COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

December 19, 2001

DIRECTORS:

The Committee on Student Services recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

Proposals/Grant Awards

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to accept grant awards in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 2, inclusive.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That upon approval of the grant by the granting agency, the Board authorize the establishment of appropriate accounts and, where necessary to implement the grant, authorize the advancement of funds to operate the program until the grant and fees are received.

- 1. Acceptance of a grant of \$14,500 of School-to Career funds from the PADOE through the Allegheny Intermediate Unit for the Career Development Program to purchase and license Careerware items from Bridges.com. Dates of operation include January 1, 2002 through June 30, 2002.
- 2. Acceptance of a grant of \$505,264.25 of School Performance Initiatives funds from the PADOE for incentive awards to nineteen elementary, five middle and two secondary schools. The awards are based on school improvement in reading and mathematics scores and/or attendance. The operating period for these awards is January 1, 2002 through May 31, 2002.

Consultants/Contracted Services

RESOLVED, That the Board authorize its proper officers to enter into contracts with the following individuals for the services and fees set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 12, inclusive.

- 1. Walter Stewart To provide technical support in the areas of hardware and software installation, trouble shooting and maintenance. Mr. Stewart shall also assist staff in learning how to solve technical problems on their own. Dates of service include December 2001 through June 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$1,555.55 per month, total amount not to exceed \$14,000 from Account #4305-604-2270-323.
- 2. Communities in Schools To implement a service that connects community resources to the school, the students and their families to help students stay in school. Dates of service include December 2001 through June 2002. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$35,000 from Account #4121-204-3300-323.
- 3. Cornerstone Evaluation Association To perform the final-year evaluation with the Minadeo staff and students for School Year 2001-2002. The contractor shall again design a pre- and post-evaluation questionnaire for teachers and students and shall provide technical assistance, complete analysis and open-ended evaluations, analyze test data, and provide a report for the funders. Dates of service include December 20, 2001 through June 2002. Compensation shall be in two payments of \$5,000 each, total amount not to exceed \$10,000 from Account #4155-070-2810-323.
- 4. Elaine O. Lees To assist the staff of the Office of the Chief of Staff in program planning, needs assessment documentation and proposal writing activities on an as-needed basis between January 1, 2002 and December 31, 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$40 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$44,000 from Account #3100-010-2360-330.
- 5. Physical Rehabilitation Enterprises To provide physical therapy services to special education and "protected handicapped" students for thirty (30) hours per week for twenty-three (23) weeks. The contractor shall provide direct service to students based upon IEP goals and objectives and Chapter 15 Service Plans. A District physical therapist will be on maternity leave. Dates of service include January 2, 2002 through June 30, 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$59 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$41,000 from Account #5500-053-1241-330.
- 6. Pittsburgh Vision Services To provide vision screenings for approximately 150-200 students enrolled in the Early Intervention Program but not in Head Start programs. The children will be screened for visual acuity, muscle imbalance, and amblyopia. The contractor shall provide all follow-up activities with families whose children do not pass the screen. The screenings shall occur in January 2002 at a cost of \$10 per child and are required under Early Intervention regulations. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$2,000 from Account #5500-054-1281-330.
- 7. Prismatic Consulting To develop additional software needed to assess, rate and collect data on the world language oral proficiency standard (in six languages for novice, proficient, and advance levels). Phase one resulted in the test software. In Phase two, the company shall develop enhanced administrator function, the teacher rating calibration program, the connection to the District's

- SASI program, and fine tuning of work done in Phase One. Dates of service include December 30, 2001 through May 30, 2002. Payment shall be in four stages, total amount not to exceed \$60,000 from Account #4600-032-2270-323.
- 8. Family Child Care Home, Linnie Mitchell To provide Head Start comprehensive services for a maximum of five children, as approved by the granting agency, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Dates of service include January 1, 2002 through July 31, 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$10 per child per day, total amount not to exceed \$4,000 from Account #4800-072-1441-330.
- 9. Family Child Care Home, Irma Woodson To provide Head Start comprehensive services for a maximum of five children, as approved by the granting agency, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Dates of service include January 1, 2002 through July 31, 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$10 per child per day, total amount not to exceed \$4,000 from Account #4800-072-1441-330.
- 10. Family Child Care Home, Renee Evans To provide Head Start comprehensive services for a maximum of five children, as approved by the granting agency, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Dates of service include January 1, 2002 through July 31, 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$10 per child per day, total amount not to exceed \$4,000 from Account #4800-072-1441-330.
- 11. Family Child Care Home, Patricia Jones To provide Head Start comprehensive services for a maximum of five children, as approved by the granting agency, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Dates of service include January 1, 2002 through July 31, 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$10 per child per day, total amount not to exceed \$4,000 from Account #4800-072-1441-330.
- 12. Yale Child Study Center School Development Program To provide professional development training, materials and consultation; to analyze climate and SIQ-A reports; to assist with the implementation of the School Development at Belmar, Burgwin, and Lemington Elementary, Knoxville Middle, and Oliver High Schools. Dates of service include January 1, 2002 through September 30, 2002. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$114.000 from Fund 104.

Payments Authorized

RESOLVED, That the Board authorize payments in the amounts set forth below to the following individuals, groups, and organizations, including School District employees and others who will participate in activities of the School District or provide services, as described in subparagraphs 1 through 15, inclusive.

1. Three (3) Teachers – To conduct an adult computer training class for parents at the Title I Parent Resource and Training Center between January 2002 and June

- 2002. Payment shall be at the workshop rate of \$20.69 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$744.84 from Account #4800-204-3300-124.
- 2. Carolina Biological Supply Company, Sherry Perella-Jack To present at an all-day workshop for the eighth grade health teachers during the District-wide Inservice on February 1, 2002. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$1,500, including travel and the curriculum module for the Human Body Systems. Payment shall be from Account #4600-118-2270-323.
- 3. Up to Fifteen (15) Teachers, Two (2) Paraprofessionals, Six (6) Parents and Three (3) High School students for the implementation of the Fort Pitt Elementary School Reading, Writing and Math Tutoring Program from January 1, 2002 through June 13, 2002. Compensation shall be at the workshop rate of \$20.69 per hour for teachers, \$10.35 per hour for paraprofessionals, \$10 per session for parents, and \$5.50 per hour for students. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$30,000 from Funds 067, 204, and 050.
- 4. John Wideman, University of Massachusetts To conduct a writing workshop regarding nonfiction and fiction genres at Pittsburgh CAPA High School by January 2002. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$3,000 from R.K. Mellon Grant funds, Account #4304-181-1490-323.
- 5. One (1) Teacher at Concord Elementary School To lead the After School Instructional Support Team for students in the 3rd, 4th, and 5th grades who need additional academic assistance. Dates of service include December 20, 2001 through June 11, 2002. Payment shall be at the current workshop rate of \$20.69 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$1,400 from Account #4118-604-1100-124.
- 6. Carnegie Institute/Science Center For the Museum of Natural History, the Museum of Art and the Carnegie Science Center to provide educational tours, classes, and programs under the School-Museum Program for students in the District's high schools/ between January 2002 and December 2002. Payments shall be based on tours conducted, total amount not to exceed \$17,000 from Account #4008-010-1100-323.
- 7. Carnegie Institute/Science Center For the Museum of Natural History, the Museum of Art and the Carnegie Science Center to provide educational tours, classes, and programs under the School-Museum Program for students in the District's elementary schools between January 2002 and December 2002. Payments shall be based on tours conducted, total amount not to exceed \$21,000 from Account #4008-010-1100-323.
- 8. Carnegie Art, History, Science Center and the Senator John Heinz History Center Admission fees and costs for visits by <u>middle school students</u> to various museums in the city, exploring art, history, and science exhibits. Dates of service include January 2002 through December 2002. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$17,000 from Account #4010-010-1100-323.
- 9. Up to Ten (10) Teachers To provide reading and math instruction at Martin Luther King Elementary School for Title I students during the period of January

- 2002 to June 2002. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$20,690 from Account #4195-204-2270-124.
- 10. Up to Forty (40) Teachers and Ten (10) Paraprofessionals To facilitate the after school NovaNET computer-assisted learning program in all secondary schools and at Reizenstein, Arsenal, Columbus, and Milliones Middle Schools. Students shall have the opportunity to make up credits for previously failed courses and/or enrich basic skills, using the on-line computerized system. Payment shall be at the current workshop rates of \$20.69 per hour for teachers and \$10.35 per hour for paraprofessionals. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$50,000 from Account #4011-142-1490-125.
- 11. Eight (8) Teachers and Five (5) Paraprofessionals To enrich, enhance and remediate the literacy and math skills of Belmar Elementary School Students after school between January 2, 2002 and May 2002. Teachers shall be paid the prevailing workshop rate of \$20.69 per hour; paraprofessionals, the prevailing workshop of \$10.35 per hour. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$30,000 from Account #4106-204-1490-124/196.
- 12. One (1) Teacher at Concord Elementary School To teach Spanish after school to 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade students once a week between December 20, 2001 and June 11, 2002. Payment shall be at the workshop rate of \$20.69 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$705 from Account #4118-604-1100-124.
- 13. Ten (10) High School Students To serve as tutors for Lemington Elementary School's after school tutoring program between December 20, 2001 and May 24, 2002. Payment shall be at the rate of \$5.50 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$17,240 from Account #4145-067-1490-599.
- 14. Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic, The Crisis Institute To conduct a two-day workshop on January 31 and February 1, 2002 for the entire staff of Conroy Education Center, teachers and para-educators. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$2,500 from Account #5545-292-2420-330.
- 15. Up to Ten (10) Teachers and One (1) School Secretary at Arsenal Middle School To assist in the preparation and modifications to the CEIP for accreditation. Dates of service include January 2002 through March 2002. Teachers shall be compensated at the workshop rate of \$20.69 per hour; the secretary, \$13.24. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$1,034.50 from Account #4298-604-1100-124.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That in addition to the foregoing levies The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a school tax of .13 mills on each dollar of the total assessment of all real property assessed and certified for taxation in this district, being at the rate of \$0.013 on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of taxable real property, for general public school purposes, pursuant to the provisions of Act 386, approved July 12, 1957, P.L. 837.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That in addition to the foregoing levies The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess for the fiscal year, beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a school tax of .34 mills on each dollar of the total assessment of all real property assessed and certified for taxation in this district, being at the rate of \$0.034 on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of taxable real property, for general public school purposes, pursuant to the provisions of Act 557, approved November 19, 1959, P.L. 1552.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That in addition to the foregoing levies The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess for the fiscal year, beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a school tax of .17 mills on each dollar of the total assessment of all real property assessed and certified for taxation in this district, being at the rate of \$0.017 on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of taxable real property, for general public school purposes, pursuant to the provisions of Act 321, approved October 21, 1965, P.L. 650.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That in addition to the foregoing levies The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess for the fiscal year, beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a school tax of 1.02 mills on each dollar of the total assessment of all real property assessed and certified for taxation in this district, being at the rate of \$0.102 on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of taxable real property, for general public school purposes, pursuant to the provisions of Act 340, approved November 26, 1968, P.L. 1098.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That in addition to the foregoing levies The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess for the fiscal year, beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a school tax of 1.02 mills on each dollar of the total assessment of all real property assessed and certified for taxation in this district, being at the rate of \$0.102 on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of taxable real property, for general public school purposes, pursuant to the provisions of Act 143, approved December 15, 1975, P.L. 483.

RESOLVED, FINALLY, That in addition to the foregoing levies The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess for the fiscal year, beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a school tax of 8.98 mills on each dollar of the total assessment of all real property assessed and certified for taxation in this district, being at the rate of \$0.898 on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of taxable real property, for general public school purposes, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph (a) (3) of Section 652.1 of the Public School Code of 1949 (Act 1982-182).

All of said taxes have been ascertained, determined and fixed in accordance with laws applicable thereto, including, but not limited to, Act 146 of 1998.

RESOLUTION

Earned Income Tax Levies for Fiscal Year 2002

I. Act 508 of 1961, as amended

RESOLVED, That pursuant to the provisions of Act 508, approved August 24, 1961, P.L. 1135, as amended by Act 293, approved November 30, 1967, P.L. 638 (Senate Bill 1246, Printer's No. 1493 of 1967 General Assembly of Pennsylvania), The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess, for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a tax of one per centum (1%) on salaries, wages, commissions and other compensation earned by residents of the School District of Pittsburgh and on net profits earned from businesses, professions and other activities conducted by residents of the School District of Pittsburgh.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That in accordance with the provisions of Section 4 (f) of said Act, The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby require any and all non-resident employers, as defined in said Act, to make returns and withhold and pay taxes as required under Section 4 of the said Act for employees residing within the School District of Pittsburgh.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That under the provisions of Section 6 (a) of said Act, the Treasurer of the School District of Pittsburgh is hereby designated and empowered to sue in the name of the School District for the recovery of all taxes levied and assessed under said Act, not paid when due.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That if, for any reason, the taxes levied herein are not paid when due, interest at the rate of six per centum (6%) per annum on the amount of said taxes shall be added and collected as authorized by Act 1982-134.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That all of the provisions of said Acts are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this Resolution.

II. Act 1982-182

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That pursuant to the provisions of Section 652.1 (a) (2) of the Public School Code of 1949, as amended by Act 1982-182 (hereinafter referred to as Act 182), The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does additionally hereby levy and assess, for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a tax of one per centum (1%) on salaries, wages, commissions and other compensation earned by residents of the School District of Pittsburgh and on net profits earned from businesses, professions and other activities conducted by residents of the School District of Pittsburgh.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That the implementation of the above Earned Income Tax, shall be governed by all of the mandates set forth within Act 508 of 1961, as amended, except the reference made therein to rate of tax, which mandates are incorporated herein by reference thereto and are made a part hereof, including, by way of illustration, but not by way of limitation: definitions of terms, declaration and payment of tax amounts, collection at source, suit for collection of tax, interest and penalties, etc.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby require any and all non-resident employers, as defined in Act 508 of 1961, as amended, to make returns and withhold and pay taxes for employees residing within the School District of Pittsburgh.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, That if, for any reason, the taxes levied herein are not paid when due, interest at the rate of six per centum (6%) per annum on the amount of said taxes shall be added and collected as authorized by Act 1982-134.

RESOLVED, FINALLY, That the Treasurer of the School District of Pittsburgh is hereby designated and empowered to sue in the name of the School District for the recovery of all taxes levied and assessed under the aforementioned Acts, not paid when due.

RESOLUTION

Realty Transfer Tax for Fiscal Year 2002

RESOLVED, That pursuant to the provisions of Section 652.1(a)(4) of the Public School Code of 1949, as amended by Act 1982-182, The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess, for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January, 2002, a tax of one percent (1%) of the value of each transfer of any interest in real property situated within the School District, upon the terms and conditions, and subject to the exceptions set forth in the remaining portions of this Resolution.

SECTION 1 DEFINITIONS.

As used in this Resolution, certain terms are defined as follows:

- (a) "Association" means a partnership, limited partnership or any other form of unincorporated enterprise owned or conducted by two or more persons.
- (b) "Corporation" means a corporation or joint stock association organized under the laws of the United States, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, or any other state, territory or foreign country or dependency, including but not limited to banking institutions.
- (c) "Document" means any deed, instrument or writing whereby any real property interest is transferred.
- (d) "Living trust" means any trust, other than a business trust, intended as a will substitute by the settlor, which becomes effective during the lifetime of the settlor, but from which trust distributions cannot be made to any beneficiaries other than the settlor prior to the death of the settlor.
- (e) "Real property interest" or "interest in real property," refers to any interest in real property, including, but not limited to, lands, tenements and hereditaments; specifically including an interest in an association and shares of stock in a corporation, the major part [i.e., more than fifty percent (50%)] of the assets of which association or corporation is composed of real estate or shares in any cooperative real estate venture.
- (f) "School District" means the School District of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

- other modes of conveying real property interests, including the complete or partial liquidation of an association or a corporation, or the sale of any interest or shares therein if any part of the distribution made in such liquidation or if any of the assets which are the subject of such sale of any interest or shares therein, consists of real estate or real property. "Transfer" also includes a lease or rental of real property or real estate pursuant to an agreement which terminates upon the expiration of thirty (30) years or more or which contains an option for an extension for a period of thirty (30) years or more; and ground rents. It is the intention of The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania that any transfer of a real property interest accomplished through a sale of an interest in an association or shares of stock in a corporation, through a distribution of assets, through a long-term lease, or through ground rents be specifically subject to the tax imposed herein.
- (h) "Value" means, in the case of any document transferring any real property interest, the amount of the actual consideration therefor, including liens or other encumbrances thereon and ground rents, or a commensurate part of liens or other encumbrances thereon and ground rents where such liens or other encumbrances and ground rents also encumber or are charged against any other real property interest. Where the document sets forth no consideration or a nominal consideration, the "value" thereof shall be determined from the price set forth in, or the actual consideration for, the contract of sale, or, in the case of a gift or any other transfer without consideration, from the actual monetary worth of the interest transferred, which in either event shall not be less than the amount of the assessment of such property made by the Allegheny County Board of Property Assessment, Appeals and Review. In the case of a sale of an interest in an association or shares of stock in a corporation involving the transfer of a real property interest, it shall be the burden of the taxpayer to establish any claim that a portion of the consideration for the transfer is not attributable to real property or shares in any cooperative real estate venture owned by the association or corporation.

SECTION 2 LEVY AND RATE.

- (a) Rate and Time of Payment. A tax in the amount of one percent (1%) of the value is hereby imposed upon each transfer of any interest in real property situated within the School District regardless of where the document is made, executed or delivered, or where the actual settlement on each transfer takes place. The tax shall be payable at the time of delivery of the document.
- (b) <u>Determination of Tax Liability</u>. Every person who accepts delivery of any document, or on whose behalf delivery of any document is accepted, shall be liable for the payment of the tax, except that where any document is delivered to the Commonwealth, a political subdivision or to any authority created by the Commonwealth or a political subdivision, the person by whom the document was made, executed, issued or delivered shall be liable for the payment of the tax.
- (c) <u>Location of Property</u>. Where the real property is situated partly within and partly without the boundaries of the School District, the tax shall be paid on the value of the portion of the real property situated within the School District.

SECTION 3 EXCEPTIONS.

The real property transfer tax shall not be imposed upon the following transfers:

- (a) Wills:
- (b) Leases, provided that such leases are not for a period of thirty (30) years or more and/or do not contain an option for an extension of a period of thirty (30) years or more. This exclusion does not include ground rents.
- (c) Mortgages;
- (d) Conveyances to a trustee under a recorded trust agreement for the express purpose of holding title in trust as security for debt contracted at the time of the conveyance, under which the trustee is not the lender, and requiring the trustee to make reconveyance to the grantor-borrower upon the payment of the debt;
- (e) Transfers involving living trusts, upon presentation of a copy of the living trust instrument to the recorder of deeds, and only to the extent that:
 - (1) The transfer is for no consideration or nominal actual consideration to a trustee of a living trust from the settlor of the living trust; or
 - (2) The transfer is for no consideration or nominal actual consideration from a trustee of a living trust after the death of the settlor of the trust, or from a

- trustee of a trust created pursuant to the will of a decedent to a beneficiary to whom the property is devised or bequeathed; or
- (3) The transfer is for no consideration or nominal actual consideration from the trustee of a living trust to the settlor of the living trust, if such property was originally conveyed to the trustee by the settlor.
- (f) Transfers between husband and wife;
- (g) Transfer between persons who were previously husband and wife but who have been divorced, provided the property or interest therein subject to such transfer was acquired by the husband and wife, or husband, or wife prior to the granting of the final decree in divorce, except that a subsequent transfer by the grantee within one year shall be subject to tax as if the grantor were making such a transfer;
- (h) Transfers between parent and child, or spouse of such child, or between parent and trustee for the benefit of a child, or the spouse of such child, or between brother or sister, or the spouse of such brother or sister, or between a grandparent and grandchild, or the spouse of such grandchild, except that a subsequent transfer by the grantee within one year shall be subject to tax as if the grantor were making such transfer.
- (i) Correctional deeds without consideration;
- (j) Transfers by and between a principal and straw party for the purpose of placing a mortgage, or ground rent upon the premises;
- (k) Transfers from a purchase money mortgagor to the vendor holding the purchase money mortgage, whether pursuant to a foreclosure or in lieu thereof;
- (l) Transfers from the Commonwealth or political subdivision(s) or from authority(ies) created by the Commonwealth or political subdivision(s) to any of such public bodies;
- (m) Conveyances to political subdivision(s) pursuant to acquisition by the political subdivision(s) of tax delinquent properties at any sheriff's or treasurer's sale;
- (n) Transfers to the United States, the Commonwealth, or to any of their instrumentalities by gift or dedication, or by deed of confirmation in connection with a gift, dedication,

condemnation proceedings or in lieu thereof, or reconveyance by a condemning body of the property condemned to the owner of record at the time of condemnation which reconveyance may include property line adjustments, provided such reconveyance is made within one year of the date of condemnation;

- (o) Transfers between religious organizations or other bodies or persons holding title to real estate for a religious organization if such real estate is not being or has not been used by such transferor for commercial purposes;
- (p) Transfer between corporations operating housing projects pursuant to the Housing and Redevelopment Assistance Law and the shareholders thereof;
- (q) Transfers to nonprofit industrial development agencies;
- (r) Transfers between nonprofit industrial development agencies and industrial corporations purchasing from them; and
- (s) Transfers by the owner of previously occupied residential premises within the School District to a builder of new residential premises within the School District when such previously occupied residential premises is taken in trade by such builder as part of the consideration for the purchase of a new, previously unoccupied residential premises.
 - Where there is a transfer of residential property by a licensed real estate broker, which property was transferred to him within the preceding year as part of the consideration for the purchase of other residential property, a credit for the amount of the tax paid at the time of the transfer to him shall be given to him toward the amount of the tax due upon the transfer. If the tax due upon the transfer from the licensed real estate broker is greater than the credit given for the prior transfer, the difference shall be paid and if the credit allowed is greater than the amount of the tax due, no refund shall be allowed.
- (t) Transfers from a political subdivision or public authority created under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, of a multi-purpose stadium to private entities or persons.

SECTION 4 EVIDENCE OF PAYMENT OF TAX.

The tax imposed by this Resolution shall be paid in the office of the Recorder of Deeds for Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, and payment shall be evidenced by affixing documentary stamps to each document by the person making delivery or presenting or recording the document, who shall write or otherwise place thereon the initials of his name and the date upon which the stamps are affixed so that the stamps may not again be used. The stamps or the receipts shall be affixed in such manner that their removal requires the continued application of steam or water. The Recorder of Deeds may prescribe alternative methods of evidencing the payment of the tax.

SECTION 5 EVIDENCE OF VALUE.

- (a) Affidavit of Value. Where the document does not set forth the true, full and complete value, as in the case of gifts or for any other reason, the value shall be as set forth in the affidavit submitted as to the realty transfer tax payable to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the Act of December 27, 1951, P.L. 1742, as amended (72 P.S. §3283 et seq.), and a certified copy of that affidavit shall be filed with the office of the Recorder of Deeds at the time the tax is paid.
- (b) Additional Facts by Affidavit. Whenever the taxability of any transfer of real property or the amount of the tax depends upon the relationship of the parties to the transaction or upon any other facts not recited in the document, the Recorder of Deeds may require that such facts be established by affidavit.

SECTION 6 INTEREST AND PENALTIES.

If for any reason the tax is not paid when due, interest at the rate of six percent (6%) per annum on the amount of such tax and an additional penalty of one-half percent (1/2%) of the amount of the unpaid tax for each month or fraction thereof during which the tax remains unpaid shall be added and collected. Where suit is brought for the recovery of the tax, the person liable shall, in addition, be liable for the cost of collection as well as for the interest and penalties herein imposed.

SECTION 7 LIEN AUTHORIZED.

If any person fails to pay the tax in the amount and at the time required under this Resolution, the School Treasurer shall file a lien against the property which is the subject of the transfer in the amount of the deficiency.

SECTION 8 VIOLATIONS.

No person shall:

- (a) Make, execute, issue, deliver or accept, or cause to be made, executed, issued, delivered or accepted, any document without the full amount of the tax thereon being duly paid;
- (b) Fraudulently cut, tear or remove from any document any documentary stamp, receipt or other evidence of payment;
- (c) Fraudulently affix to any document upon which a tax is imposed by this Resolution any documentary stamp, receipt or other evidence of payment which has been cut, torn or removed from any other document upon which a tax is imposed by this or any documentary stamp or receipt or any impression of any forged or counterfeited stamp, receipt, die, plate or any other article;
- (d) Wilfully remove or alter the cancellation marks of any documentary stamp or receipt, or restore any such documentary stamp or receipt with intent to use or cause the same to be used after it has already been used, or knowingly buy, sell, offer for sale or give away any such altered or restored stamp or receipt to any person for use, or knowingly use the same;
- (e) Knowingly have in his possession an altered or restored documentary stamp or receipt removed from any document upon which a tax is imposed by this Resolution;
- (f) Knowingly or wilfully prepare, keep, sell, offer for sale or have in his possession, any forged or counterfeited documentary stamps or receipts; or
- (g) Fail, neglect or refuse to comply with, or violate, the rules and regulations adopted by the School Treasurer under the provisions of this Resolution.

SECTION 9 EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Resolution shall take effect on January 1, 2002 and shall apply to all transfers of real property made on and after that date.

RESOLUTION

Mercantile License Tax Levy for Fiscal Year 2002

WHEREAS, Act 320, approved June 20, 1947, P.L. 745, as re-enacted and amended by Act 374, approved May 12, 1949, P.L. 1238, and as further amended, provides for the licensing and taxing of "every person desiring to continue to engage in, or hereafter to begin to engage in, the business of wholesale or retail vendor of, or dealer in, goods, wares and merchandise, broker, conducting a restaurant or other place where food, drink or refreshments are sold or place of amusement of a school district of the first class", and an annual tax on such businesses for the use of the school district in which such businesses are conducted; and,

WHEREAS, said Act, as re-enacted and amended, is applicable to the School District of Pittsburgh under the provisions of Amendatory Act 374, approved May 12, 1949, P.L. 1238, and under the provisions of Act 397, approved May 13, 1949, P.L. 1332;

BE IT RESOLVED:

FIRST, That for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2002, a license fee of \$2.00 for a wholesale license or a retail license, and a license fee of \$4.00 for a wholesale and retail license is hereby levied and assessed by The Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh upon each person, as defined in said Act, for each place of business conducted by him in the School District of Pittsburgh.

SECOND, That the Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh does hereby levy and assess for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January, 2002 upon all persons subject to such tax under the terms of said Act, a mercantile license tax at the following rates:

- (1) Wholesale vendors or dealers in goods, wares and merchandise and brokers, at the rate of one-half (1/2) mill on each dollar of the annual gross business transacted by him.
- (2) Retail vendors or dealers in goods, wares and merchandise, all persons engaged in conducting restaurants or other places where food, drink or refreshments are sold, and all persons conducting places of amusement, at the rate of one (1) mill on each dollar of the volume of the annual gross business transacted by him.

