COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION Legislative Meeting November 22, 2011

DIRECTORS:

The Committee on Education recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, that the proper officers of the Board be authorized to enter into contracts relating to those resolutions and that authority be given to the staff to change account numbers, the periods of performance, and such other details as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the resolution, so long as the total amount of money carried in the resolution is not exceeded. Except that with respect to grants which are received as a direct result of Board action approving the submission of proposals to obtain them, the following procedures shall apply: Where the original grant is \$1,000 or less, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant. Where the original grant is more than \$1,000, the staff is authorized to receive and expend any increase over the original grant, so long as the increase does not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the original grant. Increases in excess of fifteen percent (15%) require additional Board authority.

Proposals/Grant Awards

1. **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to accept \$278,340 from PA Department of Education for the Language Fund for Limited English Proficient and Immigrants Grant.

Title III funding is used to support instructional programming and professional development for District wide English as a Second Language students, teachers, and parents. The funds are specifically utilized to provide supplemental materials and supplies to enhance the learning of English Language Learners. The funds also provide partial salary of the ESL Coordinator. This position consists of providing professional development to ESL Regional Centers and district wide meetings, assisting families during the enrollment process, and formally evaluating ESL teachers among other job duties and responsibilities.

The total budget comprised of the Federal allocation from 2010-11 is \$129,102, which will be utilized through September 30, 2012, and the Federal allocation from 2011-12 of \$149,238 which will be utilized through September 30, 2013. The \$129,102 allocation was a 23.7% increase over the prior year, and the \$149,238 allocation is a 15.6% increase over the \$129,102.

2. **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to submit a proposal to The Heinz Endowments for the Early Childhood Program in the amount of \$1,000,000.

Funds are requested to support 5 early childhood classrooms and 1 infant toddler room at **Pittsburgh Crescent Early Childhood Center**. Each classroom will serve 20 students - 3 and 4 years old. Funds are also requested to support the development of a business plan and a marketing/advertising component. The purpose of the business plan is to explore parent payment models and how these might be implemented for families that are at the 300% or greater level of federal income. For a two-person household, this would equate to an annual income of \$44,130; for a three-person household, \$55,590; and a four-person household, \$67,050. The business plan will look, also, at ways in which community agencies can be involved to leverage services for children and families, particularly through the Homewood Children's Village Project construct.

Two caveats that will constrain the business plan's development include:

- 1) <u>Alignment</u>. Whatever is proposed must align with current or projected services in the area and resources, particularly the current Early Head Start Program serving children out of the Pittsburgh Westinghouse High School facility.
- 2) <u>Sustainability</u>. The plan must contain viable strategies to sustain the program beyond the life of the grant. This support is requested from the Endowments at this time due to unprecedented cuts affecting early childhood funding at the state and federal levels, which puts Pittsburgh children at risk.

Funding is requested also to support a unique opportunity to align early childhood offerings in Homewood with the promising Homewood Children's Village project, which seeks to galvanize the community at every level to support the future of its children.

Consultants/Contracted Services

RESOLVED, That the Board authorizes its proper officers to enter into contracts with the following individuals for the services and fees set forth in subparagraphs 3 through 10, inclusive.

3. YouthWorks — Board authorization is requested to renew the contract with YouthWorks. They will prepare 133 Career and Technical Education (CTE) 12th grade seniors to enter the workforce providing the necessary skills to acquire and maintain employment. YouthWorks will provide students with real authentic learning experiences by means of mock interviews to be conducted by volunteer professionals. In addition to the mock interviews, YouthWorks will provide training using their Jump Start Success Curriculum to address and enhance the student's interviewing and soft skills such as conflict resolution, negotiation, personal effectiveness, creative problem solving, strategic thinking, communication skill, and team building.

This will also allow the Pittsburgh Public Schools, CTE division to meet Perkins Grant indicator 5S1 "Number of CTE concentrators... who completed and were placed in postsecondary education, employment, and /or military service."

It also allows us to meet the Pennsylvania Department of Education Chapter 339 assurance, 8.2..."instruction in the approved program includes the development of human relations skills; knowledge of occupations; and leadership competencies and positive attitudes toward fulfilling occupational, civic, social, and community responsibilities" and, in addition, align with Career Education and Work standards.

The operating period shall be from December 1, 2011 through February 2012. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$8,540 from account line 4800-06S-1399-329.

4. Peterson Event Center – Board authorization is requested to renew the contract with Petersen Event Center for the use of their facilities for Year 2012 commencement practices and commencement ceremonies for Pittsburgh Allderdice High School, Pittsburgh Brashear High School, Pittsburgh Carrick High School, Pittsburgh Milliones 6-12, and Pittsburgh Perry High School.

Practices and commencement ceremonies will be held on June 8, 2012 and June 9, 2012. The cost of this action shall be at a rate of \$16,062.61 per day. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$32,125.22 from account line 4017-010-2360-599.

5. Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall and Museum – Board authorization is requested to renew the contract with Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall and Museum Trust, Inc. for the use of their facilities for Year 2012 commencement practices and commencement ceremonies for Pittsburgh Obama 6-12, Pittsburgh CAPA 6-12, Pittsburgh Langley High School, Pittsburgh Oliver High School, and Pittsburgh Westinghouse.

Practices and commencement ceremonies will be held on June 8, 2012 and June 9, 2012. The cost of this action shall be at a rate of \$4,500 per day. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$9,000 from account line 4017-010-2360-599.

6. Pittsburgh Center for the Arts Residency – Board authorization is requested to enter into a contract with Pittsburgh Center for the Arts Residency to provide students at Pittsburgh Dilworth PreK-5 additional arts experiences within the PPS adopted reading/language arts curricula to help increase student academic achievement through art integrated activities. Pittsburgh Center for the Arts Residency Program will provide two artists in residence (Barbara Minges and Laura Jean McLaughlin) to work with the Pittsburgh Dilworth PreK-5 faculty and students in grades K-5 to integrate visual arts and to support students in achieving proficiency in social studies, math, reading, writing, speaking, and listening. The arts infused program is designed to promote self-expression, problem solving, increased vocabulary, and foster student understanding of the interconnection of subjects. Students will be stimulated to read, write, and create. Cultural diversity will be celebrated throughout each instructional opportunity.

The operating period shall be from November 23, 2011 through June 8, 2012, between 8:30 am to 3:41 pm for 100 days. The cost of this item shall be a rate of \$200 per day and will provide the matching funds for the Pittsburgh Center for the Arts Residency Program. The principal, art teacher, and ITL (primary and intermediate teacher leaders) will monitor and evaluate the program at no cost. The total contract shall not exceed \$21,200 from account line 4161-620-1100-329.

7. Rosemary Trail — Board authorization is requested to enter into a contract with Rosemary Trail, an instructor for "Food is Elementary Program" at Pittsburgh Lincoln K-5. This program will incorporate fresh foods and cooking, with an emphasis on nutrition. Third grade students will be presented with opportunities to learn about the nutritional value of fresh fruits and vegetables through hands - on learning experiences. During each monthly session, students will prepare healthy meals or snacks using fresh fruits and vegetables.

Students will also be educated about the benefits of healthy foods. This program will also have a home to school connection in which students will be required to share their learning with their families and complete projects at home. Furthermore, third grade students will serve as healthy food ambassadors for the school community by leading their peers through food challenges and surveys. Supplies and groceries for the program will be donated by Whole Foods and East End Food Co-op.

The operating period shall be from November 23, 2011 thru June 6, 2012. The cost of this action shall be at a rate of \$50 per class with 2 classes per month and 4 family/school events at \$200 per event. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$1,800 from account line 4148-620-3210-599.

8. **Wesley Spectrum Services** – Board authorization is requested to enter into a contract with Wesley Spectrum Services. They will provide full-time mental health therapists to be assigned to the Therapeutic Support Classrooms at: **Pittsburgh Milliones 6-12** and **Pittsburgh Westinghouse**. The therapist at each school will: work with the schools' emotional support teachers providing individual and group therapy in the classroom; provide classroom training related to social skills development, problem solving, conflict resolution, and anger management; and provide teaming strategies for both regular and special education teachers.

The operating period shall be from December 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012. The cost of this action shall be at a rate of \$5,800 per month (2 classrooms at \$2,900 each). The total contract amount shall not exceed \$40,600 (2 classrooms x \$2,900 per month x 7 months=\$40,600) from account line 5500-132-1231-330. An evaluation will be on file in the PSE Office.

9. Gateway to the Arts Program – Board authorization is requested a enter into a contract with the Gateway to the Arts Program to conduct up to ten (10) enrichment presentations within Early Intervention Program playgroup sites located at Arlington Early Childhood Center, McCleary Early Childhood Center, and Reizenstein Early Childhood Center. The objective of the activities is to reinforce and enrich the MacMillan Little Treasures curriculum. The Gateway to the Arts staff artists will present enrichment activities in the field of Story time, Drama, Creative Movement, Puppet Play, and Music in conjunction with the MacMillan Little Treasures curriculum.

Presentations will occur on selected dates to be determined between January 1, 2012 and June 30, 2012. The cost of this action shall be at a rate of \$100 per presentation. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$1,000 from account line 5181-15R-1281-329.

10. Office of Child Development and Early Learning – Board authorization is requested to renew the contract with the Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL), to collect and retrieve child outcome data from the online Work Sampling System and Ounce Online Systems for preschool children enrolled in the Early Childhood Program.

The Work Sampling System is a vital tool that documents a child's knowledge, behavior, and academic accomplishments. The contract covers the cost for Head Start students. Students funded through the Head Start Supplemental Assistance Program (HSSAP), Pennsylvania Pre-K Counts Program, and the Early Intervention (EI) Program are paid through the PA Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL).

The operating period shall be from November 23, 2011 through July 31, 2012. The cost of this action shall be at a rate of \$7.50 per child. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$9,847.50 from account line 4800-19R-1800-329.

Payments Authorized

RESOLVED, That the Board authorize payments in the amounts set forth below to the following individuals, groups, and organizations, including School District employees and others who will participate in activities of the School District to provide services, as described in subparagraphs 11 through 19 inclusive.

11. Shmoop University Inc. – Board authorization is requested to make payment to Shmoop University, an online prep and review tool for Advanced Placement (AP) courses. This service is part of the District's matching portion for the Advanced Placement Incentive Program (APIP) Grant which the board approved on October 26, 2011. The District received Shmoop University at no cost during the 2010-2011 school year, and more than 100 students and teachers used the service.

Students are able to use the program to review concepts and take practice tests for AP courses; there are also resources available for teachers to use in the classroom. Teachers and students can access the services from any computer; service is not limited to the school. These online services will run from November 23, 2011 through November 22, 2012.

The total payment amount shall not exceed \$6,000 from account line 5243-01B-1243-599. Shmoop University is charging the District a discounted rate of \$6,000, waiving the fee for two (2) online professional development sessions for teachers, and the upgrade of additional AP courses that become available throughout the year, an approximate savings of \$9,000.

12. The Andy Warhol Museum – Board authorization is requested to make payment to The Andy Warhol Museum. This collaboration will immerse Pittsburgh Gifted Center Middle School Print-Making students (85) in an integrated Arts experience with the Andy Warhol Museum for a two session outreach. This aligns with the Strategies for Academic Achievement to adopt writing across the curricula. The students will first visit the museum's exhibits to observe the techniques and the stylized methods found in Andy Warhol's art work. At the museum, students will view works of art that reveal the mixed-medium of Warhol and contemporary artist Alexander Ross. Students will interpret the subject matter in the collections of art to make a written compare/contrast statement of the two artists. There will be a thematic discussion about the work and its relevance to contemporary culture and their lives. Students will experience a screen printing that is typical of Warhol's work. In addition, the students will make personal connections with the images: Super Heroes and Myths to produce a LINO-CUT BLOCK PRINT back at the school.

The total payment amount shall not exceed \$1,000 from account line 5291-01B-1243-330.

13. Carnegie Libraries of Pittsburgh (BLAST) – Board authorization is requested to supplement the services of BLAST (Bring Libraries and Schools Together) outreach program, in its ninth year of implementation. This literacy based outreach program is designed to provide third grade students with equitable access to public library resources while supporting the reading program by offering read aloud experiences that enhance vocabulary and comprehension skills.

This program will be offered to the third grade students in the following schools: Pittsburgh Concord PreK-5, Pittsburgh Dilworth PreK-5, Pittsburgh Fulton PreK-5, Pittsburgh Grandview K-5, Pittsburgh Liberty K-5, Pittsburgh Lincoln K-5, Pittsburgh Miller PreK-5, Pittsburgh Montessori PreK-8, Pittsburgh Murray K-8, Pittsburgh Phillips K-5, Pittsburgh Roosevelt PreK-5, Pittsburgh Sunnyside K-8, Pittsburgh Weil PreK-5, and Pittsburgh Woolslair K-5.

In addition, BLAST will offer K-5 monthly thematic programs to the following schools: Pittsburgh Beechwood PreK-5, Pittsburgh Colfax K-8, Pittsburgh Concord PreK-5, Pittsburgh Dilworth PreK-5, Pittsburgh Fulton PreK-5, Pittsburgh Lincoln K-5, Pittsburgh Linden K-5, Pittsburgh Miller PreK-5, Pittsburgh Morrow PreK-5, Pittsburgh Phillips K-5, Pittsburgh Roosevelt PreK-5, Pittsburgh Schaeffer K-8, Pittsburgh Sunnyside K-8, Pittsburgh Spring Hill K-5, and Pittsburgh Weil PreK-5.

The total payment amount shall not exceed \$15,020, from account lines xxxx-620-110-599.

PPS funding is supported by additional funds (\$62,500) that the Carnegie Library receives from EITC (Education Improvement Tax Credit) funds.

English as a Second Language Program-Translation Services - Board 14. authorization is requested to make payment for translation services to assist the English as a Second Language Program maintain compliance with state and federal education guidelines for parents and students who do not have English as their first language. The ESL program retains interpreters to assist with verbal needs in cases such as enrollment, parent meetings mediations, and teacher conferences. The ESL program retains translators to provide written communication with parents as appropriate. The frequency of the translator/interpreter assignments and number of translators needed depends upon student enrollment and new documentation and correspondence that is generated at the District level. The translators are also needed for special circumstances that arise with individual students. Individuals are contacted through community service agencies such as Jewish Family and Children's Services and Catholic Charities.

The rate of payment shall be \$25 per hour. The total payment amount shall not exceed \$20,000 from account line 4600-010-2260-340.

15. Cambium Learning Group – Board authorization is requested to make payment to Cambium Learning Group. They will provide professional development to teachers at Pittsburgh Westinghouse using the Passport Reading Journeys program with high school students. Passport Reading Journeys is a reading intervention program designed to provide instruction in fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension while appealing to the interests of High School students.

The professional development instructor will train **Pittsburgh Westinghouse** teachers who are new to teaching this program. This program is needed to provide targeted reading intervention to students at **Pittsburgh Westinghouse**. The curriculum office in partnership with school management developed a plan to replace an advisory period with a more focused intervention, Passport Journeys, in order to support the High School students at **Pittsburgh Westinghouse** who are not reading at a proficient level.

The total payment amount shall not exceed \$2,500 from account line 4327-18M-2271-324.

16. Child's Way – Board authorization is requested to make payment to the Child's Way for the provision of comprehensive services for Head Start-eligible children enrolled in their program. Children will receive education, mental health/disability, and health/nutrition support services by Early Childhood staff. The childcare collaborator will receive an incentive of \$1,000 per classroom, after progression from one STAR level (maximum of 4) to the next. The total payment amount shall not exceed \$1,000 from account line 4800-20R-1807-323.

Collaboration with this agency for provision of service was proposed in grant application that was approved by Board of Directors on March 23, 2011.

17. Pennsylvania Head Start Association (PHSA) – Board authorization is requested to make payment to the Pennsylvania Head Start Association (PHSA) for participation in the 2012 Wage and Fringe Benefits Comparability Project. The purpose of the comprehensive wage survey project is to provide Head Start programs across the state of Pennsylvania with concrete data to assist them in evaluating staff positions. This survey will compare the average wage and benefits of staff positions funded by Head Start dollars and compare them to analogous positions across the State of Pennsylvania also funded through Head Start dollars. This is a requirement of the Head Start grant.

The total payment amount shall not exceed \$900 from account line 4800-19R-1802-599.

18. Charter School (Federal IDEA B 611 Pass-Through Entitlement) — Board authorization is requested to make payment to the following Charter Schools for pass-through entitlement of Federal IDEA B 611 funds. The Charter Schools had 357 students on the December 2010 Child Count for Special Education. The Charter Schools will receive approximately \$1,205.35 per child receiving School Age Special Education programs and services as reported in December 2010. This is required by the IDEA B 611 fund.

19. **Pittsburgh-Mt. Oliver Intermediate Unit** –Board authorization is requested to make payment to the Pittsburgh-Mt. Oliver Intermediate Unit (per requirement of IDEA 611) for parentally placed children with disabilities attending private schools. These schools are entitled to a proportional calculation of federal funds as required by IDEA 611. There are 113 parentally placed students (76 in city parochial schools and 37 in city private schools) out of the 6,303 students reported on the December 2010 Child Count.

The total payment amount is \$150,809 from account line 5500-13R-1231-323 (1.8 % of the \$8,411,923 IDEA B 611 allocation).

General Authorization

20. Summer Dreamers Academy 2011-2012 Implementation

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to implement the third year of the Summer Dreamers Academy. The camp will be open to 2011-2012 PPS K - 8th grade students. Campers will spend the summer reading great books and participating in fascinating literacy-based projects during a literacy block that will be designed to support and challenge campers in the areas that will benefit them the most. In addition to participating in daily literacy instruction, campers will also have the opportunity to actively engage in a variety of fun activities everyday through partnerships with organizations in Pittsburgh. The camp will be offered Monday through Friday beginning on July 16, 2012 through August 17, 2012. Staffing will be based on student enrollment.

The total cost shall not exceed \$400,000 from account lines 4800-16P-1190-124 (\$290,864), 4800-16P-1190-610 (\$99,000), and 4800-16P-5410-934 (\$10,136). Additional funding is still pending from several sources and will only be utilized when granted.

21. 5th Grade Novel – The Hope Chest

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to approve the purchase of a fifth grade novel, The Hope Chest. The Hope Chest will be used in a fifth grade reading unit during the third grading period. The unit will be designed to support the transition of reading between fifth and sixth grades and will provide an introduction to the pedagogy of the 6-12 English Language Arts Curriculum. Last school year, we added the novel Just Like Martin to fifth grade and The Hope Chest will be our second addition. Both novels align to themes covered in our social studies curriculum. The Hope Chest depicts events surrounding the eventual ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment. The unit will explore how women have organized to fight for equality over time, what made them successful and how we celebrate those successes. Just Like Martin was aligned to the Civil Rights Era.

