EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

The Board does not vote at executive sessions.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

JULY 21, 2004

DIRECTORS:

The Committee on Student Services recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

Proposals/Grant Awards

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to submit proposals for grants and accept grant awards in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 11, inclusive.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That upon approval of the grant by the granting agency, the Board authorize the establishment of appropriate accounts and, where necessary to implement the grant, authorize the advancement of funds to operate the program until the grant and fees are received.

- 1. Submission of an application for \$33,400 to Commonwealth of PADOW, Office of Children, Youth and Families and the Head Start State Collaboration Office to increase the availability of high-quality, full-year/extended-day services to Head Start-eligible children and families. The funding period shall be from July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.
- Submission of an application to the PADOE for \$1,225,797 of USDOE Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Career Development funds to be used to improve the performance of all secondary Career and Technical Education programs with a focus on enhancing the skills of special needs students. The funds will also help advance academic achievement through tutoring and job placement guidance and will help in the replacement of supplies and the latest equipment for labs. The funding period shall be from July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.
- 3. Submission of a proposal to the City of Pittsburgh Three Rivers Workforce Investment Board and the Pittsburgh Partnership for \$69,882 of WIA Workforce

Development funds to support the year-round program to provide students with significant physical disabilities a 4-6-week supervised summer work experience, year-round supervised work experiences, paid and unpaid, in order to develop successful employment skills. Students in paid work experiences shall receive an hourly/daily stipend or production (piece) rate. The funding period shall be from July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.

- 4. Acceptance of \$500 from the West Penn Allegheny Health System to support the Pittsburgh Public Schools Public Safety Academy by the West Penn Allegheny Health System. The donation shall be placed in the Anthony Novak Paramedic Memorial Scholarship fund located at Peabody High School and shall be utilized for public safety graduates to attend CCAC for paramedic training. The funding period shall be from September 2004 through June 2010.
- 5. Acceptance of \$3,600 to the Pittsburgh Public Schools Public Safety Academy by Maureen Novak, the widow of Pittsburgh Paramedic, for the establishment of a scholarship program for safety graduates to attend CCAC. Recipients shall receive \$500 for tuition and books; funds will be placed in an account located at Peabody High School. The funding period shall be from September 2004 through June 2010.
- 6. Acceptance of \$392,545 of Drug-Free Schools and Communities Student Assistance Program funds from the PADOE to provide comprehensive services K-12. Focus is on prevention education, early intervention, and support services related to health/Wellness, alcohol tobacco and other drugs, violence, disruptive behavior and learning. The funding period shall be from July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.
- 7. Submission of an application to the PADOE/PADOW for \$1,159,812 to continue year-round services to support pregnant and parenting students' successful completion of high school and transition to post-secondary training or employment. The required local match will be provided through the services of ten counselors who will work 10 percent of their time with the ELECT (Education Leading to Employment and Career Training) Program in the District's high schools. The funding period shall be from July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.
- 8. Submission of an application to the PADOE, Service Learning and Teen Parent Programs, Division of Student and Safe School Services for \$19,600 in support of services to pregnant and parenting teens in all secondary and middle schools. Case management shall be provided by Teen Parent Advocates and contracted services. The funding period shall be from July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.
- Submission of an application to the PADOE/PADOE for \$140,000 to support the ELECT Fatherhood Initiative, which will provide comprehensive case management, educational, and support services to teen fathers at each high

- school through the Teen Parenting Program. The funding period shall be from July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.
- 10. Acceptance of \$250 from Pittsburgh Urban Basketball Officials as an annual gift to the Pittsburgh Public Schools Interscholastic Athletic Department in order to support book scholarships for senior student athletes who enroll in post-secondary training. Scholarship recipients will be chosen based on evidence they have met the following criteria: a) high citizenship, b) athletic and academic success, c) acceptance into a post-secondary training environment, and d) receipt of recommendations from the student's principal and coach. The funding period shall be August 1, 2004 through August 1, 2005.
- 11. Submission of a proposal to The Grable Foundation for \$38,000 over two (2) years to support developmental, one-time-only costs for the Middle Years IB Program for grades 9 and 10 at Schenley High School. The Middle Years Program will be developed in collaboration by staff and administrators from Frick International Studies Academy and Schenley High School. Funding will support teacher training, the development of curriculum, and initial site license fees. The addition of the MYP program in grades 6 through 10, in addition to enhancing the International Studies program at Frick, will assist in building and sustaining the International Baccalaureate Program for grades 11 and 12 at Schenley High School. Funding for grades 6 through 8 was previously awarded from The Buhl Foundation in January 2004. This additional funding from The Grable Foundation, if granted, will provide the final funding needed for the one-time-only costs associated with the establishment of the Middle Years IB Program for grades 9 and 10 in Schenley High School for the Pittsburgh Public Schools. The funding period shall include August 1, 2004 through August 30, 2006.

Consultants/Contracted Services

RESOLVED, That the Board authorize its proper officers to enter into contracts with the following individual for the services and fees set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 31, inclusive.

- 1. For Kids Only Daycare To provide childcare services to eligible Head Start children and families from August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005. The School District Head Start Program will provide:
 - Recruitment and enrollment of age-eligible children
 - Ongoing training to Head Start staff and child care center staff during designated Head Start inservice trainings
 - Other comprehensive services as mandated by the Head Start Performance Standards
- 2. Kelly Street Child Care To provide childcare services to eligible Head Start children and families between August 1, 2004 and July 31, 2005. The School District of Pittsburgh Head Start Program will provide:
 - Recruitment and enrollment of age-eligible children

- Ongoing training to Head Start staff and child care center staff during designated Head Start inservice trainings
- Other comprehensive services as mandated by the Head Start Performance Standards
- 3. Schenley Heights Community Development Program To provide wrap-around services to twenty (20) Head Start students between July 1, 2004 and June 30, 2005, at a cost not to exceed \$33,400 from Account # 4800-225-1441-330, pending funding.
- 4. Imani Christian Academy, Abundant Beginnings Child Care Center To provide extended-day services to Head Start-eligible families who are working or enrolled in training and to provide continuity of educational services to Head Start-eligible children during non-traditional hours. Services provided include:
 - Classroom materials and supplies at no cost to the provider
 - All meals (breakfast, lunch, snacks) for all Head Start eligible children at a cost of six-thousand dollars (\$6,000)
 - Recruitment and enrollment of age-eligible children
 - Ongoing training to Head Start staff and child care center staff during designated Head Start inservice trainings
 - Other comprehensive services as mandated by the Head Start Performance Standards

The dates of service include August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005.

- 5. Patricia Jones To provide Head Start comprehensive services for a maximum of six (6) children in a daycare home setting. Enrolled children shall receive education, mental health/disability, and health/nutrition services by Head Start staff. The period of operation shall be August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005, total cost not to exceed \$10,400 from Account # 4800-225-1441-330.
- 6. Marguerite Tallon, Auntie's Daycare To provide Head Start comprehensive services to a maximum of six (6) children in a daycare home setting. Enrolled children will receive education, mental health/disability, and health/nutrition services support by Head Start staff. The dates of service include August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005. Payment shall be \$10,400 from Account # 4800-225-1441-330.
- 7. Victoria Dickerson To provide Head Start comprehensive services for a maximum of six (6) children in a daycare home setting. Enrolled children will receive education, mental health/disability, and health/nutrition services support by Head Start staff. The dates of service include August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005. Payment shall be \$10,400 from Account # 4800-225-1441-330.
- 8. Yeshiva School To provide wrap-around childcare for the Head Start full-day classroom. Payment will cover the educational services offered to Head Start children in the summer. The dates of service include August 2, 2004 through

- August 29, 2004. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$7,000 from Account # 4800-225-1441-330.
- 9. American Red Cross Foster Grandparent Program To provide intergenerational experiences to Head Start children through classroom support. The program will serve fifty-five (55) classrooms, five (5) days a week, six (6) hours a day for one hundred fifty (150) days. The dates of service include August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005. Payment shall be at the rate of 50 cents per hour, total amount not to exceed \$20,700 from Account # 4800-225-1441-323.
- 10. This item was removed from the agenda.
- 11. University of Pittsburgh School of Dental Medicine To provide dental services to Head Start children on an as-needed basis, including screenings and other comprehensive dental care. The dates of service include August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$4,140 from Account # 4800-225-1441-330.
- 12. Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh Healthy Child Program, UCLID Center To provide individual consultations to Head Start parents/children, training coordination for staff, child assessments and data management and mental health intervention services for children and families. The dates of service include August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$235,691 from Account # 4800-225-1441-330.
- 13. University of Pittsburgh, Beck Group, LRDC To promote the District's Literacy Plus Initiative through the Reading First Grant Award by the State Department of Education. The Beck Group will continue the work with Text Talk and Questioning the Author in all Reading First schools and continue the professional development with coaches, focusing on the addition of reading clinic in the 2004-2005 school year. The dates of service are September 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$208,151 chargeable to the Reading First Grant line, 4000-285-2271-323.
- 14. Parents League for Emotional Adjustment (PLEA) To provide an autistic support program for three (3) students with severe disabilities and very critical mental health issues. PLEA provides an educational program and an extensive partial hospital program on site. Placements are made based on IEP team recommendations. Payment shall be at the rate of \$13,245 per student per year, total amount not to exceed \$39,735 from Account # 5545-241-2320-330.
- 15. D.T. Watson Institute To provide an educational program and all related services for students with severe disabilities living at the Shadyside Residential Treatment Facility. This unique partnership is funded as an Institutionalized Children's Program and is extremely successful in providing supports for up to thirty (30) students with autism and severe disabilities with challenging behavior

- disorders. Payment shall be at the rate of \$32,735 per month, total amount not to exceed \$392.811 from Account # 5233-261-1233-323.
- 16. Frances May Burke, MSW To assist the contracted psychiatrist in providing initial interviews for parents and students referred to Emotional Support programs. She will also provide social work services for students at McNaugher Education Center. Payment shall be at the rate of \$50 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$19,880 from Account # 5545-241-2420-330.
- 17. Auberle Education Center To provide an educational program and related services for up to fifty (50) students with severe social and emotional disturbances who have extremely challenging behaviors in the classroom. Payment shall be at the rate of \$13,680 per student, total amount not to exceed \$684,000 from Account # 5231-264-1231-323.
- 18. The Wesley Academy To provide a full-time emotional support education program and related services for up to thirty (30) severely emotionally disturbed students as per their IEPs. Payment shall be at the rate of \$13,107 per student per year. In addition, there is a one-time matriculation fee of \$100 for new students. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$398,000 from Account #5231-241-1231-323.
- 19. Dr. Cathy D. Sigmund To provide psychological evaluations and one-on-one interventions for students at McNaugher Education Center. Payment shall be at the rate of \$60 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$32,700 from Account # 5545-241-2420-330.
- 20. Pressley Ridge: Brightwood Pointe Program To provide a complete educational program and all necessary related services to up to four (4) students with PDD and other multiple disabilities. The students in this program have very significant disabilities that require highly specialized services. Payment shall be at the rate of \$42,666 per student per school year, total amount not to exceed \$171,000 from Account # 5231-241-1231-323.
- 21. Dr. Anne R. Laforte-Moore To provide psychiatric evaluations for students referred to emotional support programs. She will also consult on identified psychiatric and behavioral problems within the classroom setting for students at McNaugher Education Center. Payment shall be at the rate of \$120 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$18,720 from Account # 5545-241-2420-330.
- 22. Rachel M. Forsyth To provide psychological diagnostic testing and evaluation services to five (5) schools from September 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005. Payment shall be at the rate of \$1,000 per week, total amount not to exceed \$40,000 from Account # 5530-292-2142-330.
- 23. Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic (WPIC) To participate in a program with the District's Program for Students with Exceptionalities (PSE) which is designed

to identify and stabilize children and adolescents already identified as in need of special education services who are now experiencing significant mental health issues. The contract will support the services of a teacher and two paraprofessionals employed by WPIC. Students ranging from twelve through eighteen years will continue to receive their emotional support and educational program along with mental health/partial hospital services provided on site at WPIC South Side. Payment shall be at the rate of \$10,350 per month, total amount not to exceed \$103,500 from Account # 5500-264-1231-323.

- 24. Competitive Employment Opportunities To provide specialized supportive employment services to students with severe disabilities via job consultation; counseling and placement; and feedback to teachers, parents/guardians and employers. Meetings will be conducted with employers and agencies involved with the students to explain individual student resources. Payment shall be at the rate of \$44 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$5,000 from Account # 5211-241-1211-323.
- 25. Watson Institute To provide consultative services in the area of autism. The contractor will provide training to staff and assist in case management for the Autistic Support classrooms and students who are included in the regular education setting. The consultant will provide feedback via meetings, trainings and reports. In addition, the contractor will provide clinical supervision and consultation support to the education programs at Conroy Education Center. Payment shall be at the rate of \$60 per hour plus 32.5 cents per mile, total amount not to exceed \$150,000 from Account # 5211-264-1211-330.
- 26. Ghadud Na'um-el, The Seventh District Men's Association To develop a seven-week program for thirty (30) to fifty (50) ninth and twelfth grade students for the purpose of developing leadership skills through public speaking and debate forums. Students will gain a better understanding of the resources and economic framework in the larger Homewood community during three (3)-hour sessions conducted three (3) times per week over a seven (7)-week period. As a culminating activity, students will prepare a position paper and will be expected to use their positions to present a rationale for change to the other student participants via a public speaking forum. Payment shall be at the rate of \$25 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$2,000 from Account #4327-297-1490-323.
- 27. Nego, Gato Inc, Justin Laing To implement the Queen Nzinga Project, which enhances the artistic abilities of the students at Miller African Centered Academy in the areas of oral recitation, interpretive dance and instrumentation. This project also has a tutorial component in reading and math for all children who participate in the program. The Afro-Brazilian Martial Arts Program known as Capoeria will also be taught to forty-five (45) students in grades K through 5 that are enrolled in the program four days per week. The dates of operation include October 2004 through May 2005. Payment shall be at the rate of \$2,500 per

month, total amount not to exceed \$20,000 from Account # 4154-607-3210/2380/1100-599.