(3) Wholesale and retail vendors or dealers in goods, wares and merchandise, at the rate of one-half (1/2) mill on each dollar of the volume of the annual gross wholesale business transacted by him and one (1) mill on each dollar of the volume of the annual gross retail business transacted by him. The "annual gross business" in each case to be computed in accordance with the provisions of said Act.

THIRD, That if, for any reason, the taxes levied herein are not paid when due, interest at the rate of six per centum (6%) per annum on the amount of said taxes shall be added and collected as authorized by Act 1982-125.

FOURTH, That all of the provisions of said Acts are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this Resolution.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC EDUCATION OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF PITTSBURGH AMENDING POLICY NO. 611 TO REQUIRE BOARD APPROVAL OF ALL PURCHASE ORDERS AND CONTRACTS IN EXCESS OF \$5,000

RESOLVED, That Policy No. 611. PURCHASES BUDGETED, is hereby amended to read as follows:

It is the policy of the Board that when funds are available all purchases contemplated within the current budget and not subject to bid shall be made in a manner that ensures the best interests of the School District.

All purchases that are within budgetary limits may be made upon authorization of the Business Manager or his/her designee, provided, however, that all contracts or purchases in excess of \$5,000 shall be subject to Board approval.

Written or telephonic price quotations shall be required from at least three (3) responsible contractors for the supplies, equipment or services desired, and when the contemplated expenditure is less than \$10,000 (\$10,000 in cooperative purchases). A written record shall be made of these quotations and shall contain the date of the quotation, name of contractor, contractor's representative, the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance or work of the quotation. The written price quotations records or telephonic price quotations and memoranda shall be kept on file for a period of three (3) years.

NEW BUSINESS

FURTHER EXTENSION OF THE CONTRACT COVERING THE BOARD'S HEARING OFFICER FOR STUDENT SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS

WHEREAS, at its legislative meeting of December 20, 2000, the Board extended its original contract with Frank B. McWilson, Esquire, from its current termination date of January 31, 2001 to June 15, 2001; and

WHEREAS, at its legislative meeting of September 25, 2001, the Board extended its contract with Frank B. McWilson, Esquire to include the period of September 24, 2001 through December 31, 2001; and

- MS. COLAIZZI: Dr. Thompson, I would like
- 19 to ask a few questions, please.
- 20 My first question is: As I was reviewing
- 21 the budget, on page 35, I see that we have a
- 22 \$34 million dollar deficit. I want to know exactly,
- 23 what the fund balance is, that you are using, for that
- 24 number, please.
- MR. FELLERS: Mrs. Colaizzi, the figure you

- 1 refer to is the carry forward, or surplus, that's
- 2 being used to balance the budget.
- 3 That is somewhat higher than usual, but as
- 4 the ten year pattern that we showed you in the packet,
- 5 that the Board had requested, there is a pattern that
- 6 is back and forth, with some years expenditures
- 7 exceeding revenues, some years revenues exceeding
- 8 expenditures.
- 9 I think, however, the thing that you need
- 10 to be aware of, that makes us different than our two
- 11 sister municipalities, the city and the county, is
- 12 that most of our operation is on the school year
- 13 basis, yet our budget is on the calendar year basis,
- 14 so there are a lot of things that happen as with the
- 15 state budget, that impacts July 1, and with changes in
- 16 terms of our schools effective September 1, that
- 17 creates surplus for us.
- So it is not unusual to have large
- 19 surpluses. A lot of it is because it is either good
- 20 fortune, that the state gave us extra special
- 21 education money, that we didn't anticipate, and
- 22 therefore it became a surplus for 2001 going into
- 23 2002.
- 24 However, that increase is then budgeted, as
- 25 the revenue estimate in 2002.

- 1 Likewise, it was unanticipated that there
- 2 would be the retirement incentive, with the additional
- 3 .5 multiplication factor, around the retirement
- 4 system, which generated a lot of turnover in staff,
- 5 which saved us salary and benefit moneys.
- 6 In addition, the savings associated with
- 7 the school closings were somewhat greater than we
- 8 anticipated.
- 9 So I think you could account for 10 to 15
- 10 million of that figure, in terms of good things that
- 11 have happened, financially, at least, that have
- 12 improved the picture, allowed us to carry forward
- 13 money, and avoid a tax increase, but then budgeted for
- 14 those better figures, now that we are aware of the
- 15 retirement incentive, we are aware of the special ed.
- 16 funding, and your 2002 current revenues and
- 17 expenditures are on target.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. So, for laymen term
- 19 purposes, would you say that this is like our savings
- 20 account?
- 21 MR. FELLERS: Absolutely not. This is
- 22 money that we need to have a balanced budget.
- We do have an unappropriated reserve, that
- 24 we have told the Board should be at about 5 percent of
- 25 our operating budget, it is not, it's closer to

- 1 2 percent, about 2.2 percent of our budget.
- That would be the quote, "savings account",
- 3 rainy day fund, as the state calls it, whatever, in
- 4 case there is a catastrophe within the District.
- 5 This money is -- are funds that the
- 6 District has earned, either through thrift, or earning
- 7 additional revenues that are being applied to help us
- 8 balance the budget.
- Now, remember, you are going to have a big
- 10 change next year, after the reserve associated with
- 11 your real estate tax refunds is paid off. That
- 12 accounts for \$17 million, and that figure is going to
- 13 disappear next year, so it will compensate for that
- 14 change in the fund balance.
- But, this is -- it should be viewed as a
- 16 cushion. This is money that we have worked to
- 17 accumulate, so that we don't have to raise taxes, or
- 18 we don't have to cut programs.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- So what you are saying is, the reserve that
- 21 we have -- which is how much? How much is in our
- 22 reserve?
- MR. FELLERS: In addition to the
- 24 34 million that is appropriated, you have
- 25 unappropriated reserves of \$9 million, and as I said,

- 1 the rating agencies would like to see you have about
- 2 5 percent, which would be in the \$24 million range; so
- 3 we are somewhat short of that ideal. But we are -- we
- 4 have improved our situation since last year, when it
- 5 was lower than that.
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. So we raised taxes
- 7 last year and, therefore, we still have \$34 million
- 8 that we have to take from our fund balance, to be able
- 9 to balance this budget; am I correct?
- 10 MR. FELLERS: That is correct.
- 11 The relationship though, between the tax
- 12 increase and this fund balance, there is none. None
- 13 of this money relates to the tax increase; these were
- 14 other factors, that we have utilized, either in terms
- 15 of our 2000 closing, or events that have occurred in
- 16 2001, that have improved our picture, and given us
- 17 funds to use to help us balance the budget.
- 18 If you did not have these funds, then your
- 19 options to balance the budget would be to further raid
- 20 your \$9 million reserve, to raise taxes, or to cut
- 21 into your academic programs.
- 22 DR. THOMPSON: Mrs. Colaizzi, you might
- 23 need to know, that this is a process that's been used
- 24 by this District for the last, I guess 100 years, and
- 25 we are taking a look at that. But the bottom line is,

- 1 that we have -- the positive part about it is, our
- 2 people aren't going out just throwing away money, they
- 3 are holding money back and not spending money, they
- 4 are being very thrifty in what they are doing, that is
- 5 a positive end to that whole process.
- 6 But this is no different than what has been
- 7 done in the past.
- As you recall, last year when I came here
- 9 you had a \$36.5 million deficit, which was a real
- 10 deficit, and we have been able through closing the
- 11 schools, and raising taxes and tightening our belts,
- 12 to curtail that amount.
- Now that amount, if we hadn't done that
- 14 last year, I guess we would be looking at a deficit
- 15 of -- what would you say, Mr. Fellers, in the
- 16 neighborhood of what?
- MR. FELLERS: If we had not taken those
- 18 steps, we would be looking at a \$70 million problem
- 19 this year, because you would have lost those revenues,
- 20 for two consecutive years.
- DR. THOMPSON: If you recall, Philadelphia
- 22 is in the same situation, and we would have been in
- 23 the same shape, or just as bad as Philadelphia, in
- 24 doing this kind of thing.
- So we commend the taxpayers, and this

- 1 community, for the kind of input, and the local
- 2 resources they provide for this District, and for
- 3 allowing us, and I commend the Board for last year,
- 4 for allowing us to make the hard decisions, and
- 5 necessary steps, to make sure that we are not looking
- 6 at a deficit, as we move forward in your school year.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: I have a couple more
- 8 questions, please, Randall.
- 9 From what -- from the information that was
- 10 given to me, from faxes, am I correct to assume, that
- 11 it is going to be about \$1.7 million, to reopen these
- 12 schools?
- MR. FELLERS: \$1,727,000 and change. I
- 14 believe the document you have before you, on your
- 15 budget resolution, shows a million seven coming out of
- 16 the reserve that was established for the alignment
- 17 plan, and \$27,800 is being moved out of the
- 18 transportation line, to offset the utility costs. As
- 19 Mrs. Fink had pointed out, the two of those were
- 20 relatively close.
- 21 So, essentially, the transportation is
- 22 offsetting the utility, and the remaining million
- 23 seven is covering the salaries, and benefits of the
- 24 staff needed for the open schools, and the funds are
- 25 there for supplies, and equipment that was moved out

- 1 of those three closed schools, and distributed among
- 2 the other schools.
- That equipment, those equipment, and
- 4 supplies need to be replaced so that the student body
- 5 will have adequate materials to start the 2002-2003
- 6 school year.
- 7 DR. THOMPSON: How many schools are you
- 8 talking about, you said of those --
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Just those three.
- DR. THOMPSON: Just these three.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Just those three
- DR. THOMPSON: Was that one for those
- 13 three? Just those three?
- MR. FELLERS: Yes, sir.
- DR. THOMPSON: Okay. Thank you, very much.
- 16 MS. COLAIZZI: I would like to make a
- 17 motion to amend the budget, this motion would have --
- 18 reducing the budget to about 4.2 million and plus, and
- 19 I will pass that around to the Board members.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Point of order, Madam
- 21 Chairman. Point of order.
- It is my understanding, that any time any
- 23 member of this Board needed any information, that
- 24 there was a process used for requesting information.
- Mr. Fellers, have you received a list of

- 1 these questions, that were just asked of you,
- 2 Dr. Thompson?
- 3 DR. THOMPSON: No. This is ludicrous, I
- 4 know nothing about this.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: This is unbelievable, to put
- 6 our staff on the spot, publicly, requesting
- 7 information that requires time and research; Madam
- 8 President, this is embarrassing.
- 9 MS. FINK: Mr. --
- 10 MR. BRENTLEY: This is embarrassing.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Brentley, we have people ask
- 12 questions at this table all the time.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Dealing with the budget,
- 14 detailed questions like this, that our staff have to
- 15 respond to immediately, it's unfair.
- The staff works very hard to prepare
- 17 information for us, they have never denied information
- 18 to this body. And all that they are requesting, is
- 19 just an opportunity to develop a process.
- MS. FINK: We have a motion on the floor,
- 21 Mr. Brentley.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Not yet.
- MR. TAYLOR: I had my hand up before the
- 24 motion was made.
- 25 MS. FINK: Is there a second to the

- 1 motion?
- MS. HARRIS: Second.
- 3 MR. TAYLOR: I had my hand up.
- 4 MS. FINK: All right. Let's -- do we not
- 5 have to get the motion on the floor, before we can ask
- 6 questions about it?
- 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: Well, the motion is on the
- 8 floor, I think you ought to recognize the questions at
- 9 this point.
- 10 MS. FINK: Right.
- Okay. We have a motion. We have a motion
- 12 on the floor, and now I will entertain questions, and
- 13 Mr. Taylor had his hand up.
- MR. TAYLOR: I want to encourage my
- 15 colleagues, not to denigrate this institution, that we
- 16 have here. Because unfortunately, I think we have
- 17 some Board members here tonight, who are doing, or
- 18 beginning to really do a very good job, and I would
- 19 ask Dr. Thompson -- this is straining my patience,
- 20 this is unprecedented, what we are seeing here
- 21 tonight, unbelievable.
- So I am going to ask our colleagues, if we
- 23 can, try to stay in order, and raise our hands, and
- 24 not attempt to embarrass this very important
- 25 institution, which is a very important question in

- 1 front of us.
- 2 And one thing I am not going to do is talk
- 3 about particularly a new Board member. Mrs. Colaizzi,
- 4 this is unprecedented, to make a budget change, when
- 5 we requested time and time again that these budget
- 6 changes be made public, so that the Board could absorb
- 7 it, because we have to vote on this also.
- But also that the public would have input.
- 9 That is the idea of a budget hearing, which we had
- 10 last night, so the public could have input on these
- 11 budget decisions.
- I have no idea what the impact of it is.
- 13 It is wrong to ask the staff to tell us right now,
- 14 what -- the impact of these budget changes, that you
- 15 are making.
- Right, you should cover them, and the
- 17 public should have a right to know how you intend to
- 18 pay for the reopening of these schools, because I'm
- 19 very curious about it, because we still haven't heard
- 20 that.
- 21 But to make budget changes here tonight,
- 22 without any input from the public, without the staff
- 23 properly prepared, and without board members being
- 24 able to make an informed decision, again is
- 25 unprecedented; it is shocking, it is embarrassing.

- 1 President Fink, please don't take this Board down this
- 2 direction.
- 3 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler had his hand up.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, as president of this
- 5 Board, I am going to urge you that if in fact
- 6 resolutions, and other changes to this budget, are
- 7 going to be made, that this Board, and especially the
- 8 public, have time to take a look at it.
- 9 This is unfair, not only to the Board
- 10 members, who have not seen this at all, until tonight,
- 11 but also to the public.
- 12 My question is, in going over something
- 13 like this, and when something like this is offered by
- 14 anybody, what is the impact on the classroom? What is
- 15 the impact on student instruction?
- MS. COLAIZZI: None.
- 17 MR. ISLER: Well, you may say that,
- 18 Mrs. Colaizzi, I want to hear that from the
- 19 professionals of this District. I want to hear it
- 20 from the people who are out there working in the
- 21 District, day in and day out with the children, who
- 22 are qualified to make that decision, and that's why we
- 23 have them in this District.
- I am amazed that in some way, some of us
- 25 who have had no knowledge, have no insight into what

- 1 is going on, are having this really put before us this
- 2 evening.
- 3 And I think it is unfair not only to the
- 4 Board members who have not seen this yet this evening,
- 5 but also to the people of the City of Pittsburgh, the
- 6 parents, and the children of this School District, and
- 7 I urge you not to let it continue.
- 8 MS. FINK: Mr. Matthews.
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: Mrs. Fink, I want to just go
- 10 on record, and say that I totally agree with my two
- 11 colleagues. This is unheard of.
- We have been asking, for -- since
- 13 December 3rd, to have a public hearing on the budget,
- 14 so that he we can talk and deliberate about the budget
- 15 process. Not the behind the closed scene doors,
- 16 efforts that have been trying to take place, not the
- 17 telephone calls, and particularly not coming in at the
- 18 last moment and giving us a list of items that you
- 19 want to revise.
- 20 You know, this is exactly why we wanted to
- 21 have the meeting, so that we could discuss and
- 22 deliberate.
- Now, Mrs. Colaizzi, if in fact this is your
- 24 budget, then on page 94, of professional services,
- 25 what are you deleting out of there, or reducing?

- If we are going to go over these items
- 2 then, because I want to make sure that what -- because
- 3 a lot of times, what's happening, because we are not
- 4 in a public meeting, where we can discuss this and
- 5 people have the opportunity to look at this, and to
- 6 see how it affects the classroom, and the operations
- 7 of this District, we come up and we say we are going
- 8 to revise the budget, we are going to revise and take
- 9 down this category, I want to know what does that line
- 10 item, what does it entail, and who are you cutting
- 11 out.
- MS. COLAIZZI: First of all, Mrs. Fink gave
- 13 all of us a memo, and asked us for input on any
- 14 suggestion that we had, or any idea that we wanted to
- 15 put in, for the budget. I responded to that.
- MS. FINK: Actually, I had the secretary
- 17 poll the Board.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Just a second, you asked me
- 20 a question.
- 21 So this is what Mrs. Fink asked me to do,
- 22 she took who did respond to that memo, and I put it in
- 23 form for her, I also added mine in here.
- 24 If that one is specifically mine, right
- 25 offhand I can't tell you, I will search it at home, it

- 1 is not a problem. But what I am trying to tell you
- 2 is, this was very carefully done, no child would be
- 3 affected in their classroom, but --
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: Who did it?
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: But I will also answer the
- 6 other two questions, that were brought forth.
- 7 Mr. Taylor, you said that the budget has
- 8 never been handed to you, or has always been handed to
- 9 you prior to the public knowing about it. I am sorry,
- 10 but I have to disagree. Dr. Thompson handed out this
- 11 preliminary budget to the public, prior to this Board
- 12 seeing it.
- MR. TAYLOR: That is not true.
- 14 DR. THOMPSON: Mrs. Colaizzi, that is not
- 15 true. That is not true.
- 16 MS. HARRIS: I would like to call for the
- 17 question.
- 18 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 19 DR. THOMPSON: It was at the executive
- 20 session the night before.
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: Did you get it the day --
- 22 MS. FINK: I believe --
- DR. THOMPSON: That is not true.
- MS. FINK: I believe I got it, the day that
- 25 it was handed out.

- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. So it wasn't that
- 2 much before, maybe a couple of hours.
- But it doesn't --
- DR. THOMPSON: Excuse me, Madam Chairman,
- 5 we did a budget briefing the night before.
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: You didn't receive it, until
- 7 it was passed out.
- MS. FINK: Yes, we didn't get the heart --
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: I received it, I think you
- 10 did.
- MS. FINK: I don't know, Randall.
- MS. HARRIS: Call for the question.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Hold on.
- MS. FINK: We have a motion on the floor.
- MR. MATTHEWS: And we have questions. This
- 17 motion was brought before us right now, so if it's up
- 18 here, I want to discuss it.
- So I want to know, on page 25, let's go to
- 20 125, the budget was 80,000, you reduced it to \$30,000,
- 21 why was it reduced?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Most likely, it was reduced,
- 23 because as I --
- 24 MR. TAYLOR: Oh --
- MR. MATTHEWS: Not most likely.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: All right. I will answer
- 2 the question. Just a second.
- 3 It was -- as I went through, my choices of
- 4 reducing this budget, what I did was, I looked at what
- 5 was actually spent, I looked at what was budgeted, if
- 6 I found it was astronomically high, and would not
- 7 affect the child, and I was sure of that, then I would
- 8 cut it. I never cut it so much, that it would hurt or
- 9 damage any department, or any area.
- 10 And if you look at the numbers, as you go
- 11 through this, I am sure that you will see it that way.
- 12 And I will give you an example, if you
- 13 would like me to.
- MR. TAYLOR: You just walked through the
- 15 door.
- MS. FINK: Excuse me, Mr. Taylor, excuse
- 17 me.
- MR. MATTHEWS: She hasn't answered my
- 19 question on page 125.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No, I am going to answer the
- 21 question for the one I dealt with.
- MR. MATTHEWS: So this is not yours.
- 23 MR. ISLER: I said, that Mrs. Fink handed
- 24 every -- or faxed everybody a memo, asking for
- 25 everyone's input. I responded to it, and as well as

- 1 everyone else did, and then I put it together for
- 2 her.
- 3 So these are not all mine.
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. Well, then what I am
- 5 saying is --
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: But I will give you in
- 7 response to mine.
- 8 MR. MATTHEWS: But I asked --
- 9 MS. FINK: Let her give you an answer.
- MR. MATTHEWS: I want an answer to 125. On
 - 11 page 125, it says, professional educational services,
- 12 \$80,000, you reduced it to 30,000. What is it? if it
- 13 is not hers, whose is it?
- MR. TAYLOR: What is being cut?
- MR. MATTHEWS: You know, one of the things
- 16 I would object to -- hold on, Mr. Taylor.
- One of the things I really object to is the
- 18 fact that if you pass this out, how come you didn't
- 19 share this with us? How does everybody else -- how
- 20 does your other members have this?
- MS. COLAIZZI: I didn't pass it out.
- MR. MATTHEWS: What's that?
- MS. COLAIZZI: I just gave it to everybody
- 24 else.
- MR. MATTHEWS: You said they all have it.

- 1 MS. FINK: Yes, because I just got it.
- 2 MR. MATTHEWS: If you got information that
- 3 Board members wanted changes in the budget, why didn't
- 4 you distribute that to all Board members?
- 5 MS. FINK: Alex, I had the secretary poll
- 6 the Board, and ask if anybody had any changes,
- 7 suggestions, deletions, comments, or anything
- 8 else. And I got responses from some people, and from
- 9 other people I did not get responses.
- 10 MR. MATTHEWS: All right. So who on
- 11 Page 125, who can answer that particular item? Unless
- 12 you guys didn't do the budget. Unless you guys didn't
- 13 do this. Maybe that's it.
- Well, then come up with the rationale.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Alex, may I please --
- MS. FINK: Theresa just explained it.
- MS. COLAIZZI: May I please address the one
- 18 I am sure I did? I am sure --
- MR. MATTHEWS: Mrs. Colaizzi, meaning no
- 20 disrespect --
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: Allow me to answer the one I
- 22 am --
- 23 MR. MATTHEWS: -- I am not asking for that
- 24 one.
- MS. FINK: Wait a minute.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: When you don't want an
- 2 answer --
- 3 MS. FINK: We are going to have order here,
- 4 or we are just going to cut off discussion.
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: Then do it.
- 6 No, you are not going to cut off
- 7 discussion.
- 8 MS. FINK: Well, then let's have some
- 9 order.
- 10 MR. MATTHEWS: I asked for a particular
- 11 item to be discussed. This is an amendment that came
- 12 up to us today, and so we have a right to ask
- 13 questions on these amendments, and so all I am saying
- 14 is, on page 125, professional educational services,
- 15 \$80,000, \$30,000 budgeted, for a revised budget of
- 16 50,000, who came up with the recommendation, the
- 17 rationale for it?
- 18 That's all I am asking for, and these --
- 19 Mrs. Colaizzi can give me her rationale on the other
- 20 items. Right now, that's the one I am asking for.
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: I will tell you that, that
- 22 one's probably mine, and I will tell you why I
- 23 probably came up with that one.
- I saw such a large increase, and from what
- 25 was actual, and I cut it. That's how my rationale

- 1 worked.
- 2 And let me allow you to go on to the very
- 3 last one, which is on page 196, it's for natural gas
- 4 and heating, this one blew me right out of the water.
- 5 It is, the actual expenditures for 2000,
- 6 was over \$3 million, and I am just going to round
- 7 these numbers off, the budgeted for 2001, was
- 8 \$5 million, the same for 2002, I cut it only \$800,000,
- 9 because I cannot imagine that we needed that much
- 10 higher, to cover heating and natural gas. Okay?
- 11 This is how I did this, Alex, when I did
- 12 this. I used that rationale, and I have no problem
- 13 with what I did, I didn't do anything to hurt anyone,
- 14 specifically, I think this budget is too high, I was
- 15 uncomfortable with it, I didn't want to pass a budget
- 16 that was too high, and I think that this is being more
- 17 responsible.
- The number is not that damaging, to cut
- 19 this down. It is not that terrible.
- 20 MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. I guess my follow up
- 21 question to that is, that we --
- MS. FINK: Wait. Mr. Isler has his hand
- 23 up.
- 24 MR. ISLER: I think Mr. Matthews may still
- 25 have the floor, by point of parliamentary procedure.

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you, Mr. Isler.
- I just have one final question, one
- 3 comment. You know, once again, I would love to go in
- 4 somebody's budget, and because I think I can reduce
- 5 it, without asking the experts, without asking the
- 6 staff.
- 7 You know, I don't know if we have heard the
- 8 same news reports that's going on, but the cost of gas
- 9 is starting to rise up again, so when you start
- 10 looking at those things, to just come up arbitrarily,
- 11 and say, "I think we can do this, probably the reason
- 12 why I did this," without some hard cold facts.
- 13 The budget that was presented by
- 14 Dr. Thompson, was well thought out, and he had staff
- 15 working on this, who had the experts to deal with
- 16 finances, on an everyday basis, not just on a regular,
- 17 one time, "I think we should, possibly, maybe."
- And so, I just think, Mrs. Fink, I am
- 19 asking you as the Board president, to pull this,
- 20 because it is out of order for us to vote on some
- 21 amendments, that we have not had a chance to discuss
- 22 with -- discuss in a public meeting.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I want to again go
- 25 on record, and I have done this for you as you asked,

- 1 I think it is totally irresponsible, fiscally, and
- 2 morally, to do what is going on here tonight.
- 3 Why do we have people working in this
- 4 District? Why do we have people sitting around this
- 5 table, working day in and day out, to gain the trust
- 6 of people, in this city, so that their children can
- 7 come here and get a good education, and we, and I hate
- 8 to say it, willy-nilly go through a budget, and
- 9 started cutting it out, without discussing it with the
- 10 professionals, and without informing the public.
- I had asked you, and I am asking you again,
- 12 to schedule the public budget meeting, a working
- 13 meeting of the Board, which is open to the public,
- 14 where we can discuss this.
- 15 And if we don't do that, again, I think,
- 16 from the leadership of the Board, and the people who
- 17 vote for it, we are being totally irresponsible to the
- 18 people of this city.
- 19 And I think we could be damaging children's
- 20 education.
- 21 MS. FINK: One more. Mr. Taylor, and
- 22 that's it.
- 23 MR. TAYLOR: You know, we had experience
- 24 with this, Mrs. Fink, with the housewives special last
- 25 year, we did find out that cuts were made, as

- 1 Mr. Isler said, willy-nilly, and people did not know
- 2 what these cuts could mean, and I contend
- 3 Mrs. Colaizzi does not know what these cuts mean,
- 4 because I don't know what these cuts -- and I have
- 5 been here four years longer than her, but just to use
- 6 as an example, I mean, there is things like
- 7 communication cuts, just as an example, where she just
- 8 stated about natural gas and heating, now, unless
- 9 Mrs. Colaizzi can see into the future, if we get a
- 10 cold snap, and we have a whole month under a --
- 11 10 degrees below zero, we are going to be burning
- 12 books to keep the kids warm, but let's go ahead and
- 13 vote on it, because Mrs. Colaizzi can promise us, we
- 14 will not have a whole January that is under 10 degrees
- 15 below zero.
- 16 That's reckless. Mrs. Fink, that's
- 17 reckless.
- 18 DR. THOMPSON: Madam President, may I have
- 19 something to say, please.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- DR. THOMPSON: I think it is fair for this
- 22 Board, to understand the implications, and the
- 23 devastation this budget will cause in our District,
- 24 and one question, I started at the bottom, I went over
- 25 with our staff, as we see this for the first time, why

- 1 is the Board increasing their line item, by
- 2 \$1 million for your professional services? Why is
- 3 that on this -- I mean, what does that have to do with
- 4 children?
- 5 Mr. Fellers, would you go ahead?
- And one other thing, Mr. Attorney, I want
- 7 to go on record and say tonight, anything on this
- 8 budget, that violates the superintendent's contract,
- 9 as far as my ability to assign people, you need to let
- 10 the board know, it is in violation of my contract.
- 11 Also, Mr. Attorney, I will ask for you to
- 12 have each member to go down this list, and identify
- 13 the areas that they put in this board -- in this
- 14 agenda -- in this budget, so that they can be held
- 15 personally accountable for things that they do here
- 16 tonight.
- 17 When it talks about individuals, I see a
- 18 line item on here right now, that deals with an
- 19 individual that we hired in this School District, and
- 20 that is arbitrary and capricious, and I want each --
- 21 so when the time comes, and the time will come, that
- 22 each Board member to put these items in, you vote on
- 23 them, then you can be held liable as a personal thing.
- Mr. Fellers, would you please go over the
- 25 items, please?

