#### Presented November 18, 2009

Randall Taylor has represented District 1 on the Pittsburgh Board of Education since 1997.

A life-long Pittsburgh resident, Mr. Taylor attended Baxter and Dilworth elementary schools, graduated from Peabody High School and attended the University of Pittsburgh.

#### Legislative Meeting COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION November 24, 2009

#### **DIRECTORS:**

The Committee on Education recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

#### **Proposals/Grant Award**

**RESOLVED,** That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to submit proposals for grants and accept grant awards in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in subparagraph 1 through 3, inclusive.

**RESOLVED FURTHER**, That upon approval of the grant by the granting agency, the Board authorize the establishment of appropriate accounts and, where necessary to implement the grant, authorize the advancement of funds to operate the program until the grant and fees are received.

# **Proposals/Grant Award**

1. RESOLVED, That the Board accept a grant award from the Women's Sports Foundation for \$4,000. Funds are awarded in support of Pittsburgh Westinghouse's Girls Athletic Dept. and its "IMAGE" (Investing, Motivating, and Assisting Girls in Exercising) program. IMAGE seeks to build leadership capacity in middle school girls through a mentorship program that pairs Westinghouse female athletes with up to 40 underserved minority females enrolled in middle school and living in Pittsburgh's East End. These athletes serve as mentors to these middle school females (mentees) three times per week. The East End was chosen due to its being a high need community with few opportunities for middle and high school girls to engage in supportive after school opportunities where they can see key leadership traits modeled and gain these skills for themselves.

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IMAGE's main goal is to ensure middle school girls will succeed in high school and graduate.

IMAGE engages mentors and mentees through a variety of sports and gamessuch as Hip Hop Aerobics, weight training, basketball, swimming, and soccer. Mentees complete daily journals of their diet, exercise schedule, and activity level to chart progress. Themes related to physical fitness and leadership--such as goal setting, teamwork, and self-discipline--are discussed at the start of each session, and mentees complete a homework assignment on this theme and share it with their mentors. The mentors are trained and certified over a four-day training sponsored by Youth Enrichment Services, Inc., before they begin working with their mentees. Mentees receive rewards and incentives and healthy snacks. A pre-and post-evaluation is conducted.

The funding period shall run from December 1, 2009 to November 30, 2010.

2. RESOLVED, That the Board accept a grant award from the Pennsylvania Department of Education for \$5,000. Authorization is requested for **Pittsburgh Beechwood PreK-5** to accept \$5,000 from the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) for achieving AYP for at least two (2) consecutive years. In addition to being honored and rewarded for this accomplishment the PDE is recognizing the school's academic excellence by naming them a 2010 Distinguished Title I School.

This funding will be utilized to support the school's Title I program.

The funding period shall run from July 1, 2009 to September 30, 2010.

3. RESOLVED, That the Board accept the submission of an application to the Edith L. Trees Charitable Trust for \$100,000. Funds are requested to support the creation of an outdoor sensory garden at Pittsburgh Pioneer in partnership with the Western PA Conservancy, which will serve as the Project Director and Fiscal Agent for the grant. The garden will expand current playground space to enable additional classroom instruction, free play, parent engagement, and individual or group contemplation in a serenity area, designed to alleviate student stress. Unlike the average garden, sensory gardens are specially designed to stimulate the somatic senses of sight, smell, touch, taste and sound, as well as the neptic senses (awareness of the body in space)—gravity, temperature, space, and enclosure. If one sense is limited, students will have alternate ways to explore and experience the garden. This is of particular importance to multiply challenged students, such as those at Pioneer, who have fewer natural chances than other children to experience spontaneous sensation and the freedom of play. The

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garden will be adapted to their needs--with raised beds, for example, so that students may care for plants while in wheelchairs. The goal is to amplify students' experiences by surrounding them with sensation. Sensory amplification contributes to students' developing physical skills, including increased muscle tone and range of motion that develops as students use muscles differently to tend to plants, greater body awareness, and greater ability to use both sides of the body, hand preference, motor planning balance, coordination, and ocular tracking. Children also become good observers. By caring for the garden, children develop and learn responsibility, understanding, self-confidence, love of nature, and interpersonal skills.

The funding period shall run from December 1, 2009 to November 30, 2010.

#### **Consultant/Contracted Services**

**RESOLVED,** That the Board authorizes its proper officers to enter into contracts with the following individuals for the services and fees set forth in subparagraphs 4 through 29, inclusive.

4. Afrika Yetu's c/o Elie Kihonia – That the Board enter into a contract with Afrika Yetu's/Elie Kihonia as a contracted teaching artist at **Pittsburgh Lincoln K–8**, from November 25, 2009 until June 30, 2010. Mr. Kihonia is one of the 18 teaching artists already selected and rostered with the Board approval as part of the Culturally Responsive Arts Education Program (CRAE). Mr. Kihonia will provide African drumming and dance workshops for students in grades 1 to 8 at Pittsburgh Lincoln K -8. Mr.Kihonia will teach two days per week. The days will be on Tuesdays and Fridays. These workshops will enhance the cultural component of the African Drum and Dance Ensembles. The workshops will service approximately one hundred twenty (120) students.

The operating period shall be from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$200 per week; total cost shall not exceed \$10,800 payable from account #4148-616-3210-599.

5. Addiction Medicine Services: WPIC – That the Board enter into a contract with Addiction Medicine Services to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional

health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 440 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$13,860 payable from account #s 4810-04K-2120-330 (\$630), #4810-04N-2120-330 (\$10,080) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$3,150).

6. Addison Behavioral Care, Inc. – That the Board enter into a contract with Addison Behavioral Care, Inc. to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 350 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$11,025 payable from account #s 4810-04N-2120-330 (\$9,450) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$1,575).

7. Center for Victims of Violence & Crime – That the Board enter into a contract with Center for Victims of Violence & Crime to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 210 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$6,615 payable from account #s4810-04K-2120-330 (\$5,670) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$945).

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8. Divine Intervention – That the Board enter into a contract with Divine Intervention to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 200 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$6,300 payable from account #4810-04K-2120-330.

9. Family Links – That the Board enter into a contract with Family Links to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 2,980 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$93,870 payable from account #s4810-04K-2120-330 (\$17,297.50), #4810-04N-2120-330 (\$54,837.50) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$21,735).

10. Family Resources – That the Board enter into a contract with Family Resources to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 140 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$4,410

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payable from account #s4810-04K-2120-330 (\$1,575) and #4810-04N-2120-330 (\$2.835).

11. Gateway Rehabilitation Services – That the Board enter into a contract with Gateway Rehabilitation Services to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Gateway will screen students who are at the Student Achievement Center for Rule 7 violations, and provide SAC and parents with written recommendations.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 330 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$10,395 payable from account #s4810-04K-2120-330 (\$1,260), #4810-04N-2120-330 (\$6,615) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$2,520).

12. MAPS, University of Pittsburgh – That the Board enter into a contract with MAPS, University of Pittsburgh to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 100 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$3,150 payable from account #4810-04K-2120-330.

13. Mercy Behavioral Health Prevention Service – That the Board enter into a contract with Mercy Behavioral Health Prevention Service to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request.

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Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 2,220 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$69,930 payable from account #s4810-04K-2120-330 (\$18,872.50), #4810-04N-2120-330 (\$39,402.50) and 4810-010-2110-330 (\$11,655).

14. Next Generation Prevention Services – That the Board enter into a contract with Next Generation Prevention Services to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 220 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$6,930 payable from account #4810-04K-2120-330.

15. Project Redirect – That the Board enter into a contract with Project Redirect to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 180 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$5,670 payable from account #s4810-04K-2120-330 (\$5,040) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$630).

16. Malcolm Thomas: ONE Nation – That the Board enter into a contract with Malcolm Thomas/ONE Nation to provide classroom education using evidencebased curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make Legislative Meeting Committee on Education November 24, 2009

sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 470 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$14,805 payable from account #s4810-04K-2120-330 (\$13,230) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$1,575).

17. Turtle Creek Valley MH/MR, Inc. – That the Board enter into a contract with Turtle Creek Valley MH/MR to provide classroom education using evidence-based curricula, skill-building groups and behavioral supports in an effort to make sure that all students are "Promise Ready." Services will focus on teaching the skills necessary for self-control, social skill development and emotional health/wellness so that students achieve academic excellence and strength of character. Opportunities for parent workshops and school-based presentations on topics of interest available upon request. Assistance with crisis management or critical school incidents also available if need arises.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 180 hours; total cost shall not exceed \$5,670 payable from account #s4810-04N-2120-330 (\$3,780) and #4810-010-2110-330 (\$1,890).

18. School of Education, University of Pittsburgh – That the Board enter into a contract with Dr. Mary Margaret Kerr, School of Education, University of Pittsburgh to provide consultant/training services in an integrated model of PBIS [Positive Behavioral Intervention Services] and SAP [Student Assistance Program]. This consultant will work collaboratively with Student Services and the district's SAP consultant/trainer [Addiction Medicine Services: WPIC] to plan, develop, train and assist with implementation of the integrated model. Dr. Kerr will attend planning/discussion meetings with PPS personnel and the SAP trainer [not to exceed 20 hours @ \$75/hours=\$1,500], prepare content and co-present various training modules on PBIS' integration into SAP to various staff at scheduled trainings [not to exceed 25 hours @ \$75//hr=\$1,875].

The operating period shall run from November 2009 to March 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$75 per hour; total cost shall not exceed \$3,375 payable from account #4810-04K-2120-330.

19. Addiction Medicine Services: WPIC – That the Board enter into a contract with Addiction Medicin Services, WPIC to provide consultant/training services in an integrated model of PBIS [Positive Behavioral Intervention Services] and SAP [Student Assistance Program]. This consultant will work collaboratively with Student Services and the district's PBIS consultant/trainer to plan, develop, train and assist with implementation of the integrated model.

The operating period shall run from November 2009 to March 2010. The rate of payment varies per activity; total cost shall not exceed \$87,920 payable from account #4810-04K-2120-330.

20. Gentry and Byers, Inc. - Authorization is requested for Pittsburgh Public Schools to continue an agreement for a second year with Gentry and Byers, Inc., in affiliation with Purdue University, for consulting services for the Gifted Pilot Program. This university-affiliated partnership helped to design and implement the delivery model for gifted services in the five pilot schools and was a recommendation made by the K-8 Gifted Task Force. Gentry and Byers will provide Identification and Differentiation support, Database development, Classroom resources and data collection, analysis, and evaluation. The five gifted pilot schools are as follows: Pittsburgh Colfax ALA, Pittsburgh Dilworth, Pittsburgh Fort Pitt ALA, Pittsburgh Grandview and Pittsburgh Northview ALA.

University proposals and curriculum vitae are available for review in the office of Michelle Monahan at the Program for Students with Exceptionalities.

The operating period shall run from January 4, 2010 to December 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$8,266.66 per month; total cost shall not exceed \$99,200 payable from account #s5243-11L-1243-121 (\$49,600) and #5243-11P-1243-121 (\$49,600).

21. Various Outreach Coordinators – That the Board enter into a contract with up to 14 Outreach Coordinators. Each Outreach Coordinator will be paid \$500 per month for 6 months up to \$3,000 (1/15, 2/15, 3/15, 4/15, 5/15, and 6/16) and up to an additional \$2,000 for reaching a set goal for the number of students they enroll and who attend the program.

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Outreach Coordinators will be assigned specific schools and will be responsible for recruiting and enrolling current 5th, 6th, and 7th grade students at those schools for the summer middle-grades camp. Outreach coordinators will be responsible for marketing the program and informing students and parents about the opportunity. They will visit their assigned schools on a regular basis to meet with students, collect information about which students are likely to enroll in the camp, and target students who are basic or below basic in reading. Outreach Coordinators may also attend evening and registration events. Outreach Coordinators will attend a training at the beginning of their services facilitated by the summer middle-grades camp team. Regular reports will be due to the summer middle-grades camp team throughout the duration of the contract. The success of their recruitment, outreach, and enrollment efforts will be based on the number of students who enroll and who attend the camp.

Six outreach coordinators are identified to contract with as of November 2009.

The operating period shall run from November 30, 2009 to May 21, 2010. Total cost shall not exceed \$70,000 payable from account #4000-03M-2820-330.

Winsor Learning, Inc. – That the Board enter into a contract with Winsor Learning, Inc. as part of the PPS K-12 Response to Intervention Model, The Sonday System is being used as the Tier 3 Intervention for struggling students in Kindergarten through Grade 5. In order to achieve maximum gains and to support program fidelity, professional development is required. The purpose of this contract is to provide professional development to teachers implementing the Sonday program. This professional development will be offered during the school day, after school and on Saturdays and will focus on training on the Multisensory Teaching Methodology, detailed training on the lessons embedded in the intervention program and assistance on how to use progress monitoring tools to monitor delivery. The contract includes 10 days of comprehensive training.

The operating period shall run from November 30, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The total cost shall not exceed \$15,000 payable from account #4600-010-2270-324.

23. SPARK/Sports Play and Recreation for Kids – That the Board enter into a contract with Donna Boyd/SPARK Program Consultant to support professional development for K-12 physical education teachers. The purpose of this contract is to provide the physical education teachers with updated training for the SPARK (Sports, Play and Active Recreation for Kids) curriculum and implementation K-12. SPARK content and instruction is an effort to improve physical education quantity and quality. SPARK has been the District's physical education curriculum for more than eight years. The cost of this contract is paid for by two

grants: Highmark Grant and a site-based grant awarded to the PE teacher at **Pittsburgh Montessori**.

The operating period shall run from December 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010. The total cost shall not exceed \$3,530 payable from account #s 4600-175-2271-323 (\$1,530) and #4133-04L-1190-329 (\$2,000).

24. Duquesne University School of Education – That the Board enter into a contract with Dr. Rodney Hopson and Dr. Helga Stokes of Duquesne University to work under contract as co-evaluators for the PPS Culturally Responsive Arts Education Program (CRAE) funded by The Heinz Endowments after November 25, 2009, through December 2012. The evaluation is an integral facet and imperative to the success of Culturally Responsive Arts Education, and at present, the District does not have the capacity to conduct such research. Dr. Hopson has extensive experience with culturally responsive evaluation and has engaged in groundbreaking work in this field. Dr. Stokes has taught and conducted research in a number of culturally diverse settings. The IRB protocol of the Pittsburgh Public Schools will be followed for this program evaluation.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to December, 2012. The total cost shall not exceed \$92,915 payable from account #4000-16J-2260-330.

25. I'Asia Eybers – That the Board enter into a contract with I'Asia Eybers as a contracted teaching artist at **Pittsburgh Montessori PK-8** from November 25, 2009, through January, 2010. Ms. Eybers is one of the 18 teaching artists already selected and rostered with Board approval as part of the Culturally Responsive Arts Education (CRAE) program. Pittsburgh Montessori has selected her as one of the artists with whom they would like to work on the CRAE project; this request is to ask for a contract to be issued so that her work with the school may begin.

Ms. Eybers will work in a co-teaching role as a resident artist during the first semester. She will work on poetry, public speaking and drama in collaboration with the social studies teacher. Ms. Eybers will work with about 60 students in grades 6 - 8 at Pittsburgh Montessori. She will meet with students once per week for 12 weeks.

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to January 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$200 per day; total cost shall not exceed \$2,400 payable from account #4000-16J-2260-329.

- 26. The New Teacher Project That the Board enter into a contract with The New Teacher Project (TNTP). TNTP is a national nonprofit dedicated to closing the achievement gap by ensuring that high-need students get outstanding teachers. The contract is contingent upon ongoing grant support from the Gates Foundation to fund the Empowering Effective Teachers Plan. Services proposed:
  - 1) Establishing a Pittsburgh Teaching Fellows program, which will attract and train approximately 30 50 teachers annually, and will be focused on filling highneed vacancies in math, science, special education.
  - 2) Launching TNTP's highly successful Practitioner Teacher Program® in Pittsburgh to effectively prepare and certify the new alternate route teachers;
  - 3) Launching the Model Staffing Initiative to provide direct teacher hiring support for leaders of 20-25 of the hardest to staff PPS schools to help them build strong instructional teams before the start of the school year and then working with PPS Recruiting & Staffing to sustain and replicate a high-quality staffing practices used in the hardest to staff schools throughout the entire district.

The operating period shall run from December 1, 2009 to November 1, 2013. The total cost shall not exceed \$2,771,288 payable from account #1010-16N-2832-330.

27. Smart Futures – That the Board enter into a contract with Smart Futures, a non profit organization that provides career education services to students throughout Allegheny County. Because CTE was awarded a four year Women's Educational Equity Awards (WEEA) Grant designed to recruit, retain and increase achievement of female students into non traditional CTE programs, we are seeking help from Smart Futures to provide E-mentors for students in the various CTE programs indicated below. E-mentoring is an on-line mentoring program that allows students to interact with professionals aligned with their career areas of interest. In addition, students and mentors complete ten career modules that relate directly to the PA Academic Standards for Career Education and Work. Funds have been budgeted to pay for school site licenses at \$1,500 per school site for four schools (\$6,000) per year for four years and to pay for on-site development to include procedures for accessing communicating with mentors and review of accompanying curriculum. Cost for the professional development is \$150.00 per site (\$600) per year for four years.

The operating period shall run from December 1, 2009 to September 30, 2013. The rate of payment shall be \$6,600 per year; total cost shall not exceed \$26,400 payable from account #4800-15N-1399-348.

Girls. Math & Science Partnership - That the Board enter into a contract with the 28. Girls Math and Science Partnership (GMSP) an organization born out of The Heinz Endowment 1998 study, Promising Futures. GMSP was created to address issues regarding girls, their participation in science and their influence This partnership will support the major objective of the on the workforce. Women's Educational Equity Award Grant (WEEA), recently received by Career and Technical Education (CTE) - to recruit, retain and advance achievement for girls in math rich - non-traditional CTE programs. GMSP will work with CTE to plan and coordinate several educational activities for female students who are currently enrolled in these programs in hopes of building their confidence through the establishment of network opportunities with scientist/laboratories and business and industry representatives thus motivating the girls to complete the programs. Specific activities include professional development for CTE teachers on research-based techniques to sustain girls interest in math science and engineering, provision of Gender Equity Toolkits for 34 PPS teachers and administrators. RiverQuest floating laboratory exploration for students and a "kick-off" celebration at Carnegie Science Center to welcome the larger business, industry and educational communities.

The operating period shall run from December 1, 2009 to September 30, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$8,914.25 per quarter; total cost shall not exceed \$35,657 payable from account #s 4800-15N-3300 329 (\$5,264), #4800-15N-1399-329 (\$6,353), #4800-15N-2260-329 (\$20,000) and #4800-15N-2271-324 (\$4,040).

29. SchoolWorks – That the Board enter into a contract with an educational consulting group, SchoolWorks, to conduct a K-12 benchmarking process that will help the District understand how its reform efforts align with the effective practices utilized by high-performing urban districts. The benchmarking process, which will collect evidence through interviews as well as document review and classroom visits, includes but is not limited to a four-day on-site engagement with four SchoolWorks team members, an oral report and a written executive summary. The review process will focus on one or two key areas as agreed upon with the Superintendent. See attachment for additional information about the company and project examples. The not to exceed amount of \$67,000 is inclusive of all fees and reimbursable expenses (e.g. travel, postage, supplies).

The operating period shall run from November 25, 2009 to March 31, 2010. The rate of payment is a negotiated fee per project; total cost shall not exceed \$67,000 payable from account #1000-010-2360-330.

31. Pittsburgh Carmalt/Meet the Author – That the Board authorize the staff and students of Pittsburgh Carmalt Pre K-8 to invite various local authors to read to the students through the "Meet the Author" grant approved at the February 24, 2009 Legislative Meeting. The Students will meet the author, share in a book and receive an autographed copy of the book from the author. This experience will enrich the existing reading program. Stud ents will prepare questions for the author of the book that they read. Each author will spend one hour with the students reading, discussing and answering questions regarding the book. There will be accountable talk sessions during the school day to connect with the book and the students will write a biography about their author. The principal will compile the pieces and create a "Meet the Author" anthology. All students will receive a copy of the anthology.

The total cost shall not exceed \$8,724 payable from account #s 4112-03J-1490-329 (\$2,400) and #4112-03J-1490-640 (\$6,324).

32. Charter School Payments (ARRA) - That the Board authorize payment to the following charter schools for flow-through entitlement of the federal stimulus funds. This is a requirement of IDEA Part B portion of The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA - Stimulus Funds.) The Charter Schools had 334 students on the December 2008 Child Count for Special Education. The charter schools will receive the amounts allocated in the grant. This is required by the

grant. The total cost shall not exceed \$413,932. The following are the list of schools and amounts to be paid to each school: Academy Charter School (\$59,487); Career Connections (\$81,795); City Charter High School(\$104,103,); The Environmental Charter School at Frick Park (\$18,590); Manchester Academic Charter School (\$40,897); North Side Urban Pathways (\$75,598); and Urban League (\$33,462).

33. Charter School Payments (IDEA) - That the Board authorize payment to the following Charter Schools for pass-through entitlement of federal IDEA B 611 funds. The Charter Schools had 334 students on the December 2008 Child Count for Special Education. The charter schools will receive approximately \$1,125.43 per child receiving School Age Special Education programs and services as reported in December 2008. This is required by the IDEA 611 fund. The total cost shall not exceed \$375.893.62. 34. ESY/School Age Extended School Year – That the Board authorize the following employees to work in the Special Education School Age ESY Program. This Program is mandated by the State and Federal Departments of Education. The Program is for eligible students with disabilities who currently attend: Pittsburgh Conroy, Pioneer and McNaugher Education Centers, as well as students in Life Skills and Autistic Support Programs in regular school buildings. In addition, this Program serves eligible students who are enrolled in the Start on Success Program and the CITY Connection Programs. Payment will be 80% of per diem. Number of days worked will be determined by enrollment and IEP needs of the eligible children.

As of the December 2008 Child Count, there are 65 parentally placed students (52 in city parochial schools and 13 in city private schools.)

36. Pittsburgh-Mt. Oliver Intermediate Unit (IDEA) – That the Board authorize as per requirement of IDEA 611, payment to the Pittsburgh-Mt. Oliver Intermediate Unit for parentally placed children with disablitilites attending private schools. These schools are entiled to a proportional calculation of federal funds as required by

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IDEA 611. There are 65 students (52 in city parochial schools and 13 in city private schools) for a total of 0.96%. The total of this action is \$80,627.00 - 0.96% of the \$8,424,043 IDEA B 611 allocation.