The content of this unit will support alignment to PA Academic Standards as well as Common Core State Standards (CCSS). The PA Department of Education has required all Districts to align curriculum to the Common Core State Standards by 2013-2014. The work with this unit will help us achieve this goal. The addition of the unit will provide increased academic rigor and will expose our students to a rich novel that meets text complexity requirements set forth by the CCSS. The novel has been reviewed and selected by a team of central office administrators, teachers and parents in pursuant with the Instructional Supplementary Material Policy established by the board.

The total cost shall not exceed \$25,000 from account line 4600-010-1100-640 (textbook budget).

22. Partnership with the August Wilson Center

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to enter into a partnership with the August Wilson Center to provide access to the Centers' teaching artists, programming, performances, and space in support of PPS curriculum in the areas of Arts Education, ELA, Social Studies, and Physical Education.

This partnership will support the core curriculum through a variety of opportunities, including but not limited to viewing the plays of August Wilson as they connect to the English 4 course and the English 4: African American Literature course, offering dance instruction (Arts Education) through a collaboration between dance teaching artists and Physical Education instructors, and History students and teachers will experience historical perspectives of life in Pittsburgh through the study of characters and settings in the literature of August Wilson (Social Studies).

Through the partnership the August Wilson Center will engage PPS students as historians to use knowledge gained in their high school African American History course to help contextualize and shape the mission of the August Wilson Center. Students in PreK-12 will also have an opportunity to utilize the Center's offerings and expertise to make curricular connections and to look at the City of Pittsburgh through a culturally responsive and historical lens.

This is a non-monetary partnership (see Item #22a). The length of this partnership will be 2 years, from November 1, 2011 until October 31, 2013.

23. Donation Venture Outdoors to the Early Childhood Program

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to accept a donation from Venture Outdoors (a Non-Profit Organization) to the School District of Pittsburgh on behalf of the Early Childhood Program. Venture Outdoors will conduct presentations about outdoor recreational activities and provide free family passes to parents. Presentations will be held in various Early Childhood classrooms sometime between November 23, 2011 and June 30, 2012. The value of the family pass is \$20 for a family of four. The approximate value of this donation is estimated at \$5,000.

The Board expresses its appreciation and thanks to Venture Outdoors for this generous gift to the District.

24. <u>Donation from Barnes and Noble to the Early Childhood Program and Teen Parenting Program</u>

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to accept a donation from Barnes and Noble to the School District of Pittsburgh on behalf of the Early Childhood Program and Teen Parenting Program. Barnes and Noble will provide holiday books to 1,900 preschoolers and 311 teen parents for their children. The value of each book is \$5 and the total approximate value of this donation is \$11,055.

The Board expresses its appreciation and thanks to Barnes and Noble for this generous gift to the District.

25. **Donation of Framed Artwork from to Pittsburgh Arsenal PreK-5**

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to accept a donation from Mr. E-Ho Kim of 4 framed drawings of Jackie Robinson, Barack Obama, George Washington Carver, and Toni Morrison. Mr. Kim's sons attended **Pittsburgh Arsenal PreK-5** while he attended the University of Pittsburgh. His drawings are to celebrate African Americans and to thank **Pittsburgh Arsenal PreK-5** for educating his sons while they resided in Pittsburgh.

The drawings measure 28 by 26 inches each and were part of an exhibit at the University. The total value of this donation is \$600.

The Board thanks Mr. E-Ho Kim for this most generous donation.

26. Donation of Mobile Site-Based Food Banks

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to accept monthly food donations from mobile, school-based pantry that will be established by the Greater Pittsburgh Food Bank in partnership with Target, Inc. to benefit all children and their families at **Pittsburgh Arlington PreK-8**, **Pittsburgh Stevens K-8**, and **Pittsburgh Woolslair K-5**. This pantry is a storefront that is set up and torn down each month, similar to local farmers' market stands.

- Each child is eligible to receive 22 pounds of food of which 25% is fresh fruit and vegetables.
- Distribution is based on each child. If a family has, for example, 3 children in the school, then each of these children will receive 22 pounds of food.
- Families must have a child enrolled in the school in order to participate in this program.
- Distribution takes place only once per month, and the food is distributed at the school site.
- Food arrives each month via the Greater Pittsburgh Food Bank, which will set up
 the food on tables in the space provided by the school. This creates a shopping
 experience for families.

The estimated value of this donation is \$95,000.

The Board expresses its appreciation and thanks to both Heart of America and Target for this generous donation to the District.

27. District Realignment Plan

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to improve student achievement but with far fewer resources given the District's declining enrollment, the District has presented a Realignment Plan that includes school closings/consolidations, feeder pattern changes, adjustments to the education delivery model and a corresponding reduction of approximately 400 school based/central office positions.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to implement the following items from the District Realignment Plan:

- **A. RESOLVED**, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize the closure of the school program at Pittsburgh Fort Pitt PreK-5 effective June 30, 2012, and the reassignment of students. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Fort Pitt PreK-5 feeder pattern will be redrawn so that students will be assigned to Pittsburgh Arsenal PreK-5, Pittsburgh Woolslair K-5, and Pittsburgh Fulton PreK-5. Maps of how these assignments will be made are attached to this item as Exhibit B. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Fort Pitt facility will close effective June 30, 2012.
- **B. RESOLVED**, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the closure of the school program at Pittsburgh Langley 9-12 effective June 30, 2012, and the reassignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Langley 9-12 feeder pattern will be redrawn so that students will be assigned to Pittsburgh Brashear 9-12. **FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Langley facility will remain open and the Board authorizes the opening of a New K-8 school program in the Langley facility beginning with the 2012-13 school year.
- **C. RESOLVED**, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh amend Education Item #25 of January 26, 2011 for the Comprehensive Career and Technical Education (CTE) Plan to move the Machine Operations program for the South/West Regional Cluster from Pittsburgh Langley to Pittsburgh Brashear beginning with the 2012-13 school year.
- **D. RESOLVED**, That pending approval of Item B above, The Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the closure of the school program at Pittsburgh Schaeffer K-8 effective June 30, 2012, and the reassignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Schaeffer K-8 feeder pattern will be redrawn so that students will be assigned to the New K-8 School in the Langley facility. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that both the Schaeffer and Sheraden facilities will close effective June 30, 2012.
- **E. RESOLVED**, That pending approval of Item B above, The Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the reconfiguration of Pittsburgh Westwood K-8 to Pittsburgh Westwood K-5, and the reassignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the Pittsburgh Westwood grades 6-8 students will be assigned to Pittsburgh South Hills 6-8.
- **F. RESOLVED**, That pending approval of Item B above, The Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the closure of the school program at Pittsburgh Stevens K-8 effective June 30, 2012, and the reassignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Stevens K-8 feeder pattern will be assigned to the New K-8 School in the Langley facility, and to Pittsburgh Westwood K-5 and Pittsburgh South Hills 6-8. Maps of how these assignments will be made are attached to this item per Exhibit B. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, also that the Stevens facility will close effective June 30, 2012.

- **G. RESOLVED**, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the closure of the school program at Pittsburgh Murray K-8 effective June 30, 2012, and the reassignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Murray K-8 feeder pattern will be redrawn so that students will be assigned to Pittsburgh Arlington PreK-8. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Murray facility will close effective June 30, 2012.
- **H. RESOLVED**, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the expansion of Pittsburgh Morrow PreK-5 to Pittsburgh Morrow PreK-8, and the assignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Morrow PreK-5 will grow into a PreK-8 school one grade per year as the 2011-12 grade 5 students will be assigned to remain at Pittsburgh Morrow. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that Pittsburgh Morrow will also utilize the Rooney facility, which will house the grade 5-8 students.
- I. RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the closure of the school program at Pittsburgh Northview PreK-8 effective June 30, 2012, and the reassignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Northview PreK-8 feeder pattern will be redrawn so that students will be assigned to Pittsburgh Morrow PreK-8, and to Pittsburgh King PreK-8. Maps of how these assignments will be made are attached to this item per Exhibit B. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Northview facility will close effective June 30, 2012.
- J. RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the closure of the school program at Pittsburgh Oliver 9-12 effective June 30, 2012, and the reassignment of students to access enhanced educational programming. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the current Pittsburgh Oliver 9-12 feeder pattern will be become the feeder pattern of Pittsburgh Perry 9-12, in the Perry facility, with the school becoming a partial magnet. FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Oliver facility will remain open and house Pittsburgh McNaugher and Special Education Offices currently in the Overbrook facility beginning with the 2012-13 school year.
- **K. RESOLVED**, That pending approval of Item J above, The Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the move of Pittsburgh McNaugher and the Special Education Offices currently in the Overbrook facility to the Oliver facility beginning in 2012-13. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the McNaugher facility will close effective June 30, 2012.
- L. RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the move of the McCleary Early Childhood Center to Pittsburgh Arsenal PreK-5 beginning in 2012-13.

M. RESOLVED, That pending approval of items A through L above, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes adjustments of attendance areas (feeder patterns) as reflected in the attached chart per Exhibit A and on the attached maps per Exhibit B for the purposes of creating maximum efficiency for class size and staffing assignments as well to facilitate ease of understanding for families of the pathway for schools of assignment as their children move throughout grades K-12 in Pittsburgh Public Schools. FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize organizational changes that include layoffs or furloughs of employees due to the closing and consolidation of schools as described herein.

28. <u>AMENDMENT – To Amend School Re-Configuration for Pittsburgh Westinghouse and Pittsburgh Westinghouse Calendar</u>

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to amend the May 4, 2011 Special Legislative meeting item Amendment/School Re-Configuration for Pittsburgh Westinghouse and to amend the June 22, 2011 Education Item #78 Adopting the Accelerated Learning Academy (ALA) school calendar, which the Board approved for 2012-13 school year on March 23, 2011, Education Item #38.

Rationale for Change:

- amend May 4, 2011 Special Legislative meeting item to Amendment/School Re-Configuration for Pittsburgh Westinghouse in order to eliminate single gender classes no later than February 1, 2012;

<u>Amended Item of May 4, 2011 Amendment/School Re-Configuration for Pittsburgh Westinghouse:</u>

RESOLVED - That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh gives authorization to close Pittsburgh Westinghouse as a 9-12 comprehensive high school and open one new 6-12 school in the Westinghouse facility beginning with the 2011-12 school year.

Students in the current Faison 6-8 and Lincoln 6-8 feeder patterns will be assigned to the new 6-12 school; and students in grades 9-12 living east of Negley Avenue will be assigned to the new 6-12 school.

Students in the current Faison 6-8 and Lincoln 6-8 feeder patterns will be assigned to the new 6-12 school; and students in grades 9-12 living east of Negley Avenue will be assigned to the new 6-12 school.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That no later than February 1, 2012 the new 6-12 school in the Westinghouse facility will no longer offer single-gender classes, and that beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the school will no longer serve as a magnet. Per the Board's adoption of the Comprehensive Career and Technical Education (CTE) Plan at its May 26, 2010 meeting, Education Item 51, the Health Careers Academy and Culinary Arts Academies will be housed at the Westinghouse facility and those CTE students will be accounted for at their home schools.

Original Education Item #78 of June 22, 2011 - Academy at Westinghouse Calendar:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to adopt the Accelerated Learning Academy (ALA) school calendar for the Academy at Westinghouse, which was previously approved by the Board at the Legislative Meeting on September 29, 2009, General Authorization Item #40, Committee on Education.

<u>Amended Item of November 22, 2011 – Pittsburgh Westinghouse Calendar:</u>

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to no longer utilize the Accelerated Learning Academy (ALA) school calendar for Pittsburgh Westinghouse beginning with the 2012-13 school year.

29. <u>AMENDMENT - Adoption of the Revised 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 School Year</u> Calendars

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to amend Education Item #38 from the March 23, 2011 Legislative meeting for the adoption of the District school calendar for the 2012-2013 school year.

Reason for Amendment:

To eliminate the language for Accelerated Learning Academies for the 2012-2013 school year because all schools will follow the standard calendar. The 2011-2012 school year remains unchanged from the March 23, 2011 resolution.

30. AMENDMENT - The RHVAC and Welding Programs

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers to amend item #39, from the March 23, 2011 for the RHVAC and Welding programs to be moved from the Oliver building to the South Vo-Tech Annex facility.

Reason for Amendment:

As a result of declining student enrollment, District will realize efficiencies and sustainability through consolidating programs by integrating welding students within the machine operations program with exposure to welding skills. This closure supports the District's Educational Delivery Model and eliminates expenditures needed to remodel the South Annex. Students will have the ability to receive certification from the National Institute for Metalworking Skills and opportunity to pursue specialty skills in welding. The Three Rivers Workforce Investment Board projects growth over the next 10 years in eight occupations that can be achieved through machine operations; however welding occupations show a decrease in job growth over the next 10 years.

Original Item:

The RHVAC and Welding programs be moved from Pittsburgh Oliver High School to the South Vo-Tech Annex Facility.

RESOLVED, That the board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh authorizes the transformation of the Pittsburgh Oliver school program by establishing an Early College Model beginning in 2012-2013.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That Pittsburgh Oliver become a new school in 2012-13. Per the Board's adoption of the Comprehensive Career and Technical Education (CTE) Plan at its May 26, 2010 meeting, Education Committee Item #51, the Health Careers Academy, Culinary Arts Academy, Cosmetology, and Business/Finance/Information Technology will be housed at the Oliver facility and those CTE students will be accounted for at their home schools.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That beginning in 2012-13, the credit recovery program at the Student Achievement Center will be absorbed into Pittsburgh Oliver. The RHVAC and Welding programs will be housed at the South Vo-Tech Annex facility.

Amended Item:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors authorize the closure of the CTE welding program located at South Annex at the end of the 2011-2012 school year. Current South Annex welding students will have the opportunity to attend the approved Machine Operations Program at Pittsburgh Brashear High School to continue their coursework. Welding is being eliminated due to substantial decline in program enrollment and to conform with standards of organization required by law and recommended by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

31. Elimination of the costume course at Pittsburgh CAPA 6-12

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize its proper officers eliminate the costume course at **Pittsburgh CAPA 6-12** at the close of the 2011-2012 school year due to substantial decline in course enrollment as recommended as part of the proposed Education Delivery Model. The elimination of costume is supported by approximately 40% decline in enrollment over 3 years, resulting in only 9 students currently enrolled in the course.

32. Student Suspensions, Transfers, and Expulsions

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of the School District of Pittsburgh accept the following report on student suspensions, transfers, and expulsions.

- a. _50_ students suspended for four (4) to ten (10) days;
- b. <u>0</u> students suspended for four (4) to ten (10) days and transferred to another Pittsburgh Public School;
- c. 2 students expelled out of school for eleven (11) days or more;
- d. <u>0</u> students expelled out of school for eleven (11) days or more and transferred to another Pittsburgh Public School.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into by and between The School District of Pittsburgh (the "District"), with an address of 341 S. Bellefield Avenue, Pittsburgh, PA 15213, and August Wilson Center ("AWC"), a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, with its business address at 980 Liberty Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania 15222-3736.

NOW, THEREFORE, with the intent to be legally bound hereby, the parties to this MOU set forth the following as the terms and conditions of their understanding.

The District and AWC hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Background. AWC has offered the District access to AWC teaching artists, programming, performances, and space in support of PPS curriculum in the areas of Arts Education, ELA, Social Studies, and Physical Education. This partnership will support the core curriculum through a variety of opportunities, including but not limited to viewing the plays of August Wilson as they connect to the English 4 course and the English 4:African American Literature course, offering dance instruction (Arts Education) through a collaboration between dance teaching artists and Physical Education instructors, and History students and teachers will experience historical perspectives of life in Pittsburgh through the study of characters and settings in the literature of August Wilson (Social Studies). Through the partnership the August Wilson Center will engage PPS students as historians to use knowledge gained in their high school African American History course to help contextualize and shape the mission of the August Wilson Center. Students in PreK-12 will also have an opportunity to utilize the Center's offerings and expertise to make curricular connections and to look at the City of Pittsburgh through a culturally responsive and historical lens.
- 2. Term. The term of this MOU shall commence on November 1, 2011 and shall expire on October 31, 2013. The term may be extended by written mutual consent of the parties which written consent includes a scope of work referencing this MOU and setting forth the responsibilities of the parties.
- 3. Scope of Work.
 - 3.1 Responsibility of AWC.
 - 3.1.1 Provide access to AWC teaching artists, exhibitions, curriculum programming, performances, and facilities;
 - 3.1.2 Manage and coordinate trips and residencies;
 - 3.1.3 Collaborate with District Physical Education teachers to provide dance instruction;
 - 3.1.4 Provide students and teacher with access to the AWC and provide students with the opportunity to contribute to the AWC mission;
 - 3.1.5 Communicate with students, families, and staff as necessary;

- 3.1.6 Attend planning meetings; and
- 3.1.7 Provide regular reports and communications to the district.
- 3.2 Responsibility of District. In support of the AWC initiative, the District agrees to:
 - 3.2.1 Coordinate schedules, performances, trips, and logistics;
 - 3.2.2 Provide PPS students and families with information and details as needed;
 - 3.2.3 Collaborate with the August Wilson Center to connect to the Core Curriculum;
 - 3.2.4 Collect and share reports and evaluation information; and
 - 3.2.5 Attend planning meetings.

3.3 Confidentiality.

- 3.3.1 All student data provided by the District is considered to be confidential under this MOU as well as under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), 20 USC §1232g et seq., and any other federal or state statutes or regulations pertaining to student records, and will only be released in accordance with the applicable laws and regulations.
- 3.3.2 AWC hereby acknowledges and agrees that any confidential documents and/or data provided by the District, shall not be disclosed, discussed or transferred to any third party not party to this MOU, and any student data or information provided to AWC shall only be disclosed to employees of AWC and District employees who are directly involved in the AWC program.
- 3.4 Clearances. AWC staff, contractors and volunteers that will have direct contact with students shall obtain and submit all clearances required by 24 P.S. §1-111 (state and federal criminal) and 23 Pa.C.S. §§6354 *et seq.*(child abuse).
- 3.5 Communications. Communications from AWC will be coordinated with the Senior Program Officer, Arts Education or designee to avoid conflicting or contradictory information or directions given to principals or teachers in participating school.