- MR. FELLERS: I need to point out several
- 2 points, so that the Board members are informed about
- 3 the decisions they are making.
- A number of the cuts are in professional
- 5 services, which means contracts that are currently in
- 6 place will not be able to be continued. However,
- 7 those contracts will have to be officially severed; if
- 8 they are not, we are obligated for the funds, whether
- 9 they are appropriated or not.
- 10 Likewise, there are a number of reductions
- 11 in the salaries of top administrators. That is fine
- 12 to reduce the appropriation; however, if the
- 13 appropriate personnel action is not taken to make the
- 14 corresponding reduction, the person will be paid the
- 15 full amount of their salary, regardless of what is
- 16 appropriated for those line items.
- I do need to call your attention to the
- 18 fact, that there is over 1. -- almost \$1.2 million in
- 19 cuts in technology, which are about half way down the
- 20 page. I need to call with some concern, the fact that
- 21 all replacement vehicles have been cut -- I'm sorry, a
- 22 hundred thousand has been cut out, from replacement
- 23 vehicles, and a hundred thousand has been cut out of
- 24 Xerox equipment, which is primarily used in our
- 25 schools, in our lease/purchase contracts.

- I would need to point out the
- 2 communications, telecommunication, and supply lines,
- 3 which deal with our telephone service, if we get
- 4 E-Rate, we can live with that, the first two, if we
- 5 cannot get E-Rate, we will not be able to pay our
- 6 phone, and connectivity bills, and we will not be able
- 7 to buy any new hand sets, because that's what the
- 8 \$300,000 goes for, so you are cutting into areas that
- 9 are speculative.
- 10 And I must caution you on natural gas. I
- 11 know that this has been a mild winter to date, but the
- 12 bills that we are talking about paying, are the bills
- 13 starting in January.
- So if the weather turns bad, rates go bad,
- 15 and I must tell you, one of our suppliers is Enron,
- 16 that just announced their bankruptcy, which means we
- 17 are going to have to find a new natural gas supplier.
- 18 I must tell you, that is a very chancy endeavor, to be
- 19 taking.
- 20 It would be staff's collective
- 21 recommendation, that if you have questions about these
- 22 very extensive list of line items, that you take
- 23 action after the budget is adopted, to freeze them
- 24 next year, so you have the latitude to restore them,
- 25 if the need is there.

- If you cut them now, there is no funds to
- 2 restore them, you may not reopen your budget, or
- 3 increase your budget, so that if you need natural gas
- 4 money, there will not be a place to find it.
- 5 So, I also need to go back to the third and
- 6 fourth line items, the responsibility code is a four
- 7 digit number, this leads with a three digit number,
- 8 200, I don't know if that's 0200, or 2000, but that
- 9 will be difficult to implement, until that is
- 10 clarified.
- 11 Thank you.
- DR. THOMPSON: Finally, Madam Chairperson,
- 13 we are very concerned about this budget, very, very
- 14 concerned, especially in the light of the fact I have
- 15 told the Board that the closing of Fort Pitt Tunnel is
- 16 going to cost this District between two and five
- 17 million dollars, I have also told this Board that the
- 18 possibility of us having to fund two more charter
- 19 schools in this District, is going to cost us anywhere
- 20 from two to five million dollars, I have also related
- 21 to the Board some of the other issues that will come
- 22 up this year, that will cause this budget to go up,
- 23 and for us to cut this kind of money out of this
- 24 budget, is really irresponsible, and I plead with you
- 25 guys, I hope you know what you are doing, because once

- 1 you back us up into this situation, there is no way
- 2 out.
- 3 And the final thing is, what are we here
- 4 for? If you guys have all of the answers -- and,
- 5 Miss Colaizzi, I don't fault you, but I mean, you have
- 6 only been on the Board for two or three weeks, but now
- 7 how can you have come into here, when I have people
- 8 around me with 25 years, 40 years of experience,
- 9 Ph.D.'s, master degrees, specialists in the areas, and
- 10 you guys come up, automatically, overnight, and put
- 11 together a \$4 million cut.
- 12 It doesn't make any sense. Mathematically,
- 13 I don't understand it. Where -- what about the
- 14 children? Nobody -- I mean, the impact on the kids.
- 15 Has anybody talked to any of us, on how this is going
- 16 to end up impacting our kids?
- Somebody says, "Oh, we know it won't." How
- 18 do you know it would not impact kids, if you have not
- 19 talked to our principals, our executive directors, and
- 20 other people?
- 21 You can't just do this. I mean, it is bad,
- 22 it just smells bad.
- MS. FINK: We have a question, we have a
- 24 motion on the floor, to amend the budget, it's been
- 25 duly seconded, and I would like to call for a vote on

- 1 that.
- MR. MATTHEWS: No, Madam, I had my hand up.
- MR. ISLER: No, Madam --
- 4 MS. HARRIS: Roll call vote.
- 5 MS. FINK: How long are we going do
- 6 question?
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Well, I don't know, I have a
- 8 question on the budget. You brought this up to us
- 9 today, I have a right to ask questions on these
- 10 amendments.
- 11 MR. TAYLOR: We couldn't ask for them
- 12 before.
- MS. HARRIS: We called for the question.
- MR. MATTHEWS: It is easy to call for the
- 15 question, isn't it, Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes, you have done it a lot.
- 17 MR. MATTHEWS: I have never done it. I
- 18 have never silenced anyone from talking.
- MS. FINK: We are not going to go there.
- 20 MR. MATTHEWS: I have a question to ask.
- 21 MS. FINK: Ask your question.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.
- 23 And actually, it's really -- it's a
- 24 question, but it's followed first by a comment.
- In light of the fact that the staff has

- 1 indicated the implications that these cuts would make
- 2 to this District, in light of the fact that, you know,
- 3 because we did not get a chance to look at this, I am
- 4 asking, and here is my question, that the maker of
- 5 this motion, Mrs. Colaizzi, pull this from -- take
- 6 this off of the table, as an amended motion -- as a
- 7 motion, because of the fact that it is irresponsible,
- 8 and as they say in the auctions, we have been given a
- 9 fair warning. We have been given a fair warning,
- 10 about what the cost, that these cost cuts, will do to
- 11 this District, to the staff, and to the students.
- We said it is not going to hurt the
- 13 students, and we just heard some possibilities that it
- 14 is going to hurt the kids, so I am asking
- 15 Mrs. Colaizzi to pull this off.
- MS. FINK: I will say, that this budget,
- 17 has gone up.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. Can she answer my
- 19 question?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MR. MATTHEWS: You are not going to pull it
- 23 off?
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- 25 MS. FINK: Okay. This budget has gone up

- 1 \$47 million from last year. We are proposing a
- 2 \$4 million cut.
- 3 Mr. Isler, may I ask you what you want to
- 4 talk about?
- 5 MR. ISLER: Yes, Mrs. Fink, I would agree
- 6 with you that this budget has gone up, and I think if
- 7 that's the question, then we all deserve the time, and
- 8 this public deserves the time, to question this.
- 9 You know, the question, and I did not want
- 10 to ask this publicly, but I will ask you, why is this
- 11 Board planning to spend an extra million dollars?
- 12 That is a line item in the Board. I mean, I don't
- 13 want to put you on the hot seat, but I have already
- 14 been opposed to some of the things you want to spend
- 15 money on, what is this now going to be?
- We are volunteer Board members.
- 17 MS. FINK: Right.
- MR. ISLER: What is this for? We are going
- 19 to raise our budget --
- 20 MS. FINK: That --
- MR. ISLER: Excuse me. We are going to
- 22 raise the Board budget -- the Board budget, proposed,
- 23 from 200 -- if I am not mistaken, from \$316,656, that
- 24 this Board spends on itself, for what it needs -- it
- 25 is, Mrs. Colaizzi.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: It is some staff.
- 2 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, it may be some
- 3 staff, but I am saying, we spend it on ourselves. We
- 4 are going to raise that an extra million dollars? Can
- 5 you please tell me why?
- 6 MS. FINK: I think that money will be put
- 7 there, not because we have any immediate plans to
- 8 spend it, but it's there in case we need to have any
- 9 consultants, or anything that we need to have, that
- 10 answer to us, to find out -- answer some questions,
- 11 look at the budget for next year, anything we need,
- 12 anything we may decide to do. If we never spend a
- 13 dime, that's fine, too.
- 14 I would like to --
- MR. ISLER: All I am asking -- all I am
- 16 asking, and I think the public deserves this, is what
- 17 are you planning on spending the money on.
- 18 We are polled, we were polled a couple of
- 19 weeks ago on added expense, which I came to you about,
- 20 and I think is wrong. I think this is wrong. We are
- 21 putting a million dollars aside, we are asking --
- 22 trying to figure out, the fund balance, based on the
- 23 calendar year, that was one of the questions,
- 24 Mr. Fellers has been in this District for quite a
- 25 while, Mr. Camarda, are trying to explain that to us.

- 1 All of a sudden now, we want a reserve for the Board
- 2 of \$1 million, just in case we want to hire
- 3 consultants.
- I think that is folly.
- 5 MS. FINK: Okay. Could we --
- DR. THOMPSON: Madam Chairman.
- 7 MS. FINK: I would like to call for a vote.
- B DR. THOMPSON: Madam Chairman, I have
- 9 another concern, please.
- 10 Madam President.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- DR. THOMPSON: You asked about the
- 13 \$40 million deficit -- I mean the \$40 million
- 14 increase?
- 15 \$17 million was put on us by another issue.
- MS. FINK: Right.
- DR. THOMPSON: Okay. So that's part of it.
- 18 So we didn't control that.
- 19 Let me talk about the other parts of that.
- MS. FINK: That was 17.
- DR. THOMPSON: Okay. We are going to tell
- 22 you what the 40 million is for.
- 23 MS. FINK: 47.
- MR. FELLERS: I think the Board, and the
- 25 public need to understand, that the state has gone

- 1 into a mode, about ten years ago, where even when they
- 2 give us money, it increases our budget, because they
- 3 pass it through the budget.
- When we got \$3 million this last summer,
- 5 from the state for special ed., it didn't go to the
- 6 special ed. budget, it came to the general fund
- 7 budget, as revenue. We had to increase appropriations
- 8 by \$3 million, to pass it on to special ed. budget.
- 9 The same thing happens with the large
- 10 increases in state retirement that we are facing, with
- 11 Social Security, our debt service is up, but it's all
- 12 debt service that has taken place to date, none of
- 13 this deals with projects for next year. So that debt
- 14 service was duly incurred by the Board, and cannot, at
- 15 this point in time, be reduced.
- I grant you, that that sounds like a lot,
- 17 but if you look what's behind the numbers, and the
- 18 position we are put in with these pass through funds,
- 19 it creates the artificial impression that our budget
- 20 is growing much greater than it really is.
- I think the adjustment we gave you, was
- 22 3.44 percent, after we factored in all of these items.
- 23 That was in face -- in the face of labor
- 24 settlements, that were 4 percent or higher, which
- 25 means that we actually kept the growth of the budget

- 1 under the cost of labor settlements. That's
- 2 exceptional.
- 3 There is not an unusual growth in this
- 4 budget. There is an unusual way, that the state
 - 5 passes money to us, that makes the districts look bad,
 - 6 and is to the benefit of the Commonwealth.
- 7 MS. FINK: Could we please ever a roll call
- 8 vote on this motion.
- 9 MS. HARRIS: Go ahead, you have to call for
- 10 it.
- 11 MS. FINK: I am.
- I am calling for a roll call vote.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Point of order, you cannot
- 14 call for the question, Madam Chair.
- MS. HARRIS: I called for the question.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Are you going to recognize
- 17 that?
- MS. FINK: Yes. That's why I am saying --
- MR. MATTHEWS: Then we need to vote on the
- 20 call of the question.
- 21 MR. TAYLOR: That is something I would
- 22 never do.
- MS. HARRIS: There is a motion on the
- 24 floor.
- MR. MATTHEWS: You called for a question.

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1 It must be voted on for the call of
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- 2 question, that is parliamentary procedure.
- 3 MS. HARRIS: I called for --
- MS. FINK: All right. Darlene, we will
 - 5 call for the votes on the question.
 - 6 Right, Mr. Weiss?
 - 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: Yes.
 - 8 MS. FINK: And then vote -- if that
 - 9 happens, then we vote on the amendment.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Okay. This vote is on the
- 11 calling of the question.
- Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: No.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 19 MR. ISLER: No.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: No.
- 22 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: No.

- 1 ATTORNEY WEISS: Was that a no, Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 3 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 5 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- 6 MS. FINK: Yes.
- 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: Okay. Vote is five in
- 8 favor, four against, the call of the question, so we
- 9 now would have the roll call on the amendment, as
- 10 presented by Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 11 Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: No.
- 13 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 18 MR. ISLER: This is the most responsible
- 19 vote I have made. No.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- 21 MR. MATTHEWS: I will be voting no on this
- 22 amendment, because it is irresponsible to the City of
- 23 Pittsburgh, to the children of Pittsburgh, and it
- 24 violates the total respect of this Board, and its
- 25 obligation to make sure that we hold things in public,

- 1 and not do things behind closed doors, as though we
- 2 are some type of children. And maybe we need to go
- 3 back to school. And anyone else who votes on this,
- 4 ought to. It is irresponsible to this system.
- 5 MS. FINK: I take it that was no.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Is that a no,
- 7 Mr. Matthews?
- 8 MR. MATTHEWS: That is a qualifying no.
- 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: Okay.
- 10 Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: And also, since I was
- 14 silenced, before I was answered mine, I am also going
- 15 to add, this is the most dangerous -- does this Board,
- 16 does this majority recognize you are frightening the
- 17 public? And they have a right to be and they should
- 18 be frightened. You are passing a budget, you don't
- 19 even know what you are doing. This has implications
- 20 that are so far reaching for this District, I am not
- 21 sitting here grandstanding, you accuse me of
- 22 dramatizing things, this is no drama, you are sitting
- 23 here passing something that you have no idea what the
- 24 implications of it can be, and if you wrong, there is
- 25 no money to pay for it.

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Kids suffer.
- 2 MS. FINK: No, the kids won't suffer.
- 3 MR. TAYLOR: There is no money to pay for
- 4 it.
- 5 MS. FINK: Is this a no?
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: You know, this is -- I have
- 7 never -- I thought we reached a low point in June of
- 8 '98, when we voted for some things. This is the
- 9 lowest point I believe this Board has ever been in its
- 10 80 year history.
- 11 MS. FINK: Is this a no?
- MR. TAYLOR: God help us. No. No.
- 13 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: The amendment, the motion
- 18 on amendment, passes. The matter before the Board now
- 19 is the budget.
- MR. TAYLOR: My goodness.
- 21 MS. FINK: Okay.
- I will read the budget resolution, and then
- 23 we will vote on it, as amended.
- MR. TAYLOR: Oh, my goodness.
- 25 (Mrs. Fink read from prepared material.)

- 1 MS. FINK: I am going to call for a roll
- 2 call vote, on the budget as --
- 4 MS. FINK: Yes.
- DR. THOMPSON: We have a correction here.
- 6 MR. FINK: Okay.
- 7 DR. THOMPSON: Go ahead, Rick. We think
- 8 our mic is dead.
- 9 MR. FELLERS: I need to point out to the
- 10 directors that the resolution you read, refers to the
- 11 appropriations on the third page, which are not
- 12 amended, and they need to be changed to reflect this
- 13 entire page.
- 14 The only way to do that, if that has not
- 15 been done to date, is we are going to have to go into
- 16 recess, go back, and take each of these line items,
- 17 and subtract them from the major object categories, to
- 18 come up with appropriations, as amended, for you to
- 19 adopt.
- 20 Otherwise, you will be adopting the budget
- 21 the superintendent has presented to you.
- MR. TAYLOR: That's okay, let them go ahead
- 23 and do that.
- 24 MS. FINK: Is there not -- can't we simply
- 25 subtract the amended number, from this number, and

- 1 then adjust the items at a later time?
- 2 MR. FELLERS: My understanding, and I will
- 3 defer to counsel, is you are adopting by major object
- 4 code, therefore it is not just the total that needs to
- 5 be right, but each of the major objects totals need to
- 6 be correct.
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Madam Chair, we have a point
- 8 of order.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Can you answer that?
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Well, the motion on the
- 11 amendment, was to amend the budget as presented by
- 12 this --
- 13 MR. ISLER: By line item.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: -- by this presentation.
- 15 It is my view, that if the Board approves the budget,
- 16 as amended, it will approve a budget that will have to
- 17 be adjusted by these numbers.
- But I think the sequence is clear, and the
- 19 intent is clear, so I don't believe that there has to
- 20 be the actual mathematical revision, at this point.
- 21 A VOICE: Well, I do, it's my tax dollars.
- 22 ATTORNEY WEISS: The figures on the
- 23 amendment are clear, and I believe the budget, as
- 24 amended, if it passes now, would be passed as amended.
- So, that will be my position, Mr. Fellers.

- 1 MS. FINK: Okay. Well, then, we will have
- 2 a roll call vote on the budget, as amended.
- 3 MR. MATTHEWS: We have questions on the
- 4 motion.
- 5 MR. ISLER: We have questions.
- 6 MS. FINK: All right. Mr. Isler.
- 7 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I hate to use the
- 8 word, but I think we literally are in chaos. We have
- 9 staff telling us one thing, and in all due respect to
- 10 our counsel, he is telling us something else.
- If in fact we move ahead, and any citizens
- 12 of this city decide to take us to court on this, I
- 13 just want the Board to know that ahead of time.
- I think -- and it's the reason I am going
- 15 back to my request of you, that we not do this here,
- 16 that we do this in a working session -- you have now
- 17 created chaos, for this District.
- And I regret that for the people of this
- 19 city, and the children of this School District, and
- 20 the people in this District, that work day in and day
- 21 out, to make this a successful system.
- We are working against all that. And I
- 23 just need to again remind you of that.
- MS. FINK: Fine.
- 25 Mr. Matthews.

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Madam Chair, Mrs. CPA,
- 2 Mrs. CPA, because obviously you guys have degrees in
- 3 finance, so the only thing I want to say is, that I
- 4 just think it is totally irresponsible, that you cut
- 5 everybody else's department, and you increase our
- 6 department. We don't do anything. Unless you guys
- 7 want to go out and travel, or do some other things,
- 8 going to other conferences.
- 9 MS. FINK: That's not what it is for.
- MR. MATTHEWS: But you haven't explained,
- 11 we asked you what that million dollar increase is, and
- 12 it has not been done, so I think it's fair to the
- 13 public to know, why the Board office needs to have a
- 14 million dollars.
- I am the one who developed the budget, with
- 16 the long -- not with myself, but with Pete Camarda, I
- 17 have -- we developed that budget, we included
- 18 professional services, for consulting fees, and it did
- 19 not include a million dollars.
- This million dollars, here, I don't know
- 21 what you want to do with it, maybe pay your people in
- 22 Harrisburg for it, but it is not to pay consultants
- 23 around here. And what are they going to do?
- So if you can explain to us, what this
- 25 million dollars is for and, Madam Chair, once again,

- 1 this goes back to the same premise that I have been
- 2 asking for, as having a meeting in public, to discuss
- 3 the budget, and obviously, you guys must have come
- 4 together, because unless -- did you type all of this
- 5 up?
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: When did you develop the
- 7 budget, with Mr. Camarda?
- MR. MATTHEWS: The Board president
- 9 develops -- each office develops the Board budget.
- MS. COLAIZZI: When did you do it, is my
- 11 question.
- MR. MATTHEWS: It was before you came on
- 13 the Board.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, that's all my
- 15 question was.
- MR. MATTHEWS: So you put the million
- 17 dollars in?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes. I have --
- MR. MATTHEWS: So what's the million
- 20 dollars for?
- 21 MS COLAIZZI: I want financial advisors, I
- 22 want our solicitor to --
- MR. MATTHEWS: We have financial advisors
- MS. COLAIZZI: Where?
- MR. MATTHEWS: They work for us.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: Where? We asked them --
- 2 MR. MATTHEWS: What else do you need?
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: We Asked them to please cut
- 4 this budget.
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: Is this going to be the
- 6 people from Harrisburg that you have working on this
- 7 budget, are they going to be our financial advisors?
- 8 Who is -- why the million dollars? For financial
- 9 advisors?
- MS. COLAIZZI: For anything we want.
- MR. MATTHEWS: So -- oh, anything.
- 12 Anything.
- 13 MS. COLAIZZI: This Board has more -- has
- 14 more consultants, and contractors, than I have ever
- 15 seen in my life. I see more consultants --
- MR. MATTHEWS: But you are going to add a
- 17 million dollars more?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, because if -- we are
- 19 going to have a consultant, that is going to consult
- 20 us. Us. This Board doesn't have any kind of advisor,
- 21 to tell us which way to go, any time.
- You ask a questions in this District, and
- 23 God knows what happens, because you just disrupted the
- 24 whole world, because you ask a question, because you
- 25 want some information.

- 1 Okay?
- I asked for information, it is like I asked
- 3 for the Holy Bible from Jesus Christ himself to be
- 4 delivered to me. Okay?
- 5 And I resent that. I resent that.
- I also resent the fact that you don't think
- 7 that I was capable of just making some -- and these
- 8 are minor cuts. If you look at the budget, and what
- 9 was spent, what is projected for the next budget, if
- 10 -- they are not that big of a deal. If you really do.
- MS. FINK: Okay. This is really not a good
- 12 place, for this.
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes, it is.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Madam Chair, this is on the
- 15 budget, and right now I have the floor. And if you
- 16 are saying that we spent too much on consultants, but
- 17 yet you want to add a million dollars to add more
- 18 consultants, I am confused on that.
- MS. COLAIZZI: We are not going to spend
- 20 that money.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Then why is it in there?
- MS. COLAIZZI: It is just there.
- MR. MATTHEWS: But you cut everybody else,
- 24 you say why do I think you incapable --
- MS. COLAIZZI: We are not going to use it.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: Just take it out.
- 2 MS. COLAIZZI: How?
- 3 MR. MATTHEWS: Why do I think you are
- 4 incapable or any of you are incapable of developing
- 5 these cuts right here, is because we just got through
- 6 telling you, the measures and the devastation this is
- 7 going to cause to this District, but yet you are still
- 8 saying it's okay.
- 9 You stand for it yourself, you just felt
- 10 that -- that the cut in natural gas, that's a good
- 11 cut. There is no rationale, and we have consultants
- 12 that work for the District, anybody who works for us,
- 13 works for this District, they don't solely work for
- 14 us. We have to get our priorities straight.
- 15 Get them straight.
- 16 MS. FINK: Yes, we do need to do that,
- 17 Alex.
- 18 MR. MATTHEWS: And, Mrs. Fink, I have been
- 19 asking you to have meetings about this, and obviously
- 20 you guys did this behind closed doors, because you got
- 21 this thing prepared.
- 22 Mrs. Colaizzi said these are not all hers,
- 23 so obviously she had to get them from somewhere.
- MS. FINK: I had asked, requested our
- 25 secretary --.

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: And that's a violation of
- 2 the School Code.
- 3 MS. FINK: -- to poll the Board, and give
- 4 responses, to me, about how they felt about the budget
- 5 cuts, additions, deletions, changes; some people
- 6 answered them.
- 7 Mrs. Colaizzi was kind enough, to offer to
- 8 type them up for me. Okay?
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: So then, but why couldn't
- 10 you share this with us? We have been asking you for
- 11 information on the budget, for weeks.
- 12 Let's talk about it.
- MS. FINK: I just got it tonight, Alex.
- MR. MATTHEWS: You just got it tonight,
- 15 too, so you don't know --
- MS. FINK: I just got the typed copy.
- MR. MATTHEWS: You don't even know what's
- 18 these budget -- what's on these items, then.
- 19 MS. FINK: Sure, I do.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, then explain it to us.
- 21 MS. HARRIS: Call for the question.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Would you stop doing that,
- 23 Mrs. Harris? Allow us to give our opinions, and
- 24 comments. Allow us to do that.
- You know it is easy, because you got your

- 1 five votes, and I haven't heard from Skip yet.
- MS. HARRIS: Do it in a calm manner.
- MR. MATTHEWS: I am doing it in a calm
- 4 manner.
- I can't do it in a calm manner, when I have
- 6 been asking for weeks, and you try to hold a private
- 7 meeting, to deliberate, and call people in, into
- 8 question, you had the entire operations committee, had
- 9 all of the directors lined up, and you were going to
- 10 have a deliberation, talking about these line items.
- MS. HARRIS: Mr. Matthews, that is
- 12 absolutely untrue.
- MR. MATTHEWS: What was the meeting for,
- 14 then?
- MS. HARRIS: Chairing the business
- 16 committee, with the vice chair, we were going to have
- 17 a committee with staff meeting, for business, and
- 18 finance both, to talk about the agenda, to get
- 19 information for one of the new Board members, to come
- 20 on, that happens to be a vice chair.
- But, what happened through staff, is you,
- 22 which never happened before when there was a meeting
- 23 between staff and the chair, and the vice chair,
- 24 yourself, Mr. Taylor and Mr. Brentley, showed up.
- 25 Okay?

