## **EXECUTIVE SESSIONS**

## Legislative Meeting of May 21, 2008

In addition to executive sessions announced at the legislative meeting of April 23, 2008, the Board met in executive session on May 12, and immediately before this legislative meeting to discuss various personnel matters that may include, but are not limited to: administrative vacancies, update on contract negotiations, travel waivers, and positions opened and closed. In addition, at the May 12 executive session, the Solicitor discussed a matter in litigation.

Finally, at the executive session immediately before this legislative meeting, the Board discussed student discipline cases that involved violations of various portions of the Code of Student Conduct.

The Board does not vote at executive sessions.

## Legislative Meeting COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION May 21, 2008

#### **DIRECTORS:**

The Committee on Education recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

## **Proposals/Grant Award**

**RESOLVED,** That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to submit proposals for grants and accept grant awards in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in subparagraph 1, inclusive.

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, That upon approval of the grant by the granting agency, the Board authorize the establishment of appropriate accounts and, where necessary to implement the grant, authorize the advancement of funds to operate the program until the grant and fees are received.

# **Proposals/Grant Award**

1. Acceptance of a grant award in the amount of \$500 from The Pittsburgh Foundation to support a scholarship for private trumpet lessons for Ben Junker, a Frick International Studies Academy Student, from Mr. Rick Murrell, 280 Bradford Road, Wexford, PA 15090.

This scholarship program is available to any Pittsburgh Public Schools student wishing to apply. The Pittsburgh Foundation announces this competition widely on an annual basis to our schools via a direct mailing to school building principals. The funding period shall run from June 1, 2008 to August 31, 2008.

## **Consultant/Contracted Services**

**RESOLVED,** That the Board authorizes its proper officers to enter into contracts with the following individuals for the services and fees set forth in subparagraphs 2 through 17B, inclusive.

2. Penn State University - That the Board of Directors approve this contract being implemented to provide four (4) Pittsburgh Westinghouse High School Science and Math students a one week residential experience in Conservation and Agricultural Science. Students will explore local wetlands, streams and fields through hands-on-activities and experiments using math and science skills to graph, chart and document their findings. Students will be housed at the Engineering Lodge located in Petersburg, PA from June 22, 2008 to June 28, 2008. Students will travel to Penn State campus using Greyhound Bus transportation. SAM Coordinator will be responsible for taking the students to bus station and remaining until their departure. Students will be met by Penn State staff upon their arrival. The Penn State staff will serve as the chaperones during the week long experience. Students will be returning to Pittsburgh using Greyhound Bus transportation where they will be met by the SAM Coordinator. Penn State recommended the return of students who attended the program last year. Students who continue to show an interest in environmental science were considered in addition to class rank, citizenship.

The operating period shall be from June 22, 2008 to June 28, 2008. Payment is a one time payment, total cost shall not exceed \$1,700 payable from account #4327-10C-1490-323.

3. Educational Based Services (EBS) — That the Board of Directors authorize the contractor to provide integrated speech and language supports and services to Early Intervention children in a variety of Pre-Kindergarten settings. Services will include: speech and language therapy; consultation with teachers, families, childcare providers and other professionals; attendance at Early Intervention staff meetings; and Transition to Kindergarten activities as appropriate.

The contractor may provide other additional educational services based upon the needs of the Early Intervention Program and will not exceed MA billing rates.

EBS had the lowest proposed hourly rate on the RFP for Speech Therapy Services.

The operating period shall be from July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009. Payment shall be at the rate of \$49 per hour, total cost shall not exceed \$725,000 payable

from account #s 5181-15J-1281-329 (\$435,000) and #5181-19H-1281-329 (\$290,000).

4. Invo HealthCare Associates, Inc. – That the Board of Directors authorize the contractor to provide integrated speech and language supports and services to Early Intervention children in a variety of Pre-Kindergarten settings. Services will include: speech and language screenings, assessments, evaluations and reevaluation services; IEP development; participation in IEP meetings; consultation with teachers, families, childcare providers and other professionals; attendance at Early Intervention staff meetings; and Transition to Kindergarten activities as appropriate.

The contractor may provide other additional educational services based upon the needs of the Early Intervention Program and will not exceed MA billing rates.

Invo HealthCare Associates, Inc. had the lowest proposed hourly rate on the RFP for providing Screening and Evaluation Services.

The operating period shall be from July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009. Payment shall be at the rate of \$58 per hour, total cost shall not exceed \$87,000 payable from account #5181-15J-1281-329.

5. Carnegie Science Center - That the Board of Directors authorize the Cool Chemistry program for grades PreK-2, Monday - Thursday at **Pittsburgh Lincoln** Summer Regional Extended Learning Camp. The Cool Chemistry program has six (6) one hour sessions at the cost of \$100.00 per session. The Science Center will provide a Junior Scientist program for the children during the last two days of the program at \$100.00 per session. The total cost for the Primary grades (Pre-K -2) for both weeks of summer camp will be \$1,600.00. The hours of operation will be from 12 p.m. until 3:00 p.m. Program will start July 7, 2008 and end July 17, 2008.

Provide the Focus Chemistry program for grades 3-5, Monday - Thursday. The program has six (6) one hour sessions at a cost of \$100.00 per session. The Science Center will provide a Science Career Explorations program for the students during the last two days of the program. The total cost for the Intermediate grades (3-5) for both weeks of Learning Camp will be \$1,600.00. Program will start July 7 and end July 17, 2008.

Students will be given simple Chemistry lessons for each grade level to enhance their science instruction.

The operating period shall be from July 7, 2008 through July 17, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$100 per session, total cost shall not exceed \$3,200 payable from account #4148-20E-1190-599.

6. Kingsley Association - That the Board of Directors authorize payment to the Kingsley Association for the Freedom School at **Pittsburgh Lincoln** Primary Campus. The Freedom School will provide a literacy rich summer environment for five weeks (June 23 - July 25, 2008). The cost would include salary and wages for Servant Leaders, Project Directors and three artists, books, refreshments and travel for Servant Leaders. This project will service 100 students in grades K-8. Hours of operation will be from 8:00 a.m. until 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The operating period shall be from June 23, 2008 to July 25, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$15,000 every two weeks, total cost shall not exceed \$45,000 payable from account #4800-16F-1190-323.

7. Pittsburgh Center for the Arts – That the Board of Directors authorize the provision of teaching Artist Services, June 23 - July 17, 2008 at **Pittsburgh Lincoln K-8** Summer Regional Extended Learning Camp. Four (4) artist at four (4) hours per day, four (4) days per week for five (5) weeks for a total of 240 hours at \$22.00 per hour, for a total of \$5,280.00. Included in this contract is \$1,584.00 to cover Administrative costs. This contract excludes Friday, July 4, 2008.

The operating period shall be from June 23, 2008 to July 17, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$22 per hour, total cost shall not exceed \$6,864 payable from account #4148-20E-1190-599.

8. Janey Zeilinger Clark – That the Board of Directors authorize the proposal for woodworking classes at **Pittsburgh Lincoln K-8** Summer Regional Extended Learning Camp, July 21 through July 24, 2008 to enhance mathematics skills. Classes will be 60 minutes each with two classes per day from 1:00 p.m. - 2:00 p.m. for a total of eight classes. Classes are for grades 4-7 with one grade taught per day (two groups per grade level). The fee per class is \$225.00 with a maximum of 15 students. Total for eight classes is \$1,800.00. The provider will provide all materials, tools, and know-how for the children to create an original project in a safe and enriching environment.

The operating period shall be from July 21, 2008 to July 24, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$225 per class, total cost shall not exceed \$1,800 payable from account #4148-20E-1190-329.

9. Dr. Johnson Martin —This contract is part of the Heinz Endowment Grant that was approved at the March 26, 2008 Board Meeting, item #3.

That the Board of Directors enter into a contract with Dr. Johnson Martin to support the elementary Montessori training program at Pittsburgh Montessori. Dr. Johnson Martin will be involved as a consultant to work with the Pittsburgh Montessori principal, Cynthia Wallace and the Pittsburgh Montessori Coordinator, Angela Minahan, to establish a timeline for implementation and evaluation of the training. Dr. Martin will also work with Mrs. Wallace to develop a research agenda to examine the effects of this training on student achievement and discipline, teacher practices and attitudes related to teaching, learning, and instructional practices. The elementary Montessori training program will begin at Pittsburgh Montessori in August 2008 and will end in October 2008.

The operating period shall be from August 1, 2008 to October 31, 2008. Payment shall be negotiated, total cost shall not exceed \$12,500 payable from account #4000-08J-2810-329.

10. The Write Tools, LLS – That the Board of Directors authorize to support year 3 (the final year) of the comprehensive writing training to all district teachers. In the 2006-2007 school year, Write Tools training and implementation included all teachers in grades 6 through 12. In the 2007-2008 school year, training was expanded into grades K through 5. Monies, are now requested to pay for up to 36 consultants and related training materials in order to complete the Write Tools training for all elementary, special education, and Career Tech teachers; to include two full days of Write Tools training for up to 1200 participants. (Amount not to exceed 160,000.00) The training will include specific instructional methods for teaching students to write for a variety of purposes, including persuasive, descriptive, compare/contrast, summary, narrative and informative writing. The Write Tools utilizes color coding, simple organizational schemes, key vocabulary lists and direct instruction, to enable students to write clear, concise and organized paragraphs, reports and essays across the content areas. Future workshops and training will be handled internally utilizing literacy supervisors and currriculum coaches.

The operating period shall be from August 1, 2008 to July 30, 2009. Payment shall be at the rate of \$3,200 per day, total cost shall not exceed \$160,000 from account #s48C0-17F-2271-640 (\$15,000), #4800-17F-2271-610 (\$29,800) and #4800-17F-2271-324 (\$115,200).

11. Clemson University Summer Enrichment – That the Board of Directors authorize Clemson University to present and coordinate a seven (7) day summer science enrichment experience for two (2) **Pittsburgh Westinghouse** High School Science and Math Academy students. This program will include educational and

academic courses in science, computer technology and architecture design that is formulated to enhance academic skills and develop creative abilities. Students must be in the top 10% of the class, have an interest in pursuing a career in engineering, forensic science, and have demonstrated good citizenship during the school year in order to participate. Students will travel to Clemson University traveling by airplane via the Pittsburgh International Airport. SAM Coordinator will escort the students to the airport and secure their departure on the plane. Students will be met by Clemson staff upon their arrival at the airport. The Clemson staff will serve as chaperones for the students during their week long stay, from June 22, 2008 to June 28, 2008. Students will also be escorted and met on their return from Clemson to Pittsburgh by science and mathematics coordinator.

The operating period shall be from June 22, 2008 to June 28, 2008. Payment shall be a one time payment, total cost shall not exceed \$1,400 from account #4327-10C-1490-810.

12. Penn State University/Wise Program – That the Board of Directors authorize to provide three (3) Pittsburgh Westinghouse High School Science and Math Academy students with a comprehensive understanding of math and science and it's correlation to career choices that include engineering and computer science. Students have self selected to participate in this program during the summer school open enrollment period. These students are also not in need of summer school for remediation. Students selected will attend the Wise Program, a seven (7) day residential experience that will focus on math, science, project design and technology. This experience will take place at Penn State University from June 22 to June 28, 2008. Students will travel to Penn State by Greyhound Bus. The SAM Coordinator will transport the students to the station and remain until their departure. Fenn State Wise Camp officials will receive the students from the Greyhound Bus station upon arrival at State College. Penn State officials will serve as the chaperones for the entire duration of the trip. The SAM coordinator will receive the students on the return trip home by Greyhound bus transportation.

The operating period shall be from June 22, 2008 to June 28, 2008. The rate of payment is a one time payment, the total cost shall not exceed \$1,275 from account #4327-10C-1490-810.

13. University of Pittsburgh (TLI) – That the Board of Directors authorize to academically engage five (5) **Pittsburgh Westinghouse** High School Science and Math Program students in the areas of computer science, computer programming and web page designing during a six (6) week summer enrichment program from June 23, 2008 to July 31, 2008 at the University of Pittsburgh Technology Center in Oakland. Students have self selected to participate in this

program during the summer school open enrollment period. These students are not in need of summer school for remediation.

The operating period shall be from June 23, 2008 to July 31, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$250 per 6 weeks, total cost shall not exceed \$250 from account #4327-10C-1490-810.

14. Dr. Gwendolyn-Perry Burney – That the Board of Directors authorize California University of PA to present and coordinate a three (3) day, two (2) night scientific research summer experience for fifteen (15) **Pittsburgh Westinghouse** High School Science and Math Academy students during the week of June 16, 2008 - June 18, 2008. The Science and Math Academy coordinator will travel with students and assist in the instructional activities in the area of Scientific Research. Accommodations for students and coordinator will be at the California University main campus, and will be provided by the University at no cost to the Pittsburgh Public Schools District.