4. Costs and Funding.

4.1 Costs. This partnership and the program provided shall be at no direct cost to the District.

5. Intellectual Property.

5.1 Copyright. The District reserves copyright in all written and electronic materials developed by the District or District employees as a part of their employment with the District. District materials may not be copied or otherwise reproduced without the express written permission of the District. AWC reserves copyright

- in all written and electronic materials delivered and developed solely by AWC. These items may not be copied or otherwise reproduced without the express written permission of AWC.
- 5.2 Trademark and Trade Name. This MOU does not give AWC any ownership rights or interest in District trade names or trademarks. This MOU does not give the District any ownership rights or interest in AWC trade name or trademarks.
- Use of Name. AWC shall notify the District prior to using the District's name in any report or publication. As an external provider seeking funding for a project that involves particular District schools, District staff, or the District as a whole, AWC may not include the District in a proposal and/or any type of supporting document until the Superintendent's sign-off has been received through the approval process coordinated by the Chief of Staff.
- 6. Evaluations. The District reserves the right to evaluate AWC's program in relation to the District's goals and programming and its effectiveness as needed throughout the term of this MOU.
- Independent Contractors. During the performance of this MOU, the employees of one party will not be considered employees of the other party within the meaning of any federal, state or local laws or regulations including, but not limited to, laws or regulations covering unemployment insurance, old age benefits, workers compensation, industrial accident, labor or taxes of any kind nor within the meaning or application of the other party's employee fringe benefit programs for purposes of vacations, holidays, pension, group life insurance, accidental death, medical, The District's employees who perform the hospitalization and surgical benefits. obligations of the District hereunder shall be under the employment and ultimate control, management and supervision of District. AWC's employees who are to perform the services to be completed by AWC hereunder shall be under the employment and ultimate control, management and supervision of AWC. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to imply a joint venture or principal-agent relationship between the District and AWC, and neither party shall have the right, power or authority to obligate or bind the other in any manner whatsoever, except as otherwise agreed to in writing.
- 8. Termination. This MOU may be terminated by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice to the addresses set forth in Section 12.
- 9. Entire Understanding. This MOU constitutes the entire and sole understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes any prior written agreements and any prior, contemporaneous or subsequent oral understanding, with respect to the subject matter hereof.

Recommended K-5 Feeder Patterns beginning SY 2012-13

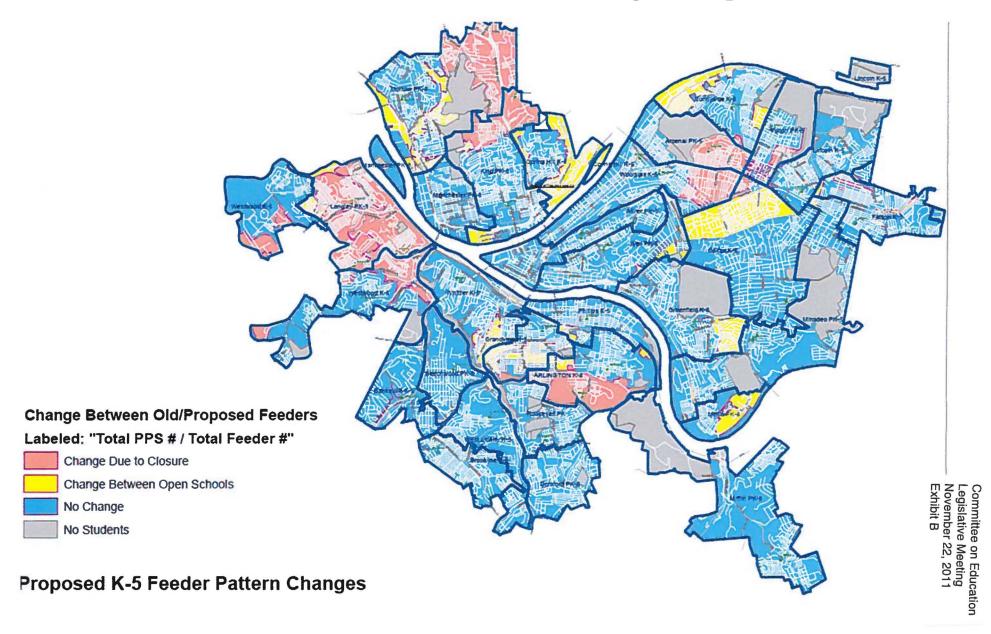

Recommended 6-8 Feeder Patterns beginning SY 2012-13

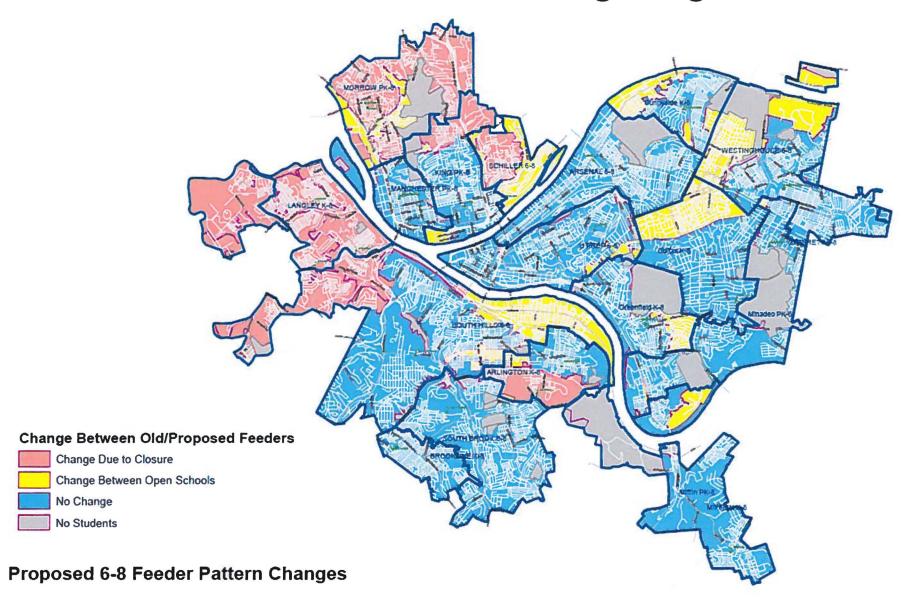
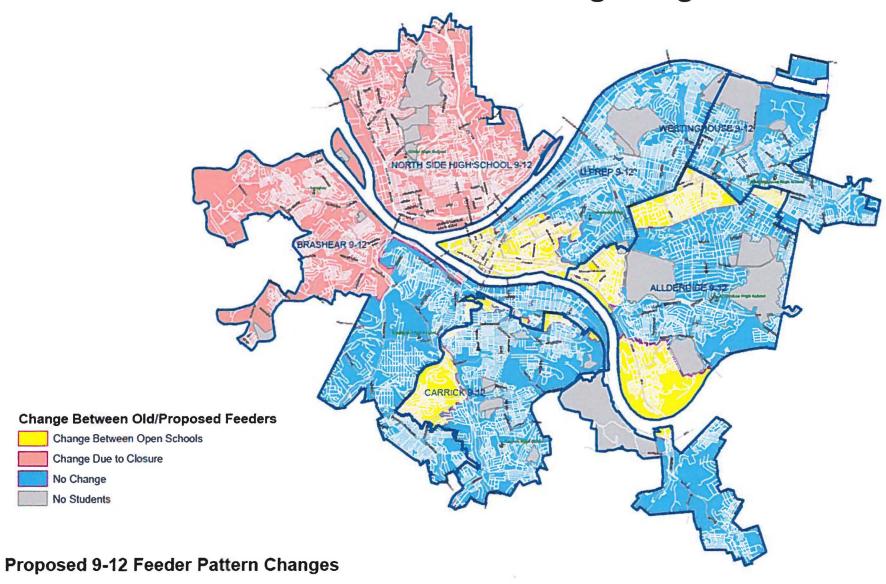

- 1. **RESOLVED**, That the contracts for supplies/equipment be awarded and bids be rejected in accordance with the recommendations of the Secretary as follows, the bids having been received and opened in accordance with the Code. (**Report No. 1687**)
- 2. **RESOLVED**, That the contracts for work at various schools be awarded and bids be rejected in accordance with the recommendations of the Secretary as follows, the bids having been received and opened in accordance with the Code. (Report No. 1152) NO BIDS THIS MONTH
- 3. **RESOLVED,** That the following additions and deductions to construction contracts previously approved be adopted. (**Report No. 1153**)
- 4. **RESOLVED**, That the daily payments made in the month of October in the amount of \$46,907,105.70 be ratified, the payments having been made in accordance with Rules of the Board and the Public School Code.

B. CONSULTANTS/CONTRACTED SERVICE

1. **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize it's proper officers to enter into a contract with Strategic Solutions for the scanning of the District's Permanent Records from the closed schools and to begin the scanning of student records from the District's open schools. Among the services included in this contract are packaging, transporting, document preparation, indexing, scanning, retrieval, return of the documents, online data storage and the software needed for image retrieval. The Technology Office will prioritize which of the permanent records will be included for scanning in this contract.

The operating period shall be from December 1, 2011 to December 31, 2012. The total contract amount is not to exceed \$100,000 from account line 5110-010-2170-348.

2. **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize it's proper officers to enter into a contract with Anthony Fail to provide services as a Web-System's Architect, reporting to the Director of End-User Services, Department of Information Technology, for the purpose of advancing staff and community access, awareness and understanding of Empowering Effective Teachers work through improved web tools. Consultant will work with district staff to integrate and optimize the District's web capabilities to improve usability and efficiency for our users – employees, students, parents, community members, and website visitors. Recent IT tool developments through the Empowering Effective Plans have provider greater web capabilities (RISE software, Pinnacle tools, employee portals), but these tools must be integrated into our existing web capabilities so our end users are not simply using more tools, but rather better tools that are integrated with other information they already rely on daily (ie. calendars, district announcements, district forms, etc.).

The operating period shall run for a 2-year period (Jan. 1, 2012 through Dec. 31, 2013) at a cost not to exceed \$71,040 for the entire 2 year period from account line 1212-16N-2840-330. The cost will be paid from grant funding.

3. **RESOLVED**, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize it's proper officers to renew the contract with Grant Communications Consulting Group. The Pittsburgh Educator is a parent-friendly publication that is written, designed, photographed, printed and mailed, as well as, postage paid by Grant Communications Consulting Group. This important District-wide publication has served as a primary communications vehicle to share important District and school-based news with parents and families since May 2008. The Educator is a 20 page publication. The District receives 30,000 copies of the issue (16,000 mailed to households and 2500 mailed to teachers)

Approval of this contract will authorize Grant Communications Consulting Group to continue working with Communications and Marketing to produce one issue scheduled for publication in the Spring 2012. Story ideas and editorial approval of all content in the newsletter are the responsibility of the Division of Communications and Marketing. Total cost of one issue is \$26,857.00

The operating period shall be from January 1, 2012 until June 30, 2012. The total cost of one issue is \$26,857 payable from account line 1500-010-2823-330.

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the School District of Pittsburgh authorize 4. it's proper officers to contract for a 1-year professional services "on-call" contract with the option to renew for an additional three years with graphic design firm Dennis Moran Design. "On-call" graphic design expertise is necessary to support the Communications and Marketing Department, schools and other District departments by providing services such as design, photography, writing, print, broadcast, web production services, specialized printing/promotional services, research, placement of media space and direct mail services. Services shall be provided on an "as needed" basis and will be coordinated through the C&M Department to ensure the appropriate use of the District's graphic standards, the most cost effective approach and to ensure accuracy/consistency in information. Dennis Moran Design was chosen in accordance with a request for proposals dated October 14, 2011 and 6 proposals submitted on October 28, 2011, and other terms and conditions as are satisfactory to the Solicitor. By engaging in this "not to exceed" contract the District will significantly streamline the use of external graphic design consultants, increase the ability of schools and departments to access and use graphic design services and continue to support communications efforts around District reform work such as the Empowering Effective Teachers work.

The operating period shall be from November 23, 2011 to November 30, 2015. The total contract amount shall not exceed \$210,000 from account line 1500-010-2823-330.

The federal law called COBRA provides employees, retirees and their dependents the ability to continue the health and dental plans through the School District when they are no longer eligible for the plans. Under this law, there are rules and regulations to be followed in a timely manner. If the School District is not in compliance with these rules and regulations the School District can be subject to fines and penalties.

The operating period shall be from January 1 2012 to December 31, 2013. The total contract amount is \$48,490 annually from account line 6030-709-2890-390.

1. That the Board approve a travel waiver for Sam Franklin, Executive Director of the Office of Teacher Effectiveness, to the following destination: Anaheim, CA for the 2011 Learning Forward Conference from Monday, December 5-7, 2011. 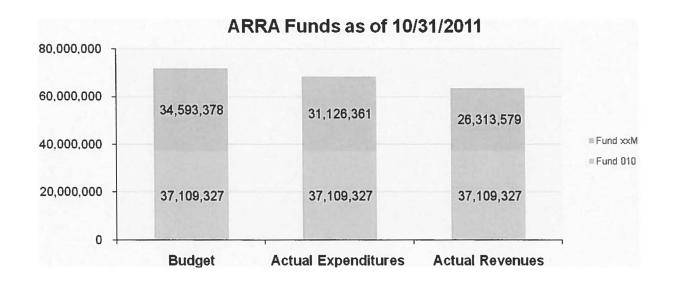

GENERAL FUND:

- The Comparative Statement reveals that actual revenues for the month ending October 31, 2011 increased by \$16.7 million while actual expenditures increased by \$7.9 million.
 - o Actual revenues of \$451.9 million are higher than the 2010 October year-to-date amount of \$435.2 million, which is a 3.85% increase.
 - Overall local tax sources of revenue are outperforming both their 2010 counterparts by 5.02% and their estimated budget amounts by 3.09%.
 - The actual state sinking fund revenues are projected to exceed budget projection amount by \$62,735 or 2.92%.
 - o Actual expenditures as a whole were \$7.9 million or 1.99% higher than 2010.
 - October 2011 actual salaries are \$4.9 million or 3.85% less than the 2010 salaries. However, overall benefits have increased by 6.45% largely due to increases in the retirement rate and in medical insurance.
 - The District continues to see improvement in the benefits budget expenditure category.
 - Lower gas expenditures can be attributed to a change in supplier from Dominion Retail to Hess which has better pricing. Also on an average the weather was warmer in 2011 than in 2010.

NEW BUSINESS Resolution for Superintendent Linda Lane's Performance Priorities for 2011-2012

Pittsburgh Board of Education Personnel Committee Jean Fink, Chair November 22, 2011

WHEREAS, the Pittsburgh Board of Education at a Special Legislative meeting on December 13, 2010 appointed Dr. Linda Lane to the position of Superintendent of the School District of Pittsburgh for the period January 1, 2011 through January 16, 2014; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Public Education also approved the employment contract for Dr. Linda Lane as the Superintendent of Schools as part of the December 13, 2010 Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Board recognizes the evaluation of the Superintendent and the establishment of the Superintendent's annual performance priorities as among its most important responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board held a Retreat in August 2011 and concluded that the progress toward the priorities set forth in the contract for 2010-11 had been affirmative; and

WHEREAS, the Board at its October 26, 2011 Legislative Meeting confirmed that Linda Lane, in the performance of her duties as Superintendent pursuant to the contract, had met the performance priorities for 2010-2011; and

WHEREAS, given the District's fiscal challenges, Linda Lane declined to accept the increase of \$15,000 which would have been effective September 1, 2011 for a total annual compensation of Two Hundred Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$215,000) and the Board graciously accepted the Superintendent's offer; and

WHEREAS, the Board and Linda Lane have worked collaboratively to determine the Superintendent's performance priorities for 2011-12; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED; that the Board hereby approves the following performance priorities for Superintendent Linda Lane for 2011-12:

- (1) Improve support for and communication with principals;
- (2) Oversee effective fiscal planning and implementation of a process that results in a budget for 2012, which meets the minimum reserve levels per the Board's policy;
- (3) Continue implementation of Empowering Effective Teachers plan to:
 - A) Assure effective teachers are placed in Career Ladder roles for 2012-13;
 - B) Bring together multiple measures to contribute to a teacher's overall rating starting 2012-13;
 - C) Rollout Value-Added Measures (VAMs) for Fall 2011 and develop and communicate VAMs usage by June 2012;
 - D) Provide report of how STAR (Students and Teachers Achieving Results) program has been utilized as a means to motivate staff to increase school performance during 2011-12;
 - E) Introduce first portal version for District Staff to access information to increase effectiveness.
- (4) Develop and communicate a plan to decrease racial disparities in student achievement within District schools by April 2012;
- (5) Show progress on a majority of the 42 testing points of the PSSA;
- (6) Reevaluate and refine the Career and Technology Education plan in light of the District Realignment Plan as adopted by the Board;
- (7) Continue emphasis on high school reform with a focus on the following:
 - A) Transition Pittsburgh Langley students into Pittsburgh Brashear for 2012-13;
 - B) Transition Pittsburgh Oliver students into Pittsburgh Perry for 2012-13;
 - C) Restart Pittsburgh Westinghouse for 2012-13.

- 10 to a Mr. Rickie Semanski who walks his daughter to the
- 11 bus stop every morning. He is the one that shared the
- 12 incident with me about Ms. Diane. He said the only
- 13 thing the kids know is Ms. Diane, and so I just wanted
- 14 to say thank you to him for sharing with me and
- 15 allowing me to share it with this Board.
- 16 Thank you.
- 17 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 18 And, Dr. Lane, I also realized I should
- 19 have gone down to your end if you wanted to make any
- 20 comments. I'm sorry.
- DR. LANE: Yes. Thank you very much,
- 22 Mrs. Hazuda.
- I did want to give my sincere thanks and
- 24 appreciation to Dr. Dara Ware Allen who has been a
- 25 fabulous Board member to work with. She's very

- 1 thoughtful. She speaks her mind. She stands her
- 2 ground, and I think those are all great qualities.
- I had the very interesting experience of
- 4 being with Dr. Ware Allen when my sister was here to
- 5 visit, and they realized they knew each other, and so
- 6 we never connected that and figured out, while she was
- 7 at Spelman, my sister was at Chaplain and Spelman, so
- 8 they recognized each other, so that was pretty nice.
- 9 All the best to you, and I hope you do stay
- 10 engaged with us. I think you have an important voice
- 11 to bring to the table and as Mr. Brentley said as a
- 12 parent of children, and I think that matters and also
- 13 as a thoughtful and strong supporter of public
- 14 education, so thank you so much for your service.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 16 Let's get down to business now.
- 17 Will everyone please turn to the minutes
- 18 from last month? Are there any corrections, additions
- 19 or deletions? Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: On the second page, 2 of 3,
- 21 under No. 2 where it says Celebration of Harvest in
- 22 place of Halloween, the last sentence, the resolution
- 23 failed for lace of second. It should be lack of a
- 24 second.
- MRS. HAZUDA: All right. Thank you.

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MR. ISLER: Any other? Hearing none, move to approve.
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- 3 MRS. COLAIZZI: Second.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you, Mr. Isler.
- 5 All those in favor?
- 6 (There was a chorus of ayes.)
- 7 MRS. HAZUDA: Opposed?
- 8 (No response.)
- 9 MRS. HAZUDA: All right. Turn the page.
- 10 In addition to Executive Sessions announced
- 11 at the Legislative Meeting of October 26, 2011, the
- 12 Board met in Executive Session on November 16, 2011
- 13 and immediately before this Legislative Meeting to
- 14 discuss various personnel matters that may include,
- 15 but are not limited to administrative vacancies and
- 16 positions opened and closed.
- 17 Finally, at the Executive Session
- 18 immediately before this Legislative Meeting, the Board
- 19 discussed student discipline cases that involved
- 20 violations of various portions of the code of student
- 21 conduct. The Board does not vote at Executive
- 22 Session.
- We'll begin with the committee reports and
- 24 the first Committee Report on Education that is before
- 25 you submitted by Dr. Allen, chair and her committee.

