EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

Legislative Meeting of October 26, 2005

In addition to executive sessions announced at the legislative meeting of September 28, 2005, the Board met in executive session on October 10, 17 and immediately before this legislative meeting to discuss various personnel matters that may include, but are not limited to: administrative vacancies, travel waivers, residency waivers and positions opened and closed. At the October 10 executive session, the Board discussed possible real estate transactions. At the October 17 executive session, Special Counsel discussed a matter in litigation.

Finally, at the executive session immediately before this legislative meeting, the Board discussed student discipline cases that involved violations of various portions of the Code of Student Conduct.

The Board does not vote at executive sessions.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION October 26, 2005

DIRECTORS:

The Committee on Education recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

Proposals/Grant Award

- 1. Acceptance of \$1,000 from the Pennsylvania Advocate for Nutrition Activity to promote healthy eating and physical activity in the school, pursuant to the 2004-2005 Keystone Healthy Zone School grant process. Rooney Middle School, in collaboration with Communities in Schools, applied for and was awarded this funding in order to support students in a variety of activities and incentives for participation in the One Billion steps program, student health council planning, nutritional presentations, public awareness announcements in the school newsletter and various curriculum activities. The funding period shall be from October 27, 2005 through October 27, 2006.
- 2. Acceptance of \$5,000 from the PA Department of Community and Economic Development to support **Carrick High School's** school newspaper, *The Carrickulum.* Funds will be used to support operation costs for the paper. The funding period shall be from October 27, 2005 through June 30, 2007.
- 3. Acceptance of \$25,500 from the Center for Minority Health to support the Healthy Class of 2010, a collaborative, mutli-year initiative established in 2003 by the Pittsburgh Public Schools and The Center for Minority Health-Graduate School of Public Health, University of Pittsburgh. The objectives of this program are to: 1) increase the proportion of students who engage in vigorous physical activity; 2) reduce the proportion of students who are overweight; 3) increase the proportion of students who consume fruits and vegetables daily; 4) increase the proportion of children—those who qualify—who enroll in the Child Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) insurance; 5) educate students about the need to serve as good role

models to others of healthy eating and lifestyle habits. Specifically, funding is awarded in this third year of the initiative to support innovation among the participating middle schools. Schools will be able to apply for mini-grants to conduct school-based initiatives involving physical activity and healthy eating. A Request for Proposal form and guidelines will be issued to the schools. A proposal review team comprised of Center for Minority Health representatives and Pittsburgh Public Schools central office representatives will review the proposals against the guidelines and will award the mini-grants. The average grant award will be \$1,500, with funding to begin in November 1, 2005, through May 31, 2006.

- 4. Acceptance of \$12,000 from the PA State Board of Education in support of Murray Elementary School's participation in the PAGE1 Program—an effort sponsored by the PA State Board of Education to close the achievement gap in Pennsylvania. PAGE1 participating schools agree to: 1) commit a community leadership team to this effort; 2) visit and observe Frontier Schools—i.e., nationally identified schools that have successfully closed achievement gaps; 3) put successful, research-proven practices to work; and 4) establish their own success story in Pennsylvania. Funding is awarded specifically to support professional development and travel around these efforts. The funding period shall be from October 27, 2005 through October 27, 2006.
- 5. Submission of a proposal to the U.S. Department of Education of the Fund for the Improvement of Education for \$99,200 to support the provision of comprehensive professional development sessions for up to twenty-five (25) highly qualified reservists/substitute teachers. Sessions will focus on the development of competencies in classroom management, differentiated instruction, the use of data to drive instruction, extending discipline while maintaining student dignity, and increasing parent involvement. Funding will also support reservists' travel to professional conferences in Chicago, IL and in St. Louis, MO. The funding period shall be from November 1, 2005 through October 31, 2006.
- 6. Acceptance of \$1,130,000 from the Commonwealth of PA, Department of Education to provide funding to the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) to offset the cost of meals served in Head Start/Pre K centers. The funding period shall be from October 1, 2005 through September 30, 2006.
- 7. Acceptance of \$438,555 from the PA Department of Education of the Dual Enrollment fund. The students from all Pittsburgh high schools will have the opportunity to take college classes part-time while still enrolled in high school. The District has partnered with Community College of Allegheny County and Chatham College to offer an assortment of classes, including Creative Writing, Pre-calculus, Environmental Science, African American History, Biology, Psychology, Sociology, Spanish, English Composition, World History, Macroeconomics, United States History, Intermediate Algebra, Earth Science,

- and World Geography. Students will earn college credits and high school credits. The grant will pay for tuition, fees, books and bus passes for students. The operating period shall be from December 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006.
- 8. Acceptance of \$5,500 of PADOE funds from Midwestern Intermediate Unit IV to provide Eleven (11) Title I Parent Involvement Mini-grants at \$500 each to conduct parent training. The following schools have been awarded these mini-grants: Allegheny Elem., Banksville, Burgwin, Concord, Crescent, Knoxville Elem., Lincoln, Northview, Woolslair, Greenway Middle School, and South Hills Middle School. Some topics include hosting a Literature Night for families as well as a Math & Science Night, to help encourage and promote reading, promote positive involvement between the parents and the school, implementing homework helper kits, familiarizing parents with the instructional practices used in the school. The operating period shall be from October 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006.
- 9. Acceptance of \$1,400,960 from the Heinz Endowments to support an expansion of the literacy coach model across grades 4-8, as well as to partially support grades K-3, among those schools most in need of making strong gains in literacy achievement. Specifically, funds are awarded to support the costs of twenty-five (25) high quality replacement teachers to be placed in performing schools with the lowest reading performance on the 2005 PSSA and schools currently without sufficient reading coach support. This support will enable the district to deploy additional coaching support to these schools in order to better ensure high quality reading instruction is provided to students. Funding will enable the district to release current teachers residing in these buildings from regular classroom duties so that they may serve as additional literacy coaches for grades 4-8. Funding is awarded also to support three .5 K-3 literacy coach positions that are currently not supported by the Reading First Grant at the following schools: Carmalt, Manchester, and Stevens. This combination of funding will permit the district to deliver concentrated, high quality reading instruction to the 34 schools currently most at risk of failing to achieve sufficient student achievement growth in reading as measured by the PSSA required performance benchmark, thus better ensuring rapid student achievement gains will be made this school year. The operating period shall be from October 27, 2005 through October 27, 2006.
- 10. Submission of a proposal to the PA Department of Education of the Title 1 School Improvement fund for \$518,435 to support the instructional program in selected elementary and middle schools with a school improvement or corrective action designation. The schools identified by the state for these funds are Arsenal, Carmalt, Columbus, Friendship, Greenway, King, Manchester, Milliones, Reizenstein, Rooney, Sheraden, Stevens, Sunnyside, Vann and Washington. Each school is eligible for \$34,599 in additional funds. Schools will develop specific plans for the use of these funds to improve the performance of students. The plans will be approved by Dr. Young and Ms. Fisher prior to

distribution of the funds. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006.

Consultant/Contracted Services

RESOLVED, That the Board authorizes its proper officers to enter into contracts with the following individuals for the services and fees set forth in subparagraphs 1 through 55, inclusive.

- 1. Civic Light Opera The Pittsburgh CLO's Creative Vision program creates a positive environment within a traditional classroom where urban school students are inspired by working artist educators. Working with approximately twenty (20) Martin Luther King School fourth grade students, the CV program supports and enhances Communication, Arts & Humanities and Math Standards. The CV program does this by creating unique opportunities for students to strengthen their skills in oral and written communications, reading and responding to literature, and critical thinking via attending and creating their own theatrical productions, recording original CD's, oral presentations, journaling and other writing projects. The operating period shall be from October 27, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$14,000 from Account # 4195-208-1490-323.
- 2. Patrick Regan To provide bagpipe lessons to approximately eighteen (18) students of the **Carrick High School** Bagpipe and Drum Corps. He will provide individual as well as group instruction. Mr. Regan works with students during the school day and also after school on Thursdays from 2:30 p.m. 9:00 p.m. throught the school year. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$10,000 from Account # 4305-608-1100-323.
- 3. FamilyLinks To provide two-hundred fifty (250) hours of mental health presentations to grades K-5 at **Brookline Elementary School**. Topics include: Anger Management; Team Building; Social Skills: Conflict Resolution; Connection Interactions; Personal Responsibility; Kids Need Heroes; Friendship; Getting Along With Others and Leadership Academy. Shelly Heigle will coordinate the program. The dates of operation will be from November 1, 2005 through June 1, 2006. The program will operate during the regular school day. The Leadership Academy will operate after school from 2:30 p.m. to 3:45 p.m. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$10,000 from Account # 4110-297-1100-323.
- 4. This item has been pulled.

- Nick Cave Project To support Nick Cave as an artist-in-residence at **Pittsburgh CAPA** for one (1) week during the period of November 1, 2005 through November 30, 2005, with Pittsburgh based organizations Pittsburgh Dance Ensemble and Nego Gato. Nick Cave will create and present original dance creations to be performed collaboratively with CAPA students, the Pittsburgh Dance Ensemble, and Nego Gato. As part of his residency, Mr. Cave will instruct CAPA students through lecture demonstrations that will accompany master dance classes facilitated by Pittsburgh Dance Ensemble and Nego Gato as they prepare to perform these original dance creations. CAPA students will have an opportunity to perform and observe the presentation of works in a live performance venue (Carnegie Museum) hosted by Fashion Africana on the last day of the residency. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through November 30, 2005. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$12,500 from Account # 4304-09C-1490-323.
- 6. Joshua Musembi Kivuva, Ph.D. To provide translation services to Somalian-Bantu children and families enrolled in Head Start classrooms. Services will be provided Monday through Friday, five (5) days a week for no more than 4.5 hours a day. Dr. Kivuva will be available to greet parents as they drop off/pick up their child(ren). Dr. Kivuva will also be available to provide translation services during evening parent meetings and home visits, when scheduled. The operating period shall be from October 27, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$26,775 from Account # 4800-11C-1800-330.
- 7. Wanda M. Henderson To facilitate training sessions for parents and staff on parliamentary procedures, rights and responsibilities of officers and council members, how to handle emotions, new officer/member orientation sessions and understanding and implementing Bylaws. Services will occur between November 1, 2005 and July 31, 2006 at a cost not to exceed \$6,000, including expenses, payable from Account # 4800-26B-1800-330.
- 8. Ronald V. McGuckin and Associates To provide consultation/training to Head Start/Pre-K in areas of shared governance to help strengthen the commitment between the School District's Board of Directors, policy council members, Head Start/Pre-K staff and other stakeholders. The training will include shared governance, program policies and procedures, conflict resolution, and parliamentarian procedures. The trainings/consultations will be conducted between November 1, 2005 and July 31, 2006, at a cost not to exceed \$15,000, including expenses, payable from an Account # 4800-26B-1800-330.
- 9. ChildPlus Software To train staff on how to use the ChildPlus Data Engine software, used for tracking student data for the Federal Government's PIR (Program Information Report). This software provides a comprehensive database that allows staff to track child attendance, immunization and health records, disability/mental health profiles, family case management, parent involvement and community resource and referral tracking. The facilitator will