15. Duquesne University Forensic Science – That the Board of Directors authorize Duquesne University to facilitate a three (3) day workshop including lectures and hands-on-activities in Forensic Science and Forensic Law. Five (5) **Pittsburgh Westinghouse** High School Science and Math Academy students who are entering into the 11th and 12th grades will participate in this summer enrichment experience at Duquesne University main campus from July 28th, 2008 - July 30th, 2008 from 9:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. daily. Students will meet daily at Pittsburgh Westinghouse High School and be transported to Duquesne University by the SAM Coordinator. Students will be given bus tickets for their commute home.

The operating period shall be from July 28, 2008 to July 30, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$400 per 3 days, total cost shall not exceed \$400 payable from account #4327-10C-1490-810.

16. Joe Leinbach – That the Board of Directors enter into a contract from May 26, 2008 through June 30, 2008, with Joe Leinbach to co-facilitate along with Mayada Mansour in 1) designing and developing a presentation of the Excel.9-12 Year 2 comprehensive implementation plan and 2) collecting and converting feedback data into usable knowledge that enables further analysis of the plan.

The operating period shall be from May 26, 2008 to June 30, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$150 per day up to 20 days, total cost shall not exceed \$3,000 payable from account #1600-04H-2810-329.

17. Mayada Mansour – That the Board of Directors enter into a contract from May 26, 2008 through June 30, 2008, with Mayada Mansour to co-facilitate along with Joe Leinbach in 1) designing and developing a presentation of the Excel.9-12 Year 2 comprehensive implementation plan and 2) collecting and converting feedback data into usable knowledge that enables further analysis of the plan.

The operating period shall be from May 26, 2008 to June 30, 2008. Payment shall be at the rate of \$150 per day up to 20 days, total cost shall not exceed \$3,000 payable from account #1600-04H-2810-329.

17A. J. Kaye Cupples – That the Board of Directors authorize the expert and technical assistance to be provided to the Office of Support Services during a transition period in department leadership in order to facilitate the multi-faceted operations within this office as governed by district, state, and federal policies and procedures. Dr. Cupples will work up to 20 8-hour days between June 30, 2008 and June 30, 2009.

The operating period shall be from June 30, 2008 to June 30, 2009. Payment shall be at the rate of \$551.19 per day, total cost shall not exceed \$11,023.80 payable from account #4810-010-2110-330.

17B. Darnell Grisham/Werm's Eye View - That the Board of Directors authorze to provide four (4) Videographers to videotape student activities at individual Pittsburgh Fublic Schools in the four regions of the City for the Tenth Annual "Take a Father to School Day" on Friday, May 23, 2008.

The operating period shall be from May 23, 2008 to May 30, 2008. Payment shall be a one time payment, total cost shall not exceed \$3,725 from account #001-010-2310-330.

18. Idlewild Amusement Park/Sun Coach Lines – That the Board of Directors authorize the Policy Council of the Early Childhood Program to hold its end-of year activity at Idlewild Amusement Park, Attn.: Group Sales, P.O. Box C, Ligonier, PA 15658, on Sunday, July 13, 2008. Approximately 150 individuals

consisting of Policy Council members and their families will participate in this event. Payment includes: FunDay Passes – \$16.50 per person (\$2,475); FunMoney - \$20 per person (\$3,000); Meal Tickets - \$12 per person (\$1,800). ALSO RESOLVED, That the Board authorize payment to Sun Coach, 415 Rebecca Street, McKeesport, PA 15132, to charter up to two (2) buses to transport individuals to Idlewild. Each bus will cost \$700.00. The cost is not to exceed \$1,400.00.

The total cost shall not exeed \$8,675 payable from account #s 4802-19F-1800-519 (\$1,400), #4802-19F-1800-599 (\$5,475) and #4802-19F-1800-635 (\$1,800).

19. Pittsburgh Marriott City Center – That the Board of Directors authorize the Early Childhood Program to conduct its 25th Annual Head Start Volunteer Recognition Day Program. All costs associated with this event include: banquet room, with amenities (non-refundable deposit of \$500 required to reserve space prior to event), catered meal for up to 250 participants at \$31 per person (gratuity fee/service charge of up to 20%). 20. Summer Kick-Off Program - That the Board of Directors authorize payment for a Summer Kick-Off program sponsored by the Early Childhood Male/Fatherhood Involvement Committee. This event will give fathers/significant males the opportunity to participate in a full day of educational and healthy fun activities with their pre-school child. Activities will focus on strengthening their gross motor skills, age appropriate physical activities, eye-hand coordination and cognitive skills. The event will be held on Saturday, June 14, 2008 at Pittsburgh King ALA. The costs associated with this event include food/refreshments, children's performers, DJ, and a tote bag filled with educational activities for the children.

Various Summer Camps – That the Board of Directors authorize payment to the schools and/or organizations listed for providing mandated Extended School Year (ESY) services for students with disabilities. The ESY experience for each child is determined by the specific criteria mandated by IDEA and defined in the IEP. Camp dates are between June 16, 2008 and August 19, 2008.

The total cost shall not exceed \$250,000 payable from account #5231-11J-1231-323.

22. Kathleen Laciner – That the Board of Directors authorize payment for a student at Pressley Ridge who qualifies for Extended School Year. The Program for Students with Exceptionalities is offering 20 hours of private tutoring in the area of reading for the summer of 2008. The following tutor will need to be paid \$45 an hour not to exceed \$900. She is a lead teacher for Duquesne University's Reading Clinic. The tutoring will be completed between July 1, 2008 and Auugust 29, 2008. This is a compensatory education settlement agreement.

The total cost shall not exceed \$900 payable from account #5231-292-1231-329.

23. Summer Professional Development Food – That the Board of Driectors authorize as per the requirement in the Pennsylvania Department of Education/Pittsburgh Public Schools Inclusion Practices Project Mini Grant, lunch will be provided at Professional Development's sessions to be conducted from June 17, 2008 through June 19, 2008 at Greenway Professional Develoment Center. The goal of this professional development is to offer teachers, paraprofessionals, parents, and administrators the opportunity to attend a professional conference locally which features nationally known speakers on a wide variety of topics. Teachers and paraeducators have the opportunity to learn from nationally known experts in the field of education. The primary focus of the professional development is to offer strategies to support students with disabilities and students at risk of failure to participate more fully in their school environments. The total cost of this action will not exceed \$2,642: Panera Bread \$1,658 (100 participants at \$8.29 per meal on June 17 and June 19.), Giant Eagle \$900 (100 participants at \$9.00 per meal on June 18.) and Giant Eagle \$84.00 (\$6.00 per case of water for 14 cases of water).

The total cost shall not exceed \$2,642 payable from account #5501-04G-2271-635.

24. Summer Professional Development Speakers – That the Board of Directors authorize as per the requirement of the Pennsylvania Department of Education/Pittsburgh Public Schools Inclusion Practice Grant, speakers will present at professional development sessions to be conducted from June 17, 2008 through June 19, 2008 at Greenway Professional Develoment Center. The goal of this professional development is to offer teachers, paraprofessionals, parents, and administrators the opportunity to attend a professional conference locally which features nationally known speakers on a wide variety of topics. Teachers and paraeducators have the opportunity to learn from these known experts in the field of education. The primary focus of this professional development to offer strategies to support students with disabilities and students at risk of failure to participate more fully in their school environments.

The total cost shall not exceed \$7,100 payable from account #5501-04G-2271-324.

25. Additional Work – That the Board of Directors approve additional work at workshop rate for 4 Speech/Language Clinicians to work no more than 50 hours each evaluating 400 students transitioning from Early Intervention to determine whether or not Speech/Language services need to be delivered in 2008-2009 school-age programs.

The total cost shall not exceed \$4,664 payable from account #5125-11J-1225-124.

26. Pittsburgh-Mt. Oliver Intermediate Unit – That the Board of Directors authorize as per requirement of IDEA 611, authorization for payment to the Pittsburgh-Mt. Oliver Intermediate Unit for parentally placed children with disablitilites attending private schools. These schools are entiled a proportional calculation of federal funds as required by IDEA 611. There are 76 students (61 in city parochial schools and 15 in city private schools) for a total of 1.07%. The total of this action is \$90,560.28 -1.07% of the \$8,460,237 IDEA 611 allocation.

The total cost shall not exceed \$90,560.28 payable from account #5500-13G-1231-323.

27. Pittsburgh Lincoln Summer School – That the Board of Directors authorize funds for payment to one (1) secretary, (1) parent engagement specialist, two (2) para

professionals, one (1) Robotics teacher and ten (10) tutors to conduct an extended year summer program for students at **Pittsburgh Lincoln Elementary** Primary Campus.

One (1) secretary will work at the primary campus extended summer program to prepare payrolls, order materials and interact with the public during the ten (10) days of extended Pittsburgh Lincoln summer program, and shall be compensated for 10 days each at per diem rates not to exceed \$3,600 from account #4148-16F- 1190-157. These days are requested to cover the ten (10) additional days of summer school open to Pittsburgh Lincoln.

The total cost shall not exceed \$36,000 payable from account #s 4148-16F-1190-197 (\$12,000), #4148-16F-1190-157 (\$3,600), #4148-16F-1190-187 (\$15,600) and #4148-16F-1190-124 (\$4,800).

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education accept a donation of \$ 250.00 from Neville Chemical to support the C.I.T.Y Connections activity for graduating students. This activity will take place on June 4, 2008 at the Vietnam Veterans Pavilion in Schenley Park.

## 49. <u>Technology Experienced Teacher/CAPA</u>

RESOLVED. That the Board of Education pay for one qualified technology experienced teacher at the per diem workshop rate to provide fulltime assistance to The Office of Information & Technology, beginning June 23, 2008 through September 2, 2008. The purpose is to assist staff with configuration and installation services on computer equipment being replaced at CAPA. This teacher will additionally provide the needed dedicated resource to work with the vendor managing the project on-site.

The total shall not exceed \$10,000 payable from account #5000-010-2240-168.

## 50. Elementary Functions

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education approve the adoption of an Elementary Functions text and supporting program materials. The text Pre-calculus: Graphical, Numerical, and Algebraic by Demana, Waits, Foley, and Kennedy published by Pearson Prentice Hall offers a rigorous learning experience. Previous editions of this text have been used for many years in the district and the series has proven to be successful in preparing students for studies in other advanced mathematics courses such as Calculus and AP Calculus. This text was selected over other texts considered due to its rich variety of tasks, which include writings, extensions, and explorations. Additional factors contributing to the selection include its clear focus on functions and their properties, the logical approach to trigonometry, and the foreshadowing of calculus concepts.

The total cost shall not exceed \$73,000 payable from account #4000-010-1100-640.

## 51. Schenley Credit Recovery School Security

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education hire one School Security for **Pittsburgh Schenley** High School to monitor and secure the safety of Pittsburgh Schenley students attending the Credit Recovery program from June 16th to June 28, 2008, at Pittsburgh Schenley High School.

The total cost shall not exceed \$3,040 payable from account #4322-20E-1190-188.

## 52. Robotics Academy Partnership

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education enter into a partnership with the Carnegie Mellon University Robotics Academy for the purposes of enhancing the Robotics Technology magnet at Pittsburgh Peabody starting in the 2008-09 school year.

The growing robotics industry in Pittsburgh makes **Pittsburgh Peabody** an ideal place for this curriculum to be implemented in our district—and will focus on the much needed area of technically sound graduates. The Academy will provide materials and curriculum to enhance the existing program, as well as the professional development of the teachers in the program. Robotics Academy curriculum can be found in over 8,000 schools internationally. This partnership will result in the implementation of several robotics certification courses, four college in high school courses and the alignment of the program with the state mandated CTE hour and programmatic requirements.

The Academy will also assist in promoting the program throughout the city and will provide assistance in the creation of materials for this promotion. They will work with John Vater, principal at Pittsburgh Peabody, the Robotics Technology magnet teachers as well as the already established partners with Pittsburgh Peabody.

## 52A. District Calendar 2008-2009

RESOSLVED, That the Board of Education amend the district calendar for the 2008-2009 school year to accommodate two additional 3-hour in-service days. The Fall in-service would be the afternoon of Wednesday, October 8, 2008, the day preceding Yom Kippur, a scheduled vacation day. The spring in-service would be the afternoon of Friday, April 3, 2009, the day preceding Spring break. Students will be served lunch prior to release.

These dates were chosen in the interest of families who may wish to use this additional release time from school to tie in with the school vacation day(s) following when making alternate child care arrangements and vacation plans. The scheduled release time for students would be 3 hours prior to regularly scheduled dismissal time each of these two dates, which would balance out against the additional 32 hours of time provided to the district by our agreement with teachers and other professionals as ratified January 25, 2008. This action is requested as a means to support teachers to effectively implement the core academic initiatives of the district through additional training on student data analysis, studying student work, and working with curriculum coaches and principals. This action will facilitate implementation of core academic initiatives at the classroom level.