- 28. Rebecca J. Altman To work with tenth and eleventh graders during the month of August 2004 to assist students in mathematical skills by utilizing a technologically-based program. Students will be coached, utilizing math concepts that are aligned with the state standards. Students will attend classes for two (2) hours per day for a four (4)-week period. This program shall be at no cost to the District.
- 29. Communities In Schools, Mr. Mort Stanfield To plan, recommend and execute techniques that provide services to students, their families and the extended community by bringing resources and programs into the school in support of the school CEIP. Responsibilities include:
 - Continual analysis and improvement of the existing delivery system
 - Development of a comprehensive service delivery plan
 - Coordination of the delivery of identified services to students
 - Fostering of student academic achievement in math and reading
 - Provision of liaison services between the school and outside agencies
 - Development of community service projects
 - Implementation of the "Community of Caring" program
 - Collaboration with the school's CEIP planning team

Payment shall be in two installments of \$20,000 each, total amount not to exceed \$40,000 from Account # 4210-607-3300-330.

30. The Academy – To provide an educational program to address the needs of up to forty (40) adjudicated high school students who demonstrate patterns of chronic truancy, academic failure and disruptive behavior. The students will be transported to The Academy daily and receive instruction that facilitates the completion of Pittsburgh Public Schools graduation requirements. Students will be assigned to the Academy program through the Juvenile Justice System. The academy will work in collaboration with the Office of Student Services to ensure that curricular and instructional programs are congruent with those of the District, including administration of the Terra Nova, PSSA and New Standards Assessments and the completion of the graduation project. Academy staff will participate in PPS professional development activities as needed. PPS will also assist Academy staff with Special Education and Vocational Education services so that continuity of program is assured for all students. The Academy and PPS Staff will participate on the Sterring/Screening Committee to select the most appropriate program options for identified students. PPS staff will make regular visits to the Academy to review program implementation. The program will be funded for the first semester of the 2004-2005 school year in the amount of \$192,000, and the Academy and PPS staff will explore other sources of funding, including the Charter School application process. If the contract is funded

through the second semester, the total amount will not exceed \$384,000 from Account #4000-010-1100-323.

Duquesne University – For a non-credit Certificate Program in Instructional Technology for up to thirty-two (32) Pittsburgh Public Schools teachers (sixteen (16) for the K-12 strand and sixteen for the Distance Learning strand) who are currently teaching in one of the Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) grant Year 2 sites (Clayton, East Hills, Grandview, Lemington, Frick, Greenway, Letsche, and Oliver). Upon completion, the teachers will be eligible to apply for the Instructional Technology Certificate through the State of Pennsylvania. The program is to begin August 25, 2004 and will end August 31, 2005. Payment shall be \$366,764 from Account # 4000-148-2271-323.

Payments Authorized

RESOLVED, That the Board authorize payments in the amounts set forth below to the following individuals, groups, and organizations, including School District employees and others who will participate in activities of the School District or provide services, as described in subparagraphs 1 through 27, inclusive.

- 1. Port Authority of Allegheny County For monthly bus passes and/or zone tickets for Head Start families who live in excess of 1.5 miles from their respective center. The dates of operation include August 1, 2004 through July 31, 2005. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$60,000 from Account # 4800-225-1441-599.
- 2. Allegheny County Health Department For Head Start teachers and paraprofessionals to participate in a two-day Food Protection certification workshop. The certificate is mandatory for personnel who serve food to children. Staff will have the option of attending the workshop on one of two dates -- September 13 or 20, 2004. Approximately twenty-two individuals will receive training. The cost of the workshop is \$60 per person, total amount not to exceed \$1,320 from Account Number 4800-225-1441-599
- 3. Forty-One (41) Head Start Staff To work an additional two (2) weeks -- on July 26-30, 2004 and August 9-13, 2004 -- to assist with recruitment and other activities necessary to meet mandated enrollment by the start of the 2004-2005 school year. Staff will be compensated at their respective daily rates, total amount not to exceed \$93,106 from Funds 122/225.
- 4. Hazel Carter Catering To provide food for Washington Polytechnic Academy's Sixth Grade Orientation at a cost up to \$7 per person for approximately one hundred (100) parents and their children to attend a day of activities designed to review reading and math curriculum with the staff, interact with teachers and share in a catered dinner at the end of May or the beginning of June 2005. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$700 from Account # 4290-207-3300-635.

- 5. In Connection with the Ninth Grade Orientation Program at Allderdice High School Payment for the following:
 - Transportation not to exceed \$1,300
 - Up to 30 teachers for three (3) hours each at the workshop rate of \$22.05

The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$3,284.50 from Account # 4301-297-3210-138/519.

- 6. All High School Special Education Reading Teachers Payment at the prevailing workshop rate of \$22.05 per hour for participation in two full-day workshops on reading strategies and the Board-approved adoption, **Reading Skills for Life.** Payment shall be for ten (10) hours per attendee, total amount not to exceed \$4,100 from Account # 5241-241-1241.
- 7. School District/University Collaborative Site Liaisons Who Have Been Assigned Student Teachers or Interns for the Semester Payment of \$100 to each site liaison, total amount not to exceed \$10,000 from Account # 8000-196-2270-124/114 for the 2004-2005 school year.
- 8. In Connection with an extended-school foreign language tutorial program for approximately Fifteen (15) Students in Grades 3-5 at Linden Payment to three (3) teachers to administer and score a German proficiency test for each student on August 27, 2004. Payment shall be at the rate of \$22.05 per hour, total amount not to exceed \$1,455.30 from Account # 4149-607-1100-124.
- 9. Up to Ten (10) ITL/Staff Members Compensation for two (2) to three (3) hours at the workshop rate of \$22.05 to attend an Instructional Cabinet Instructional Focus Meeting for the 2004-2005 school year on August 25, 2004. The objective is to set instructional goals together. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$700 from Account # 4204-607-1100-124.
- 10. Leadership Team of Up to Five Teachers from Allegheny Traditional Academy Middle School to participate in the Duquesne University APEX Program. The purpose of this 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 Teachers Academy is to foster teacher leadership, develop school improvement programs, build professional learning communities and promote student success. The teachers shall be provided an Academy Leadership experience to develop knowledge of data collection and analysis, school culture, communication systems, decision-making structures, and team grant implementation. The total cost of this program is \$1,900 per year from Account # 4204-278-1490-323.
- 11. Up to Eight (8) Allegheny Traditional Academy Middle School Teachers To implement a Title I Extended Day Program to operate from September 2004 through June 2005, three (3) times per week, not to exceed two hundred (200)

- sessions. Compensation shall be at the workshop rate of \$22.71 from Account # 4204-207-3300-124.
- 12. Up to Ten (10) ATA Teachers Who Will be Utilizing the ACTIVboard technology Compensation at the workshop rate of \$22.05 per hour to attend Star Tech professional development training before the start of school, on August 26, 2004. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$1,600 from Account # 4204-607-1100-124.
- 13. Six (6) PPS Staff For training on Cisco-related curriculum on August 2-24, 2004. Compensation shall be at the workshop rate for up to ninety-six (96) hours of training. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$11,836.80 from Account # 4318-145-2240-124.
- 14. Up to Twenty-Five (25) Teachers, Two (2) Secretaries and One (1) Administrator To work five (5) additional days to prepare to open the new Homewood Elementary School. The preparation of classrooms, orientation and professional development activities will occur on or before August 27, 2004. - 7 slots are available.

- 9 old, please contact us, if you are interested in
- 10 having your child participate in our Head Start

- 13 with income eligibility guidelines.
- So we will make you aware of those

- We were able to receive a grant from the

- 1 Pennsylvania, you receive 66 and two-thirds of your
- 2 average weekly wage.
- 3 Whether it is through traditional
- 4 vocational rehabilitation, a transitional duty job
- 5 with the school district itself, or funded
- 6 unemployment which would be much more restricted in
- 7 scope, if the rate of pay is less than what you earn,
- 8 your -- less than the 66 and two-thirds, you receive
- 9 the differential.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: So you are going by the 66
- 11 and two-thirds.
- But whatever their normal yearly salary
- 13 was, if their new job is less than that, they will
- 14 lose that money?
- MR. BERDNIK: That would be the same as if
- 16 they did not have an employment opportunity, they
- 17 would still receive under the law 66 and two-thirds
- 18 under the workers' compensation rate.
- That workers' comp is exempt, however, from
- 20 federal taxation.
- Usually the employees end up being pretty
- 22 close to whole.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. President.
- Mr. Berdnik, is that only for a time

- 1 period, though, that the difference is paid?
- 2 Is there a limit of time that the
- 3 difference is paid to that person?

with the Policy Council, as we said, and remember in

- The Policy Council was invited there.
- 3 Eight members showed up.
- We discussed and gave the presentation to
- 5 them at that time.
- And then about 2:30, we gave the other
- 7 presentation to staff members of the Policy Council.
- And at the 10:30 meeting, there was a
- 9 consensus that we would get the information out to
- 10 some other -- the Executive Committee, to make sure
- 11 that they knew about the proposed reorg., and those
- 12 things that were presented with the PowerPoint, and
- 13 then they would do -- the Policy Council would do a
- 14 telephone canvassing, if you will, to determine

    say something about parental involvement.
23
                I think this Board has gone on record, a
24
    number of times, about caring about parents, and
25
    parents' voice in this School District, and we have
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- 1 made a tremendous number of attempts to communicate
- 2 with all parents, at all time.
- 3 My understanding, and Dr. Thompson, or
- 4 Dr. King, you may correct me if I am wrong, but in our
- 5 meetings concerning this, and in my discussions with
- 6 you, based on the discussions that other Board members
- 7 have had with me, your feeling is that this
- 8 reorganization is necessary at this time, to benefit
- 9 the maximum number of children in this School
- 10 District, and the maximum number of families; that we
- 11 have a responsibility, with this Head Start program --
- 12 and I think, Mr. Brentley, some people have gotten
- 13 very erroneous information out to the public, we never
- 14 were ending Head Start, we never were stopping Head
- 15 Start, we had expanded Head Start in this District to
- 16 1,313 children, we do not have all of the eligible
- 17 children in this city who could be enrolled, enrolled,
- 18 we must do that or we are going to be sanctioned by
- 19 the Head Start regional office.
- The Head Start regional review, that just
- 21 took place, of all of my conversations with the people
- 22 that were in here, was favorable.
- What we are doing, is we are expanding our
- 24 offerings to children in this District, by being one
- 25 of the few school districts -- and I commend this

- 1 Board, for this action, one of the few districts in
- 2 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, that has taken the
- 3 accountability block grant money, and beginning a four
- 4 year old, or a pre-kindergarten program. It is huge.
- 5 So I don't necessarily agree with you on
- 6 this.
- 7 I think what we are doing, is expanding
- 8 services to children, both Head Start eligible, and
- 9 non Head Start eligible children, who will benefit by
- 10 a four year old program in this District.
- I commend this Board for that action, and
- 12 especially the staff, for being able to move as
- 13 quickly as they did, to get the accountability block
- 14 grant application into the Commonwealth of
- 15 Pennsylvania, and have it approved, without any
- 16 problem whatsoever.
- So, I beg to differ with you, in your
- 18 analysis.
- I also was led to believe, by Dr. Thompson,
- 20 and Dr. King, that they did have a meeting last week,
- 21 the meeting was rescheduled at the Policy Council's
- 22 request, to yesterday, Tuesday, at 10:00 a.m.
- 23 Am I correct, Dr. Thompson?
- DR. THOMPSON: Not Tuesday, it was Monday.
- MR. ISLER: Monday, I'm sorry, today is

- 1 Tuesday.
- DR. THOMPSON: That's correct.
- 3 MR. ISLER: My problem.
- 4 So I just am satisfied with the response
- 5 that I have received from Dr. King and Dr. Thompson on
- 6 this, which is why I am willing to go ahead with the
- 7 vote.
- 8 Any other questions or comments?
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 10 MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I do have a point.
- Mr. Isler, first of all, you won't get an
- 13 argument out of me, about the importance of providing
- 14 the best service for our students, and so -- and I
- 15 want to make that very clear.
- My concern, again, is the issue of
- 17 procedures, my concern is that we have in place a
- 18 Council, a structure, that is supposed to be a shared
- 19 governance, and we violated that.
- We have not -- we have not established a
- 21 shared governance relationship with them.
- It has been a strained relationship. And
- 23 that's my concern.
- Not to mention that I think sometimes, you
- 25 know, we kind of -- we overlook our parent group.

