment Law).
- (3) Construction. The erection of a building or buildings on formerly unoccupied land or air space or on land or air space on or in which undesirable buildings which formerly existed have been demolished or razed, which erection consists of industrial, commercial or other business units designed to bring about higher standards of safety, health, economic or sociological growth or amenity.
- (4) Improvement. Repair or construction (as defined in subsection (c) hereof) including alterations and additions, having the effect of rehabilitating an existing structure so that it allows higher standards of safety, health, economic or social amenity or the bringing into compliance of the structure with laws, ordinances or regulations governing building standards. Ordinary upkeep and maintenance shall not be deemed an improvement. The conversion of deteriorated property (as defined in subsection (g) hereof) to commercial residential use shall qualify as an improvement for purposes of this chapter.

- (5) <u>Deteriorated Property</u>. Any industrial, commercial or other business property owned by an individual, partnership, association or corporation which is located in a deteriorating area; or any property which as been the subject of an order of a government agency requiring the unit to be vacated, condemned or demolished by reason of noncompliance with laws, ordinances or regulations.
- (6) Assessed Valuation. The worth assigned to a building as certified to the county by the Board. The term "assessed valuation" shall not apply to the worth assigned to land exclusive of buildings.
- (7) Commercial Residential Use. Space is used for a commercial residential use if it is suitable for and is generally to be used by the occupants for personal residence purposes of six months or more. Commercial residential use does not include residential property occupied by the owner or hotels.
- (8) <u>Project</u>. The improvement of a building carried out during a single continuous period of time according to a common plan.
- (9) Qualified Conversion To Commercial Residential Use. Improvements having the effect of converting all or a portion of property located in a deteriorated underutilized transition area to commercial residential use, so that it becomes habitable, provided that at least fifty percent (50%) of the total building area, measured by floor area at ground level and above is so converted. Neither new construction nor ordinary upkeep and maintenance shall not be deemed a qualified improvement for this purpose.
- (10) Converted Residential Portion. That portion of a building which in a "qualified conversion to commercial residential use" is converted to commercial residential use, measured by floor area between ground level and the roof together with any area of the property to be used for parking by residents or guests only and not by the public.
- Stanwix Street and continues north on Stanwix Street to the Boulevard of the Allies. The boundary line continues along the Boulevard of the Allies and then follows Wood Street north until Fourth Avenue. The boundary line then continues eastward on Fourth Avenue until Smithfield Street then southward until the Boulevard of the Allies. The area then continues east on the Boulevard of the Allies and stops before Grant Street where it continues until it meets First Avenue. The boundary then follows First Avenue west until its intersection with Stanwix Street.

- (12) Strip District. The area begins at Penn Avenue and Eleventh Street and continues north on Eleventh Street to the Allegheny River. The boundary line continues along the river to the Thirty-first Street and goes south to Liberty Avenue. The boundary line then continues east for a block to Thirty-second Street until it meets Sassafras Way. The boundary then follows Sassafras west until it meets Twenty-eighth Street. The area then continues down Twenty-eighth Street to Liberty Avenue until Sixteenth Street at which point the boundary continues westward on Penn Avenue to the intersection of Eleventh Street.
- (13) <u>Uptown</u>. The area begins at Forbes Avenue and Boyd Street and continues east along Forbes Avenue to the Birmingham Bridge. The boundary line then follows the curve along Kirkpatrick Street and turns westward on Colwell Street until Washington Place. At Washington Place, the boundary line then continues south to Fifth Avenue, then down Diamond Street and back to the intersection of Forbes Avenue and Boyd Streets.
- Cultural District. The area begins at Liberty Avenue and Sixth Street and continues north on Sixth Street to Fort Duquesne Boulevard. The boundary line then follows Fort Duquesne Boulevard to Garrison Place and turns southward to French Street and continues to Tenth Street. The boundary then follows Tenth Street to Liberty Avenue. The boundary goes past Liberty Avenue to William Penn Place and continues along William Penn Place until Seventh Avenue. The boundary then follows Seventh Avenue until Smithfield Street. At Smithfield Street, the boundary continues south to Strawberry Way for one block and then follows Coffee Way north. The boundary continues along Coffee Way until it meets Sixth Avenue where it follows Liberty Avenue west to its intersection with Sixth Street.
- which, after public hearing, City Council, on or before May 24, 2000, has determined to be physically impaired on the basis of one or more standards set forth in (b) above and additionally containing a higher percentage of poorly spaced, large, at least 20 years old, underutilized buildings with a design no longer conducive to the original, commercial, industrial or other business use.
- (16) <u>Tax Delinquency</u>. All School District of Pittsburgh taxes, charges, fees, rents or claims due and unpaid by the owner of the deteriorated property or with respect to the deteriorated property as of the time of the application for a exemption or at any time thereafter during the term of the exemption. The term includes all penalties, additions, interest, attorney's fees and costs due on such delinquent taxes, charges, rents or claims.