The total cost shall not exceed \$80,627 payable from account #5500-13L-1231-323.

37. 95% Group, Inc. – That the Board authorize payment to support professional development for teachers on the 95% Group Phonics lesson library. As part of our K-5 Response to Intervention Model, teachers are responsible for providing tiered interventions to students performing below grade level in reading. A consultant from the 95% Group provided training to intervention specialists on August 26th, 2009. Literacy interventionists were trained as trainers. They provide job-embedded professional development on the 95% Phonics library at school sites. This board action is retro active because training costs were thought to be included in material costs at the onset of purchase. The company has provided us with a \$2000 discount in free materials as a result of this oversight. Normal consultant costs for a day of training exceed \$2500. Costs are payable from the reading first grant.

The total cost shall not exceed \$649.23 payable from account #4000-22K-2271-582.

38. CRAE Payments – That the Board authorize payment at the workshop rate of \$23.32/hr for up to 20 teachers in Culturally Responsive Arts Education (CRAE) schools for ongoing professional development from November 25, 2009 through September, 2010. These after school trainings will occur monthly at each school site, with summer professional development occurring up to one week during school vacation. Professional development activities will be focused on training CRAE teachers to review and analyze student work, discuss feedback from peer observations, share culturally relevant teaching strategies, participate in study groups, and plan activities and tasks that will promote academic achievement and resilience for CRAE students.

The total cost shall not exceed \$20,000 payable from account #4000-16J-2260-124.

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#### **General Authorization**

39. <u>Amendment/Pennsylvania Department of Education/Proposals and Grant</u>
Awards

RESOLVED, That the Board amend an item previously adopted by the Board Committee on Education, Proposals /Grant Awards, July 23, 2008, item #1.

#### Original Item:

Acceptance of a grant award in the amount of \$242,198 from the Pennsylvania Department of Education. This is the annual allocation [2008-09] for the Student Assistance Program/Safe & Drug-Free Schools and Communities Grant. The allocation was cut \$45,964 compared to the 2007/08 allocation.

This funding provides all schools with school-based prevention education, early intervention and support services focusing on health and wellness, safety and social/emotional skill development. We are required to use science/evidence-based program. The funding period shall run from July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009.

#### Amended Item:

That the Board of Directors accept additional funding in the amount of \$171,295 from the Pennsylvania Department of Education. Additional funding will be applied to the 2008-2009 Student Assistance Program grant allocation. The total amount for the grant award is amended from its original amount of \$242,198 to \$413,493. This additional funding will be for fund 04K 2008-2009 Student Assistance Program. The operating period will be July 1, 2008 through March 31, 2010, which is an extension to the original July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009 funding period. There is no change in the funding source. The indirect cost rate increased from its original amount of \$6,137 + new rate \$4,340 = \$10,477 new indirect cost amount.

Contracted services will increase from \$153,760 to \$325,055. The additional funding of \$171,295 will add \$80,000 to existing SAP service providers to help offset the overall state funding cut. In addition, the remaining \$91,295 will provide funding for consultant/training services to develop an integrated model of PBIS and SAP. Two consultants, Dr. Mary Margaret Kerr ([PBIS consultant and trainer] and WPIC [our SAP trainer] will work with Student Services staff to design and provide training in the integrated model, for elementary, middle, K-8 and secondary schools.

The integration of PBIS and SAP will allow for a more effective use of time expended by school staff to deliver a comprehensive model of student support services. Training will provide a standards-driven approach towards "best practices" for addressing student misconduct, along with prevention and early intervention programs to address the social, emotional and behavioral health needs of our students. The strengths of PBIS and SAP will be incorporated into

the training model. The Student Assistance Program will become a central fusion point of joint efforts on behalf of the "whole child.":

#### Reason for Amendment:

In July of 2009, the Student Assistance Program Coordinator sought additional funding from the Pennsylvania Department of Education for two reasons: to develop an integrated model of PBIS and SAP, and to request additional dollars to offset the cut in SAP funds for 2009/10, which would have greatly affected the delivery of school-based SAP services. On October 15, 2009, the request for additional funds was awarded. The intent of this request was not only to provide our students with the services that they need, but to also more efficiently and effectively organize and deliver the work of our school staff and community service providers.

Ultimately, the goal of support services is to make each and every Pittsburgh Public School student "Pittsburgh Promise Ready." This cannot become a reality until each child's needs are addressed and barriers to learning due to non-attendance, misconduct, poor achievement or social/emotional struggles are removed. In addition, prevention education must be provided to teach students how to behave, how to problem-solve and how to interact with their peers in a safe, healthy and non-violent manner.

#### 40. Amendment/Malcolm Thomas

RESOLVED, That the Board amend an item previously adopted by the Board of Directors Committee on Education on August 26, 2009. Item # 35.

#### **Original Minute:**

Malcolm Thomas - That the Board enter into a contract with Malcolm Thomas to provide a positive African American male role model for at-risk African American males attending Pittsburgh Arsenal Pre K-5. Mr. Malcolm Thomas has specialized training in building male leadership skills and critical thinking skills as it relates to problem solving and developing intrinsic motivation and interest about school and academic progress. This contract will assist in developing positive African American males that will be able to make better choices and possess the behavioral and academic skills needed to remain in school and become "Promise Ready." Students will be taught various character traits and engage in activities that help them to discover and understand the person they are and who they can become. They will also engage in goal setting, become more knowledgeable about what it means to be a man, discuss scenarios about school and home, role play about making decisions, and learn to play chess which teaches critical thinking, raises one's IQ, and reasoning skills. The operating period shall be from October 1, 2009 to June 4, 2010. The rate of payment shall be \$31.50 per 330 hours, total cost shall not exceed \$10,395 payable from account #4108-16H-2160-330.

#### **Amended Minute:**

Malcolm Thomas - That the Board enter into a contract with Malcolm Thomas to provide a positive African American male role model for at-risk African American males attending Pittsburgh Arsenal Pre K-5. Mr. Malcolm Thomas has specialized training in building male leadership skills and critical thinking skills as it relates to problem solving and developing intrinsic motivation and interest about school and academic progress. This contract will assist in developing positive African American males that will be able to make better choices and possess the behavioral and academic skills needed to remain in school and become "Promise Ready." Students will be taught various character traits and engage in activities that help them to discover and understand the person they are and who they can become. They will also engage in goal setting, become more knowledgeable about what it means to be a man, discuss scenarios about school and home, role play about making decisions, and learn to play chess which teaches critical thinking, raises one's IQ, and reasoning skills. The projected funding source is no longer available and the hours of the program have decreased from 330 hours to 165 hours.

#### 41. Agreement with UCP Kids Pittsburgh

RESOLVED, That the Board approve this request for PSE to cooperatively and collaboratively continue the agreement with UCP Kids Pittsburgh. This agreement includes strategizing effective ways and means to build more inclusive classrooms and schools and building a school community where all children are included and valued. PSE and UCP Kids Pittsburgh staff will support teaching teams including general education teachers, special education teachers and inclusion facilitators to promote a teaching model developed by the UCP Kids Pittsburgh called "Social Academics." Social Academics introduces the concept of building classrooms as communities. This program will take place in a total of 5 classrooms to be identified by the Program for Students with Exceptionalities and UCP Kids Pittsburgh as well as some staff training at the

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Greenway Professional Education Center. Each classroom will include several students with IEP's and UCP Kids Pittsburgh will support the teachers in making any necessary adaptations for students with IEP's so that they can fully participate in activities and discussions.

There is no cost for this action. This program is funded with a grant from the FISA Foundation to UCP Kids Pittsburgh.

#### 42. Donation/UPMC School Tools Campaign

RESOLVED, That the Board approve the acceptance of a donation of \$3,000 of school supplies for the eighth consecutive year from UPMC's annual employeedriven "UPMC School Tools Campaign." The 2009 "UPMC School Tools Campaign" was conducted at nine UPMC corporate unit sites that elected to participate in this effort: (1.) UPMC Presbyterian, (2.) UPMC Shadyside, (3.) UPMC Health Plan, (4.) Magee Women's, (5.) UPMC Corporate Services, (6.) Hillman Cancer Center, (7.) Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic, (8.) UPMC Quantum One (South Side), and (9.) Sherwood Oaks Assisted Living (UPMC Senior Communities).

Donations were delivered to six Pittsburgh Public Schools located in the neighborhoods of these participating UPMC sites: (1.) Pittsburgh Arsenal PreK-5, (2.) Pittsburgh Lincoln Primary Campus K-4, (3.) Pittsburgh Faison Primary Campus K-4, (4.) Pittsburgh Fort- Pitt PreK-5, (5.) Pittsburgh Woolslair K-5, and (6.) Pittsburgh King K-8. Each donation box contained various schools supplies, such as notebooks, paper, binders, pens & pencils, markers, crayons, book covers, and book bags. (Please see attached document for full list of donated goods.) Each donation box is valued at \$50. The total of this donation is \$3,000 (60 boxes @ \$50/box).

That the Board of Education extends its sincere appreciation and warm thanks to UPMC and its employees for providing our students and schools with this donation, and also to Sally S. Johnson, UPMC Presbyterian Shadyside's Community Relations Coordiator, who liaised with the District and the various UPMC sites in order to make this donation possible for our students.

#### 43. Donation/Pittsburgh Linden

RESOLVED, That the Board the Board accept a donation of \$1,000 from Mr. & Mrs. Jerome Pesenti, the parents of a kindergarten student at **Pittsburgh Linden K-5**. The donation will support the purchase of Lakeshore learning materials to enhance reading achievement and facilitate whole and small group instruction. The Board extends its sincere appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Pesenti for this gift.

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Lakeshore learning materials to be purchased:

- (1) Alphabet Sounds Teaching Tubs and storage unit;
- (2) Lakeshore Listening Center (a hardwood center for headphones, an 8-station junction box with volume controls and storage space for cassettes and CDs);
- (3) All-Purpose Teaching Easel; and
- (4) Student Work Organizer (storage space for students' work and homework folders).

#### 44. Donation/Opera Theater of Pittsburgh/700 Tickets

RESOLVED, That the Board accept the donation of 700 tickets valued at \$15 apiece, a total of \$10,500, for District high school choral students to attend the Opera Theater of Pittsburgh's Student Matinée Performances of the Beggar's Holiday--a collaboration with Manchester Craftsman's Guild, featuring the jazz music of Duke Ellington and Pittsburgh native Billy Strayhorn. Bus transportation for students is provided for and paid by the Opera Theater. Dates of the Student Matinée Performances are Dec. 16 and 17, 2009. If an additional date is needed, students may attend an open rehearsal on Dec. 15.

In addition to attending the performance, students and teachers also will benefit from an interactive pre-session with Opera Theater Resident Artist Christina Farrell, a professional opera singer. This educational outreach piece is provided at no cost to the District. Beginning three weeks prior to the actual performance, Ms. Farrell will travel across all participating schools to offer two interactive sessions (for each school) that explore the themes of the opera. Pittsburgh's place in the history of jazz, and African-American contributions to musical drama. Students will gain a greater understanding of opera as an evolving art form that often incorporates musical forms such as jazz or folk music, and they will complete an evaluation that reflects on their experience with Beggar's Holiday. Ms. Farrell will begin this work three weeks ahead of the actual performances. District choral music teachers will be able to extend learning further by continuing to explore the opera's themes across other areas of music, history, language arts and cultural studies their students are engaged in as part of the District's regular curriculum. The District's Curriculum Supervisor for the Arts & Humanities, Dr. Cornelia Davis, has worked closely with Ms. Farrell and the Opera Theater to review the libretto and staging for appropriateness and for alignment to District curriculum and requirements for students.

#### 45. African American Literature Instructional Material

RESOLVED, That the Board on October 21st, 2009 legislative action per action item #26, the Board approved the 12th grade African-American literature course. A selection committee convened on October 22nd, 29th, and November 3rd from 4:00 - 6:30 to review the core texts suggested for the course. A rigorous text selection criteria rating form was used to evaluate and discuss the proposed texts/novels. The committee has approved and recommended the following

novels for the African-American literature course: A Mercy by Toni Morrison, Kindred by Octavia Butler, Flyin' West by Pearl Cleage, Blood on the Forge by William Attaway, Notes of a Native Son and No Name in the Street by James Baldwin, Gem of the Ocean and Two Trains Running by August Wilson, and Passing by Nella Larsen. The text selection committee was composed of 9 teachers, 8 administrators, and 3 parents of students in the PPS, and 2 community representatives. The committee also supported the development of a customized anthology for this course which will contain supplemental texts to accompany the approved novels. There are three novels that remain undetermined for the course. December 17th has been designated as an additional textbook committee meeting date to review any new texts that the curriculum committee suggests for the course. The cost of core novels, the customized anthology, and any additional instructional materials will be dependent upon the number of sections of the course that will be offered across high schools in the district. It is anticipated that instructional materials will not exceed \$150,000 from the textbook budget.

The total cost shall not exceed \$150,000 payable from account #4000-010-1100-640.

#### 46. Pittsburgh Brashear/Europe Trip

RESOLVED. That the Board approve travel abroad to Europe during the spring of 2010 for the students of Pittsburgh Brashear. This educational trip is open to all students of Pittsburgh Brashear. Fourteen students and two chaperones have already signed up to participate during next year's spring break and more students and staff members are interested. Preparation for the trip is goaloriented; students get a tremendous sense of accomplishment when working to earn the money to pay for the trip and when applying themselves in the target language to have a better sense of the language and culture. Students develop a better appreciation for the differences and the similarities between the cultures of our country and the foreign land from an economic, historical and sociological perspective. Trips such as these heighten their tolerance and perspective of others not only in a different culture but translate into the same for people here at home. The dates for the trip are March 25, 2010 to April 4, 2010. Students will obtain passports prior to the trip. Parents are being notified of all travel arrangements through meetings and emails. Meetings have been held on February 23, 2009, March 23, 2009, May 4, 2009, September 22, 2009, September 30, 2009, and October 14, 2009 for interested students and parents.

The cost per student is \$2,604. Students can participate in fundraisers to raise funds to pay for their trip. A payment plan will be arranged for students through the tour group. If a student defaults on the payment plan they will be able to receive money back. All costs will be absorbed solely by students. There will be no cost to the district.

#### 47. Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation

RESOLVED, That the Board approve the middle school students at **Pittsburgh Murray Accelerated Learning Academy Pre K-8** to participate in a computer camp held on the Duquesne University campus. Under the tutelage of Duquesne University staff and supplied with computer equipment provided by the Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation, students will learn to assemble computers, install and utilize software, and perform other functions. At the conclusion of the eight-week cycle, student participants will have earned ownership of their computers.

This is a computer camp for underprivileged students. The program involves 25 middle school students and eight parents. Students are selected based on grades, behavior, SES, and attendance. The program is for eight weeks on Saturdays beginning January 24, 2010 through March 28, 2010, 10:00 am - 2:00 pm. Lunch and transportation will be provided for students and their parents by Duquesne University. This program is at no cost to the District.

#### 48. Pittsburgh Technical Institute

RESOLVED, That the Board authorize to extend the articulation agreement between the Pittsburgh Public School (PPS) District's Accounting, Business, and Information Technology programs to also include articulated credits from Pittsburgh Technical Institute towards the PPS Health Technology program. In a combined effort to better advance these students as well as to improve the positive growth of the Health Technology program, an Articulation Agreement will be in effect. Pittsburgh Technical Institute will offer advanced standing in the form of 24 credits, which equates to a savings of approximately \$6,400 to students entering the Health Technology program.

The students in the Health Technology program must meet the following criteria:

- 1. Students must meet admissions criteria of Pittsburgh Technical Institute.
- 2. The applicant must have achieved a "B" or better average in his/her Health Technology course while a student in the Pittsburgh Public Schools Career and Technical Education program. Plus, score an 80% or above on final course examination at PTI.

This agreement will be in effect for one year from the date of origination and may be reviewed for changes and renewal at that time. This will be at no cost to the board.

#### 49. Partnership McGowan Institute

RESOLVED, That the Board continues efforts to reach out to the engineering and health industry to cultivate a partnership between McGowan Institute and the Pittsburgh Public Schools Career and Technical Education (CTE) Department.

Kate Lewis, representing McGowan Institute, has agreed to guide the long-term delivery of Career and Technical Education by serving on the Occupational Advisory and Executive Local Advisory Committees.

Kate Lewis, representing McGowan Institute, will participate as a classroom speaker, will assist on a panel to review graduation project presentations, will serve as an end of program assessment evaluator, and also as an e-mentor understanding that clearances are necessary before beginning the program.

Ms. Lewis has volunteered to help establish an incentive plan to reward outstanding CTE students across the district, to also donate tools, reference materials or other supplies to a related CTE, to host a field trip to the McGowan Institute for interested students to gain knowledge around appropriate dress and behavior and to broaden their horizons of careers available in Pittsburgh. Ms. Lewis has also agreed to promote CTE at a Career Fair and to participate in Educator in the Workplace event. This will be at no cost to the board.

#### 50. Partnership Alcosan

RESOLVED, That the Board continues efforts to reach out to the business industry to cultivate partnerships for the Career and Technical Education (CTE) Department. Twila Simmons-Walker, representing the Allegheny County Sanitary Authority (Alcosan), has agreed to serve as a member of our Executive Local Advisory Board and has agreed to serve on our Occupational Advisory Board. Mrs. Simmons-Walker has also agreed to help guide the long term delivery of Career and Technical Education (CTE) in the Pittsburgh Public School District.

Twila Simmons-Walker, representing Alcosan, will participate as a guest speaker, will serve on a review panel for a graduation project presentation, and will host field trips to the Alcosan water treatment plant for interested students to gain knowledge and to broaden their horizons in the workplace atmosphere. Mrs. Simmons-Walker has also agreed to promote Career and Technical Education at a Career Fair, sponsor an after school or summer internship program, and participate in Educator in the Workplace event. This will be at no cost to the board.

## 51. Agreement Career Training Academy

RESOLVED, That the Board enter into an agreement between Career Training Academy and the Pittsburgh Public School (PPS) District's Health Technology program. In a combined effort to better advance these students as well as to improve the positive growth of the information in the health industry, an Articulation Agreement will be in effect. Career Training Academy will offer advanced standing in the form of 40 credits. This results in a savings of approximately \$1,350 towards an Associate in Specialized Technology Degree.

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The students in the PPS health program must meet the following criteria:

The student will have achieved, within their technical program, a minimum of 80%, or the equivalent of a B average. Credit for the applicable articulated courses shall be awarded upon receipt of the official high school transcript. This articulation agreement will be at no cost to the board.

#### 52. The Challenge Program/TCP

RESOLVED, That the Board partner with The Challenge Program, Inc. (TCP). TCP is specifically designed to build a bridge between students in high school and the business community by providing incentives to students for successes they achieve while in school. High school students are encouraged to perform well and are rewarded in the following four categories:

Most Improved Academically – demonstrating hard work
Best Attendance – acknowledging dedication
Most Community Service – indicating the willingness to give back
Best Overall GPA – signifying top performance

TCP will reward each participating student \$250 for his or her efforts. All awards will be distributed by TCP directly to the students. The Secondary Schools within the Pittsburgh Public Schools who have opted to participate in this program for the 2009-10: Pittsburgh Allderdice, Pittsburgh Carrick, Pittsburgh CAPA, Pittsburgh Langley, Pittsburgh Perry, Pittsburgh Schenley, and Pittsburgh Westinghouse.

#### 52A. Donation from Pottersville Pictures

RESOLVED, That the Board accept a donation of \$1,000 from Pottersville Pictures to Pittsburgh Schenley High School in recognition of Schenley students' appearing in the film, Love and Other Drugs, starring Jake Gyllenhaal and Anne Hathaway and directed by Oscar winner Ed Zwick. Pottersville Pictures has requested that Pittsburgh Schenley's Film IB students take part in the auditorium scene at Connelly on November 18, 2009. The film students are going to be playing a high school class that is hearing a lecture from Jake Gyllenhaal's character on the warning signs of depression. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for the students to see a major motion picture being filmed and actually be in the movie. All clearances and permission forms have been signed by each student's parent/guardian. Monies received will help defray the costs of video equipment used by Pittsburgh Schenley's IB Film classes.

#### 52B. <u>Donation from Gleason Insurance</u>

RESOLVED: That the Board of Education accept a donation of four (4) winter coats valued in total at \$120 to be awarded to District students in need. This

donation is made by Gleason Insurance as part of the Coats for Kids project in which Gleason participates. The Coats for Kids project includes numerous school districts. Accordingly, the high volume of coat purchases made in order to provide donations to these school districts results in a deep discount being given to Gleason so that coats are effectively purchased at a nominal amount for the most basic costs of creating the coat, rather than full retail prices. This enables a greater number of donations to be made to a greater number of districts and their students.

Under the direction of Dr. Linda Lane, four children in need were identified through District records to receive this donation of winter coats. Dr. Lane and her Academic Cabinet worked directly with the donor to ensure each child's coat size and preferences in selection were made available to the donor so that coats may be acquired. Dr. Lane's team also will work with the donor to ensure the coats are delivered to the students without compromising the students' and families' privacy.

FINALLY RESOLVED: That the Board of Education extends its sincere thanks and appreciation to Gleason Insurance for its very kind donation of winter coats to our students.

#### INTRODUCTION

#### **About the Partnership**

The Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation: Pittsburgh Big Six Partnership (Foundation) is assembled to further the mission and goals of the Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation which "is dedicated to improving the overall quality of life for troubled and underprivileged inner-city youth." Specifically, the partnership seeks to assist the Foundation in realizing its stated objectives to:

- increase computer knowledge
- increase access to technology between youth and their families
- increase excellence in and out of the classroom
- build trust and confidence in youth participants
- increase computer ownership in low-income areas (Foundation Description 3)

In brief, middle school students will participate in a computer camp held on the Duquesne University campus. Under the tutelage of Duquesne University staff and supplied with computer equipment provided by the Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation, students will learn to assemble computers, install and utilize software, and perform other functions. At the conclusion of the eight-week cycle, student participants will have earned ownership of their computers.