## 53. Student Suspensions, Transfers and Expulsions

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh accept the following report on student suspensions, transfers, and expulsions.

- a. 92 students suspended for four (4) to ten (10) days;

#### B. CONSULTANTS/CONTRACTED SERVICE

1. **RESOLVED,** that the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh be authorized to enter into a contract with Automatic Data Processing, Inc. to automatically deduct funds from a checking or savings account for monthly health insurance premium payments from retiree bank accounts. This ensures timely collection of premium payments in a cost effective manner. The premiums collected by this firm are directly wired into a School District bank account within 48 hours of collection. Monthly notification statements are produced and sent to each retiree indicating the amount deducted form their bank account.

The operating period shall be from July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009. Total contract amount shall not exceed \$3,000 from account line 2600-010-2832-330.

2. RESCLVED, that the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh be authorized to enter into a contract with Ms. Michelle Galterio to develop a comprehensive graphic standards guide and procedures to help all schools and departments of the District, as well as all external organizations that are approved users of the District's logotypes and colors, to present a consistent District image inside as well as outside the District. To achieve this work, consultants will review a sampling of materials from schools and the District for the past year. Work will include discussions with school-based and central office staff.

This guide will include how to use the District's logo family (PPS logo, Excellence for All, 9th Grade Nation, Pittsburgh Promise), type style recommendations and guidelines, color palette guidelines, 4-6 common design templates, and production procedures and printing specifications to follow when developing or designing any printed, published, or visual materials which convey the image of the District. Production procedures and printing specifications will help staff facilitate conversations with graphic designers and printers to ensure consistent graphic and printing results. All information will be available on the District's website.

The operating period shall be from May 22, 2008 to December 31, 2008. The total cost shall not exceed \$13,600 from account line 1500-010-2823-330.

#### C. GENERAL AUTHORIZATIONS

1. RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize to amend existing Contract No. OB6169 with L. Robert Kimball and Associates, Frick Building – North Mezzanine, for professional architectural and engineering services for the design and construction of the addition and renovations to Pittsburgh Concord K-5. This amendment will address compensation for additional services, the development of alternate designs and estimating for the widening of Edgar Street (as mutually agreed between City Planning, the City of Pittsburgh, the Community, and the District), additional Community, Planning, Zoning and HRC presentations, development of alternate building and site designs to accommodate off-site parking and local traffic and Community concerns, and for the expansion of the existing kitchen and servery to accommodate menu and service upgrades per Food Services.

With the exception of the kitchen expansion, these additional services were required to satisfy the community and the City of Pittsburgh's requests, and added requirements for zoning approval.

The total fee shall be increased from \$1,429,125 to \$1,811,672 with Basic Fee increasing from \$1,271,385 to \$1,628,932 and Reimbursable Expenses raised from \$157,740 to \$182,740. The operating period shall be extended to December 31, 2010. This is the 3<sup>rd</sup> amendment to the original contract.

2. **RESOLVED,** that the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize to submit Part F, Attachment C PlanCon, to the State Department of Education for addition and renovation of **Pittsburgh Carmalt**.

Services are not limited to, but include daily monitoring, construction coordination, review of construction documents, schedules, quality of construction, contractor requisitions, change orders, site safety and related services as may be required to complete project on schedule. The initial fee shall be based on the consultant's hourly rates submitted. The operating period shall be from November 15, 2007 through December 31, 2009. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$250,000 from account line 6300-357-4400-330.

#### Reason for Amendment:

After negotiations an agreement in partnership between Chronicle Consulting, LLC and URS Corp., for this project has not been resolved.

5. **RESOLVED,** that the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh be authorized to enter into an agreement between the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police and the School District of Pittsburgh.

The Safe Schools Act and the companion School Code provision requires such an agreement with the local police department. It is a subject of an audit exception by the Auditor General if we don't have one. The District Attorney's Office convened several meetings with the District officials including the school safety chief, Mr. Fellers, and the City Police officials. His office is very interested in promoting school safety and he has asked to receive a copy of the agreement

(which is more or less a standard form conformed for Pittsburgh's unique structure).

This process would require two 45 day deadlines: the first to submit all required information to the financing institution, and 45 days to obtain a financing commitment and for the financing institution to complete their approval process.

RESOLVED FINALLY, that the extension periods for the two 45 day periods (starting May 22) are July 7, 2008 and August 21, 2008. Failure to meet either of the two 45 day deadlines will result in the District retaining the 10% hand money from the transaction because of the failure to meet the closing deadline.

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BY AND BETWEEN

#### CITY OF PITTSBURGH BUREAU OF POLICE

#### AND

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT OF PITTSBURGH

#### I. JOINT STATEMENT OF CONCERN

A. Parties.

The City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police and the School District of Pittsburgh enter into and agree to adhere to the policies and procedures contained in this Memorandum of Understanding.

- B. The purpose of this Memorandum is to establish procedures to be followed when any of the following incidents occur on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on any public conveyance providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity, including but not limited to a school bus:
  - (i) Possession of a weapon;
  - (ii) Act of violence;
  - (iii) Possession, use or sale of a controlled substance or drug paraphernalia;
  - (iv) Purchase, consumption, possession or transportation of liquor or malt or brewed beverages by a minor under the age of 21 years and/or presence of a minor under the age of 21 years under the influence of alcohol and/or malt or brewed beverages;
  - (v) Gang-related activity;
  - (vi) Ethnic intimidation;
  - (vii) Harassment and stalking.
- C. It is further the purpose of this Memorandum to foster a relationship of cooperation, mutual support and sharing information and resources between the parties hereto as they work together to maintain the physical security and safety of schools in the district. In furtherance of the parties' intent to foster this working relationship, the following officer(s) is/are hereby designated as the district's law enforcement liaisons. In so making this designation, it is the understanding of the

parties that the school is thereby enabled to disclose information from a student's education records to these designated officers without limitations of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), 20 U.S.C. Section 1232g and its implementing regulations at 34 C.F.R. Section 99,1 et seg., and 22 Pa. Code Sections 12.31-12.33.

D. The parties hereto agree that in the event that an incident defined by this Memorandum occurs on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on any public conveyance, including but not limited to a school bus, providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity, primary law enforcement jurisdiction will be determined as follows:

The School District of Pittsburgh Division of School Safety is the first responder for incidents occurring on school grounds and at school sponsored events on school grounds.

The School District shall call upon the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police for assistance and for the handling of criminal complaints occurring on school grounds.

The City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police shall be the first responder for incidents occurring off of school property, including incidents occurring while a student is traveling to or from school.

#### E. Law Enforcement Priorities.

- 1. Investigate all incidents reported to have occurred on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on any public conveyance providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity. The investigation of all reported incidents shall involve as little disruption of the school environment as is practicable.
- 2. Identify those responsible for the commission of the reported incident and, where appropriate, apprehend and prosecute those individuals. Identification and apprehension procedures shall involve as little disruption of the school environment as is practicable.
- 3. Assist school entities in the prevention of acts of violence, possession of weapons, the possession, use or sale of controlled substances and drug paraphernalia, the purchase, consumption, possession or transportation of liquor or malt or brewed beverages, gang-related activities, ethnic intimidation, harassment and stalking.

#### F. School Priorities

- 1. Create safe learning environments which support each student's well-being and opportunities to reach their full potential while balancing and protecting the rights of all students within their authority.
- 2. Establish and maintain cooperative relationships with law enforcement authorities in the reporting and resolution of all acts of school violence, weapons possession, the possession, use or sale of controlled substances and drug paraphernalia, the purchase, consumption, possession or transportation of liquor or malt or brewed beverages, gang-related activities, ethnic intimidation, harassment and stalking.
- 3. Foster partnerships with law enforcement authorities for the education and guidance of students to create a school climate and knowledge base conducive to learning and personal growth.
- 4. Provide Law Enforcement authorities with floor plans of school buildings.

# G. Legal Authority

- 1. The parties to this Memorandum enter into this agreement in accordance with the provisions of the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L. 30, No. 14), as amended, 24 P.S. § 13.1301-A, et seq., requiring that by June 30, 1999, all school entities shall develop and implement a single memorandum of understanding in cooperation with each local law enforcement entity with jurisdiction over the school entity and the Pennsylvania State Police.
- 2. In so recognizing this legal authority, the parties acknowledge their respective duties pursuant to this Act and hereby agree to support and cooperate with one another in carrying out their joint and several responsibilities thereunder.

# II. INCIDENTS REQUIRING LAW ENFORCEMENT NOTIFICATION AND RESPONSE

#### A. Notification

The School District Division of School Safety shall immediately report by the most expeditious means possible to the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police the occurrence of any of the following incidents occurring on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on any public conveyance, including but not limited to a school bus, providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity:

- 1. Possession of a Weapon. As used in this Memorandum "weapon" shall include, but not be limited to, any knife, cutting instrument, cutting tool, nunchaku, firearm, shotgun, rifle, metal knuckles, billy club, blackjack, grenade, incendiary device, and any other tool, instrument or implement capable of inflicting serious bodily injury where the intent to use such tool, instrument or implement as a weapon is present. This reporting requirement does not apply to a weapon which is:
  - used, as part of a school-approved program, by an individual who is participating in the program; or
  - an unloaded weapon possessed by an individual while traversing school property for the purpose of obtaining access to public or private lands used for lawful hunting if the entry on school premises is authorized by school authorities.
- 2. Act of Violence. As used in this Memorandum "act of violence" shall mean an offense, including the attempt, solicitation or conspiracy to commit the offense, under any of the following provisions of the Pennsylvania Crimes Code, 18 Pa. C. S.:
  - a. Possession of Weapon on school property, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 912;
  - b. Criminal homicide, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 2501;
  - c. Simple assault, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 2701, if the offense would reasonably result in the expulsion of the perpetrator or if the victim requires outside medical assistance;
  - d. Aggravated assault, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 2702;
  - e. Terroristic threats, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 2706;
  - f. Rape, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3121;
  - g. Statutory sexual assault, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3122.1;
  - h. Involuntary deviate sexual intercourse, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3123;
  - i. Sexual assault, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3124.1;
  - j. Aggravated indecent assault, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3125;

- k. Indecent assault, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3126;
- l. Arson and related offenses, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3301;
- m. Robbery, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 3701;
- n. Robbery of motor vehicle, 18 Pa. CS, Section 3702.
- 3. Possession, Use or Sale of a Controlled Substance or Drug Paraphernalia
  - a. As used in this Memorandum, "controlled substance" shall include the possession, use or sale of controlled substances as defined in the Act of April 14, 1972 (Pl. No, 64) known as "The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act" (hereinafter "Drug Act") including, but not limited toy inhalants, marijuana, cocaine, crack, heroin, LSD, PCP, amphetamines, all steroids, look-a-likes, and other substances commonly known as "designer drugs."
  - b. Included in this reporting provision shall be the possession, use or sale of drug paraphernalia, as defined in the Drug Act, including, but not limited to, hypodermic needles, syringes, wrapping papers, and all other implements utilized for the purpose of ingesting or otherwise introducing controlled substances into the body.
- 4. Purchase, consumption, possession or transportation of liquor or malt or brewed beverages by a minor under the age of 21 years and/or presence of a minor under the age of 21 years under the influence of alcohol and/or malt or brewed beverages.
- 5. Gang-related activity.
- Ethnic Intimidation as defined in the Pennsylvania Crimes Code, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 2710.
- 7. Harassment and Stalking as defined in the Pennsylvania Crimes Code, 18 Pa. C.S. Section 2709.
- B. Upon notification of the incident to the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police, the School District of Pittsburgh Division of School Safety shall provide as much of the following information as is available at the time of notification. In no event shall the gathering of information unnecessarily delay notification.
  - 1. Whether the incident is in-progress or has concluded.

- 2. Nature of the incident.
- 3. Exact location of the incident
- 4. Number of persons involved in the incident.
- 5. Names and ages of the individuals involved.
- 6. Weapons, if any, involved in the incident.
- 7. Whether the weapons, if any, have been secured and, if so, the custodian of the weapons.
- 8. Injuries involved.
- 9. Whether EMS was notified.
- 10. Identity of the school contact person.
- 11. Identity of the witnesses to the incident, if any.
- 12. All other such information as is known to the school authority which can be deemed relevant to the incident wider investigation.

#### III. LAW ENFORCEMENT AUTHORITY RESPONSE

- A. Initial response by the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police, when required shall include:
  - 1. For incidents in progress:
    - a. Meet with contact person and locate scene of incident.
    - b. Stabilize incident.
    - c. Provide/arrange for emergency medical treatment, if necessary.
    - d. Control the scene of the incident:
      - (a) Secure any physical evidence at the scene
      - (b) Identify involved persons and witnesses
    - e. Conduct investigation
    - f. Exchange information

g. Confer with school officials to determine the extent of law enforcement involvement required by the situation.