- 1 This particular Policy Council is extremely
- 2 sophisticated.
- 3 They are extremely knowledgeable on the
- 4 rules and regulations that govern.
- 5 They understand their roles, and their
- 6 responsibilities.
- 7 And they simply should have been given an
- 8 opportunity to see a complete roll out of the proposed
- 9 organization, but not at the midnight hour.
- And not with pressure being put on them,
- 11 that we need to know, we want to know, you got to do
- 12 this and, more importantly, it is my understanding,
- 13 that the consensus from those parents, were that they
- 14 were not ready to embrace this.
- They wanted an opportunity to talk about
- 16 that.
- And so, it is not an unreasonable request.
- 18 But here we are, we can shove that before
- 19 those parents, and then expect them to respond.
- Heck, we don't -- we stop stuff, when stuff
- 21 is shoved before us, before a vote, and we don't have
- 22 enough time to talk about it.
- 23 And they are only asking for the same
- 24 consideration.
- 25 Another point I wanted to mention, is that

- 1 also at the meeting, Dr. Thompson, we agreed to bring
- 2 back that staff, and increase that Board tab, at that
- 3 meeting, Dr. King, to bring these employees back to
- 4 help with the recruiting process, which we all agreed
- 5 on.
- 6 Have we done that?
- 7 DR. THOMPSON: Yes.
- MR. BRENTLEY: We have increased it, so
- 9 they will be --
- DR. KING: We are employing the staff an
- 11 additional two weeks to recruit the 1,313 children.
- 12 We believe that should be a sufficient amount of time
- 13 to recruit that number of children.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- And is that what they agreed upon?
- Because they were already coming back two
- 17 weeks in advance, but because we have an increased
- 18 goal, it was my understanding that we talked about
- 19 bringing them back prior to that, the regular two
- 20 weeks they are supposed to come back; is --
- DR. KING: That was something the Policy
- 22 Council wanted us to consider, and we did, but based
- 23 on the one funding year ending, and the other funding
- 24 year beginning, the best way for us to support that
- 25 activity, was a week in this last funding year that is

- 1 closing, and an additional week in the funding year
- 2 that is opening, and that's the way we proceeded.
- MR. BRENTLEY: So we did not do that, then.
- DR. KING: No, we did not. We kept the two
- 5 week additional work time for everyone.
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- Well, let me just say, I am disappointed,
- 8 but also, in closing, Mr. President, just on an issue
- 9 of procedure, I'm starting to feel a little something
- 10 different, as a Board member here.
- This is probably the third time, as a Board
- 12 member, I am the liaison to this particular Policy
- 13 Council, appointed by you, once again, Mr. President,
- 14 my recommendations have not been considered by my
- 15 colleagues, while colleagues, their recommendations,
- 16 not only considered, but they are given a free --
- 17 freedom to do what they want with the particular
- 18 committee that they have.
- And I feel bad about that, and I am hoping
- 20 you, as the Board president, would change that.
- I have a right to make recommendations, I
- 22 would hope that my colleagues would honor that, being
- 23 that I attend the meetings, I am the contact person,
- 24 and my recommendations got to mean a little bit of
- 25 something.

- 1 The Board members around here, they are
- 2 often times -- Dr. Dowd, you would ask him, "Is this
- 3 okay with you, Dr. Dowd? Is this okay with you,
- 4 Mr. Taylor," or whatever.
- 5 That same courtesy is not given to me, and
- 6 I would hope that you would consider giving me the
- 7 same courtesy that my colleagues receive.
- 8 MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley, unfortunately you
- 9 were not here last week, and we did turn to Mr. McCrea
- 10 on a number of occasions, because he also was a Board
- 11 member in attendance at that meeting.
- 12 So when we had a rather --
- MR. BRENTLEY: But I am the contact person,
- 14 I am the chairman.
- MR. ISLER: I am not saying you are not.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- MR. ISLER: I am not saying you are not.
- MR. BRENTLEY: That's the difference.
- MR. ISLER: I am not saying you are not.
- But there was another Board member there,
- 21 so that was how that was handled, and this is a Board,
- 22 and you were correct, it is about your colleagues, and
- 23 whether or not this Board can support what you are
- 24 recommending, or any Board member is recommending,
- 25 versus what the Superintendent is recommending to this

- 1 Board also.
- So, there, we have, I think, talked about
- 3 this extensively, at this Board, and especially at
- 4 last week's meeting.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I want that to be
- 6 noted, as when I was the former chair of the MBE, it
- 7 was the same thing, I would attend, and make
- 8 recommendations, my colleagues here would huddle, and
- 9 vote against my recommendation.

- 11 hiring, or recommendations for the MBE, it was even --
- 12 it wasn't considered.
- And I am only asking you, as the Board
- 14 president, that I should have the same courtesy as the
- 15 other Board members.

- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: I just want to clarify my
- 21 position, on, I am going to abstain on this, because I
- 22 think the Policy Council needs more time to digest
- 23 this, they also need to have a lot more definition of
- 24 not only the terminology, but their responsibilities,

- And that's why I feel that I have to
- 2 abstain on this.
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. McCrea.
- 5 Dr. Thompson, Dr. King, did you hear
- 6 Mr. McCrea's comments?
- 7 Thank you.
- 8 If there were no other comments,
- 9 Mr. Rushford, could we have a roll call vote, please.
- MR. RUSHFORD: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, on the report, and no
- 12 on all items related to the reorganization of the Head
- 13 Start, and I will attempt to number them, and I
- 14 believe it's on Addendum A, that's 1 -- Addendum --
- 15 that's it.
- 16 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. It is Addendum A, 1

ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Rushford. 5 Is there any other business to be brought 6 before this Board this evening? 7 Any new business? 8 Mr. Brentley. 9 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. 10 Mr. President, last week I had an 11 opportunity to attend a conference, and unfortunately 12 my plane was late, I did not have an opportunity to 13 call in my vote, there was some very important issues 14 that I did not have an opportunity to vote on, and 15 I am asking procedurally, would it be legal, or 16 permitted for me to raise those issues and to get an 17 opportunity to vote on them. 18 MR. ISLER: Will you please raise your 19 specific issues with Mr. Rushford.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, there are three.
- One is the approval of the Carnegie
- 22 Learning curriculum.
- The second one is the approval of Duquesne
- 24 University technology classes, for our selected
- 25 teachers.

- 1 And the third one is the back to school
- 2 rally issue.
- 3 MR. RUSHFORD: Our office has reviewed this
- 4 matter extensively, and in reviewing the Roberts'
- 5 Rules of Order, and the pertinent case law, members
- 6 who are not present at the meeting, are permitted to
- 7 bring up motions for reconsideration.
- Any member who votes in opposition to a
- 9 nonprevailing item, would typically be the person to
- 10 bring the motion for reconsideration, but that has
- 11 also been recognized to extend to those members who
- 12 are absent, the theory being that that member has a
- 13 right to vote, and a right to participate under the
- 14 law.
- MR. ISLER: That being said, Mr. Brentley,
- 16 if there is something that you would want to bring up
- 17 before this Board for reconsideration, could you
- 18 please be specific, and read the items for us, if you
- 19 have them before you.
- 20 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I would like to -- I
- 21 believe it is --
- 22 DR. KING: These are the official items
- 23 here.
- MR. ISLER: Would you please give them to
- 25 Mr. Brentley, because Mr. Brentley is the one making

the motion. 2 I want to make sure that it is handled correctly. 4 DR. KING: It starts right here. MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. 6 Okay. This is a motion to reconsider the Duquesne University, for noncredited certificate 8 program. 9 (Mr. Brentley read from prepared material.) 10 MS. COLAIZZI: Is this open for 11 discussion? 12 MR. ISLER: No, Mr. Brentley still has the 13 floor. 14 MR. BRENTLEY: All right. I am trying to 15 look. 16 MR. McCREA: Don't second. 17 MR. - 1 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, sir.
- 2 MR. ISLER: We have before us a motion to
- 3 reconsider items from last Tuesday's meeting.
- 4 Do we have a second?
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Before you go on.
- 6 MR. ISLER: We need, Mrs. Colaizzi, to get
- 7 a second --
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: I second.
- 9 MR. ISLER: -- or not, before we can have a
- 10 discussion.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I'm afraid --
- MR. ISLER: We have a second.
- Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Sir, I was trying to tell
- 15 you that all three of those should be done separately,
- 16 for motions to reconsider, not all in one.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Rushford.
- 18 MR. RUSHFORD: I don't believe that there
- 19 is prohibition from including them as three motions,
- 20 together.
- 21 MS. COLAIZZI: I have an objective to make

- DR. DOWD: Point of clarification, please.
- MR. ISLER: Dr. Dowd.
- DR. DOWD: Mr. Rushford, is there a

- 1 difference between the vote to -- the vote on the
- 2 particular item, and the motion to reconsider?
- 3 Mr. Brentley, has made, as I understand it,
- 4 a motion to reconsider, which means he is requesting
- 5 of his colleagues that we reconsider these matters,
- 6 and these three particular matters.
- Were they to be voted in the affirmative to
- 8 be reconsidered, then we would, from that point, move
- 9 to an individual vote on each particular item; is that
- 10 correct?
- MR. RUSHFORD: Correct.
- DR. DOWD: Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: And also, if I may,
- 14 Mr. President, do -- does the second also -- and I
- 15 guess it would be for the solicitor -- does the second
- 16 also have to come from the Board members that voted
- 17 against this --
- MR. RUSHFORD: No.
- MS. COLAIZZI: -- prior to this evening?
- MR. RUSHFORD: No.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, Mr. Rushford has
- 22 indicated no.
- MR. McCREA: Yes, it does.
- MR. RUSHFORD: It is only the individual
- 25 who is making -- who is moving the motion, not the

- 1 second.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I am sorry, Mr. Rushford,
- 3 could you repeat that, please.
- 4 MR. RUSHFORD: I said, the rule requiring
- 5 that it be a person who voted in the minority, or was
- 6 not present, does not apply to the individual who
- 7 seconds the motion.
- 8 MR. McCREA: What?
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: I don't under --
- 10 MR. ISLER: I will ask him, Mr. McCrea --
- 11 Mr. McCrea, I will ask him to repeat it one more time
- 12 for you.
- MR. RUSHFORD: Anyone can second the
- 14 motion.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Thank you.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink.
- MS. FINK: Okay.
- This is actually a surprise to me, after
- 19 all of my years, I didn't realize that if someone
- 20 missed a meeting, they could call for reconsideration,
- 21 because they were not here and had the opportunity to
- 22 vote.
- I know, in many instances, over many years,
- 24 someone was unavoidably unable to attend a meeting,
- 25 and did not have that ability.

- So, tell me, now, is that just because this
- 2 meeting was not adjourned, but it is a continuation,
- 3 does that make it a different circumstance than had
- 4 the meeting been officially closed or adjourned?
- 5 MR. RUSHFORD: I don't believe that that
- 6 makes any difference, in the meeting -- I mean, the
- 7 motion.
- 8 The issue is the motion to reconsider.
- 9 There does have to be a very short time
- 10 line, though, on the motion to reconsider.
- MR. McCREA: Excuse me, it should be a
- 12 motion to reconsider immediately.
- MR. RUSHFORD: Well, or as quickly as
- 14 possible.
- I mean, that's basically what Roberts'
- 16 Rules says, so you can't wait until the next monthly
- 17 meeting to decide to do that.
- MS. FINK: So in other words, if we would
- 19 have adjourned the meeting last week, and then we had
- 20 a quorum, or a full complement of Board members, and
- 21 the person who had missed the meeting wanted to call a
- 22 special legislative meeting to ask for
- 23 reconsideration, you could do that?
- MR. RUSHFORD: You could do that. It has
- 25 to be within a very short period of time.

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1 MR. TAYLOR: What is that period of time?
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- 2 MR. McCREA: I doubt that.
- 3 MR. RUSHFORD: The rules state the it has
- 4 to be within -- either within the next succeeding day,
- 5 or in which case, if there is a holiday or a weekend,
- 6 that following working day.
- 7 MS. FINK: Mr. Rushford, we have passed
- 8 that time line.
- 9 MR. RUSHFORD: But this meeting is
- 10 recessed.
- 11 That's why it is different.
- MS. FINK: So it's --
- MS. COLAIZZI: So, may I?
- 14 MR. ISLER: Yes, Mrs. Colaizzi, go ahead,
- 15 please.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 17 What I don't understand, and I would like
- 18 clarification, if the meeting was not adjourned, how
- 19 can we bring something back up that was just simply
- 20 part of the meeting already?
- It's almost as though, you are -- we had
- 22 finished the Education, and we are now reopening it
- 23 under Business.
- It should have been under the Education,
- 25 and only under the Education.