- provide on-site training for up to three (3) days for up to fifteen (15) staff persons. The training will occur between November 1, 2005 and July 31, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$4,000, including expenses, payable from Account # 4801-26B-2271-330 (\$3,040) and 4000-19B-2271-330 (\$960).
- 10. Lazor-Richason Associates To provide comprehensive T-BASE management services within each classroom funded through the Head Start Supplemental Assistance Program (HSSAP) grant to assist teaching staff with step-by-step guidelines for ways to change challenging behavior to expected outcomes in children. The dates of operation are from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$6,000, payable from Account # 4800-11C-1800-330.
- 11. Kaplan Early Learning Company To provide training and technical assistance to up to three (3) teachers who work in classrooms funded through the Head Start Supplemental Assistance Program (HSSAP) grant on the implementation of the HIGH SCOPE curriculum and its assessment. Participants will become familiar with appropriate classroom arrangement, High Scope "Key Experiences" and instructions on utilizing and scoring the Child Observation Record (COR) assessment. The components of the trainings and consultations shall include professional development and classroom visitations. Trainings are to occur between November 1, 2005 and June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$7,000, payable from Account # 4800-11C-1800-330.
- 12. Gateway to the Arts Program To conduct "Arts-in-Early Education" professional development in-service workshops for staff who work in, and parents of children enrolled in, classrooms funded through the Head Start Supplemental Assistance Program (HSSAP) grant. These workshops will focus on providing training in the areas of music, visual art, drama/creative play or movement. Participants will have the opportunity to rotate through these arts discipline-specific workshops so that, by the end of the 2005-06 school year, each participant will have received training in all four workshops. Program assessment protocols will be mutually developed by Gateway to the Arts and HS/Pre-K administration. The dates of operation are between November 1, 2005 and June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$5,000, which also includes the cost of workshop materials and planning and preparation time between both parties. The cost is payable from Account # 4800-11C-1800-330.
- 13. Interim Healthcare To provide pediatric nursing services to children enrolled in Head Start classrooms. The contractor will provide services for required vision screenings and physical examinations. The contractor will also provide health education mini-workshops to classroom staff and parents, medical consultations with appropriate staff and parents and conduct classroom visits, when needed. The services are to occur between November 1, 2005 and July 31, 2006 at a cost not to exceed \$51,000, payable from Account # 4800-26B-1800-330.

- 14. Interim Healthcare To provide pediatric nursing services to children enrolled in Head Start Supplemental Assistance Program (HSSAP) classrooms. The contractor will provide services for required vision screenings and physical examinations. The contractor will also provide health education mini-workshops to classroom staff and parents, medical consultations with appropriate staff and parents and conduct classroom visits, when needed. The services are to occur between November 1, 2005 and June 30, 2006 at a cost not to exceed \$15,600, payable from Account # 4800-11C-1800-330.
- 15. Interim Healthcare To provide pediatric nursing services to children enrolled in Pre-K classrooms. The contractor will provide services for required vision screenings and physical examinations. The contractor will also provide health education mini-workshops to classroom staff and parents, medical consultations with appropriate staff and parents and conduct classroom visits, when needed. The services are to occur between November 1, 2005 and June 30, 2006 at a cost not to exceed \$16,000, payable from Account # 4000-19B-2420-330.
- 16. Pearson Digital Learning To provide technical support and on-site service support for the Waterford Early Reading curriculum at thirty-six (36) Head Start sites. Services will include telephone and web support, all product updates and fixes, access to troubleshooting and streamlined hardware support on HiQ systems, and on-site service, which includes training, as needed. Dates of operation are from November 1, 2005 through July 31, 2006. The total cost shall not exceed \$33,000, payable from Account # 4800-26B-1800-330 (\$16,500) and 4801-26B-2271-330 (\$16,500).
- 17. Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh To provide individual consultations to parents/children enrolled in classrooms funded through the Head Start Supplemental Assistance Program (HSSAP) grant, training coordination for staff, child assessments and data management and mental health intervention services for children and families. The dates of operation are from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$68,000, payable from Account # 4800-11C-1800-330.
- 18. City of Pittsburgh To supply personnel and equipment sufficient to broadcast, on a tape delayed basis, monthly public meetings of the Board of Education. The payment for these services shall not exceed \$70,000.00. In addition, the City will provide up to six (6) prime-time hours a week of School District programming to be broadcast on Channel 13 including but not limited to message board items, school-based educational programs and activities, messages from the leadership concerning the vision and direction of the District, and playbacks of pre-produced educational programming on issues such as character education, extracurricular activities, and academic programs which align with the District's curriculum. The cost of these services shall not exceed \$30,000.00. The City shall be paid after the services are rendered as per invoices submitted on a monthly basis. The

- dates of operation are from January 1, 2006 to December 31, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$100,000 from Account #3203-010-2370-330.
- 19. Duquesne University To provide eight Tech Advisors for six (6) hours a week for twenty-eight (28) weeks to the eight (8) pilot schools from year two (Clayton, East Hills, Grandview, Lemington, Frick, Greenway, Oliver, and Letsche). The Tech Advisors will assist teachers by working one-on-one on creating lessons using advanced instructional technologies. These lessons will be reviewed for entry into a District bank of best practices. Additionally, the Tech Advisor will conduct six (6) advanced workshops to the entire staff, building on the skills from the SUCCESS program, introducing them to graphics presentation and video-based instruction. The Tech Advisor and workshops will be conducted from November 1, 2005 through May 31, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$180,000 from Account # 4000-07C-2271-323.
- 20. Prismatic Consulting LLC To create the fully functional, refined version of the following software: 1. Refine the beta version of the district-wide PPS ORALS testing software that has been updated to utilize Microsoft's .NET technology and expand the program to include key additional features (calibration function, a MultiSkills test, un-timed version, connection to the district application programming interface); 2. Refine the online test that will be available to all PPS world language teachers for regular class testing. This version will be called PPS ORALS+; 3. Refine the online Practice Activities for Language Students (PALS) software program that will provide students with listening, speaking, reading, and writing practice at home as well as in computer labs. 4. Assist in the dissemination of project components as required by the grant. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through November 1, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$100,000 from Account # 4600-180-2270-323.
- 21. University of Pittsburgh Physicians WPIC, Dr. McGonigle Consultation and case management will be provided to students with identified neurologic, psychiatric and behavioral problems within the classroom setting. Teachers will be supported on behavior management strategies and individual behavior support plans. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$4,000 from Account # 5500-13B-1231-323.
- 22. Wilson Language Training To provide feedback and consultation to teachers who were trained in August in implementing the Wilson Language Program in Special Education classrooms. The Wilson program is a PPS approved highly specialized reading program for students with learning disabilities. The observations, feedback and consultation will occur over the course of the school year. Projected dates are: November 14-16, 2005, January 24-26, 2006, March 13-15, 2006 and May 17-19, 2006. Fees are \$1,300 and expenses are projected at \$1,300 for each three-day session. The operating period shall be from

- October 27, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$10,400 from Accounts 5231-292-1231-323 (\$5,200) and 5544-292-2390-582 (\$5,200).
- 23. AOT, Inc. To provide Certified Occupational Therapist Assistant (COTA) services three (3) days a week for students at **Conroy Education Center** who are in need of therapeutic services that cannot be provided by current staff. The rate shall be \$45.00 per hour. In addition, the contractor will provide COTA and/or Occupational Therapy (OT) services during the absences of district staff, if possible and requested. OT rates are \$55.00 per hour. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$50,000 from Account # 5131-10B-1231-323.
- 24. University of Pittsburgh Physicians, WPIC Dr. Handen Consultation and case management will be provided to students with identified neurologic, psychiatric and behavioral problems within the classroom setting. Teachers will be supported on behavior management strategies and individual behavior support plans. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$4,000 from Account # 5500-13B-1231-323.
- 25. Center for Violence and Injury Control/Allegheny-Singer Research Institute The Center for Violence and Injury Control (CVIC) will serve as the Research Partner for the Pittsburgh Youth Intervention Project (PYIP) that is funded by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. As the Research Partner, CVIC will be responsible for working with Pittsburgh Bureau of Police to ensure the ongoing collection and tracking of gang crime data in the target area, conducting regular audits and reviews of program client data, supporting the project coordinator in the preparation of written and oral reports, ensuring that program level data are transmitted in a timely and error-free manner to the National Evaluation Team, and attending project meetings (Steering Committee and Intervention Team) on a regular basis. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The cost for this action will be \$37.90 per hour and will not exceed \$10,000 from Account # 4810-252-2190-330.
- 26. Creative Information Management Concept (CIMCon), Inc. The Gang Free Schools Project is funded by the Department of Justice Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). There are a total of four (4) GFS sites in the county. CIMCon, Inc. will modify the current system to add additional features that will allow the outreach workers to be more efficient in the data collection process. The revised system will serve as a pilot for the other three (3) Gang Free Schools sites. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through January 31, 2006. The total cost of this action will not exceed \$9,000 from Account # 4810-252-2190-330.

