Finally, at the executive session immediately before this legislative meeting, the Board discussed student discipline cases that involved violations of various portions of the Code of Student Conduct.

The Board does not vote at executive sessions.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

November 26, 2002

DIRECTORS:

The Committee on Student Services recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

Proposals/Grant Awards

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to submit proposals for grants and accept grant awards in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 7, inclusive.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That upon approval of the grant by the granting agency, the Board authorize the establishment of appropriate accounts and, where necessary to implement the grant, authorize the advancement of funds to operate the program until the grant and fees are received.

- Submission of an application to the US Department of Health and Human Services for \$1,159,511 of PPS Prevention/Early Intervention Initiative funds over a period of three years. Funds will support the promoting Alternative THinking Strategies (PATHS) curriculum for Head Start and elementary school children at eleven of the District's elementary schools that exhibit the greatest need for prevention/early intervention mental health services. Dates of service include June 1, 2003 through May 31, 2006.
- 2. Submission of an application to the PADOE for \$1,010,649 to establish a pilot project to increase teachers' ability to integrate technology into curricula and instruction by: 1) training a cohort of teachers to serve as technology mentors across the district and 2) furthering development of our web-based user interface that will interact with PPS's student information system and Webstars, eventually providing teacher and parent access to each child's homework assignments, activity schedule, grades, assessment data, etc. Dates of service include January 1, 2003 through December 31, 2003.

- 3. Submission of a proposal to the Allegheny County Health Department for \$125,522 of Tobacco Health Initiative funds over a three-year period of time. Pittsburgh Public Schools seeks funding for a support specialist position to coordinate all facets of service delivery. Dates of service include January 1, 2003 through June 30, 2005.
- 4. Acceptance of a \$7,500 grant of Mentoring—Start on Success #14 funds from the PADOE to provide mentoring support to interested school districts wishing to replicate the first phase of the PPS Start on Success Program, called Project M.O.V.E., which shall include an electronic message Board for use by all participating districts: a process for dissemination of Project M.O.V.E. materials, and a one-day workshop for participating districts. Dates of service include December 1, 2002 through June 15, 2003.
- 5. Acceptance of a grant of \$7,500 of Expansion/Replication of Start on Success at Perry TA Funds from the PADOE to provide for the replication of the PPS Start on Success Program, Project M.O.V.E., for Perry TA students. This project will establish a year-long career development class for fifteen to twenty students and develop an individualized ten-week community mentorship for each student. Dates of service include December 1, 2002 through June 15, 2003.
- 6. Acceptance of \$7,500 of Expansion/Replication of Start on Success at funds from the PADOE to provide for the expansion of the PPS Start on Success Program at Langley High School. This project shall establish a year-long career development class for fifteen to twenty students and develop an individualized ten-week community mentorship for each student. Dates of service include December 1, 2002 through June 15, 2003.
- 7. Acceptance of \$10,670 of City of Pittsburgh Operation Weed and Seed funds from the East Liberty Development, Inc. to support the following programs at Peabody High School: Ninth Grade Team Building/Violence Reduction, School-Wide Mediation, and Beautification/Community Service Project. Dates of service include December 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003.

- 5. Mercy Behavioral Health Mental Health Services To provide school-based services at the Options Center, including but not limited to staff consultation, parent/guardian consultation, student assessments, initial case opening/management and classroom education on mental health and wellness, as needed. Dates of service include November 2002 through June 2003. Payment shall be at the rate of \$31.50 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$12,000 from Account # 4021-218-2190-330.
- 7. America's Choice/NCEE For professional education materials and services to support the implementation of the America's Choice Whole School Reform Model. Dates of service include November 2002 through June 2003. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$65,000 from Account # 4204-104-1490-323.
- 8. Lazor-Richason Associates To conduct T-BASE Training to engage teachers in the effective use of applied behavior analysis, while collaborating with their peers to design, implement and evaluate their classroom management systems.

Lazor-Richason shall provide 170 in-service and mentoring hours as well as fifteen off-site support hours. Dates of service include December 1, 2002 through July 30, 2003. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$21,700 from Account # 5131-201-1231-323.

- 9. WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolutions adopted by the Board of School Directors of The School District of Pittsburgh (the "Board"), the Board authorized the issuance of The School District of Pittsburgh, General Obligation Bonds, Series 1998 and The School District of Pittsburgh General Obligation Refunding Notes, 1996 Series B (collectively the "Bonds"); and,

WHEREAS, the Board has determined to defease the lien of a portion of the Bonds in order to reduce the annual debt service payments of The School District of Pittsburgh(the "School District") and in order to reduce the outstanding debt of the School District;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That the President, Vice Presidents, Secretary or Assistant Secretaries of the Board (the "Designated Officials") are individually or jointly authorized to undertake and perform such actions, which are necessary for the defeasance of the lien of a portion of the principal amount of the Bonds, not in excess of \$10,000,000, in order to achieve present value savings (net of transaction costs) as a percentage of par which is in excess of 5%.
- 2. That the Designated Officials are authorized and directed to establish with J.P Morgan Trust Company, National Association, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania ("Escrow Trustee"), in trust for a portion of the owners of the Bonds, an escrow account pursuant to the terms of an Escrow Trust Agreement (the "Escrow Trust Agreement") or provide other similar instructions to the Escrow Trustee for the deposit and maintenance of securities pledged to the payment of a portion of the Bonds, as they become due and payable. The Designated Officials are hereby authorized and directed to contract with the Escrow Trustee for its services in the capacity of Escrow Trustee under the Escrow Trust Agreement.
- 3. That the Designated Officials are authorized to purchase the Government Obligations as defined in the Escrow Trust Agreement in order to pay the debt service and defease the lien of a portion of the Bonds as provided for in the Escrow Trust Agreement.
- 4. That the payment of the fees and expenses, if any, of Co-Bond Counsel, Wayne D. Gerhold, Esq. and R.Darryl Ponton & Associates, the Escrow Trustee, The Arbitrage Group, Inc. for the preparation of a verification report, the Financial Advisor, Public Financial Management, Inc. and any other fees and expenses related to this transaction are hereby authorized.

- When the wall carpet was removed from the second floor columns, it was discovered that the subsurface plaster was cracking and deteriorated.
- The closet and adjoining wall pipe chase were constructed to conceal an existing building stand pipe and to provide additional janitorial service storage. The stand pipe was exposed during the demolition of the adjoining wall and did not show

up on the 1975 as-built drawings.
G. The contract drawings called for high impact board in the classrooms areas only at these locations. Given the schools's continuing problems with corridor wall damage, the high impact board with

lexan backing is being provided to reduce damage. Not part of the original scope of work, this wall had been subjected to water damage from a section of leaking fin tube radiator; which caused the plaster to "bloom" and fall away. Since this plaster was identified as an asbestos containing material, it was removed for health and safety reasons and wall refinished.

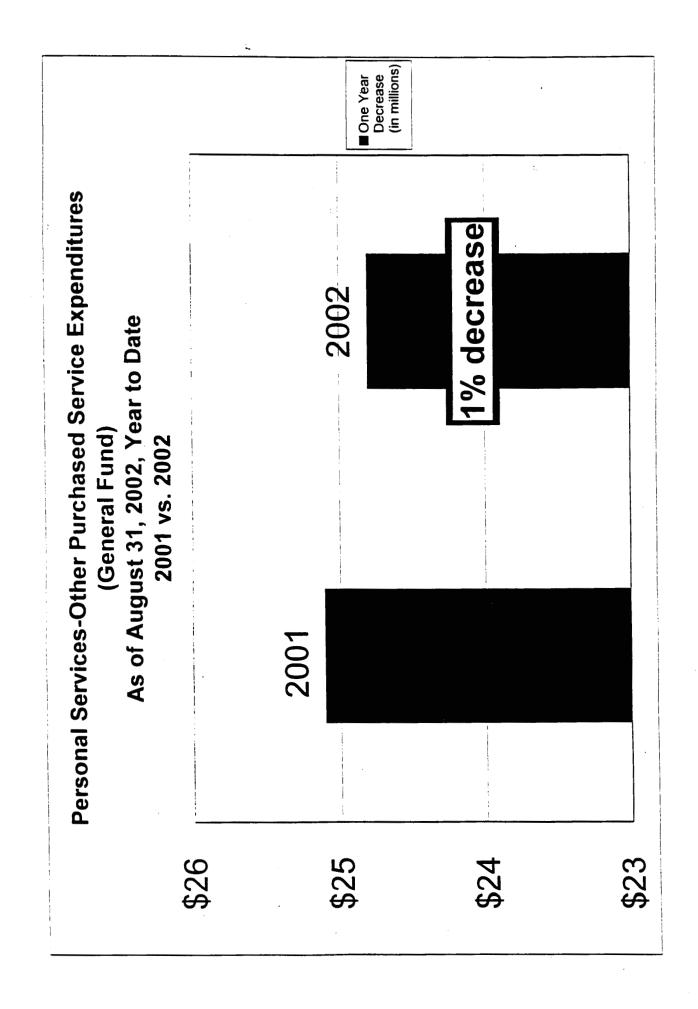
GRAPHS YEAR TO DATE SEPTEMBER 2001 vs. SEPTEMBER 2002

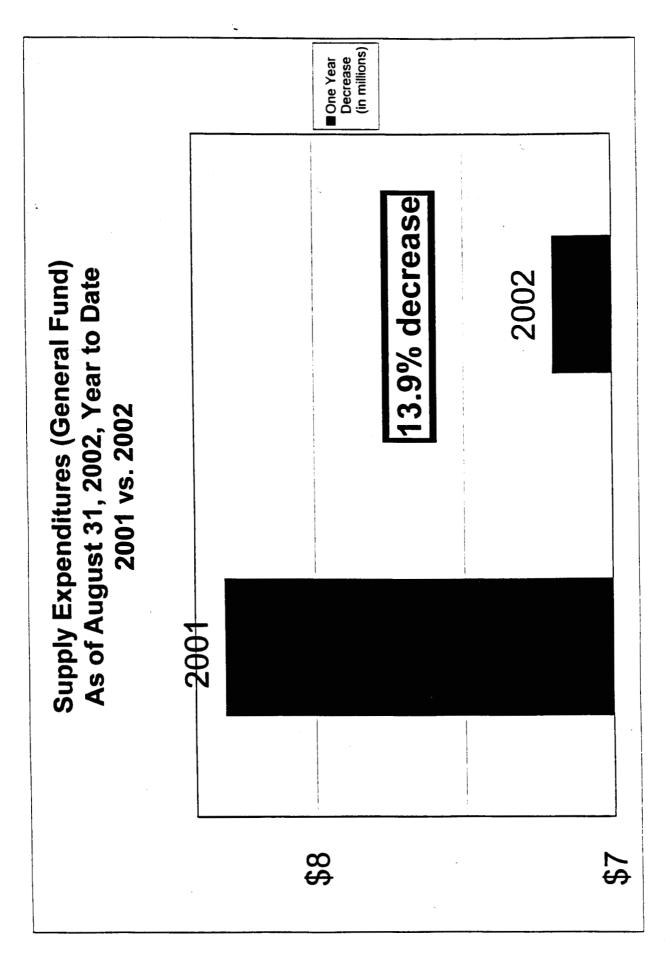
GRAPHS YEAR TO DATE AUGUST 2001 vs. AUGUST 2002