- Well, I was there, and also Mr. McCrea was
- 2 there.
- 3 The president is an ex officio member.
- 4 That made six people in that room.
- 5 You know, I walked out of that room,
- 6 because when you have five Board members, that was a
- 7 public meeting. We could not discuss anything, we
- 8 couldn't even put an agenda together.
- 9 So we could not have a finance meeting, and
- 10 we could not have a business meeting.
- 11 And that's all I have to say.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, thank you, because
- 13 since you are so informed on the law, then you also
- 14 understand, that the Sunshine Act also says that a
- 15 committee, acting as a committee of the Board, cannot
- 16 operate without that meeting being advertised.
- 17 A planning meeting is saying: "Okay,
- 18 what's going to be to the agenda? Oh, the budget's
- 19 going to be on there? Okay. We are going to talk
- 20 about the budget."
- When you call staff members in, directors
- 22 in, to talk about items in the budget, that is
- 23 deliberations, that's a committee meeting, has to be
- 24 open to the public.
- So we didn't violate the rule, you violated

- 1 the rule by holding a private meeting, to try to put
- 2 through your items, without it being discussed in
- 3 public.
- 4 MS. HARRIS: That was not a public meeting,
- 5 that was a meeting, to get -- to get an agenda
- 6 together, to get some questions answered, and any
- 7 Board member should be able to ask any staff member,
- 8 any information at all.
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: Not under the purview of a
- 10 committee.
- 11 MS. HARRIS: And I'm in total agreement
- 12 with Mrs. Colaizzi, I have asked for information, I do
- 13 not get answers to information, I have to send out two
- 14 and three memos, I'm told I have to go through the
- 15 superintendent, and I do, but I have to wait a month
- 16 to get any kind of public information, that the public
- 17 should be able to come in here and get.
- 18 I'm not going to argue with you any more.
- 19 MR. MATTHEWS: I don't want you to arque
- 20 with me.
- 21 MR. BRENTLEY: I have a comment.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Taylor had his hand --
- MR. MATTHEWS: All I am saying is that you
- 24 had a meeting that was illegal, and you scheduled the
- 25 meeting, and you are right, it was not a public

- 1 meeting, because you wanted to do it behind closed
- 2 doors, that you could deliberate, and get all of your
- 3 facts and figures together, and then I guess come up
- 4 with your own little budget, like you did tonight.
- 5 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: Every Board member has a right
- 7 to any information that they call, and if the Board
- 8 members are not receiving the information in a timely
- 9 manner to answer their questions, that's a problem for
- 10 all Board members, so to take an action, without
- 11 letting every Board member know you are having a
- 12 problem, it is just wrong, it is just wrong to operate
- 13 that way.
- 14 Probably the saddest part, and the reason
- 15 this is going on, because I thought this was going to
- 16 be a simple meeting, about recklessly trying to spend
- 17 a few million dollars to reopen some schools that
- 18 shouldn't be opened.
- I had no idea that you were guys were
- 20 talking about putting this -- putting this School
- 21 District in jeopardy, and potentially harming
- 22 children.
- 23 And once again you are making budget cuts,
- 24 that you don't have the slightest idea what they
- 25 mean. None of us can know.

- 1 That's the way -- that's the reason they
- 2 are calling for a meeting. I believe that you
- 3 should -- you should -- either we all vote down this
- 4 budget, and go to the 28th, which again is
- 5 unprecedented for us not to pass a budget on time, but
- 6 to do something like this is beyond reckless, for
- 7 Board members to sit there, and say that there is
- 8 \$47 million, as if, you know, we are not paying for
- 9 charter schools, and the District has some other
- 10 costs, we don't know about.
- 11 The public has a right to know. If you are
- 12 accusing, which you are, that the staff is padding,
- 13 inflating numbers, then you have the responsibility to
- 14 bring that to the public, and you are not doing that.
- 15 And I don't believe -- and also, in this
- 16 budget, I know it was not taken into account, that we
- 17 have one charter school that was approved by the state
- 18 appeal committee, that right now we are having in
- 19 court, and I know we are having another one, that
- 20 looked very promising, and strange things happen
- 21 around charter applications, we could be looking at,
- 22 as Dr. Thompson said, two charter schools.
- 23 Is this reflected in this, that next year
- 24 we may be paying for two charter schools?
- 25 And have we talked about -- I have talked

- 1 to our transportation director a bit about this issue
- 2 bout the Fort Pitt closing, and it could be two to
- 3 three million dollars, as Dr. Thompson said. Did you
- 4 budget for that?
- 5 Because if you didn't, again, when you lock
- 6 us into this, we cannot get any more money, you can't
- 7 raise taxes in the middle of the school year, to get
- 8 some money, or you go back to raiding the excellent
- 9 financial plans, you go back to raiding funds, and
- 10 doing things like that again, not knowing what would
- 11 those cuts mean.
- The saddest part about this, as I truly do
- 13 believe, we have Board members sitting around the
- 14 table, who think we have Board members who are
- 15 politicking and grandstanding.
- As I said, I thought we were going to just
- 17 vote on opening three or four schools, I had no idea
- 18 that something like this would come. It is
- 19 disrespectful to School Board members, and I know no
- 20 one has ever seen me disrespect the School Board
- 21 members, and to bring this at us, and throw this at
- 22 us, without us getting a discussion, there is not a
- 23 Board member here, who has ever seen me call for the
- 24 question, who has ever sat there showing impatience
- 25 whenever Board members ask 20 questions in the agenda

- 1 review hearing, they have never seen me show
- 2 impatience with that, because a Board member has a
- 3 right to any information they need to make a decision,
- 4 and they have the right to ask as many questions, as
- 5 they have, to make a decision.
- And you are in there, in just a few weeks,
- 7 President Fink, and you are denying Board members the
- 8 right to information, in which to make a decision.
- 9 Is that how you are going to operate from
- 10 here on out? This is a sad evening, it really is.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I just -- I just want
- 13 to say, too, and it's probably not even in order to
- 14 say that, let me as one Board member, just apologize
- 15 to our staff.
- MR. TAYLOR: And to the public.
- 17 MR. BRENTLEY: And to the public. What an
- 18 embarrassing thing to do. What an embarrassing thing.
- 19 I apologize to you, because I take this position very
- 20 seriously. I have children in the District, and I am
- 21 working hard for the entire -- I am learning, to work
- 22 hard for the entire District, not just my District.
- 23 President Fink, I am -- I am convinced that
- 24 this is the third situation here, I think we have
- 25 another piece of new business item, that is dealing

- 1 with operations of business, and I understand staff
- 2 haven't even seen it. And we are changing things in
- 3 the middle of the stream. They haven't even seen it.
- I am asking you, it is not our job to
- 5 compete with the staff. We are on the same team. We
- 6 are working together.
- 7 And I am asking -- you are setting a
- 8 dangerous course here. I am asking, and only you at
- 9 this point, because we know when you make the nod,
- 10 four people will follow right behind you, and I am
- 11 asking for the sake of the public, and for our staff,
- 12 you have to show some real leadership here, you know
- 13 in your heart what you are doing is wrong, you know
- 14 it's inciting some things here, you know it is going
- 15 to anger some folks, and let's also be honest, too,
- 16 that it will affect the bottom line, in this city, in
- 17 terms of the business community, because if you mess
- 18 up public education, it also hits the bottom line of
- 19 the business community.
- What will it take, for you to, for your
- 21 leadership, just to simply cut -- why can't you work
- 22 with Dr. Thompson?
- You know, whatever differences you have,
- 24 you get behind closed doors, and you get them solved,
- 25 and then you come forward. But we know this is part

- 1 of a bigger picture. And I am asking that you be an
- 2 adult, and deal with your issues with Dr. Thompson,
- 3 behind closed doors.
- This is such an embarrassment. Can you
 - 5 imagine, if you were a member of that staff, and no
 - 6 one has never even asked us yet, what's wrong with
 - 7 Mr. Camarda? This is what -- you know, a walking
 - 8 budget director, he is a genius.
 - 9 MR. TAYLOR: We have a budget director, why
- 10 ask him anything.
- 11 MR. BRENTLEY: And we have not even run it
- 12 past him.
- 13 MR. TAYLOR: They don't believe him anyway.
- MR. BRENTLEY: We are no com -- we
- 15 shouldn't be competing with the staff.
- 16 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- 17 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I would like an
- 18 explanation from you, on exactly what we are voting
- 19 on, as you, the president of this Board, understand
- 20 it.
- 21 Please explain it to me clearly, and for
- 22 the record, so that the public knows, as well as all
- 23 nine -- nine board members, what now are we voting on,
- 24 in your interpretation, of what the vote shall be.
- MS. FINK: We are voting on the budget, as

- 1 amended, and with the professional legal opinion that
- 2 this amendment does indeed speak to the numbers in the
- 3 object lines, and the bottom line, and so when we call
- 4 for the roll call vote, we are voting on this budget,
- 5 as amended, for the school year of 2002.
- 6 MR. ISLER: Can I just -- just work with
- 7 me.
- 8 MS. FINK: 2000.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Just work with me a little bit,
- 10 just so that I fully understand.
- 11 There is a difference of opinion, at the
- 12 table, among staff, since our general counsel is
- 13 considered staff, on how we are going forward with
- 14 this. So we do have a disagreement, right now, in
- 15 this room, about this.
- 16 But, we are taking the total budget, as
- 17 submitted, which was in our two-page budget, or two
- 18 volume budget document, and you are reducing it --
- 19 reducing it by what amount of money? Is it the
- 20 4,260 -- 4 million.
- MS. FINK: No, no, it is 4 million.
- 22 MR. ISLER: All right. So that is what we
- 23 are reducing it by. But I then ask you, when we voted
- 24 on this, were we voting on \$4,269,763, or less
- 25 \$3,269,783? What were we doing here?

- I assume, this is -- this paper, because we
- 2 were not clear, it is this paper, I want to make sure,
- 3 that for the public record, we are very clear on what
- 4 we are voting for, with the amendments.
- 5 MS. FINK: Okay. With the amendments --
- 6 MR. ISLER: Okay. Please let's make sure
- 7 the record adequately reflects what we are doing.
- 8 MS. FINK: We have taken \$4,269,783 out of
- 9 the budget, according to the line items, we have added
- 10 \$1 million of that money into another line item, so
- 11 now we have \$3,269,783, which will come out of these
- 12 various lines, and be put in a fund balance, where it
- 13 will remain, if it's needed.
- 14 MR. ISLER: I am confused about your last
- 15 statement. If we are cutting the budget, then we
- 16 can't take these funds here, this \$3,269,783, and put
- 17 it in a fund balance, because we are zeroing that out
- 18 of the budget; correct?
- 19 MS. FINK: No.
- MR. ISLER: Why not?
- 21 MS. FINK: This is called a reallocation.
- 22 MR. ISLER: But what I am confused about,
- 23 then, if it's a reallocation of the fund balance, the
- 24 budget page No. 35 says, "from fund balance", we are
- 25 actually reducing it, that's why I want to be clear.

- 1 Because we are reducing the fund balance \$34,050,000,
- 2 by the amount, and then coming down to \$30,780,217.
- 3 So what you just told me, is not what is
- 4 reflected on this page. So I want to be clear.
- 5 MS. FINK: Maybe I am getting my language
- 6 wrong, maybe what I want to say, is contingency. The
- 7 money isn't going to disappear.
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: Where is it going?
- 9 MS. FINK: Well, that's what I am trying to
- 10 say. Contingency or --
- MR. TAYLOR: Where is it going?
- MR. ISLER: It's not what's on this
- 13 document, Mrs. Fink, as I read it.
- 14 And I want to be clear.
- I know what's in this document. It's
- 16 clear.
- This, I want to make sure we are crystal
- 18 clear for the record, because I think it is important
- 19 for the public to know, are we taking this money out
- 20 of the budget, which this says we are doing, if I am
- 21 reading this correctly, and I think the person who
- 22 made the motion is saying that.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- MR. ISLER: You then said something else,

- 1 which is why I am asking for very clear clarification,
- 2 about what we are doing at this table, because we are
- 3 not taking this money and using it as a contingency,
- 4 we are not taking this money and adding to the fund
- 5 balance, we are zeroing this even money out of the
- 6 budget, as it stands.
- 7 Now, that's what the person who made the
- 8 motion is shaking her head to. I want to make sure,
- 9 Mrs. Fink, that's what your understanding is, too, as
- 10 the president of this Board, and this is what you are
- 11 asking us to vote on in terms of the total budget.
- Because we have voted to amend it by this
- 13 amount.
- 14 MS. FINK: Right.
- MR. ISLER: It is not staying in the
- 16 budget. Are we clear on that?
- 17 MS. FINK: Right.
- 18 MR. ISLER: Okay. It is not going into
- 19 contingency. Are we clear on that?
- 20 MS. FINK: I am not sure what the
- 21 terminology is that Theresa was using, but it's --
- MR. TAYLOR: If they want to use
- 23 \$3.4 million, for schools, he is telling you, you are
- 24 zeroing it out, and you won't have \$3 million.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.

- 1 MS. FINK: Theresa, what -- what would you
- 2 call it?
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. Listen to me. If I
- 4 am understanding you correctly, with what you are
- 5 asking, is you are asking if the number 4 million
- 6 plus, is being removed from the budget. Is that what
- 7 your question is?
- 8 MR. ISLER: Yes, that is what my question
- 9 is.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes. The 4. some --
- MR. ISLER: Totally, right? We are taking
- 12 it totally out of the budget. Well, that's what this
- 13 says.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, you are taking it out
- 15 of the budget.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- MS. HARRIS: But you are putting a million
- 18 in there.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No. You are -- you are very
- 20 correct. You are very correct. I'm sorry, I
- 21 apologize, you are very correct. You had me confused,
- 22 more than I knew what I was talking about before. The
- 23 3.2 million, is actually what the budget is being
- 24 reduced.
- MR. ISLER: Right. Totally. So in other

- 1 words, we are taking that money totally out of the
- 2 budget.
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: Right.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Because, Mrs. Fink -- I want to
- 5 make sure, Mrs. Fink, that is your understanding, this
- 6 is not going into a fund balance, this is not going
- 7 into a contingency fund, you are taking it out.
- 8 MS. FINK: What you are --
- 9 MR. ISLER: The person made the motion, and
- 10 the person who seconded, are saying that. Is that
- 11 your understanding?
- MS. FINK: I am confused, you are confusing
- 13 me here. I have some questions.
- MR. TAYLOR: You are not zeroing out, you
- 15 are putting it into the fund balance.
- MR. ISLER: No, they are not.
- 17 MR. TAYLOR: We need to hear from our
- 18 budget director.
- MR. FELLERS: Madam President, if staff
- 20 could be so presumptuous, we have worked out the
- 21 numbers that we believe are represented by the intent
- 22 of the Board, and while the solicitor said it is not
- 23 required that they be there, I can have Mr. Camarda
- 24 bring them down to you, to read, or look over, to see
- 25 if it reflects it, what your intent is.

- I think that is a safe, prudent course of
- 2 action, to make sure that you do not adopt something
- 3 erroneously, from your intention.
- 4 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 5 MR. ISLER: But, I -- Mr. Fellers in all
- 6 due respect, it does not answer the question I have
- 7 raised.
- 8 The way I read this document, and it is not
- 9 in the form of a written motion, in front of us, so I
- 10 wanted to make clear, that for the record -- for the
- 11 record, we are clear on the motion we are making,
- 12 because there is disagreement at the table, as I see
- 13 it.
- 14 As I go down here, the fund balance that is
- 15 listed for the 2002 proposed budget, is \$34 million
- 16 less the reductions of 4 million plus, plus adding in
- 17 another million, for the Board, which I hoped
- 18 everybody has heard, and then reduces the budget, the
- 19 fund balance budget by \$3,289,783. So it says,
- 20 "Revised budget."
- Now, I am going from that column, which
- 22 savs, \$30,780,000 -- \$780,217. So that's a revised
- 23 fund balance, as I read this document.
- Now, that's how I am going to interpret
- 25 this.

- 1 If my interpretation is wrong, please let
- 2 me know. Because that is clear. I would suggest that
- 3 you get this motion, and the second, in writing, so
- 4 that we, for the record, know what we are doing here.
- 5 Thank you.
- DR. THOMPSON: Madam President, may I
- 7 speak, please?
- 8 MS. FINK: Okay. Yes, Dr. Thompson.
- 9 DR. THOMPSON: I'm sorry. Madam President,
- 10 I just wanted to make sure the Board understands, that
- 11 you have arbitrarily, and capriciously, cut someone's
- 12 salary, one person's salary at 22.4 percent, and
- 13 another person's salary 7.4 percent, and that's pretty
- 14 irresponsible, and I hope you realize that that can
- 15 set us up for some day in court.
- 16 The other thing is, you have told the
- 17 superintendent that you had too much money in the
- 18 budget, the budget was too high. So, I can understand
- 19 you want to take 4 million out.
- What I can't understand, if the budget is
- 21 too high, you are willing to go out here and open
- 22 five -- four or five schools. That's kind of an
- 23 oxymoron.
- If it is too high on one end, why would you
- 25 then increase the budget, by going out and opening

- 1 other schools?
- 2 And it gets me -- I am very complexed over
- 3 that. So I just want to point that out to the Board,
- 4 especially the issue, when you are speaking about a
- 5 person's well being, at the point of 22.4 percent, to
- 6 cut somebody's salary, in that amount, and another
- 7 person, 7.4, right here at the holiday season. And I
- 8 guess they need to say, thank you, very much, to this
- 9 Board.
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: They don't even know,
- 11 Dr. Thompson, whose salary that is.
- MS. FINK: I am going to call for a ten
- 13 minute recess, so that Pete Camarda can come down
- 14 here, show us what he is doing to these numbers.
- 15 (Recess taken.)
- MS. FINK: Could we please get ready to
- 17 reconvene.
- Mr. Berdnik and Mr. Camarda have made the
- 19 changes on the sheet in front of you, that reflects
- 20 the amended budget.
- It was not our intention to lower anyone's
- 22 salary, and I feel confident, that with the salary
- 23 lines, throughout the year, we can make the
- 24 appropriate adjustments, so that there is no cut in
- 25 anyone's salary.

- 1 With that, I would like to call for a vote
- 2 on the budget as amended.
- 3 MR. MATTHEWS: Madam Chair, we have some
- 4 questions.
- 5 MS. FINK: One more round of questions,
- 6 please.
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Madam, parliamentary
- 8 procedures says that you cannot do that.
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: You cannot do that. We didn't
- 10 have a budget meeting, this is now the budget
- 11 meeting.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, again, I think when
- 13 you come back into a meeting, after a recess, and say
- 14 "it was not our intention to cut salaries," and they
- 15 were cut, shows us, and shows the public, that this is
- 16 not the way to go about, to discuss, work on, revise,
- 17 amend a School District budget, paid for by the people
- 18 in this room.
- I am appalled at the statements now being
- 20 made, because it even puts us deeper into problems.
- 21 And again, I use the word "chaos." It's
- 22 saying that we didn't know what we were voting on.
- I am still trying to determine, I mean,
- 24 what we are now seeing is, and I go back to where I --
- 25 prior to the recess, the question I asked, and there

- 1 was disagreement there, but we are actually cutting
- 2 this money out of the budget. There is no
- 3 contingency. There is no reverting into the fund
- 4 balance. This is a total reduction of the budget, by
- 5 \$4,269,783, adding another million in for the use of
- 6 the Board, undetermined what it's going to be used
- 7 for, so that we are reducing the budget by \$3,269,783.
- 8 That's what we are doing.
- 9 Are we in understanding of that? Is it for
- 10 the record, that that is what we are voting on, so
- 11 that the public, who is paying for this, thank
- 12 goodness they are not paying us salaries, that that's
- 13 what they are voting on?
- 14 That's what we must clarify, and I still
- 15 don't hear the clarification coming from the Board
- 16 president.
- We can call the question, I think the Board
- 18 president has to clarify that for me. It was unclear
- 19 whenever we recessed.
- MS. HARRIS: Explain it.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Because we did not
- 22 include a tax reduction in this, that money will go
- 23 into -- I call it a contingency. It will go into a
- 24 fund. Pete, would you care to give your opinion?
- MR. CAMARDA: The fund that was referred to

- 1 earlier tonight as being the rainy day fund, what that
- 2 will do is to add to the reserves.
- 3 You -- what it does, it eliminates the
- 4 ability if some of these predictions are wrong,
- 5 because there will be no moneys to move around within
- 6 the budget, so you removed it, and if some of the
- 7 projections are needed to be dealt with next year, we
- 8 will have to be scavenging through the budget, to
- 9 solve possibly a natural gas problem, or whatever
- 10 other problems may arise.
- 11 MR. ISLER: Then I still have the floor for
- 12 that clarification. I would then ask the president,
- 13 since, from what I am hearing, at this table tonight,
- 14 that this is a rather unusual way to adopt a budget --
- 15 and I would defer to you, because you have been on the
- 16 Board the longest.
- MS. FINK: This is an unusual way.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, very much. This is
- 19 an unusual way. That we the Board, have monthly
- 20 updates, so that we know where we stand, not based on
- 21 Mr. Camarda's report, which is in our book, which we
- 22 look at every month, but we know how these line items
- 23 are being affected, either plus or minus, because I go
- 24 back, we are not reducing money from the budget. That
- 25 is not what this intent was. This was to shift some

- 1 money out of line items, and I think, you know, that
- 2 once we sit down and take a look at this, we are going
- 3 to be pretty shocked about where that money is coming
- 4 from, including reducing salaries, which now is not
- 5 the intent, and putting this money aside.
- 6 So we need to be clear. We are not
- 7 reducing the budget. This money is still there.
- 8 There is no tax cut, there is no returning anything to
- 9 the public.
- 10 So we have done absolutely nothing, by this
- 11 motion.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Madam Chair, I would just
- 13 ask, the fact that in light of what we just heard from
- 14 my collegue, that once again we take a strong look at
- 15 this.
- You guys went out, we went out on a break,
- 17 and you of course then discovered that it cut
- 18 someone's salary, and you were unaware of that, so we
- 19 want to go ahead, and say, that, "well, we will make
- 20 up for that."
- Were you also aware of the fact, that you
- 22 cut down communication, which Mrs. Harris has always
- 23 been talking about, parent communication, but we took
- 24 the postage and the mailing money, that we use to do
- 25 that, we took it out of the budget, so now parents

- 1 won't get that magazine called Public Choice, School
- 2 Choice, they won't get that any more, so how do we
- 3 plan to communicate with our parents, the users of our
- 4 product, how do we plan to do that?
- 5 You cut down the postage, for community
- 6 engagement. I mean, how do you plan to do that then?
- 7 MS. FINK: It can be done.
- 8 MR. MATTHEWS: How? Excuse me, I have
- 9 asked a question. How do you plan to do that, if you
- 10 cut it out of the budget?
- 11 You are saying we are no longer going to
- 12 communicate with the community?
- MS. FINK: I didn't say we weren't going to
- 14 communicate.
- MR. MATTHEWS: You cut it out of the
- 16 budget.
- 17 MS. FINK: We took some money out of that
- 18 line item.
- MR. MATTHEWS: \$35,000, you reduced it by
- 20 35,000, that leaves zero. So you didn't take some
- 21 money, you took all of it. You went to the other line
- 22 item, other purchase service, 35,000, and you reduced
- 23 it by 35,000, that's zero. So that's not some money.
- So once again, I am asking you, as the
- 25 Board president, how do you intend to engage the

- 1 community, if you are taking the money out to do such
- 2 an act?
- MS. FINK: That's not what happened.
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: Well, can you explain this?
- 5 MS. FINK: Those line items, were cut by
- 6 the amount that they were increased.
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: This says here proposed
- 8 budget, 35,000, that's all that's in the budget, is
- 9 35,000. That's not a proposed increase.
- 10 Look, here, look at the budget. Look on
- 11 page 73. Look on page 73. Whichever one of you guys
- 12 submitted this, I'm not quite sure. Page 73.
- She wanted to know what line item we are
- 14 talking about.
- MR. ISLER: Last three digits.
- MS. COLAIZZI: It was budgeted for \$50,000,
- 17 in -- 330, is that what you told me?
- MR. MATTHEWS: 330.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. The actual amount
- 20 that was spent was 29,000. Okay? It was budgeted at
- 21 50,000, and I believe I removed 35,000, am I correct?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, yeah, but --
- MS. COLAIZZI: I don't have that paper in
- 24 front --
- MR. MATTHEWS: I am looking at what you

- 1 said, you said proposed budget was 35,000. So you are
- 2 saying --
- MS. COLAIZZI: 2002 revised budget.
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: Say that again.
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: The 2002 was the proposed
- 6 budget, yes.
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. Of \$35,000.
- 8 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: And you removed it, you took
- 10 35,000 out.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Can you tell me, can anybody
- 12 tell me --
- MR. TAYLOR: You tell us.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Is this your writing?
- MS. COLAIZZI: I believe this one is mine.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. Can you tell me why
- 17 you took the communication piece out?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Because I am trying to
- 19 remember what is on my notes that that was, and I want
- 20 to say, that that was probably --
- MR. TAYLOR: We got to vote on a probably?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Because I am trying to
- 23 recall it, from what I had on my notes.
- MR. MATTHEWS: So, I will wait.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay?

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: This 35,000, if you
- 2 eliminated it, it is no longer there.
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: That's right.
- That's why you have me -- it is other
- 5 professional services, it is not -- where do you get
- 6 communications?
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Because the next one is
- 8 communication, 530.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: 530.
- MR. MATTHEWS: 530.
- MS. FINK: Mr. McCrea, please, everyone,
- 12 use their microphones, our stenographer cannot hear
- 13 us.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. They were telling me
- 15 that they didn't cut the 35,000, so I am trying to
- 16 figure out, where -- the 35,000 is here in the
- 17 proposed budget cut, so I am just trying to figure
- 18 out, if it's not there, where is it, and it doesn't
- 19 make sense to me, I am just trying to figure it out.
- 20 And so if you did cut it out, under your
- 21 amendment, then how do you plan to communicate with
- 22 the community?
- MS. HARRIS: Out of our budget.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Alex, I really couldn't

- 1 answer your question up front, because I don't think
- 2 that is mine, but I will tell you that, you know, I
- 3 did my best on this and to try to make sure that we
- 4 saved this District some money. Okay?
- 5 This is not intended to hurt anyone, or
- 6 cause any problems with anyone. It is a matter of
- 7 just trying to make sure that we are able to pass this
- 8 budget, and pass it quickly. A \$4 million cut, or
- 9 3 million .2 cut, is really not a lot of money, when
- 10 you are talking \$489 million dollars.
- But it could pass this budget this evening.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Then, my only question is
- 13 exactly, I know your intent was good, which is why we
- 14 have been saying let's have a meeting, because
- 15 obviously, there is cuts in here that have been made
- 16 to this budget, that truly affect and impact how we
- 17 relate to parents, how we relate to children, impact
- 18 on the buildings.
- 19 You said you didn't want to cut buildings,
- 20 but you are actually doing that. You are cutting
- 21 items here.
- Now I can see why you had the million
- 23 dollars increase in professional services under our
- 24 contract, because we are going to get sued, because
- 25 you are going to need all of that money to deal with

- 1 all of these legal issues that we are going to have to
- 2 deal with.
- 3 All I am asking, Mrs. Fink, is that under
- 4 your proposal, or whose ever proposal that is, because
- 5 it is not Mrs. Colaizzi's --
- 6 MS. FINK: Mr. Matthews, if we have made
- 7 any errors that impede the operation of this District,
- 8 we will use the other professional services money we
- 9 have in our budget, to make sure that we have all of
- 10 the ongoing communication that we need.
- MR. MATTHEWS: No, no, no, no.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Taylor.
- MR. MATTHEWS: I was not finished talking,
- 14 all you did was interrupt me.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- MR. MATTHEWS: And all I am saying, is if
- 17 it is this item, how many more items are there, that
- 18 you are going to have to try to restore.
- 19 You know, once again, this goes to show
- 20 that we are not thinking clearly, when we put this
- 21 budget, this amendment together, we are not thinking
- 22 clearly on the effects it is going to have or this
- 23 District.
- We cut items, and then say -- I mean, how
- 25 would you like it in your household, "We are going to

- 1 cut all these items out, I am not going to get a car,
- 2 I am not going to get this; oh, later on I am going to
- 3 need a car, " so they put it back in.
- 4 You can't do that with a budget. You are
- 5 dealing with people's lives, you are cutting people's
- 6 positions, like Dr. Thompson said, is this a way to
- 7 say happy holiday to them?
- MS. FINK: I said, we didn't mean to cut
- 9 anyone's salary.
- 10 MR. MATTHEWS: Right. And I truly believe
- 11 that, and which is why I am saying to you, please take
- 12 this off the table, because there is other cuts in
- 13 here, that you are going to say to us, "We truly
- 14 didn't mean to do that," but it's going to be too
- 15 late, so all I am asking you to do, is to take this
- 16 off, take this amendment off the table, take it off,
- 17 and then let's work on some issues.
- 18 If you have a problem in communication,
- 19 let's talk to Dr. Thompson about it, let's have a
- 20 budget meeting, let's say, "Look, why don't we take
- 21 this thing, we don't need that much money, we don't
- 22 want to do all of that," we can do that if it's held
- 23 in a public meeting, where we can discuss these items,
- 24 not brought before us today, when people who submitted
- 25 it don't even know why they submitted it.