## 2. Incidents not in progress:

- a. Meet with contact person.
- b. Recover any physical evidence.
- c. Conduct investigation.
- d. Exchange information.
- e. Confer with school officials to determine the extent of law enforcement involvement required by the situation.

#### 3. Incidents involving delayed reporting

- a. In the event that a reportable incident occurs on school property, at a school sponsored event, or on any public conveyance providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity after the conclusion of the school day or after the conclusion of the event at which the incident occurred, the school entity shall report the incident to the law enforcement entity immediately upon its potification.
- If each incident is initially reported to the school entity, the school entity shall proceed as outlined in paragraphs II A and B above.
- c. If the incident is initially reported to law enforcement, law enforcement shall proceed directly with its investigation and shall immediately notify the school entity of the incident, with all pertinent and reportable information, by the most expeditious means possible as if the reporting was not delayed.

#### B. Custody of Actors

- 1. Students identified as actors in reported incidents may be taken into custody at the discretion of the investigating law enforcement officer if:
  - a. the student has been placed under arrest;
  - b. the student is being placed under investigative detention;

- c. the student is being taken into custody for the protection of the student; or
- d. the student's parent or guardian consents to the release of the student to law enforcement custody.
- 2. The investigating law enforcement officer shall take all appropriate steps to protect the legal and constitutional rights of those students being taken into custody.

#### IV. ASSISTANCE OF SCHOOL ENTITIES

#### A. In Loco Parentis

- Teachers, Guidance Counselors, Vice Principals and Principals in the public schools have the right to exercise the same authority as to conduct and behavior over the pupils attending school, during the time they are in attendance, including the time required in going to and from their homes, as the parents, guardian or persons in parental relation to such pupils may exercise over them.
- 2. School authorities' ability to stand in loco parentis over children does not extend to matters beyond conduct and discipline during school, school activities, or on any public conveyance providing transportation to or from school or school sponsored activity.

#### B. Notification of Parent or Guardian

- Parents or guardians of students involved in acts of violence, possession of weapons, sexual assault, or the possession, use or sale of a controlled substance or the underage possession of alcohol or intoxication from alcohol should be notified of the involvement as soon as possible.
- In the event that a parent or guardian of a student may be a cosuspect or in the event of a situation in which immediate notification of the incident may result in the destruction of or tampering with evidence or witnesses, the school entity, in cooperation with the law enforcement authority, may decide to delay notification of parents or guardians.
- 3. School entities shall document attempts made to reach the parents or guardians of all victims, witnesses and suspects of incidents reportable to law enforcement authorities pursuant to the terms of this agreement.

4. Except in cases in which the suspect student has been injured and requires medical attention; the decision to notify a suspect's parents or guardians shall be a cooperative decision between school officials and law enforcement authorities.

# C. Scope of School Entity's Involvement

#### Victims

- a. Unless the school entity has received previous written instruction from the parent or guardian to the contrary, the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police does not need to secure parental permission to interview a victim.
- b. The school entity shall notify the parent or guardian of a victim when the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police interviews that victim. The City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police shall follow department policies and procedures when interviewing a victim to ensure the protection of the victim's legal and constitutional rights.
- c. In the event a victim is interviewed by the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police on school property, a guidance counselor or similar designated personnel shall be present during the interview.

#### 2. Witnesses

- a. Unless the school entity has received previous written instruction from the parent or guardian to the contrary, the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police does not need to secure parental permission to interview a witness to a reportable incident.
- b. The school entity shall notify the parent or guardian of a witness when the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police interviews that witness. The City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police shall follow department policies and procedures when interviewing a witness to ensure the protection of the witness's legal and constitutional rights.
- c. In the event a witness is interviewed by the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police on school property, a guidance counselor or similar designated personnel shall be present during the interview.

## 3. Suspects

- a. Depending upon the individual circumstances of the incident, a juvenile suspect may or may not be competent to waive his/her rights to consult with an interested adult and/or an attorney prior to speaking with the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police.
- b. The school entity shall cooperate with the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police to secure the permission and presence of at least one parent or guardian of a student suspect before that student is interviewed by the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police.
- c. In the event an interested adult cannot be contacted, the school entity shall defer to the policies, procedures and direction of the investigating law enforcement authority who shall act in a manner consistent with the protection of the student suspect's legal and constitutional rights.
- d. The legal conduct of interviews, interrogations, searches, seizures of property, and arrests are within the purview of the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police. The school entity shall defer to the expertise of the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Police on matters of criminal and juvenile law procedure, except as is necessary to protect an interest of the school entity.

#### 4. Conflicts of Interest

- a. The parties to this Memorandum recognize that in the event that a school entity employee, contractor, or other person acting on behalf of the school district or entity is the subject of an investigation, a conflict of interest may exist between the school entity and the adult suspect.
- b. Where the possibility of such a conflict exists, neither the individual that is the subject of the investigation nor any person acting as his/her subordinate or direct supervisor shall be present during law enforcement authority's interviews of student co-suspects, victims or witnesses.
- c. Neither the individual who is the subject of the investigation, nor his/her subordinate(s) and/or direct supervisor(s) shall be informed of the contents of the statements made by student co-suspects, victims or witnesses, except at the discretion of law enforcement authorities or as otherwise required by law.

- D. Reporting Requirements and Exchange of Information
  - 1. Law enforcement authorities shall be governed by the following reporting and information exchange guidelines:
    - a. Criminal History Record Information Act, 18 Pa. C.S. Chapter 91.
    - b. The Public School Code of 1949, 24 P.S. Section 13-1303-A(b). Law enforcement authorities shall provide to school districts the information required under the reporting guidelines set forth thereunder.
    - c. Law enforcement authorities shall not make disclosures contradictory to paragraph IV-C-4 of this Memorandum,
  - 2. School entities, including the Division of School Safety, shall be governed by and cooperate with the following reporting and information exchange guidelines:
    - a. Federal Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), 20
       U.S.C. Section 1232g and its implementing regulations at 34 C.F.R. Section 99.1 et seq., and 22 Pa. Code Sections 12.31-12.33.
    - b. Share information and evidence as required for police to complete investigation of the incident.
    - c. Comply with the requirements of the Public School Code of 1949, 24 P.S. Sections 13-1303-A and 13-1317.2.
    - d. Complete reports as required by the Public School Code of 1949, 24 P.S. Section 13-1303-A(b).

#### V. MEDIA RELATIONS

- A. Release of information
  - 1. The release of information concerning incidents reportable to law enforcement authorities pursuant to the terms of this Memorandum of Understanding shall be coordinated between law enforcement authorities and school entities.
  - 2. The parties shall release as much information as is allowable by law with due deliberation given to the investigative considerations and the need to limit disruptions to school functions and protect the privacy of the students and staff involved.

#### VI. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. This Memorandum is not intended to and does not create any contractual rights or obligations with respect to the signatory agencies or any other persons or entities.
- B. This Memorandum may be amended, expanded or modified at any time upon the written consent of the parties, but in any event must be reviewed and re-executed within two years of the date of its original execution and every two years thereafter.
- C. In the event of changes in state or federal law which necessitate changes to this Memorandum, the parties shall collaborate to amend this Memorandum to assure compliance by the parties with state and federal requirements.
- D. All parties to this Memorandum will communicate fully and openly with each other in order to resolve any problems that may arise in the fulfillment of the terms of this Memorandum.

#### 12 MONTH ROLLFORWARD

• During the 12 month period ending March 31<sup>st</sup>, total general fund balance decreased by \$9.7 million to \$125.6 million.

#### **GENERAL FUND**

- Actual revenues exceeded expenditures by \$52.1 million, which was \$2.2 million worse than expected. The results are slightly worse than not inconsistent with 2005 (\$56.5 million), 2006 (\$57.2 million) or 2007 (\$60.3 million):
  - O Revenues as a whole trailed the year to date budget by \$3.4 million. This is an important difference from earlier periods where revenues would often be a strong point on our income statement. We have every reason to believe at this point that local revenues will be under the adopted budget by December 31, as accrued. This places an even greater premium on cutting expenses.
  - Local taxes were nearly \$3 million below expectations, driven by reduced assessments on real estate and weakness in the local economy on earned income taxes;
  - o Expenditures as a whole were 1% less than the year to date budget. Retroactive payments related to settlement of the PFT Professional Contract are already reflected.
  - O The Board will recall that the District pre-paid \$2.8 million for bus passes to lock in 2007 rates for 2008 services from the Port Authority. As a result, 2008 expenditures look much higher at this point for transportation, but the trend will not hold at that level;
  - Key pressure points on budget to actual comparisons this year will include interest earnings and natural gas:
    - Short term interest rates have plummeted as the Federal Reserve Board took action to stabilize the economy. We expect year interest earnings to be significantly lower for 2008 than 2007 (and materially lower than the budget adopted in December);
    - Likewise, commodity pressures on the gas complex have kept NYMEX prices for natural gas very high. Summer months tend to be low volume months, but our best buying opportunity will likely lie prior to the cooling season and then again in the early fall prior to the winter months. Absent technical changes in the market, we would expect 2008 costs to exceed the budget.
  - No utility costs are programmed for the 2009 forecast to accommodate retention of closed, unutilized school buildings. Sale of these assets must be a 2008 priority.

- 4 MR. ISLER: The minutes are approved.
- I would like to read the statement of
- 6 executive sessions for the legislative meeting of
- 7 March -- of May 21st.
- 8 (Mr. Isler read from prepared material.)
- 9 MR. ISLER: With that, we will please turn
- 10 to the Committee Report on Education, and turn to the
- 11 last page, so that I can give you the numbers, it is
- 12 page 27 of 27, for student suspensions, transfers and
- 13 expulsion.
- 14 92 students were suspended for four to ten
- 15 days.
- Zero students were suspend for four to ten
- 17 days and transferred to another Pittsburgh Public
- 18 School.
- 19 15 students expelled out of school for
- 20 11 days or more.
- 21 And zero students were expelled out of
- 22 school for 11 days or more and transferred to another
- 23 Pittsburgh Public School.
- The Committee Report On Education has been
- 25 submitted by its chair, Mr. Sumpter.

- 1 Are there any questions or comments, only
- 2 on the Committee Report on Education?
- 3 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 5 I'd like to address the two last minute
- 6 agenda review Board tabs that we received, that
- 7 Mr. Brentley submitted to the Board at agenda review.
- I realize one of them is a retroactive
- 9 item.
- 10 What I would like to ask, if I may,
- 11 Mr. President, Mr. Brentley, did you seek funding for
- 12 this outside of the Board funds?
- 13 Have you seeked funding outside of the
- 14 Board funds for this?
- MR. BRENTLEY: No, I did not.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Then, may I suggest that we
- 17 do that, before we spend Board dollars for this.
- I mean, the Superintendent may have the
- 19 ability to find funds outside of using taxpayers'
- 20 dollars.
- 21 May I ask you to request, to see if he
- 22 possibly has the money somewhere else?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, now, I am confused,
- 24 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- Why not taxpayer dollars?

- 1 It is a function that has been going on for
- 2 ten years, encouraging men to come out and participate
- 3 in this great wonderful day.
- It is a part of the District, it is a part
- 5 of the system.
- And so it should be an item that is a
- 7 legitimate item for this District to pay and
- 8 participate in, so --
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: And I am not disputing the
- 10 program itself. That's not at all what I was doing.
- 11 What I am suggesting is because the Board's
- 12 funds are strictly used for specific items for the
- 13 Board as a whole, and not to be used in other avenues,
- 14 but more importantly, you know, we try to not use
- 15 taxpayers' dollars for just about everything.
- I mean, we have used millions of dollars of
- 17 foundation money, and state money, and all sorts of
- 18 money, to use for even our curriculum, or programs,
- 19 all kind of things, even the training of our
- 20 principals is not being used by our local funds.
- 21 But I don't know, if we can find the funds
- 22 outside of the Board office, setting precedence in
- 23 doing it in this manner is not really the avenue that
- 24 we should be taking.
- 25 At some point we are going to have to

- 1 create a policy that states what Board dollars should
- 2 and should not be used for.
- But I mean, simply asking if the funds
- 4 could be found somewhere else, I would encourage you
- 5 to do that.
- 6 I could support it, in that -- in that
- 7 sense.
- I mean, it would be a working together sort
- 9 of thing, and in the spirit of cooperation, we
- 10 could -- we could definitely try to find the funds
- 11 somewhere else.
- 12 I would encourage you to at least, you
- 13 know, ask the Superintendent at this point if there is
- 14 some funding available for this.
- MR. BRENTLEY: You know, I just have to
- 16 express any confusion again.
- 17 I'm -- to why would we do that, when this
- 18 is an item that's a legitimate item.
- This is put through the proper channels,
- 20 something that's there, that's been there for ten
- 21 years.
- There is no need for that.
- Why would you single out this event, where
- 24 we encourage men to participate, and all of a sudden
- 25 request special or additional funding.

