                            Over the last five years, I believe that we
have had some challenges that we did not respond to
correctly. My vote will be a no vote.
    I'm standing for those poor students who
have been victimized over the last five years by the
administration.
Our new incoming president, unfortunately, voted for some of those questionable things in the poor communities, and so \(I\) will be voting no.
I will put a challenge out to the incoming leadership, that it is important that we recognize a diversity.
It is important that we find a way to include those Board members who are here, who actually have children in the District. It is important as
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well.

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    And so, as we continue to do things,
unfortunately race continues to play a mayor part.
    There are other forces, outside this
conference room here, continue to play a heavy part in
the leadership of this Board, and unfortunately our
children continue to be victimized, and stuck in the
middle.
    So my vote will be a no vote, it will
represent those struggling families and communities
who have been targeted over the last year, by this
administration, and the incoming leadership as well as
the outgoing leadership of this Board.

My vote for this position of the first vice president will also be a no vote.

Both candidates, over the last year, have voted in the affirmative on questionable initiative -initiatives, costly initiatives, and initiatives that have been targeted in the poor neighborhoods, which some research has now been able to show that it is failing, and continue to fail.

I am disappointed in their votes over the last year, in terms of not speaking up for those folks who don't have a voice, especially those coming from their communities.

And so it would concern me to have either of these candidates in such a very, very important

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position, and when and if they are elected, I have
serious concerns about the future of poor children,
especially African American children in this District,
in terms of questionable votes, questionable
initiatives, and not giving access to the same kind of
education and opportunities that we see in certain
pockets.
    So I note my no vote simply represents a no
on how they have voted and responded to the poor
children of this community, and I would be voting no
on this vote as well.
    Thank you.
    MR. WEISS: I will proceed to call the
vote, again indicate your vote by the name of the
candidate.

My challenge again is that we need to hear a voice advocating for all; a voice advocating for especially poor children.

These positions are very, very powerful,

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very, very key in terms of helping those who need
help, and I have not heard that over the last year
from my colleague in the position of first vice
president.
    My fear is it will be the similar kinds of
leadership, in the second, in his role as the second
vice president, and so it concerns me, especially for
those children who are unable to speak for themselves,
and those parents who have been victimized over the
last year by the style of leadership.
    So I will be voting no, as well, on this
position.
    MR. WEISS: Okay.

Mr. Weiss, just a simple legal question, with the absence of Mark Roosevelt, the transition, would it require another vote with the new, or incoming Superintendent to replace that, or are we electing for the position, to fill that, not necessarily the person?

MR. WEISS: At such time as the Board appoints a successor to Mr. Roosevelt, the Board will then need to pass a resolution relating to that individual.

But statutorily, the Superintendent is the secretary in a District of the First Class $A$, so that's why it is written the way it is.

As I say, at some point in the near future, when an appointment is made, there will be a mandatory resolution so that the then Superintendent will be reflected as the secretary.

MR. BRENTLEY: So, it is similar to the position on the Pittsburgh Promise, and that is, the seat will always be held for whoever is the Superintendent, to be a Board member, and this is the same with this position here as well. So really, it is a moot point then.

MR. WEISS: That's correct.
MR. BRENTLEY: So then that person would

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automatically be, it wouldn't require a vote.
    MR. WEISS: Well, it requires a vote, but
you are right, it is the position, not the person.
    MR. BRENTLEY: Got it. Good enough. Thank
you.

First of all, I would like to thank
Mrs. Colaizzi very much for her leadership in the past
two years, in helping us work together in a positive manner.

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I want to thank all of you for the confidence you are showing in me tonight, by electing me the next president of the School Board.
I promise you it will be an exciting year, and I will be tapping into each and every one of you, because the talents that are on this Board are unbelievable, and if we can get the synergy that each of you has to offer, in collaboration with our administration, we can only go better and deeper and further.
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You know, $I$-- in reflecting the last -since the three years I have been on the Board, when we got the news of Mark Roosevelt leaving us, it was sort of like being hit by James Harrison. You know, it is like -- and you get up, and you say, "What happened?" And, "Jeez, did that hurt."

But, I want to thank the Superintendent. It did hurt. It hurts his leaving. But $I$ want to thank him for all he has done for the progressive work and the movement he has taken us forward, and I wish him and Dorothy well in their new adventures in Ohio. I am sure he will be very successful at Antioch College.

I look forward to working with our new Superintendent, when that decision is finalized.

I ask staff, please stay with us, trust us, collaborate with us, because it's going to be -- as I said, it's going to be an exciting year, and we have a lot of work to do, and we look forward to it.

There are nine people sitting at this end of the table, and I am not excluding you, but the nine elected officials, and we are all here for the kids in the Pittsburgh area.

You know, I have four children who are graduates, all of them, of the Pittsburgh Public Schools.

I got my degree from Robert Morris College when I was 48 years old. I was a single parent, I had kids in college, in high school, in middle school, and I remember sitting at the dining room table, and my daughters' doing their homework, and putting them to bed, and I would start my homework at Robert Morris. I was tired.

What we are offering our children is the opportunity to not be 48 year old single parents finally getting their bachelor's degree.

And that is what we need to keep focused on, giving our kids every opportunity to just blossom
into the people that they are meant to be, so that when they do finish their years in high school, they have been so exposed to what's out in the world, that they can be successful college graduates, and representatives of not only the Pittsburgh Public Schools, but all of our city.

And, so, getting back to my James Harrison analogy, I want to say that we have everything in place here in Pittsburgh. We have a great game plan. Mark Roosevelt drafted a top-notch team. The game is being executed as we speak, and will continue to go forward, and like Mr. Harrison, we are going to have an all pro year.

Now, the only problem I see, in this whole deal, is how can we get the NFL to donate all of James Harrison's fines to the Pittsburgh Promise, because if we can do that, we are good to go.

And on that note, the meeting -- oh, okay.
MR. BRENTLEY: Madam President, I just want to make one request of you, publicly, and that is, going back to the point that you made about there are nine Board members, and $I$ just want to remind you that there are nine Board members, nine personalities, nine districts, nine sets of concerns.

And so throughout the year, when some of us
come through with concerns that may be different from others, that $I$ would ask that you and your leadership would be respectful of those -- that particular Board member, not cut his or her microphone off, and not directed to be turned down, not over talk them, not have side bars when they are discussing, all of these issues are very important to the School District. And so, I'm only asking that because while we are here with different elected positions among us, we all stand equally as elected members, representing particular communities.

There are some communities that have been hit harder, they hurt just a little bit more. And so when those concerns come, not only is it my job, but it is my duty to bring it to the attention of this Board, and I would ask that the new leadership would be mindful of that, and allow Board members to be individuals, and to be different.

And more importantly, that when Board members share information that may not be in line with everyone else, that you don't cut him or her off for discussion, you don't not include them in Board meetings, you don't cut off their cell phones, you allow them to be members of the Board, and you allow them to represent their community.

Finally, the most important thing of all, as elected Board members, I think every month I have to remind someone in the public that I am a volunteer.
We do this for free, and people still don't believe
that we put the time in and do the kinds of things
that we do.

So I'm hoping that your leadership would be mindful of that, allow us all an opportunity to share our concerns, and allow us all an opportunity, and leadership opportunities within this District.

And if there is anything that you need to tap into me for, all you have to do is ask.

So I will always be there.
And I thank everybody, for their support.