- MS. FINK: Mr. Taylor had a question, and
- 3 then Mrs. Harris.
- 4 MS. HARRIS: I want to call for the
- 5 question.
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: No. And I want to say, I
- 7 don't believe anybody here, from what we are saying,
- 8 are saying that we have some sociopaths around the
- 9 table, who are trying to destroy the system and,
- 10 Mrs. Colaizzi, we don't believe you are trying to
- 11 destroy, we think you are very wrong on this, that you
- 12 are making -- I am not qualified to make up a budget
- 13 here, there is not only, as Mr. Matthews mentioned on
- 14 communications, there is \$362,000 taken from
- 15 communications.
- And again, we talk to the same person, they
- 17 believe you just defunded parent school community
- 18 councils in this district, that you just defunded ways
- 19 for parents to get involved, and to send mailings to
- 20 parents; that you just basically killed parental
- 21 involvement in this District, which many of us think
- 22 is a very important component to this system.
- So we are not saying that you are out here,
- 24 that you are some evil person trying to do it, we are
- 25 trying to say, that you are wrong here, that you are

- 1 making -- you are about to pass a budget that you
- 2 don't know what it means, because I don't know what it
- 3 means, and the staff, there is no way that we can know
- 4 what it means.
- We had a meeting, around the housewives
- 6 special again last year, where we had the staff come
- 7 and tell us, "These are what the cuts mean," and we
- 8 know many of those cuts were pretty bad, and what the
- 9 implications of then would be.
- 10 So we are saying, this is exactly what's
- 11 going on here, if you pass this, it is the most
- 12 irresponsible thing you can possibly do, as a new
- 13 Board member.
- And I walked in as a new Board member, and
- 15 the first budget I had to vote on, called for
- 16 300 people to be laid off. That wasn't easy, but I
- 17 certainly came, and I tried to listen, and I tried to
- 18 learn.
- 19 You are just walking in the door, you have
- 20 to at least talk to the staff. Whoever did this
- 21 budget for you, cannot know what the cuts mean. You
- 22 have to sit down with the facilities, and the
- 23 operations, and others, with a full Board, not just
- 24 some Board members, and ask them what this cut would
- 25 mean.

- 1 And as Mr. Matthews said, pass the
- 2 superintendent's budget, and then we start fighting,
- 3 and move line items around.
- They know what every budget item means on
- 5 here. This, we don't know what it means.
- 6 You can't gamble with these children's
- 7 lives, and that's what you are doing here, you are
- 8 gambling with these children's lives but, in fact, you
- 9 are gambling with the future of this School District.
- 10 Don't do that. There is no reason to take
- 11 that gamble tonight.
- 12 Sometimes in life you have to take a
- 13 gamble. There is no reason for us to take this gamble
- 14 here tonight.
- So we are saying, support the
- 16 superintendent's budget, let's come back in January,
- 17 and you have the votes to tear this up, and to move
- 18 line items, and move -- anything you want to do, you
- 19 have the votes to do.
- But to pass this tonight, is reckless and,
- 21 Miss Colaizzi, I have seen some reckless behavior from
- 22 Board members, that I have served in the past, I hope
- 23 that you are not adding your name, Mr. McCrea is not
- 24 adding your names to that list, but do the right thing
- 25 here, and just again pass the budget, and you can tear

- 1 it apart next January, because you have the votes to
- 2 do that.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: I have a question.
- 4 MS. FINK: Excuse me, I said Mrs. Harris
- 5 was next.
- 6 MS. HARRIS: I called for the question.
- 7 MR. BRENTLEY: But I have a question.
- 8 MS. HARRIS: This is just going on and on
- 9 and on, call for the question.
- 10 MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley, if I may
- 11 interrupt you for one minute, if they want to cut off
- 12 Board members' discussion, then allow them to do it,
- 13 because obviously they did it at one time before, they
- 14 want to silence us, they want to silence us again.
- I have a tremendous number of questions
- 16 about this, more now than I had before the recess,
- 17 because of things that have just been said at this
- 18 table.
- So I have a lot more questions, and I am
- 20 speaking out of line, I will admit it, but I think
- 21 it's folly, Mr. Brentley, for us to try to talk, ask
- 22 questions, get information, that can be fed back out
- 23 to the public, about this, because obviously, what
- 24 they want to do is cut off the discussion, of anybody
- 25 who dissents with them. They did it once, let them

- 1 for the public, do it again.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I have one question,
- 3 that I have to ask, and I'm sorry.
- Dr. Thompson -- thank you, Mr. Isler --
- 5 excuse me, with what you have seen so far, with this
- 6 amended budget, can you tell me how it will affect
- 7 other staff members, or will it effect? Will we have
- 8 custodians out there working very hard, will it effect
- 9 them, and the management of our buildings, how will it
- 10 affect our unions, and contracts, our agreements we
- 11 have with some unions?
- Do you know, or -- and I don't mean to put
- 13 you on the spot, it was just thrown in our face, just
- 14 like it was yours, but --
- DR. THOMPSON: Mr. Brentley, I really
- 16 applaud you for thinking about the adults in our
- 17 School District, but my job is to think about
- 18 children, we have an item on here, that is going to
- 19 cut \$150,000 out of our assessment, 150,000 --
- 20 \$200,000 out of our testing program, and another
- 21 \$150,000 a year, is going to cut out the possibility
- 22 to score those tests, that is \$350,000.
- Now, you talk about adults all you want to,
- 24 I am thinking about these children, and I, in my
- 25 agenda for action and, you know, in my evaluation

- 1 process, I says, 60 percent of my evaluation will be
- 2 based on the assessment of kids.
- Now, you have just in here, and cut out
- 4 \$350,000, that would give you valid information, doing
- 5 it by fact, no guesswork, now how are you going to
- 6 determine how our kids are progressing? How are you
- 7 going to determine they are receiving a world class
- 8 education? Yeah, okay, adults, it's going to affect
- 9 them, too, I am talking about the children. See, you
- 10 guys don't understand, we are talking about children
- 11 here.
- MS. FINK: I understand.
- DR. THOMPSON: We are talking about the
- 14 lives of young people.
- When you come and cut that kind of money
- 16 out of a budget, without looking at -- now, you know
- 17 what you need to do is stop it right now, go through
- 18 this thing line by line, and tell everybody what's
- 19 going to happen.
- Because we are doing this quickly. And if
- 21 you made a mistake, say you made it. You know what,
- 22 it's time -- kids would tell you, my advisory council
- 23 would tell me, "Mr. Thompson, it is time for you all
- 24 to fess up."
- It is time, for this Board, if you made

- 1 some mistakes, you are looking at a disaster here
- 2 waiting to happen.
- 3 So I agree with Mr. Brentley, I agree with
- 4 Mr. Taylor, Mr. Isler, you guys, listen, please, for
- 5 the kids. For the kids, now.
- I don't want to hear about the adults,
- 7 what's going to happen to my adults. Let's talk about
- 8 the children.
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: I just have another one.
- MS. FINK: Alex, we have an opportunity,
- 11 someone has called for the question. I let
- 12 Mr. Brentley, and Dr. Thompson answer, and I would
- 13 really like to proceed with the vote, for the call of
- 14 the question.
- MR. ISLER: They are cutting off
- 16 discussion.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- MR. MATTHEWS: But you have to have a
- 19 second.
- MS. FINK: Do I have a second?
- Okay, we have a second.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Who Seconded it.
- 23 MS. FINK: Mr. McCrea seconded it.
- MR. MATTHEWS: To cut off discussion?
- MS. COLAIZZI: No -- yes. Yes.

- 1 MR. ISLER: You are not allowed to discuss
- 2 this any more.
- 3 So the public is not allowed to know
- 4 anything else about this right now.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: It is their money.
- A VOICE: We don't know anything now.
- 7 DR. THOMPSON: Miss Fink? Miss Fink,
- 8 please, I am sorry to keep interrupting, but I just
- 9 found out, again, we are subject to lose \$2 million
- 10 from the foundations, because the \$2 million to help
- 11 us fund our Literacy Plus Program, and this money is
- 12 not there, we could lose that money, the \$2 million in
- 13 our foundation.
- 14 These things are just -- I mean, these are
- 15 just popping out at us, as we are sitting here trying
- 16 to go through their thing.
- 17 Okay, I am through.
- 18 And to the citizens of Pittsburgh, I
- 19 apologize to you, and when we can't deliver some of
- 20 these things
- 21 MR. ISLER: Dr. Thompson, I would like to
- 22 apologize to the staff of this District, that work
- 23 hard every day, dealing with the children of this
- 24 District, they -- you may -- I agree with you on the
- 25 children, it is tough for me to look around this room,

- 1 with the people that work in this District, what we
- 2 are doing with them.
- 3 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- 4 MR. ISLER: No, Mrs. Fink, cut us off.
- 5 MS. FINK: I am trying to.
- 6 MR. ISLER: I am sitting here, I am not
- 7 getting up and walking out, like other Board members
- 8 have. But I want it on the record, you are cutting
- 9 off Board discussion, of one of the most important
- 10 things this Board does, in an annual budget, and we
- 11 are doing it in the dark, and it is chaotic, and you
- 12 are once again, I am going to say it, you are throwing
- 13 this District in chaos.
- 14 A VOICE: The public would like to know.
- MR. BRENTLEY: You know, I have one last
- 16 question.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Brentley, roll call please.
- MR. BRENTLEY: One last question.
- You know, we have yet to find out, and
- 20 Alex, you asked the question about No. 125 --
- MS. FINK: Mr. Brentley, please.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Can we at least go down the
- 23 list, Madam President?
- MS. FINK: We have a motion, sir.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Can we identify who

- 1 submitted what?
- We don't know who submitted --
- 3 MS. FINK: Roll call.
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: Let's try to respect the
- 5 Board, they don't respect the Board.
- 6 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Taylor.
- 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is a roll call, on
- 8 the budget as amended.
- 9 MS. HARRIS: No, sir.
- 10 MR. ISLER: No, sir, it is on the question.
- 11 We are voting on the question, to limit the discussion
- 12 of the Board members.
- MR. BRENTLEY: What is this?
- MS. FINK: Mr. Brentley. Please.
- 15 MR. BRENTLEY: Clarification.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Excuse me, as clarified by
- 17 Mr. Isler, this is correct, this is a vote on the
- 18 calling of the question.
- Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: No.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 23 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?

- 1 MR. ISLER: No.
- 2 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- 3 MR. MATTHEWS: I will be voting no, on this
- 4 item, on the motion to limit discussion, because as
- 5 the Board president, I have always encouraged Board
- 6 members to stop trying to cut off discussion from
- 7 other Board members, because the public needs to know
- 8 what all this stuff is about, and that's why I am
- 9 voting no.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: No.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- 17 MS. FINK: Yes.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: The question has been
- 19 called, the matter before the Board now is the budget,
- 20 as amended, and reflected in the numbers as presented
- 21 by Mr. Camarda on the break.
- Mr. Brentley?
- 23 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I'm sorry,
- 24 clarification, now what are we voting on?
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: On the amended budget.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: Voting on the budget.
- MS. FINK: The budget as amended.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: No.
- 4 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- 7 MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 8 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 9 MR. ISLER: No.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- 11 MR. MATTHEWS: I will be voting no, because
- 12 this budget is irresponsible, and hurts kids, and we
- 13 just heard from the superintendent and from the staff,
- 14 that indicated the fact that many of our kids may not
- 15 be able to get tested, and then go on to college,
- 16 because they won't have the grades, and the criteria,
- 17 I think it is irresponsible for the Board members to
- 18 vote for this budget, and those who want to vote for
- 19 it, are going to be held responsible for the
- 20 education.
- 21 And remember, I have nieces and nephews
- 22 still in school, my oldest son has graduated, and I
- 23 have nieces and nephews in school, and I am going to
- 24 hold each and every one of you accountable, because my
- 25 son and daughter cannot complete the education, the

- 1 best way that they can, under the original budget, so
- 2 I am voting no.
- 3 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 4 MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 5 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: I sit here tonight, because
- 7 what the Pittsburgh Public Schools provided for me
- 8 education wise, and I feel you are potentially taking
- 9 that same opportunity away from other students.
- 10 I will not vote for a budget, prepared by a
- 11 Board member, Theresa Colaizzi, who has been on the
- 12 Board for two weeks, I simply cannot vote for her
- 13 budget. No.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 18 A VOICE: Same, shame, shame, shame.
- 19 A VOICE: Sue, sue, sue.
- 20 A VOICE: Shame, Madam President.
- MS. FINK: We are -- we will now finish
- 22 with the tax levies, and then we will go back to the
- 23 beginning of the book.
- 24 (Mrs. Fink read from prepared material.)
- MS. FINK: Are there any questions?

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: I have a question.
- Did Board members, who voted for that, for
- 3 the budget, did you also look for ways to get more
- 4 money? I don't think we should be doing this, I don't
- 5 think we should pass -- we should ask the taxpayers to
- 6 pay for the irresponsible budget, and so as you
- 7 prepare the budget, to cut things, did you prepare a
- 8 budget that would also add revenue to this budget?
- 9 MS. FINK: Do we have any other comments?
- 10 MR. MATTHEWS: I am asking you guys a
- 11 question. Unless you don't -- is there no answer,
- 12 or -- you did not come up with a way to increase
- 13 funding?
- MS. FINK: Not yet.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, but not yet, but you
- 16 went ahead and did the expense cuts, and I don't
- 17 understand that
- 18 MS. HARRIS: We have been working on it all
- 19 year.

- 3 Are there any comments, or questions on any
- 4 of these items?
- 5 Mr. Isler.
- 6 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, as we were handed
- 7 this into our books this evening, I just want to read
- 8 this, to make sure I understand it, and then ask a
- 9 question that I asked you last week.
- 10 It has to do with No. 5, school reopenings
- 11 and closings, "RESOLVED, That the Pittsburgh School
- 12 District will reopen Bon Air, Spring Garden and
- 13 McKelvy Elementary Schools and Arlington Middle School
- 14 in September of 2002 and that these schools will have
- 15 the same feeder patterns that they had in the 2000 to
- 16 2001 school year."
- 17 A VOICE: Resegregation.
- 18 MR. ISLER: "ALSO FURTHER RESOLVED, that we
- 19 remove McCleary and South Vo-Tech High School from the
- 20 2002 school closing list."
- 21 As I asked you for additional information
- 22 this evening, Madam President, on the budget, which I
- 23 did not receive, I also asked you last week for the
- 24 criteria that was to be submitted, as to why these
- 25 schools were being reopened.

- 1 Criteria was submitted last year, Board
- 2 members might not have agreed with it, but it was
- 3 submitted to the Board, and I am wondering, Madam
- 4 President, if we have for the public record, the
- 5 criteria used for -- because there is an addition of a
- 6 school tonight, McKelvy, which was not in the book
- 7 that was sent to us, why these schools are being
- 8 reopened.
- 9 Thank you.
- MS. FINK: There had -- we had asked last
- 11 year, when the whole discussion came up about school
- 12 closings, that we sit and talk, and meet, and instead
- 13 of brain storming about how to handle excess capacity,
- 14 these schools were chosen.
- 15 Everyone's input was certainly not given,
- 16 or welcomed. We tried to build a case then, not to do
- 17 this, cited the concerns of the community, and every
- 18 one of these communities had their own specific, and
- 19 definite criteria, that they felt should have been
- 20 used to keep their schools open.
- I have talked to people in the community, I
- 22 have bent over backwards to try and get as much
- 23 information as I could, as to why these schools should
- 24 reopen.
- I have gotten more from some neighborhoods,

- 1 than others.
- 2 But the feeling seems to be there, that
- 3 these schools really do need to be reopened.
- In a couple of instances, McKelvy and
- 5 Arlington, specifically, there are plans to build a
- 6 considerable number of new residential housing in
- 7 their feeder patterns. I think if we are going to
- 8 draw young families in, it is incumbent on us to have
- 9 schools in those areas, for people. To make the
- 10 communities attractive, for people to buy these homes.
- 11 So therefore, these schools are on this
- 12 list, I am requesting that we seriously look at this,
- 13 as a way to attract and hold people in the City of
- 14 Pittsburgh, and make our city living a very attractive
- 15 commodity to young families, and that's why they are
- 16 there.
- 17 MR. ISLER: Okay. I assume I still have
- 18 the floor, and I thank you for that answer, for the
- 19 public record. But again, there is no specific
- 20 criteria, that was developed.
- 21 You had mentioned last year about meeting
- 22 and talking about this. This again, was given to the
- 23 Board last week in a resolution, another school was
- 24 added this week, again for the first time, I am seeing
- 25 that this evening. I don't know if you did fax it, I

- 1 was not in the city today, so you may very well have
- 2 faxed it.
- 3 I will give you the benefit of the doubt,
- 4 Mrs. President, that you did fax to the Board members,
- 5 that you are adding another school. But I saw it for
- 6 the first time this evening.
- 7 I would like to ask Mr. Fellers a question,
- 8 at this time.
- 9 In reopening these schools, and now with
- 10 the addition of McKelvy, because we have not as a
- 11 Board discussed this, we have not asked the staff, for
- 12 the fiscal note attached, we do understand, it is
- 13 somewhere in the neighborhood of 1.6 to 1.7 million
- 14 dollars.
- I agree with Mrs. Fink, wholeheartedly, we
- 16 should be trying to recruit new families into the City
- 17 of Pittsburgh, but yet be ever mindful of the
- 18 overwhelming majority of the taxpayers, who do not
- 19 send children to the Pittsburgh Public Schools, but
- 20 pay taxes, and should be fiscally responsible to them,
- 21 and that there were studies done, again we might not
- 22 have liked them, by outside people, including the
- 23 Economy League and the Murrin Commission, that talked
- 24 about the excess capacity in this District.
- 25 My specific question to Mr. Fellers, given

- 1 all the information we have in this District, about
- 2 excess capacity, given the work that you and your
- 3 staff did last year, when we start talking about the
- 4 opening of these schools, not oven fiscally, but what
- 5 is going to be the impact upon the District? Do you
- 6 have any idea as of this time?
- 7 MR. FELLERS: Obviously, we need to analyze
- 8 the actions of the Board in more depth, but clearly
- 9 this is going to add long-term costs, that will
- 10 approximate, over ten years, in the neighborhood of 35
- 11 to 40 million dollars, in terms of cost, cumulative
- 12 cost to the district.
- 13 Clearly, we still have capacity in this
- 14 District for approximately 52,000 students, and as you
- 15 know, our enrollment is at the 37-6 range.
- 16 It is a challenge that the superintendent
- 17 has proposed that we address the alignment plan, that
- 18 still seems to me to be a valid vehicle, but it is a
- 19 process that we need to go through.
- I think I should further point out, though,
- 21 that I am perplexed to see that the education agenda
- 22 includes four schools, because the budget that was
- 23 adopted, included the opening of three schools, it did
- 24 not include McKelvy, which has increased the cost
- 25 beyond the \$1.7 million, by another 475,000.

- 1 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Fellers, for
- 2 that bit of information.
- 3 Again, Mrs. Fink, I have to say, in all due
- 4 respect to this community, to the taxpayers, to
- 5 everybody that is involved in this system, and to this
- 6 Board, this is not being done with the amount of
- 7 discussion, and input, and rational thinking that
- 8 should go into operating a School District.
- 9 I again think that we are creating chaos,
- 10 and I am appalled to be a part of this this evening.
- This is the second item that has come
- 12 before, that is entailing money, that we do not know
- 13 the total cost or the impact for.
- 14 And as Mr. Fellers just said, in adding a
- 15 new school, which again I am assuming most people just
- 16 saw this evening, that fiscal note, that fiscal
- 17 implication, to the budget has not been thought out.
- DR. THOMPSON: Madam chairman, I just
- 19 wanted to put out something to the Board, please, if
- 20 you don't mind.
- 21 Earlier, Madam President, you made a
- 22 comment, that if we come short on any funds, in any
- 23 kind of student capacity, if we need money for student
- 24 services, that it would come from the 100 thousand --
- 25 I'm sorry, from the \$1 million that you put in your

- 1 other budget. I want to let you know, that total is
- 2 running up now, you just lost \$350,000, Mr. Fellers
- 3 just gave you another 475 -- 25 thousand so you are up
- 4 to about 700 and 75 thousand dollars.
- I want to warn the Board, anything else
- 6 that comes up, you would not have enough money,
- 7 because you only have a million dollars to use, in
- 8 funding those additional things.
- 9 So I just want to caution you, as we move
- 10 forward.
- 11 Thank you, very much.
- 12 MS. FINK: Thank you for pointing that out,
- 13 Dr. Thompson.
- 14 Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes. I assume, and I really
- 16 wanted to touch on that question of Mr. Isler, about
- 17 not receiving the criteria, he did request that from
- 18 you a few weeks ago, and also would like to, because
- 19 now it appears we should go to you, to ask questions
- 20 about things, I would like Mrs. Colaizzi to report
- 21 back to the Board, how we are going to pay for McKelvy
- 22 and I would like to get an idea when we are going to
- 23 get that report back on McKelvy, so we can pay for it.
- 24 MS. COLAIZZI: Why would I give you that
- 25 report?

- MR. TAYLOR: For the same reason you just
- 2 prepared a budget.
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: I figured you are our now
- 5 budget director, because remember, we don't have
- 6 confidence in the staff, so we need to know that, but
- 7 not only how it is going to be paid for this year,
- 8 Dr. Thompson alluded you are going to use the million
- 9 dollars out of the School Board budget, I need to also
- 10 know how it is going to be paid for next year also.
- 11 My other questions, are again about the
- 12 school closings, I think we need to continue to talk
- 13 about equity in this District, as a principle, and I
- 14 am pretty sure we have Board members that do believe
- 15 in equity, and not one school district should receive
- 16 more than others.
- So I do need to get an idea, on who the
- 18 person is in charge of the facilities, because I want
- 19 to put in my request for Homewood to have a 103 member
- 20 school, for Lincoln/Larrimer to have a 120 member
- 21 school, for the East Liberty area, to have a
- 22 170 member school, and so I don't know what Board
- 23 member is responsible for that, but can I put in my
- 24 request to whoever Board member is now responsible for
- 25 facilities, because again, we do believe in equity

- 1 around this table, as everyone just agreed.
- So, again, the city, we have to understand,
- 3 you know, for the public, that the city is limited in
- 4 its taxing opportunities, and we know that. That the
- 5 city does not have a big industry, or something, a new
- 6 growth industry for this city.
- We do recognize that and, currently, in the
- 8 year 2001, going to 2002, we are limited in our taxing
- 9 opportunities.
- 10 And I believe, right now, that the District
- 11 only has three options on which to deal with whether
- 12 it is inflation, whether it is unforeseen costs,
- 13 whether it is just salaries rising, the District, I
- 14 believe, is limited to three areas, and that's again,
- 15 job cuts, and I think that we are kind of pretty much
- 16 at the max. as far as job cuts.
- 17 You may want to target a few individuals,
- 18 which we know, again as I alluded to earlier in my
- 19 first budget, we cut 300 people, we know that that is
- 20 the kind of amount of jobs you have to cut, to raise
- 21 five and six and seven million dollars.
- 22 So that is one cut, which I haven't heard
- 23 any Board member propose, in any of the years I have
- 24 been here.
- Or you cut educational programs and

- 1 opportunities, and that's again increasing class
- 2 sizes, limiting the amount of languages we may -- that
- 3 we may offer, limiting the amount of school to career,
- 4 we will offer plumbing, we won't offer electrician,
- 5 and/or and the final thing is, is to raise taxes.
- And the only opportunity we have to avoid
- 7 those three scenarios, that we have within your power,
- 8 are to close the excess space.
- 9 It is the only other way. If you show me
- 10 another one -- and again, I am waiting for this
- 11 \$47 million, that people said is sitting out there,
- 12 that the staff is sitting on, in some drawer
- 13 somewhere, I am waiting to see that \$47 million, you
- 14 owe the public that. You owe the public to show them
- 15 where the 47 million dollars is.
- 16 And so, since we don't -- this resolution
- 17 here, is effectively taking school closings away from
- 18 Pittsburgh, in the future. Because you can't go to
- 19 anybody else's community, because again equity is a
- 20 principle, we all believe in, I understand.
- 21 And so, I don't know where we go to from
- 22 here.
- 23 We can't tax the public any more. We have
- 24 many, many seniors in this city, on a fixed income, we
- 25 cannot tax the public any more.