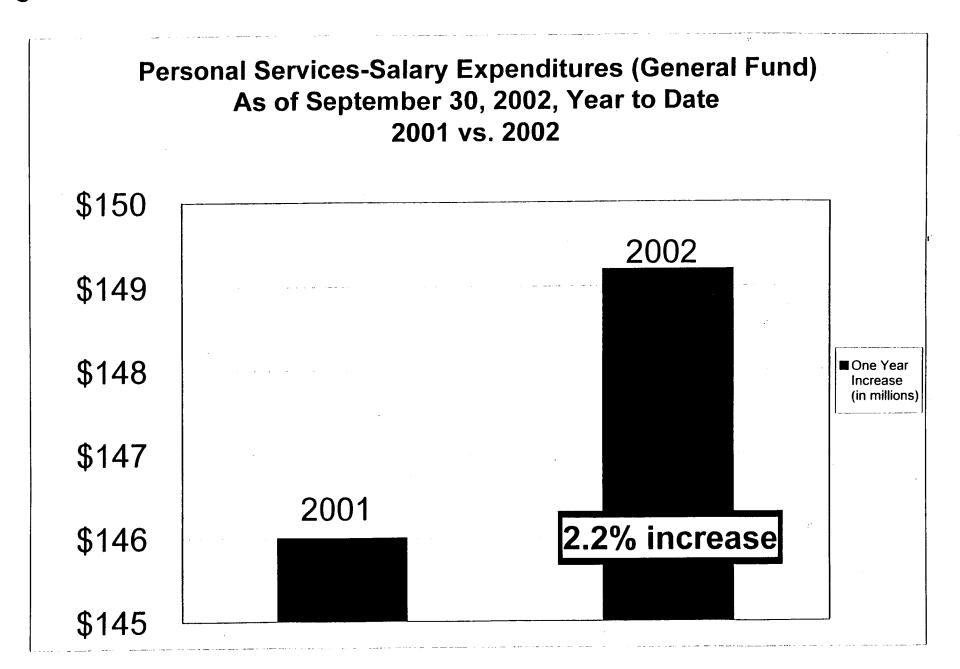


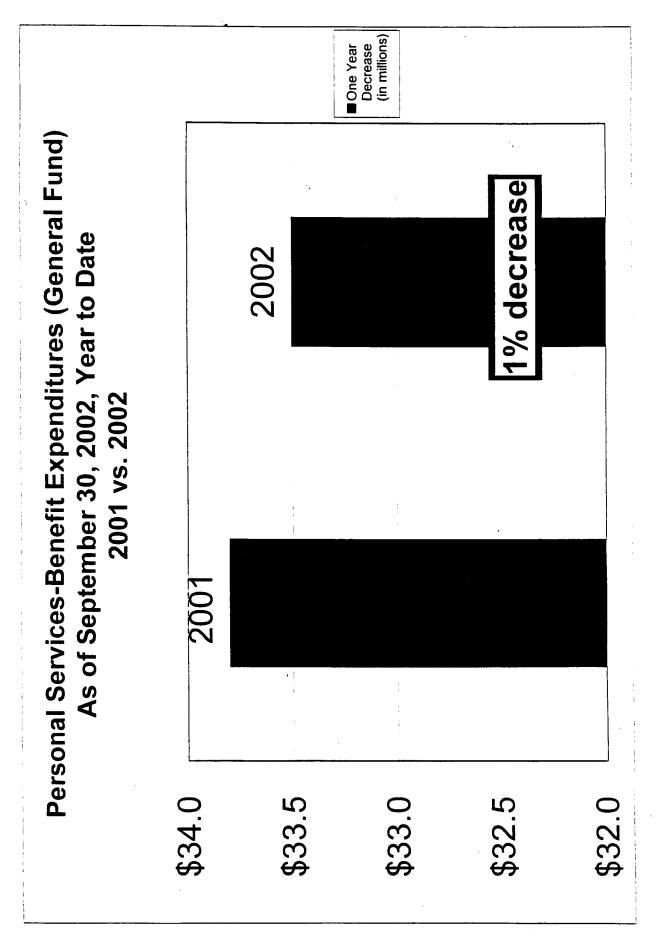


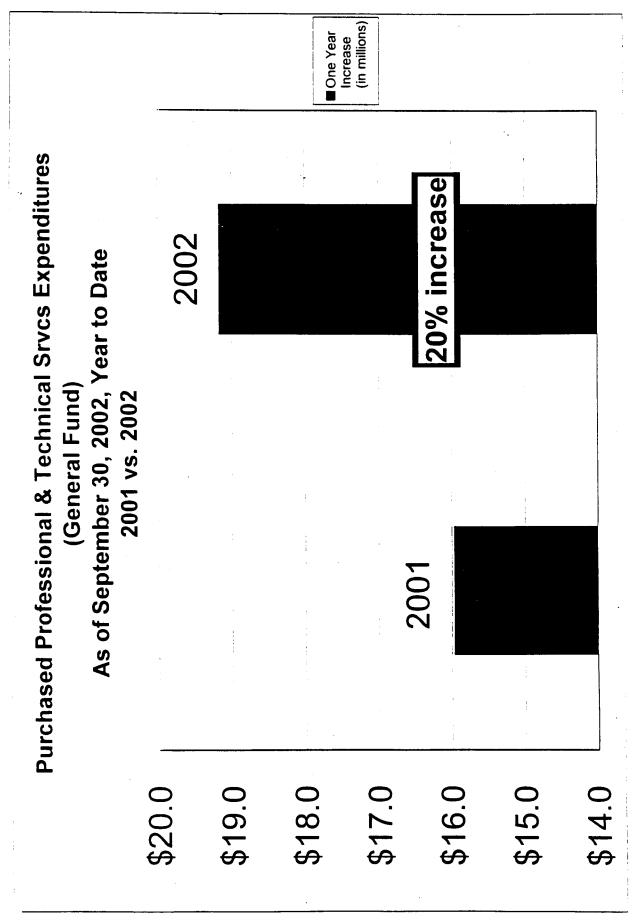


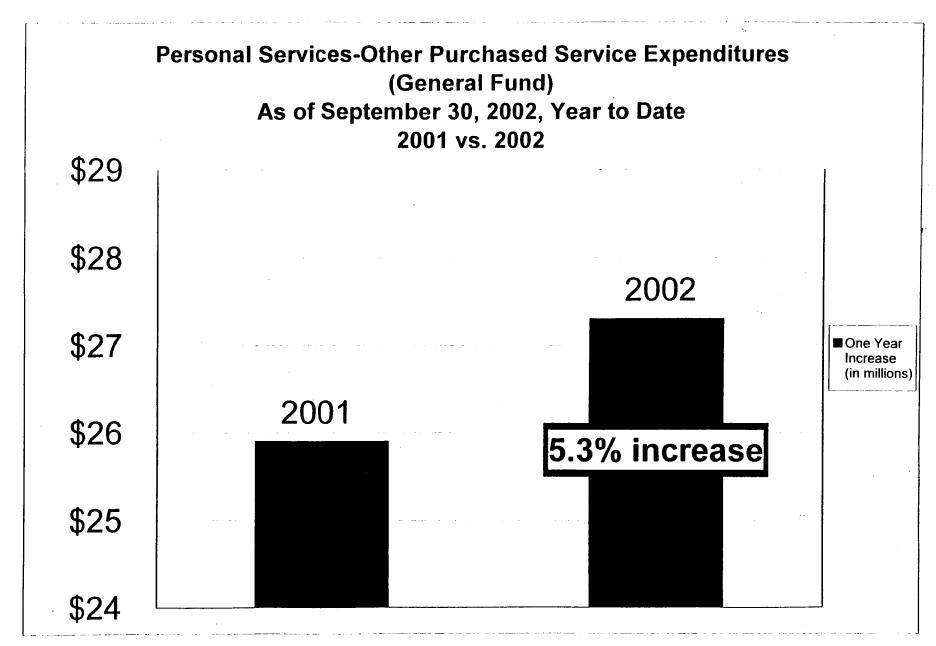


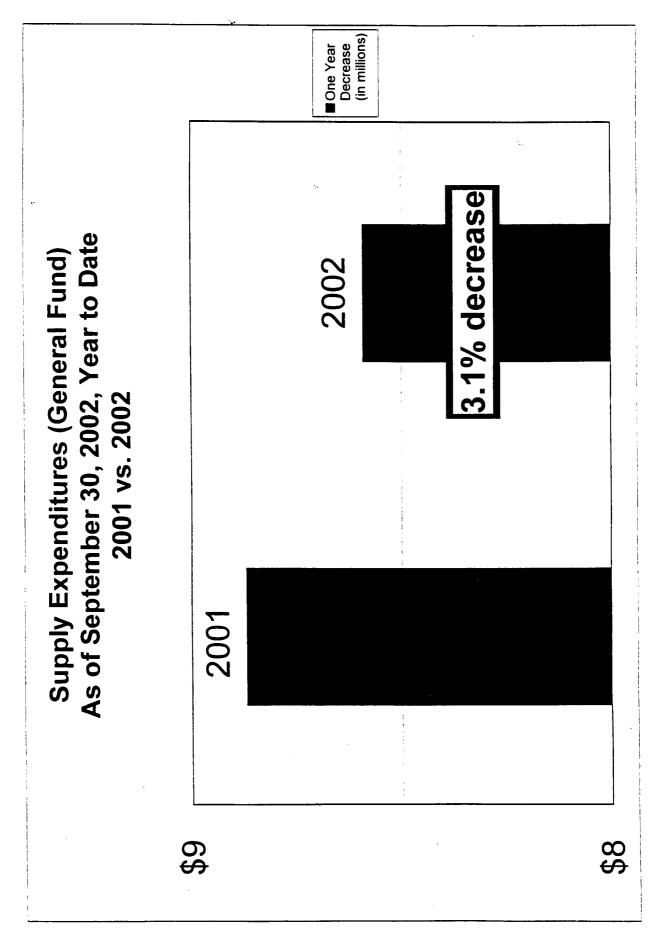

- 6 is at the Board office.
- 7 MS. FINK: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 8 MS. COLAIZZI: Dr. Thompson, and I received
- 9 the letter, and if I am not mistaken, it is addressed
- 10 to all Board members, however, Robin is here, our
- 11 secretary, and I think she can -- didn't all of the
- 12 Board members get that?
- MS. WENGER: All of the Board members got a
- 14 copy.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yeah. And I know I
- 16 personally sent a letter back to that parent, to
- 17 clarify that the Board had never not approved it.
- They asked for us to rescind our vote,
- 19 to -- our decision not to allow them to go.
- So I just wrote a letter back simply
- 21 stating that we never voted on it at all, let alone
- 22 voting it down.
- So -- but I can -- I believe I still have
- 24 the letter, and I know that Robin has it in the
- 25 office, so Dr. Kemp, I am sure you can get it from

- 1 Robin.
- DR. THOMPSON: Did the letter indicate that
- 3 somebody from the staff said it was voted down, or
- 4 implicate anybody they got the message from here, or
- 5 they just assumed?
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: With all honesty,
- 7 Dr. Thompson, I can't remember it word for word, but
- 8 it came off, from what I can recall, that it was, that
- 9 they were being told that it was coming from staff,
- 10 that the Board had voted against their trip, sir.
- DR. THOMPSON: Which staff; the school
- 12 staff, or the central staff; do you know?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Oh, I am assuming the school
- 14 staff, since this was the Allderdice German Club.
- DR. THOMPSON: Thank you.
- MS. HARRIS: Dr. Thompson --
- MS. FINK: Wait a minute, Darlene. I need
- 18 to have the record reflect that Mr. Brentley,
- 19 Mr. Matthews and Mr. Taylor have now joined the rest
- 20 of the Board.
- Go ahead.
- MS. HARRIS: I, too, received the letter,
- 23 and I did call the parent up, and he, I believe,
- 24 received the information from his teacher, so I did
- 25 call the teacher, and I believe there was some

- 1 misinformation from the principal of the school.
- DR. THOMPSON: I would appreciate it, next
- 3 time you receive a letter like that, if I am not
- 4 copied, make sure you contact me right a way, and save
- 5 you some phone calls, and I will get back with you.
- 6 Thank you.
- 7 MS. FINK: Okay. Thank you.
- 8 All right. Does anyone else have any
- 9 questions?
- 10 Yes.
- MS. WOOD: Okay.
- On page 2, item 3, is a submission of a
- 13 proposal, I would like to have it on the record, that
- 14 for this position, that we have an amendment on the
- 15 proposal, that at the end -- six months prior to the
- 16 end of the date of the job running to June 30th, that
- 17 it be evaluated, and this is to prevent -- I think
- 18 this is something that we should do with all new
- 19 positions that's funded by any proposal that we
- 20 evaluate it six months prior to the end, so that if
- 21 you intend to keep the position going, out of
- 22 01 funds, that we have an opportunity to discuss it,
- 23 evaluate the position itself, and make proper
- 24 decisions on where we want to go with it, after the
- 25 funds run out.

- 1 It's item 3, on page 2.
- 2 MS. FINK: Yes.
- 3 Mrs. Wood, I think that's a good idea.
- I would go so far as to suggest that the
- 5 Board secretaries would maintain a sunset file, if you
- 6 will, and have the dates of positions like this, that
- 7 are funded for a two-year period, or a three-year
- 8 period, that we know six months in advance that those
- 9 things are flagged for an evaluation, and then flagged
- 10 again when the contract is about to run out, so that
- 11 we can make a decision as to seeking new funding, or
- 12 funding it directly, or whatever, or terminating it,
- 13 whatever we want to do.
- But we need to begin to keep track of this,
- 15 because I don't think we do an especially good job of
- 16 that.
- There is so much that goes on around here,
- 18 I am not making a fault about it, with anyone, I am
- 19 just saying that we need to set up a mechanism, and I
- 20 think that would be appropriate.
- 21 MS. WOOD: I am just saying it, putting it
- 22 on the record, we will set up that mechanism, and that
- 23 when we set up any kind -- accept any kind of a
- 24 proposal, that includes a position that goes from this
- 25 date to that date, that is funded by the proposal,

- 1 that we have a time that we definitely evaluate it,
- 2 before any suggestions of keeping that position.
- 3 Because that's been a problem for a long time, that
- 4 sometimes we end up with projects that end up
- 5 permanent positions.
- 6 MS. HARRIS: I would like to second that
- 7 amendment.
- 8 MS. FINK: All right. First, are you
- 9 putting that in the form of a motion, then, Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Give everybody the opportunity
- 11 to discuss my proposal first, and then I will be glad
- 12 to put it in a motion.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Matthews.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you, Madam
- 15 Chairperson.
- I do want to say, that out of courtesy, I
- 17 would appreciate that when three Board members are not
- 18 present, that the meeting not start, because that same
- 19 courtesy is given to other Board members when they are
- 20 out of the room, the meeting does not begin until all
- 21 of the Board members are seated, when you know that
- 22 they are present in the building.
- My question, and comment, to the proposal
- 24 on the table, are you saying the evaluation is done
- 25 six months prior to, or that it begins in the sixth

- 1 month -- six months prior?
- 2 MS. WOOD: A discussion -- it should be
- 3 evaluated through the whole period of the position,
- 4 but that six months prior to the end of that position
- 5 being funded, that it be brought to the Board for
- 6 discussion, on whether there is any recommendation to
- 7 keep that position going, or -- and which would come
- 8 out of different funding, or our 01 funds; that the
- 9 discussion be held about the position six months prior
- 10 to the end of the funded period.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right.
- I guess my personal concern, because this
- 13 is the position that we just really brought him back
- 14 on, on board, if I am not mistaken, you are talking
- 15 about item No. 3?
- 16 MS. WOOD: Item No. 3, is a funded -- it is
- 17 coming from a fund --
- 18 MR. MATTHEWS: Page 3 is the other one.
- 19 Okay.
- 20 MS. WOOD: -- it is a position that is
- 21 strictly to --
- 22 MR. MATTHEWS: I'm sorry. I was talking
- 23 about the other one.
- MS. WOOD: I am talking about these kind or
- 25 positions, ones that an initiative is going forward,

- 1 where we are accepting money --
- 2 MR. ISLER: Okay. That's --
- MS. WOOD: -- and it requires a position --
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: I'm sorry, that's fine.
- 5 MS. WOOD: Okay.
- 6 MR. MATTHEWS: I was on the wrong item
- 7 No. 3, because the item No. 3 I was referring to ended
- 8 in June, June 30th, and so it wouldn't --
- 9 MS. WOOD: Yes.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Which item?
- MS. WOOD: It is on page 2, the top item,
- 12 item 3.
- And I am referring to, I am asking that
- 14 staff in the future, any time that an initiative is
- 15 brought forward, that is being funded, that requires a
- 16 position, that on the proposal it is added that it
- 17 will be evaluated six months prior to the end, so that
- 18 a discussion could be made whether this is going to
- 19 continue as part of the system.
- I am putting that in the form of an
- 21 amendment.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Just one more question. You
- 23 know, Dr. Thompson, do you have an opinion, or does
- 24 the staff have an opinion on this recommendation, at
- 25 all?