- 1 How can it fall under new business, if the
- 2 meeting was never adjourned?
- 3 MS. FINK: She has an excellent point.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, we will let
- 5 Mr. Rushford respond.
- 6 Thank you.
- 7 MR. RUSHFORD: Well, this -- I mean,
- 8 this -- that part of the meeting had concluded, so it
- 9 is sort of -- I mean, it is -- it would only fall
- 10 within the new business portion of the meeting,
- 11 because to my understanding, this recessed meeting,
- 12 the only matters that we covered, were the human
- 13 resources report of the Superintendent.
- So, that having been said -- and I don't
- 15 believe that there is any prohibition in Roberts'
- 16 Rules of Order --
- 17 MR. McCREA: There is.
- MR. RUSHFORD: -- with respect to the issue
- 19 of -- excuse me, with respect to the issue of bringing
- 20 matters up under new business.
- MR. McCREA: There is.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea, if you would like
- 23 to be recognized, could you please do that, so that we
- 24 can get you on the record, instead of just throwing
- 25 out comments.

- 1 MR. McCREA: All right.
- 2 MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor.
- 3 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, I do understand some
- 4 Board members have some disagreements with some of
- 5 those proposals, but I think we have to take into
- 6 account that Mr. Brentley was not able to get to a
- 7 phone, and this evening, both you, Mr. McCrea, and
- 8 Mrs. Colaizzi, were not able to be here in person.
- 9 So -- so we attempt to accommodate the
- 10 people that you are representing, by allowing people
- 11 to call in on the phone.
- I mean, people could raise the question,
- 13 are we really talking to Mrs. Colaizzi, or Mr. McCrea.
- But we don't do that, because we want to
- 15 accommodate the people that we represent.
- Now, Mr. Brentley, by bringing up these two
- 17 items, obviously is in support of them, and obviously
- 18 would have voted for them, had he been able to get to
- 19 a phone last week.
- 20 Which would have made those -- those items
- 21 passed.
- So I think it would be very unfortunate,
- 23 for Board members to attempt to exclude Mr. Brentley's
- 24 vote and attempt not to accommodate him, as we are
- 25 attempting to accommodate you this evening.

- 1 MR. ISLER: All right. Thank you,
- 2 Mr. Taylor.
- 3 Mrs. Fink, and then Mr. Romaniello, and
- 4 then Mr. Matthews.
- 5 MS. FINK: Okay.
- And Mr. McCrea, because he had asked that
- 7 he speak.
- But what I am concerned about, is not
- 9 excluding Mr. Brentley's vote, what I am concerned
- 10 about is establishing a precedent here.
- Because here is what's happening: This is
- 12 the continuation of a meeting.
- We voted on all three of these issues that
- 14 Mr. Brentley has brought up for reconsideration. The
- 15 vote was 4-4, they failed for lack of a majority, at
- 16 the last meeting.
- Actually, it wasn't the last meeting, it is
- 18 the same meeting.
- MR. ISLER: Same meeting.
- MS. FINK: So, now next month comes, and
- 21 something happens that one of us disagree with, and we
- 22 can bring this up under new business now, and ask for
- 23 a reconsideration under new business?
- MR. RUSHFORD: No, because it would have to
- 25 have been the next legislative meeting, or a recessed

- 1 meeting.
- 2 MR. McCREA: Point of order.
- 3 MS. FINK: But this is the same meeting.
- 4 MR. McCREA: Point of order, please.
- 5 MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea, hold on one moment.
- 6 MR. McCREA: I have Roberts' Rules in front
- 7 of me, and a motion to reconsider, is -- has a
- 8 reference to a motion on the floor.
- 9 There is no motion on the floor. The
- 10 motion on the floor is the motion to reconsider, which
- 11 there has to be a motion on the floor first, in order
- 12 to get a reconsideration.
- Voting has been closed.
- MR. RUSHFORD: The motion to reconsider is
- 15 its own motion, and then the motion itself would be
- 16 the second item.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea, do you have the
- 18 Roberts' Rules of Order in front of you, or do you
- 19 have -- what are you referring to, please?
- MR. McCREA: This is on page 20, of the
- 21 abridged version.
- MR. ISLER: Well, that's -- I don't -- I
- 23 just want, for your clarification, what Mr. Rushford
- 24 is referring to is not the abridged version. Not the
- 25 parliamentary procedure at a glance.

- MR. McCREA: Right. 1 2 MR. ISLER: That is not what he is 3 referring to. MR. McCREA: Well --4 5 MR. RUSHFORD: What I am referring to, is "A motion to reconsideration. The motion" -- "with 6 respect to the motion to reconsideration takes precedent over all other motions." 8 9 MR. McCREA: Right. MR. RUSHFORD: Whatever. "And yields to 10 11 nothing." 12 So, therefore, in my opinion, that being 13 the case, it doesn't make sense to have any motion to 14 reconsideration, without having the motion in itself 15 come after that. 16 It would seem to be putting the cart before 17 the horse to consider the motion itself, if the motion to reconsideration were to fail. 18 19 MR. ISLER: All right. 20 Mr. Romaniello. 21 MR. ROMANIELLO: Last -- before this
- But, saying that, in the, you know, sport

meeting was adjourned last week, I was not in favor of

25 of fairness, having been through exactly what

these resolutions.

- 1 Mr. Rushford is reading, I have to admit that at a
- 2 meeting I have been through that, and once a motion is
- 3 defeated, it can be brought up for reconsideration in
- 4 that same meeting, you know, and this is the same
- 5 meeting, and like I said, I wasn't in favor of this,
- 6 but I had it done to me, and a reconsideration vote
- 7 can be brought up before that meeting of which the
- 8 other motion was defeated, is adjourned.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 10 Mr. Matthews.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you.
- 12 Actually, I was going to reiterate the same
- 13 thing that Dan has just mentioned.
- 14 But I think we need to understand what is
- 15 the real crux of the argument. Is it the motion, or
- 16 is it the items of the motion? And I think that's
- 17 what the issue is.
- 18 You know, the fact that Mr. Brentley was
- 19 unable to participate on that particular day, and he
- 20 has brought up these items for reconsideration, which
- 21 can only take place after a motion has been defeated,
- 22 You can't reconsider something that has not been
- 23 defeated.
- 24 So I think what we have to realize is, what
- 25 is the real -- what is the real argument, behind this

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1 discussion.
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- Is it the actual motion, or is it the items
- 3 that are in the motion? And I think that's what
- 4 people need to consider.
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: May I --
- 6 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Matthews, we
- 7 will go to Dr. Dowd, then Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 8 Dr. Dowd.
- 9 DR. DOWD: My point is very simple: You
- 10 are right, Mrs. Fink, a motion to reconsider could
- 11 happen at any point in a meeting; if something were
- 12 voted in a particular way, any person who voted in the
- 13 majority, if I understand Mr. Rushford correctly, can
- 14 move to reconsider.
- And, you know, all things being equal, or
- 16 nothing changing, the vote would be the same.
- Mr. Brentley, however, being absent, does
- 18 make this a particularly different situation.
- 19 So his being present now, for the second
- 20 half of this meeting, does in fact possibly -- though
- 21 we don't know yet, possibly change some of the vote
- 22 structure, and would therefore make this a legitimate
- 23 motion.
- 24 And at this point in time, I do want to
- 25 point out, we are not discussing anything other than

- 1 the motion to reconsider, and when we get to the
- 2 discussion of -- if we were to pass a motion to
- 3 reconsider, then we would go back and have our
- 4 discussion of these various items.
- 5 So, you know, if nothing is to change, the
- 6 vote would remain the same.
- 7 I mean, that would be -- the
- 8 reconsideration would lead us to the same conclusion.
- 9 There was an absence, and that might
- 10 change, or it might not change the outcome.
- 11 MR. TAYLOR: I just --
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Dr. Dowd.
- Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I am rather, very confused,
- 15 and frustrated, with what is taking place here.
- 16 If somebody is absent, then they are
- 17 absent.
- There should be no -- no reconsideration,
- 19 for something, if somebody is just not there.
- To me, this is nothing but an opportunity
- 21 to bring something, that was defeated, up on the
- 22 floor.
- If this is the case, then from now on, any
- 24 time somebody doesn't happen to be at one of our
- 25 meetings, they can simply bring something up, and

- 1 reconsider it.
- 2 This can go on and on and on forever, at
- 3 any of our meetings.
- 4 MR. RUSHFORD: Only if it occurs on the --
- 5 sorry.
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: My point is, again, this
- 7 fell under the Education part that was closed, and I'm
- 8 still not clear to the answer as to can it be brought
- 9 up under new business, when it was very much under the
- 10 Education portion of our meeting, that was then
- 11 completed.
- So if I am missing from a meeting that
- 13 happened to be under the education, and I didn't get
- 14 to cast my vote, well, then I get to pass it again.
- But furthermore, this now sets another --
- 16 another situation, where anybody and everybody can be
- 17 convinced to change their mind, when the next meeting
- 18 comes along. Which really has me disturbed.
- You vote on something, it's done. You
- 20 don't just get a chance to change your mind later on.
- I have a very serious issue with this.
- We have never done this before.
- MR. ISLER: Well --
- MR. RUSHFORD: If I could just --
- MS. COLAIZZI: If you can tell me when.

- 1 MR. RUSHFORD: If I could just address
- 2 that.
- 3 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, before
- 4 Mr. Rushford begins, I am relying on legal counsel,
- 5 and he does want to try to clarify this for you.
- 6 MR. RUSHFORD: With respect to the issue of
- 7 being able to bring it up at the next meeting, there
- 8 is a key distinction with this, is that you cannot
- 9 bring up this motion to reconsider issue unless it
- 10 occurs, as I said before, on the next legislative day,
- 11 and I mentioned that if there is a holiday or a
- 12 weekend, it falls on that following day, or as in the
- 13 case of tonight's meeting, it happens to be a recessed
- 14 meeting.
- So it couldn't just be brought up at the
- 16 next regular meeting, it has to be within the very
- 17 strict confines of the law.
- So, from that standpoint -- and I would
- 19 have to say that we, both Mr. Weiss, and myself, have
- 20 looked at this extensively today, as this issue was
- 21 brought to us, and it is our opinion, and we have
- 22 advised other clients when this has arisen, of this
- 23 very same principle.
- So, I understand reasonable minds can
- 25 differ, but this is our legal opinion.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: So, may I also ask, then, in
- 2 the future, if a Board member does not wish to vote on
- 3 something, they do not simply appear, or do not come
- 4 on the phone, to be at a meeting, and then bring it up
- 5 the next time to be able to be the vote that can bring
- 6 it back on the table.
- 7 Mr. Brentley was not there at all. It is
- 8 not like he was the no vote, to bring it back on the
- 9 floor, he was not in attendance.
- 10 MR. RUSHFORD: Only, Mrs. Colaizzi, if that
- 11 were the next legislative day, or it was a recessed
- 12 meeting, like tonight's meeting.
- 13 It could not be at the next regularly
- 14 scheduled legislative meeting.
- MS. COLAIZZI: So if we were not to have
- 16 recessed, and we were to have made it a special
- 17 legislative meeting this evening, Mr. Brentley then
- 18 could have not brought this back up; am I correct,
- 19 sir?
- 20 MR. RUSHFORD: Correct.
- MS. COLAIZZI: And I --
- MS. FINK: Theresa, I agree, your sigh
- 23 pretty much said it all.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Fink, for you
- 25 were not recognized.

- 1 Dr. Dowd.
- DR. DOWD: As far as, just one
- 3 clarification, Mr. Rushford, the fact that this motion
- 4 comes outside of one report or another, Personnel,
- 5 Business, Education, is irrelevant; a motion to
- 6 reconsider, as you said, takes priority over all
- 7 motions; is that correct?
- 8 MR. RUSHFORD: That's correct.
- 9 DR. DOWD: So that it could happen at any
- 10 point, in the meeting, at any time in the meeting.
- MR. RUSHFORD: That is correct.
- 12 And that's the nature of the motion to
- 13 reconsider. A motion to reconsider it, is that it
- 14 follows an action that has already been taken.
- DR. DOWD: Thank you.
- MR. TAYLOR: Let me add one more.
- MR. ISLER: Okay. We have Mr. Taylor, and
- 18 then Mrs. Fink.
- MR. TAYLOR: Boy oh boy.
- 20 Mr. Rushford, doesn't the legislative day
- 21 mean the next legislative action?
- We only have two legislative days -- we
- 23 have one legislative day a month, so if the law is
- 24 saying the next legislative day, wouldn't that mean
- 25 the next month, which means you really would have

- 1 30 days in which to make such a --
- 2 MR. RUSHFORD: That is not my
- 3 interpretation, because the other language of it is
- 4 that it has to be done with some exigency.
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: Well, 30 days would be, but
- 6 I am saying, our legislative day is Wednesday,
- 7 Thursday is just another day, that is not a
- 8 legislative day; in my mind, that would not be a
- 9 legislative day, that would be just another day, but
- 10 our next legislative day is 30 days hence.
- 11 MR. RUSHFORD: I mean, I think you can make
- 12 it, obviously you can make a good argument for that.
- I think that, though, that given the
- 14 background of what's in Roberts' Rules, as to the
- 15 necessity to move these matters, that that
- 16 interpretation wouldn't be something that would be
- 17 supported by the comments in Roberts' Rules of Order.
- I can understand how you can read it that
- 19 way, and others may read it that way.
- MR. TAYLOR: Well, Mr. Rushford, speaking
- 21 of moving, can we move this along.
- MR. ISLER: I just -- if we will.
- 23 Mrs. Fink, do you have anything to add?
- 24 MS. FINK: Just that I will be conducting
- 25 this vote under protest, because I would like an

- 1 official interpretation of this, from a registered
- 2 parliamentarian, because I never heard of such a thing
- 3 in my life, and I --
- 4 MR. McCREA: Here, here.
- 5 MS. FINK: That is an interpretation.
- I have a different interpretation, and it
- 7 could be, if we do this now, I think that this leaves
- 8 a lot of things open for future confusion, to say the
- 9 least.
- 10 And I would really like to delay this whole
- 11 thing, until I hear from a registered parliamentarian,
- 12 as to whether this is appropriate or not.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, I just want to get a
- 14 point of clarification from Mr. Rushford.
- If we delay this, are we then exceeding the
- 16 bounds of Roberts' Rules of Order in terms of the
- 17 timely manner?
- 18 I know, I --
- 19 MR. RUSHFORD: And there is a motion on the
- 20 floor. I mean, the only way to do that, would be to
- 21 table it.
- 22 My recommendation -- obviously, we are
- 23 comfortable with our position on this matter.
- As I said, reasonable minds can differ on
- 25 it, but we are comfortable with the position.