- 27. Center for Urban Biblical Minstry The District has partnered with Family Guidance, Inc. (FGI) to implement the USDOE Mentoring Programs Grant. Based on FGI's highly successful one-to-one mentoring program model, the program will serve as a prevention component of the District's Pittsburgh Youth Invention Project. The Center of Urban Biblical Ministry has agreed to serve as a partner in this grant; they will identify, screen, recruit, and monitor a minimum of ten (10) mentors. The overall Mentoring Program will enable the District to reach a total of one-hundred (100) East End elementary and middle school youth. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through October 31, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$5,004 from Account # 4810-23A-2190-330.
- 28. Carnegie Science Center To provide hands on science programs designed for groups of twenty (20) students in the ELECT Student Works (ESW) After-School Program. All programs will demonstrate effective instructional strategies for students and teachers and utilize national and state science/math standard-based materials. Schools participating will include: Arlington, Chatham, Clayton, Greenfield, Knoxville, Lemington, Lincoln, Morningside, Stevens and Weil. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. The total cost of this action shall not exceed \$18,000 from Account # 4000-04C-1490-323.
- 29. Carnegie Science Center To provide hands on science programs designed for groups of twenty (20) students in the 21st Century Community Learning Center (CCLC) After-School Program. All programs will demonstrate effective instructional strategies for students and teachers and utilize national and state science/math standard-based materials. Schools participating include: Burgwin, Fort Pitt, Manchester, Murray, Northview, Roosevelt, Sunnyside and Woolslair. The operating period shall be from November 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006. WHEREAS, under the Act, the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh is legally empowered to prepare a Tax Increment Financing ("TIF") Proposal to provide financing for the elimination and prevention of the development or spread of blight within specified tax increment districts located in the City of Pittsburgh and to present such proposal to the Board of Public Education of the City of Pittsburgh for its consideration; and

WHEREAS, the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh is working to develop structured parking facilities and the necessary infrastructure to support up to an additional 950,000 square feet of new development at the Pittsburgh Technology Center in the Oakland area of Pittsburgh (the "*Project*"); and

WHEREAS, the School District of Pittsburgh is expected to benefit from the use of tax increments in portions of Redevelopment Area #50 - J & L Second Avenue by stimulation of private investment, increases in property values, creation of employment opportunities and improvement of surrounding properties; and

WHEREAS, the implementation of any TIF Proposal is fully dependent on the cooperation and participation of all local taxing bodies, namely, the City of Pittsburgh, the School District of Pittsburgh and the County of Allegheny.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF PUBLIC EDUCATION OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF PITTSBURGH AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The use of TIF financing to fund a portion of the cost of the Project located in Redevelopment Area #50 - J & L Second Avenue is endorsed and the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh is requested to prepare a detailed TIF Proposal for portions of Redevelopment Area #50 - J & L Second Avenue, as required by the Act.

SECTION 2. The respective governing bodies of the City of Pittsburgh and County of Allegheny will be notified of this action and requested to undertake similar favorable consideration and cooperation in implementing a TIF Proposal with respect to portions of Redevelopment Area #50 - J & L Second Avenue.

SECTION 3. The appropriate public officials of the School District of the Pittsburgh are hereby directed to take such actions in cooperation with the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh and any participating taxing bodies in furtherance of the development of an acceptable TIF Proposal that will be brought before the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh and to schedule and conduct any and all public hearings required by the Act to permit public comment prior to final approval and implementation of any TIF Proposal.

SECTION 4. The Chief Operations Officer and Assistant Secretary are each hereby designated as the Board of Public Education of the School District of Pittsburgh's representative to work with the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh in preparing the TIF Proposal.

SECTION 5. If any provision of this Resolution shall be determined to be unlawful, invalid, void or unenforceable, then that provision shall be considered severable from the remaining provisions of this Resolution which shall be in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. Any Resolution or part thereof conflicting with the provisions of this Resolution is hereby repealed in so far as the same affects this Resolution.

September 30, 2005 Unaudited Financial Statement Highlights October 18, 2005

GENERAL FUND

- During the 12 month period from October 1, 2004 to September 30, 2005 the cash and investment position decreased by \$18.4 million, as total fund balance declined by \$12.8 million or 9.3% lower.
- Adjusted for significant timing differences and one-time events, total 2005 General Fund revenues are trending only 0.7% higher than 2004 levels through the first nine months of the fiscal year. Note that:
 - Mercantile tax collections, purely from prior years, total \$114,957;
 - Earned income tax collections lag 2004 levels by \$423,045 or roughly 0.7%;
 - Interest earnings improved by over \$1,448,035, growing 99.9% versus 2004.
- Adjusted for significant timing differences and one-time events, total 2005 General Fund expenditures are trending over 0.4% lower than 2004 levels through the first nine months of the fiscal year. Note that:
 - Expenditures for tax refunds are running over \$788,084, or 20.1% higher. At the current trend, September's budget transfer may not be adequate for December 31, 2005 final expenditures, as accrued;
 - Salary expenditures are \$1,450,315 less than 2004, a decrease of 0.9%. The unencumbered salary appropriation is \$3,3761,641 lower than 2004;
 - Transportation costs (included in major object 500 on the expenditure summary) are \$940,984 or 5.68% greater than 2004;
 - Charter school payments (included in major object 500 on the expenditure summary) increased \$1,344,868, or 14.5% higher than 2004.
- Total encumbrances in the General Fund are reduced by \$2,159,546 or nearly 16.3% versus 2004.
- The impact of higher energy costs will be felt in transportation and utility budgets over the last three months of the fiscal year, as will the loss of the \$4 million RAD payment, which was always received as a lump sum.
- Summary: The structural gap between revenues and expenditures evidenced by the \$32.6 million decrease in fund balance during 2004 continues, exasperated by the bailout of the City of Pittsburgh.

FOOD SERVICE

- The cash position decreased by over \$1 million in the last 12 months to a negative \$1,779,464. Unrestricted net assets are negative \$1,756,453.
- Special event revenues increased by \$353,082 or 24.5% over 2004.
- Expenses are \$388,562 or 3.9% more than 2004 levels, reflecting a growth in salaries of \$4,966, but increases in supplies of \$135,864 and property of \$80,216.
- Summary: Increased meal prices in place for the 2005/06 school year will not eliminate the gap between revenues and expenses in this fund.

INTERNAL SERVICE FUNDS

• During the 12 month period from October 1, 2004 to September 30, 2005 unrestricted net assets increased by \$2,092,382 driven by the \$2,765,445 improvement in workers' compensation.



WHEREAS, The Administration of the School District of Pittsburgh is developing a plan to right-size the District which will include the closing of school buildings and the reconfiguration of other schools and educational programs to further enhance student achievement within the District; and

WHEREAS, The goal of this plan is to maximize the use of facilities and personnel as to provide the optimum educational opportunities for the students of the District; and

WHEREAS, Following the announcement of this plan, the Board of Education will conduct a Public Hearing pursuant to the Public School Code of 1949, as amended, so as to provide the parents and residents of the District the opportunity to offer comment on the plan; and

WHEREAS, In order to insure equity, the final plan must be considered as whole without amendment, to insure that all of the data and analysis utilized in the development of the plan is reflected in the final action of the Board;

NOW THEREFORE, Be it resolved and it is hereby resolved as follows:

- 1. The Board of Public Education commits that upon final consideration of the plan to "Rightsize the Pittsburgh Public Schools - Educational Enhancements and Resource Realignment for the 2006-2007 school year" following the public hearing as required by the School Code of 1949, it shall consider a motion to adopt the plan as presented without amendment.
- 2. The Board recognizes that this procedure will insure that all of the data and analysis comprising the plan will be reflected in the adopted plan and will eliminate the perception of lack of objectivity in the consideration of these factors.
- 3. Further, the Board shall not consider any motion to amend the plan and it shall vote on the motion in the manner set forth in paragraph one of this Resolution.

               MR. CAMARDA: That's correct.

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Hearing none, we will move to new

- 1 business.
- I want to just turn the microphone back
- 3 over to Mrs. Vlassich, if we may, because we have one
- 4 more student who we want to recognize this evening.
- 5 Miss Vlassich.
- 6 (Award presented.)
- 7 (Applause.)
- 8 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 9 And congratulations and thanks for coming.
- We will move to new business.
- There is a new business item.
- Mr. Romaniello.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Thank you, Mr. President.
- I would just like to read something. On
- 15 October 4th, I don't know if anyone knows, but on
- 16 October 4th, Councilman -- City Councilman Dan Deasy
- 17 sponsored a resolution to honor Pat Fisher, and I have
- 18 been asked to read it into our record.
- I'm sorry, Pat Crawford, excuse me. It was
- 20 Pat Crawford.
- MR. ISLER: Miss Fisher was a little bit
- 22 shocked back there.
- That's okay, Miss Fisher, we see you.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: I apologize.
- MR. ISLER: She got very nervous, she

- 1 thought something happened she didn't know about,
- 2 Mr. Romaniello. Let's get our Pats correct here.
- 3 (Mr. Romaniello read from prepared
- 4 material.)
- 5 MR. ROMANIELLO: Councilman Deasy just
- 6 asked me to read that into the record, in case there
- 7 were some members of the Board who didn't know that
- 8 Pat had received that honor.
- 9 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Romaniello. It
- 10 is an honor well deserved.
- Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: New business?
- MR. ISLER: Yes, sir, we are on new
- 14 business, please.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mr. President, I just want
- 16 to take a second to share my comments again about the
- 17 very important issue that I think this District is
- 18 involved with, and I think that we should not be
- 19 involved, and as you know, Mr. Roosevelt, in the next,
- 20 within five days, this city will be participating in a
- 21 holiday called Halloween, and I just want to once
- 22 again suggest that I think that this District should
- 23 find a way to deemphasize its promotion and marketing
- 24 of this particular holiday.
- I think it's a contradiction for a School

- 1 District to talk about safe schools, and don't go
- 2 anywhere with strangers, and don't put anything in
- 3 your mouth that you get from other people, but on one
- 4 day of the year, not only do we allow it, but we
- 5 promote it.
- In recent days, just in today's paper,
- 7 there is a case that is still being talked about, that
- 8 happened some years ago near and around the holiday.
- 9 And so I just think that it is something
- 10 that the District can probably do without, with
- 11 promotion.
- 12 There is no way that I am suggesting that
- 13 no one should participate, and no one should get
- 14 involved. It's a personal -- it is a personal call.
- But from a District's point of view, I just
- 16 think that it's something that we should consider, and
- 17 to avoid any of the problems that happen the following
- 18 day, in terms of children being either kidnapped, or
- 19 other problems that happen on that particular day.
- 20 So I just want to share that with you, and
- 21 I hope that you can find and create a way of
- 22 encouraging our staff to not necessarily promote it,
- 23 and to encourage our kids to participate in that
- 24 particular holiday.
- 25 Thank you, sir.

               MR. ISLER: Mr. Matthews, do you want to

    say anything else?