#### **About the Partners**

The major members of the partnership include the Jerome Bettis the Bus Stops Here Foundation, Duquesne University, the administration of the Pittsburgh Public Schools, the participating middle school, the parents of participating students, and the participating students. All of these members play vital roles, and all of these members are needed to make the Pittsburgh Big Six Partnership operate successfully and long term.

#### **About the Roles of the Partners**

Below are descriptions of the contributions to be made by the partners.

Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation: Supply computers and other contributions deemed appropriate by the Foundation.

Pittsburgh Public Schools: Identify or authorize the participation of the middle school partner(s).

Participating Middle School: Identify 25 students, 8 parents, one teacher.

Parents of Participating Students: Provide on-going support of the computer camp by encouraging students in their work in the computer camp and attending parent meetings.

Participating Students: Attend all computer camp labs and other activities and do the best work possible.

Duquesne University: Provide lead faculty and tutors. Plan and implement activities—lab, field trips, lunch, meetings, etc.

#### **CURRICULUM FOR AN EIGHT-WEEK CYCLE**

As a means to invoke and maintain student interest, the students will be engaged in an activity that is "close to their hearts"—an activity that will be about and will involve their families. Students will be engaged in digital story telling.

The digital story telling project will evolve over the eight-week period culminating in the students' presentations the last session of the computer camp.

Curricular learning goals related to information and use of Windows, Office — Suite Word, PowerPoint, and Excel — will be woven into the digital story telling experiential activity. Students will build their stories starting with the first computer camp lab session aimed at getting the students familiar and comfortable with the computer.

In the first lab session, students will begin to learn to draw pictures, harvest pictures, access music, record their voices, etc. Students throughout the eight weeks of the camp will continue to utilize and build their computer skills. Very importantly students will develop a clear sense of purpose relative to the acquisition of the information they will be learning, for it will quickly become evident to them that completing all facets of their digital story telling project will be contingent upon their learning the curriculum.

Students are to build a computer using the following parts:

- 1. case
- 2. motherboard/fans
- 3. hard drives
- 4. cables
- 5. electrical connection and wiring

Students are to learn the following:

- 1. hardware installation
- 2. proper technology terminology

- 3. proper hardware identification
- 4. to magnetize screwdrivers
- 5. software installation and training
- 6. importance of the Windows operating system via demonstration of its disk and emphasizing the product code keys
- 7. Windows, Word, Office Suite, PowerPoint, and Excel
- 8. how to surf the Internet in a positive way that will assist them in their school work
- 9. safe computing—developing good habits

#### LESSON PLANS JANUARY – MARCH 2010

#### **WEEK ONE (JANUARY 24) CONTENT**

- Expose students to multi-media.
- Introduce students to the eight-week project: digital story telling.
- Note focus of story: "My Family and Me."
- Activities include: harvesting pictures, voice recording, music activity, merging pictures with music.
- Discuss internet safety and netiquette: internet ethics.
- Begin use of digital recorders: students interview each other.
- Students will begin to learn terminology.

#### **WEEK TWO (JANUARY 31) CONTENT**

- Review material from previous week.

- Students will upload media files from their recorders to the computer: information from their interviews of older people.
- Students will continue to write about themselves (Word).
- Students will continue to organize (Windows) their pictures.
- Students will learn PowerPoint and begin to plan their presentations based upon their digital story telling.
- Students will write interview questions (Word).
- Students will interview young people for next week.
- Students will use the internet to locate information for their story.
- Students will review their computer terminology and add to their bank of words.

#### **WEEK FOUR (FEBRUARY 13) CONTENT**

- Review material from previous weeks.
- Activities include: organizing pictures (Windows) and harvesting additional ones, merging pictures and music.

#### Background

As stated within the Program Description of the Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation: The Pittsburgh Big Six Partnership, the partnership is assembled to further the mission and goals of the Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation. The Foundation's literature describes the mission as being

...dedicated to improving the overall quality of life for troubled and underprivileged inner city youth...by providing financial resources, educational, mentoring, and recreational programs that will assist youth in learning to distinguish between healthy and unhealthy choices.... On this foundation, self-esteem, responsibility, education and ultimately employability will be accomplished.

Based upon the Foundation's preferred structure, the accomplishment of these goals results from middle school students, under the tutelage of Duquesne University staff and supplied with computer equipment provided by the Foundation, learning to assemble the computer, install and utilize software, and perform other functions. At the conclusion of each eight-week cycle, student participants will have earned ownership of the computers.

Dubbed the Pittsburgh Big Six Partnership, the participants in this enterprise are the Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation, the Pittsburgh Public Schools, a selected middle school, the students and parents of the middle school, and Duquesne University. Our computer campers have a full schedule each Saturday on the Duquesne University compus.

#### Camp Structure

Students arrived on Duquesne's campus at 10:00 AM to begin their instruction, break for an hour's lunch at 11:30, and ended their day at 2:00. A university professor from the School of Business and Administration serve as instructor for both semesters, providing expert instruction in both content and in making strong connections with students affectively. Duquesne University students and full-time employees from the Michael P. Weber Learning Skills Center work as tutors, ranging in number between 8 and 10 each Saturday, providing instructional support and mentoring.

During both academic years, 2007-08 and 2008-09, students met the curricular goals. Specifically, students learned to build a computer and to install hardware and software; learned technology terminology; learned how to safely surf the internet by developing

good computer use habits; learned Windows operating systems and other software programs.

The culminating point of the camp each year was the Student Presentations and Awards Ceremony. Each student delivered a PowerPoint presentation. One of the most poignant parts of the program was the demonstrated student development. Students showed the knowledge they had acquired as displayed in their PowerPoint products but also in their poised delivery. Both academic years friends and family members turned out in sizeable numbers to support them.

#### Accomplishments

The computer camp functioned for two academic years in the manner described above. A total of 76 students completed the camp having benefited from the educational experience and exposure to a University campus for eight weeks. All students also gained the grand prize of ownership of a computer. The first year's middle school partner was Weil ALA. The middle school partner for 2008-2009 was Pittsburgh Rooney ALA.

Pittsburgh media—newspapers and television—provided coverage of a media event that was held in June of this year on Duquesne's campus. During this event, Mr. Bettis addressed parents and students and computers were distributed to families.

The Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation provided tremendous financial support. The foundation purchased computers for all student participants as well as covering the instructional costs for the University professor and tutors. Duquesne University's contribution through the Michael P. Weber Learning Skills Center were bus transportation for students each week; lunches each week for students and tutors; meals for orientation sessions and presentation and award ceremonies; and equipment for students, which included cordless headsets with microphones, digital recorders, flash drives, and digital cameras; and totes for students.

Last year the partnership identified parental participation as an area in which it wished to improve. Fall and spring semester camps enjoyed increased parent participation.

  - 1) Decision Making In Conflict Situations

The trainings will provide experiential workshops that will teach skills crucial to resolving conflicts. Total payment shall not exceed \$1,500 from account line 2700-010-2340-599.

8. **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to make payment to Career Development Center (CDC), a non-profit organization which specializes in outplacement services. The City shall be paid after the services are rendered as per invoices submitted on a monthly basis. The dates of operation are from January 1, 2010 to December 31, 2010. Total cost shall not exceed \$50,000.00 from account line 3200-010-2823-340.

7. **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to enter into an agreement with The Roman Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh Resurrection Parish, to lease two (2) classrooms and two additional rooms for ancillary space to house Early Childhood classrooms. On November 5<sup>th</sup>, the Superintendent provided the recommendation of **Pittsburgh Science and Technology Academy** based upon this name having attained the highest number of votes from the school group convened on October 19<sup>th</sup>, which included school staff, students, parents and community members.

The equipment is 16 processors connected by Ethernet cables for parallel processing. It is in great condition, fully functional, and self contained in one seven foot rack. Professor Ken Jordan has offered support in getting it running after the move to SciTech.

There is no service agreement with this equipment. Repair costs are expected to be zero - if a node fails it will not be repaired, the processing will just occur with one less node. The equipment requires limited local connectivity in so much as students will control the system (run programs) using their laptops.

As research equipment the rack of processors is obsolete. Its estimated value is \$9,000.

The donation of the equipment will be authorized by an appropriate representative of the University of Pittsburgh.

#### 12 MONTH ROLLFORWARD

- During the 12 month period ending October 31, 2009, total general fund balance increased by \$3.6 million to \$110.1 million.
- The District's general fund cash position increased by \$3.7 million to \$142.3 million, which reflects the receipt of State funding in October.

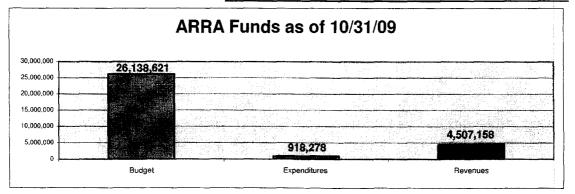
#### **GENERAL FUND**

- Actual revenues exceeded expenditures by \$38.4 million, which was \$10.4 million better than as expected:
  - Revenues as a whole trailed the year to date budget by \$1.4 million or .32%. If interest rates were only 75 basis points higher we would have met our goal.
  - We continue to see positive trends in Expenditures. Expenditures as a whole were \$11 million or 2.89% less than the year to date budget. Tax refunds, benefits, and transportation continue to lead the way.

- 4 Mr. Taylor has represented District 1 on
- 5 the Pittsburgh Board of Public Education since 1997.
- A life-long Pittsburgh resident, Mr. Taylor
- 7 attended Baxter and Dilworth Elementary Schools,
- 8 graduating from Peabody High School and the University
- 9 of Pittsburgh.
- 10 Mr. Taylor has served as first vice
- 11 president and as the chair of the Committees for
- 12 Business Affairs and Technology, Equity and
- 13 Compliance, Student Service, and Government Relations,
- 14 as well as vice chair of Pupil Services. In addition,
- 15 he has been a member of the Negotiations, Education,

    Mr. Sumpter to please share our core beliefs and
18
    commitments.
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- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, very much,
- 20 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- The Pittsburgh Board of Education is
- 22 committed. We believe we have set forth goals that we
- 23 want to make sure that every, all, each, no matter who
- 24 they are, where they are, where they come from, or
- 25 what they do, that any student, child that enters the

- 1 Pittsburgh Public School System, that we will maximize
- 2 their achievement to the highest level; that we will
- 3 educate them to their highest level of achievement.
- 4 We want to make sure that that is carried
- 5 out in a safe and orderly environment; a safe
- 6 environment for teachers, a safe environment for
- 7 students, a safe environment for all employees,
- 8 because that's conducive to learning.
- 9 We are committed to making sure that we
- 10 effectively and efficiently support that operation.
- We are committed to ensuring that all
- 12 resources are distributed in an equitable manner.
- And we want to improve, encourage,
- 14 stimulate, reinvigorate public confidence, and
- 15 community and parent engagement with this District.
- All of those together will ensure that we
- 17 carry out our mission as Board of Directors for this
- 18 School District, the City of Pittsburgh, and that we
- 19 realize our mission of educating all students.
- Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Sumpter.
- I'd like to have a motion to approve the
- 23 minutes of the October 21st, 2009 legislative meeting.
- MR. McCREA: So move.
- MS. FINK: Second.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 2 All these in favor, please signify by
- 3 saying aye.
- 4 (Thereupon, there was a chorus of ayes.)
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Any opposed, same sign?
- 6 (No response.)
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: The minutes stand approved.
- At this time I would like to read the
- 9 executive session statement.
- 10 (Mrs. Colaizzi read from written material.)
- MS. COLAIZZI: If I may ask my colleagues
- 12 to please turn to the Committee on Education that is
- 13 before you, submitted by Mr. Sumpter, the chair.
- 14 If you would please turn to page 27 of 27
- 15 of the report, I'd like to give you the student
- 16 suspensions, transfers and expulsions numbers for this
- 17 month.
- 18 53 students suspended for four to ten days.
- 2ero students suspended for four to ten
- 20 days and transferred to another Pittsburgh Public
- 21 School.
- 22 Six students expelled out of school for
- 23 11 days or more.
- And zero students expelled out of school
- 25 for 11 days or more and transferred to another

- 1 Pittsburgh Public School.
- 2 Are there any questions or comments on the
- 3 Committee Report of Education, that were not addressed
- 4 at agenda review?
- 5 Dr. Allen?
- 6 DR. ALLEN: No further questions.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley?
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I have just a quick
- 9 comment on No. 53.
- I will be voting no for the student
- 11 suspension, and transfers, and expulsions.
- When there is some inconsistency as to how
- 13 we discipline certain students, I think it's not a
- 14 good thing; not necessarily pointing fingers, but we
- 15 have to get that right when we discipline students ten
- 16 days plus expulsions, or whatever.
- 17 It's not a good thing.
- So I will be voting no for that segment.
- The other question I have is on No. 26, and
- 20 this is the new teacher project and, Mark, I just
- 21 wanted to ask you a question, this is -- is this --
- 22 these are funds from the Gates Program, or the Gates
- 23 Grant, or is it tied with it?
- Why don't you, somebody --
- 25 MR. ROOSEVELT: These are funds from the

- 1 Gates Grant.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- 3 So we physically have received the moneys
- 4 already?
- 5 MR. ROOSEVELT: I don't know if the
- 6 transfer of funds to the Pittsburgh Foundation has
- 7 occurred, but these will be expended from that fund.
- I believe they have, actually, been
- 9 received now at the Pittsburgh Foundation, I'm being
- 10 told.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- I just wanted to ask, I have been reading
- 13 bits and pieces in the paper, that there is still a
- 14 lot of more work to go in terms of the finalization of
- 15 this program, especially an agreement with the PFT.
- 16 Can you take a moment to speak about that,
- 17 and more importantly, would it not have been a little
- 18 better had we had those things in order prior to our
- 19 accepting, and kind of celebrating it?
- MR. ROOSEVELT: It would have been
- 21 impossible, sir.
- The items in the agreement that need to be
- 23 collective bargained, need to be collective bargained
- 24 with the teachers now at this time, but they needed to
- 25 be agreed to before that. No agreement with the Gates

- 1 Foundation could have been halted, or postponed, until
- 2 collective bargaining was completed.
- And actually, this sets the stage well, for
- 4 the collective bargaining process, because we all know
- 5 what is at stake.
- But this particular item, and the work that
- 7 the new teacher project will be doing, is work that is
- 8 not subject to collective bargaining.
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- 10 And I don't know if I made myself clear, I
- 11 guess I was mainly speaking about the agreements with
- 12 PFT first, and having those things in order prior to
- 13 moving forward, and starting the project.
- 14 Because we still have some --
- MR. ROOSEVELT: We do, but that could not
- 16 have been done before.
- MR. BRENTLEY: It couldn't?
- MR. ROOSEVELT: No, it couldn't.
- I mean, it would have been -- I mean, we
- 20 needed to make an agreement with the foundation, which
- 21 the PFT leadership has signed onto, and now we have to
- 22 collectively bargain the things that need to be
- 23 collectively bargained.
- But, no, they would not have postponed
- 25 their grant-making process, in order to have us go

- 1 through that process.
- 2 The other districts who have also received
- 3 the awards, that have unions, are in the exact same
- 4 position as us, they now have to move that work to
- 5 collective bargaining.
- I don't know what percentage of the plan
- 7 requires collective bargaining, whether it is 30 or
- 8 40 percent, but all of us are in that very same
- 9 position.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- 11 Well, I -- you know, I just -- and I
- 12 realize they couldn't move things back, but it would
- 13 have been, I think, helpful had we been able to
- 14 announce that everything is right, and everything is
- 15 in order.
- I mean, there are some possibilities that
- 17 there may be some concerns that have not been
- 18 addressed, and you just -- you just don't want to have
- 19 to go back and kind of rehash some things that I think
- 20 should have been addressed early on.
- But let me move on.
- The physical moneys from the grant
- 23 proposal, is -- was given to the foundations, and it's
- 24 already in their possession?
- MR. ROOSEVELT: It is a six year funding

- 1 cycle, and there are different allotments of money
- 2 that come at different times.
- 3 There is a first sum of money that will be
- 4 paid to the Pittsburgh Foundation, which is the fiscal
- 5 agent, the holding agent for the money, and has
- 6 already been received, and at different times during
- 7 the different periods during the six years other sums
- 8 of money will be received, that contribute to this, if
- 9 we have met certain measurable outcomes that are in
- 10 the agreement.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I guess my question
- 12 is, is that is there a reason why the money could not
- 13 have been given directly to the Pittsburgh District.
- 14 We have one of the --
- MR. ROOSEVELT: Yes. It is not the way the
- 16 Gates Foundation does their granting process, they do
- 17 not give the money directly to districts.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- 19 Should that have been a decision that the
- 20 Board should have either discussed prior to that, or
- 21 at least been informed -- I read it in the newspaper,
- 22 so I -- you know what I mean.
- And not to mention that we have just within
- 24 the last four months, I mean, we have been able to
- 25 bring Mr. Berdnik before the public, and to

- 1 acknowledge his management of the fiscal side of this
- 2 District, and his staff has been top notch, and I am
- 3 just wondering why those dollars could not have been
- 4 given directly to the District, for its management.
- 5 MR. ROOSEVELT: As I said, Mr. Brentley,
- 6 that is not the practice of the Gates Foundation, and
- 7 it was indeed in the resolutions that you voted for,
- 8 so you were aware of it.
- 9 And you did vote --
- MR. BRENTLEY: The day of.
- MR. ROOSEVELT: No, in the resolutions in
- 12 both steps, when you did the request for proposal, and
- 13 when you accepted it.
- It was in both resolutions, that this money
- 15 would be housed at the fiduciary agent, which is the
- 16 Pittsburgh Foundation.
- 17 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- I -- I -- you know, as I mentioned, I mean,
- 19 I read it in the newspaper the day after, it could
- 20 have been, I think, something that we could have had
- 21 some say so, as a Board. That's a very, very
- 22 important piece.
- 23 I thought it was going to be, as most
- 24 grants, you know, given to our -- to the District, and
- 25 then we would then manage.

- 1 My concern is, as when I heard or read in
- 2 the paper, is -- is do we have any kind of commitment
- 3 from the foundation community for the next six years
- 4 that if there are any conflicts, that they would deal
- 5 directly with the District?
- 6 Let me explain that even better.
- 7 Years ago, previous administration, it was
- 8 the same foundation community --
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley, is that
- 10 something in the agenda for this evening?
- MR. BRENTLEY: No, no, but it is related to
- 12 this.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Well, could you -- could you
- 14 stay focused on the item itself, sir, because --
- MR. BRENTLEY: I am. I am going to finish
- 16 my thought here.
- But what happened back then was, you know,
- 18 there was an announcement of pulling dollars out of
- 19 the District, that made the District, you know, kind
- 20 of -- it raised some concern.
- 21 So my question is: What commitments do we
- 22 have, if any, from the foundation community, in terms
- 23 of these dollars, that if something doesn't go right,
- 24 that they can't hold the money, or stop the money;
- 25 that it would continue to flow, and we would have --

- 1 we, meaning the Board, would have some say so in those
- 2 dollars?
- 3 MR. ROOSEVELT: Mr. Brentley, there is a
- 4 legally binding agreement here, and the Gates
- 5 Foundation does have moments in the grant when, if we
- 6 have not met measurable outcomes, they can rescind the
- 7 grant.
- A grant of this size and magnitude is not
- 9 granted to districts to expend as they wish, or to
- 10 fail to meet certain measurable incomes, and still
- 11 receive.
- 12 And that is understood.
- The Pittsburgh Foundation does not have
- 14 that right. They are just a holding agent for the
- 15 money.
- But the Gates Foundation, per the
- 17 agreement, can, at different points, ascertain the
- 18 District has failed to meet some of the commitments
- 19 that we have made, and then indeed they could rescind.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I understand that.
- I just wanted to get our understanding with
- 22 the foundations, and the District, on how those things
- 23 would operate.
- And so I think that would even be a helpful
- 25 piece to share at some point in detail. I know it

- 1 would be helpful for me, but also the public, so that
- 2 we won't go back to what happened many, many years
- 3 ago, in terms of cutting off dollars, and then making
- 4 things look extremely difficult for us.
- 5 Thank you.
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 7 Mrs. Fink, do you have any questions in the
- 8 report?
- 9 MS. FINK: No, I'm fine.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Hazuda?
- MS. HAZUDA: I just want to comment, and
- 12 congratulate the Beechwood School on their grandt from
- 13 the Pennsylvania Department of Education. They were
- 14 chosen as the 2001 distinguished Title I school, and
- 15 they are the only school in Pittsburgh public schools
- 16 that received that distinction, so I wanted to
- 17 acknowledge that.
- I also was over there last week, and I know
- 19 we are all concerned with the arts in the school.
- 20 They had an artist, in residence, that worked with the
- 21 3rd graders, that designed a picture, and then mounted
- 22 it in little pieces of tile, and there is now this
- 23 huge entry way, this ceramic tile scene that is
- 24 absolutely beautiful. And it was really, it was a
- 25 dedication of it, and the kids were so proud, because

- 1 they knew they did that.
- So, it's -- you know, I just wanted to
- 3 congratulate them, and acknowledge them.
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 5 Mr. McCrea.
- 6 MR. McCREA: I just want to remind you, to
- 7 glance through here, and notice the generosity of
- 8 people in the city towards our students. There is
- 9 some great gifts in here, and many students,
- 10 Mrs. Hazuda has just keyed on some things, very
- 11 positive things. Always keep it positive.
- 12 And just remember, I mean, some of those
- 13 needy children are getting what they really need.
- 14 Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: No.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: No, thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Sumpter?
- MR. SUMPTER: No.
- MR. ROOSEVELT: Mrs. Colaizzi?
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, Mr. Roosevelt.
- MR. ROOSEVELT: Dr. Lane has some language
- 24 that needs to be amended, we apologize, in the item
- 25 that Mr. Brentley had referred to in the new teacher

- 1 project, which she will read.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Please go on.
- BR. LANE: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- The language remains the same, with a
- 5 couple of exceptions.
- No. 3, now reads, "Launching the model
- 7 staffing initiative to provide direct teacher hiring
- 8 support for leaders of 20 to 25 of the hardest to
- 9 staff Pittsburgh Public Schools to help them build
- 10 strong instructional teams before the start of the
- 11 school year, and then working with Pittsburgh Public
- 12 Schools recruiting and staffing to sustain and
- 13 replicate a high quality staffing practices used in
- 14 the hardest to staff schools throughout the entire
- 15 District."
- The only other change, is -- or two other
- 17 changes, I'm sorry.
- 18 Previously we had had an item in of
- 19 advising the District in the operation of the
- 20 Pittsburgh Public Schools, Pittsburgh Federation of
- 21 Teachers Academy, that item is no longer a part of
- 22 this agreement.
- 23 And, the other, the last change is the
- 24 change in the amount, which originally was \$2,700,117
- 25 and no cents, it becomes \$2,771,288 and no cents.