- Because I am pretty much confused. So I --
- MS. WOOD: There is no trouble with the
- 3 recommendation.
- 4 MR. BRENTLEY: No, I am just asking the
- 5 staff, just do you have an opinion at all?
- 6 DR. THOMPSON: Let me make sure I
- 7 understood, Miss Wood, you said on a contract, that is
- 8 two to three years, right, that you want a six month
- 9 evaluation, before it ends, is that right?
- MS. WOOD: Some of these jobs are for a
- 11 three-year period, some of these jobs are for a
- 12 one-year period, it depends on what the initiative
- 13 calls for.
- So it would mean, that six months prior to
- 15 the end of the funding period, that is when an
- 16 evaluation, and a discussion would be held between
- 17 staff and Board, to discuss whether there is any
- 18 recommendations for continuing it, giving us an
- 19 evaluation, so that what has happened in the past, is
- 20 that very often it goes by, and the next thing you
- 21 know, the job is on there, and we have more jobs than
- 22 we had in the first year.
- 23 So this has piggybacked over a long period
- 24 of time, and I think this is a way of not only
- 25 evaluating the initiatives, but also determining

- 1 whether that position is still needed, in the system.
- DR. THOMPSON: The only hesitation,
- 3 Miss Wood, if it's for a year, then six months, you
- 4 know, you are only getting into the prior six months
- 5 of it.
- One time you stated it should be evaluated
- 7 prior to the continuation, maybe for a year, we could
- 8 do it two months prior to the end of it, because if
- 9 you do six months, we have only been going through the
- 10 whole cycle for six months, so it is hard to evaluate
- 11 something like that.
- MS. WOOD: I think the appropriate time
- 13 would be six months for anything over a year.
- DR. THOMPSON: Okay.
- MS. WOOD: Two months.
- DR. THOMPSON: Okay.
- MS. WOOD: Because most of these projects
- 18 are at least two years, and most of the time three.
- DR. THOMPSON: As long as you put that, I
- 20 have no problems with that.
- 21 MR. MATTHEWS: Can I just make two
- 22 comments?
- MS. FINK: Sure.
- MR. MATTHEWS: One, I think that is a good
- 25 suggestion, but I would really like, if it could be

- 1 onto this one, and then let's make it policy, that
- 2 indicates that any, any proposals, or any --
- 3 MS. WOOD: A written policy?
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: I am saying a written
- 5 policy, right. Not just a --
- 6 MS. WOOD: Then I would ask that a written
- 7 policy be proposed by the staff. That a written --
- 8 I'm sorry.
- 9 MS. FINK: All right.
- MS. WOOD: Can we go on just the amendment
- 11 first, and then we can discuss that.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Okay. Just for this
- 13 contract, but then I would like to add, if you can add
- 14 to your motion to your amendment -- right -- well, no,
- 15 when she makes the amendment.
- MR. ISLER: Right.
- MR. MATTHEWS: When you make it, that as
- 18 opposed to this contract being evaluated six months
- 19 prior, that there is a yearly evaluation that is also
- 20 done, so that every year we know. Because at the end
- 21 of the first year, we may want to make sure that this
- 22 is something that we may want to continue on in a
- 23 program.
- But we can still do the evaluation on the
- 25 yearly basis, so we know exactly where we are headed,

- 1 and then we can begin to give indication to the
- 2 program, to say, "Look, we are unhappy with the
- 3 services, and you need to make such and such
- 4 adjustments."
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: I will just be brief. As
- 6 someone who spent over a weekend working in social
- 7 service, and at a time, had -- many years ago had a
- 8 contract such as these with the School District, I
- 9 believe in Mrs. Wood's proposal that they do be
- 10 evaluated on a six month basis, but I think we also
- 11 need to really make sure we are doing a true
- 12 evaluation of social service programs.
- And one thing I would like to take a long
- 14 look at, is the instrument, and the criteria that is
- 15 going to be used to evaluate some of those social
- 16 service programs, because I think we have had a number
- 17 of programs in this District, that haven't delivered
- 18 what they said they were going to deliver, and yet
- 19 they are still, to this day, contractors with the
- 20 School District.
- 21 MS. FINK: You could end up on a committee
- 22 to write that.
- 23 Okay.
- MS. WOOD: So I will rephrase.
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: Go ahead.

- 1 MS. WOOD: I will rephrase the amendment.
- 2 This amendment is being written for this particular
- 3 proposal only, we will then get together, and write a
- 4 policy that will cover other proposals of this type,
- 5 in the future.
- For this amendment, for this item No. 3 on
- 7 page 2, I ask for an amendment that this be evaluated
- 8 on a yearly basis, and six months prior to the end of
- 9 the funding period, to make any determinations on
- 10 future usage of that position.
- 11 MS. HARRIS: Second.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- Do we have to vote on the amendment?
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Yes.
- 15 MS. FINK: All right.
- We will now have a roll call, on the
- 17 amendment.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes?
- 22 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: Yes.

               MS. WOOD: I just want it on the record,
   and in our minutes, that it be understood, by staff,

that in using these three consultants for producing a

25 document for -- report to the community, that the

24

- 1 Board be given the opportunity, in its rough draft, to
- 2 view it, make any changes they feel necessary, and
- 3 have a discussion on it, before it goes to final
- 4 print.
- 5 MS. HARRIS: Do we need to vote on it?
- 6 MS. FINK: I don't think so.
- 7 Does anyone -- okay. Does anyone on staff
- 8 have a problem with us doing that?
- 9 Mrs. Crawford, then you could please make
- 10 note that we would like to see the draft.
- MS. CRAWFORD: Yes.
- MS. FINK: Thank you.
- All right. Do we have any other questions?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I have a --
- MS. FINK: Go ahead and then --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Question on No. 5,
- 17 Dr. Thompson, can you just explain on No. 5, page 3,
- 18 the definition of mental health and wellness as
- 19 needed, what do you mean by that?
- DR. THOMPSON: Dr. Cupples, is this your
- 21 article there?
- DR. CUPPLES: It is not mine.
- DR. THOMPSON: Dr. King? Is he here?
- On No. 5, Mercy Behavioral Health Clinic.
- 25 Is that right, Mr. Brentley?

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: That's correct.
- 2 DR. THOMPSON: We need to understand what
- 3 is meant by it.
- 4 DR. KING: What is the question?
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: On page 3, No. 5, if you
- 6 could just explain to me what is meant by health and
- 7 wellness as needed. I have some issues with Mercy
- 8 Behavioral, but let's just deal with that, first.
- DR. KING: Well, you know, the Option
- 10 Center deals with students, when they are referred for
- 11 violations of the Code of Student Conduct, and
- 12 sometimes these students have pending evaluations, and
- 13 in other situations, they demonstrate that they need
- 14 support with anger management, or other counseling,
- 15 and sometimes Mercy Behavioral Health, or other
- 16 providers, work with these students around those
- 17 issues, but that's done on a case by case basis,
- 18 that's why it is indicated as needed.
- 19 Each child is evaluated based on why they
- 20 are placed at the Option Center.
- 21 MR. BRENTLEY: Does that include
- 22 medication, or --
- DR. KING: No; no medication.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- MS. FINK: Okay.

- 1 Mrs. Harris.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- I have a question, on -- under "Consultants
- 4 and Contracted Services", 20.
- 5 I did receive my information, but it
- 6 appeared that the parents did not, in the minutes that
- 7 I received, did not want a stenographer, they wanted
- 8 their secretary to take the minutes.
- 9 Is there anyone here that can answer that
- 10 right now?
- DR. THOMPSON: Dr. King.
- DR. KING: I was under the impression, from
- 13 Mrs. Stewart, that they had used this organization in
- 14 the past for meetings, where items were to be
- 15 approved, or not approved, and they wanted to have an
- 16 official record.
- But I can't sit with the policy council, to
- 18 see if they have a problem with this item.
- 19 But I think the recommendation was to have
- 20 official minutes, and not to try to have a secretary
- 21 transcribe that information, which is very important.
- MS. FINK: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- 23 MS. COLAIZZI: Dr. King, and I am -- the
- 24 question was asked, to Miss Stewart, to go back and
- 25 ask the Policy Council if they wanted a stenographer

- 1 there, and we wanted to see that in writing, so that
- 2 we were sure that they didn't want one.
- 3 We haven't received any information on
- 4 that.
- DR. KING: In that case, let's pull the
- 6 item, and we will bring it back next month and get
- 7 that information.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I would appreciate that.
- 9 DR. KING: No problem.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Does everybody else --
- 11 MR. MATTHEWS: Let me.
- Who is the liaison to that committee?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- MS. FINK: Theresa.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, what happened at the
- 16 meeting?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Well, that's what I am
- 18 trying to say, I got the impression they would have
- 19 liked a stenographer there, but I was not at that
- 20 specific meeting when they asked that question, that's
- 21 why I wanted her to go back and ask it again.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Matthews.
- MR. MATTHEWS: The reason why I say that,
- 24 is because in the past there has been so much
- 25 confusion over items that have come up in that

- 1 particular group, and so in order to resolve these
- 2 issues, the stenographer was used, which has cut down
- 3 tremendously, the disagreements that were had.
- And so I believe that we ought to go ahead
- 5 and pass this, because of the fact, that -- what?
- It's not the wrong thing, because people
- 7 want this. They want that to occur.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Matthews, allow me to
- 9. interrupt you for one second.
- That's what I thought. I thought that this
- 11 was for the Policy Council; it's not.
- MR. MATTHEWS: It's for the meetings.
- MS. COLAIZZI: It is not with the Policy
- 14 Council, though.
- 15 Randall, would you help me out, please,
- 16 with the --
- MR. TAYLOR: You know, this is part of the
- 18 problem, President Fink, if you don't mind, I mean,
- 19 this is part of the problem, I raised this issue at
- 20 the agenda review, I received no response to it, and
- 21 had Miss Harris not -- and I am not ashamed of this
- 22 many issues I had raised since that time, if
- 23 Miss Harris had not brought that up, I would have
- 24 voted on this item, without thinking about it again,
- 25 until I read the minutes.

- 1 And, President Fink maybe there is some
- 2 kind of way we can receive the minutes, before we come
- 3 to -- because there are questions that were raised
- 4 that we are not getting responses for, and I just
- 5 don't think that I should be put in position, with no
- 6 staff, and another job I have to work all day, to have
- 7 to, you know, keep track of these type of things.
- And I mean, I would like to hold the issue,
- 9 so that I can go back and re-visit the issue. That's
- 10 why I would like to hold it this evening, but I find
- 11 it unfortunate again, that I was prepared to vote on
- 12 an item, that I had not received the full accounting,
- 13 and the questions answered that I had asked.
- 14 And I say, I don't want to criticize
- 15 Sandra Stewart or the staff, this is just the way
- 16 things are around here, and have been around here, and
- 17 these are things that we need to work on changing as a
- 18 Board.
- MS. FINK: I would agree with you,
- 20 Mr. Taylor, and I think the wisest choice of action,
- 21 right now, is to pull the item, until everyone is
- 22 satisfied, and we can certainly bring it up again next
- 23 month.
- 24 So item 20 on page 5 --
- 25 MR. MATTHEWS: We can't just pull it, you

- 1 have to table it.
- 2 MS. HARRIS: I thought staff was pulling
- 3 it.
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: Well, you can't pull it, it
- 5 is an item that needs to be voted upon.
- 6 MS. WOOD: You have to table it.
- 7 MS. FINK: Okay. Then well somebody make
- 8 a --
- 9 MS. HARRIS: I will make a motion, that we
- 10 table it, until we receive the information.
- MR. FELLERS: May I interject?
- The question does not seem to be whether --
- 13 it seems to be whether there should be more
- 14 stenographic services. By tabling the item, you are
- 15 depriving them of any stenographic services.
- Wouldn't it be more prudent, to amend it to
- 17 allow this to apply to all of their committees, and
- 18 then they can amend it to increase the amount, if they
- 19 wanted it to apply to their Parent Advisory Council.
- 20 Otherwise their next meetings are not going to have a
- 21 stenographer at all.
- MR. TAYLOR: You know, maybe it can be
- 23 amended just so we take care of next month's
- 24 meetings.
- There was a concern we had, that one of

- 1 their major meetings did not have stenographic
- 2 services, and that's what we were concerned about.
- And so, I don't want to prevent them from
- 4 doing whatever they were doing next month, maybe we
- 5 can pass a temporary, you know, funds for them to
- 6 operate next month.
- 7 But I still would like to get -- I don't
- 8 think there is a controversy here, it is just that
- 9 there was a question, that other people had the same
- 10 question, that has not been answered yet, and pending
- 11 an answer to that question, then we would like to hold
- 12 this.
- So I am saying, I think that we can amend
- 14 it, I don't think we would have a problem, if we would
- 15 make sure they have the funds to do what they have to
- 16 do next month.
- 17 Am I clear on that?
- 18 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- 19 MR. FELLERS: Then maybe the suggestion
- 20 should be, to simply approve it for one month, the
- 21 month of December, for the amount of \$500, and then
- 22 they can -- they can give the staff an opportunity to
- 23 come back and clarify the recommendation.
- MR. TAYLOR: That's fine.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, the question I have

- 1 on this, is do we already have a contract that
- 2 provides stenographic services for the Policy Council
- 3 itself?
- We do not.
- 5 So there is none whatsoever.
- 6 So I would agree, then, we have to do
- 7 something, so we cover the month of December.
- 8 Because the Policy Council is very
- 9 important, that we have accurate information, just
- 10 like this Board; correct?
- MS. FINK: Right.
- MR. ISLER: So we have to have something,
- 13 for beginning, for starting in the month of December,
- 14 we can't go a month without anything for the Policy
- 15 Council, so we have to take some action on this.
- And, I mean, I just wonder, I would like to
- 17 hear from Mrs. Colaizzi, why 500, not the 3,000,
- 18 because it doesn't mean we have to spend it.
- 19 MS. COLAIZZI: The confusion came about,
- 20 when I asked them the question if the Policy Council
- 21 was actually -- who was using the stenographer, and
- 22 that is not where they are using this.
- That's why I am very confused here, and
- 24 questions to the Board members need to be answered.
- 25 It was the Policy Council we were

- 1 encouraging to have the stenographer at, and they are
- 2 not getting it.
- 3 So this is why I think that we need to get
- 4 answers, as to why they are not getting it.
- We asked her to go back, and ask then, to
- 6 reconsider, and get -- but I am not quite sure of who
- 7 this is actually for.
- And she is not here, to answer your
- 9 questions.
- So I do think the best idea would be to be
- 11 it for one more month, and then, exactly, amend it in:
- 12 a month, and then we will go where we have to go after
- 13 that.
- I will have no problem making the motion to
- 15 amend this item, for --
- MS. FINK: Then, would you please.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I will. I make the motion
- 18 to amend item No. 20, on page 5, for one month.
- MS. HARRIS: Second.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- 21 May we have roll call, please.
- 22 MR. MATTHEWS: What is the motion?
- 23 ATTORNEY WEISS: The amendment is to amend
- 24 item 20, on page 5, to read date December 1, 2002,
- 25 through December 31, 2002, not to exceed \$500.