- 1 It just makes no sense.
- It is a part of the District, it has been
- 3 submitted that way.
- And all of the questions that were raised,
- 5 I have asked -- I mean, I have answered, and more
- 6 importantly, this event is coming up Friday, I would
- 7 encourage folks to participate.
- I would not -- I mean, I would love to talk
- 9 to any and everyone for next year's Take a Father to
- 10 School Day, that's important, and I would love to make
- 11 it bigger and better, and I would talk to any and
- 12 everybody who would be interested in helping us to
- 13 raise those dollars.
- As I mentioned before, last year the cost
- 15 came out of the personal account of Mark and Sharon
- 16 Brentley, and we can't do that, we shouldn't be doing
- 17 that.
- And so I would be more than happy to talk
- 19 to any and everyone for next year's -- as a matter of
- 20 fact, for September, because we would like to kick a
- 21 day off in the beginning of the school year, that
- 22 would encourage men to come out as well.
- So, not an issue here for me.
- MS. COLAIZZI: And again, I appreciate
- 25 that, but your comment that you started out with

- 1 saying that, you know, why shouldn't these be spent
- 2 through these dollars, the Board's budget has never
- 3 been used in this manner.
- We are very clear about what the Board
- 5 dollars do, and it's not for activity in our schools,
- 6 or those sorts of things.
- 7 That money is strictly for running the
- 8 Board office.
- 9 That is what we do with that -- with that
- 10 line item --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Show me a policy --
- MS. COLAIZZI: -- of the budget.
- MR. BRENTLEY: -- Miss Colaizzi. You said
- 14 we are very clear.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I said we should have a
- 16 policy --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- MS. COLAIZZI: -- and it should be very
- 19 clear.
- 20 But even so --
- MR. BRENTLEY: (Inaudible.)
- MS. COLAIZZI: But, even so, Board funds
- 23 are not used for activities in the schools.
- It is strictly there for running the Board
- 25 office.

- 1 It is there for any retreats we have, or
- 2 even any meals that we get, those sort of things.
- 3 This type of thing should not be coming out
- 4 of the Board budget.
- I mean, there should be other ways of
- 6 finding the funding for this, and I don't see what the
- 7 issue is of simply asking.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I -- and I don't see
- 9 the issue of singling this particular --
- MS. COLAIZZI: If I may --
- 11 MR. BRENTLEY: -- item out.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley -- Mr. Brentley,
- 13 Mrs. Colaizzi still has the floor, if we can just go
- 14 by order, please.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- There is no singling out, except for
- 17 singling out one event to be funded from the Board
- 18 office, and setting a precedence that that's what we
- 19 will be doing from this point on.
- 20 And we shouldn't start that sort of thing.
- 21 Again, as I said, in the spirit of
- 22 cooperation, I mean, I would encourage you to, you
- 23 know, ask the Superintendent, or the staff, or
- 24 whoever, Mr. Berdnik, or whoever has the ability to
- 25 see if there is funds outside of this line item, and

- 1 then I would be more than happy to support it.
- 2 But I am uncomfortable supporting it from
- 3 the Board office, because those funds are not to be
- 4 used in this manner.
- I don't see why we can't just make that --
- 6 the Board office line item is strictly used for Board
- 7 office, not to support other activities throughout the
- 8 District.
- 9 And, what my, I guess, fear is, that once
- 10 we start using these funds for these sorts of things,
- 11 we will no longer have the funds to even support the
- 12 office.
- But, simply asking to see if they could be
- 14 pulled from somewhere else, wouldn't -- shouldn't be
- 15 an issue.
- But the Board office --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: -- line item is not to
- 19 support activities that take place in the schools, or
- 20 even any personal activity that a Board member wishes
- 21 to conduct.
- It's not something we do, and it's not
- 23 something we should start doing now.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mrs. Colaizzi, can you show
- 25 me --

- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley, do you want to be
- 2 recognized?
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I do.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi, are you
- 5 finished?
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: For the moment, yes.
- 7 MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Can you show me a policy,
- 9 Miss Colaizzi, where these two items clash, or not in
- 10 line with the policy?
- 11 Can you show me where something did not go
- 12 through the proper channels of this Board, to receive
- 13 the necessary approval and the necessary funds?
- And secondly, if there needs to be a
- 15 policy, well, then, that's what we should be talking
- 16 about, putting a policy together.
- 17 Right now there is nothing wrong or
- 18 illegal, or to suggest that there is something that's
- 19 wrong.
- 20 And, you know, it's -- I think -- and
- 21 it's -- even this discussion is a little unfortunate.
- 22 It is really unfortunate.
- I would honestly say to you, Miss Colaizzi,
- 24 that if you have a problem with it, then I would
- 25 encourage you to use all of your powers within

- 1 yourself, to simply vote no for it.
- There is nothing here that is not correct,
- 3 there is nothing here that did not go through the
- 4 proper channels, there was nowhere, nowhere here,
- 5 where questions were raised, that I did not respond
- 6 appropriately.
- 7 This is a wonderful program for the
- 8 District, it has been highly successful, it will be
- 9 another successful program again this Friday.
- 10 If there are issues -- it appears that I
- 11 cannot solve your problem, I mean, whatever your
- 12 issues are, I would just encourage you, then, to
- 13 simply just vote no.
- I don't know what else to tell you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: May I?
- 16 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- I cannot show you a policy, that I know of,
- 19 that we have, but I do know that it has never been
- 20 used, Board funds, for activities that one Board
- 21 member wishes to conduct, and then denying others at
- 22 any given time.
- I will tell you that my own personal
- 24 experience, this Board, meaning a Board at the time,
- 25 did deny, so you can't have one yes, one no, or even

- 1 doing it by situation.
- But as far as the proper channels, and the
- 3 process, this is -- the one Board tab is a retroactive
- 4 Board tab, which means the money has already been
- 5 spent prior to the approval, and that is not the
- 6 proper way we do things. At least we try very
- 7 difficult -- very -- we are very adamant about not
- 8 doing that.
- 9 Again, my concern here is that we have
- 10 never spent Board dollars on anything but Board office
- 11 necessities; whether it is our meals, or paying for
- 12 whatever, you know, we spend as a whole.
- We do not single out one individual thing.
- I do not have a problem with the program,
- 15 or what it has accomplished. I have been a parent in
- 16 this District for many years, I have donated my time,
- 17 as we all are now, I have been very cooperative, I
- 18 have organized many activities, I have always gone
- 19 outside the District to look for those dollars.
- But, that's not the point here.
- The point here is, is that Board dollars
- 22 should not be spent on this, and it should be found
- 23 somewhere else, if possible.
- And again, I encourage you to ask if there
- 25 is somewhere else we can get this, so we can move on

- 1 this evening.
- 2 MR. ISLER: Mrs. Arnet.
- 3 MS. ARNET: I just have a question about
- 4 how -- so, first I want to preface by saying I think
- 5 both of my colleagues here have good points, and I
- 6 think that this is an extraordinary program you
- 7 created, and I want to commend you for your leadership
- 8 in engaging fathers in our District and in their
- 9 children's lives.
- I want to say that Mrs. Colaizzi is
- 11 bringing up very good points about our needs to
- 12 develop more clear policy in this area.
- Because I was just thinking, what -- what
- 14 if Board members who -- what if we were all a new
- 15 Board, we wouldn't know the history of the usage of
- 16 this account.
- 17 And so it's a really good example of how we
- 18 need to develop policies, so that we can have uniform
- 19 processes for how we handle such requests.
- Because as Mr. Brentley is saying, there
- 21 isn't a current policy that he is aware of, that he is
- 22 working outside of, and you are saying, "But this line
- 23 item was created for a very specific purpose."
- So regardless of how the vote on this
- 25 particular item goes, I would encourage us as a Board

- 1 to work together to draft some sort of policy that
- 2 would make this issue clear for all of us looking
- 3 forward. Because you are right, Mrs. Colaizzi, that
- 4 without that policy, our actions as a Board can become
- 5 inconsistent.
- And so I thank you for raising that issue,
- 7 and I, for one, would welcome the process of working
- 8 on a policy, with our solicitor, that might clarify
- 9 that.
- My question about the sort of programming
- 11 issues, I imagine there are other programs in our
- 12 schools, and in our industry -- in our District, like
- 13 Take Your Daughters and Sons to Workdays, or Career
- 14 Days, or other Bring your Parents to School Days, and
- 15 I am just curious about how those are traditionally
- 16 funded.
- 17 Maybe the Superintendent can share
- 18 information about that, because obviously it is not
- 19 this way.
- MR. ROOSEVELT: The superintendent is
- 21 always happy to share information, if he has it. The
- 22 Superintendent is lacking said information.
- But, Mr. Berdnik, or others with more
- 24 longevity, might be able to speak to the point.
- MR. BERDNIK: Boy, I can speak more to my

- 1 own experience.
- I think what you tend to see, are PTO's
- 3 getting in specific activities, at specific schools,
- 4 or schools, you know, conducting activities.
- 5 There is some things where there is an
- 6 indirect cost, or cost that you may not necessarily
- 7 measure, but -- the cost of printing the poster on a
- 8 poster printer, or things like that, where maybe the
- 9 District has paid the ink for the printer, but not
- 10 necessarily had an expenditure.
- 11 That's the best answer I can give you. I
- 12 am really drawing a blank on any District wide
- 13 expenditures for that activity.
- MS. ARNET: (Inaudible) is helpful. I
- 15 think what we are talking about here is an
- 16 untraditional -- whether this passes or not, this is
- 17 about an untraditional use of funds from a line item,
- 18 and so learning about how these activities have been
- 19 funded in the past, and thinking about how we might
- 20 fund them in the future, is helpful.
- 21 So, thank you.
- MR. ISLER: Miss Arnet, thank you for your
- 23 willingness to draft up the policy, we may take you up
- 24 on that.
- Mr. Brentley.

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- I just also wanted to mention, I know that
- 3 Mrs. Colaizzi had some concerns at the agenda review,
- 4 she also talked about why isn't there a Take a Mother
- 5 to School Workday, and one of the reasons why,
- 6 Mrs. Colaizzi, is that it requires work.
- 7 This -- this effort has been a ten year
- 8 long effort.
- 9 Many, many hours of organizing, meeting and
- 10 organizing men throughout the District, coordinating
- 11 different kinds of activities to keep them, and to put
- 12 a committee together, and so it just requires work,
- 13 and it's one of those things you just can't -- you
- 14 said that you were denied before, but you got to
- 15 organize, and you got to work.
- You know, this thing has been going on for
- 17 ten years, so that now, to all of a sudden say it is
- 18 an issue, I -- you know, just vote accordingly, you
- 19 know.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: I just need some
- 22 clarification.
- The line items, Code 330, is that for
- 24 consultants?
- MR. BERDNIK: Other professional services.

- 1 which is in the consultant line.
- MR. McCREA: And the videographer falls in
- 3 that category?
- 4 MR. BERDNIK: I think -- yes.
- 5 MR. McCREA: And then in item, line item
- 6 Code 635, is that for expenditures of supplies, or
- 7 food?
- 8 MR. BERDNIK: Food falls within the supply
- 9 family, 635 is for food for adults.
- MR. McCREA: I was unsure of that, because
- 11 that just seems like it was thrown on us last week at
- 12 agenda review, I had no idea that anybody needed any
- 13 money, I am sure if you had gone to the
- 14 Superintendent, he probably could have found it for
- 15 you.
- Who knows, he might have -- he might have
- 17 access to finding it.
- 18 We have never used -- we have never used
- 19 Board dollars to support anything outside -- from the
- 20 Board office, to support anything outside of the
- 21 Board.
- This is not a Board activity.
- And, I mean, you bought 75 lunches, did you
- 24 have 75 people eating lunch?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Why don't you ask some of

- 1 the guys who were there?
- MR. McCREA: I am asking you, Mr. Brentley
- MR. BRENTLEY: No, why don't you ask
- 4 that -- you know, one --
- 5 MR. McCREA: In other words, no.
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: Mr. McCrea, one thing I am
- 7 not going to allow anyone to do, is to try to
- 8 criminalize, or to disrespect this effort of getting
- 9 men together.
- 10 You did --
- MR. McCREA: Answer my question.
- MR. ISLER: Excuse me, gentlemen.
- MR. BRENTLEY: You can take --
- MR. ISLER: Excuse me, gentlemen,
- 15 Mr. McCrea --
- MR. BRENTLEY: You can take as many dirty
- 17 shots as you want, it is a wonderful event.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay?
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley --
- MR. McCREA: I don't like your tone, I
- 22 don't like your language.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, but lower your voice
- 25 when you are talking to me.