- 1 Payable from the same account, I believe.
- 2 Yes.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Dr. Lane, can I ask you to
- 4 just, for the sake of the record and the Board, to
- 5 make sure that that information is put in our Board
- 6 update so that we can look at that a little clearer.
- 7 Outside of that, is there anything else
- 8 that the staff needs -- that needs to add in?
- 9 No?
- 10 Okay. Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- Based on what Dr. Lane has just provided
- 13 us, my question now is: Does "hard to staff" equate
- 14 with low achievement?
- DR. LANE: We, as a District, have the
- 16 latitude to identify which schools that we would
- 17 consider to be hard to staff.
- In some cases, that might be schools with
- 19 low achievement.
- So, we are going to look and make some
- 21 determinations around what we see as our neediest
- 22 schools, but we will certainly look at past history in
- 23 terms of our ability to find effective and highly
- 24 effective teachers for certain schools, and those
- 25 would be the schools we target.

- 1 MR. SUMPTER: Okay.
- 2 Again, when you talk about hard to staff,
- 3 or hardest to staff, are we incorporating equity in
- 4 that, ensuring that we have the same resources
- 5 throughout the District, say, if it's a -- foreign
- 6 language teachers, or music teachers, gym teachers,
- 7 things of that nature, also, is that included in that
- 8 definition of hardest to staff, or is it just where
- 9 folks don't want to locate?
- DR. LANE: Well, since this work is
- 11 particularly around a particular school, there may be
- 12 positions in those schools that are easier to staff,
- 13 and harder to staff.
- 14 For example, it may be a low achieving
- 15 school, but special education may be even more
- 16 difficult in that school.
- 17 There will be other work that goes on in
- 18 our recruiting plan to address our issues around hard
- 19 to staff subject matter areas, for example, math,
- 20 science, that kind of thing.
- MR. SUMPTER: Okay.
- I know there was a request from Hill
- 23 District Education Council for foreign language to be
- 24 incorporated in those schools, in that district, so
- 25 again, as long as we can incorporate some of the

- 1 concerns we have, if it's hard to get certain type of
- 2 teachers in the District, also, we talk about science
- 3 and math, but also foreign language, to throw that in
- 4 the mix also.
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- If there are no more questions in the
- 7 Committee on Education, may we have a roll call,
- 8 Mr. Weiss.
- 9 MR. WEISS: Dr. Allen?
- DR. ALLEN: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- Excuse me, Mr. Weiss. I want to just,
- 14 please, I do want to vote no on the student numbers,
- 15 in the number of -- No. 53, page 22 of 2 -- 27 of 7,
- 16 thank you.
- 17 MR. ISLER: 27 of 27.
- 18 MR. BRENTLEY: 27 of 27.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Hazuda?
- MS. HAZUDA: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. McCrea?

1 MR. McCREA: Yes. MR. WEISS: Mr. Sumpter? 2 3 MR. SUMPTER: Yes. MR. WEISS: Mr. Taylor. 4 MR. TAYLOR: Yes. 5 MR. WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi? 6 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes. 7 8 MR. WEISS: The report's approved. 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you. 10 We will now move on to the Committee on 11 Business and Finance, submitted by Mr. McCrea, the 12 chair. 13 Are there any questions or comments that 14 were not addressed at agenda review? 15 Dr. Ware -- Dr. Allen, I'm sorry. 16 DR. ALLEN: Does this include the additions 17 and deductions section? 18 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, ma'am, it does. 19 DR. ALLEN: Okay. 20 So I just had a question in terms of add/deduct, just to make sure that they are talking 21 22 about adding expenses, and then deducting expenses 23 from what was originally proposed?

MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.

DR. ALLEN: Okay.

24

25

- And then, so, to make sure that I'm
- 2 understanding, on page 2 it shows, you know, additions
- 3 of roughly 427,000, and then deduct 1.2 million
- 4 and some change, and so would the difference be, you
- 5 know, cost savings of roughly 900,000?
- 6 MR. BERDNIK: One of the change orders is
- 7 driven by the District's actions to remove the
- 8 contractor at University Prep, so I would be hard
- 9 pressed to classify it exactly that way.
- DR. ALLEN: I see that I missed a zero, but
- 11 I know I need to subtract the two together.
- 12 Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. A question on the
- 15 change orders as well.
- And just as a general question,
- 17 Mr. Berdnik, if we are thinking about possible
- 18 changing of schools, or school consolidations,
- 19 wouldn't it make sense to start scaling back on the
- 20 spending?
- We are still seeing primarily certain
- 22 contractors having the ability to come through with
- 23 change orders on pretty large amounts.
- 24 At what point -- and I guess I can direct
- 25 this to you, as well, Mark, at what point will we

- 1 start scaling back on our spending, until there is a
- 2 clear direction on what our plans are for the future,
- 3 for our facilities?
- 4 MR. BERDNIK: Mr. Brentley, I think the
- 5 best indication of our recommendation to scale back,
- 6 the 2010 capital budget as proposed, it will be in the
- 7 proposed budget book released tonight, is just a hair
- 8 over \$30 million. So we will actually be on track to
- 9 pay off more principal next year than we will actually
- 10 issue in debt.
- And as far as the change orders go,
- 12 we're -- our run rate is right at 4 percent, which
- 13 would be the lowest -- I have only looked back about
- 14 four years, but it's even lower than last year.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, you know, I appreciate
- 16 that, but I guess, too, I am -- I would think that we
- 17 would find a way to kind of really put a hold on
- 18 everything, until some clear decisions are made with
- 19 the facilities.
- I mean, to me, that would make sense,
- 21 because if, you know, we are adding, and certain
- 22 things on certain buildings, or doing maintenance, and
- 23 spending dollars, and then if it turns back around
- 24 that it was agreed to close that particular building,
- 25 those, once again -- or to do something different with

- 1 the building, that's money wasted.
- And we have done that already, and it's
- 3 been a waste of taxpayer dollars, going in and
- 4 converting, you know, middle schools to high schools,
- 5 when you add empty schools to do things.
- 6 So I am just -- just waving a flag, when --
- 7 you know, shouldn't we be really careful on how we
- 8 spend, and what we spend, especially during these
- 9 times, in terms of questioning our plan for the
- 10 facilities.
- 11 MS. COLAIZZI: Is that all, Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. We are only going up,
- 13 to, that's --
- MS. COLAIZZI: Just the business section.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Just business. Okay. Okay.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: I'm good, thank you.
- 18 Mrs. Hazuda?
- Mr. McCrea?
- 20 Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- Mrs. Colaizzi, I want to reference the --
- 23 just let me get the agenda item, real quick, on the
- 24 school closing -- I mean on the school renaming.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I can't help you.

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: I lost track of that.
- 2 Oh, here it goes.
- "Resolved, that the Board of Directors of
- 4 the Pittsburgh District, Pittsburgh" --
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Which number is it, sir?
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: Item No. 5, C5. General
- 7 authorizations, C5.
- 8 "Resolved, that the Board of Directors of
- 9 the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper
- 10 officers to officially name the school presently known
- 11 as the Pittsburgh Science and Technology Academy
- 12 6 to 12" -- this is new, I guess it has been changed
- 13 already -- "to the Pittsburgh Science and Technology
- 14 Academy."
- I mean, I'm reading --
- MR. SUMPTER: Go ahead, you are right.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Go ahead.
- MR. TAYLOR: Yeah.
- No, no, what's making me stutter, is it
- 20 appears that it's not -- it is no longer called Frick
- 21 in its name anyway.
- MR. SUMPTER: "Presently known as."
- MR. TAYLOR: Where is that at?
- MS. HAZUDA: First sentence.
- MR. TAYLOR: No.

- MS. COLAIZZI: If we are going to have a
- 2 discussion back and forth --
- MR. TAYLOR: No, what I'm saying is, is --
- 4 and that is part of the biggest point I am making, is
- 5 already we have made moves around school names.
- In this resolution, Frick is not mentioned
- 7 at all, as if it has already been changed, de facto,
- 8 that it's been changed.
- 9 I mean does anybody see Frick mentioned in
- 10 this?
- MS. COLAIZZI: I think you have a valid
- 12 point, but I think that what you need to understand,
- 13 is that is probably just a clerical error.
- 14 It should have been --
- MR. SUMPTER: It says, "presently known
- 16 as."
- MS. COLAIZZI: Known as. But it -- it's
- 18 presently known as --
- MR. SUMPTER: We have been calling it that.
- 20 We were calling it that all along.
- MS. COLAIZZI: All right.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- Well, I think the bigger point, and again,
- 24 this is some of the issues that we had with some of
- 25 the other schools, that it seemed to be names were

- 1 being pulled off these school buildings, without any
- 2 Board authorization, or anything.
- 3 So, it appears that's happened already,
- 4 that it's no longer the Frick building, already,
- 5 unless it's -- it's an error in the resolution.
- I want to speak to the bigger point this
- 7 evening about the culture, about history, about
- 8 historic preservation in this city.
- And, there was an excellent article written
- 10 by one of our local newspapers, talking about this
- 11 issue, and they quoted Mr. Arthur Ziegler, who is a
- 12 great name in this city, as it pertains to, again,
- 13 historic preservation.
- 14 And he is the chair of the Pittsburgh
- 15 History and Landmarks Foundation,
- And yes, Board, I did contact people like
- 17 Historic and Landmarks Foundation, and Heinz History
- 18 Center, and a few departments of history in some of
- 19 our local universities, because I think this is such a
- 20 very, very important issue.
- 21 And I hope the Board can really appreciate
- 22 how people like Mr. Ziegler and myself feels.
- He was quoted in the paper as saying --
- 24 because again, what we are proposing this evening for
- 25 the public, what we are proposing this evening is a

- 1 removal of Henry Clay Frick's name from the Frick
- 2 building, and changing that name to, again, the
- 3 Pittsburgh Science and Technology Academy.
- 4 Mr. Ziegler was quoted in the local
- 5 newspaper as saying -- and he is speaking to the issue
- 6 that, as I said, this has been a trend in the
- 7 District.
- 8 And, it began with, I believe at the
- 9 Reizenstein School, where they had actually -- the
- 10 District had actually began to remove her name from
- 11 the building, until some people in the community,
- 12 myself, raised the issue, and then they have replaced
- 13 that name back on there.
- It also happened at the Milliones building,
- 15 where it was being proposed that it become, I just
- 16 think University Prep, or whatever, but that name was
- 17 going to be removed, the Milliones family, and other
- 18 community leaders, and Mr. Sumpter, also, led the
- 19 charge to make sure that the Milliones name was not
- 20 removed from that building.
- 21 Miss Fink strongly supported that, she
- 22 served with Margaret Milliones, and she knew what that
- 23 name meant.
- I can't really think on the West End,
- 25 because we consolidated things, whether anything was

- 1 removed there, but one place that we did remove, and
- 2 nobody raised a question, was the McKelvy building,
- 3 and unfortunately I didn't do my homework to find out
- 4 who Mr. or Ms. McKelvy was, but they certainly were a
- 5 person, because there is no street or community named
- 6 McKelvy, and their name was removed to rename that the
- 7 Miller -- the Miller building
- I think that's an unfortunate trend. As
- 9 someone, again, who majored in history, who thinks it
- 10 is very important to preserve it, and save it.
- 11 And I save a lot of things.
- When Miss -- when Mr. Allen was sworn in, I
- 13 saved the Pittsburgh Courier with her picture on it,
- 14 because I knew that that was history.
- And those things are important. Whether
- 16 people appreciate history or not, those things are
- 17 important for our children to see.
- 18 Mr. Arthur Ziegler, chair of the Pittsburgh
- 19 History and Landmarks Foundation said, "Those names
- 20 have significant roles in Pittsburgh's history, and
- 21 are an important ingredient in our culture. To erase
- 22 the original names of the Pittsburgh Public Schools,
- 23 seems to us that we are erasing an important part of
- 24 our history."
- 25 And I certainly -- I certainly agree with

- 1 those thoughts.
- 1'm asking the Board, let's not proceed --
- 3 let's not erase our local Pittsburgh history.
- 4 There is a lot of schools that have
- 5 sometimes small people's name, like Mary Dilworth, I
- 6 went to Dilworth School, Mary Dilworth was just a
- 7 person who, when she died, I don't think she had
- 8 anything to leave it to, she left her land to the
- 9 Pittsburgh Public Schools, with the only stipulation,
- 10 "You build a school for the children."
- 11 Should we take her name off on it, because
- 12 Mary Dilworth is not famous?
- Jean, what about John Minadeo? Come on.
- 14 There is a lot of people who are forgetting that
- 15 story.
- Mr. Sumpter raised, about, "Well, as long
- 17 as people are alive, and they can remember it."
- That is not why you save and preserve
- 19 history. It is for when we are gone, that kids will
- 20 ask about, "Who was John Minadeo?"
- By the way, John Minadeo was a school
- 22 crossing guard, and I believe, Jean, a car or
- 23 something was barreling down the street, he jumped in
- 24 front of the way and saved some children, and was hit
- 25 and killed.

- 1 And they named a school after that hero,
- 2 that 14 year old hero.
- 3 So should we take his name off the
- 4 building, because, you know, he is not famous; should
- 5 we remove that?
- 6 MR. SUMPTER: Who was on the name before?
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: I have no idea. I have no
- 8 idea.
- 9 But the point is, that we shouldn't do
- 10 that. We shouldn't remove John Minadeo's building,
- 11 because we want to call it the Pittsburgh
- 12 Environmental Sciences Academy. That's not right.
- There was another story that was done in
- 14 one of our local papers talking about, I believe,
- 15 John Phillips. Named after Phillips Park, Phillips
- 16 School. People looked into it, they had no idea who
- 17 he was, and found out the profound things he had done
- 18 for this city and others.
- Just because we don't know who
- 20 John Phillips was, doesn't mean we ought to remove
- 21 John Phillips school, and call hit the Art Academy of
- 22 the West End, or whatever.
- 23 That's not right.
- MS. FINK: South End.
- 25 MR. TAYLOR: I don't think we should

- 1 remove, and no matter what people think of his
- 2 policies -- and I understand, Mr. Isler, we have done
- 3 some things around, you know, policies, and things
- 4 like that, we even did something, I think, Mr. Weiss,
- 5 where you are not even allowed to propose a policy
- 6 without taking a month or so advance, and all of those
- 7 things are correct, and the right way to do things,
- 8 but it is never too late to try to do what's right.
- 9 And so I am proposing this evening that we
- 10 do accept -- and unfortunately I wish they had
- 11 considered names that they did not consider, like
- 12 Rachel Carson, and Jonas Salk, who again is a great
- 13 Pittsburgh story, went on to save millions of lives
- 14 around the country, they chose to give it a more
- 15 generic one, Pittsburgh Science and Technology
- 16 Academy, I have nothing wrong with that, but again, I
- 17 don't want to circumvent, you know, any policies, but
- 18 I think this is such an important, vital issue, that
- 19 it says a lot about the School Board, and the message
- 20 that we are sending our children about the importance
- 21 of our history, and culture, and remembering people
- 22 who helped to make the city what it is, and
- 23 remembering people, young 13 year old heroes like
- 24 John Minadeo.
- 25 So I want to make a motion that we amend

- 1 this resolution, and that we call it the Pittsburgh
- 2 Science and Technology Academy at Frick.
- But, Mr. Isler, Mr. Weiss, did we ever get
- 4 the actual resolution, where I was talking about, we
- 5 cannot remove a current human being's name on --
- 6 MR. WEISS: That is a new business item.
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: It is in the new business
- 8 items?
- 9 MR. WEISS: I thought it was distributed to
- 10 the --
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay. I hadn't seen it.
- 12 Which means, I can give this speech all over again.
- MR. WEISS: Somebody will find it.
- Mr. Taylor, Mrs. Wenger has it.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay. I'm sorry, I had not
- 16 seen it.
- 17 Okay.
- Well -- I am not going to say never mind.
- MS. COLAIZZI: It is not in your book.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay. Well, it's new, we
- 21 hadn't got it, so it's here, and I have to wait for
- 22 this under new business.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay.
- MR. TAYLOR: It is no problem. That is no
- 25 problem.

- MS. COLAIZZI: That is fine, but do you
- 2 have a copy for everybody?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes, she has a copy for
- 4 everybody. That is not a problem, I just --
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Taylor. Are
- 6 you done?
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: I wouldn't have jumped the
- 8 gun, it is not a problem, and I won't repeat --
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- MR. TAYLOR: -- very much what I said, but
- 11 as I say, I will repeat a little bit.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Isler.
- MR. SUMPTER: He is making a motion.
- MR. ISLER: Just a point of clarification.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I'm sorry, Mr. --
- MR. ISLER: Point of clarification.
- Did you or did you not make a motion?
- 18 MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Isler, I am going to
- 19 withdraw that motion, and I am going to bring that up
- 20 again at new business.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 22 Mr. Isler, it is your turn.
- MR. ISLER: No, ma'am, all of my questions
- 24 were answered, thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Sumpter.

- 1 MR. SUMPTER: We are going to address this
- 2 in new business, but the item No. 5 -- so we are going
- 3 to keep this report as it is before us, and discuss
- 4 this matter later in the meeting.
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: So, excuse me, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 6 Mr. Weiss, what is -- I don't necessarily
- 7 want -- because I don't know what would happen, I
- 8 don't necessarily want to say pull this item, because
- 9 I don't necessarily want it to be pulled or tabled.
- 10 What happens if this new item is voted in
- 11 new business, after we have already voted this one?
- 12 Would that vote contradict what the new --
- 13 would this create a new policy, that would supersede
- 14 this vote?
- MR. WEISS: Well, the process by which the
- 16 name of a school is before you, was undertaken under
- 17 the existing policy, and there was considerable
- 18 participation there by students, staff, parents,
- 19 community members.
- If you name this school, and then you
- 21 change the policy, the school's named.
- 22 So --
- MR. TAYLOR: Well, do I have to deal with
- 24 this now, then?
- MR. WEISS: Well, if you wish this school

- 1 not to be named as it is, you have got to deal with
- 2 it, because you name the school, you approve this now,
- 3 then you change the policy, the school's been named,
- 4 as far as I'm concerned.
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Yes.
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: So, I definitely --
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: Let Mr. Sumpter intervene
- 8 for a minute.
- 9 MR. SUMPTER: Just a question.
- 10 MR. TAYLOR: This is just a matter for the
- 11 Board to review, have an opportunity.
- MR. SUMPTER: If we go through a name
- 13 change, according to the existing policy, is there
- 14 anything that says that this Board can't change the
- 15 name of a school at any point in time after that
- 16 occurs?
- The policy is for naming a new school, for
- 18 the creation of a new school, and when we change --
- 19 when we create a new school in a building, we go
- 20 through the naming policy. Is there anything to
- 21 prevent this Board from amending the name of any
- 22 school in the District?
- 23 MR. WEISS: Sorry, I will have to review
- 24 the policy to see if there is any process you have to
- 25 go through to do that, because it would seem to me,

- 1 logically, if you can do that, then why have this
- 2 whole process to start with, if the Board could just
- 3 do that.
- 4 MR. SUMPTER: Well, that is for new
- 5 schools. Any time we have a new school, we go through
- 6 this procedure.
- 7 And what I am saying is, after we have gone
- 8 through that procedure, what is to keep this Board, at
- 9 any point in time, changing any name of any school, on
- 10 its own; an old school that is already in existence,
- 11 not a new school.
- So I am saying, this would be a new school,
- 13 we went through the policy for the new school, what is
- 14 to keep this Board from amending any name? And we
- 15 have done that through our branding of schools.
- We put 6-12 on all schools, or K-8's, or we
- 17 have amended the names of schools without any action
- 18 by the Board.
- So, I will get to it later, but there is a
- 20 difference between the name of a school, and the name
- 21 of a building.
- MS. COLAIZZI: If I could just add one
- 23 other thing as well, and I believe this Board voted to
- 24 add the word Pittsburgh in front of all of the
- 25 schools, but we did take action on that. We voted on

- 1 that, just so that's clear.
- Yeah, we did, we voted on it.
- All right. Are there any more questions?
- 4 Dr. Allen?
- DR. ALLEN: Not related to this item we are
- 6 currently discussing.
- 7 But back to my original question about the
- 8 change orders, under additions and deductions.
- 9 Looking back over the number for the
- 10 addition, under grand total, is that a typo? I just
- 11 did a quick tally --
- MR. BERDNIK: It is.
- Mrs. Willig has the correct version that
- 14 will appear. There is a couple of zeros at the end,
- 15 shouldn't be there.
- DR. ALLEN: Okay. Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- Any more questions?
- Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: Randall, in light of what we are
- 21 doing, do you want to reintroduce your motion to add
- 22 "at Frick" to the Resolution No. 5?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yeah. I think what they are
- 24 telling us, is we do have to deal with this -- to deal
- 25 with this right now, so I think what we have to do,

- 1 Ira, is we have to either vote yes or no on this --
- 2 this policy amendment, that I'm making.
- I think that that has to be a first step,
- 4 yes or no, and then that would be --
- 5 MR. WEISS: Well, the policy amendment is
- 6 new business. I think what you can do is, to
- 7 accomplish your immediate concern about the school is,
- 8 is remake your motion to add the words "at Frick" to
- 9 the name. That's essentially what you are talking
- 10 about.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay. Then I will -- okay.
- 12 Okay. I understand now.
- So, I would make the amendment. If anybody
- 14 sees the last sentence of it, everything is the same,
- 15 and all it says -- I want to read it so the public --
- MS. COLAIZZI: Are you making this as a
- 17 motion now?
- 18 MR. TAYLOR: Okay. Okay. I just want to
- 19 read -- first I want to read just the change, so
- 20 people are clear what the future change is going to
- 21 be, and the public can hear.
- "Once the school" -- this is the only
- 23 change in our school making policy. "Once the school
- 24 has been named for a distinguished person in
- 25 accordance with this policy, any proposal to rename an