- 1 Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: One final question.
- 3 This was submitted by Sandra Stewart, is
- 4 that correct?
- 5 MS. FINK: Right.
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. And this --
- 7 MS. WOOD: And clarification was asked at
- 8 the agenda review.
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: I believe what Mrs. Stewart
- 10 shares some concern, as to why this meeting was not --
- 11 did not have a stenographer at it.
- But all we wanted to do, was to receive an
- 13 answer as to why the Policy Council did not want to
- 14 have a stenographer.
- 15 I believe at the meeting, they actually
- 16 voted on items, and we thought that to be just
- 17 peculiar, and all we did, we wanted to ask, and that's
- 18 what we are going to do.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Mr. Matthews.
- 20 MR. MATTHEWS: I would like to know if a
- 21 friendly amendment could be added on, so that it would
- 22 also then read that upon further presentation from
- 23 Sandra Stewart, that further consideration will be
- 24 given, upon information, once it's received.
- MS. FINK: Right.

25 note, that there was a copy of the transcript -- not

- 1 the transcript, but the minutes sent to the Board on
- 2 Friday, last Friday, there was not enough information.
- 3 So could I talk to you, Mrs. Colaizzi, after the
- 4 meeting, and tell me exactly what you are looking for,
- 5 so that we make sure that you get exactly what you
- 6 want?
- 7 Is that okay?
- 8 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 9 DR. THOMPSON: Okay.
- MS. HARRIS: Dr. Thompson, I have that with
- 11 me this evening, so we can share it.
- 12 Thank you.
- DR. THOMPSON: All right.
- MS. FINK: All right.
- Does anyone have any more questions?
- Mrs. Harris.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- I was concerned about No. 2, under
- 19 "Payments Authorized", and I thought that we were
- 20 looking for other money, some grant money, or
- 21 something.
- 22 If -- since they went over budget, that
- 23 there would be refreshments coming some other way,
- 24 other than tax dollars.
- MR. MASCARI: Mrs. Harris, we do not have a

- 1 budget to pay for refreshments, for these principals
- 2 meetings, and what we have done is used the
- 3 Intermediate Unit's, Pittsburgh-Mount Oliver
- 4 Intermediate Unit's funds to do that prior to this,
- 5 and as it was brought out at the agenda review, this
- 6 had been exhausted.
- 7 MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- 8 MR. MASCARI: So that left us with no
- 9 choice.
- 10 MS. HARRIS: Then I am going to actually
- 11 have to vote no on this one, because I believe using
- 12 \$15,000, in two months, was a little bit too much.
- So, I am not going to be able to vote on
- 14 that one this evening.
- 15 I -- for the -- for the new teachers
- 16 inductions, No. 21, I know that's out of 01 money,
- 17 too, and that was also supposed to be money out of the
- 18 15,000, that come out of the IU, and there is no money
- 19 left, because somebody spent it all.
- I would have thought that this would have
- 21 been something separate, and I was wondering if there
- 22 was any other account that we could pay for it, other
- 23 than 01 money?
- DR. MOSLEY: Mrs. Harris, because the
- 25 question came to us beyond the workday today, we were

- 1 unable to explore other alternatives for funding.
- We still propose to do that, but we did
- 3 not -- we were unable to do that today.
- 4 MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- MS. WOOD: Can we not put, which we have
- 6 done before, "from account to be determined"?
- 7 MS. HARRIS: Yes. Yes. Would it be a
- 8 grant account?
- 9 DR. MOSLEY: We are --
- MS. HARRIS: Pete, how would we -- could
- 11 you answer that?
- DR. MOSLEY: We are looking at supplemental
- 13 funding for that.
- But go ahead, Pete.
- MR. CAMARDA: Dr. Rosen called me, and my
- 16 recommendation was to talk to Mrs. Stewart, with
- 17 moneys she has for staff development, if it's not all
- 18 being consumed within the grant, if there would be the
- 19 availability, to look for that. As you are aware,
- 20 Mrs. Stewart is not available today, to give that
- 21 answer.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. Could we amend that to
- 23 say "from supplemental fund, from an account to be
- 24 determined"?
- DR. MOSLEY: Yes.

- 1 MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- 2 MR. MATTHEWS: Does that pigeon hole the
- 3 thing? I think just to put down, "from account to be
- 4 determined," and then give us what account it came
- 5 from, understanding the staff is directed to look for
- 6 supplemental funds.
- 7 MS. HARRIS: Well, I assumed that's where
- 8 staff was looking, Mr. Matthews.
- 9 Yes, Mr. Camarda.
- 10 MR. CAMARDA: With that amendment to the
- 11 item, there would be no ability to spend any money,
- 12 until it would be determined what the funding would
- 13 be, so really, it complies with what Mr. Matthews is
- 14 asking, and what Mrs. Harris is asking.
- There would --
- MS. HARRIS: How would you suggest,
- 17 Mr. Camarda, that we --
- 18 MR. CAMARDA: I would --
- 19 MS. HARRIS: I mean, because I would like
- 20 to vote on this.
- 21 MR. CAMARDA: I think it would be the "to
- 22 be determined."
- MS. HARRIS: "To be determined"?
- MR. CAMARDA: Yes.
- MS. HARRIS: "Supplemental, to be

- 1 determined"?
- MR. CAMARDA: "Supplemental fund, to be
- 3 determined."
- 4 MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- 5 Then I would like to make an amendment,
- 6 under "Payments Authorized", No. 21, that it shall
- 7 read, "Action shall not exceed \$5,764 from a
- 8 supplement account to be determined."
- 9 Do I have a second?
- MR. McCREA: Second.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I have got a question.
- You know, let's be clear what we are
- 13 talking about here.
- This is page 9, No. 21 and, Dr. Thompson,
- 15 can you just explain this a little bit more in detail,
- 16 what exactly is this money for?
- DR. THOMPSON: Basically, what we do, when
- 18 we have any group coming into our office, we try to
- 19 show the humane side of the School District. It is
- 20 almost a public relations item, to show people that we
- 21 serve refreshments, just being a kind School District,
- 22 is basically what it is for, and being a humane School
- 23 District.
- It is just refreshments, that's just bottom
- 25 line.

- And I guess I need the staff to understand,
- 2 that the Board has taken on a new policy that they
- 3 don't want us to spend any money, 01 money, for
- 4 refreshments for teachers at various meetings. If
- 5 that's the directive in which you want us to go,
- 6 please just make it clear, and we can deal with that.
- We have a couple of issues tonight, where
- 8 the Board has approved the use of funds to serve
- 9 teachers and students, and in other cases, they are
- 10 questioned.
- 11 So I need true direction on which way you
- 12 want us to do it. Is it when we have guests into our
- 13 buildings, I mean, host various conferences, that
- 14 include our people, plus outside people, and just give
- 15 us the kind of direction.
- 16 If you say we can't use any 01 money, to
- 17 fund refreshments, in our efforts to provide
- 18 hospitality to the people in our District, who work
- 19 hard every day, and let's just say it, and I would
- 20 like it enforced across the board so we won't have
- 21 this problem any more.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, you know, I just
- 23 wanted to get a little clarification on that.
- You know, Madam President, I just think,
- 25 that out of all of the big fish out there to fry, you

- 1 know, for this amount of money, to try to get into a
- 2 positive PR for this District, I think we should not
- 3 be tampering with that.
- As a matter of fact, it should be something
- 5 that we should be doubling or tripling this
- 6 particular.
- But, you know, for us to sharpen our teeth
- 8 on this, and to say we are watching tax dollars, I
- 9 think that we are in a position to try to get some
- 10 positive press, it is used exactly for that, and I
- 11 would encourage my colleagues here, let's not do this.
- I mean, the other one that we are talking
- 13 about, is -- I believe this is for the meeting with
- 14 principals.
- This -- you know, how many principals are
- 16 we talking about, Mr. Mascari, and you meet how often?
- MR. MASCARI: Mr. Brentley, we meet once a
- 18 month, and the meetings are attended by all the
- 19 principals, and some of the support
- MR. BRENTLEY: What is the number, about,
- 21 approximately?
- MR. MASCARI: Support staff, about 125,
- 23 130.
- MR. BRENTLEY: You know, Mrs. Fink, this --
- 25 you know, I -- and I know we can go on and on, all

- 1 night, over small issues like this.
- But I think this is something, we know that
- 3 we need it, we know that we need to continue to
- 4 support our principals, and especially to get them on
- 5 the same side, on all issues, and especially in
- 6 running some of these buildings, and being a part of
- 7 this District.
- 8 I don't think that this is an area where we
- 9 need to talk about robbing Peter to pay Paul, or an
- 10 account to be announced, it is not a good thing.
- 11 MS. FINK: I think that the reason that
- 12 this has become a discussion, is because in years past
- 13 there was about \$15,000 allocated for refreshments, it
- 14 was shared by various groups, professionals in the
- 15 District, and it never came up, because it was never
- 16 exceeded.
- 17 But it has been exceeded, and exceeded,
- 18 before even half the budget year is up.
- 19 So that's why it has become an issue.
- It is almost like, why was that a good
- 21 enough figure to allocate in many -- for many years
- 22 past, and all of a sudden, in the first --
- MS. HARRIS: Two months.
- 24 MS. FINK: -- two months or so, it is
- 25 gone.

- So, you know, what happened here, and do
- 2 we -- nobody is denying anybody coffee and a donut,
- 3 you know.
- But I'm saying, that there must have been
- 5 some really fancy donuts, because --
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, Mrs. Fink, why don't
- 7 we do this, so that we won't ripple the feathers here,
- 8 in terms of the system, why don't we suggest right now
- 9 to Dr. Thompson, a monthly reporting on the
- 10 outstanding balance, let's -- if you want to see
- 11 receipts, let's do that.
- But let's not let the word get out, that we
- 13 are standing in the way of putting our best foot
- 14 forward for the District, and I think there are a lot
- 15 of things that we can do, to make sure that we watch
- 16 this money. We can monitor the money.
- 17 Staff, I'm sure, can be creative.
- Look, if we want to set receipts, let's see
- 19 them. But let's not do this.
- I believe the one, I think also, was used
- 21 as refreshments for welcoming in new teachers, is
- 22 that --
- MR. MASCARI: Right.
- MR. BRENTLEY: You know, these are some of
- 25 the folks who are going to be changing the lives of

- 1 our students. We need to get our best foot forward
- 2 with these students.
- And I think, just think that we can, we
- 4 make some suggestions, or to add something on it, and
- 5 say, "Let's see your monthly reporting, let's see your
- 6 receipts, let's make sure you get all of your donuts
- 7 from one particular store," if we can save the money,
- 8 but let's not let the word get out, that we are trying
- 9 to do something like that.
- 10 Please, you know, we need to get some
- 11 positives here.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I would just like
- 14 two points of clarification, one is to Mr. Camarda.
- 15 Mr. Macarda -- Camarda -- I apologize, for
- 16 that -- we are talking on this particular thing, a
- 17 fiscal year budget, not a calendar year budget?
- 18 MR. CAMARDA: Yes, you would be talking a
- 19 fiscal year budget.
- 20 And the way the Board item reads, it means
- 21 funding the activity, on item No. 21, for the fiscal
- 22 year 2002-2003, it would line up. So what you would
- 23 be seeing in this item, for the use of the general
- 24 funds, would be authorizing the use of general fund
- 25 over two of its operating years, but ending at --

- 1 because of the way it is laid out, my interpretation,
- 2 it would end June 30th.
- 3 MR. ISLER: But help me with this, the
- 4 School District's fiscal year budget, is a --
- 5 MR. CAMARDA: Calendar year.
- 6 MR. ISLER: The IU is a fiscal year, not
- 7 the calendar year; right?
- 8 MR. CAMARDA: Right.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Beginning in July, or beginning
- 10 in June?
- MR. CAMARDA: July.
- MR. ISLER: July 1.
- MR. ISLER: July 1. Okay.
- 14 And then the other question I have, is
- 15 to -- I am just wondering why we would amend one for
- 16 teachers, and not one for principals, since they are
- 17 both for staff members of the District.
- MS. HARRIS: Well, actually, some of our
- 19 leadership had to do with the principals, and also the
- 20 administration.
- 21 And I have looked at a number of years, and
- 22 it is true what Mrs. Fink said, that we have not gone
- 23 over that budget.
- But between July 1st, and October 10th, we
- 25 have receipts today to \$14,292.05.

- I think that's a little bit much.
- I mean, I would prefer as Dr. Manning used
- 3 to do, that the principals would go over to, I believe
- 4 it was Ritter's, in the morning, or some of the
- 5 principals maybe bringing donuts in with coffee.
- I mean, we don't need this catered for four
- 7 and five hundred dollars, and in particular,
- 8 Mr. Isler, just for August 12th, 13th, 15th and 16th,
- 9 the grand total was \$10,703.30.
- MR. ISLER: I think, Mrs. Fink -- or
- 11 Mrs. Harris, you answered my question.
- I also received that information, and
- 13 looked at it.
- I wanted to know why principals and
- 15 teachers, and I still don't have a valid answer.
- MS. HARRIS: Well, I quess --
- MR. ISLER: It's just an expenditure. And
- 18 I just -- I think, though, that you made it fairly
- 19 clear to most of us.
- MS. HARRIS: And I feel that with the new
- 21 teachers' induction, these are teachers that are going
- 22 through this induction period, they are coming
- 23 directly from school, and are going directly to a
- 24 meeting, it's after school, where they are not even
- 25 going to get a chance to get a snack, and they have to

- 1 be there, and they are not getting paid to be there.
- This is something that I wholeheartedly
- 3 support, and I did put the amendment up, but out of
- 4 supplemental -- to ask for supplemental funds, because
- 5 if we have supplemental funds, I would rather take it
- 6 out of that, than the tax dollars.
- 7 This, too, was to be funded out of the
- 8 15,000, for the year, but obviously someone, or
- 9 something happened, where we went through the 15,000
- 10 like water.
- I really believe that if we have a
- 12 budget -- if I have a budget at home, and it has \$500
- 13 in it, I can't go out and spend \$1,500.
- So, there is an amendment on the floor, and
- 15 I would appreciate a vote on it.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- We have three more questions.
- 18 Mr. Matthews, Mr. Taylor, and then Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Matthews was first, and
- 21 then --
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yeah, I guess my only
- 23 concern, is that here we are bickering over this
- 24 amount of money, and we keep using the phrase, that
- 25 it's taxpayers' dollars, supplemental funds, and

- 1 whether it's coming from the IU, it is still
- 2 taxpayers' dollars, and so it is not that it is not
- 3 coming from taxpayers' dollar, the 01 money is just
- 4 general fund money, but it is all taxpayers' dollars.
- 5 You know, they paid money to the state,
- 6 that money comes in via, whether it's the IU, or
- 7 whether it's through a supplemental fund, but it is
- 8 still taxpayers' dollars, you know, and I just think,
- 9 that we constantly put gloves and handcuffs on staff,
- 10 when you say that we can only come from supplemental
- 11 funds to do this, when in fact, the Board's budget --
- 12 now, maybe one of the things we should do, instead of
- 13 us having our meals, is why don't we go to Ritter's,
- 14 now, why don't we start doing some things, and let us
- 15 be the example to show people, that look, if we want
- 16 everybody else to cut their funds, and watch their
- 17 spending, then we ought to do it. We ought to do it.
- 18 You know, we constantly -- well, I want to
- 19 make a motion to take that million dollar off the
- 20 table as well.
- 21 MR. TAYLOR: Exactly.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Because that's taxpayers'
- 23 dollars that is unaccounted for.
- 24 But one of the things I am saying is that
- 25 we constantly keep throwing up this phrase, about

- 1 taxpayers' dollars; it all belongs to the taxpayers.
- 2 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 3 Mr. Taylor.
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: Mrs. Fink, I was very pleased
- 5 to hear your comment about we are potentially spending
- 6 too much on donuts, and not getting maybe the cheaper
- 7 brand of donuts, than the more expensive brand of
- 8 donuts, and I think that's a very important point,
- 9 because it shows the conversion.
- I mean, your status as a budget hawk, is
- 11 very questionable, and it has been, but I know cynical
- 12 people would say, you know, that after, what, two
- 13 schools, of 70 students reopened, one middle school,
- 14 of 125, the failed CAPA campaign, many people can say,
- 15 that under Jean Fink's administration, this District
- 16 has probably lost between 10 to 15 million dollars.
- 17 And I am glad to see you now on that path,
- 18 of trying to recovering those dollars.
- 19 So many cynical people say, that that's
- 20 just, you know, Jean Fink, but I am an optimist, that
- 21 this is now going to be part of the future, and that
- 22 we can count on Jean Fink to be on top of every single
- 23 dollar, and then maybe one day the people will forget
- 24 about the millions of dollars that your administration
- 25 has cost the city taxpayers.