B. BOUNDARIES.

The City of Pittsburgh has determined as a fact that Wards numbered 1 through 32, of the City of Pittsburgh, respectively, constitute "deteriorated areas" and within those areas, First Side, the Strip District, Uptown and the Cultural District, all as described above, constitute "deteriorated underutilized transition areas", within the purview of Act 76 of 1977.

C. EXEMPTION SCHEDULE.

- (1) Any person undertaking a project which is a qualified conversion to commercial residential use may apply for and receive an exemption of real property taxes with respect to the converted residential portion. The exemption granted is applicable to the tax upon assessed valuation attributable to the improvements to the converted residential portion and is limited to 10 years. The exemption is 100% for the first year and declines 10% for each year thereafter with the exemption being 10% in the tenth year. No exemption applies in the eleventh year or thereafter.
- (2) No exemption is granted other than as set forth in (a) above.

D. EXEMPTION CONDITIONS.

- (1) Exemption from taxation on the eligible amount of assessed valuation attributable to a qualified conversion to commercial residential use will commence the year after the completion of the eligible improvement.
- (2) No exemption hereunder shall exceed \$250,000 in any single year. There is no exemption granted on the assessed valuation attributable to land. There is no exemption granted if the improvements are not completed by the end of the third calendar year following the year the initial building permit was issued.
- (3) There is no exemption granted and any existing exemption shall be revoked if and for so long as there exists any tax delinquency with respect to the property or property owner. An exemption for qualified conversion to residential use shall be revoked if and to the extent the property does not continue to be commercial residential use property. Any revocation shall not extend the exemption period set forth in Section 3(a) above.

E. PROCEDURES FOR OBTAINING EXEMPTION.

At the time a person obtains a building permit for a qualified conversion to commercial residential use, that person may apply to the county for exemption of the taxes pursuant to the provisions of this Resolution in the following manner:

- (1) At the time the building permit is obtained, a form prescribed by the school district should be completed and submitted to the school district and to the Board.
- (2) The request for exemption must be in writing and certified on that form setting forth the following information:
 - (a) The date the building permit was issued for the improvement.
 - (b) The summary of the plan of the improvements or the plan of the construction.
 - (c) The actual cost of the improvements or the actual cost of the construction.
 - (d) The additional information as the county may require.
- (3) A property owner shall file a request for exemption with the school district no later than 90 days after the date when the initial building permit for the project is granted.
- (4) When the improvement or construction has been completed, the property owner shall notify the Board and notify the school district. The Board shall then assess the property in question for purposes of calculating the amount of the assessment eligible for tax exemption under this chapter in accordance with Act 76 of 1977.
- (5) The Board shall certify to the school district the amount of the increase in assessment attributable to the improvement. The Treasurer shall then exonerate that portion of the increase and refund the amount of the taxes attributable to the exemption. Provided, however, the Treasurer shall not exonerate taxes if there exists any tax delinquency with respect to the property or the property owner.
- (6) Appeals from the assessment may be taken by the taxpayer or by the school district as provided by law.

F. PROPERTY EXEMPTION.

The exemption from taxes authorized by this chapter shall be upon the property exempted and shall not terminate upon the sale, exchange or other alienation of such property.

G. EFFECTIVE DATE AND TERMINATION.

The provisions of this resolution, as amended, shall apply to all applications filed from and after the effective date hereof and through December 31, 2010. The cost of improvements to be exempted and the schedule of taxes exempted existing at the time of the initial request for tax exemption shall be applicable to that exemption request, and subsequent amendment to this resolution, if any, shall not apply to requests initiated prior to its adoption.