- 1 existing school, or school building, shall always
- 2 include the name of that distinguished person."
- 3 So I hope that this also means
- 4 retroactively, for ones that have already been named.
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. But that still --
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: Okay. So that will be new
- 7 business. I just want people to know, to form a
- 8 decision on this one here.
- 9 So I am going to make a motion that -- to
- 10 add to -- to item No. 5, that "Be it resolved, that
- 11 the official name of the school presently known" -- I
- 12 guess Frick -- "to the Pittsburgh Science and
- 13 Technology Academy at Frick."
- 14 MS. COLAIZZI: We have a motion on the
- 15 floor.
- Do we have a second?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Second.
- 18 MS. COLAIZZI: We have a motion on the
- 19 floor, it is open for discussion.
- Dr. Allen, do you have any comments?
- Mr. Brentley, do you?
- MR. BRENTLEY: If we are considering adding
- 23 or getting a name in, I think, Mr. Taylor, one thing
- 24 you may want to consider, it would make, to me a
- 25 little bit more sense, if you just said Frick

- 1 Sci-Tech, instead of, you know, the way you have it
- 2 there.
- 3
  I -- and this way, it's -- the name is
- 4 there, it is still the name that was chosen, but it
- 5 still gives recognition to the name.
- But it's just something I suggest.
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: Look, we had precedent already
- 8 at Reizenstein, like Schenley at Reizenstein, and
- 9 University Prep at Reizenstein.
- MR. BRENTLEY: (Inaudible.) Okay.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Gentlemen, please,
- 12 Mr. Brentley, you still have the floor, do you have a
- 13 question?
- MR. TAYLOR: You are only allowed to
- 15 discuss the amendment. Let's be clear.
- MR. WEISS: Right.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: No, I'm good.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Hazuda?
- Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: Not everyone thinks that Henry
- 22 Clay Frick was a bonus for this city, there was a lot
- 23 of people that suffered from what Frick did, so I
- 24 don't like the idea.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Taylor, I'm going to

- 1 pass you up for the moment, and just go around the
- 2 table.
- 3 Mr. Isler?
- 4 MR. ISLER: MR. TAYLOR: Mr. Taylor, I have
- 5 shared my concern with you, and I want to state it for
- 6 the public. I am going to vote no to this. It has
- 7 nothing to do with history, it has nothing to do with
- 8 what anybody has said about this.
- 9 It has purely to do with the policies of
- 10 this Board.
- Three members of this Board spent well over
- 12 two and a half years, Mr. Weiss's firm spent time, we
- 13 had PSBA come in, because we had not reviewed our
- 14 policy book since 1992.
- 15 We didn't change policies, but we took it
- 16 upon ourselves to say that policy is what has to drive
- 17 this Board.
- This resolution, No. 5, on page 7 of 8,
- 19 Committee on Business and Finance, followed every
- 20 procedure of the existing Board policy.
- We had two students come to the public
- 22 hearing, knowing full well that this was going to be
- 23 discussed, saying that this was what they wanted, and
- 24 this is what came out of the students.
- They were -- one of them was represented I

- 1 believe on the committee.
- 2 So I have a problem trying to change a
- 3 policy, without it ever being discussed by the Board,
- 4 ever being brought before the committee, ever having
- 5 any of us really go through this as to why we are
- 6 doing it.
- 7 So, I am opposing this. And I did share
- 8 this with you before this meeting, I am opposing this
- 9 purely because I do not think this is the way the
- 10 Board should do policy.
- This followed the procedures of the
- 12 existing policy.
- 13 It is either yea or may to this.
- I do not think that because of the Board
- 15 policy, we can make the changes with the existing
- 16 policy, as it states.
- 17 This committee met, this is what they voted
- 18 on, that is what was submitted to us.
- 19 So I think it is an all or nothing thing.
- 20 But the other thing is, I regret that we
- 21 are trying to do policy without giving this Board
- 22 sufficient time to think about this, and ask the
- 23 public what they think also.
- So, I'm voting no for that reason.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Isler.

- 1 Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- Because we are specifically talking about
- 4 this resolution, and the ramifications of it, there
- 5 are buildings that have been demolished, but the
- 6 history of those buildings has been preserved.
- 7 The issue of preserving history is
- 8 incumbent upon this District to do that; that we
- 9 maintain the history of each building, in that
- 10 building, or at some central location or wherever,
- 11 such that if anybody wants to know in the future what
- 12 has happened, and why, or where things have come from,
- 13 they will have a documented source of that.
- 14 You can take pictures, you can write it
- 15 down on paper, you can do whatever.
- The policy is a community involvement, or
- 17 community driven policy, in that people from the
- 18 community are selected to serve on that naming
- 19 committee.
- 20 Just because the Board doesn't like what
- 21 they have come up with, but then the naming committee
- 22 of the Board recommends to the Board, or at least
- 23 pushes that name further.
- So we have followed the process.
- 25 For this Board to just throw that process

- 1 out the window and tell the people we don't like it,
- 2 and you are going to take the name that we want, and
- 3 all of your involvement is for naught, I think would
- 4 send a bad message at this point.
- 5 That's why I was asking before, do we have
- 6 the latitude of changing the name at will, at a later
- 7 point. And if this Board so desires, we could add
- 8 whatever we want to the name.
- 9 I think we should stick with the name that
- 10 came forth, that was recommended to this Board, that
- 11 came up through the involvement of the community, and
- 12 then the naming committee of the Board looked at the
- 13 names that were given to them, and then they
- 14 recommended the name further.
- So, the fact that this one has stood the
- 16 test, and because there is a very distinction between
- 17 the name of a building, and the name of a school
- 18 housed in the building, and they don't have to be one
- 19 and the same.
- 20 And if that's the case, University
- 21 Preparatory School at Margaret Milliones, at Heron
- 22 Hill Junior High School. I mean, how far do you go
- 23 with it?
- You have to, you know -- and John Heron was
- 25 the mayor of Pittsburgh in the mid 1800's, one of the

- 1 founding families of the City of Pittsburgh was the
- 2 heron family.
- But yet, we do have U Prep, U Prep 6-12,
- 4 U Prep at Milliones, Pittsburgh Milliones 6-12, I
- 5 mean, it gets, you know, tossed all around.
- 6 But the official name is University
- 7 Preparatory School at Margaret Milliones.
- But you won't see that anywhere, and it is
- 9 hard to come by.
- 10 So whether we throw "at Frick" on it, or
- 11 not, whether or not that carries forth, it at least is
- 12 engraved on the building. Anybody that walks past
- 13 that building, looks at the front of the building,
- 14 will see Henry Clay Frick School for Teachers on the
- 15 building.
- So the history has already been preserved.
- 17 But if we need to go the extra step, to amplify the
- 18 history, to glorify the history, to preserve the
- 19 history for future days to come, buildings that are
- 20 nominated for the National Register of Historic
- 21 Places, you have to go through a big documentation
- 22 process, especially if you are going to change, or
- 23 modify the building, of have an adverse effect.
- I mean, they tell you to take pictures,
- 25 black and white pictures of a certain size, and put in

- 1 acid free envelopes so that they don't deteriorate
- 2 over a period of time.
- 3 There is all kind of ways to preserve
- 4 history. And I don't think just by the name Frick,
- 5 people might forget his first name was Henry, or that
- 6 his middle name was Clay, just at Frick, at Frick
- 7 Park, or at Frick, I mean.
- 8 So, saying all of this, so I can probably
- 9 save some time later, because it is going to come
- 10 before us again, there is a difference between the
- 11 name of a school, and the name of a building. And we
- 12 need to know what the official names of the buildings
- 13 are so that if that's been changed, that is another
- 14 issue.
- 15 But the names of the buildings are on
- 16 record with the real estate office, downtown, and the
- 17 name of a school, we do that, marketing and
- 18 communications does that, word of mouth does that, as
- 19 far as what the name of a school is.
- So I am just saying all of that, that the
- 21 issue of historic preservation is one, we should make
- 22 sure we preserve the history of all of our schools, to
- 23 give the lineage, so that anybody 200 years from now
- 24 will know where the names came from, when they were
- 25 changed, why they were changed, what boards changed

- 1 them.
- And just the fact that those, in a sense,
- 3 egotistical Board members initially started putting
- 4 their names on all of the buildings in the District,
- 5 each Board is given the authority to do what they see
- 6 fit, whether they want to keep the name, preserve the
- 7 name, or change the name. But don't destroy the
- 8 history in the process.
- 9 Make sure you maintain the history.
- 10 And that was one of the concerns, when we
- 11 were naming University Preparatory School at Margaret
- 12 Milliones. The stress was, maintain the history.
- And I hear your point, you say maintain the
- 14 history, because folks that refer to it as Frick will
- 15 continue to, and they need to know that the name was
- 16 Frick before that.
- So because it is on the building, because
- 18 we can write and document the events, because if we
- 19 need to take pictures, and go a step further, we can
- 20 preserve the history, but I think it is separate from
- 21 the name of a school, and the desire of the public for
- 22 what they went through, according to our policy, to
- 23 name that school.
- Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Sumpter.

- There is a motion on the floor, it has been
- 2 seconded.
- Mr. Weiss, may we have a roll call on the
- 4 motion, please.
- 5 MR. WEISS: This is on the amendment
- 6 proposed by Mr. Taylor adding the name "at Frick,"
- 7 words "at Frick" to the name of the Pittsburgh Science
- 8 and Technology Academy.
- 9 Dr. Allen?
- DR. ALLEN: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Hazuda?
- MS. HAZUDA: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. McCrea?
- MR. McCREA: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Sumpter?
- MR. SUMPTER: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi?

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1 MS. COLAIZZI: No.
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- MR. WEISS: Okay. The amendment fails,
- 3 2-7.
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- If there are no more questions or comments
- 6 on the Committee of Education -- I'm sorry, Business.
- 7 Mr. Brentley, is it on this report?
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: What number, please?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Just a question on No. 5.
- 11 So number 5 item is still before us as is.
- MR. BRENTLEY: As is, sir.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- I just wanted to mention, a little issue
- 15 that is a little unclear to me, you know, we often
- 16 talk about the policies of the Board. Mr. Weiss, do
- 17 we, as Board members, have the authority to amend
- 18 policies, or to add -- I mean, that is well within the
- 19 role and responsibility of the Board of Directors?
- MR. WEISS: The Board can, by action, amend
- 21 policies.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- Then secondly, you know, it was mentioned
- 24 that we don't do this thing, and you don't do it on
- 25 the floor, and you don't do it the last minute, sort

- 1 of thing. Well, just minutes ago we had this
- 2 administration make an adjustment to an item that was
- 3 getting ready to come before us.
- We accepted that without question. And, we
- 5 allowed Dr. Lane to make the comments on the record.
- 6 First time, listening to those.
- 7 It is an item coming before us for a vote.
- And so we were able to accept that.
- 9 And so, I do -- but I'm thankful to
- 10 Mr. Taylor for sharing that, because if you notice, if
- 11 we are not careful on these name changes, we can lose
- 12 a lot of history.
- For instance, even though we have the
- 14 Milliones name at the end of University Preparatory
- 15 School at Milliones --
- MR. SUMPTER: At Margaret Milliones.
- 17 MR. BRENTLEY: -- the name Milliones has
- 18 been removed from the vocabulary of our students.
- What do they all it? U Prep.
- And so the purpose is to keep that great
- 21 person's name, and their -- their works in front of
- 22 us. So to be able to have Milliones there, at
- 23 Milliones School, and University Prep is something, it
- 24 means something.
- So I just think it is a little dangerous,

- 1 and especially for those of us in the African American
- 2 community who don't have too many heroes to point to,
- 3 in terms of buildings being named after them.
- We have already went through one ridiculous
- 5 change of throwing Pittsburgh in front of it, which is
- 6 probably one of the most silliest things, that made
- 7 national news, you know, and so now we have to deal
- 8 with the possibility of not acknowledging those names.
- 9 So it is wonderful information, Mr. Taylor,
- 10 that you shared, and I think we just need to be
- 11 careful.
- MS. COLAIZZI: May we have a roll call,
- 13 please, Mr. Weiss.
- 14 MR. WEISS: This is on the Committee on
- 15 Business.
- 16 Dr. Allen?
- DR. ALLEN: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, on the report, I will
- 20 be voting no on No. 5, and I will be voting no on the
- 21 additions and deletions.

- 2 recent departing of one of the family of the
- 3 Pittsburgh Public School District system.
- Board of Directors, I regret to inform you
- of death of Miss Carolyn Heinzl, assistant principal
- 6 at Pittsburgh Roosevelt, on November 13, 2009.
- 7 (Mr. Chester read from prepared material.)
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Chester.
- 9 Are there any questions or comments on this
- 10 report?
- 11 Dr. Allen?
- DR. ALLEN: Yes. I would like to extend my
- 13 condolences to the family of Carolyn Heinzl. And we
- 14 are grateful for her service.
- I also have a question on page 17,
- 16 regarding miscellaneous recommendations for those who
- 17 are taking a leave of absence with loss of pay, and I
- 18 just had a question, is -- I had a question about
- 19 whether there would be a loss of pay based on a policy
- 20 for leave of absences, or is that discretionary?
- MR. CHESTER: Typically, there are
- 22 different reasons why a person may have a loss of pay
- 23 for a leave.
- And, without looking at the specifics, I
- 25 really can't answer your question as to why this

- 1 person would be losing that.
- 2 Do you have a number of the person that you
- 3 are referring to?
- DR. ALLEN: I was just referring to all of
- 5 them, the reasons seem very similar. So I didn't know
- 6 if they fit into a certain category, if you had a
- 7 policy for the categories for the reasons?
- MR. CHESTER: Let me just say yes, to that
- 9 answer is yes.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Is that all, Dr. Allen, on
- 11 the report?
- Thank you.
- Mr. Brentley, do you have any questions on
- 14 the Personnel Report?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, I have some questions
- 16 on the -- I think it is page 1, Addendum B, the new
- 17 appointments.
- And I believe that stretches all the way
- 19 over into the next page, and I'm just, I'm really
- 20 concerned, because with the approval of the Gates
- 21 Grant, and also items that we have witnessed for it
- 22 before in the past with the Pittsburgh Promise, we are
- 23 just starting to see, and move forward with a lot of
- 24 hiring, and I'm just wondering how, or at what point
- 25 will we be able to get a heads up in terms of how many

- 1 additional hirings do we expect; is there a way of
- 2 finding out how many, and then if so, what do we do to
- 3 focus some of those positions on home grown
- 4 individuals, folks that are here, to be seriously
- 5 considered for some of those positions.
- And, you know, that's, Mr. Chester, or
- 7 Mark, either of you can respond, if you know anything
- 8 about it.
- 9 MR. CHESTER: Well, first of all, let me
- 10 just say that the process for any of the positions
- 11 that we bring before this Board for action at
- 12 legislative session, to make hiring decisions, we
- 13 present to the Board at the Personnel Committee
- 14 meetings.
- I think that most of these positions that
- 16 we are talking about, for the office of teacher
- 17 effectiveness, is all part of the information that
- 18 previously has been shared, and I believe that
- 19 information is also posted on the site that
- 20 specifically indicates the title of the position, the
- 21 number of positions that we are going to be recruiting
- 22 for, as far as this Gates proposal and agreement.
- 23 MR. BRENTLEY: My second question is D, and
- 24 I believe we are moving some principals, and vice
- 25 principals around, I do not understand the rationale,

- 1 and I just think we just talked earlier about, Mark,
- 2 your commitment to Mr. Taylor, in terms of the ALA's,
- 3 they need stability in the worst way, and -- but here
- 4 we are making some changes with the Arlington School.
- 5 And I just think it's a terrible thing to
- 6 do in the middle of the year, if it's something that
- 7 can wait until the end of the year, a lot of them
- 8 students, I understand they are preparing for the test
- 9 now, and so to move something, expressly principals,
- 10 in the middle of the year, I think can hurt, and I
- 11 just don't understand that rationale, so I -- my final
- 12 comment is, Mr. Chester, No. -- C, on Addendum B, and
- 13 this is a termination, and whatever -- whatever you
- 14 are able to share.
- This termination, we understand, was a
- 16 question of a residency; is that correct?
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley -- Mr. Brentley,
- 18 I am going to interrupt you.
- We do not discuss -- personnel matters are
- 20 confidential, particularly in this area, so I would
- 21 caution you, this should not be dealt with in the
- 22 public session.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- Well, let me just reframe it this way: I
- 25 will not be supporting the Addendum B, because of some

- 1 inconsistencies that we are doing in terms of using
- 2 one rule to use for termination, versus another rule
- 3 for certain individuals.
- It is not consistent, and I wish we would
- 5 have had a policy, or at least being able to share if
- 6 it is a policy, every individual should be given an
- 7 opportunity to adjust any changes that were pointed
- 8 out to them that they are not in compliance in, and I
- 9 don't believe it happened in this case, it is not
- 10 consistent, and I will not support it.
- And I hope that we don't see any more of
- 12 these here, or at least any more coming before us.
- Thank you, very much.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Fink?
- MS. FINK: I, too, would like to offer my
- 16 condolences to the family of Carolyn Heinzl.
- 17 She had not been at Roosevelt for a very
- 18 long time, but within weeks she had won the friendship
- 19 and loyalty of other faculty, and the parents, she was
- 20 very highly thought of, and the entire school
- 21 community will miss her very much.
- The only other thing I want to say, is that
- 23 on item D, in Addendum B, I probably would be a little
- 24 more apprehensive if the gentleman recommended for the
- 25 acting principalship had not been there as a vice

- 1 principal, because we have had much too much turnover
- 2 at that school in the last several years.
- 3 However, Mr. Travanti has been the
- 4 vice principal, he knows everything that has gone on
- 5 at the school, he is familiar with all of the routines
- 6 and programs, and so with him being the new leadership
- 7 there, I am more comfortable than I would have been if
- 8 someone from the outside had been brought in.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: May I please remind everyone
- 10 to turn off their cell phones, or put them on vibrate,
- 11 please.
- 12 Mrs. Hazuda?
- 13 MS. HAZUDA: Carol Heinzl was the music
- 14 director at Beechview United Presbyterian Church, and
- 15 her little church and my little Lutheran church did
- 16 quite a few things together.
- You know, when you belong to a small
- 18 congregation, it becomes a family and, you know, her
- 19 talents at that church, she was amazing.
- That choir, for a little congregation, was
- 21 fabulous. She had a bell choir at that small
- 22 congregation.
- 23 She let her talents outside of the
- 24 classroom, which we were lucky to have her in the
- 25 Pittsburgh Public Schools.

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1 But she took her talents and offered them

- 2 for the greater good of others, and she shared them
- 3 willingly.
- And so, her passing is a loss to the entire
- 5 Beechview Christian community of Beechview, and she is
- 6 very, very much missed, her congregation is having a
- 7 hard time dealing with her loss.
- 8 But we kind of all feel it in Beechview.
- And so, we were lucky to have her in our
- 10 lives.
- 11 That's all.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: I also would like to extend my
- 15 condolences to her family and her extended family, I
- 16 didn't know about that, I know it is a difficult time
- 17 to go through.
- 18 Also, finally, I just want to recognize all
- 19 of our employees who are serving in the military, and
- 20 thank them for a job well done.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Taylor, do you have any
- 22 comments in the Personnel?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes, I do.
- I am going to abstain on the personnel
- 25 issue, and it pertains particularly also to the

- 1 principal of Arlington.
- I share some of the same concerns as
- 3 Mr. Brentley, and half of the concerns of Mrs. Fink,
- 4 that -- and I certainly -- I am not going to request
- 5 it myself, but I certainly am going to request for
- 6 some Board member to take up that banner of principal
- 7 turnover in this District.
- And, I am not going to say it is high, I am
- 9 not going to say it is low, I am just going to say I
- 10 think that there is some -- I wasn't aware as much of
- 11 Arlington, I don't usually give school names, but I
- 12 know Vann has had to see at least four principal
- 13 changes in the last four years.
- I don't know where this -- you know, what
- 15 other schools are being affected by a tremendous
- 16 amount of principal turnover.
- We know it at the ALA's particularly.
- 18 And this particular change will probably
- 19 make -- because it was over 50 percent when we looked
- 20 at it last time, and that was admitted by the
- 21 administration, it was over 50 percent, so somebody
- 22 correct me if this is wrong, but this here would have
- 23 to increase it up to 80 percent turnover in
- 24 principals, at the accelerated academies, over just
- 25 the last few years.

- And so someone needs to ask that question,
- 2 whether we are seeing a musical chairs at several
- 3 schools, and need to pin down, again, what is going on
- 4 with principal turnover in this District.
- We have seen principal turnover just in a
- 6 matter of months at the U Prep, we seen it happen over
- 7 a matter of months.
- 8 And when they -- when they -- there was a
- 9 change there, and then the musical chairs began.
- 10 Peabody seen at least three principal
- 11 changes in the last four years.
- So I am just saying, we don't know -- as a
- 13 Board, we don't know what's going on; we may know
- 14 particular schools in our community, but we don't know
- 15 overall -- overall, what's going on with principal
- 16 turnovers.
- 17 But if you are sitting there looking at
- 18 ten, 12, 15 schools, that have seen three turnovers in
- 19 the last three years, something is wrong.
- 20 And I think particularly what is going on,
- 21 is when we lose somebody -- for instance, what
- 22 happened at U Prep, the gentleman, he retires -- I
- 23 mean, resigns, and then you move the guy out of Vann
- 24 over there, and they get on the musical chairs all
- 25 over.