               MR. MATTHEWS: Yes.

               I just wanted to tell my fellow Board
17
   members, the reason why I have proposed this
18
    resolution, is so that we have -- this is about
19
    governance, and we understand that the District -- we
20
    understand the goals and objectives of the District in
21
   terms of the budgetary issues that we face, with
22
    the -- as the -- under the -- as the -- in usage of
23
    our school buildings.
```

And we also understand the educational

component, such as low achieving schools.

24

- 1 And I think that what this does, is that it
- 2 sets apart, and builds upon our trust factor, for
- 3 every Board member, that we would have for -- with the
- 4 Superintendent, as well as the staff.
- I am not saying that Board members cannot
- 6 comment on the plan, but I think that we just need to
- 7 show trust, and good diligence to the public, and to
- 8 also build upon the public trust, that not to take
- 9 this plan, and pull it apart, where someone may say
- 10 that one Board member had due diligence, or influence
- 11 to get something done.
- I think we need to just vote it one way or
- 13 another, either up or down, and this would be good
- 14 governance for this District, and it would set apart
- 15 the fact that this Board is not playing around, we are
- 16 not playing games, we either like the plan or we don't
- 17 like the plan.
- And I think this is also a way to hold the
- 19 Superintendent and the staff accountable.
- 20 Because whatever plan comes forth -- and I
- 21 have not seen the plan -- but whatever plan comes
- 22 forth, I think that the Superintendent is going to be
- 23 held, and needs to be held accountable to the results,
- 24 and he can't be held accountable if we pick and choose
- 25 and pull apart this plan.

- And so that's the reason why I am bringing
- 2 this resolution forward.
- 3 I had hoped that my fellow Board members
- 4 will support it, because all it merely says, is that
- 5 we are going to vote on the plan, as is, up or down.
- 6 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Matthews.
- 7 Any other comments from any other Board
- 8 members?
- 9 MR. DOWD: Do we need a second on this?
- 10 MR. ISLER: Hold on one second.
- It is a new business item, it is not a
- 12 motion.
- 13 It is a new business item.
- I am asking the parliamentarian, it is a
- 15 new business item, we do not need a second.
- MR. DOWD: Thank you.
- MR. ISLER: We are not amending this.
- MR. TAYLOR: I thought a new business item,
- 19 only the Superintendent could add a new business item
- 20 to a package.
- 21 MR. WEISS: There have been new business
- 22 items before put forward by Board members, many times.
- MR. TAYLOR: So where does the part come
- 24 in, where you make a motion and someone seconds it.
- 25 That means I can just place -- I mean, this

- 1 thing would be stacked up with new business, if each
- 2 Board member can place something into the -- I mean,
- 3 that's not the way -- I mean, it's just that's a
- 4 little bit peculiar from what I -- I mean, I usually
- 5 expect an item like this, a Board makes a resolution
- 6 and it is seconded.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: I have never known Board
- 9 members just to be able to put things in the --
- 10 MR. WEISS: It's been, there have been new
- 11 business items presented many times.
- 12 MR. TAYLOR: I wouldn't -- okay. I
- 13 wouldn't recommend us doing it that way.
- I mean, he does have a second, I would just
- 15 say for the future, I wouldn't, because again, any
- 16 resolution that any Board member say they want, goes
- 17 in the book automatically, I think it is best to make
- 18 a motion, and second it.
- But, if, you know, Board members from here
- 20 on out, determine they want to do it that way, then --
- 21 MR. ISLER: Dr. Dowd did second it. It has
- 22 been seconded.
- MR. DOWD: I had a question.
- MR. ISLER: Yes.
- MR. TAYLOR: I mean, I thought new business

- 1 items only came from the administration, I didn't know
- 2 that they --
- 3 MR. ISLER: There have been new business
- 4 items in my term on this Board, Mr. Taylor, from Board
- 5 members.
- 6 MR. DOWD: Point of order. Are we in
- 7 discussion then?
- MR. ISLER: We are in discussion.
- 9 Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- I just, first, want to say that I am a
- 12 little disturbed at the resolution.
- Mr. Matthews, I know what your intent is
- 14 here, but I have a couple of concerns, and I guess --
- 15 I mean, to kind of put it all in one -- one -- one --
- 16 one issue here.
- 17 This, Mr. Matthews, is -- is trying to
- 18 suggest, you are trying to give Mr. Roosevelt a
- 19 shortcut to building a consensus, and this is a very
- 20 sensitive matter here.
- 21 At times, in this District, it has been
- 22 somewhat of a bloody situation, and in terms of how
- 23 schools should be closed.
- 24 And I think this is a wonderful opportunity
- 25 for Mr. Roosevelt to show his skills, establish

- 1 relationships in the community, show his people
- 2 skills, and then to also be able to convince this
- 3 Board on his realignment plan.
- When we put something forward here, I am
- 5 also concerned that it is almost trying to take power
- 6 away from our Board members.
- 7 Regardless of what some in the public may
- 8 think, in terms of Board members -- as a matter of
- 9 fact, we actually, we performed tonight, some voted
- 10 for different categories in its entirety, some
- 11 abstained or withheld from certain items.
- 12 It is our right to be able to do that.
- We are elected to do that.
- 14 Furthermore, to pass something like this,
- 15 it is almost trying to corner or narrow down the
- 16 community's input.
- 17 If we vote on something like this, and you
- 18 are suggesting to me that we have to vote it in its
- 19 entirety, either up or down, well, what if, when we
- 20 open up the community response portion of this
- 21 realignment, and my community suggests to me that they
- 22 don't like A, B, C or D, as an elected official, it is
- 23 my responsibility to respond to my constituents, but
- 24 based on the resolution, I am almost obligated to vote
- 25 for it in its entirety, up or down.

- Now, I have some concerns about it, and I
- 2 really think it is just a little bit unfair to do
- 3 something like this, and especially, Mr. Matthews, we
- 4 are not sure when this plan will be presented to us.
- 5 And I understand it will be pretty soon,
- 6 but we don't know for sure, and if it's a matter of
- 7 30 days or so, before you will be exiting this Board,
- 8 it is a little unfair for the new Board member
- 9 representing your district to come in, and to find out
- 10 that his hands have been tied, in terms of being able
- 11 to vote on this process.
- 12 And I am only saying that, Mr. Matthews, to
- 13 encourage you, or to ask if you would consider pulling
- 14 this item, or not presenting it, for a couple of
- 15 reasons.
- But the most important reason is, is that
- 17 just some professional courtesy among your colleagues
- 18 here.
- I don't know about my colleagues here, but
- 20 I received this, as a fax, late last night.
- It's always good to have a discussion on
- 22 something like this.
- It's been pretty, pretty disappointing, I
- 24 think over the last year or so, when my other
- 25 colleagues on the Board sprung surprises on this body,

- 1 this is the exact same way, some dealing with the
- 2 former Superintendent, some dealing with additions to
- 3 different schools, and it's -- it's just a little
- 4 disrespectful to do that to some of the colleagues,
- 5 your colleagues here.
- 6 So I do have some concerns about it.
- 7 I would rather not be forced into a vote,
- 8 and I am only asking if you would consider pulling it
- 9 back, and allowing us to have a discussion of that.
- And we have to also keep in mind, this is
- 11 suggesting -- I mean, you suggested that it's good
- 12 government but, you know, how many elected officials
- 13 will vote on something blindly, without seeing it.
- I am a Board member, I have yet to see the
- 15 realignment, any part of it, I have yet the hear
- 16 anything about it, and that would not be good
- 17 government for me to vote on something now, that I
- 18 have not seen.
- So, I am only asking you keep that in mind.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right. And let me answer
- 21 you there.
- 22 First of all, it is good governance, and
- 23 people, most people, who are about good governance --
- 24 you are not voting on it blindly, this is good
- 25 governance.

- 1 This does not take anything away from the
- 2 community, and the community will still have input,
- 3 and it doesn't give Mr. Roosevelt a shortcut, as a
- 4 matter of fact it makes him more accountable, and his
- 5 presentation skills to the community and the Board
- 6 members has got to be on point, because otherwise it
- 7 won't get passed.
- 8 He has to sell this -- he has to sell this
- 9 plan to us and to the Board.
- 10 But what I am saying is that we cannot
- 11 afford, this District cannot afford to start picking
- 12 and pulling apart this plan, because if you pull one
- 13 off, then you can't -- you have to pull them all off.
- 14 So all I am asking is that what we do is
- 15 vote this thing one way or another.
- 16 And if not, what -- I am not taking
- 17 anything away from the person that will replace me,
- 18 Mr. Sumpter. As a matter of fact, it will strengthen
- 19 him.
- It will say, "If you don't like the plan,
- 21 vote it down, but if you like it, vote it up."
- But don't pick and pull schools from off of
- 23 this plan, or add schools onto the plan, because it
- 24 makes it look like someone has some type of influence
- 25 to try to get something done.

- 1 But you if you mess with one school, then
- 2 it ricochets, and it has the ricochet effect
- 3 throughout the whole District.
- 4 We have objectives and goals that we are
- 5 trying to accomplish, and I think that that's the
- 6 ultimate goal that we ought to be trying to look at.
- 7 And it doesn't preclude any Board member
- 8 from having a discussion. As a matter of fact, we
- 9 should have a discussion when the school plan comes
- 10 out, that we should ask Mr. Roosevelt the tough
- 11. questions, such as, "How does it benefit my community,
- 12 how does it benefit the students?"
- 13 You have the responsibility to your
- 14 constituents to ask those questions.
- So it doesn't do anything that stops any
- 16 Board member from taking -- it doesn't take away their
- 17 rights, it doesn't take away anything.
- 18 All it says is that we are going to look at
- 19 this thing as a whole, and we are going to either vote
- 20 it up -- if Mr. Roosevelt has not done a good job of
- 21 convincing us that this plan will work, then we vote
- 22 it down.
- I mean, and that now is going to be his
- 24 job. He has to convince this Board, he has to make
- 25 the sale to this Board, and to this community, why

- 1 this plan will work.
- 2 And that's all this is saying. All this is
- 3 saying is allow them to do what they have to do, and
- 4 let's vote it up or down.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: And, Mr. Matthews, I can
- 6 appreciate that, but I think, then, that all of the
- 7 things that you just mentioned that Mr. Roosevelt can
- 8 do, he can do that without passing this resolution.
- 9 That's my only concern.
- 10 I'm sure that he can do it when his plan is
- 11 presented, it will be his realignment plan.
- But to try to pass something like this,