- 1 If you would please turn to Page 19 of 19
- 2 of the report, I would like to give you the student
- 3 suspension, transfer and expulsion numbers for this
- 4 month. 50 students suspended for 4 to 10 days, no
- 5 students suspended for 4 to 10 days and transferred to
- 6 another Pittsburgh Public School, 2 students expelled
- 7 out of school for 11 days or more, zero students
- 8 expelled out of school for 11 days or more and
- 9 transferred to another Pittsburgh Public School.
- 10 Are there any questions or comments on the
- 11 Committee Report on Education that were not addressed
- 12 at Agenda Review?
- Dr. Allen, let's start with you.
- DR. ALLEN: For No. 27, the District
- 15 realignment plan, this is -- I know we've been talking
- 16 about this since the first meeting in June. It
- 17 doesn't make it any easier to discuss it and
- 18 eventually vote on it tonight.
- I do want to kind of recap I think some of
- 20 the time lines for when this was first introduced to
- 21 let people know that despite what's being brought
- 22 forth that will affect people's lives and will be
- 23 difficult for a number of people to, you know, to deal
- 24 with and adjust, we try to make the process as
- 25 thoughtful as possible.

- And so even though we don't want to be
- 2 faced with this decision, here are some of the
- 3 criteria, you know, and just a reminder about the
- 4 process. When Dr. Lane first submitted the criteria
- 5 to us about school consolidations and school closures,
- 6 we wanted to learn I think from the Right-Sizing Plan
- 7 some of the feedback we got in terms of decisions for
- 8 what schools would be proposed for closure.
- 9 There were the first chair of criteria
- 10 taking into consideration, achievement of students,
- 11 enrollment of the school, facility conditions and the
- 12 cost of operations for the building. And then there
- 13 were other secondary factors that also did weigh in
- 14 regarding the racial distribution, equity,
- 15 transportation, special programs and regions, and this
- 16 has been -- you know, these factors were considered
- 17 when the student -- the schools were proposed that
- 18 we're voting on tonight.
- I also want to make sure everyone's aware
- 20 that we had a community process, lots of various
- 21 community meetings and community input that really did
- 22 influence some of the proposals that we're actually
- 23 voting on here tonight, and we even changed -- we
- 24 actually made additional adjustments, you know, from
- 25 other proposals.

- 1 So it's gone through a number of iterations
- 2 for what we have here today, and so, you know, one of
- 3 those is Chartiers remain open and, you know, Langley
- 4 being proposed from PreK-8 to an actual K-8 school.
- I know this will be tough. I have a
- 6 personal connection for Langley in particular. My
- 7 organization provides services to the 9th grade
- 8 students.
- 9 There will be a school still in the area,
- 10 and we're just trying to make I think the best
- 11 decisions we can with the circumstances that we have,
- 12 and so that's all I'm saying.
- Thank you.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you, Dr. Allen.
- Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I just had some
- 17 clarifications under Proposal and Grants No. 2. The
- 18 \$1 million, the Heinz Endowment for Early Childhood
- 19 Program in the amount of \$1 million. It says the
- 20 purpose of the business is to work with families who
- 21 are over 3 percent greater levels of federal income
- 22 and so on and so on.
- I just wanted to ask is this plan that
- 24 they're working on, is this at all to work with or to
- 25 prepare for any type of charter school or voucher

- 1 program?
- DR. LANE: No, Mr. Brentley. Because of
- 3 the reduction in our Accountability Block Grant, we
- 4 actually have a lot of families who are no longer
- 5 eligible or able to participate in our Pre-K program,
- 6 so we have a waiting list, and this was a way --
- 7 although we have support for our families that are
- 8 below the federal poverty level because of Head Start,
- 9 families that are over the poverty level we don't have
- 10 enough funds to provide our Early Childhood.
- So we're trying to see if there might be a
- 12 way by which we could provide a fee for service model
- 13 for them, but, no, this is not related to any charter
- 14 voucher proposal.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. But what is our
- 16 relationship with the Homewood Children's Village?
- 17 Are they a contractor or service provider for us?
- DR. LANE: Well, actually, we have a
- 19 Memorandum of Understanding with Homewood Children's
- 20 Village, and they are providing some services at
- 21 Westinghouse as I'm sure you're aware, but they also
- 22 are looking to provide services to children who either
- 23 live or go to school in Homewood, which ultimately is
- 24 to include medical services, dental, those kinds of
- 25 things as well. So they're trying to kind of do wrap

- 1 around support for kids that either go to school in
- 2 Homewood or live in Homewood.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Have they at this
- 4 point submitted or expressed any interest at all in
- 5 submitting an application for a charter school in the
- 6 Pittsburgh Public School District?
- 7 DR. LANE: At this point, no, they have
- 8 not.
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, my next question,
- 10 Mr. Weiss, would that at all be any kind of conflict
- 11 for an agency to be a service provider and then to
- 12 submit an application or the better question would be
- 13 is there any language at all in our MOU with this
- 14 agency concerning that?
- MR. WEISS: There's no language in the MOU
- 16 as far as the conflict or potential conflict. I
- 17 really would have to defer any comment on that until
- 18 we see if an application would be forthcoming next
- 19 year and compare that to the MOU, so it's certainly
- 20 something we'll look at; but at this point, I really
- 21 can't say more than that until we see something
- 22 concrete.
- I would point out the deadline for
- 24 application has passed, so we're not going to be
- 25 dealing with any application likely this year.

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. And but on that
- 2 issue, just to close that issue, it would be helpful
- 3 if it was forthcoming or a much more clear
- 4 understanding if that is or was the intention of
- 5 actually any organization who is working within our
- 6 buildings and then eventually pull out and submit
- 7 applications. It would be helpful to know that early
- 8 on.
- 9 MR. WEISS: I don't disagree.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- 11 My next question is Page 3, No. 4, the
- 12 question on the Petersen Center, and I did get the
- 13 response back from Administration. It is my
- 14 understanding that the university is not willing to
- 15 work out any kind of parking arrangements with the
- 16 District on those two days if I read it correctly?
- DR. LANE: I think there was a little more
- 18 to it than that.
- But, Dr. Otuwa, can you -- was there more
- 20 to it than that? I think there was.
- 21 DR. OTUWA: It will be an added cost on
- 22 our part if we want to enter into that kind of
- 23 relationship with them.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. You know, I am -- I
- 25 did -- I thought it was a great location, but there

- 1 were some concerns about the parking and what they had
- 2 to pay, and I would just encourage folks -- it may be
- 3 difficult this year, but that because we are I believe
- 4 good customers that they would hopefully meet us
- 5 halfway or do something in support of us.
- 6 Have we at all contacted the new Consol
- 7 Energy Center for graduations, which would be an
- 8 excellent location?
- 9 DR. OTUWA: We can explore that next year,
- 10 but what the school principals are doing is some of
- 11 them are offering buses for the parents.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Which would be an
- 13 additional cost, but that's still a --
- 14 DR. OTUWA: But that's from the school
- 15 budget.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Great.
- DR. LANE: And the other thing -- well, we
- 18 can certainly look at Consol, but a couple things.
- 19 I'm sure the cost is breathtaking for Consol Energy,
- 20 but the other thing I think that we need to remember,
- 21 that is the Penguins' place, and that was the reason
- 22 we ended up with commencement on Father's Day because
- 23 of the possibility of the Penguins being in the
- 24 playoffs.
- 25 And so if we have our date where we like

- 1 it, we can't use Consol, so that we would be back in
- 2 the exact same space again.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Well, it would be
- 4 great for just an opportunity to kind of look into.
- 5 For No. 27, Doctor, the District
- 6 realignment plan, I have major, major concerns with
- 7 it, and I am obviously not alone place based upon the
- 8 response to the Public Hearing last night.
- I can tell you that I have major concerns
- 10 about No. J from the beginning, as well as what's
- 11 presently, but I am willing to work with the
- 12 two communities for the recommendations for the Perry
- 13 Oliver I believe.
- But, secondly, I still want to express my
- 15 concerns about quite a few of them, but the one that I
- 16 really want to focus on that I think makes really no
- 17 sense is the Northview Heights closing. Somewhere we
- 18 have to find a way to remind poor students, primarily
- 19 African-American students that they should be treated
- 20 fairly.
- 21 To take Northview out of its community, put
- 22 them on a bus to keep someone else's building open is
- 23 not a good thing. Northview is a great building. A
- 24 lot of remodeling was completed there, and it just
- 25 simply makes no sense to now just close the building

- 1 up, and so I would encourage my colleagues not to
- 2 support that, along with some others, but I understand
- 3 when it's not in your backyard there's no need to
- 4 stand up and support the poor folks.
- 5 So I don't support that one, Doctor, and I
- 6 am actually going to be only supporting J on the
- 7 realignment plan.
- 8 On 17, Page 17, No. 29, there's several --
- 9 there's several amendments here with the Westinghouse,
- 10 all amendments, and I have major concerns with that as
- 11 well.
- 12 And then No. 31, the elimination of costume
- 13 courses at CAPA, we've heard from CAPA loud and clear.
- 14 Have there been any other changes or
- 15 everything presented to us and still presented for
- 16 consideration for today, Doctor?
- DR. LANE: I think -- I'm not sure I
- 18 understand your question but --
- MR. BRENTLEY: We have not made any
- 20 recommendations for the changes?
- 21 DR. LANE: Are there other recommendations
- 22 for changes at CAPA specifically?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. This item is still
- 24 before us as is and that is the elimination of the
- 25 costume course at CAPA?

- DR. LANE: Correct.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Okay. Well, I am,
- 3 you know, concerned about that. I shared my concerns.
- 4 I would just say once again that it's a school that is
- 5 working. I think one of the comments that really
- 6 stuck out at the meeting there was someone made the
- 7 comment of engaging them, holding for a moment and
- 8 engaging the community to come up with some
- 9 alternatives in terms of making things work.
- 10 And I think I've been saying that for the
- 11 longest, and I'm going to ask the Administration
- 12 consider that again, and I really think most of these
- 13 items coming before us today could really benefit if
- 14 we would consider holding and then engaging the
- 15 community to help us to resolve some of the issues.
- When we do things the way we're doing here
- 17 in my opinion which is quick and kind of a knee jerk
- 18 reaction things happen, and so it will be a very, very
- 19 difficult thing for me to support. I will continue to
- 20 ask the Administration to listen to the community,
- 21 invite the community, engage the community.
- 22 Six people, nine Board members at this end
- 23 does not have the answers for all of the issues in
- 24 this District, and so we have to find a way to open up
- 25 and to engage others.

- 1 Thank you very much.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 3 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 4 MRS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Madame Chair.
- 5 Just in general I think what I would like
- 6 to state is that this realignment plan has come
- 7 forward to us back in July I would say, and it has
- 8 been through the process the staff generally does do,
- 9 which is explore, talking to the public, exploring
- 10 different options, listening to recommendations from
- 11 the public and even taking those recommendations at
- 12 times when it is the better way to go.
- But I will be supporting this with the
- 14 exception of one item in here, and that is the Welding
- 15 program. However, I would like to make clear that in
- 16 the feeder pattern changes for Minadeo and Greenfield,
- 17 which I was very involved with, again I would like to
- 18 thank staff for coming out and supporting me and
- 19 helping me and the public figure out a way to work
- 20 that out.
- I also want to remind everybody that when
- 22 we do things like this and we have to make the cuts
- 23 that we do, our job is not easy. It's generally the
- 24 one that has to make that last decision that upsets
- 25 everybody, but we don't do it for any negative reason.

- 1 We do it because it's what we have to do and what we
- 2 have to do to be equitable throughout the District.
- 3 With Greenfield and Minadeo, the feeder
- 4 pattern changes went through a process of talking to
- 5 the public several times. We had several meetings. I
- 6 know that not everybody is happy. Although, we have
- 7 said over and over again that when we do things of
- 8 this sort, we do go back and re-evaluate; and if
- 9 there's anything that we need to tweak, I'm sure the
- 10 staff will do that.
- 11 So in all of these things that we do, we
- 12 don't just do and then drop the ball. We do follow
- 13 through. We do make sure that everything is in place;
- 14 and if it doesn't work for whatever reason, staff does
- 15 address things at that time as well, so with that
- 16 being said --
- And then on No. 30, which is the RHVAC
- 18 program and the Welding program, my concern is not
- 19 necessarily that we're ending a program, but my
- 20 concern is that we need to be very clear of what CTE
- 21 programs that we are going to invest in and how we
- 22 invest in them and if we have a program that we find
- 23 that it is lacking, has loss whatever it needs to
- 24 continue, whether it's certification isn't being taken
- 25 advantage of or whatever, it is important to me to

- 1 know that the staff is going to seriously look at each
- 2 and every program and evaluate that in more than just
- 3 is the student getting certification, but what is that
- 4 student getting and what are we doing to make sure
- 5 that these students at least have an option outside of
- 6 just college or whatever things?
- 7 I think I expressed that to you, Dr. Lane,
- 8 and I think you were very responsive when you
- 9 understood where I was going.
- Thank you.
- 11 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 12 Mrs. Fink.
- MRS. FINK: No. I'm good.
- 14 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- I want to comment on three, and then there
- 17 are more in this book, but three things where I think
- 18 the community has really stepped up to assist this
- 19 District in very, very tough financial times. All
- 20 three of them directly affect services to the
- 21 children, that is the Heinz Endowments for their
- 22 willingness to come forward to help us continue the
- 23 excellence Early Childhood program that has been
- 24 developed. And, again, I quote our Superintendent
- 25 that high school reform begins in Pre-K. This is a

- 1 very, very significant grant, and one that is really
- 2 going to benefit this District.
- 3 The Western Pennsylvania Food Bank has
- 4 stepped up to really help children. I don't know how
- 5 anybody who is hungry can attempt to even begin to
- 6 learn.
- 7 And a third and a very, very important one
- 8 is the August Wilson Center with a memo of
- 9 understanding, a memo of agreement that is in here for
- 10 the arts program. I know how hard the staff is
- 11 working to continue to achieve excellence in very,
- 12 very difficult financial times, and I don't think it's
- 13 going to pass over night either. I think that these
- 14 are examples of what the community can do and what the
- 15 community should do on behalf of the children and
- 16 especially thinking about the future of this country
- 17 and having a well-educated citizen.
- In terms of 27 with the District alignment
- 19 plan, again, to Dr. Lane and to all those members of
- 20 her staff who have been working on this as
- 21 Mrs. Colaizzi pointed out since July, this is never an
- 22 easy process; but, again, the times dictate that we do
- 23 take action. I think it is very important that we are
- 24 heading into another fiscal year beginning January 1st
- 25 without a tax increase.

- I have been assured by Dr. Lane's
- 2 explanation and I think Dr. Allen spelled it out
- 3 earlier in her comments that what we want to do by the
- 4 realignment is really strengthen the educational
- 5 program children who are being most directly affected,
- 6 and Dr. Lane has assured us of that.
- 7 So, again, Dr. Lane, to you and your staff,
- 8 thank you for this.
- 9 Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 11 Mr. McCrea.
- MR. McCREA: Thank you.
- Just a quick comment on No. 27, this has
- 14 been a very painful process, and I represent some of
- 15 the people that are in the most pain.
- 16 Like we said, the community has been
- 17 involved. We tried to keep the community involved,
- 18 but let's keep the community involved going forward
- 19 and Invest in the West because they do need -- they
- 20 deserve and they need a lot more attention than
- 21 they've been getting, and not just from this Board,
- 22 from the City Council and everybody else as well.
- 23 And agree with Mrs. Colaizzi on Item
- 24 No. 30, and I think we need to keep more building
- 25 trades in our schools, and that's why I can't support

- 1 that.
- 2 Thank you.
- 3 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 4 Mr. Sumpter.
- 5 MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- I would venture to say that there are
- 7 probably more important decisions made at this table
- 8 than anywhere else in Western Pennsylvania or the City
- 9 of Pittsburgh or whatever.
- 10 Having gone through this before with school
- 11 closings, layoffs, furloughs, school closings,
- 12 realignments, we need to take this very serious
- 13 because we're charting the path for the future of the
- 14 City of Pittsburgh, and just to know that you get
- 15 nine people together like a jury or nine people
- 16 together that can collectively work at it, but I think
- 17 we all have our individual talents to contribute to
- 18 the conversation. It's been a healthy one.
- And some of the things that we've heard
- 20 that I hope as we move forward the issue of equity,
- 21 not equality, equity. Equity means where there is the
- 22 most need that that need gets addressed.
- We heard that in the Public Hearing last
- 24 evening, and we're going to hear it more. And as I
- 25 mentioned at the outset of the meeting, that's part of

- 1 our core beliefs, commitments and goals to make sure
- 2 that we do things in an equitable manner within this
- 3 District.
- 4 Some general comments or specific comments
- 5 on No. 27, the District realignment plan, Item A is
- 6 talking about the Board of Education of the School
- 7 District of Pittsburgh authorize the closure of the
- 8 school program at Pittsburgh Fort Pitt Pre-K effective
- 9 June 30, 2012 and reassignment of students. It's a
- 10 good building, and we need to find the conversation to
- 11 see if we can reuse that building in some productive
- 12 manner.
- 13 I've always been the proponent that you
- 14 need to keep the best facilities for the long-term of
- 15 the School District. For the sustainability of the
- 16 District, you need to keep the best buildings online,
- 17 and Fort Pitt is a good building and it is better than
- 18 some of the buildings that are still online within the
- 19 District and, specifically, a building that's
- 20 relatively close to that so that conversation I would
- 21 say should continue.
- I remember the same comments came up when
- 23 we were closing schools back in 2006, and we talked
- 24 about the feasibility of the reuse of the Margaret
- 25 Milliones building, and that building is back online

- 1 and being used productively, so I say that to keep
- 2 that, note of that, not lose sight of that concern.
- Also, there were a number of feeder pattern
- 4 changes within this realignment. It's good to know
- 5 where kids are assigned. It's good to know where the
- 6 feeder patterns are, but, also, it is important to
- 7 know where the kids are actually going.
- 8 Last evening at the Public Hearing, we
- 9 heard a lot of Colfax parents talking about how their
- 10 children were going from Colfax to CAPA. Now, that's
- 11 not a feeder pattern assignment, but that's a choice
- 12 that we need to take note of us and understand the
- 13 choices that parents are making within the District.
- We can on paper make it look right by
- 15 saying these are the feeder patterns and these are
- 16 where the kids are supposed to go, but unless we
- 17 actually know that, that would help, and that has been
- 18 requested to have that information plotted on a map or
- 19 plotted graphically, so we can better understand that
- 20 dynamic.
- 21 Also, Item L is talking about the that
- 22 Board of Education the School District of Pittsburgh
- 23 authorizes the move of McCleary Childhood Center to
- 24 Pittsburgh Arsenal Pre-K. At some point in time, I
- 25 would hope that we could graphically see on a map