- So I am just saying, Board, we don't know
- 2 all that's going on in principal turnover, but I think
- 3 all of us recognize how important that leader, that
- 4 the stability of leadership, in particular buildings,
- 5 are.
- And my gut is telling me, we have a problem
- 7 with the principal turnover in this District.
- 8 Thank you.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 10 Mr. Isler?
- 11 MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 12 I want to thank Mrs. Hazuda for
- 13 personalizing, and sharing with us, what you did, she

- 2 concerned about?
- MR. BERDNIK: As a whole, we are going to
- 4 be close. We are trending awfully close, within a
- 5 percentage point to the budget as a whole.
- 6 Yes, obviously we are concerned with the
- 7 interest rate environment, but some of the bigger
- 8 concerns would be around the tax collections of realty
- 9 transfer taxes, which are trending close to half of
- 10 what the past couple of years were.
- 11 Long term, that, either very high number,
- 12 or very low number, that usually does not foretell
- 13 good things.
- MR. ISLER: Can you go into some more
- 15 detail at our next Business Affairs Committee,
- 16 please?
- MR. BERDNIK: Gladly.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 21 Mr. McCrea, Mr. Isler has suggested an item

- 4 before the Board this evening, to reopen the request
- 5 for proposal period, and accept proposals for the
- 6 purchase and redevelopment of the Miller School,
- 7 61 Reed Street, Third Ward. Such proposal must
- 8 conform to the established proposal protocol as
- 9 developed by agreement with the URA. The proposal
- 10 must be submitted to the URA by no later than
- 11 January 15th, 2010.
- 12 Are there any questions or comments?
- 13 Dr. Allen?
- DR. ALLEN: No questions.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- Mr. Brentley?
- 17 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I have some questions,
- 18 and I'm confused.
- Mr. Berdnik, can you please tell me what
- 20 happened for this item to come before us, based upon
- 21 our last conversations concerning this building?
- MR. BERDNIK: Yes, Mr. Brentley, it may be
- 23 sort of helpful to bring everyone up to speed.
- In June of 2009, an RFP was issued by the
- 25 URA on the District's behalf, with a due date of

- 1 September.
- In that time period, we received one
- 3 proposal.
- 4 Subsequent to that proposal period, in
- 5 October we had public testimony from a developer that
- 6 had expressed an interest in the facility for a usage
- 7 that was outside the parameters of the RFP.
- 8 Subsequent conversations with that
- 9 developer indicate that there is the potential for
- 10 development that is different, and in fact, last
- 11 Wednesday, at 5:11 p.m. we received a short, a
- 12 succinct proposal that was a cash proposal for a use
- 13 that would be appropriate.
- In terms of dealing with the matter, you
- 15 have an RFP process that was public.
- We reviewed our potential courses of
- 17 action, that we promised the Board that we would do
- 18 last Wednesday, and given the case law, the advice
- 19 from the solicitor, and it seems like a reasonable
- 20 course of action was to simply open the RFP period up,
- 21 so there is a fair opportunity to vett that proposal
- 22 against the one that we have in hand, and run a
- 23 process like we did for Morningside, so the best of
- 24 the proposals can come back to this Board for a vote.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mr. Berdnik, but you

- 1 mentioned there was only one proposal; is that
- 2 correct?
- 3 MR. BERDNIK: That's right.
- 4 Trek submitted the only proposal to the
- 5 URA, that actually met the requirements of the RFP.
- 6 There was -- subsequent to that receipt
- 7 period, there was some conversation that perhaps it
- 8 wasn't clear on what our process or requirements were,
- 9 and in fact the developer had expressed some interest,
- 10 although it was outside the bounds of that, but Trek
- 11 submitted the only proposal, actually, to the URA, in
- 12 that time period, that met all of our requirements.
- MR. BRENTLEY: And so the proposal that was
- 14 submitted to you last week, is the only proposal on
- 15 this building?
- MR. BERDNIK: Absolutely not.
- 17 I'm actually saying the opposite. The only
- 18 proposal submitted during the RFP period, that met our
- 19 requirements, was submitted by a different developer.
- 20 That RFP period closed.
- As we do with any lead on any building, the
- 22 gentleman that came to speak on us at a public
- 23 hearing, we subsequently have met with, conversed
- 24 with, explored.
- The only fair thing to all parties

- 1 involved, seems to be to open the RFP process up, so
- 2 you can vett the proposals in the same fashion we did
- 3 Morningside ones, and come back to this Board with the
- 4 best of the proposals.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: So you have how many
- 6 proposals on this building, to date?
- 7 MR. BERDNIK: Well, there was one formally
- 8 received during the proposal period. We received a
- 9 copy of one that did not meet the requirements in
- 10 October, that --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Let's do names, so we can
- 12 clarify.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Which names, which company
- 15 are you counting as has an offer that's good on the
- 16 table as we speak?
- 17 MR. BERDNIK: We received one proposal from
- 18 Trek by the September deadline, on the RFP.
- We received, subsequent to testimony at the
- 20 October public hearing, a proposal from Oxbridge
- 21 Development.
- So -- and that proposal was clarified by an
- 23 offer letter received last Wednesday, right before our
- 24 agenda review.
- So it's not a simple question to answer.

- 1 We have one proposal --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, Mr. Berdnik, I -- and
- 3 I am -- please, please, do not take anything what I am
- 4 saying personal.
- I am so angry at this process.
- I had a conversation with you, and some
- 7 individuals in your office, with the developer. I
- 8 lended my -- my interest in at least getting some
- 9 clarification.
- It is in my district, and I thought it was
- 11 a clear issue, when this young man said, "I'm willing
- 12 to submit an offer," he hand delivered the offer, he
- 13 then later came back, and was willing to put
- 14 10 percent on the building. There were no other
- 15 interested companies.
- What we have before us, now, we are going
- 17 to shut the process down --
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley, for
- 19 clarification purposes --
- MR. BRENTLEY: I have the floor.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley, for
- 22 clarification --
- MR. SUMPTER: Let him have the floor.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I have the floor.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley.

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: I have the floor, I would
- 2 like to finish.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I don't have a problem with
- 4 you finishing and having the floor, Mr. Brentley.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: Mrs. Colaizzi, you always
- 6 interrupt me, and I'm asking to let -- to give me the
- 7 same right you give to every other Board member.
- 8 MS. COLAIZZI: Sir, I never interrupted
- 9 you.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I have the floor, thank you.
- 11 Mr. Berdnik, when we -- you presented it to
- 12 us, we were informed, at least given the impression,
- 13 that everything was in order.
- There was an offer given, this individual,
- 15 because he is the only one --
- MR. BERDNIK: No.
- MR. BRENTLEY: -- on that building. Only
- 18 one. Only one that came forward with a cash offer.
- MR. BERDNIK: I -- that's not --
- 20 MR. BRENTLEY: Please tell me who else put
- 21 out a cash offer.
- MR. BERDNIK: Trek Development offered to
- 23 put 10 percent down on this building.
- MR. BRENTLEY: That -- and that was what, a
- 25 thousand dollars here, "I am going to give you a

- 1 couple thousand there. "
- 2 Remember, we are interested in trying to
- 3 sell buildings. They did not put an offer that they
- 4 were ready, cash and carry, for lack of better terms.
- 5 This developer jumped through every hoop,
- 6 Mr. Berdnik --
- 7 MR. BERDNIK: I --
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: -- and at least that was
- 9 my -- that was my impression, at your agenda review
- 10 last night -- I mean, last week when it was
- 11 submitted.
- He then offered to give the 10 percent.
- He then asked for 60 days, or I think
- 14 90 days, which is what we give, we have on some of the
- 15 other buildings, an opportunity for that developer to
- 16 kind of do the things that he or she needs to get it
- 17 in order before the sale.
- And that's what was supposed to be before
- 19 us.
- So now we flipped the script, and now we
- 21 are going to put it right back out for proposal.
- 22 Please tell me what happened from our
- 23 conversation, and from last week's agenda review, to
- 24 what we have before us.
- MR. BERDNIK: Mr. Brentley, I pledged the

- 1 Board that I would work through the Business
- 2 Committee, and that we would take a look at the
- 3 proposal.
- It seemed to address -- the proposal that
- 5 we had received, outside of the boundaries of the
- 6 actual RFP process, originally did not -- the
- 7 ultimately usage of the building originally did not
- 8 meet the requirements of the RFP.
- 9 That usage, that proposed usage, we had
- 10 conversations with the developer on exactly why that
- 11 was not in the District's interest.
- He agreed to propose a different usage, and
- 13 offered to come back.
- He came back with an offer; in fact, early
- 15 Wednesday afternoon, you had alerted us, via
- 16 memorandum through the Board office, asking for a copy
- 17 of a proposal, which we had later received that
- 18 evening. We looked at it, it is five bullet points
- 19 long.
- The difficult thing is here we had a public
- 21 procurement process, there was an advertised RFP on
- 22 the Miller building, only one proposal was received
- 23 that met the requirements of the RFP.
- The young man came to our public hearing
- 25 and said, "Wait a minute, I have an interest," it

- 1 wasn't in the bounds.
- 2 After looking at the proposal, and speaking
- 3 with the solicitor around, "Okay. What are our
- 4 obligations here," given the fact that we had a public
- 5 RFP process, and that we are now holding a proposal
- 6 that is outside of that process, in looking at case
- 7 law, actually from Allegheny county, it seemed like
- 8 the only course of action, to even consider that
- 9 proposal, against the original one, was to reopen the
- 10 RFP period, allow a level playing field, a fair
- 11 playing field, for both parties to be evaluated.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Mr. Berdnik, in all due
- 13 respect, I am so disappointed -- I am so disappointed
- 14 in your response.
- I am disappointed.
- Are you aware that this developer has
- 17 e-mails showing his communications with the URA?
- 18 What's the communication between the
- 19 District and the URA, so someone who is interested in
- 20 the building can go to the URA, or should they go to
- 21 the URA first and then they come here, or who has --
- 22 who takes precedence? I mean, who -- which offer is
- 23 right, who determines that?
- 24 MR. BERDNIK: Mr. Brentley, the item that
- 25 was e-mailed to the Board office on or about the date

- 1 of our public hearing, was for a usage that that was
- 2 outside -- our contract with the URA --
- MR. BRENTLEY: What are you talking, what
- 4 are you referring to, please? What -- say it, what
- 5 usage?
- 6 MR. BERDNIK: Competing educational
- 7 institution.
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- 9 Mr. Berdnik, that's a moot point, and let's
- 10 be honest, that was over, when that was shared, there
- 11 was some discussion, he moved on. Moot point.
- 12 And when he submitted his proposal in
- 13 writing, with the 10 percent, he was exploring other
- 14 options.
- He also had offered, if I am not mistaken,
- 16 not to you, but it is available, the communication
- 17 that he had with the URA, in terms of his suggest --
- 18 not knowing, "Hey, should I go here, should I go
- 19 there?"
- 20 And so somewhere, URA never shared with us
- 21 that this developer had made an offer months ago, this
- 22 developer jumped through every hoops.
- Well, you know, maybe you need to see the
- 24 e-mails.
- But I -- you know, this is -- this is a

- 1 wonderful example -- this is a wonderful example for
- 2 the viewing audience to see.
- We are now saying, so -- and let's be
- 4 honest, this developer, he just happens to be an
- 5 African American.
- All of a sudden now, our money is not even
- 7 good here.
- 8 He jumped through the hoops, offered to put
- 9 the money down, gave it in writing, hand-delivered
- 10 it. And so what do we now do? "Oh, you have the
- 11 money? We will reopen the process."
- 12 It's not fair, Mr. Berdnik, it doesn't look
- 13 good, sir. It doesn't look good, if we are trying to
- 14 sell buildings, number one, and number two, if we are
- 15 trying to create an even playing field.
- This item should not be before us.
- 17 What should be before us, is what we agreed
- 18 on, and that is 90 days for this development to do
- 19 what we allowed others to do, and that is to explore
- 20 his or her options, line up supporters, meet with the
- 21 community, and then decide if he or she would move
- 22 forward with the sale of that building.
- That 90 days, what's almost a courtesy; we
- 24 have given it to others.
- And now, you know, I would hope that

- l someone follows this one, because there are a lot like
- 2 this.
- If it's the District and the URA, well,
- 4 then we have a clear example, there is one not
- 5 speaking or communicating to the other.
- And look what happens when we do this.
- Now, we will open it up, you can possibly
- 8 force this young developer out, and at the same time
- 9 it was something this District had a role in playing,
- 10 and I am disappointed, Mr. Berdnik.
- I am highly disappointed, because I really
- 12 don't get involved at those levels, I spoke to the --
- 13 we spoke together, and it was just my understanding.
- Look, we have nobody else that was
- 15 interested.
- We have nobody else. You had no other
- 17 money. You had no one else exchanging dollars.
- MR. BERDNIK: That's not true.
- DR. ALLEN: Do you have a check from the
- 20 other developer?
- MR. BERDNIK: No, Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- MR. BERDNIK: But we have brought
- 24 forward --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Did they offer --

- 1 MR. BERDNIK: -- an agenda item on October,
- 2 sir, that was before it could come to the legislative
- 3 meeting, from a developer willing to put 10 percent
- 4 down on the building.
- It was pulled in executive session.
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: Did you receive any offer of
- 7 money from the other developer, in terms of
- 8 10 percent?
- 9 MR. BERDNIK: I don't have it in front of
- 10 me, sir, but I believe it was 10 percent, yes.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- Do you have it; I mean, was it given to
- 13 you, it was a check in good faith?
- MR. BERDNIK: There would be no need for a
- 15 check, until the Board would approve.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. But there was an
- 17 offer -- in other words, in good faith, he put that
- 18 up, and was willing to do so, with his offer?
- 19 MR. BERDNIK: Yes. The principal at Trek
- 20 was very explicit, in their detailed proposal. They
- 21 are the only folks that met our deadline in the RFP
- 22 process.
- They were willing to put money down.
- 24 MR. BRENTLEY: Well -- okay. you know,
- 25 I -- it's a terrible situation. It truly is.

- And if you are now suggesting -- not you,
- 2 but this District and this Board is now saying that we
- 3 have the option of kind of playing one against the
- 4 other, based upon who they are, that's -- it's -- it's
- 5 just terrible.
- I mean, it's terrible.
- I don't know what this item is,
- 8 Mr. Berdnik. What --
- 9 MR. BERDNIK: I quess, Mr. Brentley, I
- 10 apologize for any misunderstanding.
- 11 What we are trying to do is find a vehicle
- 12 that prevents us from creating any cause of action
- 13 from the other developer, to allow a level playing
- 14 field, so all -- so all of the interested parties in
- 15 this building, and there appear to be two, can have
- 16 their proposals fairly evaluated on the same apples to
- 17 apples basis, so no one is advantaged or
- 18 disadvantaged in the process.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Okay.
- I -- that's it, it is just unfortunate.
- I am -- I don't know what else to do. I
- 22 mean, if you are at a point now where you are trying
- 23 to do right, and you have the money, and you have the
- 24 experience, if your money is no good, I don't know
- 25 what else to say at this point. I mean, because if

- 1 they can simply switch the process, and because we can
- 2 say we are now going to go back and do it this way, we
- 3 have that option, that's true, but it stinks.
- It does not give to that developer his due
- 5 process.
- 6 What was supposed to be before us, when I
- 7 last spoke to you about, was a 90 day -- a 90 day
- 8 offer, allowing this man to do what we have allowed
- 9 other developers to do; nothing wrong with that, there
- 10 was no cost involved.
- He was willing to put down 10 percent.
- 12 And we turn back around, and now we do --
- 13 well, I just don't know.
- 14 But I -- wonderful, it's a wonderful case
- 15 for the viewing audience to follow, it will show you
- 16 just some of the things that happens on this Board,
- 17 and because you have the majority vote, you can ram it
- 18 through, you can justify it.
- 19 It is not right. It is not right.
- And then if that's the case, you can
- 21 advertise and say you have a list of buildings, and if
- 22 someone comes forward with an offer, then "we will
- 23 look you up first, and then we will make a decision
- 24 based upon who you are, or what community you are
- 25 from, and then we will come up with another rule."

- 1 It is not right. Public knowledge, we
- 2 shouldn't be doing it.
- 3 MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Hazuda.
- MS. HAZUDA: We want to thank Mr. Berdnik
- 5 for all of the work -- I would like to thank
- 6 Mr. Berdnik for all of the work he has done, in -- on
- 7 not only on this building, but all of the buildings,
- 8 and sometimes maybe we don't appreciate you enough, so
- 9 I would like to take a moment to do that.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: When I first saw this, I
- 13 didn't particularly care for it, because I thought we
- 14 had a proposal ready to go.
- 15 It sounds like we are trying to invite
- 16 someone else in, to level the playing field, and take
- 17 another offer, take another proposal.
- 18 So, I quess whether I like it or not, we
- 19 will just have to go with it.
- Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Taylor.
- MR. TAYLOR: You know, I will speak to the
- 23 issue, there is a lot of misinformation flying --
- 24 flying around about this.
- Mr. Roosevelt, you hold great, great sway

- 1 over this Board, and I have said it time and time
- 2 again, in this District, with its racial make-up of
- 3 students, that this Board has a special obligation to
- 4 be sensitive when it comes to these type of issues.
- And you know we had a very -- behind closed
- 6 door, very contentious meeting, and I commend
- 7 Mr. Brentley, who came out again, after we had
- 8 discussed, and we came out to the public, and nothing
- 9 was said, nothing was said at agenda review about this
- 10 issue.
- Now, when they talk about -- and I am
- 12 speaking more to the public, as now this is heading
- 13 out to the streets now, this is heading out to the
- 14 streets of the Hill District, and I think there is
- 15 many people from the community organizations, and
- 16 others, that we have talked to and heard from, this is
- 17 who that they would like to work with on some future
- 18 projects.
- But we need to be clear for the public, as
- 20 this goes for what Mr. Isler said, this probably will
- 21 be something that the press, hopefully -- hopefully,
- 22 will begin to talk about.
- 23 Because this is not a good situation. And
- 24 I am not pointing fingers at anybody.
- When it came to submitting, Mr. Berdnik is

- l correct, that there was only one submitted under --
- 2 whatever this RFP process, and I question whether it
- 3 is really an RFP pro -- a legal RFP process, because
- 4 we are not talking about buying anything, we are
- 5 talking about soliciting people who might want to buy
- 6 a building.
- 7 According to -- and I believe I shared some
- 8 of those e-mails that went back and forth from the
- 9 URA, and Oxbridge Development, which they were
- 10 basically told, "You cannot submit for this building,
- 11 because the Board has a policy," which the Board does
- 12 not, that you -- that we do not have a written policy,
- 13 Mr. -- that was made clear, that we do not have, and
- 14 you cannot produce a written policy that says the
- 15 Board will not sell a school building to a competing
- 16 educational institution.
- So, that's the reason why he was not able
- 18 to get into the process, because he was told he
- 19 couldn't get into the process.
- That wasn't fair.
- One of the things -- and again,
- 22 Mr. Brentley speaks to again, the money, he was
- 23 willing to offer \$125,000 for the building, but again,
- 24 that's a different question.
- We raised -- I heard from him, from this

- 1 developer, who approached School Board members, which
- 2 he should, and said, "I was excluded from this
- 3 process."
- The Board went around, and we said that he
- 5 should get a chance to submit and be heard.
- 6 He submitted to Mr. Berdnik, he told us,
- 7 and Mr. Berdnik told us at agenda review last week, he
- 8 would review the thing, and come back with a
- 9 recommendation.
- In my discussion, Mr. Brentley's discussion
- 11 with him, he felt -- in my opinion, felt that the best
- 12 offer for the District, because he was offering cash,
- 13 where the other one was saying a thousand here, for
- 14 the next six months, he was offering cash, and my
- 15 understanding, Mr. Berdnik, that the best -- in the
- 16 best interests of this District, and the taxpayers,
- 17 was Oxbridge Development.
- And, I did not know until recently, until
- 19 the last few hours, that we had had a legal one,
- 20 saying that this may be questionable, because it is
- 21 not following the RFP process.
- 22 Again, there is going to be some other
- 23 lawyers are going to take a look at that and question
- 24 that.
- But the developer, who is with us this

- 1 evening, comes out this evening with check in hand, he
- 2 offered to pay the 10 percent, because he wanted to
- 3 make sure that everything was clear.
- So he offered to come this evening,
- 5 Mr. Berdnik has a check right now, in the amount of
- 6 12,500, because the young man thought the Board was
- 7 going to be supporting this, this evening.
- 8 MS. HAZUDA: Why?
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: Because he was told, as me and
- 10 Mr, Brentley was told, that the recommendation was
- 11 that that was the best offer for the District, because
- 12 that was cash, it had community support for it, as it
- 13 has community support for it now.
- 14 And so --
- MR. McCREA: (Inaudible.)
- 16 MR. TAYLOR: You received a letter from the
- 17 Hill District Consensus Group and other ones.
- 18 MR. McCREA: But the staff didn't tell him.
- MR. TAYLOR: The staff didn't tell him
- 20 what?
- MR. McCREA: It would have come to my
- 22 committee, I would know.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Yes, please, he has the
- 24 floor, Mr. McCrea.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay. So that --

- MS. COLAIZZI: He has the floor.
- 2 MR. TAYLOR: That was the understanding.
- 3 MR. McCREA: (Inaudible.)
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: I am not saying anything, but
- 5 that was the understanding, and that was the right
- 6 decision. It was the right decision.
- 7 Because, Mr. McCrea, that's the Hill
- 8 District of Pittsburgh. And that is the predominantly
- 9 African American community. They have to right to say
- 10 who, what developer is coming into their community.
- I don't know whether you agree with that or
- 12 not, but I think they have the right to say what
- 13 developer is coming into the community.
- And as long as you have two people who are
- 15 viable, make viable offers, and again have the
- 16 wherewithal to maintain that building, we, as the
- 17 Board, not the URA, makes a decision to who those
- 18 buildings should be sold to, and we, as a Board,
- 19 ultimately make that decision.
- So there is nothing wrong with Mr. Berdnik
- 21 saying, "I think that this is the right one, and the
- 22 Board should do it."
- There is nothing wrong with that.
- And so I'm saying this now goes to the
- 25 streets, and I'll certainly let people know in the

- 1 Hill District what has occurred here, I will let them
- 2 know what has occurred in that meeting a few weeks
- 3 ago, it was a very racially divided meeting, it was
- 4 very ugly, very contentious, with very ugly things
- 5 being said, and the base and the core of that was
- 6 race.
- 7 And that is sad. Because when you have the
- 8 African American representative of that District, you
- 9 have the other, I think, African American
- 10 representative of the Hill District, African American
- 11 representative of Highland Park and myself, who are
- 12 saying we want to make sure this person gets in the
- 13 process, and that's what happened.
- And we had people who were fighting that
- 15 that person would even get a chance to get heard, when
- 16 I think they were unfairly excluded from the process.
- 17 This was very unfortunate.
- I am very sad for my last night to be
- 19 dealing with an issue like this.
- This is very sad. I am very, very sad.
- Mr. Brentley said he is angry, I am very
- 22 sad that this has occurred.
- 23 And I am going to stand with that young
- 24 man off of the Board, I can stand with him more
- 25 publicly.