- 13 it's just a little unfair for some of us Board
- 14 members, especially since we have not had --
- MR. MATTHEWS: How is it -- just how --
- 16 explain how it is unfair. That's the part I am not
- 17 catching.
- 18 MR. ISLER: I would rather not. I mean,
- 19 this is not the time to debate this.
- I think that, Mr. Brentley, you have your
- 21 questions, and Mr. Matthews, there are other people
- 22 here who want to be recognized.
- Mr. Brentley, do you have anything else to
- 24 add?
- MR. BRENTLEY: You cut it off, I will --

- 1 MR. ISLER: No, I am not cutting it off, I
- 2 just don't want to get into a debate here.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: I will defer to other Board
- 4 members.
- 5 MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor, do you want to be
- 6 recognized? You had your hand up earlier.
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: I will pass to some others.
- 8 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: I just have a question of
- 10 legality here.
- If the Board passes this resolution, and
- 12 there are certain people that do not vote for it, does
- 13 that mean that they are still obligated to vote the
- 14 plan up or down?
- 15 MR. ISLER: Mr. Weiss.
- MR. WEISS: If the Board passes the
- 17 resolution, then it will be presented, the plan will
- 18 be presented to the Board as an up or down vote.
- 19 So, an action of the Board binds the Board.
- 20 If it's approved, then that's the rule, if you will,
- 21 as to how it will be presented to the Board.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- 23 MR. ISLER: The Board, or individuals of
- 24 the Board, I think is Mrs. Colaizzi's question.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.

- 1 MR. WEISS: Yes. It binds the Board
- 2 members.
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: It binds every individual
- 4 Board member.
- 5 MR. ISLER: It binds every Board member as
- 6 a total, as a whole.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: So, Mr. Matthews, for the
- 8 sake of me understanding this a little bit further,
- 9 what you are actually asking, then, is that the
- 10 Superintendent proposes this as just a plan, not a
- 11 breakdown of the plan as it's been done in the past;
- 12 am I correct?
- MR. BRENTLEY: No, because he said no
- 14 amendments.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No. Did --
- MR. DOWD: Did you hear the question,
- 17 Mr. Matthews?
- 18 MR. MATTHEWS: That was directed to me?
- 19 Say it one more time, Theresa, I'm sorry.
- MS. COLAIZZI: My question is, is that what
- 21 you are actually requesting from the Superintendent,
- 22 through this resolution, is that you are actually
- 23 asking him to present the plan as it's entirety; there
- 24 would be no break down of the plan in front of us,
- 25 it's here is the plan, yea or nay; am I correct?

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Well, no, he will give us
- 2 the plan, that will list the schools, and then
- 3 whatever schools are closing, each one has to present
- 4 to us the educational reasoning for the school, and
- 5 justification for closing the school.
- And, I mean, all of that, he has to make
- 7 his presentation and have to tell us.
- But he will present to us one resolution,
- 9 that will state this is in reference to the school
- 10 plan, school realignment, reallocation plan, XYZ, on
- 11 this date, and then list the schools, and then we vote
- 12 on it as a whole package, as one.
- MR. DOWD: Okay. Then --
- MR. MATTHEWS: It wouldn't be an A, B, C, D
- 15 and E, it would simply be an A.
- 16 MS. COLAIZZI: So there wouldn't be the
- 17 break down I just described.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right.
- MS. COLAIZZI: So you did answer the
- 20 question, the way I thought the answer was.
- 21 Well, I am going to support this
- 22 resolution, this evening, and I am going to tell
- 23 you why I am going to support this.
- The realization of all of this is not
- 25 necessarily, you know, can we vote on one thing or

- 1 another, because if we really wanted to, going around
- 2 this Board, we could do as Mr. Matthews has made
- 3 comments about in the past, we could wheel and deal,
- 4 and then not even close -- not even leave any schools
- 5 to stay open.
- So, the reality of it is, you know, we
- 7 could vote this up or down either way.
- 8 My bigger concern is this: We are being
- 9 watched very, very carefully on the state level, and
- 10 the state is looking for any excuse possible to take
- 11 this Board over.
- My fear of that is that when this Board is
- 13 taken over, you know, you talk about an elected
- 14 official not having the ability to do what they are
- 15 supposed to do, but if the state comes in here and
- 16 takes us over, the people will never have a word to
- 17 say, they won't have the opportunity to be able to
- 18 express their opinion, one way or another.
- So, any more, we are not obligated even to
- 20 our constituents, we are obligated to the state,
- 21 because the state is very clear about what their
- 22 intention is.
- So if we do not right size this District,
- 24 whether we like that plan completely or not, we will
- 25 have to work with our Superintendent.

- But, if you don't like it in the end, I
- 2 might be the first one to vote no on it.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: But you can't.
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: But the point -- yes, I can,
- 5 you can vote on the whole plan no. You can either
- 6 vote on the whole thing yes, or the whole thing no.
- 7 You can't break it apart, when we sit at the table
- 8 that night.
- 9 That is the only difference here.
- But we have time, from now until that
- 11 night.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- Mr. Romaniello.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: Thank you.
- I would like to commend Mr. Matthews for
- 16 bringing this forward.
- I sat at many, many legislative meetings,
- 18 and heard other Board members being accused of
- 19 wielding too much power to get things done in their
- 20 neighborhoods, too much -- being able to get too many
- 21 things done in their districts.
- 22 And I think that is one of the things that
- 23 this piece of legislation will avoid.
- With any -- with any piece of legislation,
- 25 with any negotiations, you know, if everybody is

- 1 entirely happy, then you, you know, need to be
- 2 concerned.
- I am not a hundred percent happy with this,
- 4 you know, I wish there was a way of doing it without
- 5 having to have this kind of legislation, but I am a
- 6 realist enough to know that we can't do it without
- 7 this piece of legislation.
- When I ran for this office, I took a pledge
- 9 that I would work for this District as a whole, that
- 10 there were -- there was too much Board business being
- 11 done from individual Board members' front porches, and
- 12 by that, what I mean is that each individual Board
- 13 member was only trying to take care of their district.
- 14 While you should be concerned about your
- 15 district, as Mrs. Colaizzi said, we need to be
- 16 concerned about this District as a whole, because of
- 17 being watched by Harrisburg.
- 18 We hired Mr. Roosevelt. When we hired
- 19 Mr. Roosevelt, we all said we were bringing him here,
- 20 and we were going to let him do his job.
- 21 If we are going to let him do his job, then
- 22 we need to let him do his job.
- 23 If we -- if he presents us with a plan, and
- 24 we pick it apart, piece by piece, and you know the
- 25 domino effect, when you pull one part of it out, some

- 1 place else suffers, and there we go into the power
- 2 broking.
- 3 So we hired him to do a job, if we are not
- 4 comfortable with the job that he did, then we vote the
- 5 whole process, the whole resolution down.
- So, I don't -- you know, I don't think
- 7 how -- I don't know how we can in good conscience,
- 8 could vote against this, after, you know, saying that
- 9 we were going to be together as a Board, we are going
- 10 to let Mr. Roosevelt do his job.
- 11 We have to have enough confidence in him to
- 12 do what is right for this District.
- We need to vote on things, as a District,
- 14 as a whole, and make sure that we would be able to
- 15 continue to do things like this.
- Because again, as Mrs. Colaizzi said, if
- 17 some higher power comes in and takes over this
- 18 District, then we will all just sit here without
- 19 anything to say, the community will have nothing to
- 20 say, someone else will make these decisions for us.
- 21 The community does have a voice. They will
- 22 have public hearings, and they also have a voice at
- 23 every meeting. They have us.
- That's what they elected us to do, was to
- 25 be their voice.

- 1 They elected us to make the hard decisions.
- This is one of those times, where,
- 3 whether -- you know, whether you like it or not, we
- 4 have to make a decision of what's good for the
- 5 District as a whole, so that's why I will be
- 6 supporting this, and I would urge the rest of my Board
- 7 members to support this resolution, too.
- 8 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Romaniello.
- 9 Mr. Taylor.
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: One of the questions I have,
- 11 Mr. Weiss, is why could not a Board member who voted
- 12 against this resolution, not be able to bring this
- 13 resolution up again for consideration?
- MR. WEISS: Why couldn't he bring the
- 15 resolution up for consideration?
- MR. TAYLOR: I intend to vote against it.
- 17 What would stop me from being able to bring this
- 18 resolution up again?
- MR. WEISS: The only person who could bring
- 20 it up, would be someone who voted for it.
- 21 MR. TAYLOR: So -- but -- but -- okay. I
- 22 had that backwards. So people who voted in the
- 23 affirmative, can bring it back up for reconsideration.
- MR. WEISS: They could.
- MR. MATTHEWS: So if people did want to

- 1 horse trade -- and I say quote, horse trade, because
- 2 that seems to be the word put around here, clearly
- 3 they can override this, if they decided -- Board
- 4 members decided they wanted to horse trade.
- 5 MR. WEISS: Well, I mean, it seems to me
- 6 that the resolution, if passed, commits the Board to
- 7 consider this as a whole, and certainly in other
- 8 legislative bodies, particularly in Harrisburg, and
- 9 Washington, legislation often comes to the floor, you
- 10 know, on a limited rule, when there are no amendments.
- 11 Obviously, if a Board member who votes in
- 12 favor of this wants to present it for reconsideration,
- 13 they can certainly do that, but recognizing that the
- 14 Board, if it approves this tonight, the statement that
- 15 is being made, it speaks for itself that it is going
- 16 to be considered as it is.
- 17 MR. TAYLOR: Right.
- And my question, I don't know if it's to --
- 19 to -- I would assume it would be to Mr. Matthews,
- 20 how -- how does the public -- as we know in past
- 21 plans, we have heard the public, and in some instances
- 22 we have made adjustments and amendments.
- How are changes made, if we hear again a
- 24 good suggestion, a good idea, that could call for
- 25 change in the plan, as it is released very shortly,

- 1 how is change made to that plan, or does this
- 2 resolution limit any change, or any amendments being
- 3 made?
- 4 MR. MATTHEWS: Right.
- 5 It limits any change that is being made.
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: So that that, therefore --
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: The public still has the