- 1 MS. FINK: Oh, well, I just can't let that
- 2 one go, Mr. Taylor.
- 3 As far --
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: I was trying to be nice,
- 5 President Fink.
- 6 MS. FINK: And I am, too, because the
- 7 capital campaign wasn't my idea, I didn't conceive it,
- 8 I didn't execute it, and whatever happened, happened,
- 9 but it -- don't lay that one on my door step.
- MR. TAYLOR: The foundations pulled out,
- 11 that caused the rest of it to go.
- MS. FINK: Don't lay that one on my door
- 13 step, either.
- MR. TAYLOR: And many people, I think, if
- 15 you are a leader, should take responsibility for the
- 16 good and the bad, that happens all the time.
- 17 MS. FINK: You are a leader, too, and you
- 18 can share it equally with me, honey.
- MR. TAYLOR: You are the president of the
- 20 Board, but --
- 21 MS. FINK: Now, the other thing I just want
- 22 to say is that at least one of those schools, that you
- 23 are talking about, that you keep ragging, everybody
- 24 keeps ragging about, it cost the same amount of money
- 25 to bus those children out, as it did to operate the

- 1 school. The same amount of money.
- 2 You closed -- you closed the building --
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: Is there a motion on the
- 4 floor --
- 5 MS. FINK: -- that was 29, it currently is
- 6 29 kids short of capacity.
- 7 And it cost as much money to move the
- 8 children, and as it did to run that little school.
- 9 What was the point?
- 10 Somebody please tell me, what was the
- 11 point?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Can we vote now.
- MS. FINK: Yes. Can we please get on with
- 14 this, before we get snowed in, and we have to spend
- 15 the night with each other.
- MR. MATTHEWS: I definitely move that we
- 17 move this meeting right along, please.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is a vote on the
- 19 amendment, in item 21, the amount to be determined
- 20 from supplemental funds.
- 21 Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: No.
- 23 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?

- 1 MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 2 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 3 MR. ISLER: No.
- 4 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes, with reservations.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 7 MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 8 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: No.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: The amendment is adopted.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- MS. HARRIS: I still have more.
- MS. FINK: Oh. Why didn't I know that.
- MS. HARRIS: Dr. Thompson, I did receive my
- 19 answers back on 10 and 11. There were two other
- 20 schools last month, and also school No. 11 had said
- 21 that these professional development sessions, that
- 22 they would like to be buying refreshments for, would
- 23 be when staff was volunteering their time.
- 24
 I did not receive that in the letter from
- 25 Reizenstein, and I was hoping that it would be the

- 1 same, because I wouldn't want to treat one school
- 2 differently than the other.
- MS. REED: Yes. I will certainly make
- 4 certain that he understands that he is to follow the
- 5 same rules, as the other two schools.
- 6 MS. HARRIS: Okay. Actually, it's three
- 7 now.
- 8 Thank you, very much.
- And, one more on No. 12, I know there were
- 10 some concerns at agenda review, and maybe we should
- 11 just change the words, because it's really not a
- 12 renaming of Dilworth Traditional Academy, I think it's
- 13 with the emphasis of the arts and humanities. That's
- 14 why, you know, we didn't have to go through with the
- 15 policy.
- Is that not correct, Mrs -- or
- 17 Dr. Thompson?
- DR. THOMPSON: It is a renaming, because we
- 19 are saying, the School for Arts and Humanities onto
- 20 it, it is not called that now, so it will be a
- 21 renaming.
- 22 Dilworth Traditional Academy, is that what
- 23 you are talking about?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes. But I think --
- MS. FINK: Dr. Briscoe.

- 1 MS. HARRIS: Dr. Briscoe, is --
- DR. BRISCOE: The name will change,
- 3 Mrs. Harris, we are adding arts and humanities. So
- 4 technically, if you want to say, that the name, we are
- 5 renaming, you could say that.
- 6 But we are just adding the arts and
- 7 humanities caption.
- 8 MS. HARRIS: So it is not a real --
- DR. BRISCOE: A total, a formal renaming,
- 10 as you would probably think of.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay. Thank you, very much.
- DR. BRISCOE: But it will be Dilworth
- 13 Traditional Academy of Arts and Humanities.
- Does that --
- MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- DR. BRISCOE: -- answer your question?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes, ma'am.
- DR. BRISCOE: Thank you.
- MS. FINK: All right.
- Do we have any other questions, or
- 21 concerns?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I have a question,
- 23 page 10, on No. 27.
- 24 And I raised my comments earlier,
- 25 concerning this relationship, or this partnership, and

- 1 I believe that this District needs to once again work
- 2 hard at -- work hard at putting its best foot forward,
- 3 in terms of public relations, because of all of the
- 4 negative things that existed when this District,
- 5 especially in the last year, year and a half or so,
- 6 and I cannot support this.
- 7 I think that something so important, should
- 8 have included some Board involvement, early on.
- 9 I think it also looks like at times, that
- 10 it may give one particular local station an unfair
- 11 advantage, over others, in terms of an opportunity to
- 12 help us shape and mold a positive image for the
- 13 District.
- So I cannot support that.
- And I would hope, once again, Dr. Thompson,
- 16 in the very near future, any time that we talk about
- 17 establishing, or considering building
- 18 relationships/partnerships, with the media, locally or
- 19 nationally, that we -- that we would be included early
- 20 on, in the front end, as a Board, because I think it's
- 21 really important that while we are talking about
- 22 establishing a relationship, it's important just as
- 23 well, to make sure that that station, or radio
- 24 company, or whatever, that they also bring something
- 25 to the table, in terms of supporting public education.

- So I will not be able to support No. 27, on
- 2 page 10.
- 3 MS. FINK: Yes, Randall.
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: No, I agree with Mr. Brentley,
- 5 I am also going to be voting against this item.
- I would hope that the staff, in the future,
- 7 would try to look very closely at our partners.
- 8 This is an institution, which not only
- 9 organizations like the NAACP, approached about their
- 10 reporting, and their negative reporting, our former
- 11 School Board president, staff, also approached PXI,
- 12 and their reporting, negative reporting, was
- 13 acknowledged by their management.
- So I think our staff has not done a very
- 15 good job, in developing partners, when it comes to a
- 16 very important initiative like this.
- I would hope in the future, our staff would
- 18 be far more careful about the partners that --
- 19 partnerships, we are creating.
- MS. FINK: Do we have any other questions?
- MR. ISLER: Numbers, please.
- MS. FINK: Oh, okay.
- On item No. 13, on page 16, your numbers
- 24 are item a. is 68, item b., is zero, item c. is nine,
- 25 item d. is zero.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: Can you repeat that first
- 2 one?
- MS. FINK: Yes, on item a. is 68, item
- 4 b. is zero, item c. is nine, and item d. is zero.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: Madam President, I would
- 6 like to make just a quick comment, not necessarily a
- 7 question, nor looking for response, but again, I would
- 8 want to once again put out another call or challenge
- 9 to this administration, and to my colleagues here,
- 10 that we strongly consider what we actually discussed a
- 11 year or so ago, and that is the possibility of
- 12 contracting the services out, in terms of all
- 13 disciplinary actions, with our students.
- I think it's so very important that we give
- 15 a positive image, and an unfair image -- or a fair
- 16 image, in terms of that we are serious about dealing
- 17 with the discipline of all students, and that we are
- 18 so serious about it, that we are willing to give it to
- 19 an independent group, or individuals to actually
- 20 monitor, and handle, and to actually sit in on the
- 21 hearings.
- As you know, that we have Board members who
- 23 actually serve in that capacity, including myself, I
- 24 have never actually heard a hearing, but we have no
- 25 legal backgrounds.

- These are very, very important cases that
- 2 change the lives of some students.
- 3 So I am only asking that we consider again,
- 4 the possibilities or some discussions, about looking
- 5 into the possibility of just allowing that part of the
- 6 disciplinary actions, and everything along these
- 7 lines, to just look into another individual, or
- 8 another company, that would actually do it, and this
- 9 way we could clearly say that there is no politics
- 10 involved, when this particular child comes before us,
- 11 because he or she is the father of, or the daughter
- 12 of, or the nephew or cousin of someone, that we would
- 13 have to give him or her preference or treatment.
- 14 And so I would ask once again, not
- 15 necessarily looking for a comment, but that we would
- 16 consider that, in the very, very near future.
- 17 MS. FINK: This month, all of the hearings
- 18 that were done, were done by the contracted officer.
- 19 Okay. If we have no other questions or
- 20 comments, may we have the roll call, please.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, on the report; no, on
- 23 page 10, No. 27.
- 24 And I believe that's it.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mrs. Colaizzi?

- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, on the report as a
- 2 whole.
- Yes, on the report as a whole, no, on
- 4 page 6, No. 2, and page 9, No. 21.
- 5 That's it.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- 7 MS. HARRIS: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 8 no, under "Payments Authorized", No. 2.
- 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: What page is that?
- MS. HARRIS: Page 6, excuse me.
- 11 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: Yes.
- ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 17 no on item No. 2, on page 6.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor.
- MS. WOOD: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 20 no on item, "Payments Authorized", No. 27.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 23 no on page 6, item 2.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes, on the report as a whole,

- 1 no on page 6, item 2.
- 2 ATTORNEY WEISS: The report as a whole is
- 3 adopted; with the exception of page 6, No. 2.
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: Madam Chair, I am really
- 5 confused.
- I thought the whole discussion of why we
- 7 are talking about supplemental funds, was so that we
- 8 could resolve this issue, and here we have \$3,400 --
- 9 \$3,400 -- \$3,400, and we vote no, because it is coming
- 10 out of 01 money?
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Why? Why did you vote ni.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Matthews, not that
- 14 I need to explain myself, because at agenda review --
- MR. MATTHEWS: First of all, you --
- MS. COLAIZZI: I think you would have --
- MR. MATTHEWS: No, you elected to explain,
- 18 I didn't ask you to explain.
- MS. COLAIZZI: You looked directly at me,
- 20 and asked me why.
- 21 MR. MATTHEWS: No, I was looking at the
- 22 chairperson.
- MS. COLAIZZI: But I would be glad to
- 24 answer the question on my behalf. Okay?
- 25 I voted no, because when I understood that

- 1 \$15,000 was used up, from July 1st until now, I felt
- 2 that there was no need for that kind of money to be
- 3 spent that quickly, when it was supposed to be
- 4 allotted for the whole year.
- I voted no on the other one as well,
- 6 because I didn't see any need for it.
- 7 If we have to cut money, then we cut the
- 8 funds, we cut what we have to cut.
- I don't want to cut a book off of a child,
- 10 but I think that cutting a refreshment -- and I am
- 11 speaking, sir -- cutting a refreshment off of someone,
- 12 isn't going to hurt a child anywhere down the line,
- 13 but maybe it will send a message that this Board will
- 14 not allow \$15,000 to be abused and used in three
- 15 months' time.
- Actually, about almost \$11,000 of it was
- 17 used in a two-day period.
- So I'm against that, and that's my
- 19 preference, and that's what I chose to vote no on.
- That has nothing to do about looking for
- 21 supplemental funds, because I would have voted no on
- 22 that regardless.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, I appreciate that
- 24 comment, and if you are so worried about the fact that
- 25 those moneys could have been taken away from a child's

- 1 reading material, or math material, why not take it
- 2 out of the \$1 million, that is allocated in the Board
- 3 fund.
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: Why, so that we can save
- 5 food?
- 6 MR. MATTHEWS: Why don't we start doing
- 7 some things, in this District, that are the right
- 8 things to do, as opposed to constantly just voting
- 9 things down.
- 10 You know, if you have a problem with the
- 11 \$15,000, let's address that through a policy, let's
- 12 address that through the superintendent.
- But to take it out on the fact that these
- 14 principals meet, for \$3,400, that's ludicrous. It is
- 15 ludicrous.
- And so I am saying to you, that your
- 17 rationale does not make sense, when in fact if that's
- 18 your reasoning, then the money should have come out of
- 19 the \$1 million, that's in the Board's budget, just
- 20 sitting there, doing nothing.
- 21 And it just doesn't make any sense.
- 22 I truly, can not understand, this Board's
- 23 rationale.
- 24 I don't understand it.
- MR. HARRIS: Maybe we --

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: On one end, you constantly
- 2 talk about the facts that you want to save money, you
- 3 want to cut money, but then you go ahead and issue
- 4 contracts without the full approval of this Board,
- 5 only a select few members, you go ahead and add a
- 6 million dollar into your budget, and you can waste
- 7 taxpayers' dollars that way, but for \$3,400, we are
- 8 going to say no, and we are going to hold the line,
- 9 because we want to show people that we are fiscally
- 10 responsible in the matters of this School District.
- 11 It's ludicrous. Now --
- MS. FINK: May we move on?
- MR. MATTHEWS: I have the floor.
- 14 It's ludicrous. It's uncalled for, unjust.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- MR. MATTHEWS: It's unjust, and your
- 17 actions, yes, I'm saying to you, that your actions are
- 18 unjust, and they are ludicrous, because they don't
- 19 make any sense.
- 20 You are contradicting yourselves on one
- 21 end, talking about how you are fiscal managers on one
- 22 hand, but yet you are going to expend the money of
- 23 taxpayers, that you are so worried about and
- 24 protective of on the other hand. It doesn't make any
- 25 sense. It doesn't make any sense at all.