- 1 MR. McCREA: I am not taking dirty shots.
- 2 MR. ISLER: Please.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Lower your voice in talking
- 4 to me.
- 5 MR. McCREA: I asked you a question. You
- 6 can answer, yes or no.
- 7 MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea, Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I am telling you. And I am
- 9 telling you.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea and Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, just man up, and stop
- 12 the personal attacks.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. McCrea and Mr. Brentley,
- 14 please.
- Mr. Brentley, could you turn your mic off,
- 16 please.
- 17 Anybody else?
- Mr. McCrea, are you finished?
- MR. McCREA: Yes.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor, did you want to be
- 21 recognized? You had your hand up.
- 22 You do not.
- Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, Mr. Isler.
- I was fortunate enough to attend the

- 1 activity at City Council yesterday, and that was a
- 2 great day for the School District of the City of
- 3 Pittsburgh, we were able to convey a lot of important
- 4 information to the council members there, we were
- 5 recognized, it was a good public relations activity
- 6 for the District, it was very significant, and those
- 7 who did attend, to be seen, and standing strong for
- 8 the children of the City of Pittsburgh.
- 9 And also, after the event, after we
- 10 received the proclamation from the city, the ability
- 11 to stand outside of the City-County Building with
- 12 information for all of those who walked by, for
- 13 passersbys on the street -- passersbys on the street,
- 14 people that drove past could see this effort.
- 15 People were inquisitive in terms of asking
- 16 what it was about, what it was for.
- 17 We were able to tell them what the
- 18 initiative was for.
- 19 So it was a very beneficial first part of
- 20 the activity.
- 21 The rest of it is going to take place this
- 22 coming Friday. And I would encourage all those who
- 23 are able to participate in that, to join in that.
- It seems to be a discussion right now as to
- 25 where the money comes from, that pays for this

- 1 activity.
- 2 And my thought is that it's not a concern
- 3 where, it's the ability to take care of it.
- 4 But if it is a matter of whether it's
- 5 taxpayer dollars, or private dollars, for us it
- 6 shouldn't be an issue, because I think we are doing
- 7 everything we can to save the taxpayer dollars,
- 8 whenever we can.
- 9 So I would just ask if there is anyone
- 10 around this table, or in this room, or if you,
- 11 Mr. Roosevelt, could speak to the matter of, is there
- 12 the possibility of obtaining any outside funding, to
- 13 support this activity, even though the lunches were
- 14 consumed yesterday, but for the videographers that are
- 15 coming up this Friday, is there a possibility of
- 16 receiving other than Board moneys, to fund this
- 17 activity?
- 18 Because that seems to be the bone of
- 19 contention.
- MR. ROOSEVELT: Yes, sir, Mr. Sumpter, I
- 21 think that if the Board were to ask me if I could
- 22 obtain this sum, even though it is sort of
- 23 retroactive, it is small enough that I'm confident I
- 24 could find someone to pay for it.
- I don't know if I could do it immediately,

- 1 but I think I could do it in order to pay the bills,
- 2 once they came in.
- 3 MR. SUMPTER: Okay.
- 4 That's good to know, because even though we
- 5 are going through this metamorphosis of reformed
- 6 governance of this Board, items like this should not
- 7 be bones of contention, such that they take up so much
- 8 of the Board's time, because I don't know whether the
- 9 lunch, or the videographer, is going to boost
- 10 achievement, however, I do know the active
- 11 participation of male role models, fathers, et cetera,
- 12 in the lives of children, does have a direct
- 13 relationship on achievement, does have a direct
- 14 relationship on attendance, does have a direct
- 15 relationship on providing a positive attitude in
- 16 children's lives.
- 17 So it is a worthwhile event, and it does
- 18 come under the one commitment of us improving
- 19 parent/community engagement within the District.
- That's one of our commitments, one of our
- 21 goal areas, and one of our beliefs, to do that.
- 22 So it is in line with the activities of
- 23 this Board, and for this District.
- 24 But it's good to know that, and it is just
- 25 a matter of whether or not we can accept those funds,

- 1 or be willing to utilize those funds for this effort
- 2 this time.
- And in the future, whatever we do,
- 4 that's -- we will cross that bridge when we come to
- 5 it.
- 6 MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor.
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Roosevelt, I want to ask
- 8 you, you said that you believe we can raise some
- 9 private funds, for this.
- These are smaller contractors, who would
- 11 need to be paid in a fairly quick fashion.
- 12 And we have passed this through us, and
- 13 with our tax dollars, and there is a certain timeline
- 14 that we could assure them that they would be paid,
- 15 since these are smaller contractors.
- And you are saying here, publicly, that you
- 17 do believe that those funds are available; I mean, we
- 18 are saying, definitely, that those funds are
- 19 available, that you do have access to some private
- 20 funds, to pay for this?
- MR. ROOSEVELT: If the Board is requesting
- 22 this of me, I will commit to raising the money.
- I -- I can -- I don't know in terms of the
- 24 process of getting the check cut, and whether we have
- 25 to receive it, and put it in the school -- I would

- 1 have to ask people who do this, and even if we need a
- 2 Board tab for it, and things like that, because it is
- 3 a contract, we actually would actually need a Board
- 4 tab to except the money, I believe, Mr. Weiss; is that
- 5 correct?
- 6 MR. WEISS: Yes.
- 7 MR. ROOSEVELT: I would -- Mr. Taylor, I
- 8 would commit to doing it as fast as I can, given the
- 9 processes that we have to follow, which are not, I
- 10 have found, the quickest processes that mankind ever
- 11 invented.
- MR. TAYLOR: Well, I just want to say
- 13 again, I mean, our preference is always to not use
- 14 public dollars, on anything.
- I mean, if we can get private dollars to
- 16 subsidize teachers salaries, we would be interested in
- 17 that these days.
- 18 But --
- MR. ROOSEVELT: (Inaudible.)
- MR. TAYLOR: Yeah, but you know the point I
- 21 am trying to make. And this -- and it is always
- 22 again, we could use private dollars, as opposed to
- 23 taxpayer dollars.
- So, what does -- what does the Board need
- 25 to do, or maybe this is to our solicitor, what does

- 1 the Board need to do, to -- what kind of motion needs
- 2 to be put on the table?
- But I did want to also add if anything,
- 4 that these contractors are paid in a very, very timely
- 5 fashion, because they are small business people, and
- 6 the like, and that they are paid in a very, very
- 7 timely manner.
- 8 So I don't know exactly, you heard what the
- 9 Superintendent had said, I just want to know how we
- 10 are able to put that in motion.
- MR. WEISS: Well, I mean, the only way that
- 12 I know to assure prompt payment to these contractors,
- 13 is to have the Board approve the item, and then at a
- 14 later time, when the Superintendent obtains the funds,
- 15 have the Board approve the acceptance of those funds,
- 16 and then the Board made whole.
- I think that's the simplest, most direct
- 18 way to do this.
- MR. ISLER: If I may, just -- I'm sorry,
- 20 one moment, Mrs. Arnet.
- I am hearing what you are saying, and I
- 22 want to make sure we are very clear on this,
- 23 Mr. Weiss, you are saying if this is approved this
- 24 evening, with the understanding that the
- 25 Superintendent will raise the funds, that at the June

- 1 meeting we would approve the funds that were raised by
- 2 the Superintendent, and that would offset any expense
- 3 to the School District.
- 4 MR. WEISS: Yes.
- 5 MR. ISLER: So we don't have to make any
- 6 motion at this point in time to pull this out.
- 7 MR. WEISS: No. That's right.
- MR. ISLER: Mrs. Arnet.
- 9 MS. ARNET: I think this is a question for
- 10 Mr. Berdy, which is, do we have a general operating,
- 11 miscellaneous --
- MR. ISLER: Berdnik
- MS. ARNET: Or Berdnik, I'm sorry.
- Okay. I am not -- okay. I am not sure who
- 15 this question is for, but as the newbie at the table,
- 16 I am going to ask a question about line item codes,
- 17 which is: Would it be appropriate at all for us to
- 18 just change the account number on this Board tab, so
- 19 we can take it out of general operating,
- 20 miscellaneous, therefore, it's covered within our
- 21 current operating budget?
- It is such a small amount of funds.
- Out -- the colleague to my right has a
- 24 program that has been in process, and is active, and
- 25 will receive funding, small vendors will receive

- 1 payment, and Mrs. Colaizzi's concerns about
- 2 untraditional spending from the Board office would all
- 3 be rectified, just by the changing of the numbers on
- 4 the Board tab?
- 5 MR. ISLER: Mr. Berdnik.
- 6 MS. ARNET: Would that work for everyone?
- 7 MR. BERDNIK: We have two suggestions.
- 8 The first would be, we will see that the --
- 9 Mr. Roosevelt has a discretionary amount, it is part
- 10 of the contract, \$6,000 a year, we will see if there
- 11 is a sufficient balance to absorb the cost.
- The second is, and I obviously don't have
- 13 the luxury of running this past the solicitor, I think
- 14 we have revolutionary -- I don't even think that is a
- 15 word -- we have a resolution that I can give you, that
- 16 I think would accomplish what we need to do here, if I
- 17 could read it, Mr. Isler.
- 18 Resolved, that the Board authorize the
- 19 application for and acceptance of such private grant
- 20 funds as are necessary to absorb the cost of the Take
- 21 a Father to School Day; and, resolved, finally, that
- 22 staff record such transactions are as necessary to
- 23 transfer the cost from the Board office to
- 24 discretionary funds, at such time funds are received.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Weiss, is that sufficient?

- 1 MR. WEISS: Sounds fine to me.
- 2 MR. ISLER: If I may -- just hold tight,
- 3 Mr. Weiss.
- 4 Mrs. Fink.
- 5 MS. FINK: I was going to propose to put in
- 6 an amendment that we be reimbursed, and Mr. Berdnik
- 7 has so eloquently beat me to it, with the very
- 8 appropriate language, that I would like to make a
- 9 resolution that we adopt Mr. Berdnik's resolution.
- 10 MR. ISLER: Make a motion.
- 11 MS. FINK: And I make a motion that we
- 12 adopt Mr. Berdnik's resolution.
- MR. ISLER: Is there a second?
- MR. McCREA: Second.
- MR. ISLER: It has been moved and seconded,
- 16 that we accept the resolution.
- Mr. Weiss, could we have a roll call,
- 18 please, on the resolution on the Committee Report On
- 19 Education.
- MR. WEISS: This is on Mr. Berdnik's
- 21 resolution.
- MR. ISLER: Yes.
- It has been moved and seconded; moved by
- 24 Mrs. Fink, and seconded by Mr. McCrea.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Arnet?

    little disgraceful, Mr. President, that we have now
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politicized this entire event, spent ten, 15, 20

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- 1 minutes politicizing.
- What are we really disappointed about for
- 3 some colleagues?
- 4 Is it because it is an African American
- 5 candidate, who got the contract to do the work, or is
- 6 it because we are seeing men stand up, and finally get
- 7 involved?
- 8 You know, it makes no sense to do this.
- 9 This is a function of the District.
- 10 And, I would only ask, for all of my
- 11 colleagues, including Mr. Taylor, and Mr. Sumpter,
- 12 that hopefully you will step up to the aid, when there
- 13 are other issues that are presented, that are of real
- 14 value to this District, and aid and assist, as we so
- 15 quickly did on something here, that is so, so minor;
- 16 so minor.
- 17 And keep in mind, we don't even have a
- 18 policy that would govern how our dollars are being
- 19 spent.
- But we just -- we moved immediately here,
- 21 to make this move.
- Mr. Weiss, I have one question.
- Is there anything that is presented on
- 24 these two items, that's illegal?
- MR. WEISS: It is not illegal.

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: Is there anything here,
- 2 Mr. Weiss, that was presented, that was not -- that
- 3 answers or response were not given?
- 4 MR. WEISS: Well, I mean, the only issue
- 5 that -- the responses were given.
- 6 The only issue that was raised, is this
- 7 issue of retroactivity on the lunches.
- 8 It is not illegal, boards have -- not
- 9 necessarily this Board, but boards have retroactively
- 10 approved things before, when there are circumstances.
- 11 So the short answer is, there is nothing
- 12 illegal about it.
- 13 MR. BRENTLEY: And have we ever voted on
- 14 any items before in the past, that were retroactive?
- 15 You have been here a long time.
- 16 MR. WEISS: I believe we have. That's what
- 17 I said.
- 18 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, for much more dollars.
- MR. WEISS: I believe you are correct.
- 20 MR. BRENTLEY: That's right. Okay.
- We held this issue up for a little over
- 22 \$500. \$500.
- And, Mr. President, again, sir, I have to
- 24 express my disappointment, on -- with you, on your
- 25 leadership with this item.