- 8 right and responsibility to question, and to raise
- 9 those issues.
- 10 Mr. Roosevelt is going to have to make sure
- 11 that he gets out to community, and brings that -- and
- 12 brings the plan up, and brings the plan to them, and
- 13 presents it.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No, that is not his
- 15 question.
- MR. TAYLOR: So therefore, the resolution,
- 17 as it is stated here, no changes or amendments can be
- 18 made to this plan, neither by the Board, nor the
- 19 administration.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MR. MATTHEWS: We will vote up or down.
- MR. TAYLOR: You are saying this, he is
- 23 bringing it forward.
- MS. COLAIZZI: He is not understanding your
- 25 question.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: He is not understanding my
- 2 question?
- MR. ISLER: Hold on, Board members, please.
- 4 Mr. Taylor, you have the floor.
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Matthews, did you
- 6 understand my question?
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: I understand your question.
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: And I understood your answer.
- 9 The issues, I have -- and, of course, I
- 10 don't -- I don't support this resolution.
- And one of my issues is my concern about
- 12 public input, and clearly this resolution cuts off any
- 13 public, or Board input, into this plan.
- I'm concerned, that -- I really am not
- 15 aware -- I know, as we started our process last year,
- 16 that the Board was in retreats, and we worked to set
- 17 criterias, and beacons, and many other words that we
- 18 used to describe the criteria that we would use, to
- 19 eliminate school buildings, which is crucial that it
- 20 happens.
- I am not clear -- even though I do know
- 22 from talking to Mr. Roosevelt, that those beacons, and
- 23 criteria of the Board, worked on over the last year,
- 24 are no longer in effect.
- 25 And I'm certainly not clear exactly what is

- 1 being used, and I am sure the public is probably even
- 2 less clear about what is being used.
- 3 But I do have to -- have to hope that
- 4 everything is -- is fine, and that people are working
- 5 as hard as they can to make this plan as fair and as
- 6 equitable.
- But many things in the legislation, that
- 8 calls for this procedure, will ensure that all of the
- 9 data, analysis, comprising the plan, will be reflected
- 10 in the adopted plan.
- I don't think there is any way for us to
- 12 know that, until we see the plan.
- And I think, to blindly vote for it, is not
- 14 a wise -- is not wise governance.
- And I understand that I and Mr. Brentley
- 16 don't look too good, because what Mr. Matthews is
- 17 citing, of course, is a goal that I have talked about.
- I have been the Board member who talked
- 19 about a blue ribbon committee, that decides on the
- 20 schools, and pretty much like the military base
- 21 closing commission, and then Senate has to vote up or
- 22 down, they can't get involved in that.
- The Board opposed that.
- I am a Board member who has supported every
- 25 single school closing recommendation by this

- 1 administration, with the exception of Letsche
- 2 alternative program, because I opposed, I thought the
- 3 Board and Superintendent should have gone into the
- 4 community and explained about an alternative education
- 5 program coming into the Homewood community, though I
- 6 supported that change to that program's location.
- 7 So I don't -- I don't have to take a back
- 8 seat to anyone, when it comes to school closings.
- 9 But as we talk about the important thing
- 10 that Mr. Matthews had talked about, was perception, we
- 11 have to be clear that we have members who have stated
- 12 already their intention to support this, who talked
- 13 about the school closing -- who talked about, you
- 14 know, the legislature, and the potential of the state
- 15 taking over, and they are watching us.
- But as soon as -- I mean, as soon ago as
- 17 May of 2004, they were voting to remove schools off of
- 18 the list, and that's exactly what happened in May of
- 19 2003, three schools were removed, and then prior to
- 20 that three years ago, we had members who ran on a
- 21 platform to reopen schools, and that's exactly what
- 22 they did.
- 23 And so the perception could be, what has
- 24 been this epiphany that these people had.
- I mean, I slept a little bit, so I am not

- 1 as familiar with the story of Saul of Tarsus turning
- 2 into St. Paul, but there is people who is going to
- 3 wonder what has happened.
- 4 Because what they will think, what that
- 5 perception will be, is that they must know something,
- 6 that they are comfortable with turning over, and
- 7 passing a plan as is.
- I am not saying that that's the case.
- 9 I am saying that that could be the
- 10 perception.
- 11 And what I -- and the message that I have
- 12 been taking to my community, over what has occurred
- 13 over -- what has occurred in this Board, over the last
- 14 year, is to watch this School Board.
- The community of Homewood, watch this
- 16 School Board.
- 17 And again, I think it is our job, always,
- 18 to not to trust the administration, I said the same
- 19 thing with John Thompson, my job here is to verify, to
- 20 research the recommendations, and to make a decision,
- 21 and ultimately it is the Board's responsibility to
- 22 take a look at the plan, and to listen to the public,
- 23 and to go to the Superintendent and say, "The public
- 24 is saying, educators are saying that part B of this
- 25 plan is not workable."

- 1 And I think, that it would be -- at a time,
- 2 when we know that we have to close some schools, we
- 3 are being put in an untenable situation, where we have
- 4 to say, this part -- this part E, or part B, is bad,
- 5 but because I know schools have to close, and I have
- 6 to support doing something very bad over here, when it
- 7 is clearly -- when it is easy that we have the right
- 8 just to take out that part.
- 9 We have done that.
- 10 And this Board has agreed to do that,
- 11 whether it was a situation at Miller, where we have
- 12 heard many times, a -- school communities, and we have
- 13 listened to, when they have made some good arguments
- 14 that we haven't thought about before. That is what's
- 15 called listening to the public.
- So I can't support -- I can't support this
- 17 resolution.
- I think it's a dereliction of my duties.
- I think that it is cutting off debate from
- 20 the public, and most importantly, I think that it is
- 21 important, that -- well, I have said about all that I
- 22 can say on this issue.
- MR. MATTHEWS: All right. May I make a
- 24 comment?
- MR. ISLER: Yes, please, Mr. Matthews.

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: And I don't want to debate
- 2 Mr. Taylor.
- But, there is something he said that is
- 4 wrong, and that is the fact that this does not
- 5 preclude public comment, public input.
- 6 The public can still come, and they can
- 7 listen to the plan. Mr. Roosevelt has got to sell the
- 8 plan to them as well, and if it does not make sense, a
- 9 Board member can vote it down.
- 10 You don't have to vote for it.
- But if you pull one -- if you pull one
- 12 school off, because you may be getting pressure in
- 13 your community, or you just don't like this plan, it
- 14 will have -- as Mr. Romaniello said, it will have a
- 15 domino effect on the other issues.
- And so if you pull one off, pull them all
- 17 off.
- And so that's the only thing I am saying,
- 19 there is nothing wrong, there is nothing to say public
- 20 input is not welcome.
- We want the public to have input. We want
- 22 their input.
- We want them to come and say how they feel
- 24 about the plan.
- We want Board members to say you how they

- 1 feel about the plan.
- 2 And if, in your gut, you do not believe
- 3 that this is a valid plan, then vote it down.
- 4 So, I just wanted to clear the
- 5 misperception that Mr. Taylor said, and that the
- 6 public will not have an opportunity to comment, and to
- 7 have the input, because they will.
- We have listened to the public, they have
- 9 handled meetings around the community, talking with
- 10 the public, in different community groups.
- 11 And so, what I am saying, the only thing
- 12 that this resolution says, is that when all of these
- 13 things have taken place, once this plan comes up,
- 14 after we hear the public comments, and everything, we
- 15 have a choice, either vote it up or vote it down.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Matthews, I want to thank
- 17 you for the clarification of the public hearing.
- As is mentioned in this new business item,
- 19 we are governed by the School Code of Pennsylvania, we
- 20 must offer public comments, and as we have done in the
- 21 past, we will offer public comments, as long as it
- 22 takes this Board to hear from the public, we will sit
- 23 as a Board to hear the public comment.
- This precludes nothing.
- We are governed by law, in terms of how we

- 1 close schools.
- 2 And we must offer public comment.
- 3 MR. TAYLOR: May I?
- 4 MR. ISLER: May we hold on.
- 5 There are other people who would like to be
- 6 recognized.
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: I wonder if I could amend --
- 8 MR. ISLER: There were other people who
- 9 would like to be recognized.
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: -- his motion.
- MR. ISLER: Dr. Dowd, you did have your
- 12 hand up.
- 13 MR. DOWD: I just wanted to make a couple
- 14 of quick comments.
- Mr. Brentley, you had said that this is
- 16 sort of an emasculation of Board members, it is taking
- 17 away a Board member power, and I just want to remind
- 18 you that this is in no way taking away of any power.
- 19 Our responsibility as Board members is not,
- 20 we are not responsible for protecting particular
- 21 schools.
- We are not responsible for guaranteeing
- 23 that certain schools stay open.
- In fact, quite to the contrary, our
- 25 responsibilities, as Board members, are to ensure that

- 1 we deliver, that the District delivers the best
- 2 possible education service, to all students.
- The only way we can do that, is if we start
- 4 to think about this District as a whole.
- 5 And so this is in no way taking away
- 6 authority.
- We still have to cast a vote, the
- 8 Superintendent and administration must craft a plan,
- 9 the plan that they craft must be acceptable, and we
- 10 will then have to cast a vote.
- It is in no way taking away authority.
- 12 It is not a dereliction of our duty,
- 13 Mr. Taylor, to say we will cast this vote in an up or
- 14 down fashion. Quite to the contrary.
- And in fact it is most consistent with the
- 16 contract that we have created for the Superintendent.
- 17 Our responsibility, as Board members, is to set
- 18 policy.
- One of those policies that we clearly set
- 20 in the contract for the new Superintendent, was to
- 21 close schools, to right size this District as far as
- 22 facilities were concerned.
- 23 We are not -- we are not managers. I would
- 24 like to remind us that we are not managers.
- Our responsibility was to set that policy.

- 1 We are in no way responsible for determining how
- 2 schools should be closed, which schools should be
- 3 closed, which programs should be created, which
- 4 programs should be closed.
- 5 That is the responsibility of the
- 6 administration.
- We have no knowledge in that area.
- We only know that we must close schools.