WHEREAS, On January 19, 2000, the representatives of both the School District Administration and James T. Scarpino had agreed to proceed directly to arbitration in lieu of the aforementioned hearing before the Board Member; and

WHEREAS, A hearing was held on March 7, 2000, before Elliot Newman, Arbitrator; and

WHEREAS, Both the School District Administration and James T. Scarpino were represented by competent counsel at the aforementioned hearing; and

WHEREAS, At the arbitration hearing, testimony of various witnesses was taken and exhibits were received into evidence and the professional employee was afforded an opportunity to present any evidence and/or testimony he had relative to the proposed dismissal, and he did so through witnesses and documents; and

WHEREAS, Arbitrator Elliot Newman issued his opinion and award on May 5, 2000, denying the grievance of James T. Scarpino and supporting the Administration's recommendation that he be terminated from the employ of the School District of Pittsburgh; and

WHEREAS, Article 28, Section 11b of the current collective bargaining agreement between the Board and the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers provides, among other things, that "The decision, including awards, of the arbitrator shall be final and binding on the parties."

- 22 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Neiser?
- MS. NEISER: Yes.
- 24 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Schmidt?
- MS. SCHMIDT: Yes.

- 1 MS. ROYAL: Mr. Taylor?
- MS. NEISER: Yes on the report as a whole,
- 3 abstaining on items 11, a. through d.
- 4 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Wood?
- 5 MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 6 MS. ROYAL: Mr. Matthews?
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 8 MS. ROYAL: Nine votes yes on the entire
- 9 report, two abstentions on item 11, a. through d.
- The report passes.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.
- Moving on to Committee on Business Affairs.
- 13 (Thereupon, Mr. Matthews read from prepared
- 14 material.)
- MR. MATTHEWS: Any questions or comments?
- Mr. Brentley, any questions?
- 17 MR. BRENTLEY: No.
- 18 MR. MATTHEWS: Mrs. Schmidt.
- MS. SCHMIDT: I do have a question on
- 20 item 10, Mr. Fellers.
- It talks about developing an agreement with
- 22 the City, with recreational facilities
- Does that include our ball fields and
- 24 things?
- MR. FELLERS: Yes, Mrs. Schmidt, it does.

- This is an attempt to do three things.
- One, to take some lapsed agreements, and
- 3 make them active again.
- Two, to formalize on a first come, first
- 5 served basis, the fact that the City will provide
- 6 fields for our needs athletically, and that we will
- 7 provide inside facilities, gymnasiums and swimming
- 8 pools, for their recreation programs.
- 9 And thirdly, rather than send checks back
- 10 and forth all year long, we will do a settle up at
- 11 year end --
- MS. SCHMIDT: Right.
- 13 MR. FELLERS: -- to try to facilitate the
- 14 relationship between the two entities.
- MS. SCHMIDT: Okay. One of the reasons
- 16 that I asked is that I know the City is starting to do
- 17 an assessment of their ball fields, and their athletic
- 18 fields, and one of the questions that I asked them, is
- 19 how much will we be involved in, and they will be
- 20 doing; they will be doing an assessment of ours, too,
- 21 so I just wanted to make sure that that was included
- 22 in this.
- MR. FELLERS: You should have received a
- 24 report, the fields we used for interscholastics,
- 25 Mr. Pajack and the facilities staff are working on all

- of our fields, and that report will be forthcoming to
- 2 you.
- But as you know, the City and the School
- 4 District, are in great need for added outdoor
- 5 facilities for both recreation and interscholastic
- 6 competition.
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Mrs. Fink.
- 8 MS. FINK: Yes, I have a question, probably
- 9 addressed to Mr. Walluk, on item No. 11, where they
- 10 talk about allowing us to use Banksville's water and
- 11 sewer hookups.
- 12 Whatever type of restroom facilities they
- 13 place there, is that going to come through the lines,
- 14 in Banksville School?
- 15 MR. WALLUK: It should be tied into the
- 16 sewer line after Banksville School.
- 17 The connection will be made into the
- 18 basement, so that it will tie into the sewer and water
- 19 lines at that point.
- 20 MS. FINK: Okay. My concern is that
- 21 knowing how these facilities are very often left
- 22 unchecked for periods of time, I don't want to stuff
- 23 up our plumbing, this is what I am saying, I guess,
- 24 you know.
- MR. WALLUK: It is my understanding that