- 1 You know what this whole thing is about.
- 2 And it would have been helpful, sir, for
- 3 you to stand with me, regardless of what folks may
- 4 think about me, I am a Board member, I am an elected
- 5 official, I have just as much to say at this table as
- 6 anyone else, it would be helpful, sir, for you to
- 7 stand with me on good items, just like you would rush
- 8 to the aid of others, when there are other issues.
- 9 This makes no sense.
- No sense.
- Now we politicized it, so while it was an
- 12 effort to continue to put men active, and bringing men
- 13 in the District -- and, yes, it should be within a
- 14 Board function, because it started in the Board
- 15 function, it continues to be spared, because it is the
- 16 Board that has been signing on and voting on the
- 17 resolutions, encouraging those men to come out.
- Yes, it is helpful to get others to join
- 19 and be a part.
- 20 But to just politicize this the way we --
- 21 you know, it's a terrible thing.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Brentley.
- I believe I did support this, and vote in
- 24 the affirmative.
- I do not wish to debate this with you, sir.

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: I am sure you don't.
- 2 MR. ISLER: But I'm one of nine, no
- 3 individual has power, it is only the Board that has
- 4 the power.
- Any other questions on the Committee Report
- 6 On Education?
- 7 Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: Sorry, I don't have a
- 9 question, I just wanted to recognize the good work of
- 10 the children at Westinghouse High School, that are
- 11 involved in the Science and Math Academy, the
- 12 experiences that they are going to be receiving,
- 13 partnering with different universities throughout the
- 14 country is going to be worthwhile and awarding, and
- 15 anything we can to do to bolster the efforts of that
- 16 program, we should do so.
- 17 Thank you.
- 18 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 19 Mr. Weiss, could we have a roll call vote,
- 20 please, on the Committee Report on Education.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Arnet?

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On Report 1645, which is the purchasing

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- 1 report, Inquiry 8549, the recommendation is that all
- 2 bids be rejected.
- 3 MR. ISLER: That is now taken out of the
- 4 report.
- 5 Any other --
- 6 MR. WEISS: Well, it should reflect the
- 7 fact that we are recommending the bids --
- MR. ISLER: Right, we are not voting on
- 9 anything this evening dealing with that.
- 10 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- On that item, there was only one bid.
- MR. WEISS: There may have been two bids,
- 14 but it is the belief of the finance department that a
- 15 rebid will result in significant savings to the
- 16 District.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. Thank you.
- MR. ISLER: Any questions or comments?
- 19 Hearing none -- Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- The item, the memorandum of understanding,
- 22 by and between the city police and the School District
- 23 of Pittsburgh, can someone speak about that?
- Is that something that we are legally
- 25 mandated to do; is there anyone --

- 1 MR. ISLER: We did talk about that -- I'm
- 2 sorry, Mr. Taylor, we talked about that in detail at
- 3 the agenda review meeting, Mr. Weiss did explain the
- 4 responsibility of the School District.
- I will have him repeat it for the record.
- 6 MR. WEISS: The Safe Schools Act, which is
- 7 part of the Public School Code, mandates that school
- 8 districts have cooperation agreements with police
- 9 departments of the communities in which their schools
- 10 are located.
- The agreement that is before you is the
- 12 agreement that has been promulgated by the Department,
- 13 in cooperation with the Attorney General's Office, and
- 14 the District Attorney of Allegheny County has also
- 15 worked with this.
- So really, this is a required action.
- 17 It reflects what is in fact the practice
- 18 now.
- 19 There is nothing in here that is different.
- But, failure to have this will result in
- 21 and audit citation by the Auditor General.
- 22 So it is important that the Board approve
- 23 this.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Weiss.
- 25 Any other questions?

- 1 Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: The language in that, was the
- 3 language also, was that written by the legislation, or
- 4 was the language drafted by the participants in the
- 5 memorandum of understanding?
- 6 MR. WEISS: The language was drafted by the
- 7 Department of Education, with cooperation with the
- 8 Attorney General's Office.
- 9 It has been reviewed with the school safety
- 10 office, with the District Attorney's Office, and the
- 11 city police, and there have been certain modifications
- 12 made, because there are unique features in this
- 13 District, such as the fact that we do have our own
- 14 school police.
- But this does not change, in any way, what
- 16 occurs on the ground every day in the District. It
- 17 really memorializes it, and is a required item under
- 18 the Code.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Weiss.
- 20 Any other questions?
- 21 Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: Also, I want to ask about item
- 23 No. 6, on page 5 of 5, the extension time for Gregory
- 24 Development.
- MR. ISLER: This also, sir, was discussed.

- 1 I will have Mr. Weiss repeat what he said at the
- 2 agenda review meeting.
- MR. TAYLOR: Again, as I said, that that
- 4 was originally just to the end of this month, and now
- 5 they are requesting, it appears to be even now two
- 6 months more, my main concern is if there may be other
- 7 people who may be interested, who may have the
- 8 wherewithal, at this time, to -- and we know that
- 9 certainly money is tight in this country at this time.
- So I am just -- I just, you know, for a
- 11 property I always thought was something that was --
- 12 that was also, I thought, was a valuable property, I
- 13 just don't want the District to be caught again
- 14 holding another property for -- again, for an entity
- 15 that should have already have paid for this property,
- 16 when the Board voted on it, and now we are requesting
- 17 now up to two months more time.
- 18 So again, I don't want -- I think at the
- 19 same time while this is going on, we should also be
- 20 advertising this building also, again, in case, after
- 21 this two-month period, that this -- that this company
- 22 cannot come up with the money.
- I don't want us to be caught holding
- 24 another building, that we should be trying to actively
- 25 sell.

- 1 MR. WEISS: The issue here is the
- 2 tightening credit market that occurred really between
- 3 the time of this bid and the closing, which was to be
- 4 at the end of this month.
- 5 We got one bid on this property, this is a
- 6 two 45-day period here, and the one is to require the
- 7 bidder to get all of his required documentation into
- 8 the lender.
- 9 The second 45-day period would be to have
- 10 the commitment to close.
- If he does not meet the first requirement,
- 12 he will surrender his bid security, which is
- 13 10 percent of the bid, or \$110,000.
- 14 If he does not close after doing that, he
- 15 will surrender the money.
- The reality is, that if we rebid this
- 17 property, we would not be closing any sooner, and I
- 18 remind the Board we only got one bid.
- 19 So both Mr. Fellers and I are recommending
- 20 this to the Board.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- 22 And so what happens in two months, if they
- 23 don't have the money necessary to purchase?
- MS. COLAIZZI: He just told you.
- MR. ISLER: He just told you.

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MR. WEISS: We will retain the $110,000 bid
   security, the hand money, in essence, and place the
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   property on the market.
               MR. ISLER: Any other questions?

- MR. CHESTER: And one other item on the
- 19 Human Resources Report of the Superintendent, if you
- 20 would turn to page 11, letter M, under "Sabbatical
- · 21 Leaves of Absences", item No. 3, you see the date
  - 22 6-13-08, should read 6-13-08 to 1-30-09.
  - 23 So if you would make that correction, I
  - 24 would appreciate it.
  - MR. ISLER: So noted, for the record.

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1 Thank you, Mr. Chester.
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- 2 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- I just wanted to make a comment, Mr. Taylor
- 5 and I were both just commenting on this, I believe
- 6 that this is the last legislative meeting that
- 7 Dr. Cupples will be one of our full-time employees,
- 8 although somebody could easily motion to bring his
- 9 retirement back, and we could just not let him leave.
- MR. ISLER: So move.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Second.
- MS. HAZUDA: Second that one.
- MS. COLAIZZI: We will just have --
- 14 Dr. Cupples, you are one very special person, who is
- 15 very much appreciated around this city, this state. I
- 16 have heard so much talk about you everywhere.
- 17 MR. ISLER: This nation.
- MS. COLAIZZI: This whole nation.
- 19 You are sorely great to be missed, and you
- 20 do deserve the applause I am about to begin for you.
- 21 (Applause.)
- MS. COLAIZZI: Does that mean you are going
- 23 to come back to work now?
- Thank you.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: Yeah, I have to -- I have to
- 2 also say a few words on behalf of Dr. Cupples.
- 3 One, because of the many, many, many
- 4 students that I know that he has helped, and that
- 5 always makes you a special person, and it's very sad
- 6 for me to see that man leave, because I have such an
- 7 immense respect for him.
- 8 And for other employees of this District,
- 9 and some sitting around the table, and to ask that
- 10 question, is it possible to have the complete respect
- 11 of every single School Board member who has worked
- 12 with this man, even though you see many of the
- 13 differences that we have, how does one employee
- 14 command the respect of universally everybody?
- And that's a special person, right there.
- That's a special person.
- 17 It's very few people who can say that.
- So I just have to say, from my -- you know,
- 19 why does he command such respect from me, and such
- 20 admiration? One, because I know how much he has
- 21 helped so many people, one, I know how much he has
- 22 helped me, when parents or others call.
- 23 And a lot of people say, "Well, we should
- 24 call into the Superintendent." Maybe you should.
- But when I have had parents who have called

- 1 me with issues and concerns, sometimes with tears at
- 2 the other end of the phone, you know, Dr. Cupples was
- 3 always, you know, "Call me," and I certainly did, and
- 4 the phone calls I almost always received was, "Thank
- 5 you, Mr. Taylor, for referring me to Dr. Cupples."
- And that means a lot to me, because that
- 7 makes my job easier, and it makes my job more
- 8 rewarding.
- 9 So I thank him for the many, many, many
- 10 parents that I sent to him, that he helped.
- 11 So, again, also how do you command the
- 12 complete respect of the full and very diverse, and
- 13 different Board.
- 14 There has never been a time where he has
- 15 given us information which we didn't automatically
- 16 know was correct, was well researched, was well
- 17 planned.
- 18 It was very difficult to question him on
- 19 anything.
- And in time we, as a Board, never really
- 21 did question him, because we knew that if he was
- 22 putting something there, he was putting the best
- 23 thing, and the best interests of the students, and of
- 24 this District.
- And, again, that's just an amazing

- 1 accomplishment.
- But there are also some times, that if you
- 3 called up Dr. Cupples, he would also say, "These are
- 4 also some things that you need to know."
- 5 And maybe there might have been some
- 6 superintendents in the past who might not have liked
- 7 some of the things he might have been telling us, but
- 8 he thought it was important that there were certain
- 9 things that we needed to know.
- 10 And he just had my complete trust, and my
- 11 complete respect.
- 12 So he may be in trouble now, with his
- 13 former boss, the Superintendent, but he is truly -- I
- 14 mean, and I certainly, because we have had a lot of
- 15 employees that I have respected out here, he will be
- 16 the guy's whole picture I will put in the lobby, and I
- 17 am saying that quite honestly, Dr. Cupples, you are
- 18 the guy whose picture I would put in the lobby, as an
- 19 example to every employee of this District, and
- 20 particularly to the future employees of the District,
- 21 "This is what you should aspire to."
- 22 Because you can actually do work out here,
- 23 that you can receive the full respect of a very
- 24 diverse and different Board.
- 25 And Dr. Cupples commands that respect.

