School Procedures

Arrival Procedures

Walkers and bus students enter the school through the main entrance on the Liberty Ave side of the building. Parents that drive their students to school are asked to drop their children off on Howley St. Fortieth Street drop-off is for **buses only**. Please note that Woolslair staff report for arrival duty at 9:05 a.m. Please do not drop off students prior to 9:05 a.m. More details of the morning routine are outlined below:

- Staff report to morning duty at 9:05 a.m.
- Students who eat breakfast will report to the cafeteria at 9:10 a.m.
- All students report to the morning meeting in the gymnasium at 9:25 a.m.
- The morning meeting begins at 9:25 a.m.
- Teachers will escort students to class at 9:33 a.m.
- Students that bring cell phones are to give their cell phones to their homeroom teacher until dismissal.

Dismissal Procedures

All students are dismissed by a grade-level homeroom teacher or escorted to their bus room. Students will be escorted to the buses by a staff member. Students that walk home can be received outside of the school in the courtyard. Please make sure that the homeroom teacher sees you before you take your student.

Students who attend the after-school program will report to the library.

If your child will not be taking the bus home or will be picked up by an adult, not on their emergency care form, you must send a letter to the school with your child. All changes must be approved by the school administration. Phone calls will not be accepted for any dismissal changes unless we receive written correspondence. Please do not attempt to pick up your child in the bus lane (Fortieth Street). Parents can park on Howley St. to pick up their children. Ms. Lott is unable to authorize early dismissals via phone call.

Dress Code for Woolslair K-5

Pittsburgh Woolslair does have a dress code policy. Please refer to the dress code policy on Page 6 of the student handbook.

Cell Phones/Electronic Devices (except Laptop or IPAD)

Cell phones and electronic devices will be collected by each homeroom teacher. Please refer to the electronic device policy on Page 11 of the student handbook. Students will receive their items when they are dismissed from school.

Lunch/Breakfast

Breakfast is served daily from 9:10 until 9:25. Students should report directly to the cafeteria after entering the building. Lunch is served to students daily. The school has two lunch periods. Students in grades K-1 eat the first lunch from 12:14 – 12:59 and students in grades 2 -5 eat the second lunch from 12:59 – 1:44. All students can eat both breakfast and lunch for free. Students that do not want to eat the lunch provided by the

school can pack their lunch. Please note that students are not permitted to bring just chips/snacks as lunch. School menus are posted monthly on the district website.

Recess

Students will have 25 minutes of recess daily. Students will go outside for recess (weather dependent) or to the gymnasium. When students are unable to go outside for recess, they will have indoor recess.

Transportation

Students that live at least 1.5 miles from Pittsburgh Woolslair will receive transportation. Transportation information is mailed to families by the district transportation office. Information is usually mailed by mid-August.

Bus Safety

It is important for students to follow the rules on the school bus to ensure the safety of all students. Additional information regarding transportation can be found on the district website: <https://www.pghschools.org/transportation>

If riding the bus, follow these rules:

- Follow the directions of the bus driver.
- Remain in your seat, do not change seats.
- Keep your head, hands, and body inside the bus.
- Refrain from throwing objects inside or outside of the bus.
- Talk with an inside voice. No screaming/yelling.
- Keep hands and unkind words to yourself.

School Departments and Programs

Course Offerings

Pittsburgh Woolslair K-5 students who are eligible for special education services are supported through the Program for Students with Exceptionalities.

- Speech and Language services are available for eligible students.
- Art, Music, Gym, and Library, are available for all students.
- Instrumental music is integrated into the curriculum for grades 3.
- Students can sign up for instrumental in grades 4 and 5.

Student Schedule

Students will receive a copy of their homeroom schedule at the beginning of the school year. Pittsburgh Woolslair follows a six (6) day schedule. The school calendar always indicates the rotation day number on the calendar.

Bell Schedule

On Pages 7-9 of the student handbook, you will find a copy of the bell schedule.

School Calendar

A monthly school calendar is sent home to families. The calendar lists special activities, parent meetings, and other important information. The school calendar is also posted on the school webpage.

Absences

Per the Pittsburgh Public Schools Policy, an absence is excused for the following reasons:

- Illness or injuries which make the student physically unable to attend school
- Health Care--including doctor visits, emergency care, and/or quarantine.
- Bereavement and/or family funeral
- Religious Holidays and Religious Instruction
- Weather Emergency. If school is not canceled, a written explanation must be provided within three days. The principal will review it for approval.
- School-Approved Activities—Includes field trips, service learning, assemblies, support groups, mentoring, and tutoring.
- Other Principal Approved Excusals— Principal may excuse attendance for educational vacations, counseling/support groups, social service agency appointments. A request for educational absences should be submitted in writing to the principal one week before a trip for approval. The request should indicate what educational activities the student will complete. The student and family should also work with the teacher to complete make-up work.

Unexcused/Excessive Absences

- Parents must submit a written note to the teacher for all excused absences. The school may request documentation where appropriate.

- Please note the following PPS policies and procedures regarding unexcused absences for all students at Pittsburgh Phillips as outlined in the Student Code of Conduct:
- Legal Notices shall be sent to all students of compulsory school attendance after each instance of Unlawful and Unexcused Absence.
- After 3 Unlawful or Unexcused Absences, the parent will be required to schedule an appointment with the school counselor and create a School Attendance Improvement Plan (SAIP).
- If additional absences occur and the parent has not created a SAIP or the SAIP was violated, a citation will be filed with the local magistrate.
- Possible consequences with the magistrate may include:
 - o Fine of up to \$300
 - o Completion of a parenting education program

Students are permitted only **10 excused absences** during a school year.