- 1 \$3,400.
- You ought to be ashamed of yourselves, for
- 3 voting \$3,400 down. We have bigger pieces in this
- 4 budget, in this package right here, than \$3,400.
- 5 It doesn't make any sense.
- 6 MS. FINK: May we move into the Business
- 7 and Finance Committee, please.
- 8 The items are before you.
- 9 Comments or questions?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I have a question.
- 11 Mr. Fellers, can you tell me, for this month, the
- 12 number -- excuse me.
- MS. FINK: We have -- folks, we have one
- 14 person speaking, please.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mr. Fellers, can you tell me
- 16 please, for this month, what is the dollar amount that
- 17 you will giving out, in terms of paying for contracts,
- 18 goods and services? Roughly, and I know I catch you
- 19 off guard, I don't mean to do so.
- MR. FELLERS: No, sir, because we don't
- 21 total the reports, to get that figure, I would have to
- 22 sit down for a while and calculate that, but it's
- 23 probably several million dollars.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Can you tell me, or do you
- 25 know of what percentage of this \$7 million, for this

- 1 month, would be going to MBE's, WBE's, or DBE's?
- MR. FELLERS: We have no idea. That's the
- 3 role of the MBE/WBE coordinator, and that position, as
- 4 you know, is still vacant.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: But we do know, that at this
- 6 point, we are still flying by the seat of our pants,
- 7 so to speak, and using the old policy, and it's almost
- 8 a judgment call on how we do business. Would you kind
- 9 of agree to that?
- MR. FELLERS: We are using the policy that
- 11 has been in place, of 15 percent minority, and
- 12 2 percent women, and bypassing on purchasing bids, if
- 13 that's met, and forcing compliance on facilities bids.
- MR. BRENTLEY: And it is safe to say, that
- 15 we are nowhere near, whatever our percentages are on
- 16 the old policy; is that correct?
- MR. FELLERS: I don't know if we are near
- 18 it or not, because I don't know what the numbers are.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- MS. FINK: All right.
- 21 Are there any other questions, on --
- 22 Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: Yes, under the changes in the
- 24 minutes, on No. 4, it is page 7, No. 4, I'd like to
- 25 know who found this mistake, that happened back in

- 1 February, with the amount of -- it was an accounting
- 2 mistake basically, I am just wondering specifically,
- 3 who found that.
- 4 MR. FELLERS: It was first uncovered by
- 5 Mr. Berdnik, it was not -- he did not get around to
- 6 correcting it, Maher Duessel then pointed it out
- 7 again, and at that point he brought forward the
- 8 resolution, to correct it.
- 9 MR. McCREA: So it's basically a
- 10 collaboration between our outside audit and
- 11 Mr. Berdnik. Good job.
- MS. FINK: Do we have any further
- 13 questions, on the business agenda?
- 14 If not, may we have the roll call, please.
- 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes, on report as a whole, I'd
- 21 like to abstain under "Payments Authorized", No. 1,
- 22 Report 1579, Inquiry 8115. And that was under
- 23 "Purchasing Bids".
- 24 Also, I would like to abstain under
- 25 "Payments Authorized", A, No. 2, Report 5102, under

- 1 facilities bids, page 2, CAPA.
- 2 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 3 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- 4 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 7 MR. McCREA: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 8 under "Consultants/Contracted Services", No. 1b. I'd
- 9 like to -- actually, the entire section, la. through
- 10 s., I would like to abstain.
- 11 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 13 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: The report is approved.
- MS. FINK: We are now ready to do
- 19 personnel.
- Dr. Thompson.
- DR. THOMPSON: Thank you, Madam President.
- We would like for you to review the new
- 23 appointments on pages 1 through 6, retirements and
- 24 resignations, on pages 13 through 15, leaves of
- 25 absence on page 17, and pages 18 through 27 are

- 1 transfers.
- 2 And the Addendum A, positions opened and
- 3 closed, Addendum B is additional human resource
- 4 actions.
- 5 And if you have any questions, Dr. Mosley
- 6 will be glad to answer them for you.
- 7 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 8 Questions and comments?
- 9 Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- To start with, I would like to commend the
- 12 three people who are going off to military leave. We
- 13 are not allowed to read the names off, are we? That's
- 14 too bad.
- And on page 29, No. 3.f), I am confused.
- You say three halves of a fireman, isn't
- 17 that greater than one? Shouldn't that be two-thirds,
- 18 or should -- or is it just a typo?
- MR. FELLERS: A 3/2 fireman, that means he
- 20 works three days as a fireman, and two days as a
- 21 cleaner.
- MR. McCREA: Thank you.
- MS. FINK: All right.
- 24 Any other -- Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: Are we voting on the item, for

- 1 the MBE/WBE in this item? I was looking for it.
- MS. WOOD: That's Addendum B.
- MR. TAYLOR: That's Addendum B. Thank you.
- 4 MS. FINK: Those are addendums, that's
- 5 included in the vote.
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: That is included in the vote.
- 7 Okay.
- 8 ATTORNEY WEISS: It is in the addendum.
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- MS. FINK: Are we doing addendums
- 11 separately?
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Separately.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I'm sorry?
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: We will be doing the
- 15 addendums separate.
- MR. TAYLOR: We are doing addendums
- 17 separate?
- ATTORNEY WEISS: I don't know, are we doing
- 19 them separately?
- MS. WOOD: They are not in the business
- 21 items, they are just addendums.
- 22 ATTORNEY WEISS: I'm sorry, so the
- 23 addendums are part of the personnel report. I got
- 24 confused. Thank you for asking.
- MS. FINK: Okay.

- 1 Mr. Brentley.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. Since we are voting,
- 3 is that correct, Mr. Weiss, with the Addendums A and
- 4 B.
- 5 ATTORNEY WEISS: I'm sorry, yes, we are; we
- 6 are voting.
- 7 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, then let me just say,
- 8 on addendum, I believe it is B -- I'm sorry
- 9 Addendum B, page 1, and that is the filling of the
- 10 MBE/WBE, minority/women's business coordinator
- 11 position -- I will wait until Mr. Taylor finishes.
- 12 I just want to say, as the chair of this
- 13 committee, we have worked very, very hard to take a
- 14 look at the MBE/WBE policy, as you know, we were able
- 15 to present a policy last year, I believe earlier this
- 16 year that policy was voted on, we are now in the
- 17 position to hire this position, hire for this
- 18 position.
- As you know, that this candidate, Mr. Bob
- 20 Weston, not only was able to rise to the surface in
- 21 the first interviewing process, but we actually had to
- 22 go into a second interviewing process, which was a
- 23 national, we conducted a national search. Mr. Weston,
- 24 of course, was chosen again, as the number one
- 25 candidate, and the first choice of the committee, made

- 1 up of staff members, community members, and the staff
- 2 and community members.
- 3 So I just want to encourage my colleagues,
- 4 that I believe out of all of the mixed signals that
- 5 this Board have sent out over the last year, maybe two
- 6 years, I think clearly this would be an opportunity
- 7 for this Board to show that out of all of the
- 8 differences we may have, at this table, that one thing
- 9 that we can say that we agree on, is the fact that we
- 10 are simply saying that we are open for business for
- 11 all, and that is for women owned businesses, minority
- 12 owned businesses, and disadvantaged businesses.
- So I would at this time, Madam President,
- 14 just respectfully request of my colleagues today, that
- 15 while the media is here, the cameras are rolling, and
- 16 the tapes are rolling, that we would show this
- 17 community our commitment to the entire business
- 18 community, by giving a majority vote for this
- 19 particular issue, on the supporting, and bringing
- 20 forward Mr. Bob Weston, for the MBE/WBE, and I am
- 21 asking for unanimous decision, hopefully, for this
- 22 particular position.
- Thank you.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- Mr. Taylor.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: I will support you, on this
- 2 appointment, Mr. Brentley.
- We have spoken, you know, much about how
- 4 important this position was; that we have someone who
- 5 has many, many years of experience, in real, quality,
- 6 MBE/WBE/DBE programs, that can pass any court test,
- 7 and he gave us, I think he gave a gift to this city,
- 8 when he came and contracted with us, and we were able
- 9 to pass this policy earlier this year.
- 10 Of course, it's in the best interests of
- 11 this city, if we are able to hire the actual author of
- 12 the policy this Board passed.
- But unfortunately, the Board majority has
- 14 looked at this differently. It is unfortunate.
- I think the fact that this is not going to
- 16 be successful for Dr. Weston, and what the Board
- 17 majority has to deal with is the person that comes
- 18 behind him, we are going to try to work, and make sure
- 19 that they are just as independent, and just as serious
- 20 about making these programs work, because these
- 21 programs, this School District is going to be an
- 22 example for the City of Pittsburgh, for the Stadium
- 23 Authority, for the University of Pittsburgh, and
- 24 again, never again will we have crimes like the
- 25 stadiums, which last I knew, pass throughs, some

- 1 things like that, were crimes, will never again take
- 2 place, everyone will know that they have a chance to
- 3 participate.
- And I tried to make clear to my colleagues,
- 5 small business people in their communities have as
- 6 much chance of getting a contract out here, as small
- 7 business people in my communities.
- 8 That is going to be opened up, that is
- 9 going to be opened up next month, or a year from now,
- 10 two years from now, this District will be an example.
- 11 Let me just show our Board members whose
- 12 minds are so made up, and for those in the audience
- 13 that may have a legislative item, this is something
- 14 that Dr. Weston pointed out to the School District,
- 15 which just shows more of the type of ruses, and games,
- 16 that are played.
- I want you to look on, if anybody has it in
- 18 the purchasing bids, Inquire 8115, and on
- 19 Inquiry 8118.
- You will see, for the automotive purchase,
- 21 they were listed on here, low bidder bypassed due to
- 22 insufficient women participation, at a car dealer.
- There is another item, that was bypassed
- 24 for again, insufficient minority participation.
- 25 And if you look at the items, Mr. Weston

- 1 said these are some of the most bizarre things he had
- 2 ever seen, and what these are designed to do is to
- 3 make the public, and the Board members believe that we
- 4 have a real program here.
- 5 But he said notice every single one, of the
- 6 many that he has seen over these, he looked through
- 7 many years of this type of records, he said all of
- 8 them would be a discrepancy, of like \$50, or \$200,
- 9 which means, this is illegal to pass these companies
- 10 up, because the amounts are so low they wouldn't
- 11 choose to fight it in the court.
- And so those are the type of shams, and
- 13 ruses, that have gone on around the stadiums, and
- 14 other issues.
- We are committed now, that this District,
- 16 some members, to stopping this out here at the
- 17 Pittsburgh School District, and we are.
- And we are going to do that. Just like
- 19 when the FBI built their new facility, and the new
- 20 renovations, they did at the Federal Courthouse, when
- 21 she stood out, the one who runs the, I guess federal
- 22 procurement here, she stood up in front of the
- 23 cameras, and said, "We will not allow to happen here,
- 24 what happened at the stadiums."
- So that's someone who read the message. I

- 1 think there are other people heard the message.
- 2 Unfortunately, we don't have a Board
- 3 majority, who has heard that message, but that message
- 4 will not stop, and it will be back next month.
- It may not be Dr. Weston, but it will be
- 6 back next month, and that message that everybody in
- 7 Pittsburgh will participate, that everybody has a
- 8 chance to get a contract out here in the Pittsburgh
- 9 School District, in the City of Pittsburgh, where our
- 10 taxpayers -- that message is never to end, until that
- 11 day comes, when truly everybody in Pittsburgh has a
- 12 chance to participate, not just those who are friends
- 13 and relatives of big contractors.
- Every single body, and I am committed to
- 15 that, and it is going to happen.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- May we have the roll call, please.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, as the report as a
- 22 whole, on page 30, No. 6, I abstain.
- 23 And under Addendum B, under "New
- 24 Appointments", No. 1, I vote no.
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?

- MS. HARRIS: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 2 I want to abstain under C, on page 8, No. 13, under N,
- 3 on page 18, No. 10, I would like to abstain.
- 4 On page 30, R, "Miscellaneous
- 5 Recommendations", I would like to vote no on No. 6.
- And on Addendum B, under "New
- 7 Appointments", A, No. 1, I will vote no.
- 8 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- 9 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 14 on page 30, No. 6, 9 and 10, I am abstaining, under
- 15 Addendum B, A.1, I am also abstaining.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: Do you want to repeat that
- 17 Mr. McCrea, I'm sorry.
- 18 MR. McCREA: On page 30, Nos. 6, 9 and 10,
- 19 I am abstaining.
- On addendum B, No. A.1, I will abstain.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 23 no, on item 6, page 30 -- or abstain on item 6,
- 24 page 30.
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?

- MS. WOOD: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 2 no on Addendum B, item -- under A.1.
- 3 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- 4 MS. FINK: Yes, on the report as a whole,
- 5 no, on item 6, on page 30, and no, on Addendum B, item
- 6 No. 1.
- 7 Ask for clarification.
- MS. HARRIS: Can I have clarification on my
- 9 vote?
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: I had down, that you
- 11 abstained on page 8, C, No. 13, page 18, on page 30,
- 12 No. 6.
- MS. HARRIS: Was item 18.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Pardon me? I can't hear
- 15 you.
- MS. HARRIS: Page 18, No. 10.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: I had you voting no on
- 18 Addendum B, No. 1 -- addendum A, No. 1.
- MS. HARRIS: And on page 30.
- MS. FINK: Addendum B.
- MS. HARRIS: No, it is Addendum B.
- 22 I says --
- ATTORNEY WEISS: You stated Addendum A.
- MS. HARRIS: No, I said that it is under A,
- 25 "New Appointments," on under Addendum B, No. 1.