- 1 So obviously, we are recommending that the
- 2 Board, if the Board so chooses, that they consider
- 3 this matter.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Rushford.
- 5 Any other comments?
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Isler.
- 7 MR. ISLER: Yes, ma'am, yes, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 8 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 9 Does this mean, that at the legislative
- 10 meeting coming up, next -- of course, at the end of
- 11 August, that I then can bring this up again?
- 12 MR. ISLER: No, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I'm sorry, I cannot hear
- 14 you, sir.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, I do not want to
- 16 speak for Mr. Rushford, but what Mr. Rushford made
- 17 very clear, is it has to be brought up in a timely
- 18 manner.
- This meeting, if the Board so chooses,
- 20 either is recessed, or adjourned.
- 21 If it is adjourned, a timely manner would
- 22 be the next day, as Mr. -- there is even disagreement
- 23 on the Board to this, but it would be the next day,
- 24 also considering the next legislative day.
- Mr. Taylor raised the issue, is we only

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1 have one legislative day a month, so even that then
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- 2 would be up for discussion, and some interpretation by
- 3 the Board.
- 4 Mr. Matthews.
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: And then the second part has
- 6 to come in, is that you have to be in the majority.
- 7 So you just can't bring it up. You have to
- 8 be in the majority of the --
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Well, I was, until tonight.
- DR. DOWD: No. We haven't voted.
- 11 MR. MATTHEWS: You are asking -- you are
- 12 asking a future vote, and you are saying can you do
- 13 it, and what I am saying is, that what Mr. Isler said
- 14 is correct, but also, you have to also then be in the
- 15 majority.
- MS. FINK: Are you a registered
- 17 parliamentary, Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: I do know my
- 19 parliamentarian, pretty well, yes.
- MS. FINK: (Inaudible.)
- MS. COLAİZZI: (Inaudible.)
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right.
- But his reading from it is correct, and you
- 24 disagree with him.
- 25 So --

- 10 Rules of order, which is before him, which is numerous
- 11 pages.
- Dr. Dowd, and then we --
- DR. DOWD: Just a quick point of
- 14 clarification, the motion to reconsider is also in the
- 15 abridged version of Roberts' Rules of Order.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- MR. ISLER: Do you want to call the
- 18 question?
- MR. ROMANIELLO: I just want to know, if we
- 20 can make a motion to suspend --
- MR. ISLER: We are right --
- MR. ROMANIELLO: -- discussion.

- MR. BRENTLEY: Excuse me, point of order,
- 12 Mr. President, please.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, please.
- You do not have the floor.
- MS. FINK: All right. But --
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink.
- MS. FINK: This is wrong, Bill.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink.
- MS. FINK: It says in standing and special
- 20 committees.
- This is neither.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink.
- MS. FINK: I'm sorry, that's wrong.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink, you may be sorry,
- 25 you are a member of the School Board, and you should

- 1 conduct yourself appropriately.
- 2 MS. FINK: Right.
- MR. ISLER: We have a solicitor's opinion.
- 4 MS. FINK: Well, he better read it again.
- 5 MR. ISLER: Well, we will ask him to read
- 6 it again.
- 7 MR. RUSHFORD: We did. We reviewed that,
- 8 and we also reviewed the pertinent case law, Mr. Weiss
- 9 and myself.
- 10 MR. ISLER: Okay.
- 11 Now --
- MS. FINK: So this is now a standing
- 13 committee.
- 14 Okay.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I would like to vote.
- 17 MR. ISLER: You would like to make a
- 18 motion?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, sir I would like to
- 20 make the vote to --
- 21 MR. ISLER: Motion.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I would like to make a
- 23 motion to vote on the items that were read into the
- 24 minutes earlier, and they are listed in the book, I
- 25 believe on page 17, No. 10, which is the instructional

- 1 materials for adoption for algebra 1 mainstream, also
- 2 on -- I'm sorry, on page 17, and then also on 17,
- 3 No. 12, which is the back to school event, and -- of
- 4 course we always lose the other page.
- 5 I will just read it, the approval of the
- 6 Duquesne University technology classes for selected
- 7 teachers.
- 8 MS. COLAIZZI: Is there no discussion?
- 9 MR. ISLER: Is there -- Mrs. Fink --
- 10 Mrs. Colaizzi, there is only a motion.
- 11 Is there a second?
- MR. TAYLOR: Second.
- DR. DOWD: Second.
- MR. ISLER: There is a second by Dr. Dowd
- 15 and Mr. Taylor.
- 16 Discussion.
- Mr. Romaniello.
- 18 MR. ROMANIELLO: As far as the back to
- 19 school rally, what I was going to say, Mr. Brentley,
- 20 is that I was prepared to bring a resolution to the
- 21 table, under new business, that we go ahead with the
- 22 rally, but that we do not extend -- you know, expend
- 23 any dollars, because we haven't paid for it in the
- 24 past, and while it may seem like if we don't approve
- 25 it, if we just approve without the money, we do pay

- 1 for everybody's salary who is at the rally, and
- 2 besides the vote to close the schools, that we took
- 3 some months ago, I never realized that such a small
- 4 item, in -- on -- in the legislative agenda, would
- 5 have generated so many phone calls that I received
- 6 about this rally from -- not only from taxpayers, but
- 7 also from staff.
- 8 So, my one question would be, if it's
- 9 proper, if I can ask a question, is this a
- 10 voluntary --
- DR. THOMPSON: No.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Pardon?
- DR. THOMPSON: It is a professional
- 14 development day.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Okay. Then that answers.
- 16 Okay.
- But I would like, you know, if this is -- I
- 18 would like to let everybody know that if this
- 19 particular one is voted down, that I will re-enter a
- 20 motion that we have the rally, we go ahead with the
- 21 rally, but without the expenditure of money.
- I'm still not in favor of the expenditure
- 23 of money.
- MR. ISLER: Do you want to amend the
- 25 motion?

- 1 Will you think about that?
- 2 Mrs. Colaizzi, do you have a comment?
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 4 I would like to have discussion on all
- 5 three items, but I will start with the one that
- 6 Mr. Romaniello just touched on, which is the rally.
- 7 I realize that it's considered professional
- 8 development. However, 4.6 math coaches just were
- 9 approved for professional development.
- I do not see how a rally is professional
- 11 development, and I have attended it, and it is
- 12 extremely informative, however, it is not in my
- 13 opinion, professional development.
- 14 It is taxpayers' dollars to pay for
- 15 salaries, when indeed, those teachers could be in the
- 16 classroom preparing for our students to come back.
- 17 Regardless of where the money comes from,
- 18 it is not a necessary event to take place.
- 19 However, from what is appearing to me,
- 20 tonight, it seems like it doesn't matter what I say,
- 21 or what any Board member says, it is going to go
- 22 through, it is going to go through.
- 23 And the taxpayers need to know that this is
- 24 money that need not be spent, could be better spent
- 25 with teachers preparing themselves for these students.

- 1 There is not any professional development
- 2 really going on here, and it is, in my opinion, a
- 3 waste of money.
- So, I will never favor this, I have given
- 5 it the opportunity, I have been there, and I am not in
- 6 favor of it, regardless of where the money comes from.
- 7 So that's that item.
- 8 Shall I continue? Does anybody else have
- 9 anything to say, on the rally, that they would like to
- 10 piggyback.
- MR. ISLER: Please continue, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- I would like to go to the Duquesne
- 14 University technology thing.
- These are credited classes.
- They were initially brought forward to the
- 17 Board as noncredit, they were simply to be used as
- 18 professional development, for those teachers to attend
- 19 it, we were picking up the bills, there was to be no
- 20 credit.
- We, as a Board, do not pay for education
- 22 for -- I am speaking, please.
- We do pay -- we do not pay for extending
- 24 education to any of our staff.
- The way this was brought to us last month,

- 1 was that we pick up the bill.
- 2 However, Duquesne University has offered
- 3 that if the teachers, or any staff member that attends
- 4 this, finishes paying off approximately a third of the
- 5 cost of this class, they then will receive a credit.
- Therefore, as a Board, we should seriously
- 7 think and talk about this. This is not something we
- 8 want to start.
- 9 It was clearly told to us it would be
- 10 noncredited, and there would never be the possibility
- 11 of receiving credit for it.
- Now, all of a sudden we are paying for
- 13 credits, and just as they are paying a third of it, we
- 14 still are paying partial for them to receive credit.
- This is an issue, and it is starting a
- 16 precedence that we do not want to start doing.
- Anybody want to piggyback on that one?
- MR. ISLER: No, I don't.
- Dr. Thompson, or Dr. King, do you want to
- 20 comment on what Mrs. Colaizzi said about this?
- DR. THOMPSON: Mrs. Shields, Peggy Shields.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I cannot hear.
- Peggy Shields is the coordinator with the
- 24 program.
- Peggy.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: I'm sorry.
- MS. SHIELDS: The -- our agreement with
- 3 Duquesne, and this is being funded through a grant, is
- 4 that we are paying for a noncredit program.
- 5 Duquesne then offered an additional expense
- 6 to the teachers, for them to get the credit from
- 7 Duquesne.
- But our partnership with Duquesne, was
- 9 completely noncredit.
- MR. ISLER: So, I want to be --
- 11 Mrs. Colaizzi, I just want to make sure, that we are
- 12 in agreement with what we are being told.
- Miss Shields, you are telling us that what
- 14 the Board is paying for, is professional development,
- 15 no credit to the teachers; correct?
- MS. SHIELDS: That's correct.
- MR. ISLER: If the teachers want the
- 18 credit, they then have to pay Duquesne University; is
- 19 that correct?
- MS. SHIELDS: That's correct also.
- 21 MR. ISLER: Dr. King.
- DR. KING: Mr. Isler, but if the teachers
- 23 decide to pay for the credit at this time, they then
- 24 have to pay a partial fee for the credit.
- So indirectly, the grant money is

- 1 subsidizing credit for teachers.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Dr. King, because
- 3 that's exactly what I understood, Mr. Isler, and that
- 4 was the point I was trying to make.
- 5 It is noncredit only if the teachers do not
- 6 take advantage of paying that small amount, that then
- 7 makes it credited.
- 8 So we are paying for credited courses, if
- 9 they choose to finish off and pay the fee that
- 10 Duquesne University has attached to this class.
- 11 Am I making myself clear, sir?
- MR. ISLER: Yes.
- Do you have another point?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Well, I think that that's a
- 15 pretty serious point, when we do not pay for credited
- 16 courses.
- This can become a credited course, by them
- 18 simply -- it is no different than them paying partial
- 19 tuition. It is no different.
- And as a matter of fact, their attendance,
- 21 if I am not mistaken, from the information I had
- 22 gathered, doesn't -- isn't even relevant, as to them
- 23 receiving the credits, if they pay for the difference.
- I have a real issue with this, because we
- 25 do not pay for credit courses, we do not do that.

- 1 And now we are going to start doing it.
- 2 So how much is the taxpayers going to have
- 3 to burden, later on in time, when everybody begins to
- 4 demand such -- the ability to get credited courses.
- 5 So, I will continue on to the next one,
- 6 because it doesn't seem to matter.
- 7 Algebra 1 mainstream.
- 8 This too was defeated, and I am just
- 9 appalled at the fact that when this Board votes on
- 10 something, and it goes down, and then all of a sudden
- 11 it comes back on the floor, because of somebody's
- 12 absence.
- I am going to continue arguing this one,
- 14 because I think that this is just not the way that
- 15 business has been done with this District.
- I cannot believe that I am sitting here,
- 17 and listening to what took place this evening.
- I am just appalled at the fact that just
- 19 because something went down, it has to be -- some way,
- 20 some how, a way had to be found, to bring it back up.
- It's appalling to me.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- In the order that I have them, it is
- 24 Mr. Brentley, Mr. Matthews, Dr. Dowd and
- 25 Mr. Romaniello.