- 1 this will be checked by the City on a regular basis --
- 2 MS. FINK: Don't hold your breath.
- 3 MR. WALLUK: -- and only be used during the
- 4 spring and summer time, and then they will shut them
- 5 down during the wintertime, there is not that
- 6 connection concern we have to worry about, pipes
- 7 busting and those types of things.
- 8 MS. FINK: I quess I am concerned about
- 9 supervision, more than anything else.
- MR. WALLUK: We also ran this past the
- 11 County Health Department, and they had no problems.
- MS. FINK: Okay. I hope there is something
- in that agreement as to who does the repairs, if
- 14 somebody purposely stuffs up the plumbing, and it
- 15 backs up into the school.
- 16 MR. WALLUK: Clearly, they are
- 17 responsible.
- 18 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 19 Because I just want to be sure.
- The other thing I wanted to ask, on item
- 21 No. 12, where it defines what is a deteriorated area,
- 22 some of these things are so general, that they could
- 23 be any place in the City of Pittsburgh, including our
- 24 school buildings.
- 25 I quess I have a little problem with the

- 1 language, where it defines what a deteriorated area
- 2 is, item (a), the language kind of bothers me, and
- 3 item (e), which is almost anything in the City. Just,
- 4 it kind of concerns me a little bit, that they are
- 5 defining those deteriorated property in that
- 6 fashion.
- 7 MR. FELLERS: Mrs. Fink, we noticed the
- 8 same thing at the agenda review item, and Ira Weiss,
- 9 who is our outside counsel on matters such as this,
- 10 worked with us.
- The restriction to the four regions of
- 12 Uptown, Cultural District, Strip District and First
- 13 Side, are the only areas that this will apply to,
- 14 until we agree that another region be added.
- So while the language is very general, it
- 16 is only general to structures that exist in those
- 17 facilities, and it is only general in the sense that
- 18 it must be a deteriorated commercial structure that is
- 19 converted into housing.
- 20 So it can't be a residential structure, it
- 21 can't be a school, it has to be a commercial
- 22 structure, converted to housing.
- So we think with the changes we
- 24 incorporated in the item, between your agenda review
- 25 meeting, and the legislative meeting, that the

- 1 District's interests are served; that it gives the
- 2 financial benefit to both the City and the School
- 3 District, without creating any hardship for us.
- 4 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 5 I think my concern would be that depending
- 6 on who is doing the defining, a building that may be
- 7 revenue producing, and adequate in most people's eyes
- 8 for the purpose that it's serving, could be declared
- 9 tax exempt, in order to turn it into housing.
- I guess I just -- I just have some problems
- 11 with it, you know.
- MR. MATTHEWS: All right. Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: One of my concerns,
- 14 Mr. Fellers, is the amount of time that has elapsed
- 15 since we received the presentation from the City, and
- 16 I want to be cautious in guessing six months, that
- 17 we --
- 18 MR. FELLERS: You received the presentation
- 19 on February 9th.
- MR. TAYLOR: February 9th of this year?
- 21 MR. FELLERS: Yes, sir.
- 22 MS. NEISER: Oh, I don't think it was --
- MR. FELLERS: Yes, sir.
- 24 As a matter of fact, I forwarded to you two
- 25 weeks ago, the material that was distributed at that

- 1 February 9th meeting, by Dennis Davin, who was at the
- 2 Agenda Review meeting, along with a number of other
- 3 people, to answer questions on the item.
- 4 But --
- 5 MS. NEISER: Okay.
- 6 MR. FELLERS: -- procedurally, they wanted
- 7 to take time and do this right, which is why there was
- 8 the delay.
- 9 I was concerned about that delay, and the
- 10 fact that through the loss of time, it was not fresh
- 11 in everyone's mind.
- MR. TAYLOR: Well, like as I say, maybe I
- 13 wasn't present at that February, so I know, there
- 14 was -- so they made two presentations to the School
- 15 Board then, perhaps I was not at that February 9th
- 16 meeting, since I was at the second one that they
- 17 presented it to the School District?
- 18 MR. FELLERS: No.
- 19 MR. TAYLOR: Okay. Well, I am just
- 20 concerned whether there have been any changes made, I
- 21 think I answered some of those, so you are saying that
- 22 the District is comfortable with some of the changes
- 23 that have been made, I am willing to accept that
- 24 recommendation.
- 25 MR. FELLERS: From the URA and the City's

- 1 point of view, no changes were made in that interval.
- There was a change made in the item to
- 3 restrict it to the four regions that are identified
- 4 here.
- 5 That was not clearly defined in the first
- 6 resolution you saw last Tuesday.
- 7 It would have allowed the City, at their
- 8 discretion, to add a fifth region, if you will, a
- 9 fifth district.
- This language does not allow them to do
- 11 that. They would have to come back to the School
- 12 District, before they could add a fifth region, such
- 13 as Oakland, or whatever.
- 14 So that's the only change, material change,
- 15 that has taken place.
- We think the advantages are there, and the
- 17 negatives, which would be additional requirements for
- 18 students, are not likely, in these four areas.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Okay.
- 20 Mrs. Neiser.
- MS. NEISER: Mr. Fellers, we have a map in
- 22 here, does that specifically show the areas of where
- 23 this is going to occur, that it won't go outside these
- 24 boundaries here?
- MR. FELLERS: Yes, it does.