- 1 ATTORNEY WEISS: Okay. All right. Thank
- 2 you.
- 3 MS. HARRIS: AnD then did you also have my
- 4 vote on 30?
- 5 ATTORNEY WEISS: Yes.
- 6 MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- 7 I wasn't sure, if you had that clarified,
- 8 because A, "New Appointments", I specified.
- 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: Right.
- MS. HARRIS: Okay.
- 11 ATTORNEY WEISS: The report is adopted,
- 12 with the exception of Addendum B, No. 1, and page 30,
- 13 No. 6.
- 14 MR. BRENTLEY: Madam President, I would
- 15 just like to make a brief comment.
- 16 I think what we have just witnessed, in
- 17 terms of voting down the MBE/WBE, I think it's clear
- 18 now, that this Board, and this administration, are
- 19 simply saying it's a closed shop when it comes to
- 20 doing business in this District, it is a closed shop
- 21 for women owned businesses, it is a closed shop for
- 22 minority owned businesses, and it is a closed shop for
- 23 disadvantaged businesses.
- 24 For one, as the chair of this committee, I
- 25 think it's time now, that I can no longer simply try

- 1 to guiet my community down, in hopes that they will
- 2 get a fair opportunity, in terms of doing business
- 3 with this District.
- I will not stand in the way of anyone in
- 5 this community who decides to do something in the
- 6 alternative method, in terms of getting some work in
- 7 this city.
- 8 African Americans, women, and disadvantaged
- 9 people, have the right to work, have a right to make
- 10 an honest living.
- 11 And what this majority simply completed
- 12 here, you are simply saying now, that the doors are
- 13 closed for good.
- 14 And let's not talk about, "Oh, when the
- 15 next candidate comes forward." To my colleague,
- 16 Mr. Taylor, when we bring another candidate forward,
- 17 the reason for supporting Mr. Weston is clear,
- 18 Mr. Weston is out of town, and he is from out of town,
- 19 Mr. Weston is an expert, he is coming free and clear
- 20 of all of this political baggage, that anyone would
- 21 have, especially anyone coming from this majority.
- That simply means that he would come in not
- 23 knowing anything about anyone, but would come in and
- 24 begin to spread this money evenly.
- 25 I can no longer, no longer try to work

- 1 within this system, Miss Fink. I think you have made
- 2 it very clear.
- You have made it very clear. We don't have
- 4 a right to vote -- I mean, we don't have the right to
- 5 work in this community, we don't have the right to do
- 6 business, we don't have the right to get contracts,
- 7 and we definitely don't have the right to have someone
- 8 here, to coordinate that.
- And So when we see what this majority has
- 10 done in the past, in terms of giving certain
- 11 contracts, to certain individuals, without going
- 12 through the process, Miss Fink, there is no other way,
- 13 but to simply say that is clearly a racist thing to
- 14 do, and it is unfortunate. It is unfortunate.
- Remember, Mr. Weston is a clear case of
- 16 discrimination now, because he was chosen through the
- 17 process, and the system that we put together for
- 18 choosing and filling any other positions, and this
- 19 Board simply says, "Well, now, we will lower the bar,
- 20 where we want to get someone else, that we can put our
- 21 hands on, and that we can determine what they may do,"
- 22 and simply bypass the entire policy.
- That's unfortunate, and I am so sorry, I am
- 24 so sorry, especially women, that you weren't able to
- 25 take advantage of a great opportunity here, and in

- 1 bringing not only filling this position, but the best
- 2 candidate for this.
- 3 Mr. Weston, and his thinking, would be good
- 4 for this entire city.
- 5 And I'm so disappointed, that this Board,
- 6 and this majority, did not take advantage of that.
- 7 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 8 If everyone will please turn to the
- 9 transfer of funds tab, we do have a transfer of funds.
- 10 MS. HARRIS: Two.
- 11 MS. FINK: Okay. We have two.
- Mr. Fellers, would you speak to these,
- 13 please.
- 14 MR. FELLERS: Madam President, the first
- 15 transfer you have, is an open ended transfer, from
- 16 Major Object 800 potentially to 800 and 900, and we
- 17 are stating that it can be the maximum of 900, simply,
- 18 because it is a function of interest rates at the time
- 19 of the defeasance. This allows to us buy down debt,
- 20 and improve the School District's fiscal posture.
- 21 Secondly, the second transfer is, will
- 22 allow us to accommodate the tax collection payments,
- 23 for this year, which we are running underbudgeted, and
- 24 we are taking that money from the funds from the
- 25 personal property tax, which you will see from another

- 1 item, are not needed this year and, therefore, we are
- 2 simply moving them from one category, where they have
- 3 become surplus, to a category where they are needed.
- 4 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 5 And do we do separate roll call votes on
- 6 this?
- 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: It is my recommendation,
- 8 that you can take it as one report.
- 9 MS. FINK: Okay.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: If the Board is willing to
- 11 do that.
- MS. FINK: Oh, I am willing.
- Does anyone ever a problem with that?
- 14 All right.
- Then we are voting as one report, two
- 16 separate budget transfers.
- So, Mr. Weiss, may we have the roll call,
- 18 please.
- 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 23 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: Yes.
- 25 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler?

- 1 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- 2 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews?
- 3 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.
- 4 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 5 MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 6 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 8 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood?
- 9 MS. WOOD: Yes.
- 10 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- We now have several new business items.
- MR. FELLERS: Madam chair?
- MS. FINK: Oh, personal property tax, I'm
- 15 sorry. Went right by that little tab.
- 16 Okay.
- 17 MR. FELLERS: Madam President? Three
- 18 items, which I think you can vote on jointly, because
- 19 if you don't vote on one, it will be a complication
- 20 for the others.
- This attempts to resolve the Annenberg
- 22 decision, on the personal property tax that the
- 23 District levied in 1993 and 1994. We are relevying
- 24 those taxes. We will go about and attempt to collect
- 25 those taxes, and work out agreements, where possible,

- 1 so you have in the levying of those taxes for the two
- 2 years, and then the third item that you have, is a
- 3 cooperation agreement, because we believe that at
- 4 least the city, and perhaps the city and the County of
- 5 Allegheny, will follow like action, and this will
- 6 allow us to minimize our expenses, by sharing those
- 7 among the three entities.
- 8 MS. FINK: Mr. Isler.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Mr. Fellers, just a point of
- 10 clarification, I know we have discussed this already,
- 11 but just, if in fact the city and the county do not go
- 12 forward, we are still planning to go forward once we
- 13 take this action; correct?
- MR. FELLERS: Yes. We feel this is -- it's
- 15 timely now for us to act, and we will not wait if they
- 16 do not take like action.
- MR. ISLER: And again, I just want to make
- 18 sure, this, our solicitor concurs with this?
- 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Yes, we prepared these,
- 20 and it is our recommendation you approve them.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- MS. FINK: May we have the roll call,
- 23 please.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: You are voting on items 5,
- 25 6 and 7, which are really, they are sort of together.

MR. BRENTLEY: Wait. Wait. Wait. Hold 1 2 it. Hold it. 5, 6 and 7. ATTORNEY WEISS: They are in the book. MR. ISLER: Personal property tax tab. 4 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. I got you. 5 6 MS. WOOD: Right before the new business. 7 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Brentley? MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. 8 9 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi? 10 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes. 11 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris? 12 MS. HARRIS: Yes. 13 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler? 14 MR. ISLER: Yes. 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Matthews? 16 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes. 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. McCrea? 18 MR. McCREA: Yes. 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Taylor? 20 MR. TAYLOR: Yes. 21 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Wood? 22 MS. WOOD: Yes. 23 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Fink?

MS. FINK: Yes.

ATTORNEY WEISS: The item carries.

24

25

- 1 MS. FINK: Okay.
- Now if everyone will turn to new business.
- 3 Several items here.
- 4 The first one I am going to ask you to get
- 5 out, because these are not numbered, is an item that
- 6 says "New Business," at the top, and it reads:
- 7 (Mrs. Fink read from prepared material.)
- 8 MS. FINK: Questions or comments?
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 10 Madam President, I think, and I shared my
- 11 comments earlier, I believe this is a little
- 12 premature. This is for, if I am not mistaken, for the
- 13 old Gladstone Middle School.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. We are in the
- 16 process, if I am not mistaken, Dr. Thompson, we were
- 17 talking about a realignment, a comprehensive
- 18 realignment plan, for the entire city, and I thought
- 19 that we were -- did we ever get a date and a time for
- 20 that, Dr. Thompson, when those discussions were going
- 21 to start?
- 22 DR. THOMPSON: Mr. Brentley, Mrs. Fink, I
- 23 think has sent out to all of the Board members, which
- 24 said that we will get the parameters on which we will
- 25 look at a realignment, and Mrs. Fink, I don't know if

- l you did or not, but you are going to send out a
- 2 questionnaire to each Board member to give those
- 3 parameters, back into --
- 4 MS. FINK: I have done that.
- DR. THOMPSON: Okay. And you are supposed
- 6 to get them back into Miss Fink, and once she receives
- 7 those parameters, we hope to call a Board meeting to
- 8 discuss those issues, and then we will move forward.
- 9 MS. FINK: Which I am not really
- 10 anticipating working on, until after policy.
- DR. THOMPSON: Okay.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, then that would really
- 13 make this new business item, premature, because --
- MS. FINK: But it doesn't commit us to
- 15 anything.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yeah, but I think it is a
- 17 little misleading, and it is not a good thing to do,
- 18 because let's just read the final one, it says, "BE IT
- 19 FINALLY RESOLVED THAT, This study, while it can
- 20 potentially lead to the sale or transfer of this
- 21 property, will only do so with the subsequent
- 22 legislative approval by the Board."
- 23 If that's not beginning to convey some
- 24 property to someone, I don't know what is.
- I just think it is premature, not to

- 1 mention that the level of community involvement, I
- 2 have not heard anything about any community meetings,
- 3 or discussions, or any kind of feedback from the
- 4 community.
- 5 MS. FINK: Well, I know there was at least
- 6 one community meeting.
- 7 Mrs. Colaizzi, would you speak to that,
- 8 please?
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley, I assure you
- 10 that there was a great deal of community involvement
- 11 here.
- Dr. Thompson participated in this, and st
- 13 did quite a few of our staff members.
- This does in no shape, way or form, put us
- 15 in a position where, if we decide we want to go a
- 16 different direction, it stops this. But at the same
- 17 time, it also gives that community hope, that we are
- 18 not just going to let another white elephant sit out
- 19 there.
- I assure you that if anything goes anywhere
- 21 with this, you will be the first to know, along with
- 22 the other eight Board members.
- But to stop this, is also showing everybody
- 24 out there, that there is no way you will work with us.
- So, I encourage you to go on.

- 1 And if you don't encourage us, then just
- 2 don't vote for it, it won't really make that big of a
- 3 difference, to hurt us, or help us.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yeah, but Miss Colaizzi,
- 5 this is -- what makes it confusing is, is that there
- 6 are other buildings in this city, that at one point or
- 7 another, had individual companies, and corporations,
- 8 who expressed an interest in purchasing. Some of the
- 9 buildings were vacant, and some were recently made
- 10 vacant, with the closing of some of the schools in
- 11 some of our districts.
- Our comments, or response to most of them
- 13 was, "We are going to put this on mothballs because we
- 14 are going to hold, and we are going to wait to kind of
- 15 see how things develop."
- 16 Let's also be clear, too, that if for some
- 17 strange reason, that the last sentence in this new
- 18 business item goes through, where we decide to sell,
- 19 then that community is out of luck, in terms of having
- 20 that magic word of a neighborhood school, because now
- 21 the building has been used, or sold to someone else.
- 22 And I just think in the middle of talking
- 23 about -- we have yet to sit down and talk about the
- 24 realignment for the District -- in the middle of
- 25 talking about it, to put that community, in an un --

- 1 in a not so good position, by taking the rug right out
- 2 from underneath their feet, by simply saying, "We are
- 3 going to possibly look into the possibilities of
- 4 talking to someone who may be interested in buying
- 5 it."
- 6 We are only doing it with that building,
- 7 and I think it's inconsiderate, it's not a good thing
- 8 to do at this particular time, and I think we should
- 9 hold off, and wait until we have our plan in place,
- 10 and then we can determine if we are going to even need
- 11 the building or not.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Mr. Matthews, and then
- 13 Mr. McCrea.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Yes. Now, I am a little bit
- 15 confused because, Miss Colaizzi, you said there was a
- 16 great deal of community input, and my understanding,
- 17 that we were told that there was a meeting.
- 18 And in this meeting this outcome came
- 19 about, where the Coro Group would take a look at that.
- Dr. Thompson, how many people were present,
- 21 at that, at this meeting? And was it more than one
- 22 meeting?
- DR. THOMPSON: At the meeting, at
- 24 Gladstone, I guess maybe there were about ten people,
- 25 and then I met with Reverend Smith for a luncheon, who

- 1 is the kind of the community person that's trying to
- 2 pull this together, and then before then, I had met
- 3 with Reverend Smith, and some community people, even
- 4 before, or back in, say, October.
- 5 And then on last week, the staff, and
- 6 Miss Colaizzi, met with several other members, I was
- 7 not able to attend that meeting.
- But there have been four or five dialogs,
- 9 along with physical meetings, and then I spoke with
- 10 Reverend Smith on the phone again yesterday,
- 11 concerning this issue.
- But to have a, what we call a community,
- 13 like, I guess you would -- the political community
- 14 term, community meeting, where you have people coming
- 15 out en masse, we haven't had one of those, but we have
- 16 had a lot of subgroup meetings.
- MR. MATTHEWS: I guess that's my question,
- 18 because when you, Mrs. Colaizzi, said there was a
- 19 great deal of community input, that doesn't sound like
- 20 a great deal.
- Now, whether there was a couple of
- 22 meetings, and I think what Mr. Brentley is referring
- 23 to, actually makes sense, in the fact that there is a
- 24 realignment plan that we are going to be doing, and
- 25 what I don't want to do is to give false hope to a

- 1 community group, in saying that "we are going to allow
- 2 you to spend money to take a look at this facility,
- 3 look at it, evaluate it, to see its potential use,"
- 4 and then turn around and say, "You know, we have done
- 5 our realignment, and now we need the building for
- 6 something else."
- 7 And I just I think what we are doing is
- 8 just putting false hopes to people, and this District
- 9 has gotten itself in trouble before, by offering false
- 10 hopes to folks, and so for that, I would have to not
- 11 support this item.
- MS. FINK: Mr. McCrea, and then Mr. Isler.
- MR. McCREA: I want to clarify something.
- 14 This is a research project, being done by this group,
- 15 is that correct, this is sort of like a high school
- 16 assignment, that you get, and it really has no teeth
- 17 to it?
- MR. MATTHEWS: No. No.
- MR. McCREA: That's the way I understood
- 20 it.
- MR. MATTHEWS: No, it is not a high school
- 22 project.
- MR. McCREA: No, I am not saying a high
- 24 school project.
- MR. MATTHEWS: But people, this community,