- 1 where our early childhood centers are and how they're
- 2 serving the District.
- When we talked about moving McCleary a year
- 4 ago, folks were complaining about it. We were talking
- 5 about moving Chartiers, but that's not moving, but
- 6 sometimes we need to just take into account the cost
- 7 and benefits of moving, not that I'm speaking against
- 8 that one; but in particular, folks that are there are
- 9 talking about how it's a beautiful building and you
- 10 got playgrounds. You have all these amenities around
- 11 that, and what impact that would have on parents
- 12 getting to the centers.
- In general, the policy of the Public
- 14 Housing Authority within the City of Pittsburgh has
- 15 greatly affected poor and low income students within
- 16 this District in various areas, and because of such
- 17 has caused schools to close or caused recommendations
- 18 to come before this Board to close schools in those
- 19 areas, but I would just say to keep in mind that if we
- 20 promise to do right by the students and such that the
- 21 students take advantage of the Promise and maybe we
- 22 might see or might not see within the next several
- 23 years the effect of having the Pittsburgh Promise, of
- 24 having met AYP several years, of having achievement
- 25 gaps eliminated, of having improvement within the

- 1 District, folks might come flocking back to the City
- 2 if gas prices go up high enough and folks are tired of
- 3 being in the hinderlands and can't walk to amenities.
- 4 That's some of the things that urban living
- 5 affords individuals, being able to walk to shopping,
- 6 being able to walk to education and cultural
- 7 facilities, such that we need to know what schools
- 8 that we're going to keep moth-balled as such for the
- 9 potential regeneration of particular communities.
- 10 We need to keep in mind that folks are
- 11 getting beamed up at this time and --
- MR. McCREA: Beam me up.
- MR. SUMPTER: Let's continue, but let's
- 14 always keep in mind the big picture, not this
- 15 community, this community, this community one at a
- 16 time, but the big picture of do we have enough
- 17 facilities ready in case the population increases or
- 18 when the population goes back up, are we keeping the
- 19 best facilities online? Are we making sure that
- 20 equity is throughout the District because some people
- 21 are complaining about what was taken away from them
- 22 and some folks were saying that they never had it in
- 23 the first place, so let's understand what our mission
- 24 is and that term equity to make sure that all of the
- 25 children get the benefit of what we can do for them

- 1 based on the resources we have to provide for them.
- 2 So in case of the closing of Northview and
- 3 in the case of the closing of Fort Pitt, it's
- 4 something that I regret. However, those communities
- 5 may turn around, and we need to keep that in mind, and
- 6 to make sure that the burden doesn't just fall on
- 7 particular segments of our school population, that
- 8 only certain children wind up being bussed or only
- 9 certain child care centers are located in certain
- 10 areas or that the burden is shared throughout the
- 11 District in an equitable manner, not in a punitive or
- 12 harmful manner. That happens when you look at it from
- 13 the big picture, not just look at it neighborhood by
- 14 neighborhood or community by community.
- Those are just some of the comments that I
- 16 wanted to make in terms of in general how it relates
- 17 to -- but, specifically, Fort Pitt and Northview as
- 18 far as the potential reuse of those buildings if
- 19 possible.
- Thank you.
- 21 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- Ms. Shealey.
- MS. SHEALEY: Thank you.
- Just on Item 31, Dr. Lane, the elimination
- 25 of the costuming program at CAPA, what happens to

- 1 those nine children?
- DR. LANE: The children will be part of the
- 3 visual arts program, and I probably should point out
- 4 that in the case of the actual specific reductions
- 5 that were discussed last evening and with you prior,
- 6 they did undergo some changes based on the discussion
- 7 with the school. However, in answer to the specific
- 8 question you're answering -- or asking me is these
- 9 students are dual enrolled and they'll be in visual
- 10 arts.
- 11 MS. SHEALEY: I'm sorry. So all of them
- 12 are already dual enrolled students?
- DR. LANE: Correct.
- MS. SHEALEY: Okay. Okay. And so -- thank
- 15 you for that. That makes me feel better because I
- 16 think to Mr. Sumpter's point about equity, I was -- my
- 17 concern is they would just have nothing and pushed out
- 18 of CAPA next year or sent to the four winds.
- But while I'm here on equity, I might as
- 20 put my plug in for 3rd graders who are currently
- 21 taking instrumental music programs and the continuity
- 22 of programming for them because that's what I was --
- 23 that's what I was looking at is the continuity for
- 24 these nine students.
- 25 And so as we move forward, any

- 1 consideration that could be given to current
- 2 3rd graders in instrumental music programs being able
- 3 to continue those programs into 4th grade I think
- 4 would be a more equitable situation for those specific
- 5 students than the hard stop that I think Education
- 6 Committee.
- 7 Thank you very much.
- 8 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- In an effort to be fiscally responsible, we
- 10 have looked at our CTE program to align it with the
- 11 Pennsylvania State Department PDE to look at jobs that
- 12 are going to be in existence in the next ten years,
- 13 and I think the intent is good that we do that because
- 14 we do need to be fiscally responsible because that's
- 15 how we get reimbursed.
- But I think when the state is looking at
- 17 the entire state, they're not looking at the City of
- 18 Pittsburgh, and we know in Pittsburgh we do have
- 19 strong construction unions, and this year we've seen
- 20 Ms. Mike has put together several partnerships with
- 21 different trade organizations that have been
- 22 beneficial to our children, but I'm still concerned
- 23 with the reduction in building trades being taught in
- 24 our District for our children. We know there are jobs
- 25 out there for them.

- 1 Since we have put CTE as a priority again
- 2 for 2012 as an effort to get it right, I would hate to
- 3 see us make a move on this and then decide halfway
- 4 down the road that this isn't -- like, we're going to
- 5 take -- be willing to pay for this to educate these
- 6 kids without getting reimbursement from the state,
- 7 and, I mean, you could always close it next year.
- 8 The savings is not -- to me the savings of
- 9 closing it this year is not significant enough to do
- 10 it while we're still reviewing the program and making
- 11 decisions, so I will be voting no on No. 30.
- 12 Thank you.
- Mr. Weiss, may we have a roll call vote,
- 14 please?
- 15 MR. WEISS: Let me take a little time
- 16 here. Bare with us.
- 17 Dr. Allen.
- DR. ALLEN: Yes, on the report as a whole.
- 19 Abstain on Item 3.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley.
- 21 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, on the report. I'll be
- 22 voting no on No. 27, but yes on J of 27. I'll be
- 23 voting no on 28. I'll be voting no on 29, and I'll be
- 24 voting no on 31.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Colaizzi.

- 1 MRS. COLAIZZI: Yes, on the report as a
- 2 whole. I will be voting no on No. 30.
- 3 MR. WEISS: Mrs. Fink.
- 4 MRS. FINK: Yes, on the report as a whole.
- 5 No, on Item 30, Page 17.
- 6 MR. WEISS: Mr. Isler.
- 7 MR. ISLER: Yes.
- MR. McCREA: Yes, on the report as a
- 9 whole. No on Item No. 30.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Shealey.
- MS. SHEALEY: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: Yes.
- MR. WEISS: Mrs. Hazuda.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Yes, on the report on the
- 16 whole. No, on No. 30.
- MR. WEISS: As I view this, it appears the
- 18 all items have passed. Item 30 has four no votes and
- 19 five yes votes, so the report is approved.
- Thank you pardon?
- 21 (Inaudible.)
- MR. WEISS: Yes.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you, Mr. Weiss.
- We'll now move onto the Committee on
- 25 Business and Finance submitted by Mr. McCrea, chair

- 1 and his committee.
- 2 Before we begin discussion on the report,
- 3 Mr. Camarda would like to make clarification on
- 4 two business items.
- 5 MR. CAMARDA: Just to clarify for you on
- 6 Page 4 of 6, Items B7 and B8, they both should say
- 7 annually. I apologize for that.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Tell us where to go, and tell
- 9 us a little slower.
- MR. CAMARDA: On Page 4 of 6, Items B7 and
- 11 B8. I believe B7 has the word annually in it, but
- 12 just for the record, it was not there at Agenda
- 13 Review, and I missed having it show up in B8.
- 14 MRS. COLAIZZI: Where?
- MR. SUMPTER: Page 4 of 6.
- MR. CAMARDA: If you go to Business, it's
- 17 the fourth page in, Page 4 of 6.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: What numbers?
- MR. SUMPTER: B7 and B8.
- MR. CAMARDA: B7 and B8.
- 21 MRS. COLAIZZI: Where is the Bs?
- 22 (Inaudible.)
- MR. CAMARDA: 7 and 8, the items are for
- 24 the COBRA is No. 7. UPMC Benefit Management Services
- 25 is No. 8, and the word "annually" was to be in both of

- 1 them.
- MS. SHEALEY: Excuse me, Mr. Camarda.
- 3 Annually after the amount?
- 4 MR. CAMARDA: After the amount, yes.
- 5 MS. SHEALEY: Thank you.
- 6 MS. COLAIZZI: All right. Thank you,
- 7 Mr. Camarda.
- 8 Are there any questions or comments that
- 9 were not addressed at Agenda Review? Dr. Allen.
- 10 DR. ALLEN: Yes. For Item C1 and 2
- 11 regarding the recommendation to authorize the School
- 12 District to award the bid for the sale of the
- 13 Reizenstin School property and then No. 2 for the sale
- 14 of the Ridge Avenue School property, I struggled with
- 15 this one, but I will not be able to support these
- 16 two items based on the process.
- I have expressed this early on when I saw
- 18 what the timeline was for submissions, and I think
- 19 that our process was not reasonable to expect people
- 20 to be able to respond. A three-week window is what we
- 21 had for these two buildings, and we may end up with --
- 22 we could have ended up even with the same bids that
- 23 are coming forward, but I think it would have given
- 24 more opportunity for the community to be able to have
- 25 their voices heard in the process about what the plans

- 1 are or to be able to adequately respond to the RFP
- 2 when it came out.
- I think that we should reject the bids,
- 4 open up the process to extend it for a little bit
- 5 longer for more people to be able to have the
- 6 opportunity to weigh in, and then we could still even
- 7 have a sale within 2012 where we would be able to
- 8 recoupe the funding from the sale of these two
- 9 buildings.
- 10 It does not have any -- my opinion doesn't
- 11 have anything to do with the bids that have come forth
- 12 from the individual firm for No. 1 and then non-profit
- 13 for No. 2, but I think it's more of a larger
- 14 commitment to I think the community who has these
- 15 public assets within their community to be able to
- 16 weigh in within a reasonable time period.
- We approved it in August, and I think we
- 18 should have quickly gotten out the RFP to provide the
- 19 time that we needed for our deadline that would have
- 20 allowed us to be able to give that input.
- Thank you.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I have major concerns
- 25 for B3, 4, 5 and 6. B3 is these are all contracts,

- 1 Communications and Marketing. One is nearly \$27,000.
- 2 The second one is for \$210,000. The third one is 105,
- 3 and I believe there's another 105. If you add those
- 4 up, we are close to the half a million dollars that
- 5 CAPA requested from us last night.
- And, Dr. Lane, I've shared this many times.
- 7 This is a perfect example of duplication of services,
- 8 out of control spending and just a total disrespect
- 9 for the taxpayers. If we have an entire
- 10 communications department, why are we spending nearly
- 11 a half a million dollars for consultants?
- 12 And, remember, some of these if you read
- 13 throughout the description here, some have an
- 14 automatic renewal of two, maybe three years.
- This is an abuse of public dollars. I will
- 16 not be supporting it, and I hope my colleagues would
- 17 join me. We've heard loud and clear from the public
- 18 last night you cannot continue to spend this kind of
- 19 money. You cannot continue to spend this kind of
- 20 money without putting a call to duty so to speak out
- 21 there in the District.
- How many of our employees would jump at the
- 23 opportunity of providing some of the services that
- 24 these consultants are using. Even though the language
- 25 is somewhat misleading, the language suggests oncall

- 1 or up to an amount, which really means nothing because
- 2 if you look in the past, those figures -- they've
- 3 always managed to spend up to the amount, if not
- 4 exceeding the amount.
- 5 And so it is a great opportunity for great
- 6 money for great work if you can get it, but there is
- 7 only a handful of individuals who can get it, so I
- 8 will not be supporting that.
- And I am going to encourage you, Dr. Lane,
- 10 to please not submit anything like this when we're
- 11 going through the hard times that we're going through.
- 12 Last year, there was another consultant,
- 13 Veritas, the Veritas company I believe walked away
- 14 with another 150 or \$200,000, and no one questioned
- 15 it, and we're spending.
- 16 We're not increasing our class sizes, but
- 17 we can give out these contracts, and so it makes no
- 18 sense. It is a duplication of service. It is
- 19 something that really I think we should now wave a
- 20 white flag to as to the amount of money, how it's
- 21 being spent, what kind of budget are we giving
- 22 Communications and Marketing and why not find a way to
- 23 redirect those dollars where they're serving our
- 24 students.
- The second one is on C1, this is the public

- 1 give away of a valuable asset I believe I referred to
- 2 the Reizenstein School. Regardless of the amount,
- 3 that's listed \$5.4 million. If you subtract the debt,
- 4 I believe or what was shared to me that actually we
- 5 would be getting about \$1.1 million.
- And somebody, Mr. Weiss, could you clarify
- 7 for me if I'm making a mistake on my math here?
- MR. WEISS: Well, your math is correct, but
- 9 the bottom line is if the Board approves it, the
- 10 District will receive the bid amount and is required
- 11 by federal law to apply the proceeds first to the
- 12 existing debt on the building. So let's be clear that
- 13 the amount of the sale is around \$5-1/2\$ million, not
- 14 \$1.1 million.
- I understand what you're saying,
- 16 Mr. Brentley. Your math is correct, but I don't
- 17 believe the impression should be left that the
- 18 District is receiving \$1.1 million. It's receiving
- 19 \$5.5 million. If it's approved, the debt on the
- 20 building will be defeated, which means it will be
- 21 paid, and the difference will be used by the District
- 22 for either capital projects or other debt service per
- 23 the school code.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you, Mr. Weiss.
- The question is still the question that we

- 1 have to be able to wrestle with and be able to live
- 2 with ourselves with this, and my words with this give
- 3 away regardless of what is offered that money is going
- 4 right to pay off the debt, so by law -- that's fine.
- 5 You can say by law.
- 6 MR. SUMPTER: By law.
- 7 MR. BRENTLEY: In actuality, we are getting
- 8 1.1 for this campus, this newer building, this
- 9 building just four years ago, the previous
- 10 Administration put 8 to \$10 million, and they had the
- 11 bright idea of taking a middle school and we're going
- 12 to convert it into a high school and no one challenged
- 13 it.
- 14 Here we are four years later, not only are
- 15 we going to give it away, but it is my understanding
- 16 that the potential buyer is going to actually demolish
- 17 it. This is a great story for someone to watch abuse
- 18 of public dollars.
- 19 We can stop that. We should stop it. I
- 20 don't support selling the building, period, but if we
- 21 have had to and if we had to, we can clearly put a
- 22 dollar figure on that that would wipe out half of this
- 23 deficit. Bring those folks back to work. Put those
- 24 CAPA teachers back where they need to be. Get all of
- 25 those employees back that were contributing to this

- 1 great School District.
- We have to be smart in how we deal with
- 3 business here. We're not doing it here. It is
- 4 unfortunate that this is even coming before us.
- 5 And the final note, out of all the
- 6 experimental programs that the previous Administration
- 7 put on, most of it was targeting the East End. We
- 8 have problems going on at Westinghouse, problems with
- 9 a lot East End schools. This is the last building
- 10 that they could actually use in terms of probably
- 11 consolidating two, maybe three of those schools in
- 12 that newer building.
- I am also told that this building -- and I
- 14 don't really give as much credit to so-called gangs or
- 15 territorial, but they consider the location of that
- 16 building as central, as safe, as no one's territory,
- 17 so everyone and anyone can go freely there, and so
- 18 we're missing that opportunity as well.
- And so I'm asking my colleagues that not
- 20 only should we vote it down, but we should do it
- 21 unanimously and send a clear message that if we're
- 22 going to sell any of our assets, we're going to have
- 23 to ask some of our partners to come to the table with
- 24 a little bit more and to support us. I will not be
- 25 supporting that.