- 1 You will see what looks, it is not well
- 2 shaded, but you have an outline of your central tip
- 3 district, which is irregular, you will see First Side,
- 4 which is towards the Mon River, you will see the
- 5 Cultural District, which is towards the Allegheny, you
- 6 will see --
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Mr. Fellers, can you turn
- 8 your mic on?
- 9 MR. FELLERS: I beg your pardon. Let me
- 10 start over, so that it's on the tape.
- The four shaded areas on your map, are
- 12 first, the First Side, which is towards the Mon River,
- 13 from the tip region, Cultural District is on the
- 14 Allegheny side of the triangle, there is a couple
- 15 block gap, and then the Strip District region extends
- 16 along the Allegheny River towards Lawrenceville, the
- 17 fourth region extends from the central triangle area,
- 18 up in the Uptown region, and that's what that region
- 19 is called, the Uptown region.
- 20 Those four districts are the only four that
- 21 this LERTA agreement can be applied to.
- 22 Any structure that falls anywhere outside
- 23 of those four districts, is not eligible for this
- 24 project.
- MS. NEISER: Thank you.

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Okay.
- 2 Mrs. Schmidt.
- MS. SCHMIDT: Mr. Fellers, I have one more
- 4 question.
- Is there a time limit, is there a length of
- 6 time for this agreement, if at some point we don't
- 7 like the way things are going, or we don't like some
- 8 of the designations, can we make some change?
- 9 Is there a time frame to this at all?
- 10 MR. FELLERS: There is, and I am looking
- 11 for it quickly.
- I think it is a three-year period -- no,
- any that are approved, extend ten years, but I believe
- 14 there is a three year sunshine provision that is
- 15 specified in here.
- And it is, Mr. Camarda nudges me to point
- 17 out -- no, it is the 10-year period, that I have
- 18 previously stated, it's in G, on page 10, and it would
- 19 extend through December 31, 2010.
- MR. MATTHEWS: All right.
- 21 Any other questions or comments?
- If not, may we have a roll call, please.
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Brentley?
- MS. ROYAL: Yes, on the report.
- 25 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Fink?

- 1 MS. FINK: Yes, on the report as a whole, I
- 2 abstain on items 11 and 12.
- 3 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Harris?
- 4 MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 5 MS. ROYAL: Mr. Isler?
- 6 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- 7 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Neiser?
- 8 MS. NEISER: Yes.
- 9 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Schmidt?
- 10 MS. SCHMIDT: Yes.
- 11 MS. ROYAL: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Nine in favor of the report as
- 18 a whole, one abstention on items 11 and 12.
- The report passes.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.
- 21 Moving on to Human Resources Report.
- 22 Dr. Faison.
- DR. FAISON: Mr. Matthews, and members of
- 24 the Board, I would like to call you to the report,
- when you look at pages 1 and 2, you will find the new

- 1 appointments that are being recommended; pages 2 to 4
- 2 have the reassignments of persons, from leaves of
- 3 absence; page 9, retirement.
- Page 10, resignations. Among then, is the
- 5 resignation of Michaeline Reed, payroll administration
- 6 manager.
- 7 Page 12 there is the sabbatical leaves of
- 8 absence, and included among them is one for
- 9 Sheila Washington, the principal of Regent Square,
- 10 from July 1, 2000 to June 30, 2001.
- 11 Pages 12 to 13, are leaves of absence.
- Pages 13 to 14, transfers with and without
- 13 change of salary.
- Pages 15 to 23, supplemental appointments
- of summer activities, which includes all categories of
- 16 employees.
- There is an Addendum A to Section 1, which
- 18 relates to the dismissal of a professional employee.
- 19 That's the report.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you, very much.
- 21 Any questions or comments?
- 22 Seeing none, may we have a roll call,
- 23 please?
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, on the report.