- 1 whether it is their staff doing it, it is still money
- 2 that they have to spend money to do.
- 3 MR. McCREA: But it is a research, it is
- 4 just someone that is doing research to learn how to do
- 5 this?
- 6 MR. MATTHEWS: No, not to learn how to do
- 7 it.
- 8 MR. McCREA: That's what I was --
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mr. Fellers, would you
- 11 clarify that, that if for some strange reason, that if
- 12 things worked out, that we would make an offer to this
- 13 company, or individual for purchase?
- MS. FINK: Please, Mr. Brentley --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, okay, I think if
- 16 Mr. Fellers can --
- MS. FINK: -- you don't have the floor
- 18 right now.
- 19 MR. ISLER: In all due respect, to my
- 20 colleagues who may not agree with this particular
- 21 resolution, it is my understanding, and I think
- 22 Mr. Fellers may not be the appropriate person, this
- 23 may have to go to somebody else, but it is my
- 24 understanding, that the Coro Leadership Program, is
- 25 going to assign students, and these are rather

- 1 high-level individuals, the best and the brightest,
- 2 trying to keep people in urban areas, I mean all part
- 3 of Coro, take a look at a feasibility, of what can be
- 4 done for this building, and this community, and the
- 5 School District.
- 6 We are committing no resources, and we are
- 7 committing nothing, other than getting back a
- 8 feasibility study.
- 9 Now, that's as far as we are going. Am I
- 10 correct?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- MR. FELLERS: Yes, sir.
- DR. THOMPSON: Correct.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- MR. McCREA: Can we also include in part of
- 18 that study, possibly making it a middle school again?
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MR. McCREA: Or that's not part of it?
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MR. McCREA: Okay. Not part of parameters.
- 23 MR. ISLER: It is always open.
- MS. COLAIZZI: It is open for anything.
- MR. BRENTLEY: But you don't want them to

- 1 use it for a school.
- 2 MS. COLAIZZI: I didn't never, I never said
- 3 that. And you know what, I am not the one who voted
- 4 to close it, Mr. Brentley.
- Now, I don't understand what the problem
- 6 is. We are just giving the thing an option here,
- 7 and -- no, I don't think you understand.
- 8 MS. FINK: Now, we don't need to get into
- 9 this kind of a discussion.
- 10 Mr. Taylor.
- 11 MR. TAYLOR: You know, I am going to
- 12 support this amendment, and as Mrs. Colaizzi just
- 13 stated, she doesn't understand why something like this
- 14 is occurring, and I hope my colleagues, you know, will
- 15 forgive me, if I will say they are as angry as I am
- 16 right now, about what happened on the MBE vote, and
- 17 unfortunately, you can't understand that, and that's
- 18 very unfortunate.
- We are African American elected officials,
- 20 Miss Colaizzi, we are elected by a community, who
- 21 expects us to come here to do the job for all people,
- 22 but they expect us to advocate for issues that are
- 23 important to African Americans, because nobody else
- 24 will.
- 25 And you don't understand, that that MBE

- 1 vote is some of the most important things that we
- 2 have, the commitment that we make to our community,
- 3 that we are going to open up these doors to everybody,
- 4 particularly people that look like me, and it is a
- 5 shame that you can't understand.
- 6 I believe, that Mr. Brentley, and
- 7 Mr. Matthews' response to this innocuous document,
- 8 about the Coro Center, is anger, at which you just
- 9 did, and other members of this majority, and it is a
- 10 shame you cannot understand how we feel right now.
- 11 You should feel that as a woman, who -- women have a
- 12 history of being cut out in their full work, being put
- 13 aside, and not being able to be all that they can be,
- 14 and it is a shame you don't understand that.
- 15 It really is.
- So I am going to support this amendment of
- 17 Coro, and I am going to encourage my other colleagues
- 18 to do the same.
- MS. FINK: May we have a roll call, please.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I would like to make a
- 21 comment to Mr. Taylor.
- You know, in the spirit of compromise,
- 23 Mr. Taylor, I would support it, but I would ask, while
- 24 Mr. McCrea pointed out that it is a study, well, then
- 25 let's take out the final sentence, because that's

- 1 what's misleading about that, and I think that
- 2 everyone around this table should agree to that, and
- 3 any time you put something in there, well, you know,
- 4 that potentially the sale, et cetera, et cetera, and
- 5 that's the confusing part.
- 6 So I would like to make a motion, Madam
- 7 President that we strike out that final sentence, that
- 8 simply reads, "BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED THAT, This
- 9 study, while it could potential lead to the sale or
- 10 transfer of this property, would only do so with
- 11 subsequent legislative approval by this Board," that's
- 12 misleading, and so let's just keep it as a study.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Second.
- MS. FINK: Mr. Matthews seconded it.
- 15 Roll call, please.
- 16 ATTORNEY WEISS: This is on the amendment.
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- 18 ATTORNEY WEISS: Me Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: I am voting no, but,
- 22 Mr. Brentley, I want to explain to you why.
- I think that this last sentence is the very
- 24 thing that protects us, because without this sentence,
- 25 it would be assumed that there wouldn't be needing a

- 1 legislative approval, by us, to go with it, or not.
- 2 So this is really protecting us. So I just
- 3 want to stress that to you.
- And, I don't know how else to do it.
- 5 I think that we are overreacting on
- 6 something, that if anything, I would like to see this
- 7 become the beginning of doing it in other places, with
- 8 other buildings, as we -- you have made very clear,
- 9 there are other empty buildings out there.
- But that's what I am very cautious of here,
- 11 and why I am voting no.
- 12 I think this really ultimately protects us,
- 13 and correct me, Mr. Weiss, if I am incorrect.
- 14 ATTORNEY WEISS: Well, I mean, I think the
- 15 sentence basically says that if there is any transfer,
- 16 it has to be affirmatively approved by the Board.
- 17 So it makes it clear that nothing else will
- 18 occur, without actual approval.
- 19 MR. BRENTLEY: But, Mr. Weiss, you would
- 20 also agree that this language also sends a message,
- 21 that there is a possibility, or we are open for
- 22 business, if for some strange reason someone makes a
- 23 good offer, or for some reason that there is a
- 24 possibility, I mean, you would agree on that?
- 25 And let me ask you this way: You would

- 1 agree that this final sentence is confusing, in terms
- 2 of if -- what we are talking about, and what we
- 3 expect?
- 4 ATTORNEY WEISS: Well, I would agree, that
- 5 the final sentence does mention the potential sale or
- 6 transfer.
- 7 Certainly, I think it's incumbent on the
- 8 staff, in communicating with the community, that -- to
- 9 make it clear, that there is no implied commitment to
- 10 sell or transfer.
- But it's really up to the Board, how you
- 12 want to handle this amendment.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, let the record show,
- 14 Mr. Weiss, that I appreciate your interpretation, but
- 15 that's not what it says.
- Okay. And this is it.
- 17 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Harris? I'm sorry,
- 18 Mrs. Harris?
- MS. WOOD: What are we voting on?
- 20 ATTORNEY WEISS: The amendment.
- This is voting on the amendment.
- Mrs. Harris?
- MS. HARRIS: No.
- 24 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: No.

- 11 can educate students, parents and the like.
- I have an issue with an item or two, but I
- 13 hope that the Board can discuss that, you know, in the
- 14 coming weeks, but I want to wholeheartedly, you know,
- 15 ask my colleagues to support this item, unanimously.
- MS. FINK: Okay. Anyone else?
- 17 MR. BRENTLEY: I just have just a quick
- 18 question, on the process used, for identifying the
- 19 company.

- 14 who came recommended to us, and that's why we are
- 15 using them.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. So it was their
- 17 recommendation, it was not a process that we use,
- 18 to --
- MR. ISLER: No, we are working with the
- 20 City Cable Bureau on this, so that we need to work
- 21 with people that they are comfortable with, they have
- 22 worked with, this is a very reputable company and, I
- 23 mean, I don't think there is any issue here.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I am just curious, I
- 25 am trying to find out about the company, the process

used. 2 Now, the actual cost involved --3 MR. ISLER: The cost, all of the cost involved, this is what is known as a reimbursement grant from the Falk Foundation. The Falk Foundation, is covering all costs associated with this, there are no costs to the District. 8 MS. FINK: Okay. 9 Hearing no other questions, Mr. Weiss, may 10 we have the roll call. 11 Remember you are voting on both items. 12 ATTORNEY WEISS: Both items. 13 Mr. Brentley? 14 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. 15 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi? 16 Mrs. Colaizzi stepped out. 17 Mrs. Harris? 18 MS. HARRIS: Yes. 19 ATTORNEY WEISS: Mr. Isler? 20 MR. - 7 say something.
- B DR. COLEMAN: I think Carey should say it.
- 9 We are really pleased with the cooperation of the
- 10 Board, and the mayor's office, and the community, and
- 11 Dr. Thompson has been really great, and the staff, and
- 12 this kind of cooperative venture makes us really very
- 13 happy, as a consultant to the foundation.
- Carey, why don't you say -- she did all of
- 15 the work.
- MS. O'DONNELL: Yes, I just want to
- 17 personally thank all of you for your cooperation, and
- 18 collaboration for this project, and for the unanimous
- 19 consent among all nine Board members, and also again,
- 20 Dr. John Thompson, and his staff, and the mayor's
- 21 office for donating the air time, and thank you all
- 22 personally, I really appreciate your cooperation.
- MS. FINK: And we appreciate your
- 24 confidence in us, we will behave ourselves on TV.

- MS. FINK: Okay.
- 3 MR. MATTHEWS: Just for a point of
- 4 clarification, for the record, it is Dr. Coleman. So
- 5 just wanted to make sure that it's --
- 6 MS. FINK: I thought I said that. If I
- 7 didn't, I'm sorry.
- B DR. COLEMAN: That's okay.
- 9 MS. FINK: I apologize.
- DR. COLEMAN: You can always call me Ma.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I do have another new
- 12 business item, I just wanted to raise, and mainly, for
- 13 discussion, and if we can reconsider, that would be
- 14 great, last month, Madam President, and until I looked
- 15 over the minutes, and really understood what happenes,
- 16 we voted on an issue, that we actually voted to remove
- 17 books from the classroom, on a very important issue.
- That vote actually will affect over a
- 19 thousand students in this District and, you know, I
- 20 just wanted to raise that question, you know, and I
- 21 don't know legally if it would be appropriate, one of
- 22 the things we have been wrestling with over the last
- 23 months, are the issues dealing with our math program,
- 24 and you made a comment, before, that we would not do
- 25 anything to affect the children, but if we had to

- 1 change some of the programs, or adjust it, we would do
- 2 it.
- But nevertheless last month, and it was
- 4 submitted by Miss Harris, I mean, right here on the
- 5 floor, I mean, on the fly, we just changed it to --
- 6 changed the wording, and removed books from what we
- 7 voted on.
- And I just think it's not good business,
- 9 and I don't know if all of my colleagues were aware of
- 10 that.
- The actual book is here, I mean there were
- 12 over 1,100 students, that will be affected by these
- 13 books. Even though we have a difference of opinion
- 14 about these math programs, we are never supposed to be
- 15 in the business of taking away from our children.
- And so I don't know, legally, what --
- 17 Mr. Weiss, if I can make a motion, Madam President, if
- 18 it's appropriate, I don't know. I am only doing this
- 19 for the sake of the children. We took away these
- 20 books.
- 21 We are not supposed to -- we are not
- 22 supposed to be in the business of removing books from
- 23 children.
- If we have some issues, let's deal with
- 25 them as adults, but let's at least let our kids have

- 1 the books, until we decide, if this majority decides
- 2 to make adjustments, or changes, to the present math
- 3 system.
- So I don't know if it's appropriate, or
- 5 Mr. Weiss, if it is allowed or permitted, and if so, I
- 6 would like to try.
- We, last month, we voted to remove them,
- 8 and I am asking if it's appropriate to make a motion
- 9 that we simply put these back.
- 10 Is that appropriate, Mr. Weiss?
- 11 ATTORNEY WEISS: I am really not familiar
- 12 with the item that you are referring to, but normally,
- 13 when -- in essence, this is almost a reconsideration,
- 14 which means that an individual who voted to remove
- 15 them, would have to now bring it forward.
- But I don't have the item in front of me,
- 17 so I don't know what in particular you are referring
- 18 to.
- 19 MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Brentley, can we hold that
- 20 question, and try to get a clarification on that
- 21 question in the future, because I am not comfortable
- 22 voting on it. I really don't know what that item was,
- 23 I don't know why it might have been removed, maybe it
- 24 is outdated, I don't know.
- 25 But I mean, I would like to find out if

- 1 that is not -- I mean there may be a cycle, or books
- 2 were removed, and put in, I don't know, I just would
- 3 like to explore it, before I vote on it.
- 4 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, we didn't explore it
- 5 when we removed it, and --
- 6 MS. WOOD: Yes, we did.
- 7 MR. BRENTLEY: And the point --
- 8 Dr. Thompson, do you recall, the removal of the books
- 9 last month?
- MS. HARRIS: He is out of order.
- MS. FINK: Ms. Brentley, Mrs. Wood would
- 12 like to add some clarification, and I would like her
- 13 to do that.
- MR. BRENTLEY: All right.
- MS. WOOD: Okay. The vote was not to
- 16 remove books. The vote was to accept buying class
- 17 sets, for each individual class, which are
- 18 supplemental books to the curriculum.
- We did vote to buy those class sets.
- We did not choose to buy each one of those
- 21 books, which did not even come to the table for a
- 22 vote, for each individual student.
- We bought class sets, for each classroom.
- MR. BRENTLEY: But --
- MS. WOOD: And they already have academic

- 1 books. This is supplemental materials that are
- 2 available in each class room.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- But, Miss Wood, what we simply were able to
- 5 do, we did vote to not accept the books, that will
- 6 affect over 1,100 children. We said at that time, the
- 7 discussion was, if they need them, to let them make
- 8 ditto copies, or -- you know.
- 9 MS. WOOD: Sir, do you want to have someone
- 10 who voted against it, or for it, I don't know even
- 11 which you want to do, because the only vote I recall
- 12 is one that we all agreed to buy supplemental books,
- 13 we did buy them.
- 14 So you would have to bring it to an agenda
- 15 review, or something, to discuss exactly what you are
- 16 talking about, what vote we didn't vote on, and then
- 17 only the party who voted against it, or for it,
- 18 depending on which way you want this to go, would be
- 19 the party that would have to bring it to the table
- 20 again.
- 21 So we will have to discuss this at either
- 22 an education meeting, or the next agenda review, and
- 23 get it clarified exactly what you are discussing,
- 24 because we can't change that now, because no one is
- 25 clear on what it is, that you want.