- 1 I have never seen anything like it.
- I never -- so maybe it is something that
- 3 you will never reach, maybe this is just -- this man
- 4 is just a once in a lifetime person you see, but I
- 5 encourage our employees, particularly our senior ones
- 6 sitting around this table, please try. Please try to
- 7 be another Dr. Kaye Cupples.
- 8 So, Dr. Cupples, on behalf of -- on behalf
- 9 of this city, on behalf of this District, on behalf of
- 10 the District and the taxpayers, and particularly, I
- 11 know on behalf of those many parents that I sent to
- 12 you that you helped, thank you, very, very much.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Taylor, I would like to
- 14 note that one of the things that Dr. Cupples requested
- 15 tonight, is if the Board really was commending him for
- 16 a job well done, that we might be brief, and get out
- 17 of here at a decent hour.
- But we do know that the name --
- MR. TAYLOR: Dr. Cupples knows me better
- 20 than that. He knows.
- 21 He knows I can't clear my throat, and -- he
- 22 knows it takes me five minutes to clear my throat, so
- 23 he knows that, so --
- 24 MR. ISLER: We also know that it is a name
- 25 that really has meant a lot, not only with

- 1 Dr. Cupples, but with his father in this District.
- 2 So --
- 3 MR. TAYLOR: Yeah.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Any other questions?
- 5 Mr. Brentley.
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 7 I just want to say congratulations to all
- 8 of our retirees, too many to really acknowledge,
- 9 because there are quite a few highly qualified folks
- 10 that we losing.
- But I would like to just say a word to
- 12 Dr. Cupples, for me it's been the small things.
- That parent who could not articulate his or
- 14 her concerns, but knew what they wanted to say, and
- 15 for me, unfortunately, Board members are volunteers,
- 16 so I may have a minute and a half with him, and I make
- 17 a call, find out what they are interested in, and
- 18 every time I refer them to you, number one, you called
- 19 immediately and, number two, you followed up.
- And similar to what Mr. Taylor's comments
- 21 were, and I mean this respectfully, it would be great
- 22 for our staff that's here to understand, it's the
- 23 small things that makes the world go around a little
- 24 better for Board members, while we are trying to hold
- 25 down a full-time job, and do silly things like taking

- 1 care of our families.
- When we call and put you in the hand of one
- 3 of our constituents, it is helpful to us when the call
- 4 is made immediately, when there is follow up, when
- 5 there is clarity on the part of that parent saying,
- 6 "He was very clear, I understand, I know what's next."
- And so, for me, Doctor, that's been the
- 8 greatest thing, because I know each and every time I
- 9 make the referral, I know that she is going to get a
- 10 straight answer, I know that the answer is going to be
- 11 so, so timely, that it will make her head spin, in
- 12 terms of how quickly someone was able to get back, and
- 13 a lot of times your response to a follow up in
- 14 writing.
- 15 And that just surprises a lot of parents.
- And so I am grateful, you made my job a
- 17 little easier as a Board member.
- 18 And also, we have to talk about the issue
- 19 of class.
- 20 There is still some that believe because
- 21 you are in education, that you are up here, and the
- 22 parents are always down here beneath them.
- Doctor, you have the highest level of
- 24 education, and you are here, but somehow, some way,
- 25 with your even tone voice, you always made that

- 1 conversation come right here, and those parents feel
- 2 that.
- 3 So I really appreciate it, and I wish you
- 4 the best of luck, and please find some kind of way to
- 5 share with those employees that are here the
- 6 importance of return calls, the importance of talking
- 7 to taxpayers, talking to parents, and the importance
- 8 of being honest, and sharing what's important to them
- 9 in a timely fashion.
- 10 So congratulations to you, Doctor. We will
- 11 miss you.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 13 Any other questions or comments on
- 14 Personnel?
- Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: Always last.
- There is not much more you can say than has
- 18 already been said about Dr. Cupples, but thank you.
- 19 I also want to thank our employees serving
- 20 in the military for serving our country, and doing an
- 21 excellent job, and reminder, this is Memorial Day
- 22 weekend, and thank a veteran as well.
- Thank you.
- MR. ISLER: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yeah, I do want to ask

- 1 Mr. Chester one question -- well, I guess to
- 2 Mr. Chester, and also to Mark, on the Addendum B, Al
- 3 and 2.
- 4 Now we have had a brief conversation about
- 5 the appointments there at Miller African Centered.
- There were some community meetings. I know
- 7 that the community were not allowed, or don't get
- 8 allowed with picking employees, but this was a very,
- 9 very important position, because we are losing a great
- 10 principal, who was trained in the afro centric form of
- 11 educating our students.
- And, my concerns, speaking somewhat to the
- 13 parents, that they didn't have the real opportunity of
- 14 getting a framework to you, and having some say so in
- 15 the process, and I am just concerned, at this point,
- 16 did we extend that offer, that invitation to those
- 17 parents, and if not, why not?
- 18 MR. ROOSEVELT: Well, actually, we did send
- 19 the two comments and series of inquiries, that were
- 20 lodged at the public meeting, to Mr. Gibson, and he
- 21 has crafted an extremely lengthy and thoughtful reply,
- 22 which we are going to send, we can send to the Board
- 23 members, and we will also send to the community.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yeah, but that's not what I
- 25 asked.

- 1 In terms of the selection process, was
- 2 there input, and did we allow, as a matter of fact --
- 3 or, as an example, did we do anything in terms of
- 4 talking to what -- the former principal, and getting
- 5 her feeling, or some of her recommendations on what we
- 6 should be doing for -- in a candidate, or even did she
- 7 even suggest a possible candidate to fill that
- 8 position, who would be qualified?
- 9 MR. ROOSEVELT: Well, I can't answer that
- 10 specific last question, it would be inappropriate, but
- 11 I can say that Dr. French did speak to the retiring
- 12 principal, and Dr. French, who was extremely involved
- 13 in the selection of this principal, took those
- 14 thoughts, and applied them to the search process.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I just want to say in
- 16 closing, I consider Miller a specialized school, just
- 17 like the Montessori, we work very, very hard to
- 18 accommodate some of the concerns of the parents, and
- 19 it appears it is moving very well, and I think that we
- 20 have to be consistent in finding a way to getting the
- 21 parent involvement, as well as the former principal's.
- I mean, we worked, and really bent over
- 23 backwards to make Montessori work.
- And I am happy for those parents, but we
- 25 have to find a way to make it work with others.

- I will not be supporting these items, and
- 2 once again I will ask that we find some kind of way to
- 3 have some consistency with getting feedback from the
- 4 community when filling key positions, especially these
- 5 two positions are in the Hill District, trying times
- 6 are taking place in the Hill District in terms of the
- 7 movement, the schools, the changing of schools, and so
- 8 it's really important that the community have some
- 9 buy-in.
- 10 So I will not be supporting these items.
- And please, let's find a way to even out
- 12 the process, when filling some of these key positions
- 13 in the District.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Brentley.
- Mr. Weiss, could we have a roll call vote,
- 16 please.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Arnet?
- MS. ARNET: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, on the report, I will
- 21 be voting no, on page 1, Addendum -- Addendum B, A1
- 22 and 2 and 3.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Fink?

- 1 MS. FINK: Yes.
- 2 MR. WEISS: Mr. Hazuda?
- 3 MS. HAZUDA: Yes.
- 4 MR. WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- 5 MR. McCREA: Yes.
- 6 MR. WEISS: Mr. Sumpter?
- 7 MR. SUMPTER: Yes, on the report of -- yes,
- 8 on the report as a whole, and I will abstain on item
- 9 H1 -- H15, on page 10.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: The report's approved.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Weiss.
- 16 I would like to call the Board's attention
- 17 to the April 30th, 2008 financial statement.
- Also to the April 30th, 2008 general fund
- 19 and food service budgets that have been audited by the
- 20 controller, Mr. Lamb.
- There is a budget matter that I would like
- 22 to bring before this Board, which we need to vote on.
- 23 And it is a new business item, basically,
- 24 that -- but it is a budget item, whereby we need to
- 25 accept a grant award in the amount of \$2,500, from the

- 1 Jordan -- it is under the budget matter section, the
- 2 red one, the tab.
- 3
  It may appear both places, but I am dealing
- 4 with it now as a budget matter.
- It is for a program that will benefit the
- 6 8th grade students at the Pittsburgh Schiller, and it
- 7 will take place at Pittsburgh Schiller Classical
- 8 Academy.
- 9 Are there any questions?
- Hearing none, Mr. Weiss, could we please
- 11 have a vote on this new business item, which is under
- 12 the budget matter section.
- MR. WEISS: There is also a transfer of
- 14 funds.
- 15 MR. ISLER: Yes, I understand that, sir, we
- 16 are not there yet.
- 17 MR. WEISS: This is on the new business
- 18 item, which Mr. Isler has --
- 19 MR. ISLER: It's just on the new business
- 20 item.
- 21 MR. WEISS: Right.
- Mrs. Arnet?
- MS. ARNET: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.

- 3 service to our families and children, and I wanted to
- 4 send our regards to him, and to his widow, Jean Clark.
- I also wanted, I am also realizing that
- 6 this is the last time the Board will -- not the -- we
- 7 won't vote again until after some of our graduations,
- 8 and so I wanted to officially congratulate the
- 9 students and teachers and principals and all of the
- 10 staff who have worked so hard to bring about that
- 11 day.
- 12 And of course graduation will bring about
- 13 our first Pittsburgh Promise recipients, and we are
- 14 all prepared to be there, and talk more about that
- 15 later on in the month.
- 16 But congratulations to everyone who has
- 17 worked so hard to bring these days ahead of us.
- We also have softball and baseball
- 19 championships, and other athletic championships
- 20 happening for our boys and girls teams throughout the
- 21 District, and so I want to support those athletics and
- 22 their coaches and families.
- 23 And just lastly, certainly as a new Board
- 24 member, I haven't had as much experience with
- 25 Dr. Cupples, but want to voice my thanks to him as

- 1 well, but also want to really thank all of the staff
- 2 throughout the District, and really urge all of us, at
- 3 the Board and staff level, to begin all of our days
- 4 together with a sense of mutual respect.
- 5 And really thinking about universal respect
- 6 for all of us every day, and what we all can did do to
- 7 kind of start in that place.

- 6 haven't picked up one yet it is worth picking up, the
- 7 May 23rd edition of Time Magazine, up in the upper
- 8 right-hand corner there is a small picture of
- 9 students, those are our students there, and then also
- 10 on page 50 and 51, it is a wonderful story, they
- 11 actually quoted one of our staff here, there at Perry,
- 12 and they also have a beautiful picture of our
- 13 students.
- And so that's something we should all pick
- 15 up, we should be extremely proud.
- 16 I don't know when the last time one of our
- 17 schools actually made it to one of the national, or
- 18 this particular newspaper.
- 19 Also, I would like to remind folks that you
- 20 can still pick up your Take a Father to School Day
- 21 directory, this was the first year that we were
- 22 actually able to put it together, and you can get them
- 23 from our communications and marketing department.
- This directory simply has all of the
- 25 schools, and their contact information, and they list

- 1 their activities for May 23rd Take a Father to School
- 2 Day, and I would encourage, especially the men to go
- 3 out and participate, but especially those in the
- 4 viewing audience, to please pick one up, and don't
- 5 take my word for it, but go and check it out, and see
- 6 our men coming out and really standing up, and being
- 7 responsible within the city.
- And I believe that is it for me.
- 9 Thank you.
- 10 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Brentley.
- 11 Mr. Taylor, do you have something to add?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- 13 Also, in our earlier discussions, we
- 14 neglected again to encourage people to come out and
- 15 participate in Take Your Father to School Day, and
- 16 make it very clear that you don't have to be a father
- 17 to participate.
- You just have to have a child in your life
- 19 who loves you, and you love them, and encourage again
- 20 grandfathers, uncles, you know, everybody who has a
- 21 child in their life, who loves them, to come on out
- 22 and participate on that day.
- And also, as we heard from a few
- 24 principals, Mr. Brentley knows, we have some students
- 25 who don't have an adult male, you know, in their

- 1 lives, and sometimes it is not as nice experience Take
- 2 Your Father to School Day for some of our students, so
- 3 for some people who hear this, I encourage you to go
- 4 up, you know, call the school ahead of time, and maybe
- 5 they -- I think they would appreciate just some people
- 6 coming out on that day, and just spend some time with
- 7 some of our young people who don't have an adult male
- 8 loved one in their life.
- 9 But I would suggest again that they touch
- 10 base with the school before they do that, because we
- 11 do have a lot of students who don't have anybody to
- 12 come and spend part of that day with them.
- So for those that hear that, who, again,
- 14 have a child in their life, I would strongly encourage
- 15 you -- on Friday, Mr. Brentley?
- MR. ISLER: The 23rd.
- MR. TAYLOR: Friday, May 23rd.
- MR. ISLER: It is this Friday.
- MR. TAYLOR: This Friday, Take a Father to
- 20 School Day, we urge everyone to participate.
- 21 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Taylor.
- Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, Mr. Isler.
- 24 To piggyback on what was said about the
- 25 Take a Father to School Day initiative, one of the

- 1 fathers that was involved in that was a gentleman by
- 2 the name of Henry Struthers, and Mr. Struthers just so
- 3 happens to be the national poster dad, along with his
- 4 daughter, in the national fatherhood initiative.
- 5 And that's giving a lot of recognition to
- 6 the City of Pittsburgh, the fact that he is local, and
- 7 there was a conference in April of which the program
- 8 booklet had -- the national fatherhood initiative
- 9 conference had a picture of Mr. Struthers on the
- 10 program for the conference, so everybody that was in
- 11 attendance there saw the picture, I believe -- I don't
- 12 know whether they gave out posters there or not, but
- 13 they do have them produced.
- And we need to perhaps find a way to
- 15 recognize Mr. Struthers, and have that poster put up
- 16 around the administration building, and maybe sent out
- 17 to all of the schools.
- It is a great poster.
- 19 It is one that, you know, this is giving
- 20 national recognition to the School District of the
- 21 City of Pittsburgh, and again, this is a national
- 22 initiative, and it is just good to have somebody
- 23 locally, somebody from the City of Pittsburgh, who
- 24 represents us as the -- on the poster that is going to
- 25 be distributed throughout the entire country.

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MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mr. Sumpter.
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               Anything else to be brought before the
2
 3 Board at this time?
               Hearing none, could I have a motion to

   adjourn.