- Can we do the job layoffs? Absolutely not.
- 2 We know, a few years, when we cut off the janitors, we
- 3 know the janitors were very upset, because their
- 4 workload increased a lot, all of us know that.
- 5 So we know the only place we can go, to
- 6 deal with the rise in cost -- you have a teacher
- 7 contract at the end of next year, health costs may go,
- 8 I know we locked that in, but maybe two years from
- 9 now, health costs may go up, or any unforeseen
- 10 problem.
- The only place that you can cut, is
- 12 education programs. And that's just what we are
- 13 heading to, and I believe that.
- And, Mrs. Fink, you told me, and I think
- 15 Mrs. Wood also told me, "Randall, you are being
- 16 dramatic, you are wrong, we couldn't turn out like
- 17 Philadelphia, and Wilkinsburg, and Duquesne."
- I said, "We can."
- So if I am wrong, then all we have done is
- 20 deprive Bon Air some schools, but if you are wrong --
- 21 A VOICE: Madam President, can the public
- 22 address this issue, since it is affecting the public?
- MS. FINK: No, sir.
- Mr. Matthews.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.

- 1 You know, I have once again, voiced my
- 2 opinion in terms of looking at reopening these
- 3 schools.
- I just think it is an irrational move on
- 5 the Board members.
- We have talked about the fact that it won't
- 7 increase the budget, and you are going to take it out
- 8 of contingency, but the costs to reopen these schools
- 9 are going to be ongoing, and you can't continue to
- 10 reach into a fund, and then when that fund runs dry,
- 11 like it has, and before, which we had the deficit, a
- 12 huge deficit, then what do we do? What do we tell the
- 13 public, we are going to pay, so that certain
- 14 communities can have these small schools, that we say
- 15 are successful, that we say should be the national
- 16 norm, and when we know that throughout the country,
- 17 you know, while we look at small class sizes, I think
- 18 that's one issue. But schools of 150, I mean, and are
- 19 not even 150, schools of 102, 125, just are not cost
- 20 effective.
- 21 And as public officials, we have the
- 22 responsibility to the community to make sure that we
- 23 are being fiscally responsible with the money, and
- 24 here tonight, we have seen this Board is not being
- 25 fiscally responsible, because we are making cuts, we

- 1 don't know what we are cutting, and they are going to
- 2 add, you are saying cut expenses, but then you say on
- 3 the other hand, to add expenses.
- 4 So you know, it is really confusing do what
- 5 the taxpayers are really paying for. So we are paying
- 6 so that you can keep your school.
- Now, we heard from the community, who also
- 8 said the community members said that they wanted
- 9 Spring Garden turned into a community center. So how
- 10 come that is not on, why not do something for the
- 11 community, if we are saying we are doing things for
- 12 the community, on their behalf.
- What about Gladstone, what about some of
- 14 the other schools we have moved, how come those aren't
- 15 on here?
- You know darn well, that we have had a huge
- 17 outcry, from the Gladstone community, a couple -- no,
- 18 not recently -- because this move to close Gladstone,
- 19 and that occurred in the last redistricting plan,
- 20 that's when that move was made.
- 21 You know we had a lot of opposition on
- 22 closing that school. So there was support, after
- 23 support, after support, to open that school, and you
- 24 heard support yesterday, Mrs. Fink, but once again, we
- 25 are only catering to certain communities.

- 1 So all I am asking is, that if you are
- 2 going to be irresponsible, and open up those schools,
- 3 be irresponsible, and open up all of the schools, open
- 4 them all up.
- 5 Throw the budget way out of whack.
- 6 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- 7 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I just, to go a
- 8 little bit further, because I can't -- the domino
- 9 effect of all of this, is just stunning to me, and
- 10 again, I think we are shooting in the dark, and I
- 11 don't like being a part of that, given the fact that
- 12 we are responsible to the public, and we should know
- 13 exactly what we are doing, and should be informing
- 14 them exactly what we are doing.
- But again, we have a series of reports, and
- 16 we reached out to the larger community, and we have
- 17 gotten input, everybody is in agreement, we would all
- 18 love to have a small school, but I think what every
- 19 report said is, there is something we can only afford
- 20 in this District, so we are really moving backwards,
- 21 number one.
- 22 Number two, we are putting, and I echo
- 23 those comments, we are putting this District in fiscal
- 24 peril. There is no doubt about it.
- 25 And I have to follow up, I mean, I am not

- 1 satisfied, Mr. Fellers, with your answer. My
- 2 understanding is that McKelvy is a Gifted Center.
- 3 MR. FELLERS: Gifted and middle.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: Where is it going? Where is
- 6 the Gifted Center?
- 7 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 8 Mr. Taylor, that's the question I want to
- 9 ask. Where now is this going to go, and how much is
- 10 that going to cost in addition, because we are taking
- 11 something that we built for something, totally
- 12 dismantling it, and moving it -- I am not sure where
- 13 we are moving it. I mean, did I miss that? Did I
- 14 miss that? Okay. Okay. Thank you.
- So there is some more questions, Madam
- 16 President, that I think the Board members deserve to
- 17 hear, and that the public deserves to hear, what are
- 18 you going to do, in terms of McKelvy.
- I am very confused. And what is that total
- 20 cost going to be. I think it's only fair.
- MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Fellers, if you are going
- 22 to answer that, could you also add, because we did
- 23 work on McKelvy, money was spent, that obviously now
- 24 was wasted money. Do you have anything off of the top
- 25 of your head? Because I know these are shooting at

- 1 you, because we didn't know this was going to occur,
- 2 about how much money we have lost, to now reversing
- 3 back what was done last year?
- 4 MR. FELLERS: I started staff this morning,
- 5 in looking into the options. No, I do not have any
- 6 cost figures for you, and we don't have any options
- 7 for you.
- 8 What we do know, is that the site where the
- 9 elementary program was, Ridge Avenue is occupied by
- 10 the sixth grade Columbus program, and that the site
- 11 for the middle school program, which was at Greenway,
- 12 is now occupied by the former West Liberty Classical
- 13 Academy, now called the Pittsburgh Classical Academy,
- 14 so we do not have any options in terms of those
- 15 locations.
- 16 Without options, we can't come up with cost
- 17 estimates, or time lines. So that staff will have to
- 18 be working on that, and bringing recommendations
- 19 forward, in terms of what the options might be.
- 20 MR. TAYLOR: I think, Mr. Fellers, the
- 21 staff maybe should probably just wait and see what the
- 22 Board is going to give you to do, because I probably
- 23 should have directed that question to the Board
- 24 members who are implementing this, what plan do you
- 25 have, for the Gifted Academy, that is -- where is it

- 1 going?
- 2 MR. ISLER: But more so -- excuse me, let
- 3 me jump in -- what is the fiscal note, that is
- 4 attached to this.
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: Yeah, I mean, I am sure they
- 6 will get back to us.
- 7 MR. ISLER: Which again, we don't have in
- 8 front of us, we now don't have an accurate fiscal
- 9 note, we are making another important vote on behalf
- 10 of the public, and we do not have the information
- 11 before us, that we need to make a rational vote.
- MR. TAYLOR: No question about it, and also
- 13 I think when the parents read in the morning, who send
- 14 their children to the Gifted Center, I think that's
- 15 half way respectful, to let them know where their
- 16 children are going to be going to school next year, so
- 17 they can make the appropriate arrangements.
- I mean, I think that's only fair to the
- 19 public, isn't it?
- DR. THOMPSON: Excuse me, Madam Chair, to
- 21 respond to those questions, I need to let you know,
- 22 our tab now, to open those schools, we need two labs
- 23 per school, runs to \$700,000, that puts us over
- 24 \$525,000, over that million dollars, that you are
- 25 going to give us back, to implement these schools.

- Also, I need to remind you, not only are we
- 2 going to have those schools still the small sizes, but
- 3 the schools that they are leaving from, will become
- 4 small schools as well, so we have additional small
- 5 schools now in our District, that still fall below
- 6 that magic number.
- 7 So I wanted you to know, that the million
- 8 dollars has now been used up, we are at a \$525,000
- 9 price tag, that we have to find the money to do all of
- 10 the things we talked about, from the just proposed
- 11 budget that you made.
- 12 Thank you.
- MS. FINK: There are a couple other items
- 14 in this area, that we need to discuss.
- 15 Item No. 4, on page 6, was there -- that
- 16 was pulled? Okay.
- MR. ISLER: My understanding, it was
- 18 pulled. Is there a change in that now?
- MS. FINK: No, that's what I am asking. Is
- 20 that pulled? Fine.
- MS. HARRIS: The staff didn't pull it yet.
- 22 It's in our book, so they have to pull it on the
- 23 floor.
- MS. FINK: All right.
- MS. HARRIS: Are they pulling it, or are

- 1 we?
- MS. FINK: Well, that's what I am asking.
- DR. BUTTERFIELD: That's the recruiter for
- 4 CCAC.
- DR. THOMPSON: I am informed, item No. 4
- 6 has been pulled, Madam Chairman, that is the recruiter
- 7 for CCAC, for the minority scholarship with CCAC, and
- 8 County of Allegheny, where minority citizens will be
- 9 allowed there free, and we failed to give you enough
- 10 information on it, that has been pulled.
- 11 MS. FINK: Thank you.
- 12 If you will look at item No. 6, on page 7,
- 13 the numbers here are 75 on item a., zero on b., five
- 14 on c., and two on d.
- 15 Are there any other questions, under
- 16 student performance?
- 17 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- I just have a question, concerning the
- 19 reopening of schools, and can someone please explain
- 20 to me, is there a reason why we did not include
- 21 Gladstone?
- 22 MS. FINK: Yeah. That is an old vote, that
- 23 has been something that has been discussed for a long
- 24 time, and now right now these are the schools that are
- 25 included, in tonight's resolution. I am sure we will

- 1 have more discussion later.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I just have a question,
- 3 Dr. Thompson, and Dr. Briscoe, can you just give me an
- 4 overview of the program that is presently in McKelvy,
- 5 how -- I mean, have they adjusted, how is it going?
- 6 DR. THOMPSON: Very well, and I will let
- 7 Dr. Butterfield, and some execs to come up and answer
- 8 that question for you.
- DR. BRISCOE: The program has been very
- 10 well received at McKelvy, it has been received by the
- 11 community also. It is an excellent program.
- 12 A lot of money was spent to renovate the
- 13 building, from top to bottom, much money, and at this
- 14 time the children love the center, and the teachers
- 15 have adjusted to the center. I will yield to
- 16 Mrs. Reed.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Let me just one question,
- 18 Dr. Briscoe, please?
- 19 The students, that normally attended
- 20 McKelvy, for the most part, have been transferred
- 21 through the other schools in the Hill District, and
- 22 for the most part -- and I am aware of a few concerns
- 23 at last night's meeting, some little glitch that we
- 24 have to take care of, but as a whole, what is your
- 25 impression on the adjustment of the community?

- DR. BRISCOE: The Children predominantly
- 2 went to --- the majority of the children went to Weil
- 3 Elementary, they have adjusted well.
- 4 The balance of those youngsters are at
- 5 Miller School, the African Center Academy, and they,
- 6 too, have adjusted.
- 7 Removing those children from Weil School,
- 8 will affect the entire program at Weil School. Those
- 9 children are part of the Weil Technology Academy,
- 10 which is an outstanding, outstanding program.
- DR. THOMPSON: Mr. Brentley, just before
- 12 the next answer, I need to -- we need to have a point
- 13 of clarification here again, I'm sorry, I just seem to
- 14 be confused tonight, but as we move forward with these
- 15 school closings, we have a strategic planning
- 16 committee in the process now, and you notice, in my
- 17 budget, at one particular time there was an alignment
- 18 committee, that was supposed to be appointed.
- My question to the Board then, if the
- 20 alignment committee comes back in May, I think May 1st
- 21 is the date, and reidentifies these same schools to be
- 22 closed again, are these schools -- are these schools
- 23 still going to be in the mix? Is the Board going to
- 24 take the recommendation of the alignment committee,
- 25 and if they come back and say, "Yes, these schools

- 1 need to be closed again," now are you prepared as a
- 2 Board, to close them again?
- If you are, then that puts our young people
- 4 in another dilemma. Parents don't know what to do
- 5 now. "Do I send my child back, they are getting ready
- 6 to do an alignment plan, and all of that kind of
- 7 thing, what should I do? My baby is happy now, but
- 8 now they are talking about reopening the schools, but
- 9 then in May, there is going to be another decision
- 10 made about the school," so we are going to be -- there
- 11 is a possibility, that some of our students will be
- 12 reassigned every year, over the past three years. And
- 13 I don't think it is fair to our students.
- I think the Board needs to answer that
- 15 question. Are these schools going to be a part of the
- 16 alignment plan, and will this Board live by that
- 17 alignment plan, if these schools are once again
- 18 identified, as to have -- this is, I think about the
- 19 second time around, they have been identified to
- 20 close.
- Do you have any question about McKelvy?
- 22 Just think about that as we answer this question,
- 23 please.
- 24 MS. REED: By consolidating the McKelvy
- 25 program, you have brought together two schools that

- 1 have traditionally operated separately, for many
- 2 years. I think it was in the mid '70 -- 1975, when
- 3 you had the established middle school gifted program.
- 4 And then it operated separately from the elementary,
- 5 until this year.
- 6 This is the first time that we consolidated
- 7 those two programs.
- 8 So that you now have a very efficiently run
- 9 operation, under the direction of one principal.
- 10 You have one principal operating that
- 11 program, managing the resources, and the supplies,
- 12 under one -- in one facility. That has not happened
- 13 before.
- 14 This is the first time, in the history of
- 15 this city, that we have been able to see a very
- 16 efficient, and very well run operation, with the
- 17 elementary, and the middle school gifted in one
- 18 building.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- I just, my final comment, is that while I
- 21 am the Board representative for McKelvy, and the other
- 22 majority of the schools in the Hill District, I am
- 23 happy to support the efforts of the community, or the
- 24 attempts to reopen the school, but on the other hand,
- 25 I am learning, under the leadership of our

- 1 superintendent, Dr. Thompson, that I have to be much
- 2 bigger, than just my own neighborhood; so, therefore,
- 3 I will not be supporting this, because -- until all of
- 4 the schools, who were closed, are placed on that list.
- I am happy for my school, and for my
- 6 District, but I will not be supporting this, because
- 7 the method used was not a good method, and besides
- 8 that it is divisive, it creates tension, that we can
- 9 just simply avoid.
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: I have a comment, Madam
- 11 President, that we -- I don't believe the Hill
- 12 District, we -- as I said the same thing, that I said
- 13 to the parents at Bon Air, "To close your school, is
- 14 doing it in the best interests of all students, in the
- 15 lodge term."
- There may be some individuals, some
- 17 parents, who would like to see McKelvy reopened, but
- 18 it simply is a fiscally irresponsible thing to do, and
- 19 I would like to make a motion that McKelvy is removed
- 20 from this list.
- 21 MS. FINK: Is there a second?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Second.
- MS. FINK: May we have a roll call, please.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is a roll call, on
- 25 the motion to remove McKelvy from the list of schools

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to be reopened.

- 2 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?

- 4 ATTORNEY WEISS: The motion carries, five
- 5 yes.
- 6 A VOICE: You get rid of McKelvy.
- 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: Okay. So the report,
- 8 before the Board, then, would be as amended.
- 9 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- 10 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I just again, in --
- 11 with the job you have to do, is not easy, and I just
- 12 want to point out something that occurred to me, as
- 13 you were giving us the numbers under item 6, and I
- 14 don't mean to single out any single individual, but it
- 15 occurs to me that two things that seeing this, and
- 16 having read something over the weekend, I want to
- 17 remind you, and the rest of the Board, about what it
- 18 is like, what we accomplish when we work together with
- 19 the staff, instead of work in conflict with them,
- 20 which is what we are doing now. There was a time,
- 21 when these numbers were much higher. There were some
- 22 Board members who wanted to work on the Code of
- 23 Student Conduct, that was changed, the staff worked
- 24 very hard, and these numbers are reflected very
- 25 differently today, than they were a year ago, and that

- 1 is working together, and that's cooperation.
- The second thing is, is I am not a
- 3 revisionist, and I think I am accurate when I say when
- 4 Literacy Plus was first presented to this Board, there
- 5 was real negative discussion, and accusations made to
- 6 individuals, that were just unbelievable, and now we
- 7 embrace, as a Board, Literacy Plus, as a fabulous
- 8 program moving forward.
- 9 I think, Mrs. President, we need to remind
- 10 ourselves, what we accomplish positively, directly
- 11 impacting children, which is why we are here, when we
- 12 work together with this professional staff, in this
- 13 building.
- And I think tonight what we are seeing is
- 15 the reverse.
- We are really negatively impacting
- 17 children, because we are working in conflict with the
- 18 staff.
- 19 MS. FINK: Are there any more comments or
- 20 questions, on the student performance agenda?
- 21 Mrs. Harris.
- MS. HARRIS: Yes, I would just like to
- 23 know, if everyone in the book, this evening, whether
- 24 it be personnel, if it's consultants, or contractors,
- 25 have their clearance, of Act 34, and 151.

- DR. THOMPSON: To the best of our
- 2 knowledge, yes.
- 3 MS. FINK: Hearing no other questions,
- 4 could we have a roll call vote on the student
- 5 performance agenda, as amended.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- 7 MR. BRENTLEY: I am voting no, based upon
- 8 the information that I mentioned earlier, but more
- 9 importantly, that once again, this is a clear sign
- 10 that the leadership of this Board has no intention on
- 11 working together as a Board, and they are working hard
- 12 to continue to compete with our staff.
- Once again, I am not interested in
- 14 competing with the staff, we are on the same team, and
- 15 I want to work together, so I will be voting no.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: I vote yes, on the report as
- 18 a whole, as amended.
- 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 23 no on item 5.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi, would you
- 25 repeat your vote? I think I missed part of it.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 2 ATTORNEY WEISS: Oh, yes. Okay.
- 3 Mr. Matthews?
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: I am going vote no on item
- 5 No. 5, under "General Authorizations", for the school
- 6 reopenings, and closings. But I am happy to see that
- 7 McKelvy was pulled off, because when the fiscal damage
- 8 is done to this District, I don't want anyone blaming
- 9 McKelvy for the downfall of this District.
- 10 A VOICE: Amen.
- MR. MATTHEWS: So I am voting yes on the
- 12 report as a whole, and no under item No. 5, under
- 13 school reopenings and closings.
- 14 MR. WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- 17 MR. TAYLOR: Yes. I just wanted to say
- 18 briefly, again, I think as Board members, I think
- 19 political games are being played.
- 20 If we wanted to play political games, we
- 21 would have made a motion to have you vote against
- 22 Gladstone in your own community, and we wouldn't want
- 23 to do that, because that would be wrong, because
- 24 reopening Gladstone would break the budget.
- 25 And we don't want to sit here and have to

- 1 force you to vote -- or maybe vote for, Gladstone in
- 2 your own community.
- 3 This is no political game, these stakes are
- 4 extremely high.
- I vote yes on the report as a whole, no on
- 6 item 5.
- 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- 8 MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- 10 MS. FINK: Yes.
- 11 ATTORNEY WEISS: There is eight in favor of
- 12 the report as a whole -- I'm sorry, nine in favor of
- 13 the report as a whole.
- MR. ISLER: No, you were right the first
- 15 time.
- MR. TAYLOR: The first time.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is the first time, I
- 18 need a play book in front of me.
- 19 Eight in favor of the report as a whole,
- 20 and there are three no votes on item 5.
- 21 Thank you.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- MR. TAYLOR: Four no votes.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Four no votes? You are
- 25 correct.

- 1 MS. FINK: Okay. Now we have the Committee
- 2 on Business and Finance.
- 3 This is respectfully submitted by
- 4 Mark Brentley, Chairperson.
- 5 We have payments authorized, consultants
- 6 and contracted services, we have amendments to other
- 7 contracts, let's see, Business Affairs Committee,
- 8 Item 8, we have general authorizations, we have an
- 9 investment, 2002 investment plan.
- 10 And it's all before you.
- Is there anything that anyone would like
- 12 to -- Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I am looking at, under
- 14 "Payments and authorization", I believe I received a
- 15 new sheet today.
- MS. FINK: Oh. Yes.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Correct.
- 18 MS. FINK: That was item 3, and it changed
- 19 the report number. The old report number was
- 20 incorrect, and the number 0157 is the sheet that has
- 21 the correct report number.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- MR. FELLERS: Mrs. Fink, No. 2 should read
- 24 0156, I think it previously read 0151.
- 25 MS. FINK: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Fellers.

- 1 1 Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: I just want to, just for
- 3 clarity, please, No. 2, under the payments of
- 4 authorization, that's the canopy, am I correct?
- 5 MR. FELLERS: No. 2, is report 1567 -- I'm
- 6 sorry, is 10156, the first item, administration
- 7 building, is the canopy, and as a result of the
- 8 Board's reaction at the agenda review meeting, the
- 9 staff was recommended that all bids be rejected, so
- 10 that if you vote yes on this report, it is to not do
- 11 the canopy.
- 12 All other items, do have a
- 13 recommendation -- I'm sorry, No. 3 also, as well as
- 14 does No. 4, and 5. So really, you are only voting on
- 15 item 2, the Reizenstein proposal, with what is left of
- 16 this report.
- MS. HARRIS: Can I?
- 18 MS. FINK: Oh, yes, Mrs. Harris. Go ahead.
- MR. FELLERS: I am corrected by Mr. Walluk,
- 20 item 4, and item 2, are there for consideration.
- 21 MS. FINK: Okay. Mrs. Harris.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. Does that mean that
- 23 8040, under 1567, is on for a vote? That's the auto
- 24 equipment.
- 25 MR. FELLERS: That is correct. And that

- 1 has been actually lowered by three vehicles. As a
- 2 result of an agenda review, you asked that we remove
- 3 three new vehicles from the school safety purchase
- 4 figures, and we conceded that is -- in the underlying
- 5 thing, section at the bottom, it is recommended that
- 6 all bids, item 2 be rejected, those were those
- 7 vehicles, so that we have deleted the three new school
- 8 safety vehicles, the two replacement vehicles are
- 9 still in the purchase.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. So they are all
- 11 replacement vehicles, at this time; is that what you
- 12 are saying?
- MR. FELLERS: That is correct.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. Thank you.
- I also -- okay. Under "Consultants and
- 16 Contracted Services", I am feeling a little bit
- 17 uncomfortable at this time, voting on No. 4, and I
- 18 would really like to table that for this month, and go
- 19 back to it. So I would like to make a motion that we
- 20 table No. 4, under "Consultants and Contracted
- 21 Services".
- MR. ISLER: Can you tell us what page you
- 23 are on, please?
- MS. HARRIS: Page 4.
- MR. FELLERS: Madam President, I would just

- 1 point out, that by tabling that, that means that
- 2 effective January 1, the District will have no one as
- 3 a real estate agent to serve in terms of appeals, or
- 4 issues before the courts, around real estate matters.
- I hope there is not confusion, this item
- 6 does not support the purchase of land or buildings for
- 7 new development, all of those types of purchases are
- 8 under separate agreements with the real estate
- 9 companies.
- This is for our ongoing day-to-day
- 11 services.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, if I may add, this
- 13 was discussed in agenda review, referred to our
- 14 solicitor, who handles these matters, and he
- 15 encouraged us, if I am not mistaken, to continue with
- 16 this consultant, because he -- he is much more in the
- 17 governmental side, and not on the retail and
- 18 commercial side. I just want to reinforce the fact,
- 19 that our solicitor did suggest that we keep this
- 20 individual.
- 21 Thank you.
- 22 ATTORNEY WEISS: I would confirm what
- 23 Mr. Isler said, that this item is strictly for court
- 24 related work, and that's an ongoing process.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. If we have -- if we

- 1 have a concern from January, then for the month of
- 2 January, I would -- until I get the information, I
- 3 feel more comfortable, I would go for the month of
- 4 January, but I am feeling uncomfortable at this time.
- 5 I mean, if you want to leave them on for January,
- 6 until I am not feeling as uncomfortable as I am --
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: What are you uncomfortable
- 8 about?
- 9 MR. ISLER: You have to make a motion.
- 10 MS. HARRIS: Okay. I am making a motion, I
- 11 would like to table this now, if you would like them
- 12 on, for the month of January, you know, until I am
- 13 feeling a little better, and I can get more answers, I
- 14 don't have a problem with that.
- But, you know, to go for a full year, right
- 16 now, until I have the answers that I have, I can't do
- 17 that.
- MS. FINK: May I make a suggestion?
- MS. HARRIS: Sure.
- 20 MS. FINK: That you --
- 21 MR. MATTHEWS: Hit your mic.
- 22 MS. FINK: Okay. If you are feeling
- 23 uncomfortable, and you feel like you need more
- 24 answers, why not just make a motion to extend this
- 25 contract for 60 days, until you get your answers, and

- 1 then we can discuss it some more.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. I would like to just --
- 3 how do you want me to say it?
- 4 MS. FINK: Extend the contract for 60 days.
- 5 MS. HARRIS: Okay. I would like to make a
- 6 motion, that we amend it, that we extend this contract
- 7 for -- 60 days? 60 days.
- 8 MS. WOOD: I asked the question if that was
- 9 an hourly basis contract, and just to exceed, so the
- 10 60 days they would still be paid at the normal rate,
- 11 until the next legislative meeting; is that correct?
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: That's correct. There
- 13 ought to be a vote there on the amendment, Mrs. Fink.
- 14 MS. FINK: Right. And I was about to do
- 15 that.
- Oh, we didn't have a second yet.
- 17 MR. McCREA: I seconded.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 20 Mr. Fellers, can you tell me, with this
- 21 amendment, what's your impression on it?
- I don't know what the heck we are doing
- 23 here.
- 24 MR. FELLERS: Clearly, this is superior to
- 25 a no vote, it gives us ongoing support over those two

- 1 months, while we would rebid, if that would -- becomes
- 2 to the Board's pleasure. It is really a variation of
- 3 what I recommended to the Board of directors on the
- 4 Mercer contract, which is in new business.
- 5 We do utilize both of those companies on a
- 6 day in and day out basis, and since both contracts end
- 7 December 31, we would be left without resources.
- 8 My experience with both firms, however,
- 9 would cause me to tell you that my best preference
- 10 would be that you just renew them, but two months is
- 11 certainly better than voting no.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Mr. Matthews.
- 13 MR. MATTHEWS: I am -- I appreciate the
- 14 fact that my colleague has -- she is uncomfortable
- 15 with this item.
- I guess I need to know, within the 60 days,
- 17 what are we going to do, or is this going to be
- 18 another behind the closed doors deal, where you get
- 19 your answers, and you do what you want to do? I am
- 20 just trying to find out, what is the concern?
- 21 MS. HARRIS: We could discuss it at next
- 22 agenda review, or the business meeting, whenever we
- 23 can have one, and have the planning meeting, in order
- 24 to have the meeting. So I am feeling uncomfortable
- 25 with this, Mr. --

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Matthews.
- MS. HARRIS: -- Matthews, right now, and I
- 3 made the amendment, and it was seconded.
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: I am not -- I mean, I wasn't
- 5 trying to put you down, I am just saying, I am just
- 6 trying to figure out, if you had some concerns, I
- 7 would like to know when we are going to address those
- 8 concerns, so that everyone can hear it, or is it going
- 9 to be another one of these deals, that you are going
- 10 to do behind closed doors; that's all I am asking.
- MS. HARRIS: The deal is, that I can't even
- 12 get answers right now, I can't even have a planning
- 13 meeting right now, I can't talk to staff right now, so
- 14 when I can start getting answers, I can start voting
- 15 on things, Mr. Matthews.
- MR. MATTHEWS: That will come out of
- 17 \$1 million contract that we have in our office now.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Now we are ready.
- 19 Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I am again troubled.
- 21 We seek professional advice at the agenda review
- 22 meeting, we asked Mr. Weiss, who needs to have the
- 23 support in a court of law, he was comfortable with
- 24 this person's services, he laid out for me very
- 25 specifically how this person differs from other

- 1 people, and again, I am appalled of how we are turning
- 2 on our professional staff.
- 3 MS. FINK: May we have a vote on the
- 4 motion.
- 5 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is a motion to amend
- 6 the report to extend the Ellis contract 60 days.
- 7 Mr. Brentley?
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: No.
- 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 11 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 13 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: No.
- 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: No.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 18 MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- 20 MR. TAYLOR: No.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 23 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: So the report has been

- 1 amended, via motion, and the report is now before the
- 2 Board.
- 3 Mrs. Fink.
- 4 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 5 Do we have any other -- Mrs. Wood.
- 6 MS. WOOD: Okay. And I will give my
- 7 reasons for asking this to be tabled, it is page 3,
- 8 item 2. And the only reason I am asking this, is I
- 9 know we had discussion on this, I know the value of
- 10 workmen's compensation reviews, since I'm in the
- 11 insurance business, but I remembered a study that we
- 12 had done, that cost a lot more than this.
- And that study was not brought out to
- 14 compare whether we actually need this information
- 15 that's asked here, and I only want it tabled, for --
- 16 until the next agenda review, to pull the study that
- 17 was done, it was a very extensive study, done at our
- 18 complete workmen's comp department, a lot of which we
- 19 did not follow their advice at that time, and I would
- 20 like to see it before the next agenda review meeting,
- 21 so that we can discuss it.
- 22 MR. ISLER: I thank you for that
- 23 clarification.
- MS. WOOD: I don't want duplication of
- 25 services.