Tardiness

Promptness to school is especially important. Students who arrive late miss the beginning of the day routines and valuable instructional time. Even arriving 10 minutes late can cause stress for a student and disrupt their learning and the learning of others.

Students are admitted into the school as early as 9:10 a.m. Students who are not present and accounted for by 9:25 a.m. will be counted as tardy.

Parents should walk their child into the office and check in when tardy. The student will then be given a class admittance slip from the office before going to the classroom.

Teachers are required to keep a record of tardiness. If a student is habitually tardy a parent conference will be scheduled, and further interventions may take place to solve the issue.

Before/After School Programs

There are opportunities for students to participate in after-school programs. Pittsburg Woolslair currently offers the following programs:

- **Neighborhood Learning Alliance**-Afterschool program that supports students with completing their homework and STEAM programming.
- **STEAM Club**-Afterschool program run by Woolslair teachers.
- **Junior Chapter of The National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE Jr.)**- Sponsored by The Links Inc. (grades 3-5 before school)
- **Intramurals**- Students can participate in intramurals after school.
- **Strong Women, Strong Girls** - Local University students offer a mentoring program for girls in grades 4 and 5.

School Rules

The administration and staff of Pittsburgh Woolslair K-5 have developed three universal rules for all students in Grades K-5. Classroom teachers may also utilize supplemental rules while in their classroom at their own discretion.

- Ready and Safe
- Respect
- Responsibility

PBIS, SEL, and Efficacy

Pittsburgh Woolslair utilizes a Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) system to recognize positive student behavior. The goal of our PBIS Program is to create a learning environment where students can learn and grow. The PBIS behavior matrix is shared on the school website. Students are recognized daily for demonstrating positive student behavior. Students receive PAWS tickets for demonstrating the 3Rs.

Every month students learn a Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) skill to support our school improvement goal on school culture. Teachers utilize SEL lessons from Wayfinder.

Woolslair participates in the PPS Student Envoy program. The Student Envoy Project focuses on mobilizing students directly, engaging them as active and essential partners in improving their academic performance and impacting classroom and school culture. This program builds a group of student leaders called Student Envoys, who are trained and provided with support to lead a cultural change with their peers throughout the building.

The PSCC meets monthly. Information is shared on the school webpage and via Talking Points.
- **Volunteering Opportunities Within the School** –Please contact the school if you are interested in finding out how you can volunteer at the school. There are certain criteria that must be met prior to volunteering at the school.

Uniform Policy 2023-2024

Pittsburgh Woolslair PreK-5 is a uniform school. All students that attend Woolslair must wear the school's uniform. The school's uniform colors are navy blue, light blue, yellow, white, and black. The Woolslair uniform policy, created and adopted by parents, is an integral part of creating an atmosphere that is focused on learning. Students are expected to always follow the dress code. Failure to follow the dress code is a breach of the expectations in place at Pittsburgh Woolslair PreK-5. A student's clothing should fit appropriately and meet the guidelines indicated below.

Pittsburgh Woolslair Uniform Guidelines:

Tops: Solid color Navy, Light Blue, Yellow, White, and Black polo shirts, collared shirts, or sweaters. Woolslair school spirit t-shirts are also permitted.

Bottoms: Solid color Khaki, Navy, or Black pants. Jumpers and skirts are also acceptable in the required color combination. Knee-length shorts of the appropriate color are also acceptable during warm weather.

Socks: Must always be worn.

Shoes: Sandals with a back strap, casual, or dress shoes. Students must wear athletic shoes for Physical Education class.

The following are NOT permitted:

- Jeans, hats, or hoodies
- Shorts that are not knee length.
- Undershirts, exposed undergarments, midriff tops, tank tops, or halters
- Flip flops, open-toed shoes, or slippers
- Pictures, words, or graphics on any piece of clothing
- Coats, scarves worn inside during the school day.



When available, uniforms will be provided to students, not in uniform. When not available, parents will be called to bring a uniform to school. Please do not hesitate to contact Ms. Kimberly Safran, Principal with any questions or concerns regarding the uniform policy.

Cell Phone Policy 2023-2024

At Pittsburgh Woolslair, we want our students focused on learning every day. Additionally, we also want to create the safest learning environment possible. It is important for students to be free from distractions as well as safe while learning in class and moving throughout the building for lunch, recess, or other activities.

For these reasons, we are reinforcing the Pittsburgh Woolslair electronic device policy. Electronic devices include all cell phones, Air Pods, headphones, etc. Beginning on the first day of school, Monday, August 28th, all students are required to turn in all electronic devices brought to school during homeroom. Student electronic devices will be kept in the Homeroom teacher's classroom. At the conclusion of the school day during Homeroom, all electronic devices will be returned to the student by the Homeroom teacher. In the case of a scheduled early dismissal, students will be able to receive their devices in their classes.

Students found in violation of this procedure will be asked to surrender the device to the principal and must return to school with a parent to have the electronic device returned.

We are implementing this procedure to improve the overall instructional climate and to ensure a safe learning community. This procedure will reduce classroom distractions during instruction and allow all students to be fully engaged in class.

As a parent of four children, I understand that we live in a very uncertain world. Therefore, I am committed to ensuring that if you need to reach your child or your child needs to reach you, this can be done through the main office. Parents may call 412-529-8800 and leave a message for their child. Likewise, if a child needs to reach a parent, they will be permitted to use the phone with a note to the office.

We strongly discourage students from bringing any type of electronic device to school. Neither the school nor the district is responsible for any lost, damaged, or stolen electronic devices that are brought into the building.