- 1 And the second one is C2. C2 is the sale
- 2 of Ridge Avenue. Representing that community, I had
- 3 asked before and I'm going to ask and actually put a
- 4 motion on the floor that this bid should be rejected,
- 5 and I am asking once again for those who aren't
- 6 familiar with it, it is the building that's located on
- 7 the campus of Community College.
- 8 Former superintendent Dr. John Thompson had
- 9 a wonderful program with a school-to-college program,
- 10 and I wanted to look into the possibilities of
- 11 creating that same program for our students to benefit
- 12 of having a building on the campus. If not, at least
- 13 to get in some conversation with Community College
- 14 about whatever program they want to put in there. We
- 15 create a Memorandum of Understanding. If there are
- 16 15 jobs, well, let's 3 of them be trainees or leader
- 17 in transition or leaders in training for Pittsburgh
- 18 Public School seniors. Let us have a direct line into
- 19 getting our students trained and possibly into the
- 20 workforce.
- 21 So I will at the appropriate time make a
- 22 motion that not only it be rejected, that I would be
- 23 appointed as the chair of the Ridge Avenue Project,
- 24 which is nothing more but an ad hoc committee to look
- 25 into the highest and best use for the building

- 1 starting with a conversation with the folks at
- 2 Community College.
- 3 Mr. Weiss, can you tell me would it be
- 4 appropriate for me to do it here or should I wait
- 5 until we go around the table? Or Madame Chair? I
- 6 don't know who --
- 7 MR. WEISS: I would suggest that the
- 8 members comment, and then we can determine what we're
- 9 going to do at that point.
- 10 MR. BRENTLEY: Great. Thank you very much.
- 11 I'll withhold.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: No, I wouldn't.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- 14 MRS. COLAIZZI: Sorry.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Go ahead. I'll wait.
- MRS. COLAIZZI. Quite honestly, I would
- 17 have preferred that you were going to make a motion
- 18 that you would have done it at this point in time, so
- 19 it could be over and done with before we continued on
- 20 but --
- MR. BRENTLEY: I'm following the advice of
- 22 the Solicitor.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: I totally respect that, but
- 24 I guess what I do want to say is that there are
- 25 buildings here that are being sold, and we are

- 1 obligated by law to pay off our debts in those
- 2 buildings whenever we sell them.
- 3 Collectively, as a Board, we discussed the
- 4 process. We did make it a short time period.
- 5 However, we did get some wonderful responses from
- 6 them, and, obviously, some are coming forward.
- 7 Holding onto buildings for a long period of
- 8 time -- I've been on this Board for ten years, and
- 9 Ridge Avenue had been a discussion for those ten
- 10 years. The building isn't getting any younger. It's
- 11 getting older. That goes for all of the other
- 12 buildings we have.
- 13 It will be just more of a cost on us
- 14 sitting on these buildings longer and longer, so I'm
- 15 very supportive of selling them because I would like
- 16 to put at least some of these buildings back on the
- 17 tax rolls. I realize Ridge is not going to be one of
- 18 them, but it serves a purpose in our City just the
- 19 same with what the option is to use the building for.
- 20 But I guess that one of the things I would
- 21 like to say very briefly, Madame Chair, is that I find
- 22 it very difficult at times to sit on this Board and
- 23 hear information being given out as though it were
- 24 fact when it is not. It is very frustrating to me
- 25 when I hear hundreds of thousands of dollars that this

- 1 Board spends on things that this Board has not spent.
- When I hear about half million dollars in
- 3 contracts of Communications and Marketing, for
- 4 example, and then we're demanding that Communications
- 5 and Marketing send out some sort of a flier. Well, I
- 6 mean, you need one to do others. The Communication
- 7 and Marketing department is not that big, and I'm not
- 8 trying to defend the department or not.
- 9 I'm trying to make clear to the public that
- 10 information that is sometimes said at this table is
- 11 not factual. It's very easy to get information. We
- 12 are very open to the public. We have a lot of
- 13 information on the web.
- 14 An up to amount or not to exceed amount
- 15 generally just puts a top on something, and I'm not
- 16 sure that we've ever really spent that kind of money,
- 17 but it is there in case of any needs, and the schools
- 18 do use these contracts. They tap into it constantly.
- 19 That's why they're there.
- 20 So I just would like to remind my
- 21 colleagues that when they're stating numbers or
- 22 statements they should be very clear on if they are
- 23 actual factual statements and not just claiming that
- 24 this is this or that was that. That's just very, very
- 25 frustrating.

- 1 MR. CAMARDA: That is correct.
- 2 MR. ISLER: Okay. Then I was right in my
- 3 reading of it. Thank you.
- 4 You know, I think the comments of some of
- 5 my colleagues in terms of use of buildings is very,
- 6 very critical. I mean, we are limited by the
- 7 Commonwealth, and I say this time and time again.
- 8 We're limited in terms of our role as School members
- 9 by the Commonwealth and the school code.
- I however do really feel strongly that it
- 11 is not about the usage issue at all, but I would like
- 12 to see as much return to the tax roll as possible.
- I would also like to point out to my
- 14 colleagues that when we reduce the debt on a building,
- 15 we have a double hit. No. 1, we are we are not paying
- 16 any debt service, which something that Mrs. Fink and I
- 17 have been in my 12 years and her 30-something is
- 18 something that we talk about all the time because it
- 19 does drive us all up the wall.
- 20 And the second thing is we're not paying
- 21 any ongoing maintenance to maintain the building at
- 22 45 or 50 degrees, which is what services do, so I just
- 23 think we need to be aware of that, but I do believe in
- 24 the fact that we ought to try to get as many of these
- 25 back on the tax rolls as possible.

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1 Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
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- 2 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 3 Mr. McCrea.
- 4 MR. McCREA: Just a quick thought about the
- 5 sale of the buildings, and I've been on this Board for
- 6 ten years, along with Mrs. Colaizzi, and we have had a
- 7 lot of buildings we vacated, we tried to sell, then we
- 8 stopped the sale and started the sale. We had some
- 9 good solid deals going. It's going to reduce our
- 10 long-term debt by paying off the short-term debt, so I
- 11 say let's move forward.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- These are the meetings we live for.
- For Items 4, 5 and 6, those are all the
- 17 consultant, contracts dealing with Marketing and
- 18 Communications, my preference would be that if these
- 19 were to move forward it would be one-year contracts
- 20 with one-year options only and that they would be
- 21 approved on a year-to-year basis, not four-year
- 22 contracts or not one-year contracts with three-year
- 23 option agreements.
- On the sale of the buildings, there's been
- 25 a comment about the process from this table and from

- 1 people in the community. I think the learning
- 2 experience for this Board is to better inform the
- 3 community of its role when we do decide to sell a
- 4 building, to let them know the timeframes for the
- 5 Public Hearings and what we would expect from the
- 6 community to be said at those Public Hearings, to
- 7 invite the community to visit the buildings, to
- 8 consider the proposals for the buildings.
- 9 However, the timeframe set up in this last
- 10 round, I don't know that it would give anybody
- 11 adequate time from the start of when they were
- 12 advertised for bid to this point in time to come
- 13 together with a proper bid for some folks. For others
- 14 who have been sitting back waiting in the wings maybe
- 15 they have all their ducks lined up and are ready to
- 16 move.
- The deals that have been put forward to us
- 18 I think we need to look at from the standpoint, yes,
- 19 it may have been a short process. Perhaps, it may be
- 20 different, but to look at the costs and benefits of
- 21 those deals, what benefit would the District derive
- 22 from the sale of a school? Would it benefit the
- 23 District on the tax rolls? Would it benefit the
- 24 District with helping to repopulate some of the
- 25 schools? Would it benefit the District or the City in

- 1 terms of jobs? Would it benefit the District in terms
- 2 of development in areas that need it or are our
- 3 buildings standing in the way of progress in certain
- 4 areas?
- 5 And you could look at finally the old
- 6 Fifth Avenue High School as being developed, and it
- 7 has been sitting there for some time, but now it's
- 8 going to be developed. And if you look at patterns of
- 9 development, once Consol Energy, the arena, the lawyer
- 10 offices coming up Fifth Avenue, the development coming
- 11 up Fifth Avenue, so it's logical that it would
- 12 develop.
- 13 The Larimer Avenue building is still
- 14 sitting there vacant from when it was sold many,
- 15 many moons ago, but with the revitalization of
- 16 East Liberty, there's potential there that could
- 17 happen, and you see how things are locating in
- 18 East Liberty.
- 19 Some folks are old enough to remember what
- 20 East Liberty was 30, 40, 50 years ago, that it was
- 21 second to Downtown as being a central business
- 22 district and had all the amentities that a business
- 23 district would have in it. It would be second to
- 24 Downtown, but because of the automobile, because of
- 25 television and because of the development of the outer

- 1 lying areas around the city, things like that just
- 2 don't happen.
- 3 Cities were created for the exchange of
- 4 goods and services, and things happen in a natural
- 5 manner. If we can contribute to that development in a
- 6 beneficial way that benefits the School District,
- 7 benefits the City, benefits the community, we should
- 8 take that to heart. If it's just a matter of trying
- 9 to unload and get rid of and we don't care what
- 10 happens, that's another issue.
- 11 So the concern that certain folks have
- 12 mentioned about having the opportunity to discuss
- 13 what's going to happen with a building before the bid
- 14 is accepted and what process -- there has not been a
- 15 process laid out for the community, so they don't know
- 16 and we don't know. We don't know what to expect.
- 17 They don't know what to expect.
- 18 They go up for bid, and the lucky bidder
- 19 gets it, and then we react afterwards with a community
- 20 meeting hoping that the community will accept or
- 21 mitigate any concerns or problems and make the project
- 22 amenable to what they want, but they're saddled with
- 23 that project.
- So now I'm hearing that we want to have
- 25 some ideas or lay out some guidelines or some guidance

- 1 for what we want to accept in certain communities
- 2 before bids are accepted and voted on. So, again,
- 3 this process of going through this bidding process is
- 4 a learning experience such that whatever buildings are
- 5 left after tonight, we better know how to market those
- 6 buildings and what type of process would be expected
- 7 and the role the community can play in marketing those
- 8 buildings going forward.
- 9 We can't move backwards and redo what's
- 10 done already. It could happen, but I think that that
- 11 may be more detrimental to the District in the long
- 12 run than in the times that we're having right now
- 13 regarding the financial crisis, regarding the
- 14 achievement crisis, regarding the population within
- 15 the School District, et cetera, et cetera.
- 16
 It's almost like the imperfect storm
- 17 instead of being the perfect storm, such that again
- 18 hard decisions are made at this table. Important
- 19 decisions are made at this table that have far
- 20 reaching impact for the City and the School District.
- 21 And like I say, we need to take that to
- 22 heart, but in some cases for at least the one
- 23 property, I think the benefits far outweigh the costs.
- 24 Any money that comes to the District is income to the
- 25 District. How we use it should not negate the value

- 1 of that.
- There were decisions that we made before,
- 3 hard decisions regarding if you have to relocate a
- 4 high school, if you have to move that population to
- 5 another building to at least accommodate those
- 6 individuals there, and we heard the nay-sayers saying
- 7 what was going to happen if we decided to do that
- 8 regarding the relocation of Schenley to Reizenstein
- 9 building, that blood would be running through the
- 10 streets of East Liberty, and that folks would be
- 11 fighting. We heard that when we were closing schools
- 12 in Homewood as far as where people had walk, but
- 13 that's neither here, nor there.
- You hear things on the front end.
- 15 Sometimes it happens. Sometimes it doesn't.
- 16 Hopefully, it won't; but, again, it's a learning
- 17 experience that those are things that we need to
- 18 attend to regarding any sale of buildings, closing of
- 19 buildings, realignment of schools, et cetera.
- 20 So as we can improve our business, our
- 21 deliberations in terms of knowing better how to
- 22 involve the community and how to engage community
- 23 comes under community engagement, and we're saying
- 24 that's one of your goals, one of our beliefs and
- 25 commitments that we want to improve, community

- 1 engagement within the School District. This is one
- 2 aspect of where improvement is needed, improvement
- 3 going forward we can make and we can learn.
- But, again, certain -- I really take
- 5 exception to the fact that if this Board is recorded
- 6 as approving everything that has been done over the
- 7 last -- since my tenure on this Board -- six years,
- 8 that if we have approved it, we condone what happened.
- 9 We weren't testing the waters. We weren't necessarily
- 10 taking chances or risks. We had trust within the
- 11 Administration that the right things are being done.
- 12 So if we do see pockets of excellence, if
- 13 we do see greater achievement, if we do see
- 14 improvement within the District, if we do see folks
- 15 coming back to our schools, if we do see folks being
- 16 picked up at the airports and the comments are made
- 17 about how good the Pittsburgh Public School System is,
- 18 that's what we're here for, and we won't see those
- 19 kinds of things over night. It won't come soon.
- Some of us may see it 10 or 20 years from
- 21 now because of the decisions we're making here tonight
- 22 because the decisions that were made 20 or 30 years
- 23 ago, you can ride around certain communities and see
- 24 the affect of those decisions that still exist.
- So, again, let's take to heart our

- 1 important task. Let's do the right things for the
- 2 kids of the City of Pittsburgh, and, hopefully, the
- 3 byproduct will improve the City as a whole.
- 4 Thank you.
- 5 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 6 Ms. Shealey.
- 7 MS. SHEALEY: Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- 8 Mr. Camarda, this falls a little before my
- 9 time, but I believe the Board approved a healthy
- 10 school bus policy that school buses needed to meet
- 11 emission standards.
- MR. CAMARDA: It's in the current contract,
- 13 and it's retrofitting the buses.
- MS. SHEALEY: So C10 -- or B10. I'm sorry.
- 15 I'm under B10. This is a contract to enter with the
- 16 local bus carrier?
- MR. CAMARDA: It's adding a carrier for --
- 18 within the current contract, that they would abide by
- 19 that same contract.
- MS. SHEALEY: I'm sorry. So wait. We
- 21 already are under contract with them? No?
- MR. CAMARDA: It's another carrier, and I
- 23 think it dealt with a change in ownership within the
- 24 carrier.
- MS. SHEALEY: Okay.

- 1 MR. WEISS: If I can explain it --
- MS. SHEALEY: Let me get my question out,
- 3 and then maybe you can help. I just want to know did
- 4 they meet the policy?
- 5 MR. WEISS: They have to meet the policy by
- 6 the contract they're going to sign. If they don't
- 7 meet it, they don't transport children.
- MS. SHEALEY: Thank you. That suffices.
- 9 And I guess to some comments that were made
- 10 earlier, there was characterization that I don't
- 11 necessarily agree with to Mrs. Colaizzi's point about
- 12 us as members being able to make statements, and it
- 13 was with regard to the failing East End schools, and I
- 14 think that the characterization is unfair.
- We have tremendous issues at Westinghouse
- 16 and the Administration has devoted a lot of time and
- 17 attention to that, but Westinghouse is not the only
- 18 school on the East End. If I might name, Obama,
- 19 Linden, Sterrett, Faison and Lincoln, Homewood Early
- 20 Child Care Center, Dilworth and Fulton are all really
- 21 good schools that live in the East End and that --
- 22 I'm not sure if I named them both, but two
- 23 of my children attend -- my children attend two
- 24 schools on the East End, and as a parent, I'm very
- 25 happy.

- 1 So just that characterization about bad
- 2 schools on the East End just didn't feel fair to me,
- 3 particularly, as the representative of a lot of the
- 4 East End schools.
- 5 So thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- 6 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 7 Mr. Weiss, what buildings do we have that
- 8 are currently vacant, but not up for sale?
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: I want to see this one.
- 10 MR. WEISS: Well --
- 11 MR. SUMPTER: There's a bunch.
- MR. WEISS: -- I didn't bring my roster
- 13 with me, but Prospect is vacant, but it's under option
- 14 agreement. Miller will close by the end of the year.
- 15 Connelly has been sold. And I think the bulk of them
- 16 are -- were up for sale under C3, and we did not get a
- 17 lot of response so that's the best answer I can give
- 18 you right now.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Okay. Thank you.
- So would it be safe to say that a community
- 21 where any of our vacant buildings are other than
- 22 Connelly, Prospect and Miller, the community should
- 23 take a proactive stance in trying to look for ways to
- 24 get the building re-used in a purpose that is suitable
- 25 to that neighborhood?

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1 MR. WEISS: I would say you're right, and
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- 2 in some of the communities, that has been done, but
- 3 the efforts have not been successful to date I think
- 4 due in part to the economic times we live in right
- 5 now. That's sort of capital is scarce, but we hope as
- 6 things get better there may be more interest.
- 7 MRS. HAZUDA: But if they do take a
- 8 proactive interest at this point, it might save us
- 9 time later when people react when the buildings go up
- 10 for sale?
- 11 MR. WEISS: Yes. I agree with that.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Okay. Thank you.
- 13 If there are no -- Dr. Allen.
- DR. ALLEN: I just wanted to clarify,
- 15 Mr. Weiss, when you said the Miller -- that Miller is
- 16 closing, do you mean the Miller building, not Miller
- 17 School where it's currently located?
- MR. WEISS: The Miller building will -- the
- 19 transaction will close by the end of the year. The
- 20 Board approve that sale sometime ago. So thank you
- 21 for the opportunity do that.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- Mr. Brentley.
- 24 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I want to -- first
- 25 before I put the motion on the floor, I do want to

- 1 point out the fact that I had a brief conversation
- 2 with the director of the Light of Life Mission who was
- 3 the candidate or the agency that was recommended by
- 4 the Administration to receive the Ridge Avenue.
- 5 And I had a brief conversation with him in
- 6 the hallway, and I had to remind him that I am a
- 7 supporter of the mission of the Light of Life Mission.
- 8 As a youngster, I attended church there. I
- 9 participated in the food distribution program. I was
- 10 a volunteer there, and, also, I did one summer as a
- 11 summer worker there.
- My family is committed. My family is a
- 13 part of that building on North Avenue. I don't
- 14 believe that there's a room that we haven't been in in
- 15 the building in terms of a family attending church and
- 16 other activities, so I only say that to make it very
- 17 clear so that the attempt to draw lines between folks
- 18 not supporting the mission of the Light of Life
- 19 Mission would just simply be false. I am a supporter,
- 20 will continue to support them. The reason for making
- 21 this resolution to try to get something out of it for
- 22 our children because of the wonderful, wonderful
- 23 location.
- 24 Secondly, it was made here -- there was
- 25 comments made here by one of my colleagues concerning

- 1 misinformation and not give accurate numbers and so
- 2 on, and I agree with my colleague.
- 3 So I am going to direct Dr. Lane -- I would
- 4 like for you to provide for me the exact numbers for
- 5 the last five years of the dollars that were spent
- 6 from the Communications and Marketing, and I would
- 7 like to have a break out of the different contractors
- 8 and the amount of dollars that each contractor
- 9 provided. I would like to at this time --
- 10 MRS. HAZUDA: Excuse me, Mr. Brentley. I
- 11 believe that was supplied to us about two months ago
- 12 at your request, so it would be in our paperwork
- 13 already.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, I am asking for
- 15 additional information because I need to know as it
- 16 was mentioned by one of my colleagues in terms of the
- 17 actual numbers, and I also need to see --
- MRS. HAZUDA: We were given that. You had
- 19 asked for --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay.
- MRS. HAZUDA: -- it and you were given --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Let me --
- MRS. HAZUDA: -- the details.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Let me put my request in,
- 25 and then let the Administration provide if possible.

- 1 And, also, I would like to see the list of
- 2 the contractor or service providers and what dollar
- 3 amount they received over the last five years.
- I would like to make a motion for this
- 5 resolution for C10, and this is a motion to simply
- 6 reject the motion and to -- well, I'll do it in two
- 7 phases. I'll do the rejection of this motion first.
- 8 Then the second one I would like to do as a -- to be
- 9 appointed as the chair to talk about the highest and
- 10 best use for that particular building with the
- 11 Community College or any other agency interested.
- 12 So that is a motion that I'm putting
- 13 forward on this --
- 14 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Brentley, you wouldn't
- 15 need to make a motion to reject it. We would simply
- 16 do that by our vote.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, but I'm asking to
- 18 reject it to have it removed so that we're not voting
- 19 on this item.
- MR. WEISS: Well, it's part of the report.
- 21 I mean, the motion -- the report you have on C2 is to
- 22 award the bid to Light of Life Mission. Those who
- 23 wish to not have that happen should vote no on C2.
- I think the motion Mr. Brentley is making
- 25 is repetitive, and I would suggest that the Board

- 1 consider the report, and if the members are
- 2 inclined -- those members who are inclined not to
- 3 support the sale of Ridge to Light of Life Mission
- 4 should simply vote no.
- I think the motion to reject is repetitive
- 6 and could tend to confuse the report, so I would
- 7 recommend the Board not consider that.
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, Mr. Weiss, here's the
- 9 reason for that. I don't want it to be a splitting
- 10 issues with someone having to say yes or no for this
- 11 particular item, and because of the wonderful works of
- 12 this mission, it can be viewed that way.
- 13 My attempt to put a motion on the floor to
- 14 simply have it removed before us would avoid that, so
- 15 there is a difference.
- MR. WEISS: Having it removed, in effect,
- 17 rejects the bid. So I'm suggesting to the Board, you
- 18 have it before you in an organized fashion. If it is
- 19 your desire to not award the bid to Light of Life for
- 20 whatever reason that you indicate a no vote on C2.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well, you know, I'm not
- 22 going to argue. I totally disagree with that,
- 23 Mr. Weiss. I mean, as a Board member, we should have
- 24 that right of simply having an item removed.
- 25 (Inaudible.)