- 1 MR. McCREA: Put me on there.
- 2 MR. ISLER: Okay. Mr. McCrea, I will add
- 3 you.
- 4 Thank you.
- 5 Mr. Brentley.
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: I just want to be very
- 7 brief, and that is, I have always supported the back
- 8 to school celebration, and to Mr. Romaniello, I think
- 9 will be your -- hopefully your first one that you will
- 10 attend. You haven't been able to -- okay.
- And I would just encourage you, if you are
- 12 able to attend.
- It is the only thing that I am able to
- 14 witness, as a Board member, in terms of visualization,
- 15 of how awesome my role is as a Board member.
- 16 When you look into that audience, and you
- 17 see thousands and thousands of people, that you and I
- 18 are responsible for, you take a second look, and
- 19 you -- for me, and you really take the job even much
- 20 more serious.
- Number two, it is something that I think
- 22 that is so powerful, in terms of at least allowing all
- 23 of our District -- all of our schools to come together
- 24 under one event, under one roof, and to really get
- 25 pumped up.

- 1 You know, you would be surprised, and now,
- 2 speaking again personally, from the folks who come
- 3 from my district, and how they wait for the
- 4 opportunity, because they don't know what it's like to
- 5 see their vice principal in blue jeans, hollering and
- 6 screaming for their school, and hanging out, and just
- 7 being able to look at the other schools, and to really
- 8 get excited, and talk about their pride for their
- 9 particular school.
- 10 You know, the only thing I wish we could
- 11 do, is somehow take that whole unit, and move together
- 12 as a unit, and let's all kind of go up the academic
- 13 ladder together.
- But it's a start.
- And so I have always supported it, and I
- 16 think, Dr. Thompson, you need to be commended, you
- 17 along with Pat Crawford, and Pat, I think you probably
- 18 spent a night here, three or four days before the
- 19 event, getting the things together.
- And as a Board member, I just want to tell
- 21 you how much we appreciate it. I think it is well
- 22 done, it is extremely powerful.
- My guess is there are other school
- 24 districts trying to copy off of that particular event.
- And I would hope that not only we would

- 1 continue it, but I would hope we would get to a point
- 2 and say, "Look, money is not an issue, on this
- 3 particular rally, for what we get out of it."
- As a matter of fact, I still have a vendor
- 5 who called me, said, "Mark, I want to help."
- 6 Last year, he volunteered, gave a thousand
- 7 dollars. He said, "I want to help."
- 8 He called me again, he said, "I want to be
- 9 a part." And told me, that's the kind of atmosphere
- 10 that is created.
- So, Dr. Thompson, and the staff, you all
- 12 need to be commended for that.
- I am excited about it again, and I think it
- 14 is a great thing.
- So, you know, I just wanted to share that.
- 16 That's it.
- 17 Thank you.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Brentley.
- Mr. Matthews.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Thank you, Mr. President.
- One of the things, I was going to -- I
- 22 wanted to is echo what Mr. Brentley said.
- 23 The back to school celebration is more than
- 24 just a party, and it is professional development.
- You know, if you talk to any professional

- 1 trainer, anyone who does professional development for
- 2 a living, they will tell you that that gathering is
- 3 professional development.
- 4 You know, if we say about taxpayers paying
- 5 money for that, taxpayers pay money for to us go down
- 6 to these national conferences and, you know, have they
- 7 seen any benefit from that?
- The thing is, is that we go there, because
- 9 even if you learn just a little bit, it is more than
- 10 what you know.
- 11 And that's what this does.
- 12 It teaches, it shows and demonstrates the
- 13 morale of this District, and it brings forth the
- 14 vision that is taking place.
- And it is a way to just say, "Listen,
- 16 tomorrow school starts, have yourself a good day."
- 17 That means a lot.
- And I'm quite sure, out of all of the
- 19 employees that we have, not even -- I would gather,
- 20 not even 10 percent came to you, or anyone, and said
- 21 that they don't want to be involved in this.
- It is good. It is good morale for the
- 23 staff and, Dr. Thompson, I am glad that you introduced
- 24 this when you came here, and I hope it continues,
- 25 because this is a good program.

- 1 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Matthews.
- 2 Dr. Dowd.
- 3 DR. DOWD: I just wanted to raise a comment
- 4 about professional development, and crediting courses
- 5 for which people receive credits for advanced degrees.
- It seems to me that the practice of the
- 7 District has been to not participate in this, and I
- 8 certainly understand why, from a financial standpoint,
- 9 it would be rather costly if we were to pay for the
- 10 advanced degrees of every employee.
- However, one of the things that we want to
- 12 achieve here, is improved service, and hopefully, by
- 13 receiving higher education, more education,
- 14 individuals will be able to provide greater service.
- And so it seems to me, Mrs. Colaizzi, that
- 16 as we begin to think about this, and I don't think
- 17 that we will necessarily reach a conclusion this
- 18 evening on the entire matter, but I do think we ought
- 19 to begin to think about what sort of return, on our
- 20 investment, as far as college credits, or advanced
- 21 credits, we might receive, and perhaps we might
- 22 consider paying -- paying for these courses, were we
- 23 to see, in fact, improved performance.
- I think that is the direction we should be
- 25 heading.

- I agree, we shouldn't just be paying, for
- 2 example, for a Board member, advanced degrees, or
- 3 whatever.
- But if they were to receive -- if we were
- 5 to receive improved service, that is to say, if we
- 6 were to see, for example, improved teaching on
- 7 standardized tests, or in various other ways, maybe
- 8 that would be a way in which we could make decisions
- 9 about how, in fact, we do pay for these things.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- Mr. Romaniello.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: On the back to school
- 13 rally, again, I didn't say that I wasn't in favor of
- 14 the rally.
- 15 Okay?
- I have never been to one. I did get some
- 17 calls on it. Maybe next year, you can make it
- 18 voluntary, and see what -- see what, you know,
- 19 transpires from it.
- But -- and again, I would have made the
- 21 motion that we go ahead with the rally. I didn't
- 22 realize, at the time, that the resolution that was on
- 23 the table last week, was -- would have ended the whole
- 24 thing.
- So, I would have -- I was prepared to put a

- 1 motion on the floor, to go ahead with the rally,
- 2 without the -- without the -- because, from what I
- 3 understand, we were able to get money in previous
- 4 years so, you know, maybe we just got to find a few
- 5 more people that are willing to open up their purse
- 6 strings.
- 7 So I would again ask Mr. Brentley, if he
- 8 would amend his motion, if he -- you know, it is his
- 9 decision -- to go ahead with the rally, but at no
- 10 cost, other than, you know, that we pay everybody's
- 11 salary that's there.
- On -- I'm sorry.
- DR. DOWD: Is that a motion?
- MR. ROMANIELLO: No, I was asking
- 15 Mr. Brentley. He has to amend it.
- MR. ISLER: There is a motion of
- 17 reconsideration, so Mr. Brentley would have to amend
- 18 his motion to say no funds were expended by the
- 19 District.
- 20 MR. ROMANIELLO: On the -- I got a question
- 21 on the back and forth, about the college credits, or
- 22 the course.
- 23 If this course was to be offered, and we
- 24 would pay for it, but no mention of college credit
- 25 would have been added to it, would we be having this

- 1 type of discussion; would this -- would this
- 2 program -- I guess what I am asking is, would this
- 3 program have gone ahead without anybody raising an
- 4 eyebrow; and if somebody -- I don't know who could
- 5 answer that question, if it's -- you know, if it turns
- 6 out to be rhetorical, that's fine, but if somebody
- 7 wants to answer it.
- MS. COLAIZZI: If I may, Mr. Romaniello.
- 9 MR. ROMANIELLO: I will yield to that
- 10 question.
- MR. ISLER: Yes, go ahead, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 13 Mr. Romaniello I would like to make clear
- 14 to you that this was also something that we offered
- 15 last year, and it was done precisely as you described,
- 16 the credits were not given, it was noncredit, there
- 17 was no option to become credit.
- That is something new, that Duquesne
- 19 University has offered this year.
- 20 And that is why I am having such a problem
- 21 with it.
- It was not given as credit. They could not
- 23 receive credit for it and, therefore, it was fine.
- It was a debate back then, but because it
- 25 was never offered as a credited course at all, it

- 1 therefore was not an issue.
- But now, Duquesne University has taken it
- 3 upon themselves, or whoever sat with them, and made
- 4 this decision, was to then offer it to become a credit
- 5 course, if indeed the teacher chooses to pay the
- 6 difference of the cost.
- 7 That is where this issue is.
- And it is not, if they go and take the
- 9 course, attend it, and receive the noncredit, whatever
- 10 you want to call it.
- 11 MR. ISLER: Okay.
- 12 Mrs. Colaizzi, we need a point of
- 13 clarification from Miss Shields again.
- MS. SHIELDS: Yes.
- I would like to clarify that, please.
- What we are putting on the table this year
- 17 is exactly the same as what occurred last year. It
- 18 came up on the table.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Who is it?
- 20 MR. ISLER: Peggy Shields.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- MS. SHIELDS: It was brought forward last
- 23 year, because it was written into the grant as a
- 24 credit program, but that was pulled, after discussion,
- 25 to a noncredit program.

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1
               MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
               So what you are saying is that we were --
2
   if I am not mistaken, Miss Shields, I was under the
4
   impression last year, that there was no opportunity
5
   for a teacher to pay for the difference, and receive
6
   the credits.
7
               Are you telling me, that that is incorrect?
8
               MS. SHIELDS: What we are proposing right
9
   now, is exactly the same thing that happened last
10
   year, with the teachers that have already completed
11
    that program.
12
               MS. COLAIZZI: So last year they had the
13
    opportunity to pay the difference, and receive the
14
    credit, because that, I would go back into the
15
   minutes, and I can assure you, that that is not what
16
    that -- what the Board was told last year, ma'am.
17
               MS. SHIELDS: It was changed from -- the
18
    terminology was changed from credit, because
19
    originally it was going to be a 15 credit program.
20
    is not a 15 credit program, from what we are paying
21
    for.

               It is a noncredit.
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Duquesne offered that option to the

MS. COLAIZZI: And you -- do you understand

teachers, once they got started.

- 1 my point, Mr. Romaniello?
- 2 MR. ROMANIELLO: Yes, if you could -- I
- 3 guess what my question was, if the same amount of
- 4 people were involved in it this year, that were
- 5 involved in it last year, would it be costing the
- 6 District any more money this year, than last year?
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: I think you are missing the
- 8 point.
- 9 MR. ISLER: I am sorry, hold on,
- 10 Mrs. Colaizzi, one second.
- 11 Mr. Romaniello has a question on the
- 12 floor.
- Can anybody answer that question?
- DR. KING: I believe the answer is yes,
- 15 unless the amount of cost for Duquesne University
- 16 credits went up.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Okay. Let's, just for
- 18 argument sake, if it costs the same amount of money
- 19 this year as last year, and we send the exact same
- 20 amount of people this year, as we did last year, would
- 21 it cost the District any more money, than it did last
- 22 year?
- DR. KING: No. If the credit price is the
- 24 same, it would cost the same.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: So if these teachers paid

- 1 the difference, it is turning out, you know, it really
- 2 doesn't matter to us, one way or the other, whether
- 3 they paid the difference, because it is not costing us
- 4 any more money, than it did before.
- 5 MR. ISLER: That's correct.
- 6 DR. KING: That's correct.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: But then it is causing an
- 8 issue.
- 9 MR. ROMANIELLO: Well, I am not worried
- 10 about issues right now, I am worried about dollars.
- MR. McCREA: Can I explain something?
- 12 It is not costing us money now, it will in
- 13 the future, because that will -- it will enhance their
- 14 degree, therefore, they can ask for more money in
- 15 their salary.
- That was the issue last year, that is why
- 17 they did this noncredit last year.
- MR. ISLER: Okay. We are going to -- thank
- 19 you, Mr. McCrea.
- Mr. McCrea, do you have anything else you
- 21 want to add?
- MR. McCREA: That was the only thing on
- 23 that issue.
- Is my mic on?
- MR. ISLER: Yes, sir.

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1 MR. McCREA: Okay.
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- The back to school rally, I have no problem
- 3 with it really, the only feedback I got was, could we
- 4 have it in the afternoon, as opposed to the morning,
- 5 because teachers wanted to get into their classrooms,
- 6 set up, and I got turned down flat and cold, when I
- 7 brought that point up last year.
- I am assuming I will get the same thing
- 9 this year, because you have got your rubber stamp five
- 10 votes.
- 11 Anyway, back to algebra, the alleged
- 12 algebra vote.
- I asked for more information from the
- 14 agenda review, I received it yesterday, after this was
- 15 defeated. This is incompetence at its best.
- I just can't believe you are going to try
- 17 to pull this -- never mind.
- I am done.
- 19 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. McCrea.
- MS. COLAIZZI: (Inaudible.)
- MR. McCREA: I am done, I can't --
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Fink.
- MS. FINK: I have gotten a tremendous
- 24 amount of feedback on this back to school rally, and
- 25 people enjoy it, it is fun, they like it.