- 1 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 3 no on item 1, page 9.
- 4 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Harris?
- 5 MS. HARRIS: Okay. Yes on the report as a
- 6 whole, no on No. 1, under F, "Reinstatements," on page
- 7 9.
- 8 MS. ROYAL: Mr. Isler?
- 9 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- 10 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Neiser?
- 11 MS. NEISER: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Schmidt?
- MS. SCHMIDT: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Taylor?
- MS. NEISER: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 18 no on page 9, item F, No. 1.
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Matthews?
- 20 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Nine in favor of the report as
- 22 a whole, three against item F, No. 1, page 9.
- 23 Report passes.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you, very much.
- Just for correction, on the agenda, please

- 1 note that the financial statements, and the
- 2 controller's report on status appropriations, is not
- in this month's report, but will be here next month.
- 4 Moving on to New Business.
- 5 (Thereupon, Mr. Matthews read from prepared
- 6 material.)
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Any questions or comments?
- DR. FAISON: Mr. Matthews, I would like to
- 9 inform the Board, that the account to which this is to
- 10 be charged, will be established once we receive
- 11 approval of the Perkins Grant from the State
- 12 Department of Education.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. Thank you, very much.
- 14 Any questions or comments?
- Seeing none, may we have a roll call,
- 16 please.
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Brentley?
- 18 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 19 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 21 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Isler?
- 24 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Neiser?

- 1 MS. NEISER: Yes.
- 2 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Schmidt?
- 3 MS. SCHMIDT: Yes.
- 4 MS. ROYAL: Mr. Taylor?
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 6 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Wood?
- 7 MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 8 MS. ROYAL: Mr. Matthews?
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- Nine in favor of the report as a whole, the
- 11 report passes.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.
- Moving on to New Business item No. 2.
- 14 (Thereupon, Mr. Matthews read from prepared
- 15 material.)
- 16 MR. MATTHEWS: Any questions or comments?
- 17 Mrs. Harris.
- MS. Harris: Yes, thank you, Mr. President.
- 19 I have concerns on this one, particularly
- 20 as we start out, this was given to us by Dr. Thompson,
- 21 not by Dr. Faison, and her name is on the other pages
- 22 that we received in the other room.
- 23 My concern, number one is, that I think
- 24 this should have been discussed like any other agenda
- 25 review item, and it should have been discussed in

- 1 public, under the Sunshine Law.
- I don't think anything that has to do with
- 3 audits, or policies, procedures, supervision, anything
- 4 like that, should not -- should be done in an
- 5 executive session.
- 6 And we had a long, drawn out meeting on it,
- 7 and received a lot of information, that I believe that
- 8 the public should have.
- 9 I believe we have had a number of
- 10 investigations already on the school safety division,
- and there should be a lot of information out there,
- 12 since the Board has voted to give different people,
- 13 consultants as is on here, consultants and contracted
- 14 services.
- And now we are going to be spending more
- 16 tax dollars, to do another investigation, which I
- 17 believe Dr. Thompson said was recommended by our
- 18 attorney, Bruce Campbell.
- I also did not like some of the comments
- 20 that were given in the other room to me, which I would
- 21 like to share publicly, that a board member, "Maybe
- 22 there is some way that we can hold things back from
- 23 board members, so that they can't say anything in
- 24 public, about what's going on."
- 25 Well, what I have to say publicly to those

- 1 board members are, we do not represent the
- 2 Administration, we represent the public, and so I
- 3 represent the public.
- Thank you, and I will be voting no on
- 5 this.
- 6 MR. MATTHEWS: Any other questions or
- 7 comments?
- 8 Mrs. Wood.
- 9 MS. WOOD: I will an abstaining on this
- 10 one, because I was not here for the discussion, and I
- 11 don't know any of the ins or outs of it.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.
- Just for clarification, let me state that
- 14 this is not an investigation, this is an audit.
- 15 Any other questions or comments?
- Seeing none, may I have a roll call,
- 17 please.
- MS. ROYAL: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 20 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: No.
- MS. ROYAL: Is that no?
- MS. FINK: No.
- 24 MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Harris?
- 25 MS. HARRIS: No.

1	MS. ROYAL: Mr. Isler?
2	MR. ISLER: Yes.
3	MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Neiser?
4	MS. NEISER: Yes.
5	MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Schmidt?
6	MS. SCHMIDT: Yes.
7	MS. ROYAL: Mr. Taylor?
8	MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
9	MS. ROYAL: Mrs. Wood?
10	MS. WOOD: Abstain.
11	MS. ROYAL: Mr. Matthews?
12	MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
13	MS. ROYAL: Six in favor of the report, two
14	no votes, and one abstention, the report passes.
15	MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you. Any other items
16	that need to come before the Board?
17	Seeing none, the meeting is adjourned.