- 1 MR. BRENTLEY: That's the -- no, I'm not
- 2 going to argue with the Solicitor on this. Fine.
- 3 We'll just move forward with it.
- 4 You cannot continue to take the rights of a
- 5 voting Board members here, but fine. We'll move
- 6 forward with it.
- 7 MRS. HAZUDA: If there are no further --
- B Dr. Lane -- wait a minute. Go ahead,
- 9 Dr. Lane.
- DR. LANE: I just wanted to offer some
- 11 clarification around the consulting fees for the
- 12 department of communications which on face looks like
- 13 the department of communications has just as a heavy
- 14 budget, which is not the case. What really happens
- 15 here is that if a school or a department needs design
- 16 work done, they ask the department of communications
- 17 to do that, and then they pay out of their budgets to
- 18 cover the cost of that particular design work.
- And in addition to that, I think we did
- 20 provide some information to the Board in this regard
- 21 fairly recently to indicate -- and I don't know if
- 22 Ms. Fischetti can come up with the number. I can't
- 23 pull it out of my head right now. A good portion of
- 24 these costs are actually supported by grant funds, so
- 25 75 percent.

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1 Thank you.
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- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 3 Mr. Sumpter.
- 4 MR. SUMPTER: One question on the point of
- 5 order, Mr. Weiss, on the resolution involving the
- 6 remainder of the buildings where it's recommending
- 7 that the bids be rejected, that's an up or down vote
- 8 on all of those buildings?
- 9 MR. WEISS: Well, that's the resolution is
- 10 drafted. If a Board member wishes to vote no on the
- 11 resolution on a particular school, they can do that,
- 12 and then assuming at the end of that voting process
- 13 one of those results in that bid not being rejected,
- 14 then we'll have to deal with what we did with the bid.
- So I guess what I'm telling you is you can
- 16 vote -- the Board members can vote yes, but register a
- 17 no vote on a particular building. It's not an all up
- 18 or down vote.
- MR. SUMPTER: Okay. Thank you.
- 20 At this point, I would like to put forth a
- 21 motion concerning Items 4, 5 and 6, that they only be
- 22 for one year with THE possibility of one-year options
- 23 for renewal on each of those.
- DR. ALLEN: I'll second it.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Sumpter, Ware Allen.

- 1 Questions on the motion?
- 2 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 3 MRS. COLAIZZI: No.
- 4 MRS. HAZUDA: okay. Mr. Weiss, will you
- 5 take -- this is to vote on the motion to limit Nos. 4,
- 6 5 and 6 to 1-year terms with a 1-year option to renew.
- 7 Is that what you said?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Now, that would mean that at
- 9 the end of the year they would have to come back
- 10 before the process. Okay. That would also mean that
- 11 they can still run the tab up not to exceed the 150
- 12 and \$210,000, that part --
- 13 I'm asking you does your motion address any
- 14 of that?
- 15 MR. SUMPTER: The motion as stated does not
- 16 address that. However, I'm trying to think how to
- 17 address that in the sense that how many items would
- 18 come up that would run it up that high in a one-year
- 19 timeframe, as opposed to a two-year, as opposed to a
- 20 three-year.
- 21 If it were to be addressed, it would be to
- 22 have that same motion and one-year option, the
- 23 one-year -- the first year would only be able to spend
- 24 one-third of that money or one-quarter of that money
- 25 in the first year, but I don't want to limit it to you

- 1 might need a little more than a year. You might need
- 2 a little less, but they still would have to come
- 3 before us for approval to go over that amount.
- 4 MR. BRENTLEY: Well, listen, I appreciation
- 5 your intentions. I don't think it goes far enough. I
- 6 won't be --
- 7 MR. SUMPTER: I understand what you're
- 8 saying.
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: -- but we need to stop the
- 10 bleeding. It's been bleeding for five or more years.
- 11 MR. SUMPTER: At this point, I'll just keep
- 12 it as is, but I take that as --
- MR. BRENTLEY: Thank you.
- MR. SUMPTER: Thank you.
- DR. ALLEN: So with Mr. Sumpter's motion
- 16 that he's put forth, does it mean that the contractors
- 17 would have to submit to an -- reply to an RFP every
- 18 two years?
- MR. SUMPTER: They would have to come back
- 20 on a yearly basis. After the one year, they would
- 21 have to come back to us for renewal.
- 22 DR. ALLEN: So renewal doesn't necessarily
- 23 mean an RFP process? So that's what I'm asking, if
- 24 they have a one-year renewal, then we have an option
- 25 to give them a renewal and then at the end of the

- 1 two-year period, then does that mean they would have
- 2 to reapply? We would have to circulate an RFP again?
- 3 That's my question.
- 4 MR. SUMPTER: Does anybody else see it that
- 5 way? I was just thinking a one-year renewal just
- 6 coming to us to be renewed if they were to on a yearly
- 7 basis.
- 8 MR. BRENTLEY: Annual.
- 9 MR. SUMPTER: Annual renewal.
- MR. WEISS: Well, if it's an option to
- 11 renew that is not an RFP, it's an option to renew
- 12 their services for another year in terms of the
- 13 agreement. There would not be a new RFP. If it were
- 14 a new RFP, there would be a one-year contract, period,
- 15 so that's the difference.
- MR. SUMPTER: The intent was thinking based
- 17 on what was done in that year, we could judge whether
- 18 to renew it or not, and if we didn't, then an RFP
- 19 would go out for new consultants or the decision not
- 20 to have consultants at that point.
- DR. ALLEN: Well, what happens after the
- 22 renewal period? Do you mean does it only say one
- 23 renewal period of a year?
- 24 MR. SUMPTER: No. The intent was that you
- 25 have a one-year contract. They wanted to go for

- 1 four years. Each year they would come back for
- 2 approval of renewing that contract on an annual basis,
- 3 that contract will be renewed on an annual basis.
- DR. ALLEN: But I guess my concern is that
- 5 the RFP allows them to solicit bids from other folks,
- 6 so if it just is on an annual basis, the same
- 7 contractor can't be a contract in perpetuity as
- 8 opposed to soliciting new bids at the end of the
- 9 four-year period.
- 10 MR. SUMPTER: True, and I was looking at it
- 11 just as a control factor. I'm looking at is as a
- 12 control factor not to give out a four-year contract as
- 13 opposed to one-year -- approved on a one-year basis.
- I see what you're saying that one year with
- 15 a one-year renewal and then a new RFP for all of that
- 16 or -- that's -- if we're satisfied with what they've
- 17 done and renew it on an annual basis, then we would
- 18 save money by not having to do a new RFP in that
- 19 sense, so I'm keeping it as the same. It's just renew
- 20 on an annual basis. Because if we had not --
- 21 If this motion were not put forward and we
- 22 voted on it, we would be giving four-year -- almost
- 23 four-year contracts with no -- you would have one-year
- 24 and then approval of a three-year. That was what the
- 25 option was.

- 1 MR. WEISS: Let me ask a question here
- 2 because I think there's some -- we need some clarity.
- 3 The motion as you expressed it is a one-year
- 4 contract -- basically, a two-year agreement, one-year
- 5 and one-year renewal at our option.
- 6 What I'm hearing now is that it's a
- 7 four-year agreement, but it's a one-year and then
- 8 there's three renewals within it. Is that what you're
- 9 saying? The question is how much renewals?
- 10 MR. SUMPTER: I was looking for a renewal
- 11 on an annual basis, approval of renewal on an annual
- 12 basis.
- MR. WEISS: How many of those are there? I
- 14 mean --
- MR. SUMPTER: As it's stated here, it would
- 16 be one year with three renewals.
- MR. WEISS: So is it your goal to have this
- 18 work that each year comes to the Board for approval?
- 19 MR. SUMPTER: Okay. Then my motion would
- 20 be a one-year contract with a one-year option. That's
- 21 what I would really prefer.
- MR. WEISS: So is that two years?
- MR. SUMPTER: Right.
- 24 MR. WEISS: That's what the motion was
- 25 originally that Mr. Sumpter made.

- 1 MR. SUMPTER: Okay. I'll stick with that
- 2 then.
- 3 MRS. HAZUDA: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- 4 MRS. COLAIZZI: May I please have some
- 5 clarification on this contract or all three contracts,
- 6 am I correct? If I'm correct remembering Agenda
- 7 Review, it was a one-year contract with three-year
- 8 optional renewal, but that option still had to come in
- 9 front of this Board. Am I correct?
- 10 (Inaudible.)
- 11 MRS. COLAIZZI: I'm not disputing that,
- 12 Mr. Isler. I'm recalling Agenda Review.
- 13 MS. FISCHETTI: This is Lisa Fischetti.
- The way this was bid was so that we would
- 15 not have to go out and do an RFP again until the term
- 16 was up. So that means that the Board will be
- 17 authorizing us for the entire term for that up to, not
- 18 to exceed amount for the entire term.
- The option to renew on an annual basis, you
- 20 as a Board would be authorizing the Administration to
- 21 exercise that option without coming back to the Board
- 22 for approval, so it would be based on the
- 23 Administration's desire whether or not to continue to
- 24 use that contract.
- In fact, back in 2008, you did approve a

- 1 contract like this, and we did not use that firm for
- 2 all four years. We did not come back to you and say
- 3 we weren't going to use it. We did not come back to
- 4 you and tell you we did not go to the not to exceed
- 5 amount. We just didn't use the firm because we were
- 6 not satisfied with the firm.
- 7 So what the Board is authorizing is that we
- 8 do not have to bring this back to the Board again for
- 9 another RFP for the entire term that is listed. The
- 10 way the bid went out for RFP, the way the RFP was
- 11 done, providers and vendors knew that their price was
- 12 based on the fact that they would be able to keep
- 13 people employed for a period of time if they did good
- 14 work and their quality met our expectations. So the
- 15 pricing that was involved in the bid is based on a
- 16 multi-year contract.
- 17 MRS. COLAIZZI: Okay. So that would have
- 18 been my concern, if they were coming back every
- 19 year -- yeah. Okay. I'm just --
- MR. SUMPTER: After hearing the discussion
- 21 at this table, I'll withdraw the motion.
- DR. ALLEN: I'll withdraw my second.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Isler, do you still want
- 24 to comment?
- MR. ISLER: No, ma'am. Thank you.

- 1 MRS. HAZUDA: All right. Let's have a roll
- 2 call vote.
- MR. WEISS: This is a vote on the Business
- 4 item again.
- DR. ALLEN: One last question. I'm sorry.
- You won't have to deal with me after this.
- 7 MS. COLAIZZI: I was just going to say just
- 8 because this is your last night --
- 9 DR. ALLEN: For Item C3A regarding the
- 10 recommendation to reject the bids for Belmar, Madison,
- 11 Mann and Morningside, if the bids are -- and
- 12 Schenley. If then bids are rejected, would they have
- 13 the opportunity to apply again?
- 14 MR. WEISS: Well, if the bids are rejected,
- 15 the Board will have to -- there will be a discussion
- 16 with the Board how we proceed at that point, so yes,
- 17 people can rebid, but we're going to have to come up
- 18 with a process, the process the Board wants to use.
- DR. ALLEN: And just so the public is aware
- 20 as I was informed because I had concern about this one
- 21 is that for some of these bids we would actually end
- 22 up owing money beyond what they're offering us the
- 23 full cost?
- 24 MR. WEISS: It would not cover the debt on
- 25 the building, correct.

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DR. ALLEN: Thank you.
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- 2 MR. SUMPTER: We still would owe the debt?
- 3 MR. WEISS: Right.
- 4 MR. SUMPTER: It doesn't have to go to the
- 5 debt?
- 6 MS. SHEALEY: But we wouldn't have to --
- 7 and there's comments made that some may not have been
- 8 able to hear, but it was except for non-profit, and we
- 9 would not have to deface those bonds if we sold to a
- 10 non-profit.
- MR. WEISS: If you sold to a non-profit,
- 12 you don't have to deface them, which you don't have to
- 13 pay off those bonds, but the money has to either be
- 14 used for debt service generally or capital projects.
- 15 All of these bid documents specified that
- 16 the bid covering the existing debt was preferred, and
- 17 all of the ones that are being rejected did not meet
- 18 that threshold.
- MS. SHEALEY: Thank you.
- 20 MR. WEISS: This is a Business Agenda.
- 21 Dr. Allen.
- DR. ALLEN: Yes, on the report as a whole.
- 23 No, on C 1 and 2.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, on the report. I'll be

- 1 voting no on B2, 3, 4, 5 and 6. I'll also be voting
- 2 no on the public asset giveaway, C1, and I'll be

- 20 understand Mr. Isler's vote. Can I just catch up?
- I'm sorry. Can I get a point of order on

- 23 C2A.
- MR. ISLER: What I wanted to be very
- 25 specific with he solicitor and the vote is I'm voting

- 1 on the resolution that appears as Item No. C2A as
- 2 appears as a resolution, Ms. Shealey. Okay.
- MS. SHEALEY: Thank you.
- 4 MR. ISLER: Do you see it up there?
- 5 MS. SHEALEY: Thank you. I was --
- 6 MR. ISLER: Thank you.
- 7 MS. SHEALEY: -- a few pages behind. Thank
- 8 you. No. I was just making clear.

- 25 and B that are before you.

- 1 Are there any questions on the Personnel
- 2 Report at this time? Dr. Allen.
- 3 DR. ALLEN: I just want to congratulate and
- 4 welcome Evelyn Newsome in Addendum B, who will be the
- 5 secretary to Dr. Lane. I had the privilege of working
- 6 with her sister as my assistant for a number of years.
- 7 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 8 Mr. Brentley.
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: I am going to be
- 10 respectfully voting no for No. 2, and I have to take a
- 11 second to explain that with all of the somewhat
- 12 midyear changes with principals and shifting, which is
- 13 a terrible thing to do once a school starts, you lose
- 14 consistency in other schools.
- 15 And one of the things that's happening here
- 16 is the shifting or the moving of, No. 2, who is
- 17 assistant principal at Allegheny Middle School, loved
- 18 by all the students and a perfect fit with the
- 19 principal there under the leadership of
- 20 Tony Kendricks. I've never seen a couple work
- 21 together so well, and so as a respectful thing of
- 22 losing Mr. Valotta from the school, I will
- 23 respectfully be voting no.
- But on the flip side of that, I'm wishing
- 25 him well, but we miss him. The students will miss him

- 1 in front of the school every day organizing and
- 2 knowing all the students by name and having a
- 3 wonderful working relationship with the principal
- 4 there, Tony Kendricks, so I will be respectfully
- 5 voting no and giving him a --
- 6 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Brentley, for
- 7 clarification, is that Addendum B, C --

- 17 a very good job.
- 18 Thank you.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Sumpter.
- MR. SUMPTER: No comment.

- MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Weiss, could we have a

- 20 2012, D, provide report on how STAR, meaning Students
- 21 and Teachers Achieving Results program, as been
- 22 utilized as a means to motivate staff to increase
- 23 school performance during the 2011-2012 and, E,
- 24 introduce first portal version for District staff to
- 25 accept information to increase effectiveness;

- 1 Item No. 4, develop and communication a
- 2 plan to decrease racial disparities in student
- 3 achievement within District schools by April 2012;
- 4 No. 5, show progress on a majority of the
- 5 42 testing points of the PSSA;
- 6, re-evaluate and refine the career and
- 7 technology education plan in light of the District
- 8 realignment plan as adopted by the Board;
- 9 No. 7, continue emphasis on high school
- 10 reform with a focus on the following, A, transition
- 11 Pittsburgh Langley students into Pittsburgh Brashear
- 12 for 2012-13, transition Pittsburgh Oliver students
- 13 into Pittsburgh Perry for 2012-13 and, C, restart
- 14 Pittsburgh Westinghouse for 2012-13.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: So moved.
- MR. McCREA: Second.
- 17 MRS. HAZUDA: Colaizzi and McCrea.
- Are there any questions on the motion?
- 19 Dr. Allen.
- DR. ALLEN: No.
- 21 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Brentley.
- 22 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I am -- I will be
- 23 abstaining from this motion. I believe during these
- 24 hard times we need clear measurables as to the
- 25 progress that this District needs. When we can use

- 1 words like "roll out", "continue", "oversee",
- 2 "improve", "re-evaluate", it's a very, very difficult
- 3 to measure, and so I will abstain.
- And I felt that way over the last six years
- 5 on the process used to identify its goals, and I think
- 6 we need a little more for this District, so I will be
- 7 abstaining on this item.
- 8 Thank you.
- 9 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 10 Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: No.
- 12 MRS. HAZUDA: Mrs. Fink.
- MRS. FINK: I'm good. Thank you.
- 14 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: Yes. I think this process --
- 16 and, again, I know we do this every year -- went very
- 17 smoothly this year, Mrs. Hazuda, and I, you know,
- 18 thank you for that and Mr. Sumpter who usually takes
- 19 it to write this, but I know there was a lot of
- 20 comments back and forth and the emails, and I just
- 21 think that we did a good job of putting this together.
- It is a pleasure to be working with
- 23 Dr. Lane. I hear incredibly positive statements about
- 24 her leadership with this District. I'm a little
- 25 disappointed, but I think it should be noted

- 1 publicly that you have declined an increase this year
- 2 for the money that you should have been given because
- 3 you met your performances. There's a lot of comments
- 4 in the Commonwealth two years --
- 5 (Inaudible.)
- 6 MR. ISLER: Both, I understand that. I'm
- 7 saying that I want to be clear on that. There's a lot
- 8 of comments in the Pennsylvania newspapers about
- 9 Superintendents taking increases. You're one who did
- 10 not. I think that that sacrifice should be noted, and
- 11 I do appreciate it, but I again feel strongly that the
- 12 amount of time that you put in in this District is
- 13 stunning, and the work that you do on behalf of the
- 14 students and the parents is phenomenal. It's a
- 15 pleasure to be sitting at the table with you, and I
- 16 thank my fellow colleagues for working on these goals.
- 17 Thank you, Mrs. Hazuda.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 19 Mr. McCrea.
- 20 MR. McCREA: I think Mr. Isler covered it
- 21 very well.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Sumpter.
- 23 MR. SUMPTER: Just a clarification, the
- 24 last meeting it was vetted onto give the increase, and
- 25 just to note on record that Dr. Lane's non-acceptance