- 9 It is the Superintendent's and
- 10 administration's responsibility to do that.
- And I think, as Mr. Matthews has pointed
- 12 out so aptly in this resolution, we must simply hold
- 13 the Superintendent and administration accountable.
- If this plan is acceptable, we must vote
- 15 for it. If it is unacceptable, we must not, and we
- 16 must hold the Superintendent accountable. It is that
- 17 simple.
- There should be no micromanagement of the
- 19 Board. And that is exactly what you and Mr. Brentley
- 20 are proposing; that the Board get its hands into this
- 21 plan, micromanage, based on its own particular
- 22 segments of the District, and I think that is the way
- 23 of the past. That was before.
- And this is, as we have said many times, a
- 25 new day, this is an age of accountability, this is an

- 1 age of going forward, and thinking of this District as
- 2 a whole.
- 3 So I urge you to reconsider your
- 4 statements, and to vote for this resolution.
- 5 MR. ISLER: Mr. Romaniello.
- 6 MR. ROMANIELLO: I guess it is more in the
- 7 form of a question, but I think I know the answer.
- 8 The way this will go down, is that
- 9 Mr. Roosevelt will present the plan, then we will have
- 10 public hearing, and we will have input from the Board.
- 11 The day that he presents his plan, is not
- 12 the resolution, it is not the day we will vote on it.
- MR. DOWD: That's right.
- 14 MR. ROMANIELLO: So once Mr. Roosevelt
- 15 presents his plan, then we get the public input, we
- 16 get input from the Board, and if there is maybe
- 17 something that needs to be changed, there is time to
- 18 change it, before it is brought before this Board.
- So, the day that he proposes it, is not the
- 20 day that we will vote on it.
- So, that's why I'm in favor of this,
- 22 because of the public input, because of our input, and
- 23 then if there is anything that needs to be changed,
- 24 there is time for it to be changed.
- We will not be voting on it. It is

- 1 impossible to vote on it on the day that he presents
- 2 the plan, because we are not in session that day.
- 3 So the only time we can vote on this, is
- 4 when we have fulfilled our legal requirements of
- 5 public input, and then when we have our legislative
- 6 meeting.
- 7 That is the only time we can vote on it.
- 8 So we have time for the input, we have time
- 9 for changes, I think we are being -- we are worried
- 10 about something that isn't going to happen.
- It is not going to be voted on the date it
- 12 is presented.
- So there will be time, so that's why I am
- 14 very comfortable in voting for this resolution.
- MR. ISLER: If we could just have one
- 16 conversation, and hold on a second, because you are
- 17 not being recognized.
- 18 Again, Mr. Romaniello, there is a 90 day,
- 19 three month period by the School Code. We are
- 20 governed by the School Code.
- We must present a plan to the public, and
- 22 then there is a period of time, which is 90 days,
- 23 three months, before we can vote on it.
- So, you are correct. There is no way this
- 25 can be voted on, without following the law.

- 1 Hold on.
- 2 Mr. Weiss, do you want to clarify
- 3 anything?
- 4 MR. WEISS: Well, it is three months after
- 5 the public hearing.
- 6 So whenever the public hearing is
- 7 scheduled, the Board vote can be no sooner than three
- 8 months after that.
- 9 MR. ROMANIELLO: So it can't be the day
- 10 that Mr. Roosevelt presents it.
- 11 MR. ISLER: It cannot be, you just heard,
- 12 you are governed by law.
- MR. ROMANIELLO: That's what I am trying to
- 14 get across.
- So we are worrying about something that
- 16 isn't going to happen.
- 17 MR. ISLER: Okay.
- 18 Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: My point of order is,
- 20 Mr. Romaniello made reference again that changes could
- 21 be made, and Mr. Matthews should not your resolution
- 22 in the last sentence, "Further, the Board shall not
- 23 consider" -- shouldn't it be amended to say, "Further,
- 24 the Board shall not consider any motion by the Board,
- 25 Superintendent or administration to amend the plan,

- 1 and it shall be voted on the motion in the manner set
- 2 forth in the paragraph 1 of this resolution"?
- 3 You made it very clear, that in your
- 4 thinking, there can be no changes to this plan once it
- 5 is presented publicly, by the Superintendent.
- Is Mr. Matthews still there?
- 7 MR. MATTHEWS: Are you asking that to me?
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 9 I mean, you made it clear, I understood it
- 10 very clear.
- MR. MATTHEWS: (Inaudible.)
- MR. TAYLOR: So I am saying, do you have a
- 13 problem with amending your resolution, and on sentence
- 14 No. 3, in the last paragraph, do you have a problem
- 15 with amending it to say, "Further, THE Board should
- 16 not consider any motion to amend by the Board" -- "to
- 17 amend the plan by the Board, Superintendent or
- 18 administration, and it shall vote on the motion in the
- 19 manner set forth in paragraph 1 of this resolution,"
- 20 which is locking this Board in to no changes
- 21 whatsoever.
- MS. COLAIZZI: On the floor.
- MR. TAYLOR: No changes whatsoever. No
- 24 recommendation --
- MR. ISLER: You asked for a point of order.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- 2 MR. ISLER: If we may.
- MR. TAYLOR: I am asking Mr. Matthews, I
- 4 want to go --
- 5 MR. ISLER: Okay. But hold on, I want to
- 6 go back to Mr. Weiss.
- 7 Mr. Weiss, the way this reads, "Further,
- 8 the Board shall not consider any motion," that means
- 9 the Board, it does not preclude the administration, if
- 10 something comes to light during this public comment
- 11 period; correct?
- MR. WEISS: What it means is, the plan that
- 13 is presented to the Board for a vote, three months
- 14 following the public hearing, cannot be amended by the
- 15 Board.
- 16 That's what it means.
- 17 MR. TAYLOR: We know that.
- But again, Mr. Isler, you are setting up
- 19 straw men. That is not what Mr. Matthews said.
- 20 He said he expects it to be no changes
- 21 made.
- I feel that this resolution, which is by
- 23 him, should reflect his thinking, not yours.
- MR. ISLER: I am not --
- MR. TAYLOR: And his thinking -- and that's

- 1 why I asked Mr. Matthews, does he have a problem with
- 2 amending that to make sure that it is clear, that once
- 3 this -- that the plan that is released in early
- 4 November, is the final plan, no changes can be made.
- 5 Because -- I mean, because -- I mean, we
- 6 are talking about perceptions.
- 7 Can people maybe have a perception, that
- 8 there is horse trading between the Board members and
- 9 administration?
- 10 So therefore, it should be one plan, and
- 11 I -- Mr. Matthews said that very clearly. People
- 12 don't seem to want to hear it.
- That's the reason I am asking him to amend
- 14 his resolution, which I am not going to second or
- 15 support, and I am not going to add into that language,
- 16 because I didn't bring this forth, but I am only
- 17 asking Mr. Matthews to further define this, and to
- 18 further constrict this resolution to make sure that
- 19 there is no room for the politics and the horse
- 20 trading that has been alluded to.
- 21 And I think that is best done by making
- 22 sure that it is clear that no changes can be made to
- 23 this plan after it is presented to the public.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, I guess I am not
- 25 following what you are saying, because I thought -- to

- 1 me it reads exactly what I wanted to say.
- MR. TAYLOR: Well, there is some confusion
- 3 here.
- 4 And I don't --
- 5 MR. MATTHEWS: There is no --
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: Yes, there are, because
- 7 Mr. Romaniello just made a reference to changes can be
- 8 made, and Mrs. Colaizzi was a bit surprised when you
- 9 had said that no changes could be made by the
- 10 Superintendent, or Board.
- And I just think maybe that you can make
- 12 the language far more clear, not only to this Board,
- 13 but to the public, that you do not expect any changes
- 14 to be made whatsoever, from -- to deviate from the
- 15 plan that is put forward by the administration in
- 16 early next month.
- 17 Mr. Matthews?
- MR. MATTHEWS: Well, I guess, if Dan wanted
- 19 to say it, and if you want to propose an amendment,
- 20 Randall go ahead and do it. I just say, it says what
- 21 I wanted to say.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay. Then I will add that.
- I mean, that's he a bit unorthodox, but I
- 25 think it is important that I do put the Board in a

- 1 position where they are being truly, and completely
- 2 straight up with the public, and if the idea, that
- 3 Mr. Matthews has stated very clearly, is that there
- 4 cannot be any changes to the original plan, then I
- 5 think I should make a motion to add that language that
- 6 we -- that further, the Board shall not consider any
- 7 motion to amend the plan, by -- I mean, Mr. Weiss,
- 8 maybe you can help me to word this better, maybe where
- 9 it should be worded at, but basically, what I am
- 10 trying to say, and that's why I looked in on line 3,
- 11 that the Board should not consider any motion by a
- 12 Board member, Superintendent, or staff, or
- 13 administration, to amend the plan, and it shall vote
- 14 on the motion in the manner set forth, which is an up
- 15 and down one.
- MR. WEISS: The Superintendent doesn't make
- 17 a motion.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- What I am trying to get to is to make it
- 20 very clear, that there can be no changes made in the
- 21 plan that is delivered on -- because --
- MR. DOWD: Yes.
- MR. TAYLOR: Because if there is opening to
- 24 make changes, that means, again, that a Board member
- 25 can horse trade with the administration.

- We are trying to end it. Because we are
- 2 not talking about anybody doing horse trading, we are
- 3 talking about perceptions.
- Because as I said before in the past, the
- 5 Board votes to change schools, we are not horse
- 6 trading, there was a change in the Board, majority,
- 7 and different things that happened.
- 8 So, but we want to deal with the
- 9 perceptions.
- 10 And so I think that any changes that are
- 11 made, would give the perception of potentially
- 12 politics are being played.
- And are we saying there is no such thing as
- 14 politics between a Board member and a Superintendent?
- 15 And I am not saying that there is between, but I am
- 16 just saying we are talking about perceptions.
- 17 Right?
- So clearly, no Board member who supports
- 19 this, should have a problem with saying that the plan
- 20 that is released in early November, is etched in
- 21 stone, either you vote it up all the way, or you vote
- 22 it down all the way.
- MR. ISLER: All right.
- MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Weiss, do you
- 25 understand --

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MR. WEISS: Well, I mean --

- 3 made in those three months, from November 9th --

- 5 That's not what this ways, Randall.
- 6 MR. MATTHEWS: But that's what Mr. Matthews
- 7 has said.
- 8 MR. WEISS: I am not speaking for
- 9 Mr. Matthews.
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- MR. WEISS: Let Mr. Matthews --
- MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Matthews, just say again,
- 13 that is not what you are saying, that you don't intend
- 14 for this to lock in on November 9th, that you are not
- 15 saying that this plan is supposed to lock in the Board
- 16 and the administration.
- MR. MATTHEWS: The Board and administration