- Because he is what we are talking about.
- I unashamedly say that we have to support
- 3 African American, and women, and other minorities, and
- 4 to do business with this District, and in this city.
- 5 I am -- there is no shame in me about that,
- 6 to see an African American developer, the things we
- 7 have to deal with in our own communities.
- 8 Right now they are building at the Granada
- 9 Theater, and the whole community cries about the lack
- 10 of African American workers on sites like that,
- 11 because we don't have any African American developers
- 12 in this city.
- This is one I think that can grow into
- 14 one. I am doing the best I can do to support him
- 15 right now, and I am going to go into the community,
- 16 and let people know what's going on here, and I hope
- 17 we will begin to hear from some of the voices, and
- 18 some of the organized people in the Hill to say, "This
- 19 is the group that we want to work, yes, we want to
- 20 work in this African American community, we want to
- 21 work with an African American developer.
- Why? Because Ralph Banks and
- 23 Audrey Morrell told you that those are things that are
- 24 good for this city; that when it comes to working in
- 25 the community, you can count on an African American

- 1 firm to hire African Americans to work in those
- 2 communities.
- And they said, again they said, the
- 4 cities -- and I am done -- but the cities that do the
- 5 best, and grow the most, are the cities that have the
- 6 most vibrant and strongest minority and women business
- 7 programs. And they proved that.
- And I'm saying, what's happening here is
- 9 unfortunate, and it is sending that message that we
- 10 continue to send, that we have sent year after year
- 11 after year, is that women, minorities, African
- 12 Americans, need not apply to Pittsburgh Public
- 13 Schools.
- I'm very disappointed in this.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- Mr. Weiss, and Mr. Berdnik, there was a
- 18 proposal that was submitted in the RFP process, in a
- 19 timely manner; correct?
- MR. WEISS: Yes.
- MR. ISLER: Can you give us the name of the
- 22 developer who submitted on time?
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Berdnik has it, I don't
- 24 have it in front of me.
- MR. BERDNIK: Trek.

- 1 MR. ISLER: So, it is Trek that submitted
- 2 in a timely manner; correct? And it is Oxridge --
- 3 Oxsridge -- am I correct in that?
- 4 MR. WEISS: Oxbridge.
- 5 MR. ISLER: Oxbridge. -- Oxbridge who had
- 6 asked us, and I believe the community, to allow him to
- 7 submit his proposal on time; correct -- to resubmit,
- 8 that he was not able to get the information in on
- 9 time; am I right on that?
- MR. BERDNIK: Yes.
- MR. ISLER: And he was the young man who
- 12 came to the public hearing?
- MR. BERDNIK: Yes.
- MR. ISLER: So what we are asking for,
- 15 tonight, is to allow the process to be reopened, so
- 16 that that young man who came before us, who I believe
- 17 is a developer, if I can go back, because I want to
- 18 make sure that I am correct, was a graduate of the
- 19 Temper school, has done minority development in the
- 20 city; correct?
- MR. BERDNIK: Yes. He lives on the South
- 22 Side.
- MR. ISLER: And he is the one who came to
- 24 us at that public hearing, and said he was not able to
- 25 get his proposal in in time; am I right? For whatever

- 1 reason, I don't know what it was.
- 2 MR. BERDNIK: Yes.
- MR. ISLER: But it now allows him to submit
- 4 his proposal. But he had never submitted an RFP
- 5 proposal; am I right? I mean, I am trying to get the
- 6 facts straight here.
- 7 MR. BERDNIK: There was not a proposal
- 8 submitted in the form, manner, and timeline on that
- 9 request.
- MR. ISLER: And this would allow him to do
- 11 it?
- MR. BERDNIK: In an apples to apples basis,
- 13 we will have proposals to compare, yes.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Sumpter?
- Just for clarification, and I do remember
- 17 this quite well, I just want to add this.
- In October, this Board had in front of them
- 19 a proposal that came from Trek, that went through the
- 20 RFP process of the URA, and it was in front of us to
- 21 vote for. The public hearing, prior to that, we had a
- 22 gentleman that came in front of us, and told us that
- 23 he had attempted to put his offer in, but was not
- 24 successful.
- Mr. Berdnik, could you please pay attention

- 1 to me, sir.
- 2 MR. BERDNIK: I am.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 4 He was not successful for several reasons.
- 5 One of them was that he was -- he had told us, anyway,
- 6 at the public hearing, that he was not permitted to
- 7 put a bid in, simply because he was going to go for
- 8 education services in that building.
- 9 And we do not generally sell our buildings
- 10 to anybody that is going to compete with this
- 11 District.
- 12 I remember that very clearly.
- Am I correct, so far, sir?
- MR. BERDNIK: I don't believe in the public
- 15 testimony that a notion of competing educational
- 16 institution was presented, but it is clear in the RFP,
- 17 and it is in our agreement with the URA that we don't
- 18 consider competing institutions.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 20 Later we found out that there was an actual
- 21 plan that he had, and it was given to us, and I saw
- 22 the e-mails, so I know exactly what has been referred
- 23 to in this room.
- This opportunity, this evening, if I
- 25 understand correctly, gives now this gentleman the

- 1 opportunity to go back and put his plan forward, as
- 2 well, and anybody else can come forward, too, now. So
- 3 not just Trek, or Oxford, but anyone else -- or
- 4 Oxbridge, I apologize, anyone else can come forward
- 5 now, as well; am I correct, sir?
- 6 MR. BERDNIK: Yes.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 8 Dr. Allen.
- 9 DR. ALLEN: Yes.
- 10 Although, Mr. Taylor, you and I disagree on
- 11 the item before us, I do want to thank you for
- 12 bringing this to our attention, so that we could
- 13 ensure that there was, you know, additional
- 14 consideration for Oxbridge Development, as we want to
- 15 make sure that we sell our schools, as well as have
- 16 community input about who develops in that -- in our
- 17 communities.
- 18 And this was to, I think, delaying what was
- 19 put before us, the Trek proposal, provided that
- 20 opportunity for us to get additional community input
- 21 for both proposals.
- 22 And so, I think that as has been stated by
- 23 some Board members, that this now, I think, rights
- 24 that process, in terms of it now being open, as
- 25 opposed to it being denied before, based on what is an

- 1 existing arrangement with the URA.
- 2 And so I think that for future
- 3 considerations, we really should go back and look at
- 4 the URA arrangement, if the Board feels that proposals
- 5 should not be screened, or if they should be screened
- 6 at a certain threshold level, so that the URA is not
- 7 discouraging proposals, which is why I think we gave
- 8 additional time, and then those considerations can be
- 9 made by the staff, to be referred to the Board.
- 10 So I would suggest that you look at the URA
- 11 policy, because that seems to be the area of
- 12 contention here.
- And I am happy that it now is an open
- 14 process for both to submit, and additional people as
- 15 well.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Dr. Allen.
- 17 I would like to remind this Board that
- 18 there is more business ahead of us, and there is still
- 19 also a reception after this meeting, so I would like
- 20 to try to ask all of you to consider that, please.
- 21 Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, thank you, but I just
- 23 want to say, in considering that, that is the
- 24 disadvantage of having something before you just hours
- 25 before the meeting, especially when we had a clear

- 1 understanding it was going to be something completely
- 2 different, unfortunately, but this is the way it is.
- I want to make a comment, too, that let's
- 4 not get this thing twisted. This process here is not
- 5 beneficial to the Oxbridge Development.
- I mean, we can flip it all we want, it is
- 7 not beneficial.
- 8 What he was under the impression of, is
- 9 what the last conversation that I had with this staff,
- 10 and the developer on the phone, and that was getting a
- 11 right to have an option on the building for 90 days,
- 12 free of charge, while he would solicit support, and
- 13 line things up.
- When you do that, that gives him the
- 15 exclusive right, for lack of a better term, a first
- 16 right to purchase, for that particular building.
- What we have here, now that we have
- 18 conveniently flipped, "Oh, we are doing you a favor
- 19 sir, so you can submit it," is you have opened the
- 20 entire process up.
- 21 Which now, can get into a bidding -- great
- 22 for the District, but it is bad for the developer who
- 23 was under the impression that he was the only one that
- 24 offered cash, and he was the one who was going to be
- 25 given a 90 day option of going through, and getting

- 1 his support.
- 2 Let's not flip it, and let's not get this
- 3 thing twisted here, it is not a beneficial tool for
- 4 him, and it is misleading.
- Yes, we have authority to do it, but it's
- 6 bad.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Fink?
- 8 Anybody?
- 9 Mrs. Fink?
- Mrs. Hazuda, do you have any comments?
- MS. HAZUDA: No.
- MR. WEISS: Thank you.
- Mr. McCrea?
- Mr. Taylor?
- MR. TAYLOR: I just want to again make it
- 16 clear, that this is being made up as it goes along.
- 17 No one was referring to the legal part, in which the
- 18 solicitor's office said that we had to do that.
- Mr. Berdnik told you, in the minutes,
- 20 people have to remember what he said, he said that we
- 21 all agree that the Board was saying that Oxbridge
- 22 should have been heard.
- So Mr. Berdnik told you he was going to
- 24 receive them, he said it at agenda review, he just
- 25 received it a few hours ago, so he could not make any

- 1 recommendation to you.
- 2 He told you he was going to make a
- 3 recommendation before the next meeting.
- 4 DR. ALLEN: This is it.
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: Huh?
- 6 DR. ALLEN: This is it.
- 7 MR. TAYLOR: No, his recommendation was
- 8 going to be to support -- to make a decision on which
- 9 company to go for.
- Then he received a legal thing saying you
- 11 can't do that; that if you do an RFP, that's what this
- 12 legal thing is.
- So the part that you are talking about
- 14 reopening it, was not the reason why he made that
- 15 recommendation.
- DR. ALLEN: That is my understanding.
- MR. TAYLOR: But that is not the reality.
- 18 The reality was they were told that it was a legal
- 19 thing.
- I believe, from my conversation,
- 21 Mr. Berdnik's conversation, that Mr. Berdnik was
- 22 comfortable making that recommendation to the Board,
- 23 in the best interest of the Board.
- So that's what I am saying, we are sitting
- 25 here with this as if Mr. Berdnik did not tell you what

- 1 he was going to do.
- 2 Just because you are not recalling it,
- 3 Mr. Isler, does not mean he did not tell you word for
- 4 word what he was going to do.
- 5 MR. ISLER: (Inaudible.)
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: But if you don't believe me,
- 7 we have minutes, that they can -- is that the
- 8 stenographer? He is still there. So go and review
- 9 the minutes. Mr. Berdnik instructed you what he was
- 10 going to do. He was going to review that, he was
- 11 going to make a recommendation by the next meeting.
- DR. ALLEN: But it doesn't say what that
- 13 recommendation was.
- 14 Sorry.
- MS. COLAIZZI: If I may --
- MR. TAYLOR: He never got a --
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Taylor --
- MR. TAYLOR: -- chance to bring it forth,
- 19 because he was told that he couldn't; that was like a
- 20 legal RFP process, like -- and this is citing, I
- 21 believe, bind something, or whatever, with RFP, so you
- 22 can't put an RFP, and then just select a company after
- 23 you are done, you can only select out of that group of
- 24 people.
- Then the question is, is that an RFP, like

- 1 you're buying goods and services. I question that,
- 2 and I do think that there may be some attorneys that
- 3 may question that.
- 4 So --
- 5 MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Taylor, Mr. Berdnik has
- 6 been waiting to respond to the comment you keep
- 7 making. Do you want him to do so?
- MR. BERDNIK: I mean, I think the --
- 9 MR. TAYLOR: I am sorry to put you in this
- 10 position, that's all.
- MR. BERDNIK: No, I mean, I think it's
- 12 fair. We are certainly -- you know, as the staff, we
- 13 are intriqued to -- we have an offer that's
- 14 interesting enough, look, we meet once a week, the
- 15 solicitor's office, staff, the Urban Redevelopment
- 16 Authority, we looked at what our options were here.
- I mean, let's lay them on the table. You
- 18 can do -- we could do nothing for another week, for
- 19 another month; right? And so we would have had the
- 20 results from an RFP for September that would keep
- 21 getting staler.
- We could move forward the proposal that
- 23 didn't move forward in October, and then we would have
- 24 this cloud of was there a proposal, that the URA
- 25 didn't give you, forever hanging over us. That

- 1 doesn't seem satisfactory.
- We could move forward a proposal that
- 3 didn't come to us through our RFP process.
- 4 There is case law that says that is not
- 5 appropriate to do it that way.
- 6 So the fourth option, which is before us
- 7 tonight, which is the recommendation, it is the best
- 8 recommendation I can bring to this Board, to make sure
- 9 that this developer has an opportunity, as well as the
- 10 developer that responded to our RFP, is to open the
- 11 process, so in the same form, and the say manner, from
- 12 Oxbridge we have a proposal, or anyone else, that
- 13 would be similar to the one Trek submitted, that meets
- 14 the guidelines in the RFP, Mr. Taylor.
- This is the best recommendation, given the
- 16 case law, I can bring you tonight.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 18 Thank you, Mr. Berdnik.
- MR. TAYLOR: As I still have the floor,
- 20 just a final question to our solicitor.
- 21 Under what legal mandates are we to accept
- 22 the recommendation of the URA, in this process? What
- 23 legal, and what legal binding rights does the URA have
- 24 in this process? And again, how are we legally bound
- 25 by any actions or recommendation by the URA?

- MR. WEISS: Well, they --
- 2 MR. TAYLOR: Or are they simply advisory?
- 3 MR. WEISS: The District has utilized the
- 4 URA to solicit proposals for the disposal of District
- 5 buildings, to screen them, and to present their
- 6 findings to the District.
- 7 The situation here is that there is --
- 8 there was a public proposal process that was followed
- 9 by one developer.
- The other developer claimed that he was
- 11 foreclosed from submitting a proposal, because his
- 12 proposed use involved a competing educational
- 13 institution, which is mentioned in the RFP. The RFP
- 14 states the District will not consider proposals for
- 15 use from competing educational institutions.
- Sometime thereafter, outside of the
- 17 process, the developer submitted a proposal which
- 18 was -- had certain items on it, and it's my
- 19 understanding, later -- earlier today, he tendered a
- 20 check for a percentage of the purchase price.
- Now, I was called today about this matter,
- 22 and pointed out that under this case that you have
- 23 mentioned, but not totally consistently with what it
- 24 is, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania has said that
- 25 once a public body undertakes a proposal process, that

- 1 it may not necessarily be obligated to undertake, but
- 2 once you undertake it, you have to see it through
- 3 under its terms.
- 4 Briefly, that case dealt with the proposals
- 5 for concessions at greater Pittsburgh Airport, the old
- 6 airport.
- 7 The county solicitor's proposal required
- 8 each proposer to have certain elements in his
- 9 proposal,
- Thereafter, one of the proposers asked if
- 11 he could modify his proposal to eliminate one part of
- 12 it. The county told him no, and proceeded to allow
- 13 another proposer to do that.
- So the disappointed vendor, so to speak,
- 15 challenged that, and ultimately prevailed in the
- 16 Supreme Court, and at that point I inherited the case,
- 17 I began working at the county in 1981, and I handled
- 18 the trial of the case, which is why I was so familiar
- 19 with it.
- The point of it is, the School District has
- 21 a proposal process that it is utilizing.
- It is obligated to see that process through
- 23 to its fair conclusion.
- The matter before you tonight will permit
- 25 this developer to submit a proposal in the manner in

- 1 which the RFP prescribes, to URA. It will also permit
- 2 others, if they want to, but they have --
- MR. TAYLOR: Oxbridge can?
- 4 MR. WEISS: Yes, Oxbridge can, absolutely.
- 5 That is all --
- 6 MR. TAYLOR: The RFP says it can't be a
- 7 competing educational --
- 8 MR. WEISS: Well, that's right, but his
- 9 last proposal, as I understand it, addressed incubator
- 10 space, and some other things.
- 11 So in reality, this case, in my judgment,
- 12 creates significant difficulty for the District, in
- 13 allowing a developer to make a proposal outside of
- 14 process.
- Now, if, down the road, the Board wants to
- 16 consider some other process, with or without the URA,
- 17 that's the Board's decision.
- 18 But for this particular case, this will
- 19 permit this developer to submit a proposal consistent
- 20 with the RFP, consistent with its requirements, the
- 21 information it requires, and then the Board can make a
- 22 decision.
- There is no question that the decision, as
- 24 to who to sell buildings to, rests with the Board, not
- 25 with the URA.

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: I will pass, Mrs. Colaizzi. I
- 3 just wish, Mr. Weiss, you would have given that
- 4 explanation a lot sooner.
- 5 Thank you, sir.
- 6 MR. WEISS: Well, I wasn't asked.
- 7 MR. ISLER: I know. I know.
- MR. BRENTLEY: It still doesn't change
- 9 anything.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley.
- 11 MR. ISLER: I believe I have the floor.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Bill, you have the floor.
- MR. ISLER: I believe I have the floor, and
- 14 there is some Board members who protest when they are
- 15 interrupted.
- So in all due respect, if the courtesy
- 17 would be shown to all Board members, it would be nice.
- Again, Mr. Weiss, I thank you for that, I
- 19 just wish it would have come a lot sooner in this
- 20 discussion.
- Thank you.
- MR. WEISS: If I was asked, I would have
- 23 said it.
- MR. ISLER: I understand that, Mr. Weiss, I
- 25 knew you were going to have a retort.

- 1 Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 3 Mr. Sumpter?
- 4 MR. SUMPTER: Just a question. We are
- 5 talking about request for proposals.
- Is this Board bound by any law, as to which
- 7 proposal has to be selected, as a result of the
- 8 process going through an RFP?
- 9 MR. WEISS: It is bound to observe the
- 10 criteria that it sets forth. So, as an example -- and
- 11 I am not intimately familiar with this one, but if you
- 12 have a process where you set forth criteria, and the
- 13 analysis would indicate that proposer A meets the
- 14 criteria more fully than proposer B, and you award it
- 15 to proposer B, then A may have a legitimate cause of
- 16 action.
- So again, if you say that you are going to
- 18 award it based on certain criteria, those criteria
- 19 have to be followed.
- MR. SUMPTER: Okay.
- Then the question is: As a result of going
- 22 through this RFP, on purchasing a building, are you
- 23 bound to take the highest bidder, lowest bidder; does
- 24 it matter? Or can you select which proposal that
- 25 meets the criteria that you want to sell for?

- MR. WEISS: If the proposal states that the
- 2 award will be made on the basis of the highest
- 3 financial return, then, of course, that's the measure.
- If the proposal states that it is going to
- 5 be based on --
- 6 MR. SUMPTER: Merit.
- 7 MR. WEISS: -- for example, the highest
- 8 possible return, uses consistent with the community,
- 9 and things like that, then it becomes a little more
- 10 subjective.
- 11 MR. SUMPTER: So, I would recommend that
- 12 this RFP that goes out is not bound, or constrained by
- 13 financial amounts, saying we are going to have to
- 14 award to the highest, or we are going to have to award
- 15 to the lowest, or whatever, and it is worded in such a
- 16 way that the criteria -- but then we still have to --
- 17 we are going to discuss that at some later date, as to
- 18 whether certain criteria stays in there or not, such
- 19 that -- what I am looking for is the situation where
- 20 the Board can select, and is not forced to select a
- 21 proposal that it might not want, but select a proposal
- 22 based on what that proposal says, and how comfortable
- 23 that Board feels with that proposal.
- Now, individuals have different comfort
- 25 zones, so that whichever one comes in -- I am just

- 1 saying to not rule out a proposal, or not give an
- 2 undue advantage to anybody, not give an undue
- 3 advantage to the big buck developer, versus the small
- 4 developer, not give a -- if you are doing multifamily
- 5 housing, as opposed to single family, that's a
- 6 judgment call, but if you are doing housing as opposed
- 7 to something else, and it says you don't want it, then
- 8 it doesn't just knock it out of the consideration.
- 9 I guess what I am saying is, the proposals
- 10 that come forward to the URA, I would like to see all
- 11 the proposals that come forward from the URA, and then
- 12 let this Board decide which one they want on that
- 13 particular building.
- MR. WEISS: We can certainly let
- 15 Mr. Berdnik's office make that clear.
- MR. SUMPTER: Okay.
- 17 MS. COLAIZZI: I would like to close the
- 18 discussion.
- 19 I would like to make a motion to close the
- 20 discussion.
- MR. SUMPTER: The chair can't make a
- 22 motion.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I can make that motion. Why
- 24 can't I make the motion?
- MR. BRENTLEY: I still have a comment I

- 1 wanted to make.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Can I make that motion?
- 3 MR. WEISS: Board members can make it, the
- 4 chair shouldn't make that motion.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: And I would like to make a
- 6 comment.
- 7 MR. WEISS: The chair shouldn't make a
- 8 motion.
- 9 The rules of the Board state, the chair
- 10 doesn't make a motion.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I have a comment, and I
- 12 would like to make a comment.
- 13 That's --
- MS. COLAIZZI: Mr. Brentley, go ahead,
- 15 please. And I would appreciate if you would show me
- 16 the same respect that you asked me to show you, sir.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, you just put --
- MS. COLAIZZI: And I did turn it off.
- MR. BRENTLEY: -- something on the Board
- 20 you didn't have the legal --
- MS. COLAIZZI: It was my turn, sir.
- MR. BRENTLEY: -- right to do it.
- MS. COLAIZZI: It was my turn, just like I
- 24 gave you the floor, I am asking you to show me the
- 25 same amount of respect.