- 1 MR. ISLER: I appreciate that, that's
- 2 professional business, I totally support it. Thank
- 3 you for your explanation.
- 4 MS. HARRIS: I second.
- 5 MS. FINK: All right. We have a motion,
- 6 and a second. Which we have a motion to table, and a
- 7 second.
- 8 Could we please have a roll call.
- 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: Motion to table item 2.
- 10 Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 17 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 22 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes.

1 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink? 2 MS. FINK: Yes. Okav. We have -- Mrs. Harris. 3 I had one -- oh, go ahead. 4 MS. HARRIS: Don't you have to say how many votes? 5 ATTORNEY WEISS: That motion carries. 6 MS. HARRIS: I would also like to make an 7 amendment to No. 8, because we don't get information 9 all the time. I want to see -- I would like to amend 10 this, I would like to make a motion to amend this, that it would not exceed \$100,000. If the staff would 11 12 need more money, they could come back, show us how that money was utilized, and where. 13 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is on page 5? 15 MS. FINK: Yes. 16 MS. HARRIS: So that is on page 5. 17 So, I make a motion, that we amend the 18 figure, from the 250,000, and make that 100,000. MS. FINK: Do I have a second for that? 19 20 MS. WOOD: I want to ask a question. 21 MR. TAYLOR: Okay. 22 MS. WOOD: I am just wondering if we can 23 change that from January 1st to June, and then get a

review, and then reallocate it again, if it is needed.

MS. HARRIS: Sounds good.

24

- MS. FINK: We would need an answer from --
- 2 MR. TAYLOR: Increase the amendment.
- 3 MR. MATTHEWS: You need a second to the
- 4 amendment from Mrs. Wood, and Mrs. --
- 5 MS. WOOD: I am not making an amendment.
- 6 MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. Her motion hasn't
- 7 been seconded.
- MR. TAYLOR: No, there wasn't a second.
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: Okay.
- 10 MS. HARRIS: And that we would -- but that
- 11 would be from January 1st, 2002, until June 2002.
- 12 MS. FINK: So it's 100,000.

- MS. FINK: From January 1st, through
- 17 June 30th.
- 18 MS. HARRIS: 2002.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Now, do we have a second
- 20 to that?
- 21 MS. WOOD: I will.
- MS. FINK: Mrs. Wood seconds.
- Then can we have a roll call vote.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Question.
- MS. FINK: Oh, I'm sorry

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: Question, Mr. Fellers,
- 2 Dr. Thompson, do you see this amendment at all,
- 3 hindering the staff's ability to function?
- 4 DR. THOMPSON: I'm sorry.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: Do you see this amendment at
- 6 all hindering the staff's ability to function?
- 7 MS. WOOD: As amended.
- 8 MR. FELLERS: As amended, it will work. It
- 9 is difficult, because everyone in the system utilizes
- 10 these moneys, and in the month of June it is possible
- 11 that we could slip over a hundred thousand dollars, if
- 12 a whole bunch of schools utilize it on the same day.
- 13 So to control it --
- MS. WOOD: June 1st.
- MR. FELLERS: Or June 1st? That makes it
- 16 even more difficult, but --
- 17 DR. THOMPSON: My response to that is, the
- 18 250,000, if we don't use it, we don't use it. I mean,
- 19 it's going to be there. It's there if you need it, we
- 20 don't have to keep coming back and forth to the Board
- 21 for additional use. It is there, if we don't use it,
- 22 we have it in the fund balance, so I don't see the
- 23 logic behind cutting them out, and putting it there.
- 24 MS. FINK: I think, Dr. Thompson, I seem to
- 25 be getting the impression that the point was to do an

- 1 evaluation, and they were thinking of a mechanism to
- 2 get an evaluation, on how well these services are
- 3 benefiting the District, within that time period.
- DR. THOMPSON: As he said --
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: I just wanted to say, if
- 6 that's the case, let's get the evaluation, but let's
- 7 not jeopardize the service in the mean time.
- 8 MS. HARRIS: We are not going to
- 9 jeopardize.
- 10 MR. BRENTLEY: But if we are going to cut
- 11 it almost in half --
- MS. HARRIS: We are not jeopardizing. We
- 13 are not jeopardizing here.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Why not allow them to do
- 15 what they have to do, submit the reports, and let's
- 16 move forward.
- 17 You know, I just want to say for the
- 18 record, again, we should not be involved with the
- 19 everyday operation of this District. That's the role
- 20 of the superintendent.
- 21 MS. FINK: One of our distinct duties, is
- 22 to get evaluations, on --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, then let's get the
- 24 evaluations, but it is almost like a punishment here,
- 25 to cut the funds, and then they will wait for the

- l evaluation.
- MS. FINK: Well, it is not my motion.
- 3 How do we want to address this?
- 4 MS. HARRIS: We want to proceed with the
- 5 motion, and we would look at that, you know, actually
- 6 see an evaluation. We are not cutting any funds, if
- 7 they need more fund, no one is saying they are not
- 8 going to get any more money for this, but we can see
- 9 what's going on midyear.
- 10 MS. FINK: Okay. So in other words, do
- 11 you -- we are going with the motion, as you state it,
- 12 \$100,000, for the period of January 1st, through June
- 13 the 1st?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- 16 MS. WOOD: Can I just ask one question, can
- 17 we have the valuation as early as the beginning of
- 18 May, so that we can appropriate by June legislative.
- 19 MS. FINK: Certainly.
- DR. MOSLEY: Madam Chairman, I would like
- 21 to know what kind of assessment evaluation, that
- 22 Mrs. Harris would like to have regarding the services,
- 23 because clearly we have not had any complaints to
- 24 date, relative to the replacement people, that fits in
- 25 on a day-to-day basis, regarding filling in for

- 1 absenteeism.
- 2 So if we can understand exactly the
- 3 questions that she would like to have evaluated, and
- 4 assessed, we certainly would be more than glad to
- 5 provide her with that information.
- 6 MS. HARRIS: I would like to find out where
- 7 they are being used, and why, and if it's absenteeism,
- 8 we want to see, you know, where actually this is
- 9 occurring, and why it's occurring.
- 10 So that's the type of evaluation we are
- 11 looking at, a breakdown per school, per office.
- DR. MOSLEY: Excuse me, we will be more
- 13 than willing to provide those specific information in
- 14 terms of the assessment you would like to have.
- MS. HARRIS: Thank you, very much.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Again, I am stunned that this
- 18 is coming to us tonight.
- One of my fellow Board members used the
- 20 term punishment, and I am amazed, at what is coming
- 21 before this Board tonight for the first time, when we
- 22 had plenty of time, prior to agenda review, to bring
- 23 this up, and it was not brought up until tonight.
- 24 And I think, that we -- this definitely,
- 25 you may disagree, this is why we have choices in this

- 1 world, this could affect the operation of our schools.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: I have one question.
- 3 Mr. Fellers, can you tell me a little bit about this
- 4 Kelly Services, are they local -- I know it is --
- 5 what --
- 6 MR. FELLERS: Yes.
- 7 MR. BRENTLEY: What can you tell me about
- 8 them?
- 9 MR. FELLERS: Dr. Mosley needs to respond,
- 10 he runs the program, and we handle the allocation of
- 11 dollars.
- DR. MOSLEY: The intent of Kelly Services,
- 13 is basically to fill in for special needs,
- 14 specifically in categories if we have absenteeism, in
- 15 clerical areas, we have a replacement, and in some
- 16 cases there may be special projects that need to be
- 17 completed, we have a limited amount of resources, so
- 18 you will go ahead and you will have a Kelly Service
- 19 person come in, fill in the void, until you get that
- 20 project done, and it is reduced.
- 21 A lot of it, as I mentioned to you, on a
- 22 day-to-day basis -- on a day-to-day basis, cost of
- 23 doing business, specifically related to filling in for
- 24 absenteeism, and also filling in for critical needs on
- 25 a short duration of time, that's what Kelly Services

- 1 provide. They are a person personnel services entity.
- 2 And as Mr. Fellers mentioned, specifically, we have
- 3 site level budget, site level decision making at the
- 4 building levels, and they are the ones, as well, that
- 5 ask for specific resources, and also select people to
- 6 come in and fill in on specific projects, as well as
- 7 central office.
- 8 So that's what it is, it is really a
- 9 support backup maintenance.
- 10 MR. BRENTLEY: Dr. Mosley, can you just
- 11 tell me, First Choice Temporary Services, and Kelly
- 12 Services, are they considered to be small businesses,
- 13 women owned businesses, or are they minority owned
- 14 businesses?
- 15 DR. MOSLEY: Neither of them are minority
- 16 owned businesses, but clearly -- I'm sorry. Thank
- 17 you, excuse me, for the clarification.
- 18 Kelly is a nationally owned, and the other
- 19 organization is a minority owned firm, that provides
- 20 temporary services to the District.
- MR. BRENTLEY: And the one is considered to
- 22 be a small business, is that correct?
- DR. MOSLEY: First Choice is.
- 24 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. So a change in the
- 25 funding, could be a problem, for them?

- DR. MOSLEY: Possibly. Based on again, on
- 2 a day-to-day basis, I don't have the ability right
- 3 now, to assess the volume of business that we provide
- 4 on a day-to-day basis, but clearly, if there was a
- 5 shortfall of funds, or if we exceeded dollars,
- 6 obviously the revenue flow would be a problem to a
- 7 small business.
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: Could I have a brief remark.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 11 MR. TAYLOR: We are not here in the
- 12 business, to protect businesses, but I would like
- 13 Dr. Mosley to give a little idea, First Choice, to
- 14 tell us maybe what this -- what kind of impact this
- 15 might be, because if they have done any type of long
- 16 range planning, we cut half of their budget, so if
- 17 anybody can just give us maybe a snippet, about First
- 18 Choice, what kind of bind they may be put in, because
- 19 I never heard of them, I don't know how small they
- 20 are.
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: Can I ask --
- 22 DR. MOSLEY: I don't have that data
- 23 available, I would have to -- Mr. Taylor, I would have
- 24 to provide that for you later, I just don't have that
- 25 information at my fingertips, but certainly, we would

- be able to do that analysis for you.
- 2 MR. TAYLOR: That's what I am saying, maybe
- 3 they can tell us.
- DR. MOSLEY: Absolutely, just like any
 - 5 other business could tell you, if they had, you know,
 - 6 reduced some revenues, what type of impact that would
 - 7 have on their business.
 - 8 MS. FINK: Miss Colaizzi.
 - 9 MS. COLAIZZI: I just want to clarify this,
- 10 from what I understood, from what Mrs. Harris's
- 11 request was, is not to cut their budget, but was to at
- 12 the hundred thousand -- give them a hundred thousand
- 13 now, in June, let us look at what this money is spent.
- 14 And I think what I would look at, if I -- I want to
- 15 make sure that, you know, people aren't just calling
- 16 off, and a temp is just being called in, for, you
- 17 know, no necessary --
- 18 MR. TAYLOR: Mrs. Colaizzi, I will say,
- 19 that your contract is through December 31st, so that
- 20 would be a signed contract, guaranteeing them, you
- 21 know, work with us.
- MS. HARRIS: No.
- MR. TAYLOR: When you cut it to June 1st,
- 24 2002, it may put in jeopardy the other six months,
- 25 they may budget for. So I want to move on.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: I just want to say, in
- 3 closing, too, and I guess in response to Miss
- 4 Colaizzi, and also Miss Harris, that you want to get
- 5 this report to see how many teachers are calling off,
- 6 or what secretarials, are doing what, et cetera, et
- 7 cetera. You know, I just have to remind folks, that
- 8 some of these positions, if not, may affect somehow,
- 9 some way with some of the agreements dealing with some
- 10 of the unions, and some of that stuff we have to let
- 11 it kind of take its course.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Absolutely.
- MR. BRENTLEY: You know, we can't go out
- 14 you know, and attack union folks, for taking off,
- 15 these agreements they have.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- I make the motion on the amendment.
- MS. FINK: I am calling for a roll call
- 19 vote on the amendment.
- MR. BRENTLEY: What are we --
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: It is being amended to
- 22 amount of \$100,000, to June 1, 2002, with an
- 23 evaluation to be provided by May 1st.
- Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: I will be voting no on the

- 1 amendment. I believe that it is an attack on small
- 2 businesses, and impairs -- it could be an attack on
- 3 some minority business.
- I just don't support it, and I think that
- 5 we need to get behind and allow them, if there is
- 6 going to be a report submitted, let's wait for the
- 7 report, and not punish small businesses.
- 8 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: I will vote yes.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?

- 19 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 22 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 23 MR. McCREA: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 24 no on item 1F, under "Consultants and Contracted
- 25 Services".

- 1 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- 2 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 3 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- 4 MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 5 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- 6 MS. FINK: Yes.
- 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: Nine in favor on the
- 8 report as a whole, two no votes on item 1f.
- 9 MS. FINK: On the human resources report,
- 10 on superintendent of schools, Dr. Thompson.
- DR. THOMPSON: Thank you, Madam President,
- 12 you will see the documents, but before we get to that
- 13 we would like to acknowledge, and send our sympathies
- 14 out to the family of Mr. Michael Einloth.
- 15 MS. FINK: Einloth.
- DR. THOMPSON: Einloth, I'm sorry. Thank
- 17 you.
- 18 The assistant custodian at Carmalt
- 19 Elementary School. This tribute was made by
- 20 Mr. Timothy Rapp, District operations supervisor,
- 21 plant operations.
- 22 And we do want to send out our condolences
- 23 to that family.

- 1 MR. McCREA: My first question, is the
- 2 dates, January 1st, somebody say 2001 or 2002?
- 3 MR. FELLERS: That refers to the existing
- 4 contracts, be it resolved, 90 days, beginning
- 5 January 1st, and the amount that was prorated down
- 6 from 85,000, to 21,250, which is one quarter of the
- 7 normal annual revenue.
- 8 MR. McCREA: I would like to make a motion,
- 9 that we -- that this reads 60 days extension, instead
- 10 of 90 days.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I will second it.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Seconded. All right.
- 13 May we have a roll call vote on the amendment, please.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- MS. FINK: Sure.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Dr. Thompson, this
- 17 extension, where does it stand with the staff?
- MR. FELLERS: It means we will have to

- 5 take 60 days instead of not at all. I think 90 days
- 6 would allow staff to do a better job in terms of the
- 7 RFP.
- 8 DR. THOMPSON: Mrs. Spolar would like to
- 9 speak to that, please.
- MS. SPOLAR: I just wanted to reiterate,
- 11 that to do this rebid responsibly, and thoroughly, I
- 12 believe a 90 day period is appropriate to conduct that
- 13 work, and it would ensure that we have the consulting
- 14 services that we need, on this very large budget item
- 15 for us, the cost of our health care services for all
- 16 of our employees, and I would really request the
- 17 90 days, rather than the 60, because I don't think the
- 18 60 is sufficient.
- 19 MR. FELLERS: I would also remind the
- 20 directors, that this is our backstop, on \$35 million
- 21 in premium payments, to Highmark.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Can I ask, Mr. McCrea, what
- 23 is the purpose for the amendment? If it's putting a
- 24 crunch on the staff, if they are telling us that they
- 25 can use more time, to do it right, what is the purpose

- 1 for the amendment?
- MR. McCREA: I have faith in the staff,
- 3 that they are going to do it right in 60 days.
- 4 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- 5 MR. ISLER: In all due respect, again, we
- 6 are hearing from a professional staff member in this
- 7 District.
- 8 MS. FINK: Oh, mics off, please.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Again, we are hearing from
- 10 professional staff of this District.
- I don't mean to embarrass her, I never
- 12 heard a negative word about her. She has asked for
- 13 90 days, to do it right. I think that's fair to grant
- 14 to the staff person.
- I really do.
- And I would hope that both people, that
- 17 person who made the motion, and that who seconded it,
- 18 get it off.
- 19 If in fact you really want a point of
- 20 clarification, I think you go to a Board member who
- 21 has some experience in this area, and ask her if she
- 22 feels that 90 days is unfair.
- I don't know how you can go against the
- 24 staff member.
- 25 MR. BRENTLEY: That's right.

- 1 MS. FINK: Mrs. Wood, obviously, they want
- 2 your opinion.
- 3 MS. WOOD: Okay. I do believe, that -- is
- 4 someone else on?
- 5 Okay. I respect that you want to move this

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- 1 Discussion.
- 2 Mr. Isler, and then Mr. Matthews.
- 3 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, unfortunately, I was
- 4 unable to be, I would assume this was discussed at the
- 5 executive committee, can you give my the reasons for
- 6 it? I would like to know how long this policy has
- 7 been in effect, if there have been any violations,
- 8 negativity, what was the reason, again, the criteria,
- 9 if I may use that word, for the bringing it before the
- 10 Board, to change this policy at this time.
- 11 MS. FINK: It is my understanding that the
- 12 amount was being reduced back down to 5,000, because
- 13 this way, items coming before the Board can be
- 14 commented on, and accepted or rejected after the
- 15 discussion; it gives us more control over the
- 16 financial item.
- 17 MR. ISLER: Okay. It gives us now -- now I
- 18 want to be clear about this, because there are
- 19 accusations made all the time. Is this being changed
- 20 because there are Board members who are accusing, or
- 21 are making any accusations towards any negativity use,
- 22 negative use of this \$10,000, or is it purely --
- MS. FINK: No.
- 24 MR. ISLER: -- to give the Board more
- 25 control. But the Board, always has the final sign off

- 1 of anything anyhow, right, so whether we change it or
- 2 not, really doesn't make a difference.
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 MS. FINK: The thing is, you don't know
- 5 about it, it is not brought in front of you.
- 6 MR. ISLER: You still have the final
- 7 authority, Mrs. Fink.
- 8 MS. FINK: Mr. Fellers.
- 9 MR. FELLERS: Just as a point of --
- 10 MS. FINK: Sorry, Alex.
- 11 MR. FELLERS: Just as a point of
- 12 clarification, I don't believe it is Board policy, it
- 13 is the School Code that prescribes the \$10,000. The
- 14 School Code provides in both the purchasing and
- 15 facilities contracts, that there be three competitive
- 16 written bids above \$4,000. And that at \$10,000, you
- 17 have sealed competitive bids.
- There has never been, to the best of my
- 19 knowledge in 29 years with the system, a \$5,000
- 20 threshold, that we are moving back to, and it kind of
- 21 puts us in a no man land, where we are enforcing
- 22 something more stringently than the School Code, as
- 23 the second largest school district in the system,
- 24 which really ought to have a higher limit. These
- 25 limits were set in the original adoption of the School

- 1 Code in 1949.
- 2 MS. FINK: Okay.
- Wait a minute, Mr. Matthews had his hand
- 4 up.
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.
- And, Mr. Fellers, thank you for that
- 7 information, because I was also going to say, is that
- 8 what we should be doing, is increasing this amount,
- 9 going to the state, to increase it.
- 10 Folks here who are supportive of unions,
- 11 they know that the cost of construction, the cost of
- 12 material, the cost of labor, have gone up, and yet you
- 13 are going to reduce what comes down lower.
- I am really confused about what you are
- 15 trying to do. Why don't you just eliminate it
- 16 altogether. Because, you know, we got to have some
- 17 kind of trust in our staff, that they are going ahead,
- 18 and putting forth the best efforts to make sure that
- 19 these contracts are upheld according to the state
- 20 code, and just to arbitrarily say, take it down to
- 21 \$5,000, without -- just to arbitrarily say, take it
- 22 down to \$5,000, without justification, just because
- 23 you want to see everything that comes before the
- 24 Board, take it down to zero, as a matter of fact, make
- 25 sure there is no spending, even in schools, that no

- 1 spending is done, until you five review it, because
- 2 that's what you want to do, to control the management
- 3 of the District.
- 4 You know, you got to have some staff, you
- 5 have got to hold staff accountable to these things. A
- 6 lot of these contracts are minority contracts, as
- 7 well, that's how we are meeting some of the goals that
- 8 we have set, and so now you are going to take it down
- 9 to \$5,000, so now, what I am assuming, is that you are
- 10 going to now vote against those minority contracts.
- 11 So I am really concerned about the efforts,
- 12 that this resolution is doing.
- We need to talk about this. We just heard
- 14 Mr. Fellers say that this is part of the School Code,
- 15 and you are saying, "Forget the School Code, we are
- 16 going to do our own thing." It's wrong.
- DR. THOMPSON: Madam President, if you
- 18 don't mind.
- 19 MS. FINK: Go ahead.
- DR. THOMPSON: Once again, as
- 21 superintendent of the Pittsburgh Public Schools, who
- 22 is in charge of nearly \$700 million, are you telling
- 23 me that you don't give me the respect, that I can make
- 24 a decision, as the superintendent, for more than
- 25 \$5,000, and I am supposed to be responsible for a

- 1 \$489 million operating budget, plus another additional
- 2 capital budget?
- I don't know what your message is. Your
- 4 message is either telling me I am incompetent, and I
- 5 can't decide to make those decision, or something is
- 6 wrong with it. That doesn't make a whole lot of
- 7 sense, guys. \$489 million budget, and you are a
- 8 superintendent, that you won't entrust the ability to
- 9 make the decision, on whether or not he can spend
- 10 \$10,000, is really ridiculous.
- 11 Thank you.
- MS. FINK: Mrs. Harris hasn't had a chance.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I had my hand up first.
- 14 MS. FINK: She had her hand up, Mr. Isler
- 15 had his hand up, and you had your hand up, she hasn't
- 16 spoken yet.
- MS. HARRIS: Yes, I am a hundred percent
- 18 behind this, I think we have to be more fiscally
- 19 responsible in this School District. We have been
- 20 watching schools close, you had a budget two years
- 21 ago, of the actual spending was \$401 million, in the
- 22 last two years it went up to \$489 million, it is
- 23 \$88 million increase in two years, plus closing
- 24 12 schools, yes, I believe the Board has to start
- 25 watching how we are spending our money, and this is

- 1 one of the ways.
- Now, this might be a little bit more work
- 3 for Board members, because we are not paid, and we
- 4 might have to read more for agenda review.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: It is not our
- 6 responsibility, it is what the staff --
- 7 MS. HARRIS: It is our responsibility to
- 8 the taxpayers --
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: Not nit-pick.
- 10 MS. HARRIS: -- of the City of Pittsburgh.
- 11 There are school districts, and correct me if I am not
- 12 wrong, other school districts that have to approve
- 13 everything.
- Now, yes, we are larger, and we have been
- 15 at 10,000, but I think we need to look for a while,
- 16 from 5,000 down, before things are passed.
- I think we have to watch every dollar, and
- 18 I am a hundred percent behind this.
- MR. BRENTLEY: This is --
- MS. FINK: Go ahead.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I just wanted to mention
- 22 that this is --
- MS. FINK: In a minute, Bill.
- MR. BRENTLEY: This is clearly an attack on
- 25 the minority businesses --

- 1 MS. HARRIS: Oh, it is not.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: -- small businesses, and
- 3 women owned businesses.
- We know how important it is for them to be
- 5 able to have access to cash, to keep their businesses
- 6 striving, and to take this thing down to \$5,000 -- you
- 7 remember, on top of this, last month, we just hired to
- 8 bring -- we just voted to bring in the expert on NBEWB
- 9 programs, Bob Weston, there is nobody second to him.
- 10 He is here under contract, reviewing our entire
- 11 process, he is scheduled for the end of next month, to
- 12 come before us, with recommendations on how we can
- 13 increase, and get more women owned, and disadvantaged
- 14 owned businesses involved, and this is premature,
- 15 because he has recommendations on how that we can do
- 16 things, like this.
- And so, for the life of me, if you can't do
- 18 it for the District, what about the small women owned
- 19 businesses?
- 20 Have a heart for them. This can make or
- 21 break a small business person, that doesn't have that
- 22 kind of on hand cash, to keep things going.
- MS. HARRIS: This cannot make or break any
- 24 business. This is making us more fiscally
- 25 responsible, and that we are watching over what is

- 1 occurring here.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- 3 Mrs. Harris, Mr. Isler had his hand up, and
- 4 we need to let him speak.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: I just don't get it.
- 6 MR. ISLER: In all due respect, I don't
- 7 like the accusation, at least I take it as an
- 8 accusation that if we vote against this, we are not
- 9 fiscally responsible, because the conflict I see this
- 10 evening, and I did not vote for what I thought was a
- 11 fiscally irresponsible budget presentation, and
- 12 levying of taxes for a lot more money than this,
- 13 again, I'm asking for the criteria, I don't think it
- 14 is sufficient, it is something that has been put
- 15 before us this evening, for the first time, without
- 16 any discussion.
- 17 It has been explained, and again, we have a
- 18 conflict in statement at the table, where it was told
- 19 we were going back to \$5,000. Somebody who has been
- 20 around for 21 years, the person who has been around
- 21 for 29 years, is saying it has never been at \$5,000,
- 22 we have gone along with the School Code.
- It is conflict, upon conflict, upon
- 24 conflict. And I do not want to vote, or my vote to be
- 25 considered fiscally irresponsible, when I didn't vote

- 1 for fiscally irresponsible budget or tax levy this
- 2 evening.
- 3 MS. FINK: Mr. Taylor.
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: Yes. I say, this is just
- 5 amazing but, President Fink, I mean, I think the games
- 6 are up, I think the people -- I mean, you sit here and
- 7 you nit-pick about 5,000, you say, "We want to be
- 8 fiscal watch dogs," and you just spent a million
- 9 dollars in our budget, I am just saying, those are
- 10 things you were able to get away with before. The
- 11 public knows now.
- 12 After what happened here tonight, the
- 13 public knows you are not fiscal watch dogs. I mean,
- 14 this is just simply, you know, smoke and mirrors.
- "I am trying to watch, to make sure 5,000,
- 16 isn't spent, you know, irresponsibly."
- Why, you just voted to spend millions
- 18 irresponsibly.
- So I am just saying, the public now knows,
- 20 and so there is no more hiding.
- This is ridiculous, as Mr. Matthews said,
- 22 take it down to zero. If Mrs. Harris believes all the
- 23 things she said, why would you have it at 5,000, why
- 24 wouldn't you have it at zero, and I think she ought to
- 25 amend her motion, and she will make our stack this

- 1 high, and we can go through it.
- 2 And I think again -- but I think again,
- 3 that is being a contradiction, take it down to 5, if
- 4 you are such a fiscal watch dog, take it down to zero.
- 5 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 6 Mr. Isler.
- 7 MR. ISLER: I'm making a motion to table
- 8 this until the Board has had additional time --
- 9 MS. HARRIS: I'm sorry.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Second.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Harris, for
- 12 apologizing. I am making a motion to table this,
- 13 until the Board has had sufficient time to discuss
- 14 this.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Second.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- We will have a roll call on the motion to
- 18 table this, for further discussion.
- 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I will be voting yes,
- 21 because in its present form, it is clearly an attack
- 22 on women owned businesses, and disadvantaged
- 23 businesses, and I think we should not be in the
- 24 business of excluding anyone from doing business
- 25 within the District.