- 18 can't make a motion, though, so I guess that's what I
- 19 am looking at, Randall.
- So I don't want -- what you are -- what I
- 21 am saying is that the plan that comes before us, is
- 22 the plan that we are going to vote up or down.
- MR. TAYLOR: With no amendments or changes
- 24 to it.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right. But that's what it

- 1 says, the Board will not consider any motion, whether
- 2 it comes from the Superintendent, or whether it comes
- 3 from each other, it doesn't matter where it comes
- 4 from, that the Board will -- the Board will not
- 5 consider any motion to amend the plan.
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: So -- so --
- 7 MR. ISLER: Can I just, Mr. Matthews, first
- 8 of all, the Superintendent has no right to make a
- 9 motion.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Exactly.
- MR. ISLER: Right. So we agree on that.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right.
- MR. ISLER: The confusion is, we are going
- 14 to have a plan presented to us shortly.
- There is a three month comment period.
- The plan we vote on, which will be sent,
- 17 given to us, as Mr. Weiss is pointing out, three
- 18 months after the public hearing.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Right.
- MR. ISLER: That is the plan.
- MR. MATTHEWS: That we will be voting on.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- So you are clear then, we are voting on the
- 24 plan that is given to us after the comment period.
- 25 Correct?

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Right. That's correct.
- 2 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 3 Are there any other questions or comments?
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: Are we all clear now?
- 5 Everybody is clear?
- 6 MR. ISLER: We are all clear, including
- 7 Mr. Matthews.
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: That the plan that is
- 9 released, there can be no change --
- MS. COLAIZZI: No, that is not --
- MR. TAYLOR: Wait a minute here.
- MR. ISLER: That is not what's being said,
- 13 Mr. Taylor, and that's what we are trying to clarify.
- I think we are in agreement.
- You have a plan that's being presented.
- You have a comment period.
- 17 You have a plan that's presented to you at
- 18 the end of the comment period. That is the vote in
- 19 the up and down.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Which can be different than
- 21 what was released November 9th.
- MR. ISLER: And the Superintendent is
- 23 nodding.
- MR. TAYLOR: And you are comfortable with
- 25 that, Mr. Matthews?

- 1 MR. MATTHEWS: Yes, I am comfortable with
- 2 it, Randall.
- MR. TAYLOR: So you understand that the
- 4 plan that is released November 9th, can be radically
- 5 different than the plan that is ultimately put
- 6 forward?
- 7 MR. ISLER: Hold on. Hold on. Dr. Dowd,
- 8 just hold on, I have you down.
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: So the question is, why pass
- 10 this this evening.
- 11 So, Mr. Matthews, I thought that the idea
- 12 of this resolution was again to make sure that there
- 13 couldn't be anything --
- 14 MR. MATTHEWS: Randall, the reason why it
- 15 is being presented now, is because the plan has not
- 16 been announced, and once the plan us announced, this
- 17 resolution doesn't do any good if you don't vote it
- 18 now, because then people will then vote on it based on
- 19 whether or not there are schools, or -- schools that
- 20 they want to take off.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- MR. MATTHEWS: So what this is saying is,
- 23 that everyone is going to the same plan.
- 24 What we have to do at the end is trust the
- 25 Superintendent and staff, and then not just trust him,

- l but hold him accountable to the results of that plan.
- 2 He is going to be held accountable.
- And you can't hold him accountable, if we
- 4 start picking apart that plan.
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- 6 But you do understand that the plan that he
- 7 releases --
- 8 MR. MATTHEWS: Randall, I understand it. I
- 9 understand.
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: -- next month, can be
- 11 radically different --
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Matthews said on a number
- 13 of occasions he understands.
- MR. TAYLOR: -- and it will be in that
- 15 (inaudible).
- MR. ISLER: Dr. Dowd.
- MR. DOWD: I will wait.
- 18 MR. ISLER: I don't think -- I'm sorry.
- MR. DOWD: I will wait.
- MR. ISLER: I believe he had his hand up
- 21 long before you did, Mr. Brentley, but go ahead.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mr. Matthews, in my earlier
- 23 comments, I just asked, I think for the last
- 24 20 minutes we have been arguing, and trying to get
- 25 some clarification on this.

- 1 Would you please, sir, for the sake of this
- 2 body, and the sake of the public, would you consider
- 3 just withdrawing this new business item, and allow us
- 4 to come together as a body, and perhaps talk about
- 5 this in executive session, and then present something
- 6 publicly, or we can talk about it in another public
- 7 forum, but at least to give us that courtesy as a
- 8 Board member.
- 9 You know, we are seeing this for the second
- 10 time, and we are here trying to make amendments, or
- 11 get clarification on the fly.
- 12 And so I am asking once again, would you
- 13 consider that, sir.
- 14 MR. MATTHEWS: Mr. Brentley, listen, I
- 15 truly appreciate what you and Randall are doing, but
- 16 what we are trying to do is try to establish a form of
- 17 governance, a good governance, and there is nothing
- 18 wrong with this plan.
- The only one who is having any issue with
- 20 the plan, is yourself and Mr. Taylor.
- 21 Everyone else understands what this
- 22 resolution is stating.
- 23 And if we did not get this plan today, you
- 24 know, I called the Board, and I have asked
- 25 Mr. Roosevelt to call the Board, to let me know about

- 1 the plan. So it is not like this is the first time we
- 2 have heard about this.
- And that was done intentionally, because I
- 4 did not want anyone thinking that we are going to try
- 5 to ram something down people's throats.
- 6 There is knowing wrong with this, it just
- 7 says that we as a body agree.
- And so the 20 minutes, or 30 minutes that
- 9 we have spent talking about this, is because
- 10 Mr. Taylor doesn't like this part, nor you.
- 11 Everyone else, while they may have some
- 12 reservation about part of it, they said they would
- 13 support it.
- Now, I am not going to say everyone, but
- 15 from the comments that I have heard, they support it.
- And it is, it is a leap of faith, but it is
- 17 a leap of faith to say we are going to turn this over,
- 18 to make sure we are going to hold people accountable
- 19 for the results now.
- 20 And that has to be done on this Board. We
- 21 have to begin to holding people accountable, and you
- 22 can't hold someone accountable if you continue to
- 23 micromanage, and continue to say, "We want this pulled
- 24 off, I want this taken off, I want this taken off."
- This is what the plan is in, and we can

- 1 either vote it up or down, and Mr. Roosevelt has to
- 2 sell this not only to the community, but to the Board
- 3 members.
- 4 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I appreciate that.
- I just want to say, too, that it's a little
- 6 unfair, and you are not the only one here this
- 7 evening, Mr. Matthews, that suggested, because someone
- 8 is asking questions, all of a sudden we have become
- 9 micromanagers.
- 10 And so I am disappointed in that
- 11 clarification.
- MR. MATTHEWS: Now, I didn't say you. I
- 13 didn't say you. I said what this will do, is allow
- 14 people to become micromanagers, if you don't vote this
- 15 up.
- What you are saying is, that it will
- 17 allow -- what we are going to be doing is
- 18 micromanaging.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Let me move on.
- 20 Thank you.
- MR. MATTHEWS: (Inaudible.)
- MR. BRENTLEY: Let me move on.
- 23 I just --
- MR. MATTHEWS: It is not identifying you,
- 25 it is not identifying anyone. It is saying that

- 1 regardless of what the past history has been, this is
- 2 the way we are going to operate.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- 4 I just want to move on.
- I do want to just clarify something that
- 6 Mr. Dowd, you made, and that is, you made a comment as
- 7 if myself, or Mr. Taylor, are only here advocating for
- 8 our small schools, and our community, and that because
- 9 your impression is that we are doing that, we are
- 10 micromanaging.
- 11 First of all, I don't think you have heard
- 12 me attempt to talk about my district, and just me, me,
- 13 me, me.
- I am trying to get clarification on this
- 15 item here.
- I am concerned about having the power to do
- 17 what I am elected to do, and I feel that this is one
- 18 of the things that can possibly take some of those
- 19 powers away from me.
- 20 Secondly, if this resolution, Mr. Dowd,
- 21 would have been in place last month, when you pulled,
- 22 without sharing it with other Board members, an item
- 23 off the table that gave preferential treatment to
- 24 Colfax School, if this would have been in place, you
- 25 would not have been permitted to do that, or if the

- 1 realignment would have been announced.
- So, when we talk about micromanaging, and
- 3 not working with staff, and undermining, and not
- 4 sharing with folks, we need to see both sides of it.
- 5 So, while you were successful in getting
- 6 that through for Mr. Isler's district; politics.
- 7 Okay?
- 8 Some of us don't have that kind of pull,
- 9 Dr. Dowd. Some of us have to wait, and use, and wait
- 10 for this realignment plan, and hope that it's fair,
- 11 and hope that it's honest.
- You guys had that kind of pull, you got
- 13 yours off the top.
- But there are other smaller communities,
- 15 that when this plan is released, and we know that it
- 16 is going to be a big one, there are some who don't
- 17 have those powerful folks in their community, and who
- 18 can get the kinds of things that they can get.
- And now that this thing is being voted on,
- 20 it may even be difficult to amend it.
- 21 And so I am only asking that you be mindful
- 22 of that before you make comments, because we are not
- 23 all micromanagers, we are not all here looking just to
- 24 fight for our own little section.
- We would like to see every school get the

- 1 same kind of treatment that you gave Colfax last
- 2 month, getting an addition, even though they are
- 3 talking about we are facing a steady decline in
- 4 student population.
- 5 So if we are going to do it right, let's do
- 6 it for all.
- 7 You are suggesting that we are only doing
- 8 it in our community.
- 9 It is almost suggesting that it is almost
- 10 the complete opposite.
- 11 You fought hard, you articulated the issues
- 12 well, you were able to get close to \$1 million
- 13 approved for architectural services for that
- 14 particular school.
- That's before his plan was released.
- So, we know that that's one school that's
- 17 going to be taken care of.
- There are communities, there are parents,
- 19 there are children sitting with their fingers crossed,
- 20 waiting for this plan, because we don't know.
- 21 Somebody knew, and so you were able to get
- 22 that for that particular school.
- 23 Please, it's important, all of us on here,
- 24 to just take care of certain communities, some of us
- 25 are here for the entire community.