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: I --
- MS. COLAIZZI: So I will turn my mic off,
- 3 and give you the floor, sir, you can say what you
- 4 want.
- 5 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, plus you don't have the
- 6 legal authority to put a motion on the floor --
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: If you want to have this
- 8 discussion, we will have this discussion.
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: -- to shut people up,
- 10 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: It has been removed.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you. That's good.
- 13 Thank God.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Are you done? Do you want
- 15 to make a comment?
- MR. BRENTLEY: I am speaking. I am
- 17 speaking.
- MS. COLAIZZI: We know
- MR. BRENTLEY: I want to just to ask
- 20 Mr. Weiss, you said that you were contacted by
- 21 someone. Who were you contacted by?
- MR. WEISS: There was a meeting in
- 23 Mr. Berdnik's office with representative of the URA,
- 24 and Mr. Berdnik, and an attorney from my office, and I
- 25 was called to participate in the meeting, it was

- 1 around 10:00 o'clock this morning.
- 2 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- 3 And that was the meeting that there was
- 4 some indication that there was some legalities as to
- 5 how this thing was handled, or that was the meeting
- 6 that led to opening up the process?
- 7 MR. WEISS: It was a regular meeting, on
- 8 Tuesdays, with the -- Mr. Berdnik's office and the URA
- 9 and our office, and it was in that context that this
- 10 was discussed, and I was called about it, and I
- 11 indicated what my view was, based upon this case, and
- 12 I had furnished the case to Mr. Berdnik.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- Mr. Berdnik, can you just tell me, what is
- 15 the process, then, for those in the viewing audience,
- 16 we have a list of buildings that are for sale, if
- 17 someone is interested, what is the proper process that
- 18 they should go through?
- 19 MR. BERDNIK: That's a great question.
- You could either go to the URA web site, or
- 21 go to the School District's web site, there is a link
- 22 on properties for sale.
- Claire at the URA is the first point of
- 24 contact.
- There is an open proposal process for most

- 1 of our school buildings. For certain school
- 2 buildings, we have specific RFP's.
- 3 The situation at hand would be clearly
- 4 delineated by school buildings on the list. There is
- 5 a page that takes you to a link with information about
- 6 each building.
- If you request a proposal package, the
- 8 proposal package is weighty, and it requires you to go
- 9 through a process, similar to underwriting, like you
- 10 would almost like a mortgage, where you have to have
- 11 your sources and uses of funds, descriptions about
- 12 what you plan on doing to the building, some
- 13 architectural sketches, and so forth.
- So it is a fairly detailed process, but it
- 15 starts with the Urban Redevelopment Authority.
- In fact, they make the arrangements for the
- 17 tours of the schools, although our personnel are
- 18 always present to quide those forces.
- 19 MR. BRENTLEY: And so, but still, there are
- 20 buildings where potential buyers contacted you first,
- 21 and went through your office, and then shared with the
- 22 URA at a later date; is that correct?
- MR. BERDNIK: The first -- when I get those
- 24 phone calls, the first words out of my mouth are,
- 25 usually, "We need to get you in contact with the Urban

- 1 Redevelopment Authority. Let me, you know, take some
- 2 information, this is who you need to call."
- 3 Kyra Straussman is the director of the real
- 4 estate division, Claire Hosteny is the No. 2 there,
- 5 Claire really leads the charge for us.
- If you call our office, and between
- 7 Mr. Camarda and I, we cover probably 18 hours a day
- 8 coverage, if you feel like you are stuck over at the
- 9 Urban Redevelopment Authority, please, heavens, call
- 10 me, 412-622-3777, call Pete, 412-622-3911, we will
- 11 make sure that your voice is heard.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I appreciate it, thank
- 13 you, very much.
- My just comments in closing is just real
- 15 clear, even with the explanation from the solicitor,
- 16 this still has some questions as to how this
- 17 particular case was handled.
- 18 URA versus the District.
- Okay. Here is an other, we got an offer.
- Okay. Give you cash, we got to wait.
- Okay. Now we are going to reopen it even
- 22 though -- it still raises several questions on this of
- 23 how this particular developer was handled.
- And, I have to just say, finally, again,
- 25 not a good process, not a clean process, on this

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particular case.
              MS. COLAIZZI: Are you done?

- 8 MR. TAYLOR: Oh.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: And when you are done
- 10 passing it out, could you please turn on your mic and
- 11 explain it.
- 12 Can we have some down here.
- MR. TAYLOR: First, I -- first, I would
- 14 like to -- Mrs. Colaizzi, about this item, about the
- 15 new business item on the naming of the schools, first,
- 16 I would like to -- I would like the Board, honestly --
- 17 and some of the arguments that Mr. Isler made, around
- 18 the policy, are beyond specious arguments.
- When they did this, the whole thought
- 20 process around policy, one of the first things that we
- 21 made clear, is that there were not going to be any
- 22 amendments, they were just going to be cleaning up
- 23 language, and we are not going to go through amending
- 24 the language of the policies, and those.
- 25 So clearly, from his process, was not the

- 1 time where you would have talked about amendments,
- 2 according to what he and Mr. Sumpter had told me, it
- 3 was just cleaning up language.
- So, again, that would not have been the
- 5 time for us to go through there.
- 6 Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 7 So -- and so again, I can see about the
- 8 problem. But again, the only thing I can see about
- 9 the process is I believe in the new policy that we
- 10 passed, that you have to submit -- is it like two
- 11 months, or I thought it was a second --
- MR. WEISS: No. No.
- MR. TAYLOR: Huh?
- MR. WEISS: No, it is not. Board -- no,
- 15 no, it is not --
- MR. TAYLOR: So I am not -- I am not out of
- 17 line of any current policy, by presenting it this
- 18 evening, in this matter?
- 19 MR. WEISS: You are not out of line in
- 20 presenting it. Whether the Board wants to deal with
- 21 it, this is it.
- MR. TAYLOR: I thought I had seen
- 23 something, that that --
- MR. WEISS: No.
- MR. TAYLOR: That is something you are

- l working on, but it is not to be passed yet.
- 2 MR. WEISS: Well, I think it is the
- 3 policy -- I think that rule is more directed at
- 4 administration proposals, to give --
- 5 MR. TAYLOR: I see. All right.
- 6 MR. WEISS: -- the Board a chance to review
- 7 it.
- 8 MR. TAYLOR: So when Mr. Isler said we are
- 9 making policy on the fly, we are allowed, Mr. Weiss --
- 10 Mr. Weiss?
- MR. WEISS: Yes.
- MR. TAYLOR: We are allowed as Board
- 13 members to, as Mr. Isler characterized it, making
- 14 policy on the fly; it is not the best way to do
- 15 things, I think we ought to provide these -- we did
- 16 talk about it at agenda review, so I did bring it up
- 17 this evening, that I would be receiving, and this
- 18 is -- I am receiving it now.
- So I just wanted to make sure that people
- 20 understood that again I'm not trying to violate a
- 21 policy, I am not trying to do this on the fly, I
- 22 tried, again I let people know that this was coming up
- 23 at agenda review, and that -- that I would be
- 24 presenting this, this evening.
- MR. SUMPTER: (Inaudible.)

- 1 MS. COLAIZZI: Let him finish.
- 2 MR. SUMPTER: Okay.
- 3
  I'm sorry, go ahead.
- 4 MR. TAYLOR: I mean, the reason why it is
- 5 important, what he said, that is the basis of --
- 6 again, that was the basis of Mr. Isler's no vote on
- 7 the other one, that it was violating, that we had went
- 8 through this, and you didn't go through that.
- 9 So if people don't use that as a basis to
- 10 vote no, then I think that is important, whatever
- 11 Mr. Sumpter said is an important comment.
- MS. COLAIZZI: The point I was trying to
- 13 make, is that you have the floor, and I wanted to try
- 14 to keep some sort of order here.
- And are you going to make this as a motion
- 16 now, and move it into the record?
- MR. TAYLOR: Yes. So it is already on
- 18 agenda to be voted on, you don't have to make a motion
- 19 to put a new business item on the agenda.
- MS. COLAIZZI: No, you have to make this
- 21 motion.
- 22 MR. WEISS: You have to make a motion.
- MR. TAYLOR: Okay.
- 24 Well, then I make a motion, again, I just
- 25 want people to see the bottom one, the only change in

- 1 the policy is that again once the school -- it is
- 2 underlined, that's how we, you know, differentiate
- 3 what's new policy, what's changed policy.
- 4 "Once a school has been named for a
- 5 distinguished person in accordance with this policy,
- 6 any proposal to rename an existing school or school
- 7 building shall always include the name of that
- 8 distinguished person."
- 9 So I make a motion to enter this new
- 10 business item for a vote.
- MS. COLAIZZI: There is a motion on the
- 12 floor.
- 13 Is there a second?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Second.
- 15 MS. COLAIZZI: There is a motion on the
- 16 floor, it's open for discussion.
- 17 Dr. Allen.
- 18 DR. ALLEN: Does the Policy Committee meet
- 19 ad hoc?
- 20 MR. ISLER: Yes, ma'am, we do. And if you
- 21 go back to the process, we did exactly what Mr. Taylor
- 22 said we did, we only cleaned up the manual from 1992
- 23 to 2009.
- It is now on line for everybody to see.
- 25 All Board members can access it, we can access it this

- l evening.
- One of the things that Mrs. Colaizzi is
- 3 going to make sure, that there is a computer at all of
- 4 our meetings, so that we will be able to access it and
- 5 see what's going on.
- The second process is to go through how we
- 7 are going to handle changing, reviewing and changing
- 8 policies that Board members want to, and how we are
- 9 going to propose policies going forward. That is the
- 10 next step.
- Because we met fairly consistently for a
- 12 number of months, we have taken a break until after
- 13 the 1st of the year.
- DR. ALLEN: So my comment, would -- I guess
- 15 I am going to have to vote no on it, but I would like
- 16 to defer it to when the committee does meet to discuss
- 17 new policies.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Dr. Allen.
- Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yeah, I -- once again, I
- 21 just have to thank Mr. Taylor, your points about
- 22 building names, and how they should be handled.
- And as I mentioned, there are only a few
- 24 that -- that have folks from our community, and so, I
- 25 would hate to have something be renamed, and have

- 1 those names removed, or not to be acknowledged in the
- 2 name, and so that would be it.
- 3 I support it.
- 4 MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Fink?
- 5 MS. FINK: I think Dara had an excellent
- 6 suggestion, about waiting until the Policy Committee
- 7 meets, and I think that I would -- I think that would
- 8 be the best way to handle this, at this point.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 10 Mr. McCrea?
- 11 Mr. Taylor, I'm going to -- thank you.
- 12 Mr. Isler?
- MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- I just want to clarify something for
- 15 Mr. Taylor, and I do thank you for acknowledging the
- 16 work of the Policy Committee, and acknowledging.
- When I said making policy on the fly,
- 18 Mr. Taylor, what I was getting at is in seeing the
- 19 sentence that you added, "Once a school has been named
- 20 for a distinguished person," I would in discussion, if
- 21 we were doing this by committee, and we were working
- 22 through this, you used the words, and when you spoke,
- 23 about history, and historically significant people, so
- 24 I would even request certain changes to this
- 25 particular sentence, based upon a very, very rich

- 1 discussion, with nine members of the Board.
- 2 And that's what I regret we have not had
- 3 time to do.
- And I think if we are going to make a
- 5 policy that is going to stand the test of time, we
- 6 need to do it with discussion and input not only from
- 7 us, but also have the public be able to comment.
- 8 Those two things are what I was speaking
- 9 about.
- I take the making of policy very seriously,
- 11 as I am sure you do.
- 12 Thus, I would rather have had this
- 13 discussion prior to tonight's meeting.
- And I also clarify, that we are not able,
- 15 within an Executive Committee, to conduct official
- 16 business according to the Sunshine law. This was
- 17 never presented to us. All you said is you were going
- 18 to bring something forward.
- 19 At that time, I said exactly what I said
- 20 tonight.
- 21 Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Isler.
- 23 Mr. Sumpter?
- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- The last sentence, we will have to take

- 1 this up at some other time, but the last -- next to
- 2 the last sentence says, "Although the Board will
- 3 carefully consider community recommendations for
- 4 school names, the final responsibility for officially
- 5 naming" -- and it says here, "a school building" --
- 6 "shall rest with the Board."
- 7 Now, up until that point, I think it talked
- 8 about school. They made no reference to a building,
- 9 up until that point.
- 10 So I still say there is a distinction
- 11 between a school and a building.
- 12 But that sentence before the amendment,
- 13 gives the Board the wherewithal, that if they want to
- 14 keep -- if they want to take the recommendation from
- 15 the naming committee, they can, if they don't, they
- 16 don't have to, if they want to put a person's name on
- 17 a building, they can, if they don't, they don't have
- 18 to.
- This would bind future boards, to limit
- 20 their ability to do what they -- their power is in the
- 21 future.
- So if they choose to put a name on a
- 23 building, the sentence before that gives them that
- 24 right to do so.
- So it is not necessary to put it in

- 1 concrete that that's what has to happen, and it only
- 2 affects buildings from this point forward, that go
- 3 through this procedure, not previously named
- 4 buildings, or et cetera.
- 5 So, I'm one that would rather have a
- 6 lengthy discussion, and hear points of view, but not
- 7 at a legislative meeting, regarding creating policy.
- 8 So -- but if we want to stretch our
- 9 legislative meetings out, we can debate, talk, discuss
- 10 policy at those meetings, but I don't think that's
- 11 what the purpose of a legislative meeting is.
- We craft our policy, bring it to the
- 13 legislative meeting for approval or disapproval.
- But I still say that that amendment is not
- 15 necessary, and that the sentence before that gives the
- 16 Board the power to do what that amendment would say it
- 17 wants to do, if that is that Board's desire.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- 19 Is there any more questions or comments on
- 20 this motion?
- Seeing none, Mr. Weiss, may we have a roll
- 22 call, please.
- MR. WEISS: Dr. Allen?
- DR. ALLEN: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley?

               Secondly, I want to also ask my colleagues
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- 1 here, I pointed out before in the past the conditions
- 2 of the CEP program at Clayton, I am asking again that
- 3 we move quickly to resolve the issue there.
- Those students need attention. I know it's
- 5 something that we don't necessarily get involved with,
- 6 because we say it is kind of out of sight, out of
- 7 mind.
- I am asking again that this Board would
- 9 move, and place in on this agenda, to find a way to
- 10 discontinue its contract, bring those services
- 11 in-house, and to give those students the services that
- 12 they need within the District.
- And the final thing, I just wanted to read,
- 14 I have had some strong opinions before concerning our
- 15 sex ed. program, and I just wanted to read something
- 16 that I found interesting.
- I had asked for this Board to allow that
- 18 program to be presented to the Board, before we roll
- 19 it out to the schools.
- 20 And, this is just one segment, I will just
- 21 read you.
- 22 "It is part of the Pittsburgh Public
- 23 Schools' ongoing mission for children to achieve
- 24 academic excellence and strength of character, for the
- 25 District's health curriculum was reevaluated.

- "After extensive committee work for a new
- 2 health curriculum, there has been a development based
- 3 on a Board adopted comprehensive sexuality policy."
- We did not see a comprehensive sexuality
- 5 policy. We had an outline that we shared. We never
- 6 seen its detail on how this policy was going to
- 7 address the really, really, sensitive issues.
- But at the bottom, I guess this would serve
- 9 as somewhat of an opt out form, but at the bottom it
- 10 said here, "Two units.
- "For unit 4, the topics would be puberty
- 12 and hygiene, No. 1.
- "No. 2, human reproduction and personal
- 14 health.
- "Unit 5, the sexual health.
- "Sexual orientation, relationships,
- 17 intercourse, abstinence, and self-exploration."
- 18 God knows what that means.
- And then the final segment there is "HIV,
- 20 AIDS, STD's."
- By the way, this was given to a 6th grader.
- 22 And out of all of the things that this
- 23 Board has voted on, either through the Broad
- 24 Foundation, or Board folks pushing their own agenda,
- 25 this has got to be one of the most terrible things

- 1 that we can do as a District, and that is not
- 2 informing the community, and not allowing a broad
- 3 discussion on these items before we roll these out to
- 4 the students.
- 5 Students at that age are concerned about
- 6 video games, football, and baseball, but this item
- 7 comes in, and now all of a sudden someone has to
- 8 remind him about sexual orientation, and real
- 9 sensitive issues.
- 10 We should have taken our time on that, and
- 11 I think out of all of the things that hurt, that we
- 12 have voted on in the past, this has got to be one of
- 13 the most terrible things that we have done, without
- 14 informing the community, and it almost suggests, if we
- 15 are in a District that is predominantly African
- 16 American, what are you suggesting to this population?
- 17 "We can make this kind of stuff available
- 18 to you, but it is difficult to guarantee we can get
- 19 you up to speed in all of the other basic things."
- It's a terrible, terrible thing, and I have
- 21 asked before and, Mark, I am going to ask again, that
- 22 that curriculum should be brought before this Board,
- 23 it should have happened before we -- really, I think
- 24 it's out of sync, it is not legal, because you didn't
- 25 come before the Board for its final vote.

- 1 We should have had a final vote, before
- 2 this hit.
- I am asking again, that that be placed on
- 4 an agenda, and this community get an opportunity to
- 5 view.
- 6 We don't know how they are going to address
- 7 issues, as abortion, which is a very hot issue, and we
- 8 should have had some discussions, so at least, when it
- 9 hit the communities, we know exactly what to look
- 10 forward to.
- 11 Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Just for the record, when we
- 13 say announcements, at this time we are looking for
- 14 announcements that actually need to be announced.
- Those type of items that you just brought
- 16 up, Mr. Brentley, should have been brought up in an
- 17 Education Committee meeting, where we could have had a
- 18 full-blown discussion on it.
- 19 And Mr. --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Those are my announcements.
- 21 Those are announcements to me.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Those are very good subjects
- 23 of conversation, sir.
- 24 Could you please turn your mic off.
- MR. BRENTLEY: That is for me, you don't

- 1 control what I say.
- MS. COLAIZZI: I was not trying to control
- 3 what you are saying, I was merely suggesting that your
- 4 subjects would have been good subjects to have at
- 5 Education Committee meetings.
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: I determine that, not you.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Fink, do you have
- 8 anything else?
- 9 MS. FINK: No.
- 10 MS. COLAIZZI: Mrs. Hazuda?
- MS. HAZUDA: Since the school is still
- 12 named John A. Brashear, I am going to quote him.
- I might be paraphrasing.
- "I have loved the stars too fondly to be
- 15 fearful of the night."
- 16 And so while it has become night while we
- 17 are in here, I am going to keep my announcement really
- 18 short.
- This District is so huge, and there are so
- 20 many different things that we get involved in, and so
- 21 a few years ago the web site was redone, and we have
- 22 added to it, and we have just -- we just keep
- 23 developing more things, and growing, and getting
- 24 involved in more things, and so sometimes that web
- 25 site is a little challenging to navigate.

- In fact, we have moved our Excellence for
- 2 All videos, if you want to watch them at home, on the
- 3 top left where you used to be able to see that's what
- 4 it was, it is now behind the Pittsburgh -- the
- 5 Promise.
- 6 Yeah.
- No, it's not on the tab, it's the format.
- 8 Anyway, it is that top left.
- 9 The good news is, December 1st we have a
- 10 new web site, and the Communications and Public
- 11 Relations Committee was lucky enough to get a preview
- 12 of it a few weeks ago, and it is absolutely
- 13 wonderful.
- The team that is working on it, is doing an
- 15 outstanding job.
- It will still have a lot of tabs, but it
- 17 will be designed for the user.
- 18 If you are a parent, you may want to touch
- 19 this, and get into what you would, as a parent, be
- 20 interested in.
- In you are a staff member, you would go on
- 22 this, and get into it.
- The ease of going from one part of the site
- 24 to another, is so much better.
- And we really look forward to rolling it

- 1 out, and that will be December 1st.
- 2 So I invite everybody to go on it, it will
- 3 probably lock up -- no. But it is -- it is -- it will
- 4 hold more information, it will hold additional videos,
- 5 so, it's really a good thing, and the ease of
- 6 navigating, that's what I want to say, a lot easier to
- 7 navigate.
- 8 So, thank you.
- 9 MS. COLAIZZI: And our policy manual will
- 10 be on there then; right?
- MS. HAZUDA: Absolutely.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- Mr. McCrea, do you have any announcements?
- MR. McCREA: I just have, our budget books
- 15 will be available in the office after the meeting, and
- 16 the public hearing is -- December 2nd?
- MS. COLAIZZI: 1st.
- MR. BERDNIK: 1st.
- MR. McCREA: December 1st.
- So come on out if you want to look over the
- 21 budget.
- 22 And happy turkey day.
- MS. COLAIZZI: At noon is the public
- 24 hearing.
- Mr. Taylor, do you have any announcements?

- 1 MR. TAYLOR: I apologize, it is no one, you
- 2 know to blame, but I had wanted this evening to
- 3 recognize our Pittsburgh Public School graduate who
- 4 died at Fort Hood, and I think that we should pick a
- 5 more special time to really recognize that person, who
- 6 is also a Langley graduate, the same as the Pittsburgh
- 7 police officer who was killed earlier this year, and I
- 8 don't -- I think that we ought to do something at
- 9 Langley, so I won't say any more on that, and I hope
- 10 that the Board will do -- next month will do something
- 11 special for our person, of our Pittsburgh Public
- 12 School alumni, who we lost at Fort Hood.
- 13 And leaving it at that, I just want to
- 14 again wish the city a happy Thanksgiving, in
- 15 particular, and another thank you to the people of the
- 16 East end.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Taylor.
- Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Colaizzi.
- Yesterday, in one of the papers, there was
- 21 an article about the Pittsburgh Promise, and some
- 22 people in the community who are taking it upon
- 23 themselves to help with the fundraising, which I think
- 24 is -- and I don't want to single them out, but I do
- 25 think it is a very, very significant contribution that

- 1 they are making on behalf of the children of the City
- 2 of Pittsburgh.
- And I bring it up, because every time there
- 4 is an article in one of the -- every time I bring --
- 5 every time there is an article in one of the papers,
- 6 I'm sure like a lot of other Board members, we get a
- 7 lot of telephone calls, a lot of e-mails.
- 8 What's really interesting is the number of
- 9 telephone calls and e-mails we are getting from
- 10 outside the area, people who are somewhat envious of
- 11 what we are doing in Pittsburgh.
- 12 And again I would like to thank this
- 13 administrative team that has put the Promise together,
- 14 and for all of those people in the city who are
- 15 helping to make it become a reality.
- Thank you.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you.
- Mr. Sumpter?
- MR. SUMPTER: I don't have a full
- 20 announcement.
- There were some schools that were
- 22 recognized in Sunday's paper, their achievement in
- 23 making AYP in several years, but we can save that for
- 24 the good news moment another time.
- I don't have the list with me, but we can

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remember to recognize them later.