- 1 They don't like it the day before school
- 2 starts. They hate that a lot. They are very, very
- 3 busy; there are still contractors finishing up work,
- 4 custodial people, clerical people, lunch ladies,
- 5 tradesmen, these people are all incredibly busy the
- 6 day before school starts.
- 7 Getting their supplies in order, getting
- 8 all of their last minute things done, custodians don't
- 9 like going out and leaving their buildings unattended
- 10 with contractors, believe it or not. They are very
- 11 possessive of their buildings.
- I just have had so many people tell me,
- 13 this would be fun, I would enjoy this, if it wasn't
- 14 the day before school starts.
- That is the biggest beef.
- And, I think, I don't know if people don't
- 17 say what's on their mind, to other people, but they
- 18 sure say it to me, and I bet if 500 people talk to me
- 19 about this, 499 of them want it to be on a different
- 20 day.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 22 Any other comments?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes, I have.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: I hope people realize this

- 1 continuation is longer than the meeting that we had
- 2 originally --
- 3 MS. FINK: Much.
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: -- last week.
- 5 And I want to try to say mine quickly.
- To Mr. McCrea, this is from one of the five
- 7 rubber stamps: I do think that we need to take a bit
- 8 closer look at this situation with Duquesne, because
- 9 this is -- I hear what people are saying, but if there
- 10 is any scenario in which we are paying for tuition,
- 11 that is a step that we need to take, it can have
- 12 ramification, that once you start that precedence,
- 13 every one of our 5,000 employees can begin to make the
- 14 case that we should -- people at Mellon Bank, PNC,
- 15 many offer that to their employees.
- If we want to do that, then let's discuss
- 17 it.
- 18 But if there is some kind of round about
- 19 way in which it turns out that we could be
- 20 subsidizing somebody's tuition, after these questions
- 21 were clearly, and crystal clear brought up by Board
- 22 members, that we were not interested in doing that at
- 23 this time, that is very serious, Dr. Thompson.
- 24 And I particularly want to know.
- 25 Because I am not -- I don't want to support

- 1 this item right now, because I am not 100 percent sure
- 2 that in some kind of way, whether people figure out a
- 3 back door way, around the mulberry bush way, in which
- 4 we are subsidizing the tuition, that is a very serious
- 5 thing.
- It could have long-term implications, as
- 7 far as our teacher negotiations that are coming up.
- 8 We could begin to be starting something
- 9 that could be very, very expensive for this School
- 10 District.
- And I, for one, right now, am not sure that
- 12 all of our I's are dotted, and our T's are crossed on
- 13 this issue.
- 14 And as we know one thing for sure, people
- 15 can figure out a lot of ways to find loopholes in
- 16 things.
- 17 So we could all be sitting around this
- 18 table with the assumption that, no, we are not, and
- 19 people find out one loophole, and then everybody goes
- 20 through that loophole, and once we start that,
- 21 everyone is going to be able to make that same claim
- 22 that, "We should receive that same perk, priority,
- 23 courtesy," whatever you want to call it.
- I just wanted to say briefly again, about,
- 25 as we went round and round about Mr. Brentley voting

- 1 for that, I am saying that did not violate anything
- 2 that I have seen out here, going on seven years.
- 3 Someone, who either wasn't there voting a
- 4 negative, is allowed to bring something back up.
- 5 I think it is very unfair for Board members
- 6 to attempt in any way to take advantage of his
- 7 absence, to thwart the will of the Board.
- 8 Obviously, as I think will be shown by this
- 9 vote, the majority of this Board was in accord with
- 10 some of these initiatives, and we ought to be about
- 11 making sure the will of this Board goes forward, and
- 12 not try to take advantage of someone's cell phone not
- 13 working, or someone being ill, things or something
- 14 like that.
- I think that is unfair.
- MR. ISLER: Based on Mr. Taylor's comment,
- 17 Dr. Thompson, are we subsidizing tuition?
- DR. THOMPSON: Mr. President, based on
- 19 information from Mrs. Shields, and based on the intent
- 20 of the grant, we are not.
- 21 However, it appears that once we said we
- 22 were not going to be using it as a credit given
- 23 process, that the university, after we entered into
- 24 the grant with them, decided later on in the grant
- 25 that they would offer this piece there.

- 1 So technically, I guess, if you want to say
- 2 it, if the university -- if a person buys into it, it
- 3 can be considered that.
- 4 The same thing is true with our program
- 5 with our math interns, you know we give \$6,000 for
- 6 those people to go to school, and those kinds of
- 7 things.
- 8 So we all -- you know, it gets very
- 9 technical, Mr. Taylor, you have a very good point,
- 10 about what you said.
- One of the things that is on the table, I
- 12 proposed to you earlier on this year, was a CEP
- 13 program, where they actually come in and hire people,
- 14 and send them back for their doctor degrees.
- But my question to you, is a technical
- 16 thing, we don't, according as to the grant, supplement
- 17 the credits for those people.
- But I heard what you are saying, it is six
- 19 of one, half a dozen of the other, we just have to
- 20 look at it, we are in the middle of a grant, I will
- 21 take a look at it, and see what I can come up with.
- MR. ISLER: Dr. Thompson, I think it is
- 23 very clear from this Board, and I am not going to
- 24 speak for them all, but you are hearing that in no way
- 25 are we to be subsidizing people's education.

- 1 And if we are, if there is any sense that
- 2 we are doing this -- I don't know why you reacted that
- 3 way, Dr. Dowd, but I will let you speak -- if we are
- 4 doing it, we need to be clear that we are not, and if
- 5 we are not, in this particular motion, if there is
- 6 still a lot of question, and you are not making it
- 7 clear to the Board that the answer is no, we may not
- 8 want to take this forward.
- 9 DR. THOMPSON: Mr. Isler, we are in the
- 10 middle of a grant, and once again, based on that
- 11 grant, based on the grant to us, we are not.
- 12 Let me give you another scenario. You go
- 13 to the program there, and finish up at Duquesne
- 14 University.
- Then Carnegie Mellon will say, "You guys
- 16 over at Duquesne University, we will take that credit
- 17 and transfer it for you, towards your master's
- 18 degree."
- But the grant is that we are not going to
- 20 subsidize.
- Now, if the university comes in -- well,
- 22 you are shaking your head.
- 23 My answer is, I don't know.
- MR. TAYLOR: I mean, Dr. Thompson, if they
- 25 can switch -- if we pay for them to take a noncredit

- 1 course, and we pay for it, and then a year later, the
- 2 university allows them to switch it over, and get
- 3 credit for it, then we paid for it.
- DR. THOMPSON: That's what I am saying.
- 5 But our original intent, based on what the
- 6 intent was, the intent of the grant was to be a
- 7 noncredit grant.
- 8 So I can't tell that university what they
- 9 can or cannot do, after this program is all over.
- 10 If anybody wants to come in and give the
- 11 people credit for that course, for that rigor, they
- 12 can do it.
- For instance, if one of those people would
- 14 apply for the doctoral program at another university,
- 15 they look at the rigor of that program, they could
- 16 give those people credit towards the doctoral degree.
- MR. ISLER: Dr. Thompson, we are not in
- 18 disagreement about what a university can or cannot do.
- What we are very clear, in what you are
- 20 raising to this Board, is that our contractual
- 21 arrangement should make it very clear that this grant
- 22 in no way subsidizes credit.
- And if it's not clear, we need to make it
- 24 clear.
- DR. THOMPSON: Our legal people will check

- 1 it, and look at it, and if it doesn't, then I will get
- 2 back to the Board, but based on what Miss Shields has
- 3 said, and based on information that I have, we are
- 4 delivering a noncredit grant.
- 5 Andy, do you have something you want to
- 6 elaborate on that at all? You are pointing your
- 7 finger here.
- DR. KING: I think we need to look a little
- 9 more closely to that grant.
- 10 MR. ISLER: I mean, I am more concerned
- 11 about Dr. King's comment, than I am anybody else's.
- Dr. Dowd.
- DR. THOMPSON: And what was that comment,
- 14 by Dr. King?
- MR. ISLER: Whenever he said, in a sense,
- 16 we -- I am going to paraphrase, that we are
- 17 subsidizing.
- DR. THOMPSON: If they go back, and choose
- 19 to do it.
- MR. ISLER: That's right.
- 21 DR. THOMPSON: If. That's a conditional
- 22 process.
- MR. ISLER: I am with you on it, but I do
- 24 think that we can make it very clear in all of our
- 25 contracts, that we are not subsidizing.