- 1 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- 2 MS. COLAIZZI: I am voting yes, and for the
- 3 record, I would like it to be known, that I am doing
- 4 that because I do want to further discuss this,
- 5 because I don't quite understand what you are all
- 6 complaining, and screaming about, so if there is
- 7 something you want to share, that's fine, but then we
- 8 will have the discussion, and then I can understand it
- 9 better.
- 10 And maybe the staff can bring some examples
- 11 of this, when we do have this discussion.
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: I will vote to table it, yes.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: Yes, and I want to thank
- 16 Mrs. Colaizzi for pointing out the need that we do
- 17 have to have further discussions of the Board, prior
- 18 to coming to this meeting.
- 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 22 MR. McCREA: Yes, I also agree we need
- 23 further discussion.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes, and I apologize to the

- 1 staff and the public for my unprofessional behavior
- 2 this evening.
- 3 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- 4 MS. WOOD: Yes. I just wanted to make one
- 5 little statement, with that yes vote, and that is, I
- 6 object to people saying it's because we are trying to
- 7 stop minority businesses. If that is the case, and
- 8 this could, I want that pointed out, how it could,
- 9 because that is not the intention here whatsoever.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Motion to table.
- MS. FINK: Is there any -- is there any
- 14 other business to come before the Pittsburgh Board of
- 15 Education?
- Mr. Matthews.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes. Madam, in light of the
- 18 firestorm that resulted from the Board President
- 19 Jean Fink's controversial comment made during a
- 20 community meeting at McKelvy Gifted Center last night,
- 21 December 18th, I wish to offer a motion, but first
- 22 I am going to state for the record my rationale for
- 23 such a motion. Roberts Rules of Order provide a
- 24 deliberative body, in this case, our Board of
- 25 Directors, and the Public School District, is allowed

- 1 to seek disciplinary action, to protect itself against
- 2 bad conduct of its officers, and/or members of the
- 3 Board.
- 4 This is certainly true if the officers, or
- 5 members in question, engage in conduct that injures a
- 6 deliberative body, disturbs its well-being, or hampers
- 7 the body of its work.
- 8 I suggest that the comment that -- the
- 9 conduct of this Board of Directors, individually, and
- 10 collectively must be that of Caesar's wife, above
- 11 reproach, and of suspicion.
- As president of this body, Jean Fink is
- 13 responsible for ensuring fair and balanced treatment
- 14 of all Pittsburgh public school students, regardless
- 15 of race.
- In my view, it is unconscionable, that the
- 17 president of this Board would even suggest that her
- 18 responsibility is exclusively limited to protecting
- 19 only the interests of one particular group.
- In her words, "my people," it is clear, the
- 21 reference of "my people" translate to mean
- 22 Caucasians.
- If you doubt that, please keep in mind
- 24 Mrs. Fink's comment came in its entirety, it was
- 25 directed at Mr. Mark Brentley, an African American

- 1 member of this Board. Her exact words were, "I fought
- 2 for my people, Mark, you did not fight for yours."
- 3
 I submit that we need further -- we don't
- 4 need further, a translator, or a rocket scientist, to
- 5 figure out the use of the word "your", in the context
- 6 in which Mrs. Fink used, this obviously refers to
- 7 African American.
- 8 Such a shameful display of racial bias is
- 9 not only insensitive and disrespectful, Mrs. Fink's
- 10 were also terribly divisive and pose a serious threat
- 11 to the Board's charge to ensure every student's
- 12 interest and needs for an equal education, and
- 13 consideration.
- I, therefore, move, in protection of this
- 15 body's reputation, to reconsider the election of
- 16 Miss Jean Fink as Board president.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Second.
- MS. FINK: I would like an opportunity to
- 19 defend myself, Mr. Isler, before you say anything.
- 20 MR. ISLER: Fine.
- MR. MATTHEWS; And for the record,
- 22 parliamentary procedure says that such a motion, that
- 23 involves the Board president, you cannot reside over
- 24 that motion. So the first vice president will have to
- 25 take over the chair.

- 1 MS. FINK: Okay. Darlene, would you please
- 2 take over this part of the meeting, and I would like
- 3 to defend myself.
- 4 MS. HARRIS: Sure. Do I have to move into
- 5 her seat, or can I do it from here?
- 6 MR. ISLER: No, you can stay there, the
- 7 chair just has to recognize you.
- 8 MS. HARRIS: Okay. Mrs. Fink.
- 9 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 10 We were in the McKelvy School auditorium,
- 11 discussing why we were -- why we did not open -- why I
- 12 did not have McKelvy on the list to reopen schools,
- 13 and I was referring to last year where we were -- I
- 14 was out there, very much speaking, begging, whatever
- 15 it took, to get this Board not to close the schools.
- People came to public hearings, they
- 17 testified, they poured their heart out, and nobody
- 18 cared.
- 19 And when I used the expression "my people",
- 20 I was using the expression in the terms of my
- 21 constituency, both black and white, the people that
- 22 live in District 7.
- That's what I meant.
- Now, if you took that remark, and used it
- 25 in the context of racial, whatever, it's not how I

- 1 meant it, because my District consists of African
- 2 American, white, and oriental, and Hispanic people.
- 3 Not everyone that lives south of the river
- 4 is white.
- 5 There were two of my constituents at this
- 6 meeting last night. I was including them in my
- 7 comments. Because, I had gone to bat for issues that
- 8 they were concerned about, at various times.
- They are my people, because they are my
- 10 constituents.
- I do not, I never have, and I never will,
- 12 try in any way to discriminate against anybody because
- 13 of their race, religion, sex, national origin, sexual
- 14 preference, or any other tag that you can put on human
- 15 beings.
- I grew up in the City of Pittsburgh in a
- 17 racially mixed neighborhood, and I actually, I never
- 18 thought much about race, one way or the other.
- 19 I liked you, or I didn't. I didn't care
- 20 what color you were, how old you were, how much money
- 21 you had.
- I liked you, or I didn't.
- None of the other stuff mattered.
- 24 Because that's the way I am.
- 25 And if the only way that you can find to

- 1 get at me, or to discredit me in some way -- and I am
- 2 not perfect, and I make mistakes, and when I get mad,
- 3 I shoot from the lip, and I was mad last night,
- 4 because I felt like I was set up.
- 5 You see, there are people, in the City of
- 6 Pittsburgh, who go so far as to go to city officials
- 7 and saying that McKelvy School is one that needs to be
- 8 put on that list, because otherwise this is all going
- 9 to look racial, which it isn't.
- 10 I'm fighting for schools that I represent,
- 11 because the community has begged, and they care, and
- 12 those schools were achieving, and they were at
- 13 capacity and, yes, I fight for people I represent.
- 14 And I don't ask them what color they are, when they
- 15 call me on the phone, or any other question.
- They elected me to represent them. And
- 17 that's what I do.
- And if you can't deal with that, and you
- 19 got to hang racial tags on me, and use the race card,
- 20 and make it look racial, when you disagree with me,
- 21 then I feel sorry for you, that you can't come up with
- 22 a better argument.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. Yes.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Let me just disagree with
- 25 you, Madam President, I was there, and I was offended

- 1 by your comment, didn't say much last night, I was
- 2 shocked that you said it publicly.
- 3 Clearly, there was no room for guessing, on
- 4 what you meant.
- If you noticed, my comment was, I paused,
- 6 actually, "Ooh, ooh."
- 7 As a Board member, and as the president,
- 8 you should be responsible to the entire School
- 9 District, not just "my people".
- 10 And it was taken that way, and I think it
- 11 surprised the majority of the folks there.
- 12 Let's not forget the fact, and it's so sad,
- 13 it's really sad, that you made the comments, but it is
- 14 sad that that kind of display was actually in front
- 15 for our children to witness it, and how do we expect
- 16 the kids to stay calm, and to work together, and
- 17 accept other groups, and accept diversity, when we
- 18 hear it coming from the president.
- 19 Let's not forget the fact that it was back
- 20 in March of 2001, this year, your comments when asked,
- 21 in the local newspaper, about you running for council,
- 22 you said, "No, I want to be here long enough to wave
- 23 goodbye to Dr. Thompson." And you have also said,
- 24 that you want to make it miserable for him.
- 25 How do you expect the District to move

- 1 forward, when you have already said these things, on
- 2 record, and here you at eight or nine months later,
- 3 you are now president, you are not just responsible
- 4 for the District 7, or whatever your district is, you
- 5 are responsible for the entire District.
- 6 And number two, with those comments, and
- 7 with those prejudice kinds of thinking, how do you
- 8 expect African American children to get a fair chance,
- 9 when they come before you on these student hearings?
- 10 You whack them left and right. And that's
- 11 why I campaigned early on. That is something that we
- 12 need to put up under a private contractor, it is so
- 13 unfair when you have those kind of thinking, to simply
- 14 sit there, and now we know how you feel about
- 15 certain -- we can't change who we are, and we have the
- 16 right to be educated, we have the right to be involved
- 17 in this District, and we would hope that anyone, who
- 18 sits in that seat, would say, "Look, we are all in
- 19 this together."
- It was offensive, Miss Fink, and it was
- 21 clearly meant to simply play the race card.
- 22 Shame on you. And I believe it is time to
- 23 call for the question.
- 24 MS. FINK: I -- Madam Chairman.
- MS. WOOD: May I make a comment?

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1 MR. ISLER: I --
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- MS. WOOD: I strongly, am very --
- 3 MS. HARRIS: Jean.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Wood, thank you
- 5 Mrs. Harris.
- I am going to make a very similar comment,
- 7 to what I made before. This is something that is
- 8 being brought before us tonight, I know it is very
- 9 emotional for the people who have brought it before
- 10 us. I am going to ask you to please withdraw the
- 11 motion, the second, and that the Board deal with this
- 12 as a Board.
- I don't think this is the proper way to go
- 14 about it. I sympathize with the people who were
- 15 offended, but I go back to what I said before, if we
- 16 can't get together on certain issues, if they are
- 17 going to be brought in here cold, I think we need time
- 18 as a Board to discuss this, and I don't think that
- 19 this is the proper forum.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Let me just say, I disagree
- 21 with you --
- MS. HARRIS: You are out of order.
- MR. BRENTLEY: -- Mr. Isler, you are not
- 24 the one offended by it.
- MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley.

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: Your constituents are not
- 2 the ones --
- 3 MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley, you do not have
- 4 the floor.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: -- who were offended by it.
- 6 MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley, you do not have
- 7 the floor.
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: So I respectfully disagree
- 9 with that.
- MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. ISLER: Then I apologize, I meant no
- 12 offense.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, sir.
- MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley, you do not have
- 15 the floor.
- MR. BRENTLEY: And we have the big picture
- 17 here, is that that is the problem, African Americans,
- 18 every time, we are asked to go, to take another
- 19 chance, just wait.
- Oh, it will Be all right.
- MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley, you do not have
- 22 the floor.
- 23 MR. BRENTLEY: The racial issue must be
- 24 dealt with, you are not sweeping it under the floor,
- 25 this is the reason why all of this matter is going on.

- 1 MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: It is not about the schools,
- 3 it is about that man. And until we address it -- and
- 4 listen, you have got to open up, Bill. I didn't make
- 5 a choice on having this (indicating).
- 6 MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley, you had your
- 7 say.
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Address the race issues.
- 9 Address it.
- MR. ISLER: I am suggesting that we do
- 11 it as a Board
- MR. BRENTLEY: Address it.
- 13 And we want to play with it.
- MR. ISLER: I am agreeing with you,
- 15 Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: This racism is choking this
- 17 city to death.
- MR. ISLER: I don't think this is the forum
- 19 for this.
- 20 MR. BRENTLEY: It isn't the forum? Look
- 21 what just happened to Dr. Thompson.
- MS. HARRIS: Mr. Brentley, you do not have
- 23 the floor.
- 24 MR. BRENTLEY: That's not the forum. But
- 25 it happened. Deal with the race issue.

- We have a mayor of this city, two months
- 2 ago raised money for these Board members who agreed to
- 3 attack Dr. Thompson, and he met with them.
- I ask you, Mr. Isler, I represent African
- 5 Americans, he never once invited me to say what's my
- 6 opinion on children, and guess what, I am his Board
- 7 representative. Not once, did the mayor of the city
- 8 invite me.
- 9 What should I tell my little black kids,
- 10 that the mayor is only concerned about white kids in-
- 11 the city. He is only interested in raising funds for
- 12 white Board members, who have committed to attacking
- 13 that man?
- 14 Deal with the race issue, and everything
- 15 else will be -- just fall.
- 16 Deal with it.
- MS. HARRIS: Mrs. Fink -- or Mrs. Wood.
- 18 MS. WOOD: I agree with Mr. Isler, this is
- 19 not the place; I don't agree with Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: It is not the place, I know
- 21 you don't.
- MS. WOOD: And in my heart, and if you know
- 23 me as a person, you know that is not true, the things
- 24 you are saying.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I know how you voted.

- MS. WOOD: You know how I voted tonight,
- 2 Mark.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: I know comments made in
- 4 private, about African American children, by the same
- 5 three members here.
- 6 MS. WOOD: Never from my mouth.
- 7 Mr. Brentley --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Same Board members.
- 9 MS. WOOD: -- you better stop making
- 10 accusations about me.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Just stop, there it is.
- 12 That supremist thing, right?
- MS. WOOD: I have never, ever, made any
- 14 racial remark, and I will not stand for it.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Deal with the racism.
- MS. WOOD: And I have never asked, or
- 17 intend to put pressure on Dr. Thompson to leave this
- 18 city.
- I do want a little pressure to work with
- 20 Dr. Thompson, and he with us.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Look --
- MS. WOOD: That is the difference between
- 23 what has been happening, and what we would like to
- 24 happen.
- MR. BRENTLEY: We can't solve your

- 1 differences inside, you folks got to deal with that.
- MS. WOOD: Yes, we can get together. But I
- 3 think --
- 4 MR. BRENTLEY: You got to deal with that.
- 5 MS. WOOD: You need to stop making
- 6 accusations, until we talk.
- 7 MR. BRENTLEY: I am not making accusations,
- 8 you just displayed in the last hour and a half,
- 9 your --
- MS. WOOD: No, that was not racial.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Oh, it wasn't?
- MS. WOOD: No, it wasn't.
- MR. BRENTLEY: It wasn't?
- 14 MS. WOOD: And I am getting tired of
- 15 staying quiet, and listening to people making
- 16 accusations, too.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Maybe that's what we need to
- 18 do, talk, let's talk. You said it before.
- MS. WOOD: That's what we need to do.
- MR. BRENTLEY: You come here, you surprise
- 21 us with stuff, you attack certain members of the
- 22 staff, we are supposed to sit back quiet, just like
- 23 this whole thing here.
- MS. WOOD: Are you going to take a word,
- 25 she used over and over again, about her

- 1 constituents?
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: Were you there?
- 3 MS. WOOD: I know that word that she uses.
- 4 MR. BRENTLEY: Were you there, did you talk
- 5 to anybody who was there?
- 6 MS. WOOD: I am sorry, Mr. Matthews, did
- 7 you not quote what was said?
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Call for the vote.
- 9 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- MS. WOOD: That quote has been made many
- 11 times. I just want to make that noted.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Call for the vote.
- 13 Everybody has to put this thing back.
- MS. FINK: One more time.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- 16 MS. FINK: I will admit that I have said
- 17 some things about Dr. Thompson.
- MR. BRENTLEY: That's right.
- 19 MS. FINK: I have said --
- MR. BRENTLEY: That's right.
- MS. FINK: -- that I want to be here, to see
- 22 him leave, I said that.
- MR. BRENTLEY: That's right.
- MS. FINK: You know why? Because I felt
- 25 that he did not understand the City of Pittsburgh, and

- 1 what the neighborhood schools meant to people.
- The way that things were done last year,
- 3 was a sin and a shame. There was no discussion of
- 4 criteria, things went horribly out of kilter, and
- 5 people were slammed over the head, that their schools
- 6 were going to close.
- 7 And my heart broke for every one of them.
- And when my community hurts, I hurt with
- 9 them, and I, like I said before, I shoot from the lip.
- 10 If I used an offensive choice of words last night,
- 11 instead of saying the word constituent, I am sorry I
- 12 offended anybody. I didn't mean to, and I didn't mean
- 13 any different classes of people. I meant the people
- 14 in my District, and last year, when all of that stuff
- 15 started, I was not Board president.
- I was sent here by the people of
- 17 District 7, to represent them.
- 18 And when things went badly for them, and
- 19 their communities were -- they were losing their
- 20 schools, and the communities --
- MR. BRENTLEY: We lost schools, too. We
- 22 lost schools, too.
- MS. FINK: I didn't say you didn't, Mark.
- 24 MR. BRENTLEY: We cried and bled like the
- 25 rest.

- 1 MS. FINK: I Didn't say you didn't.
- MR. BRENTLEY: But You reopened three.
- MS. FINK: I tried for four. Okay?
- Anyway, I said some things, because I was
- 5 hurting for the communities, and they were hurting.
- And when I get mad, I say things. And
- 7 sometimes I'm sorry, and sometimes I'm not.
- And I believe if we learn to work together,
- 9 it's going to have to be a two-way street. Because
- 10 you are no bed of roses, when you start calling racism
- 11 every time things don't go your way.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Hey, listen, Jean --
- MS. FINK: That's not fair, either.
- 14 MR. BRENTLEY: -- you said last time, the
- 15 horse is out of the barn, you said it, you know what I
- 16 mean.
- MS. HARRIS: Mr. Matthews.
- 18 MR. MATTHEWS: You know, I am glad that you
- 19 said that you are sorry, but it's always that when
- 20 something happens in our community, the thing that we
- 21 always get, is that "we are sorry, next time we will
- 22 know."
- 23 And how many times do we have to constantly
- 24 come up to say this.
- 25 And I don't respect Mrs. Wood, her

- 1 statement, saying that that's the way you talk, and
- 2 that's your language. But as a Board president, you
- 3 have to be sensitive to every group.
- I can't go to an all white area, and say,
- 5 "Hey, I fight for my people, you got to have someone
- 6 fight for you," you know, because of the racial
- 7 overtone that has been played with that.
- 8 MS. FINK: You don't come to my area, Alex,
- 9 how could you say anything wrong?
- 10 MR. BRENTLEY: She is missing the point.
- MR. MATTHEWS: All I am saying to -- all
- 12 that I am saying to you, as the Board president, there
- 13 is something you have got to demonstrate to everyone,
- 14 and one of the things you should have said was, that
- 15 you weren't there fighting for your people, you were
- 16 there fighting for all people. And it is not just
- 17 your constituents, because as the president of the
- 18 Board, you have to represent everybody.
- 19 We have had this discussion. And so for
- 20 you to come out and say that, the only way I can ever
- 21 take that, is that "I fight for my people", meaning
- 22 Caucasian folks, "and you fight for yours," and that's
- 23 the only way I can take it, because that's the only
- 24 example that you have given me, to ever go by. Now, I
- 25 can only go by what you say.

- And that's how I took it, other folks took
- 2 it, Mark took it.
- 3 You know, so it is always offensive to us,
- 4 and all we get all the time is that "I'm sorry. I'm
- 5 sorry."
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: Call for the vote.
- 7 MS. FINK: Yes, please.
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: At least go on the record,
- 9 we are on the record, we are trying to address this
- 10 issue, it is choking the city.
- 11 Call for the vote.
- MR. TAYLOR: I have a final comment.
- I think the real problem, that we have
- 14 here, is the public's hearing it, and on either -- on
- 15 wither side, whether it's -- and if it's a racial
- 16 remark, then that's real horrific for the District,
- 17 but even to make the District, that "I fought for my
- 18 District," which is what you said, Mr. Brentley didn't
- 19 fight for his, is still not the thinking that a Board
- 20 president should have.
- 21 There should never be -- sometime in our
- 22 discussion, we will say, "This problem is in my
- 23 District," but as Board president, it has to be always
- 24 we, our, because people can begin to think, that she
- 25 may even think, my children, what it really should be

- 1 as Board president, our children.
- 2 And that perception is out there, it can't
- 3 be denied, and I think that's something that you
- 4 really have to think about, you know, as the School
- 5 Board president, have there been some members of the
- 6 public, who may have lost confidence in you.
- 7 MS. HARRIS: Okay. We will have the roll
- 8 call.
- 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is a roll call on the
- 10 motion to reconsider the election of Mrs. Fink as
- 11 president.
- MS. HARRIS: What is this now?
- 13 ATTORNEY WEISS: Do you have your motion,
- 14 Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Do what?
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Do you want to restate the
- 17 motion, because I didn't have it.
- MR. MATTHEWS: The motion is to have the --
- 19 to redo the reelection of Mrs. Fink, as Board
- 20 president.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Okay. All right.
- MR. MATTHEWS: You undo the re -- the
- 23 election. Reverse the election.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, and I am voting yes,

- 1 because I think it's important, and it's time that we
- 2 stop playing around, and begin to address these real
- 3 issues.
- We have differences, but let's deal with
- 5 this race issue, first, and furthermore, the comments
- 6 were offensive, and it's important that we support
- 7 this motion, because this thing will save this city,
- 8 because of the leadership of this president, it
- 9 clearly draws a line in our city.
- Now we have got folks running around
- 11 talking about, what side are you on, I am on this
- 12 side.
- Never before, have we brought this thing to
- 14 a level like this.
- 15 I am voting yes.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- 19 MS. HARRIS: No.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 21 MR. ISLER: I am going to abstain. I do
- 22 not think this is the proper way. Mr. Brentley, I
- 23 agree with you, we have to deal with this, but I do
- 24 not think this is the proper way to do it.
- 25 I think this Board needs a very, very

- 1 serious discussion about this, and I am abstaining,
- 2 because I do not think this is the way to go about to
- 3 do it.
- 4 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: No.
- 8 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: No.
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: No.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: The motion is defeated,
- 15 there are three yes votes, five no votes, and an
- 16 abstention.
- MS. FINK: Is there any other business to
- 18 come before this Board?
- MR. MATTHEWS: I want to make one more
- 20 comment, please.
- I was actually going to come up, I have two
- 22 other motions that I was going to bring up, but I am
- 23 not going to do that, because one was dealing with
- 24 censorship, but I am not going to do that right now,
- 25 but I believe that we have got to deal with this

- 1 issue, this is more than just now, these Board
- 2 members, this is community effort.
- Because, you know, something has to be
- 4 done. And like I said, I was going to bring up two
- 5 other motions, and one was dealing with some type of
- 6 censor, because of the actions that our Board
- 7 president's taken and, so, you know, I think that it's
- 8 important that we have to start dialoguing somehow,
- 9 and start talking about this race issue, because
- 10 everything that we have done, shows that there is a
- 11 serious racial divide.
- 12 And I know folks don't like talking about
- 13 it, which is why it continues to exist, and unless we
- 14 start dealing with it, and start bringing it out, and
- 15 when I tell you that this is a racial issue, and then
- 16 you say no it is not, and then we go ahead with it,
- 17 but you haven't addressed why it is not a racial
- 18 issue, but all of the facts point it to, then that's
- 19 the only thing that we can lead to, that we can
- 20 conform with it.
- I think it is very important that you have
- 22 three African Americans on here who feel the same way,
- 23 but yet, you know, not once have you come and said,
- 24 you know, "Listen, I hear this is a racial issue, what
- 25 can I do to try to build this relationship? What can

- 1 I do to make this a better situation, so that it
- 2 doesn't" -- "so that I am not being" -- "the actions
- 3 that I am taking, are not racial?"
- Those are things that we have to do. And I
- 5 think until we start doing that, every time something
- 6 comes up, because of the fact that, you know, comments
- 7 that you made, putting Dr. Thompson on the leash, all
- 8 of those things are racial. And all of the time, like
- 9 I said before, all we get is, "I'm sorry, I didn't
- 10 mean to."
- And so you know, I am not going to present
- 12 that tonight, but I just want you to know how I feel,
- 13 I feel very strongly about it, it bothers me, last
- 14 night, I mean, I just kept, you know talking about it,
- 15 because I just couldn't believe that it occurred, and
- 16 I would just hope that the -- that we deal with this
- 17 issue of race, on this Board.
- 18 You have three African Americans on here,
- 19 and it seems like the African American opinion is not
- 20 taken serious, and one of the things that have to be
- 21 done, is it has to be a Board decision totally.
- 22 And so I will take Mr. Isler's suggestion,
- 23 and we will deal with this thing, as a Board, we will
- 24 deal with it.
- But I am really, really upset, just as, I

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know you are upset, but I am upset, because once again
   my community has been affected, and I am saying my
   community, because now I am talking about the African
   American community.