- 1 of that makes it official?
- 2 MR. WEISS: Dr. Lane has declined it and
- 3 has so informed the appropriate officers in the
- 4 District. Her salary remains as it was before the
- 5 Board action.
- 6 MR. SUMPTER: Okay. Thank you.
- 7 Thank you, Dr. Lane. You are to be
- 8 commended for that.
- 9 MRS. HAZUDA: Ms. Shealey.
- MS. SHEALEY: No.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Before we take the vote, I
- 12 would just like to comment that I'm a little
- 13 disheartened that there were so many hours and hours
- 14 put into this and that, Mr. Brentley, you chose not to
- 15 participate at all, and then to withhold your support
- 16 of the work done by your eight colleagues is very
- 17 disrespectful of our work.
- I hope you will reconsider and participate
- 19 in the process next year, so perhaps it can be what
- 20 you desire. Thank you.
- 21 MR. BRENTLEY: I would like to -- I would
- 22 just like to respond to that. I shared many times
- 23 over the last six years I think probably before you
- 24 arrived on this Board.
- The process has not been one that has been

- 1 open. The process has been one that it has almost
- 2 been prescribed before we get there on what the
- 3 outcome of what the evaluations are going to be. I've
- 4 said them publicly and I've said them as well as in
- 5 Executive Session.
- 6 Thirdly, the most important reason is is
- 7 that there is no need to walk into additional conflict
- 8 when you don't have to. I get enough of it here,
- 9 right at this table, and any other meetings where I
- 10 happen to have a difference of opinion, my same or
- 11 those same colleagues you referred to -- I have not
- 12 been given just the basic rights that others have been
- 13 given.
- And to attend a meeting to determine or to
- 15 hash out the evaluation and evaluation tool for the
- 16 Superintendent with having a difference of opinion
- 17 could get bloody because there are some here who are
- 18 hell bent on putting forward the positive things
- 19 regardless and not accurately and honestly evaluating
- 20 what's happening in the District, and so it continues
- 21 to be that, and so there's no need for me to over
- 22 extend myself when the welcome is simply not there on
- 23 behalf.
- It's a wonderful thing to say, what you've
- 25 just said, but in Executive Session, it is always much

- 1 more of a different situation, so I appreciate the
- 2 invitation. I still believe the process is tainted,
- 3 that as long as certain individuals continue to have a
- 4 heavy hand in this process, we'll never been be able
- 5 to accurately and honestly to be able to critically
- 6 analyze what's going on in this District. There will
- 7 always be the spin of pushing certain things forward.
- I'm not interested in that. I want the
- 9 brutal honesty. I want to be able to learn and to
- 10 grow, and somewhere somebody has got to be honest in
- 11 sharing with them. It is not what we see in the local
- 12 newspaper in terms of the conditions of what's
- 13 happening in this District.
- 14 So thank you very much.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you. And I would just
- 16 like to clarify that in Executive Session much as the
- 17 votes went tonight that there was a lot of divergence
- 18 of opinion. That is actually what happens at
- 19 Executive Session. For the most part, it's done
- 20 respectfully.
- 21 And I have to say you're the only person on
- 22 this Board who has ever insulted me personally, and so
- 23 I feel for you.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Well --
- 25 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Weiss --

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1 MR. BRENTLEY: Mrs. --
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- MRS. HAZUDA: Go ahead.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: Madame Chair, unfortunately,
- 4 I can understand your comments now because they appear
- 5 to be personal. I have been professional here even
- 6 having my microphones cut off, conversations taking
- 7 place, personal cell phone removed, not given the
- 8 proper opportunity to present my items, not having
- 9 any -- very few of my items ever seconded just to have
- 10 it presented to the floor.
- I think I have handled myself pretty well,
- 12 and I have yet -- there is no record anywhere of me
- 13 ever cussing, cursing, pointing my fingers or getting
- 14 angry to hit, hurt or harm anyone even though some
- 15 around this table have actually moved to that level.
- I have never raised my voice to shut a
- 17 person off from speaking at a meeting, like, some
- 18 chairs have done here. We don't want to hear you.
- 19 Just keep quiet. I've never ever done that.
- So, unfortunately, yours is personal, and
- 21 that's your call. You're the chair, but I've stated
- 22 clearly what my position -- I've said it again, and
- 23 somewhere we have to find a way to open this up to
- 24 everyone.
- 25 Yes, there are some difference of opinions.

- 1 Yes, there are some who are asking for other
- 2 information, and we should welcome that and not turn
- 3 it into anything personal, but it's your call.
- 4 MRS. HAZUDA: I could respond, but then we
- 5 would go back and forth all night. That's not --
- 6 MR. BRENTLEY: I'm willing to go --
- 7 MRS. HAZUDA: -- good use of anyone's time
- 8 so --

- Is there any discussion on the motion?

- 1 MRS. COLAIZZI: I'm afraid that I will not
- 2 be able to support this motion. It is probably the
- 3 third or fourth time now that this motion has been
- 4 brought to the table. We've had discussion over it.
- 5 (Inaudible.)
- 6 MRS. COLAIZZI: No, it is not.
- 7 However, I would rather --
- 8 (Inaudible.)
- 9 MRS. COLAIZZI: Regardless, it's -- we've
- 10 had this discussion on the fly. What I would like if
- 11 Mr. Brentley is serious about having that conversation
- 12 is to put it through committee, which it would go
- 13 through Business Committee I would imagine or it could
- 14 go through Communications and Marketing, whichever
- 15 their chair prefers.
- But if we're going to have that sort of a
- 17 discussion, I don't want to make a decision like that
- 18 right here, last minute, last second, you know, when
- 19 we've already been here for two and a half hours. I
- 20 would prefer it go through committee.
- 21 So I would ask Mr. Brentley to please
- 22 withdraw his motion and put it through a committee.
- 23 MR. BRENTLEY: No. I do want to clarify
- 24 it. This is the first time that it was presented for
- 25 a vote for consideration. There were many times it

- 1 was raised and discussed, but never before this body
- 2 for a vote consideration.
- 3 MRS. HAZUDA: Any other comments on the
- 4 motion? Mr. Sumpter.
- 5 MR. SUMPTER: The only merit I can see is
- 6 that the identity of our schools outside of the City
- 7 for people around the world to know who we are, where
- 8 we're from or where those schools are located. It may
- 9 help in that sense.
- I know in state playoffs in athletics you
- 11 hear -- there's many Central Catholics, but when you
- 12 say Pittsburgh Central Catholic, you know exactly
- 13 which one you're talking about, so I think that same
- 14 identity could be extended to our schools also, but, I
- 15 mean, of all the big things we've talked about this
- 16 evening, let's move on.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Any other comments on the
- 18 motion? Mr. Brentley.
- MR. BRENTLEY: I just want to give the main
- 20 reason for this is that there are reasons why
- 21 buildings have names, and it is for history of this
- 22 region. It is to bring up that person's name or his
- 23 or her spirit or to remind us of their
- 24 accomplishments.
- A perfect example would be Milliones, and,

- 1 you know, not only do you have Pittsburgh in front,
- 2 but you have University Preparatory School At Margaret
- 3 Milliones, no, no. We want to say her name
- 4 first. Vann School, these individuals made
- 5 contributions to the City, and the list just goes on
- 6 as to the history of it.
- 7 We do not need to throw Pittsburgh in front
- 8 of or to take the light away from the rich history
- 9 that some of these names bring to some of these
- 10 buildings.
- 11 Thank you.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Any other comments on the
- 13 motion?
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Weiss, could we have a
- 16 roll call, please?
- 17 MR. WEISS: Dr. Allen.
- DR. ALLEN: No.
- MR. WEISS: Mr. Brentley.

- DR. ALLEN: No.
- 2 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Brentley.
- 3 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes. I have a couple
- 4 announcements.
- I just want to suggest to you, Dr. Lane and
- 6 the Administration, that I think it's worth a second
- 7 look at our sex ed program, and the reason why I raise
- 8 that is that if you're looking in the news of all the
- 9 issues, the information with Penn State and so on, we
- 10 need to re-evaluate it and see if there's any issues
- 11 or topics in our sex ed that would do a couple of
- 12 things, make it uncomfortable to talk about or it
- 13 might create an atmosphere that could create a similar
- 14 atmosphere.
- And so I'm asking that we find a way or put
- 16 it on the Education Committee or to bring it up and to
- 17 talk about it. I know of staff, I know of parents who
- 18 have raised concerns about certain sections and how do
- 19 you handle that kind of discussion with young kids,
- 20 and so I think that is something that we need to
- 21 consider.
- Second, I want to just ask too, Dr. Lane, I
- 23 had made a request about information concerning
- 24 discussions about bankruptcy, and I did not receive
- 25 anything. I have not heard anything, and I would

- 1 really like to know any and all communications or what
- 2 discussions or how extensive have those discussions
- 3 been, and I also want to remind the Administration
- 4 that it is really something that should not take place
- 5 without full Board involvement.
- And the final comment, I just want to
- 7 remind folks concerning is the article that was in
- 8 last week's local paper concerning the situation at
- 9 Westinghouse. I've shared with you, Doctor, in
- 10 private, as well as in Agenda Review and I'll say it
- 11 here this evening that there are some recommendations
- 12 for disciplinary actions for some staff, and I am one
- 13 Board member who believes that that should not happen
- 14 to any staff.
- 15 Westinghouse is a problem that we caused as
- 16 a Board and the Administration in not taking our time
- 17 and not putting right things and the right things in
- 18 place, and so if and when anything is presented before
- 19 me, I will not be supporting it, and I'm asking that
- 20 you not even bring anything forward. This requires
- 21 someone to go in there and to really re-evaluate what
- 22 happened and what went wrong.
- In all fairness to you, Dr. Lane, that is
- 24 nothing really that we can place at your foot. That
- 25 was the previous Administration and their willingness

- 1 to force things through without thinking about them.
- The final thing I just wanted to present is
- 3 no other school is going through what this particular
- 4 community is going through. I have here 40 citations,
- 5 40 citation since the beginning of the school year.
- 6 That is unacceptable, disorderly conduct, fighting,
- 7 et cetera, et cetera. You cannot blame the children.
- B DR. ALLEN: Can I see?
- 9 MR. BRENTLEY: Yes, you can.
- 10 You cannot blame the children for some of
- 11 the problems that we've had. It's not read in the
- 12 public -- it's public information. You can make a
- 13 request to the local magistrate's office.
- MS. SHEALEY: Those are kids.
- 15 MR. WEISS: I would urge Mr. Brentley to be
- 16 prudent in his discussion here. These are minors, so
- 17 you're not doing these children any favor by bringing
- 18 this up.
- 19 MR. BRENTLEY: I understand that,
- 20 Mr. Weiss. That's why it's a packet there, and I
- 21 shared it the way I shared it.
- Thank you very much, but the point is I'm
- 23 encouraging the Board that we have to find a way to
- 24 get in there to resolve Westinghouse. You don't allow
- 25 this to go on, and we have to do what we have to do to

- 1 make it happen and to make it safe for all children.
- 2 Thank you very much.
- 3 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- 4 MRS. COLAIZZI: Motion to adjourn.
- 5 MRS. HAZUDA: No. Wait. I need to respond
- 6 to two of Mr. Brentley's --
- 7 Just for clarification, Dr. Lane did
- 8 respond on your request for information on --
- 9 What was your second thing?
- MR. BRENTLEY: Bankruptcy.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Bankruptcy, she did respond
- 12 to us twice on that. She responded initially, and
- 13 then she gave us -- she provided additional
- 14 information, so if you want to check your faxes and/or
- 15 your emails.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Are you talking about the
- 17 memo --
- 18 MRS. HAZUDA: Yes.
- MR. BRENTLEY: --- that she referred to
- 20 Mr. Weiss.
- 21 MR. WEISS: The memo explained the nature
- 22 of any discussions that were with me, and the memo
- 23 said there had been no other discussions by Dr. Lane
- 24 or me. That's what it said.
- MR. BRENTLEY: Okay. Well, that's good

- 1 information and --
- 2 MRS. HAZUDA: What was your -- I know.
- 3 Part of the discussion in speaking of discipline
- 4 tonight was centered around the concerns at
- 5 Westinghouse, and I don't want to say anymore, but we
- 6 were discussing it tonight.
- 7 MR. WEISS: I would urge the Board to be
- 8 very prudent in discussing student discipline or any
- 9 legal proceedings in the schools. That is really not
- 10 appropriate for a public forum.
- MS. COLAIZZI: Thank you, Mr. Weiss. I
- 12 apologize.
- MR. WEISS: You don't have to apologize.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: Motion to adjourn.
- MRS. HAZUDA: no. We have to go around the
- 16 table. We're on announcements. Do you have any
- 17 announcements?
- 18 MRS. COLAIZZI: I tried. No.
- 19 MRS. HAZUDA: Mrs. Fink.
- 20 MRS. FINK: No.
- 21 MRS. HAZUDA: Mr. Isler.
- MR. ISLER: No.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Mrs. Colaizzi.
- MRS. COLAIZZI: No.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Go ahead, Tom. Mr. Sumpter.

- 1 MR. SUMPTER: I just want to say that this
- 2 Saturday the City League, Pittsburgh City League
- 3 Championship was held at Cupples Stadium, two great
- 4 teams, Pittsburgh Allderdice, and it was really
- 5 interesting.
- 6 Sometimes they were Obama. Sometimes they
- 7 were USO. Sometimes they were University Preparatory
- 8 School at Margaret Milliones. Sometimes they were
- 9 U Prep. Sometimes they were the Eagles. Sometimes
- 10 they were the Panthers. I hear they're actually the
- 11 Wild Cats, but this is what happens when you have
- 12 three schools, three or four schools put together to
- 13 make one team.
- 14 It's University Preparatory School at
- 15 Margaret Milliones, Pittsburgh Science and Technology
- 16 Academy and Barack Obama International Studies Academy
- 17 to make up the USO. This is their first year of
- 18 competition, first year of coming together. They
- 19 talked about how they had to overcome all the egos of
- 20 the different young men coming together from different
- 21 parts of the City, different schools.
- 22 And, collectively, they put together a very
- 23 outstanding football season. I believe they were 11
- 24 and 1 with 8 shutouts. They played teams in Ohio.
- 25 They are looking forward to going into the state

- 1 playoffs. They'll be playing in Johnstown,
- 2 Pennsylvania. They'll be playing against -- I'm
- 3 not -- I can -- Altoona, the game is in Altoona, and I
- 4 can't recall the team they're going to be playing, but
- 5 they're really looking forward to making impact on the
- 6 state, and if they do get a win in the state playoffs,
- 7 that will be good, but they did win the championship.
- 8 And it was an exciting game because it was
- 9 nothing to nothing, 0/0, until about eight minutes
- 10 left in the game, and the one young man at U Prep,
- 11 University Preparatory School at Margaret Milliones,
- 12 USO, they finally scored, so it was six nothing with
- 13 about three or four minutes left, and then finally
- 14 they got the ball back, and a young man broke off a
- 15 run from the 9 yard line and went 91 yards for a
- 16 touchdown. It was an exciting ending to a game, but
- 17 congratulations to Pittsburgh USO, the guys of U Prep,
- 18 Obama and Sci-Tech coming together and forming that
- 19 team. It was the first year of competition. They're
- 20 the City League Champions. Congratulations.
- 21 (Applause.)
- MS. COLAIZZI: Ms. Shealey.
- MS. SHEALEY: Dr. Lane, can you speak to --
- 24 and I'm sorry to put you on the spot, but, apparently,
- 25 I'm going to do it any way -- the things that -- the

- 1 changes that have been instituted at Westinghouse in
- 2 the past four to six weeks that addressed some of the
- 3 concerns out of that building?
- DR. LANE: Yes, I can. What the major
- 5 changes, of course, are involved and we had two issues
- 6 we had to address. One was our action we took and
- 7 asked you to approve regarding single-gender classes,
- 8 and so that is a change.
- 9 Another change is addressing the -- we did
- 10 make a change to standard schedule rather than the
- 11 trimester schedule. We did change leadership at
- 12 Pittsburgh Westinghouse, and the agreement that I
- 13 think in discussing it with folks coming in, as well
- 14 as Dr. Talapero who has already gone in to assist was
- 15 that we would have a two-week period of just
- 16 assessment as to where things are, what we thought the
- 17 major issues were and how we were going to address
- 18 them, and then we would meet after that two-week
- 19 period and prioritize some things that we believe
- 20 needed to be done.
- 21 Progress, I know Dr. Otuwa is there fairly
- 22 regularly. I myself have been to Westinghouse I think
- 23 four times this year, which is more than any other
- 24 school in the City.
- We did have a meeting. We are planning to

- 1 meet with Homewood Children's Village to make sure
- 2 that we're all on the same page as to who's doing
- 3 what. One of the concerns we have is around roles and
- 4 responsibilities because there are a lot of extra
- 5 adults in Westinghouse, and we have to make sure
- 6 everyone's clear on what their role and
- 7 responsibilities are, so we knew that that was one of
- 8 the things that had to happened.
- 9 The last time I was there is -- and I'll be
- 10 the first to admit we had real struggles at
- 11 Westinghouse this year, but the last time I was there,
- 12 some of our middle school young ladies were coming
- 13 back from seeing a play, and they were so excited.
- 14 They were --
- They had enjoyed it. It was related to I
- 16 think some of the reading they had been doing in
- 17 English language arts, and they actually got to see
- 18 the play performed, and they were talking to me about,
- 19 you know, how great that was.
- 20 Another opportunity I had there -- and just
- 21 to remind all of us that not all of us is a negative
- 22 at Westinghouse. We had four of our seniors also
- 23 young women who are Promise Ready, and one of them was
- 24 a 4.0. I got the opportunity -- I told them I wanted
- 25 my picture with them, and so we got a picture taken

- 1 together.
- 2 So we do have a lot of attention on it.
- 3 You know, I've told this Board that I plan to give it
- 4 personal attention because we have to make it right.
- 5 We truly have to make it right.
- 6 So I will be keeping the Board up-to-date
- 7 on any recommended actions that we believe need to be
- 8 taken. We got a suggestion last night to have a
- 9 meeting in the community. I think that's a good idea,
- 10 so I had conversation with Tim Stevens about when we
- 11 might be able to do that just today.
- So we'll be, you know, using part of our
- 13 Education Committee time or the Board Update to keep
- 14 the Board apprised as to progress.
- Thank you.
- MS. SHEALEY: Thank you, Dr. Lane.
- 17 I'm done, Mrs. Hazuda.
- 18 MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you.
- I just want to take a moment to thank --
- 20 Go ahead, Skip.
- MR. McCREA: I did forget something. On
- 22 November 29th is the budget -- the Public Hearing at
- 23 noon for the budget, so if anybody is interested in
- 24 talking about the budget hearing, come on up.
- MRS. HAZUDA: Thank you. That was very