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I think that the point made, by two of the
1
   Board members, is that it could be a point of
2
   negotiations, which we need to be clear on.
3
               We are not doing that.
4
               DR. THOMPSON: Okay.
5
6
               I don't have any problems with going back,
    if you want to pull the grant, we can pull the grant,
7
   but what you are doing is, I don't know what kind of
9
   effect it is going to have on the money there, I don't
10
    know where that money would go, and how it would be
    dealt with, but I don't see any solution out of the
11
12
    problem, other than we tell the people at the
13
    university that this is not to be used to enhance the
14
    education of those individuals in the program.
               MR. ISLER: That's all we are asking. I
15
16
    mean, you can put that in any grant award, or any --
17
    are we, is this District expending funds to the
18
    university?
19
               DR. THOMPSON: I don't know -- no, the
20
    District is not, this is through -- who is the grant
21
    through?
22
               Who gives --
23
               MS. SHIELDS: This is Title II, Part D
24
    grant.
```

MR. ISLER: Right.

- 1 To whom?
- MS. SHIELDS: I'm sorry, it is a Title II,
- 3 Part D grant, that is administered through the state,
- 4 to the School District.
- 5 MR. ISLER: To the School District. So it
- 6 is School District funds.
- 7 I mean, let's be realistic about it, the
- 8 funds may come to the School District through another
- 9 source, but they are given to the School District that
- 10 wishes to do this training, and this gets into a very
- 11 fine line.
- This is just like the issue of
- 13 interpretation of parliamentary procedure this
- 14 evening.
- We need to be very, very clear,
- 16 Dr. Thompson, that we are not expending any School
- 17 District funds to supplement credit.
- DR. THOMPSON: Mr. Isler, one more time. I
- 19 can only tell you what's in the grant, according to
- 20 Miss Shields.
- 21 And Miss Shields said it is a noncredit
- 22 grant.
- 23 And, anything that's given to those
- 24 students, is a post opportunity, by the university.
- Now, we can tell them, in the grant, that

- 1 it is supposed to be noncredit, but after it is all
- 2 said and done, if they decide to do something, now
- 3 where does that put us?
- 4 MR. ISLER: I am saying, that we need to
- 5 make it very clear that no District funds may be used
- 6 for credit given in any of these courses.
- 7 Now, if the university wants to supplement
- 8 it, or whatever else they want to do, that's fine.
- 9 But I think what we are being clear upon,
- 10 is that the District should not be expending funds
- 11 this way.
- 12 Am I clear?
- I mean, I am getting a lot of --
- DR. THOMPSON: You are clear on that, I
- 15 understand that. I understand that very clearly.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- I think that you need to be one step
- 19 clearer.
- 20 If, regardless of our stating that it is
- 21 noncredit on our part, in our contract, the university
- 22 can never make it a credited course, because it puts
- 23 us back in the same boat.
- 24 And this -- and I thank you for clarifying
- 25 the fact that that is will hurt us in this

- 1 negotiations.
- I am very adamant about this one, in
- 3 particular, because of going into negotiations, it
- 4 opens up a can of worms that we will never be able to
- 5 close.
- DR. THOMPSON: And I understand that.
- 7 Mr. Isler, all I am saying is, if we can
- 8 tell the university, "You cannot give credit for this
- 9 course," okay, we can tell Duquesne that. If that
- 10 person wants to take those credits to another
- 11 university, and that university gives a credit for it,
- 12 towards another degree, there is nothing you can do
- 13 about it.
- MR. ISLER: It wouldn't -- they wouldn't be
- 15 credit, so it would be a certificate of attendance or
- 16 something of that nature.
- 17 MR. TAYLOR: I make a motion to table.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I would really like to put a
- 19 motion on the table.
- MR. ISLER: Hold on, Mrs. Colaizzi, there
- 21 is a motion on the table, from Mr. Taylor, to table
- 22 this.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Second.
- 24 DR. DOWD: Point of clarification. Is this
- 25 a legitimate move, in Roberts' Rules?

- 1 MR. RUSHFORD: Yes.
- 2 But it has to be clarified as to what --
- 3 there are three items.
- 4 MR. ISLER: There were three items. You
- 5 are tabling one item, then we need to be clear,
- 6 Mr. Taylor, what is your motion to table, which of the
- 7 three items.
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: The Duquesne University.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor has a motion on the
- 10 floor, to table the Duquesne University item, which
- 11 Mr. Brentley has brought up for reconsideration.
- 12 Is there a second?
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Second.
- MR. ISLER: There is a second.
- 15 Is there any discussion?
- Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I just want to make a
- 18 comment.
- You know, it seems like, this, we are back
- 20 into some of the old business.
- 21 At some point, we have to sit back, and to
- 22 rely, and -- rely on, and trust the man at the end of
- 23 the table.
- It is his responsibility. We gave him a
- 25 direction, what we don't want.

- And to pull this thing, you know, I mean,
- 2 who would stand in the way of having, you know, some
- 3 development for their staff, making a better staff.
- And especially, if it equals, you know,
- 5 higher academic achievement in our students.
- 6 So who would want to pull something off
- 7 like that. It just confuses me.
- 8 It is their responsibility. They -- you
- 9 know, they said they can make it work; if not, I think
- 10 Dr. Thompson said it several times, that he will go
- 11 back, and he will review it.
- But, you know, look, folks, we are, you
- 13 know, trying to make the best District around. We
- 14 keep meddling, and pulling.
- Just allow them to do their job.
- 16 You know, I still have kids in this
- 17 District, and I want the best in the classroom. You
- 18 know, allow them to do what they have to do.
- 19 Dr. King, if you can evaluate -- as they
- 20 said, they will get a legal opinion. There is not
- 21 much more they can do.
- But I want to encourage you, do not stand
- 23 in the way of progress, and don't stand in the way of
- 24 individuals who are trying to better themselves.
- 25 If there is a technicality on it, if it is

- 1 using our funds, then let's talk about that.
- 2 But to stop the grant in the middle, and to
- 3 pull this thing, you know, it just almost seems like
- 4 we are trying to hate on our own staff. It is just
- 5 not a good thing.
- 6 MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor.
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Brentley, the issue is
- 8 not -- Dr. Thompson is doing his job, as far as
- 9 getting his staff as much support, as much extra
- 10 training, as much professional development as we can
- 11 do.
- We entrust him, and -- entrust him to do
- 13 that.
- 14 The question becomes, if this is in some
- 15 kind of way, a way where someone can gain college
- 16 credit, for free, then I think we as a Board have to,
- 17 you know, direct Dr. Thompson on how he makes those
- 18 decisions, on whose career gets enhanced and when.
- 19 We have 300 -- we have 3,300 teachers.
- 20 Now, why would that just be able to go, and how does
- 21 Dr. Thompson decide to extend that -- and that's
- 22 money, also, in people's pocket, and also advancement
- 23 in their career, how does he decide to offer that to
- 24 ten or 15 people, and not offer it to this other ten
- 25 or 15 people over there.

- 1 It is a decision that the Board has to talk
- 2 about, if we are going to go down that road of
- 3 subsidizing.
- Again as I said, that is not unheard of in
- 5 America, where we have businesses that give college
- 6 credits to -- and it is not unheard of, Allegheny
- 7 County Government does it in many of its incidences,
- 8 they extend it.
- 9 But that is something that has to be talked
- 10 about, where, when, to whom, how many, how many
- 11 universities should be involved.
- 12 And I am just saying, this could be
- 13 something where we are kind of opening a Pandora's
- 14 box, that we need to talk about very, very closely.
- So I don't mind giving up a grant, or
- 16 losing a grant to stop -- to potentially stop what can
- 17 be a real, real problem for us.
- And that is other people asking, "How come
- 19 they got their education subsidized, while I am
- 20 writing checks every month to go to school."
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Matthews and
- 22 Mr. Romaniello.
- MR. McCREA: (Inaudible.)
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, first of all, just to
- 25 clarify it again, that if they choose to obtain a

- 1 credit for that particular course, it is not for free,
- 2 and we are not paying for it; that they would have to
- 3 choose to pay that additional sum.
- This is a grant money, it is not something
- 5 that we are saying all employees get to go, and we are
- 6 going to pay for it.
- 7 This is grant money that came in
- 8 specifically saying they are to go back to school, and
- 9 get this.
- 10 Which enhances their job performance.
- Just like we send people to school for
- 12 PeopleSoft, to enhance their ability.
- Just like we send people to school for
- 14 Microsoft certification, and if they want to -- to
- 15 send away, and take a test, because they have already
- 16 had the training, and get a degree, and they pay for
- 17 that test, that is on them. That is on them.
- We are doing it to enhance the ability for
- 19 them to perform their job.
- 20 And it has nothing to do with paying -- we
- 21 are not saying we are going to pay everyone to go to
- 22 school.
- This is a grant that is coming through, and
- 24 saying with this grant -- if there is a grant with the
- 25 Federal Government that says send all teachers to

- 1 school to get a master's degree, let them do it, a
- 2 bachelor's degree, let them do it, and if they want to
- 3 get a credit for that, pay the additional funds, that
- 4 is on that employee.
- 5 But if the grant comes in and says this is
- 6 what you can do, then you are right, then we should
- 7 take advantage of that and do it.
- Because if you are saying no to this, then
- 9 what you are also saying no to is all of the math
- 10 programs that we have going in here, where we are
- 11 giving \$6,000 for all of these interns to go in and
- 12 get their master course.
- Because we are in a sense paying a portion
- 14 for that, subsidizing their ability to get a master's
- 15 degree.
- And if we are saying no to this, you are
- 17 saying no to everything else that we do.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Romaniello.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: I would just ask my
- 20 colleagues to vote in favor of tabling this, because I
- 21 was a no vote before, and now with everything that is
- 22 coming around, I would personally like to get some
- 23 more information, before I cast a vote.
- So I would hope that we can table this,
- 25 just to give, at least, I would like to have a little

- 1 bit more time to get a couple of questions answered.
- DR. DOWD: Point of clarification.
- 3 MR. ISLER: Dr. Dowd.
- DR. DOWD: Mr. Rushford, were we to table
- 5 this motion, which is a reconsidered motion, and we
- 6 were to reconsider it at our next legislative meeting
- 7 in August, would we still -- would that still be
- 8 legitimate?
- 9 MR. RUSHFORD: It would have to come off
- 10 the table at that point.
- DR. DOWD: Someone would have to make a
- 12 motion to essentially untable the tabled motion, which
- 13 has been reconsidered.
- MR. RUSHFORD: Right.
- DR. DOWD: Excellent.
- MR. ISLER: So, Dr. Dowd, you are clear
- 17 that if we vote to table, there is a motion on the
- 18 table -- there is a motion on the floor, to table '
- 19 this.
- Is there a second?
- DR. DOWD: Second.
- MR. ISLER: Excuse me one second.
- We have to -- Mr. McCrea.
- 24 MR. McCREA: I have a brief comment on the
- 25 first part of the motion there.

- 1 MR. ISLER: Okay.
- MR. McCREA: Because I believe it was last
- 3 month, or the month before, we did the very same thing
- 4 with security officers, we actually used 01 money to
- 5 pay for their enhanced education, and I was opposed to
- 6 it then, and I am opposed to this as well.
- 7 Thank you.
- 8 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. McCrea.
- 9 There is a motion on the table, and --
- 10 Theresa, did you want to say something?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, I do.
- I am seriously confused with the amount of
- 13 motions that have been put on the table.
- MR. ISLER: All right. Let me,
- 15 Mrs. Colaizzi, try to clarify that.
- 16 Could you hit her mic.
- 17 We have a motion on the floor to reconsider
- 18 three items. That's official.
- We have a second, in fact, we have -- that
- 20 is official.
- In this discussion on the Duquesne
- 22 University piece, there is a motion to table that one
- 23 of three items, and that has been seconded.
- So what we will be voting on right now, by
- 25 roll call, will be to table the Duquesne University

- 1 grant, until our next legislative meeting, so we can
- 2 get all of the clarifications we need.
- 3 Are you clear on that, Mrs. Colaizzi?
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, sir.
- 5 MR. ISLER: All we are voting on, is to
- 6 table this.
- Now, if there is no other discussion,
- 8 Dr. Thompson, is this going to cause any undue
- 9 concern, if we table this until the August meeting?
- DR. THOMPSON: Just a minute, I will confer
- 11 with Miss Shields, please.
- 12 Will it cause any other problems, that you
- 13 can think of?
- MS. SHIELDS: It may cause Duquesne some
- 15 problems, because they are waiting on spaces within
- 16 their classes, to know whether these people are going
- 17 to be taking up those spaces, or to open it up to
- 18 their other applicants.
- MR. ISLER: So, I mean, I understand then
- 20 it is really an issue here for the university, but we
- 21 can wait.
- DR. THOMPSON: Right.
- MR. ISLER: Okay. There is a motion to
- 24 table, we are going to have a vote on tabling the
- 25 Duquesne University training.

- 13 Committee meeting, I would ask Dr. Dowd to make a
- 14 specific line on his agenda, that I would like to have
- 15 Dr. Briars attend that meeting, and be available to --
- 16 at questioning of her, on this particular item, and a
- 17 few other math items, because like I said before,
- 18 about the back to school issue, this algebra issue, I
- 19 didn't think it was that big of an issue, until, you
- 20 know, my phone started ringing off the hook, and my
- 21 e-mail starting going, coming in one right after
- 22 another.
- So I would ask Dr. Dowd to have an agenda
- 24 item, which would be specifically for questioning of
- 25 Dr. Briars on the math program in this District.

- 1 MR. ISLER: Dr. Dowd?
- DR. DOWD: As I explained to
- 3 Mr. Romaniello, we, Mr. Taylor, and Dr. King and I
- 4 have been talking about having a discussion of the No
- 5 Child Left Behind status of the School District, and
- 6 of the schools in late August, which is unusual,
- 7 normally we don't have Education meeting at that time.
- 8 But we could probably get something on
- 9 agenda in September, Dr. King, Mr. Taylor?
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 11 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 12 DR. THOMPSON: You can consult with the
- 13 Superintendent, but I think we can.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 15 Are there any other questions or comments?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, please.
- 17 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Did you recognize me?
- 19 MR. ISLER: I did, Mrs. Colaizzi, go ahead.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 21 I'm still very concerned with the fact that
- 22 this is even coming back up for a vote.
- I would like a written opinion from the
- 24 solicitors, explaining in detail how this even took
- 25 place tonight.

- 1 MR. McCREA: So would I.
- MS. COLAIZZI: This has me very, very
- 3 concerned, that somebody who is absent from a meeting,
- 4 can bring something up, just because they were absent
- 5 and, Mr. Taylor, I would like to tell you that just
- 6 because somebody's phone is not working, or they are
- 7 not available, then they are just not available, and
- 8 things like that happen.
- 9 You know, I am on vacation, and I made
- 10 myself available this evening, and have more than the
- 11 amount of time I care to spend on the phone, but
- 12 that's -- I'm still here, I am available.
- I made my vote, so did everybody else.
- I just think it is appalling, to me, that
- 15 this is going on.
- This is nothing but a display of someone
- 17 trying to get something through, that did not pass.
- And I just don't see how this isn't going
- 19 to cause issues later on.
- If somebody can bring something up, to
- 21 change their vote, well, then I am going to start
- 22 doing it from now on.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, I can assure you
- 24 that Mr. Rushford and Mr. Weiss will have this
- 25 detailed written for us, as soon as possible, and

- 1 Mrs. Fink also has a request into the solicitor, in
- 2 terms of a parliamentarian's review of this also.
- 3 That will happen.
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: And, Mr. Isler, and if that
- 5 happens to come up, opposite of what was discussed
- 6 this evening, then what?
- 7 MR. ISLER: Then, obviously, we --
- 8 Mr. Rushford.
- 9 MR. RUSHFORD: We would need to address
- 10 that issue, depending on how it would come up.
- But, at this point, as I said before, we
- 12 feel fairly strong in our position.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Well, the problem is that
- 14 tax dollars will be spent, in the meanwhile, because
- 15 it is obvious that this was done intentionally to have
- 16 something go through, and from the information that
- 17 was delivered to me, especially in reference to the
- 18 math information, I don't see how dollars won't be
- 19 spent already, prior to that information coming
- 20 forward.
- 21 That is something that should have been
- 22 done prior to this taking place this evening.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, I am not sure
- 24 that could have been, because Mr. Brentley was not at
- 25 the last meeting, and came tonight with the new agenda

- 1 item.
- 2 Mr. Rushford did come prepared with his
- 3 Roberts' Rules of Order, and did say that he did
- 4 review this.
- 5 MR. RUSHFORD: I have also reviewed this,
- 6 as I said, with Mr. Weiss, and this was our combined
- 7 opinion, and that having been said, that's our
- 8 position.
- 9 The Board is fully -- I should note, that
- 10 the full Board is fully constituted this evening, and
- 11 so that these matters in addition to what's contained
- 12 in Roberts' Rules of Order, can be considered.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Well, Mr. Rushford,
- 14 (inaudible) Mr. Weiss, as long as I have been on the
- 15 Board, and even prior to that; however, I still am
- 16 very uncomfortable with this, and I need to say that
- 17 for the record.
- This is the most absurd thing I have ever
- 19 heard, and needs to take place, and it's just -- it
- 20 doesn't even seem right, let alone correct -- or fair,
- 21 rather.
- I just don't understand how somebody can be
- 23 absent, and be the person to bring something up. They
- 24 didn't vote yea or nay.
- That's the part that has me concerned.

- 1 If he voted may, that is one story, but he
- 2 didn't vote at all, and that's the whole point here.
- 3 And the fact that it -- you know, with
- 4 conveniently a continuation of a meeting -- which I
- 5 can assure you, from now on, I will never be in
- 6 agreement with voting on continuing a meeting.
- 7 MS. FINK: She is right.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I would rather have a
- 9 special legislative meeting. It seems like things
- 10 would be a lot different, if that were the case.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. --
- MS. COLAIZZI: I am sure the five votes are
- 13 there, so move on.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, it is so noted,
- 15 special legislative meeting could have been held, it
- 16 was this Board's decision not to do that.
- Mr. Romaniello.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: I had asked Mr. Brentley
- 19 if he would amend his motion, that we have a back to
- 20 school rally, but without expenditure of funds, and I
- 21 just wanted to know the yea or nay on that.
- MR. BRENTLEY: It would be nay,
